fter the retirement of John Wiseman as Port Gaverne's excellent Volunteer Beach Master, a small committee was formed to take over. We initially wanted to set up a self managing group. However, the cost of insurance proved prohibitive.

Following a meeting on the 18th of June, we have decided to manage the beach directly with the National Trust, paying all monies collected to the Trust. This money will then be available for repairs to the slipway, levelling the beach, signs and other maintenance.

We have decided not to appoint any individual to be Beach Master. The Port Gaverne Hotel has very kindly agreed to collect all launching fees on our behalf. A notice informing the public of this will be erected very soon. Hopefully all beach users will politely help with any "policing" issues (such as stopping people from parking on the beach). In due course, a set of rules will be posted near the beach to help with this process.

Calming the seas and hoisting the sails to go into heaven

Hasn't the Church got anything more interesting to talk about than the appointment of a gay bishop? Of course it has! But because the media have got hold of it, it has been blown up out of all proportion (look at the issues that have come and gone over the years). It is my view that providing the person concerned is able to minister faithfully to those in his care and does not engage in gay sex, I can go along with the appointment. Many gay priests, having a very gentle and understanding nature, have a wonderful ability to show love an compassion to those in their care.

We in Port Isaac have far more important things to think about. Raising money to keep the Church building open for everybody is our concern at the moment. From a recent quinquennial report on the fabric, as well as having to raise in the region of £10,000 a year to run the Church, we have to do the following:

Urgent works requiring immediate attention

- Arrange test of electrical installation by registered NICEIC electrician and carry out any recommended work promptly - cost approx £100 for the test.
- Arrange test of fire extinguishers and upgrade as necessary cost dependant on test.
- Refix loose floor tiles cost approx £100.
- Replace/refix damaged/slipped roof slates, remove vegetation and renew pointing of south gable of nave cost approx £400.
- Repair damaged fixings to rainwater goods. Monitor run-off from nave roof in heavy rain to access adequacy of rainwater pipes - cost approx £400.
- Clear blocked surface water drain. Clear vegetation from perimeter drainage channel and repair as necessary cost own labour.
- Arrange test of lightning conductor cost unknown.
- Check over roof timbers to nave and chancel, particularly at wall plate level and treat any active beetle infestation with clear preservative woodworm killer - cost approx £10 for materials.
- Consider providing some form of protection to the drop on the west side of the building – cost own labour.


Work recommended to be carried out during the next twelve months

- Repair purlin ends to south gable of nave cost approx £500.
- Rake out cracks in external render and dressed stones of buttresses etc and repoint with lime mortar. Renew detached and hollow areas of roughcast render to match - cost approx £800.
- Lift individual boards in nave floor to investigate possible decay in timbers, adequacy of ventilation and damp proofing. Carry out repairs and remedial work as necessary - cost dependant on investigation.
- Investigate loose floorboards in vestry and carry out remedial work as necessary cost dependant on investigation.
- Remove damaging vegetation from boundary walls and repair defective masonry – cost own labour.
- Put in hand programme of specialist maintenance/repair to defective window glazing, giving priority to south window, east chancel window, rusting external grilles, rusting ferramenta and opening lights - cost unknown.

This could mean that we must find, at a conservative estimate, a further £5000 during the next twelve months!

So that's the situation. But to answer the question "Hasn't the Church got anything more interesting to talk about?" The good news is that the Church is vibrantly active, seeking to do the Lord's work day-by-day; Sunday-by-Sunday. This will be particularly evident by the way people react to these words and quite visibly in August $(15^{th}-17^{th})$ when we have our Flower Festival and all the community join together for a glorious time, thanking God for his goodness.

Driving home the differences!

Several banks are installing new 'drive through' cash machines whereby customers will be able to withdraw cash without even having to leave their vehicles. To enable customers to use this new facility the following procedures have been drawn up and you are asked to read the procedure that applies to your own circumstances (ie male or female).

Male procedure

- Drive up to the cash machine.
- Wind down window. 2
- Insert card into machine and enter PIN number. 3
- 4 Enter amount of cash required and withdraw.
- Retrieve card, cash and receipt.
- 6 Wind up window.
- Drive off.

