The Remembrance Day Service will take place in St Peter's Church, Port Isaac on Sunday November 9th at 10.45am.

The Poppy Appeal, which has been running for some 82 years, raises about half of the funds need by the Royal British Legion to carry out its welfare and benevolent work. Millions of poppies, made at the Poppy Factory – staffed by mainly ex-service people, 70% of whom are disabled in some way – are made each year.

The poppy has become a symbol of remembrance, of reflection and of hope. During the First World War, the bloodiest and most concentrated fighting devastated areas of Northern France and Belgium yet, each year the poppy continued to flower, giving life, hope and reassurance.

Wear your poppy with pride and take a minute to remember.

Old clothes fund crew training



Thanks to our local kerbside recycling services a cheque for £6000 was handed over to Port Isaac RNLI to help the training of Cornish lifeboat crews.

This outstanding sum was raised by the Cornwall Paper Company from the sale of old clothes and

textiles which have been collected as part of their recycling schemes. This is the fortnightly kerbside service that collects materials for recycling from all North Cornwall (and Caradon district) homes. Now in its thirtieth year, the company handles some 700 tonnes a week of domestic, industrial and commercial rubbish. A special red bag is provided for reusable clothing, household textiles, bags, shoes and other accessories. All the good quality items are sold for re-use in Third World countries and the Cornwall Paper Company make charitable donations from the revenue raised, to strengthen the link between recycling and the benefit to the local community.

The RNLI was chosen because of its countrywide appeal and the relevance of their service to Cornwall's residents and tourist population. The average annual cost of training for RNLI crewmembers is between $\pounds 600$ and $\pounds 800$ each.

Said Christine Smith, Director of the Cornwall Paper Company; "We are delighted that this donation has been made possible by the willingness of local people to do their bit for recycling. By joining in, people are demonstrating that they want to save these resources from being wasted in landfill. Now they can also see how charity can benefit from their recycling efforts."

Station Hon Sec Bob Monk presented John with a certificate marking his 'long and meritorious service'. By strange coincidence it was Bob Monk who John went out to 'save' on his very first 'shout' back in 1976. A cliff walker thought

Port Isaac 2000 takes it final bow

The Port Isaac 2000 committee recently held a final meeting to disperse the funds left in the bank and officially close the group.

The money left has been distributed between the Breakwater Fund, STEER, St Peter's Church and Port Isaac School (to purchase a cooker so that the children can have cookery lessons).

Why not try a retreat?

Many people, not all of them deeply religious, these days choose to go away on retreat. The pressures of modern life have made the idea of spending a few days away from it all, in solitude and silence, an attractive prospect. And not all retreats are individual or completely silent, many are held for groups and involve some socialising.

Some retreats may be conducted by a leader who will address the group at different times during the day, and who may also be available to listen and to give counsel to individuals. Other retreats may be for someone wishing to be guided personally throughout whilst others may be completely self-directed.

Retreats are held in a wide variety of venues, including private houses as well as abbeys, monasteries and other religious houses. Retreats may have creative themes such as painting, writing, calligraphy or embroidery, or they may focus on a particular aspect of faith or spirituality. Sometimes retreats are organised during significant times of the Christian year, perhaps during Lent or Advent, and also invariably before candidates are ordained as deacons and priests.

Several people from our united benefice of St Endellion, Port Isaac and St Kew recently took part in our fifth annual retreat. Each year people involved in the three churches have been invited to spend a few days at Shell Cottage, a delightful house overlooking the sea in Penberth Cove in West Cornwall. Some are resident – the house sleeps six – and some come for just part of the time. A theme is chosen and the activities, silence, prayer and worship are based on it. Themes so far have included 'Jesus by the Sea Shore', 'Healing', 'Creation', 'Patterns of Prayer' and 'Spirituality & the Arts.'

Spirituality through art, poetry, music and dance was explored during this last retreat held in early September. The theme was chosen following the highly acclaimed Lent lectures on 'Spirituality & the Arts' held in St Endellion Church earlier in the year. On the first day of the retreat, artist Bridget Holden from Delabole spoke on 'Art and the Pilgrim Way,' illustrating her talk with drawings and prints made from carvings in various churches in Cornwall and other parts of the country. In the evening Diana Maberly talked about the use of the mandala in meditation and personal exploration and everyone became absorbed in mandala drawing.

