

Filming 'Code of Practice'

L was recently invited to attend a meeting that had been convened by South West Screen to discuss future filming in Port Isaac. This was very definitely not a secret meeting and was also attended by Jon Cleave, Barbara Bell, David Phelps, Malcolm Lee, Sue Craig and Peter Jones from South West Screen and Clare Vickers and Theresa Timms from Cornwall Tourist Board.

Whilst it is not officially confirmed, it does look as if another series of 'Doc Martin' will be filmed here next year. Without doubt this will have a mixed reaction in the village. However, everyone at the meeting agreed that improved communication between the film company and the village would alleviate most of the problems that had arisen previously. Sue from South West Screen explained how Bristol (where Casualty is filmed) and London boroughs have a 'Code of Practice' that helps minimise the local inconvenience.

At a recent STEER meeting it was agreed that Jon Cleave would be the ideal man to act as Port Isaac's film liaison rep. He will therefore be attending further meetings to progress this 'Code of Practice'. If you have any comments or suggestions have a word with him.

Neighbourhood Watch

ROYAL BRITISH LEGION

Mr Allan Chadband was presented with a cheque for £120 from the Parish Council and thanked for his dedicated work on behalf of the Royal British Legion. He reported that he had raised £1,449 this year. Well done Allan!

COMMUNITY POLICING

PC Malcolm Taylor reported to the Parish Council on the Summer crime figures. There were 10 crimes during July and five during August. These comprised of - five burglaries, two of which had been detected and five thefts. There were also two criminal damages and one assault. Malcolm also reported that he had been in touch with the Coastguard authorities with a view to using their offices in Port Isaac as a centre for him where members of the public could visit.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

David Phelps reported that the firework display had been the best ever and that he will verbally thank and congratulate the Firework Committee on such a wonderful display.

PARISH PLAN

The final grant application has been made and approved. The cost to the Parish Council was £314.96 which is £61 less than expected. This is principally because the £50 contribution received from NCDC is being regarded as part of the Parish Council's contribution. The Countryside Agency has authorised payment of the £1,777.48 grant balance, which should be received shortly. They considered that our Parish Plan was very comprehensive and well researched.







Not a Christmas lunc

We reached the edge of Saigon at 1.00 pm, just in time for lunch. Cheung selected a restaurant. He appeared to know it well. 

Did you know that for every £1 donated for a poppy, the British Legion spends 85p on direct welfare? Only 15p in the pound is spent on benevolent and fundraising administration.

Cornwall is one of the highest welfare grant areas of all the British Legion counties. A major problem here is homelessness and Government figures show that on any one day there are at least 60 homeless cases in our county. During the last year the British Legion has dealt with 68 such cases and managed to house and find employment for many.

In fact, Cornwall is one of the most successful Legion counties for the provision of welfare for the serving and ex service community. Some 97 qualified welfare workers dealt with 3078 requests for help and advice and a total of £427,031.28 was made in grants (£267,588.41 of this was contributions obtained from other charities).

Spotlight on a local chef

Ian Brodey Head Chef, Port Gaverne Hotel

Pan-fried fillet of Sea Bass with Garlic, Ginger and Lemongrass

Depending on our Cornish weather, Sea bass is usually a good buy and plentiful this time of year. This is a simple and quick to prepare recipe with minimal cooking time required.

for four persons

2 x 1¹/₂ lb Sea Bass, descaled and filleted
2 stalks of lemongrass, top and tailed, outer leaves removed and finely chopped
2" piece of ginger, scraped and grated
2 cloves of garlic, crushed and chopped
¹/₄ pint dry white wine
1 tsp each of freshly chopped dill and parsley
1/8 pint sunflower oil
2 oz soft butter
mill pepper and salt

- Score skin side of Bass with a sharp knife and season with mill pepper. Heat a thick-based frying pan and add enough sunflower oil to just cover the bottom.
- Fry Bass fillets, skin side down for 1¹/₂ minutes until golden brown. Turn over and immediately remove the frying pan from the heat. Pour off any excess oil.
- Put the butter in a small saucepan with the garlic, ginger and lemon grass. Put onto a gentle heat until mixture begins to soften and aroma rises from the saucepan.
- Add white wine and allow to simmer and reduce by half. Add the herbs and pour over the fish fillets in the frying pan. Bring sauce back to simmer for 2 minutes.
- Remove fish to plates. Bring sauce up to the boil for 30 seconds. Correct the seasoning, pour over the fish and serve. Enjoy!