Female procedure

- Drive up to the cash machine.
- 2 Reverse back the required amount to align you window to machine.
- 3 Set hand brake.
- 4 Wind down window.
- 5 Find handbag; remove all contents onto passenger seat to locate card.
- 6 Turn the radio down.
- 7 Attempt to insert your card into the machine.
- 8 Attempt to insert your card into the machine.
- 9 Open car door to allow easier access to machine due to its excessive distance from the car.
- 10
- 11 Reinsert the card the correct way up.
- 12 Search through handbag again to find diary with PIN number written on the inside back page.
- 13 Enter PIN number.
- Press cancel and reinsert correct PIN number. 14
- 15 Enter amount of cash required.
- 16 Retrieve cash and receipt.
- 17 Empty handbag again to locate purse and place cash inside.
- 18 Place receipt in back of cheque book.
- 19 Drive forward two feet.
- 20 Reverse back to cash machine.
- 21 Retrieve card.
- Re-empty handbag, locate purse and place card into the slot 22 provided.
- 23 Give appropriate one fingered hand signal to male driver queuing behind.
- 24 Restart stalled engine.
- 25 Drive off.
- Release hand brake.



Apparently, one in five people in the world are Chinese. There are five people in my family, so it must be one of them. It's either my mum or my dad, or my older brother Colin or my younger brother Ho-Cha-Chu. But I think it's Colin.







Capers are complimentary to fish and this month I am suggesting two recipes both using these tasty little buds. First is the classic Skate with Black Butter and the second uses slow roasted salmon fillets and delicious either hot or cold. A lot of people are fearful of skate because of the bones, but they are large and the flesh comes away easily so there should be no danger of swallowing them. Indeed, my cat loves to crunch them up completely and in doing so has a calcium rich meal. Skate wings vary in size so care should be taken when choosing them – each portion should be about 225g/8oz so it may be necessary to cut the wings to size.

Skate with Black Butter

(serves 4)

1litre/2pts fish stock (a stock cube is fine) * 4 x 225g/8oz skate wings 1tsp vinegar * 1tbsp capers 50g/2oz butter * tbsp chopped parsley

Method

- Place the skate in a shallow pan large enough to hold the fish in one layer and simmer gently in the stock for about 10 minutes, until just cooked.
- Remove skate from the pan, drain well and keep warm.
- Heat the butter in a frying pan until nut brown in colour. Add the vinegar and capers and spoon over the skate.
- Sprinkle with parsley and serve with new potatoes and a vegetable of your choice.

Slow Roasted Salmon with Horseradish Dressing

(serves 4)

4 x 175g/6oz salmon fillets * olive oil salt and freshly ground black pepper * 1 heaped tbsp capers 1 tbsp red wine vinegar * 100ml/4fl oz extra virgin olive oil 1 tbsp horseradish sauce * 175g/6oz mixed salad leaves

Method

- ☐ Heat oven to 100°C/200°F.
- Wash the capers to remove excess vinegar.
- Brush salmon with olive oil and season with salt and pepper and place in a greased ovenproof dish.
- Balance capers on top of the salmon and cook in the oven for about 20 minutes the salmon should be only 'just' cooked. Allow to stand for five minutes.
- Whilst the salmon is cooking, make the dressing by mixing together the vinegar, extra virgin olive oil and the horseradish sauce.
- Pour dressing over the salad leaves and serve with the salmon.



The June Meeting of the Parish Council was held on June 9th 2003 at the Church Rooms, Port Isaac.

As this was the first full meeting of the new Parish Council, the election of Chairman and the following appointments to Committees were made:-

FINANCE

It was proposed by Mr M Lee that the Council would give the St Endellion Parochial Church Council a donation of £600.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Mrs Helen Richards was welcomed to the meeting and she reported that she had opened the Kissing Gates provided by the South East Tourism Association to celebrate the Coast Path Silver Jubilee. She had also attended a Genetically Modified Food debate at Taunton where only 120 people had attended as it had not been well publicised. There are plans to hold these locally. She also reported that proposals for the County Electoral Review are likely to group St Endellion with St Kew, St Minver, St Breock and Egloshayle. As this is ongoing, she will keep the Parish Council up to date and an Area Committee Meeting will by held on the June 26th at St Merryn.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Mr D Phelps proposed that the clerk should write to North Cornwall District Council asking why they needed to sell the land adjacent to the council offices and voicing the Parish Council's objections.

BROWN SIGNS

Mr D Phelps reported that he and Mr M Lee had met with Mr P Allen to look at proposals for brown signs. These proposed plans for the brown tourist signs were placed before the Council, discussed and approved. The go ahead is dependent upon funding which is currently being sought.