The following morning, in 'Word into Silence' there was a session on the poetry of the 17th century priest/poet George Herbert. In the afternoon, music was the focus, with Michael Bartlett recounting the significance of the part played by music in his spiritual journey. His talk 'In Tune with Heaven' was accompanied by extracts from compact disc and tape of the singing of psalms and anthems by cathedral choirs. On the final day of the retreat, in 'Praise Him in the Dance', Liz Bartlett taught the group a liturgical dance that she had created and choreographed, based on the prayer 'God be in my Head.'

The final eucharist was most moving as we incorporated the art, dance, music and poetry that had been explored during our time together. Each day began with Morning Prayer and ended with compline, an ancient late evening office. There was a daily eucharist and evensong and regular times for quiet or free time. Some walked, some rested and one drew and painted.

Spending time together in this way creates a deep sense of fellowship. We were blessed with idyllic weather and we returned feeling rested and

Monk's monthly mutterings, controversial or what?!

J've received a number of complaints. More than a few have said, "We don't want to know all this old nonsense about your Uncle Fred, Aunt Trish's shelf-like bosom and your bareback riding antics with Serafina, we want you to be your nasty, bitter and twisted old self. Let's have some controversy; say something bitchy again, stir them up!"

So, here goes: There are two topics that have aroused at least a glimmer of life amongst one or two of you. Both topics are, in many ways, connected. Firstly the Castle Rock Hotel and secondly affordable homes.

In my opinion, the area between the Church Rooms and the top car park - which includes the Castle Rock Hotel, Tre Pol Pen, the Garage, the converted sheds and the hotchpotch of houses, the newer ones each trying to compete with the other for the biggest sheet of glass facing out to sea - is the biggest eyesore since they built Slough. The builders and the persons who threw together the plans (I hesitate to call them architects) for these monstrosities deserve to live in Basingstoke for the rest of their days. The whole conglomeration of mediocrity ruins what would otherwise be a wonderful panoramic view of Port Isaac Bay.

If Arrow Developments (the company behind Roserrow Golf & Country Club) are now the new owners of the Castle Rock Hotel, then best of luck with pulling it down, says I. And I hope they receive some positive help with their planning and some inventive ideas rather than all this negative criticism.

Which brings me to the provision of affordable housing. In the 1930s, 50s and 60s, there was so much affordable housing in Port Isaac they could hardly give it away. Locals would laugh and snigger behind the backs of the outsiders every time they sold a damp, decaying, draughty, dilapidated cottage to them. They would chuckle even more as they got re-housed in a council house. However, the new buyers spent a lot of time and money on their newly acquired, damp, decaying, draughty, dilapidated cottages and transformed them into highly desirable homes worth, not just a few hundred pounds but a few hundred thousand pounds.

By the 70s and 80s, the locals who had sold, or had not bought,

realised their mistakes and started to whinge about affordable homes for them and their offspring. "Tough!" says I. You made your bed, now you and yours can lie in it!

Now, the last thing the 'new owners' want to see is a council estate or an 'affordable housing slum' on the Castle Rock site and the new owners, if not in the majority, must be pretty near. We live in a democratic society. Some people may think democracy is freedom for all. It isn't! It is the will of the majority to have its way (with a sense of responsibility).

Remember, Remember, the fifth of November

The firework party! More and more firework parties are now officially organised. They start early and what is better than to finish the evening than inviting a gathering of friends to join together for mulled wine and cosy-type food? Serve meatballs with a blue cheese sauce, baby potatoes in their jackets and round the meal off with a good wedge of ginger cake.

Boil the potatoes in their skins and when just cooked wrap each one individually in tinfoil. Five minutes before you want to eat them, toss them into the embers at the edge of the bonfire – but remember tongs or a similar instrument to retrieve them from the fire.

