Most were old and in the final stages of collapse and had to be humanely euthanised. However, she continued to raise money and began to provide free veterinary care for Cairo's working horses and donkeys - and the Brooke was born.

Dear Trio

As you all know, ''Cornish' was the native tongue of Cornwall. Its demise can be traced to the Reformation. Prior to the Reformation, Cornwall was, of course, Catholic and was in fact one of the last outposts of the Catholic faith in England.

The Cornish were slow to accept the new Church of England. In particular, the refusal of the authorities to allow Cornwall a Common Book of Prayer in Cornish was probably the defining moment in the loss of the Cornish language (at that time Latin would have been more familiar to the Cornish than English). This refusal led to the 'Prayer Book Rebellion'. Humphrey Arundell led the rebellion against the imposition of the English Prayer Book and the Cornish marched to Exeter where 5000 Cornish men were killed by the English army. This meant that one in nine of the Cornish speaking population were killed. The decline in the language dates from then.

In later centuries Cornwall suffered various economic hardships such as the collapse of the mining industry in the 19th century. Cornish folk emigrated in their thousands. However, the Cornish language lived on with odd words and phrases together with the jargon of mining, fishing and farming communities. Also, of course, place names remained as a reminder of a bygone age.

Now in the 21st century we have 'Doc Martin' with its portrayal of the Cornish as yokels, pathetic Cornish accents and the sight of row upon row of quaint holiday cottages.

It is obvious that the time is now ripe for a new rebellion. There will be a pre--rebellion meeting of all local Port Isaac Cornish people in the telephone kiosk in Church Hill on a date to be fixed. There should be plenty of room so any strangers who want to witness the meeting are welcome. The special guests will be the Vicar of Boscastle and her family who obviously understand the damage caused to small coastal communities judging by the television series.

Nicola Spotlight on a local chef Jake Pattenden Head Chef, The Old School Hotel ⁻hai Mussels

he wonderful Thai flavourings in this recipe add a different dimension to the more traditional way of cooking mussels in white wine, onions and parsley. It is easy to prepare and enjoy in the comfort of your own home.

Ingredients, serves four

5lb mussels, scrubbed and debearded TIP: If you find an open mussel, give it a knock. If it doesn't close, throw it a bunch of fresh coriander 2 tablespoons of fish sauce

200ml coconut milk 250ml white wine

for the Thai flavour 5cm piece of fresh root ginger, peeled and sliced 6 spring onions, chopped finely 3 green chillies, seeded and chopped 2 stalks lemongrass, chopped 6 lime leaves * juice of 2 limes * 1 clove of garlic

Method

Put the finely chopped Thai flavourings into a large saucepan. Add the white wine and bring to the boil. Add the mussels, put the lid on the pan and steam the mussels for about 8-10 minutes, shaking the pan from time to time. When all the shells have opened, add the coconut milk, limejuice and fish sauce. Give the mussels a good stir and warm the sauce for about 5 minutes.

Serving

Serve the mussels in big bowls. Pour over a generous amount of the sauce and top with freshly chopped coriander and fresh limes. Great with warm, crusty bread to mop up all that lovely, fragrant sauce.

Note: Thai ingredients are widely available in supermarkets and delicatessens these days and have a long shelf life.

I hope you enjoy this recipe as much as I do. Have fun!