TENDERS FOR FOOTPATH MAINTENANCE

The Footpath tenders were opened. Mr RJ Ford had made a tender of £925. It was proposed by Mr M Lee to accept Mr Ford's quote, but to check if his tender includes footpath 19.

PORT ISAAC SCHOOL/PC SPORTS HALL

Mrs B Bell reported on the meeting held on May 20th. She proposed that the Parish Council should invite School representatives to meet with Jane Cotterill, Frank Chapman of Cornwall County Council and Richard Watson, School Governor of St Minver School, to further advance this project.

PARISH PLAN QUESTIONNAIRE

Mr M Lee reported that the 95 page draft Parish Plan had been received from Cornwall Rural Community Council. It was proposed that The Parish Plan Working Group study the full report, identify and prioritise issues and report back next month. Subject to RNLI agreement, Cornwall Rural Community Council will be asked if they could undertake a 'Planning for Real' exercise (a further Survey to augment the Questionnaire) at the Life Boat Larks on August 17th. It was also proposed by Mr Lee that Neil Pendleton be provided with a draft report in respect of the affordable housing questions.

AFFORDABLE HOUSING

Mrs B Bell reported on the NCDC housing seminar that she attended on the May 28th, together with Mrs J Yates. She proposed that the PC invites Stacey Sleeman, County Housing Enabler with Cornwall Rural Community Council, and Ian Baker, Housing Enabling Officer for NCDC, to advise the PC on affordable housing with regard to the Parish Questionnaire response. It was agreed that they would be invited to a separate meeting on June 30th.

The Parish Council had received a letter from four girls at Port Isaac School regarding lack of leisure facilities for girls in the Village and the Council would be meeting them for discussion.

The next Parish Council Meeting will be held on Monday July 14th at Port Isaac, where everyone is welcome.

Monk's monthly mutterings! Holiday of a Lifetime

on a recent holiday to the Northern provinces of Kerbistan, which are situated in the mountainous region between Seegrotti and Inner Rogiralia, I had the good fortune to meet up with a tribe of nomadic Kerbistans known as the Ahsisis. These extremely hospitable, courteous and beautiful people have a reputation for living an exceptionally long life and indeed the tribe with whom I spent several days, boasted a large number of people well over a hundred years of age. The matriarch claimed to be one hundred and twenty years and was still a fine looking woman; the patriarch, although he could not remember how old he was, remembered the invasion of Kerbistan by the Rogiralians in 1879.

The reason for their longevity is, of course, due to their diet, which I found exceptionally appetising and nutritious. It consisted of butter, cheese, milk and meat from the Minski goats of which they had herds of several thousand beasts; flour and bread made from the Apupipee rice and Keebul berries. Both the rice and the berries grow in great profusion on the lower mountain slopes and in the valleys (the rice which grows higher up the mountains is of much poorer quality and one should always be sure to purchase the type named the Right Apupipee Rice.

A typical Ahsisi tribal meal would start as the sun set below the western mountains. The men, women and children would come down from the Steppes, where they had been tending the herds of Minski goats, and would all enter the 'Eumawancar' – a huge tent made of Minski goats skins and willow sticks with colourfully dyed Minski goat hair carpets spread over the bare earth. The tribe – or extended family – numbered between one and two hundred. Huge pans of meat, bread and cheese would be brought in by the young maidens, together with Minski goat skin bottles filled with Keebul berry wine, a rich, fruity wine with a bouquet of raspberry and Minski goat.

When all had had their fill, a space would be cleared in the middle of the eumawancar and all the women between the ages of fifteen and ninety would get up to dance the 'Rumpititti', a strange, sensuous, exotic dance, a sort of mixture between the Lambarda and the Dashing White Sergeant. The dance would continue for up to five hours with the men clapping their hands on their thighs and buttocks to the rhythm of the women's gyrations. At a given signal – one blast on a Minski goat horn – the women would suddenly stop, rip off their little Minski goat hair boleros, known as 'Gofarittis' and throw them at the man of their choice. With that the meal and the party would break up pretty quickly and the men would rush out on to the Steppes with his newly acquired gofaritti and the late owner on his back.