Meatballs with Blue Cheese Sauce (serves four)

1 large onion, finely chopped * 450g/11b minced lamb or beef 110g/4oz fresh breadcrumbs * 1 beaten egg 2 tbsp fresh parsley, chopped * 1 tsp dried oregano salt & freshly ground black pepper to taste plain flour * vegetable oil

Method

Combine all the ingredients except the last two and mix well. Take a teaspoonful of the mixture at a time and, using your hands, form themixture into balls. Dip each ball into a little flour. Heat the oil in a frying pan and shallow fry several meatballs at a time for about four minutes, turning once. Remove from the pan, drain on kitchen paper and keep warm. For the blue cheese sauce, just beat a soft blue cheese of your choice into crème fraiche and then add a dash of Tabasco if you want to give it a kick.

Gingerbread

Oven: 160°C/325°F/Gas Mark 4 * You will need a 20cm/8" square cake tin 225g/8oz plain wholewheat flour * 2tsp ground ginger 50g/2oz crystallised ginger * 1tsp bicarbonate of soda 125g/4oz golden syrup * 125g/4oz black treacle 75g/3oz white cooking fat * 110g/4oz soft brown sugar 1 beaten egg * 150ml/5floz milk

Method

Heat oven. Grease and line tin. Sift flour, ginger and bicarb into a large bowl. In a saucepan, gently heat together the syrup, treacle, fat and sugar until melted. Leave to cool to blood heat. Add milk and beaten egg to cooled mixture and mix well. Add to the dry ingredients. Fold in the crystallised ginger. Stir thoroughly and pour the batter into the tin. Bake for $1\frac{1}{4}$ hours until well risen, firm to the touch and coming away from the sides of the tin. Cool on a wire rack.

St Endellion Economic Regeneration Forum (STEER) is the community regeneration forum for St Endellion parish. Forum members include representatives of St Endellion Parish Council, local voluntary groups, businesses and North Cornwall District Councillors for St Endellion/St Kew and St Minver wards.

The forum held its monthly meeting in Port Isaac Village Hall on Thursday 2 October when there was an unusually large public attendance. A letter from the new owner of Castle Rock Hotel was read out and a public discussion held on the economic implications of the proposed development.

Following the public discussion, forum members resolved to write to you expressing concern about the economic consequences, for the local community and other businesses, of the demolition one of Port Isaac's largest hotels and restaurants, with the loss of 17 jobs. The forum did not object to the principle of redevelopment of the Castle Rock Hotel site but wished to see an appropriate mix of land uses that would continue economic and employment generating activity on part of the site and provide an equivalent number of jobs. No opinion was expressed on the proposed housing design, which was considered to be beyond the remit of the forum.

NCDC Councillor Tyrell Sandry (St Minver Ward) was absent from the meeting. Councillor Bill Dawe (St Endellion & St Kew), a member of the NCDC Planning and Development Committee, took no part in the discussion and abstained from voting.'

The Class of '44 by James Platt

Reunion of the Port Isaac County Primary School "Class of '44" took place in Port Isaac on October 11th 2003. The Reunion brought together a wonderful array of people who, in many cases, had not seen or spoken to one another for well over 50 years.

The dictionary defines a Reunion as "a social gathering, especially of people formerly associated". Although people change with time the former school association of the kind that that the Class of '44 shared remains forever set in times past. Such an association is always what it always was, not only held fast in the hearts and minds of those who shared it. but induced by the lapsing years to become so much more real and meaningful as a secure branch to hold on to as the pool of life laps away at the feet of those who have waded through on the way to where they are today.

The school provides a known and firm foothold to draw comfort from through the ups and downs of life, offering opposing arms to combat the great variety of slings and arrows of outrageous fortune subsequently encountered by one and all. It forms a secure bridge between then and now, and that is the real name of the game.

The Class of '44 title, although it came to be not exactly as specific as it sounds, was an appropriate blanket title to cover a group who were truly of Port Isaac's wartime generation. Initially the title was selected to include those who commenced at the school - Fore Street or Church Rooms annex it made no difference - in the closing couple of years of the 1939–1945 war. All of these are now all linked around the arrival or the imminence of arrival of the magic age of 65.