In view of the number of Kerbistani restaurants, takeaways and wholesalers starting to spring up in this country since our emigration laws have become a complete farce (indeed a takeaway is to open up very shortly in the village of Tregolluk near Gartingford Haven), I asked the matriarch of the tribe for the list of ingredients and recipe for what was my favourite Ahsiss dish, the 'Eloda Bleenki Bolukis' and here it is:

53 Minski Goats (cook on low gas Mark 2 or 150°F for 38 hours) 213 round Minski goat cheeses with Keebul berries 163 loaves of Right Apupipee Rice bread with Minski Goat butter 130 pints Minski goat milk

403 Minski goatskin bottles of Keebul berry wine (to be served at eumawancar temperature)

Now, I realise the Minski goat meat could be a bit of a problem, but I feel sure if one or two of us asked the Co-op to put Minski Goat on their shelves they would oblige. The cheese, butter and Keebul berry wine could all be obtained from Tregopuck Takeaway. So, how about a Kerbistani night at the Village Hall? I would be most pleased to loan the Gorfaritti boleros as I have about two hundred in a trunk in the loft, all slightly sweaty and with that evocative perfume of Minski Goat.

Addendum: The Minski Goat was first seen by a European called Stanislaus Jacob Minski, a Jewish tailor residing in New York in the mid seventeen hundreds. In 1759, Stanislaus Minski went on a cheap tenday package holiday to Rogiralia where he spent several days walking the mountain passes. It is said that Minski enjoyed the area and the people so much that he went back each vear until his death in 1872. He is also said to be responsible for the word 'roger' or 'to roger'. He had not realised he has crossed over the border between Rogiralia and Kerbistan and anyway, 'to kerbistan' hasn't got the same ring to it.

Another little known fact is that the song 'Paddy McGinty's Goat' was written by a Kerbistani waiter on the back of an old menu. The original title was 'Stanislaus Jacob Minski Goat' but was changed due to a certain amount of anti-Semitism at the time.

Dear Trio

Over many years of visiting Port Isaac, my family have bought quite a few pictures of the village and surrounding area, both prints and originals. However, I've been meaning to ask the question for some time now - 'What part in village life do the visiting 'artists' play?

Every year when I am here the Church hall is swamped, with a few exceptions, with amateur work. To qualify this statement, it's not a judgement but, so far as I can tell, there are very few, if any, professional artists exhibiting, meaning that no one actually earns their total income from their work. Please correct me if I'm wrong. I was also told by the person on duty that there are practically no village painters in this visiting society. Which begs the question, 'Surely these visiting artists are taking business away from the local talent?'

I'm told they've been coming for years. So does that make it right? I don't think it does. There is enormous talent in Port Isaac – and a little strange talent too! Retailing is an expensive and precarious occupation at the best of times. Exhibiting in a public hall means that other than the nominal rental and feeding the electric meter there are no other 'costs', ie business rates, vat, premises upkeep etc. Often the painters are part-timers or hobbyists. Nothing wrong with that, of course, but would they survive in the real world?

There was also a craft fair in the Liberal Club which seems to be like the art exhibition. It appears at high season to cash in on the visitors coming in and again with no business overheads. It's the same with all these street traders that are cropping up everywhere – but thankfully not in Port Isaac – yet! If these people were to stand-alone in the retail world would they survive? I don't think so.

Just for the record, I'm a professional artist myself with a retail outlet in a trade seasonal area and have experienced just what I've been talking about. After some serious, but constructive, talks with the visiting organisations, they stopped coming. Some sold their work to local galleries, my own included; some set up on their own. A few succeeded.

Whatever an outside organisation sells at a village venue, it is a direct loss of income to the legitimate businesses that are a major part of the appeal of the village. Protect what you've got; it's precious and unique.

A rose by any other name by James Platt

n one of his groundbreaking "Dark" series of novels (if I remember correctly), Peter Cheyney, the great crime and thriller writer, involved a Polish translation of a well-known quotation from Shakespeare's "Romeo and Juliet". The quotation, "What's in a name? A rose by any other name would smell as sweet," formed the basis for a secret code. It seemed that the Polish version of the quotation translated as, "What's in a name? A rose by any other name would crimson for me as enchantingly". In the book, Cheyney's character thought that he preferred Shakespeare's original quotation, although I think that it could be argued that the Polish translator did not do such a bad job, and came quite close to improving on the Bard's work.

Whichever of the two quoted versions may be the more pleasing, there is probably no one who would want to call a rose by any other name than the one that it has, in short, a rose. Gertrude Stein wrote "Rose is a rose is a rose is a rose", and that makes the identity of a rose pretty certain. You can look Gertrude Stein up in the Oxford Dictionary of Quotations. Don't ask me what Gertrude really meant about so many roses. She made a rose look quite profound and that has to be fair enough to satisfy anyone.