The Class of '44 might well have commenced on a single school class basis, but one contact led to another, one suggestion produced a fan of possibilities, one phone call opened up and unravelled a network, and the list of those interested burgeoned. The growth effect was that of the classic snowball, rolling and gathering momentum, impelled by much enthusiasm. The ultimate age range of those who signed up for the "Class of '44" was from 64 to 69 or 70. The process of locating everyone was a tribute to the personal address lists of many individuals involved, coupled with the power of modern technology including phone, email, texts and the Internet (and especially the assistance of the Friends Reunited website and not forgetting the search facilities of the UK phone book). A fair number of the members of the Class of '44 still live in North Cornwall, both inside and outside St Endellion parish. Others are resident in the west and south of Cornwall, more of them have settled through the West Country at large, London, the Home Counties, the Midlands, South Wales, Yorkshire and Lancashire and southwest Ireland. In mainland Europe there are members in Italy and the Netherlands. Much more distantly members come from Canada (Toronto in the near east and Vancouver in the west) and New Zealand (Hastings on the North Island and Christchurch on its South counterpart). For the celebration of the Reunion the furthest travelled were the Canadians (much appreciated by the way!). Messages of good wishes were (equally appreciated) received from the well-remembered friends in New Zealand.

The total number of those contacted with respect to the Reunion was about 70, of whom 20 were unfortunately unable to be in attendance on the specified date and the remaining 50 or so confirmed their intentions to attend almost at once. The Reunion programme was kept simple in order to offer the maximum opportunity for everyone to circulate and talk together. It is in the nature of events of this kind, attended by so many people united by that common association of school such a very long time ago, that time slips by too quickly. The time spent with individuals feels fleeting, and when it is all over there always seem to be so many words left unsaid. However, contacts once renewed can be held onto. The contacts are so important and so beneficial.

It was both remarkable and impressive how immediately everyone who came to the Reunion related to one another and adopted such an easy familiarity on an absolutely informal arrangement. They all wore badges with their names printed on to demonstrate who they were to likely sceptics, but the badges were only needed momentarily. One look at the name and the years that had enveloped today's faces flooded away and the face from the good old playground shone through in an instant.

For its afternoon venue, the "Class of '44" was fortunate to be able to use Port Isaac Village Hall (which few present thought of in terms of anything other than the Temperance Hall). The interior was beautifully arranged and decorated by Janet Chadband and her team, setting a wonderful tone right from the outset. The PA system was expertly set up by Sam from *Secrets*, who performed the great service of making its operation foolproof. Janet provided a magnificent spread for tea, greatly admired and acclaimed by all.

The proceedings were opened by Councillor Bill Dawe. His welcome participation was much appreciated, as were his good words delivered in an inimitable style that is his hallmark. The Rev Canon Peter Larkin spoke in an eloquent reflection on thankfulness for the time, place and company past and present, and led a silent tribute in gratitude of absent friends. A hymn in the honour of absent friends, based on William Blake's "Jerusalem", with words specially written for the occasion, was sung by the assembly accompanied by Janet Townsend on the piano whose kind participation was deservedly applauded.

The formal Class of '44 photograph, an historic documentation, was taken with the group posed on and around the front steps of the Village Hall. went through the motions of studying) within its hallowed precincts. The proprietors provided the "Class of '44 with an excellent buffet dinner in the infants' classroom, and an atmosphere of heart-warming hospitality in Boss Richard's former classroom, currently the bar. Sitting under the eagle eye of Boss more than 50 years ago, a guess on the part of any pupil that he or she would be standing on that same floor enjoying a drink in the year 2003 would have promoted a flight of imagination too extreme to even contemplate.

When the Reunion was all over, saying goodbye was perhaps the most taxing part of the day for many. Meeting up again may or may not ever happen, but since there is always the ability to live in hope that it will, that hope can spring eternal, and that's what it is all about.

The Class of '44 was a fine group of people - as Tennyson put it "That which we are, we are, one equal temper of heroic hearts made weak by time and fate, but strong in will". Looking at them as they are and were, and recognising where they have all come from in terms of time more than distance to make them the citizens they are today, Port Isaac can be both pleased and proud to have turned out such a 1940's generation of its own. The common association of that good old school which sustained them up to now will continue to do so. That good old school, you did a pretty good job.