By a direct analogy with Shakespeare's rose, people by any other name than that which they were given at birth (I would say at baptism, but these days the mystic art of baptism is not enacted as often as it once was) would equally smell as sweet, or more probably in some cases simply smell as usual, under any alternative name. Since we don't generally do anything to change our given (once Christian) names, much though some of us might like to, it is just as well that the substitute of a nickname for a given name could be devised to do the trick. In fact, a nickname can say a lot more about a person than his or her given name. A wellfurnished nickname can even give the impression that the "rose" to which it has been applied takes on a much more definitive odour as a result.

A nickname (I looked it up in a dictionary) is a familiar or humorous name given to a person or thing instead of a real name. "Nickname" was derived from the Old English "eke-name", where "eke" meant "an addition" or "a supplement", or even "making the best use of". We all know only too well about the eking out of meagre resources.

It does seem that nicknames may be much more of a male than a female preserve and it can be imagined that when ladies or girls are provided with nicknames, they are nicknames generally awarded by men. The term "award" is important, since to be the owner of a good nickname is to possess a real prize that sets you apart as an individual. The best nicknames are genuine classics that sum up, in a single word of no more than two syllables, the essence of its subject's character. You can run your eye over the list of nicknames given in the list below and imagine the great wealth of stories that lie behind them all.

The nicknames on this list, given in no particular order of precedence, were current in the Port Isaac of fifty years ago and many of them have happily covered the course up to the present day. The list is not in any way definitive as there were others as well, but it does serve to illustrate the true art of nicknaming. Here we go.

Marshall, Goblin, Mo, Shadow, Buh, Ghandi, Bollicks, Eyesnot, Guiseppe, Otch, Figgy Duff, Ido, Billy Pom Pom, Bill Pink, Nibs, Tinker, Cogs, Arker, Monk, Tibby, Texas, Pills, Trapper, Cowboy Joe, Hellfire John, Lightning Lyn, Bill Bumps, Boss, Digger, Clothy, Tuffy, Yankie, Flynn, Teddy Bush, Gaggy, Ding Dong, Taffy, Ningy, Harry Bluff, Cockeye, Cap'n, Tommy Ducksegg, Minnow, Wiffle, Boo, Scudda.

Any one of these nicknames that conjures up an immediate vision in the readers mind, for good or ill, possesses the highest quality. In a single word the nickname will have encapsulated and summed up an entire personality forever.

There were many more straightforward nicknames than those on the list. Everyone had the right to the shortening of their given name, as for example Jim in place of James, or Bill in place of William. Additionally the expedient of adding the affectionate suffix "y" to the end of a surname worked well in converting names like Short to Shorty, or Keat to Keaty. It is interesting that most of the surnames connected with the nicknames in the list above would not have lent themselves to this artifice. Perhaps if you don't have a surname that can take the line of least resistance and extend itself with a y, the fallback position has to be in a nickname that is a lot more inventive.

Some children fell into the pit of being nicknamed, chiefly by older people who should have known better, after a grandparent (it was rarely a parent). Family skeletons could be handed on down in this way in nicknames transcending generations, visiting the sins of the fathers upon the children as it were being done in total accordance with God's second commandment.

God may have more nicknames than all of the rest of us put together. Ray Bradbury wrote a short story about a group of Tibetan monks who were busy collecting all the names by which God was known. It was an inspiring task, the only drawback being that when their list was completed, they believed that the world was due to end.

A boy could easily find himself labelled for the transgressions of an ancestor that he had no memory of, or the physical characteristics of a forefather that the boy himself did not possess, or a bad habit that he had yet to acquire, even though he might be working on it. You didn't have to like it, but you did have to lump it.

A personal resemblance to the appearance of a famous person, or association, alliterative or otherwise with a famous name, played a role in forming nicknames as well. Although at the time there was no television to

bring celebrities to the public eye, there were newspapers and there was the cinema to excite the imagination and introduce play on words. You can pick some of the relevant nicknames out of the list above, Mahatma Ghandi, Errol Flynn and Gordon Harker (who was himself no stranger to Port Isaac) being prime examples.

Drawing one name from the list purely at random (I stuck a pin in it), how would you imagine someone whose nickname was Gaggy to be? Does it suggest a man who was generous, lovable and unreliable, all at the same time? Does it imply someone who a boy could take such great pleasure in being with and who meant

everything he said, when he said it? I think it does.