Parish Council news

The following report is not based on approved minutes signed by the Parish Council.

Furthering its commitment to affordable housing, several members of the Parish Council met together with representatives of North Cornwall District Council, South West Housing Trust and its architects.

The playing field and the adjacent field were inspected. The Parish Council explained that the proposal to dispose of part of the existing playing field for affordable housing, and to use the sale proceeds to develop the sporting facilities in the adjacent field, would need public approval. The two projects must go hand in hand as one could not happen without the other. It is expected that Cornwall Rural Community Council would canvass public opinion when they visited Port Isaac on 15th November.

It is envisaged that the sports facilities would need to comprise of at least an indoor sports hall capable of 5-a-side football, plus an outdoor football pitch whilst retaining the existing children's play area and skateboard park. There would also be the possibility of a footpath within the existing fields as a start of a footpath to Trewetha. Some parking would need to be provided for the sports facilities.

It is envisaged that the affordable housing would comprise of some 15 units of principally two or three bedroom properties. The architect suggested that he would approach the County Council to see if it would permit a miniroundabout at the junction of Hilson Close, with access to the sports facility and affordable housing coming off the roundabout. This would have the added bonus effect of slowing down traffic on the approach to the school and the village.

South West Housing Trust advised that funding might not be available to build until 2006/2007 although it may be possible to purchase the land prior to that date. Regarding occupancy eligibility, they saw no problems with giving first priority to those in need within the parish, or with strong former links. The next priority would be for those in adjacent parishes, and finally those within the North Cornwall district.

The architect for South West Housing Trust has offered to draw up 'concept' plans, at no cost to the Parish Council, to show the possibilities within the site, these should be ready in early November in time for the CRCC event. These plans would not be 'set in stone' but would be sufficient to demonstrate what could be done. A further meeting has been arranged in early November to take matters forward.

Transport

With the sparse population in North Cornwall, it is impossible to provide a financially profitable bus service. Subsidy is, therefore, essential if the area is to continue to have a bus service at all. Currently, Cornwall County Council provides a ± 1.2 Mpa subsidy and national government provides a further ± 1.5 Mpa. Locally, recent changes in the bus company contracts from *First* to *Western Greyhound* have met with universal approval, although this may merely reflect, at this early stage, the level of dissatisfaction with *First* as a service provider.

Bus services for Port Isaac currently run approximately every two hours, with an 07.45 service enabling people to be in Wadebridge for 08.45 and a return service at 17.15. However, residents in Trelights need to walk up to the main road for all but one of the daily buses in each direction (Monday to Saturday during the winter timetable period). Western Greyhound has a web site. <u>www.westerngreyhound.com</u> where timetables for our area can be downloaded.

Whilst there are a number of informal Car share schemes in operation between friends and neighbours there is a web site supported by the County Council as part of a wider national scheme. This service is free and links drivers and passengers for journeys to work, for school runs, shopping or leisure-related trips anywhere in Cornwall or beyond. The web site is <u>www.carsharecornwall.com</u> Our Parish has operated a voluntary hospital car scheme for many years, taking people with no other means of transport to hospital appointments across Cornwall and parts of Devon. Drivers give their time free, with approximately 25p per mile being charged to cover costs. Additional volunteer drivers are always welcome. Details of the scheme are available from David Jennings on 01208 880715.

New local PC

PC Malcolm Taylor reported to the Parish Council that it had been a busy summer with an increase in crimes reported. He also reported that there was no Neighbourhood Watch scheme in Port Isaac, but he hoped this could be rectified in the near future. Malcolm also advised that there is a possibility of him holding a mobile surgery in Port Isaac on a regular basis. The Parish Council will discuss this further next month with a view to writing in support of a regular mobile presence in the village.

Traffic Calming

Public concern was raised that nothing had been done to install traffic calming on the road through St Endellion, although it is believed that County Highways have allocated money for a scheme. It was unanimously agreed that the Parish Council write to County Highways asking for an up to date report of the current position.

Parish Council meetings

There were also concerns expressed as to where and when Parish Council meetings are held, and where they are advertised. Meetings are held monthly, usually on a Monday in the Church Rooms, Port Isaac, with two meetings, in October and February being held in the Chapel School Room in Trelights. It is often necessary to have interim meetings if there are any planning matters that require attention between the Parish Council's main monthly meetings. Agendas and planning applications are posted on the Parish Notice Boards, outside the Co-op in Port Isaac and near the post box in Trelights, at least three days before meetings. Planning applications are also posted each week in the classified section of the Cornish Guardian.

A lesson for us all in banking!

This is a copy of an actual letter sent to a Bank

Dear Sír

I am writing to thank you for bounceing my cheque with which I endeavoured to pay my plumber last month. By my calculations some three nanoseconds must have elapsed between his presenting the cheque and the arrival in my account of the funds needed to honour it. I refer, of course, to the automatic monthly deposit of my entire salary, an arrangement which, I admit, has only been in place for eight years.

You are to be commended for seizing that brief window of opportunity, and also for debiting my account £50 by way of penalty for the inconvenience I caused to your bank. My thankfulness springs from the manner in which this incident has caused me to rethink my errant financial ways.

You have set me on the path of fiscal righteousness. No more will our relationship be blighted by these unpleasant incidents, for I am restructuring my affairs, taking as my model the procedures, attitudes and conduct of your very bank. I can think of no greater compliment and I know you will be excited and proud to hear it. To this end, please be advised about the following changes:

I have noticed that whereas I personally attend to your telephone calls and letters, when I try to contact you, I am confronted by the impersonal, ever-changing, pre-recorded, faceless entity which your bank has become. From now on I, like you, choose only to deal with a flesh-and-blood person.

My mortgage and loan repayments will, therefore and hereafter, no longer be automatic, but will arrive at your bank, by cheque, addressed personally and confidentially to an employee at your branch whom you must nominate. You will be aware that it is an offence under the Postal Act for any other person to open such an envelope. Please find attached an Application Contact Status which I require your chosen employee to complete. I am sorry it runs to eight pages, but in order that I know as much about him or her as your bank knows about me, there is no alternative. Please note that all copies of his or her medical history must be countersigned by a Notary Public, and the mandatory details of his/her financial situation (income, debts, assets and liabilities) must be accompanied by documented proof. In due course I will issue your employee with a PIN number which he/she must quote in dealings with me. I regret that it cannot be shorter than 28 digits but, again, I have modelled it on the number of button presses required to access my account balance on your phone bank service. As they say,

Let me level the playing field even further by introducing you to my new telephone system, which you will notice, is very much like yours. My Authorised Contact at your bank, the only person with whom I will have any dealings, may call me at any time and will be answered by an automated voice service: Press buttons as follows:

- 1. To make an appointment to see me.
- 2. To query a missing payment.
- 3. To transfer the call to my living room in case I am there.
- 4. To transfer the call to my bedroom in case I am sleeping.
- 5. To transfer the call to my toilet in case I am attending to nature.
- 6. To transfer the call to my mobile phone if I am not at home.
- 7. To leave a message on my computer, a password to access my computer is required. The password will be communicated at a later date to the Authorised Contact.
- 8. To return to the main menu and to listen to options 1 through 9.
- 9. To make a general complaint or inquiry. The contact will then be put on hold, pending the attention of my automated answering service.

While this may on occasion involve a lengthy wait, uplifting music will play for the duration of the call. This month I've chosen a refrain from "The Best of Woodie Guthrie: Oh, the banks are made of marble, With a guard at every door, And the vaults are filled with silver, That the miners sweated for."

On a more serious note, we come to the matter of cost. As your bank has often pointed out, the ongoing drive for greater efficiency comes at a cost which you have always been quick to pass on to me. Let me repay your kindness by passing some costs back. First, there is a matter of advertising material you send me. This I will read for a fee of ± 20 per page. Inquiries from the Authorised Contact will be billed at ± 5 per minute of my time spent in response. Any debits to my account, as, for example, in the matter of the penalty for the dishonoured cheque, will be passed back to you. My new phone service runs at 75p a minute. You will be well advised to keep your inquiries brief and to the point. Regrettably, but again following your example, I must also levy an establishment fee to cover the setting up of this new arrangement.
