


COFFEE MORNING & TABLE TOP SALE

Compost Corner aka Manure Monthly!

ow are your tubs and baskets looking now? We really hope that some of you who otherwise might not have bothered to 'plant up' have given it a go and that you are enjoying the beautiful end results. Please remember to 'dead-head' regularly to prolong flowering and to water your containers in the evenings if the day is dry.

This month we want to pass on some handy tips for low-maintenance gardens, specifically beds and borders. Are your beds full of weeds? Do you spend time weeding and in no time the

blighters are back? Then why not consider 'mulching'? For those of you who have not heard the term before, do not fear. It doesn't hurt, it won't cost you much and the benefits are enormous.

'Mulching' is covering the surface of the soil with an organic or inorganic substance. There are a number of benefits, but here we are looking at weed suppression. Plants need light to grow. Deprive them of that and they will struggle.

We cannot recommend highly enough the use of membrane and bark chippings or gravel for those who do not have the time to keep their gardens in order. We have recently been working on a garden overrun with wild garlic. Not any more. Membrane, bark and gravel have all but eradicated the problem. Here's what you do:

- 1 Look at the problem areas and decide whether they would look better gravelled or barked. We favour bark for beds adjoining lawns and gravel near the pavement areas, but there are no rules.
- Will you be working on the bed regularly? Do you have bulbs planted? If the answer is 'yes' to either of these questions, you might choose to avoid membrane. If 'no', go for membrane underneath.
- Work out how much space you need to cover and buy your products. Don't skimp on the quantity of bark or gravel a good thick layer works best. Membrane is sold in rolls or by the metre we buy ours from a garden centre. Membrane allows the water through, but keeps weed seeds from germinating.
- 4 Clear all of the unwanted growth from the area and dig as many of the roots out as you can bear to do!
- 5 Spend some time creating a nice even surface on the soil. Try to excavate the soil so that the bed is a bit lower than the adjoining pavement or lawn so the bark or gravel will stay in place.
- 6 Cut the membrane to fit the space. Don't worry about being too precise. Cut around existing plants.
- 7 Lay the bark or gravel on top of the membrane, or directly on top of the soil if you haven't used membrane, in a nice thick layer.
- 8 ENJOY THE TIME HENCEFORTH YOU WOULD OTHERWISE HAVE SPENT WEEDING -

OR PAYING SOMEONE ELSE TO WEED!

It's all very simple and it really makes a difference to weed re-growth. We like to put pots with colourful bedding and/or shrubs on the finished beds to fill any gaps.

Happy mulching!

'Unplugged in Port Isaac' - an acoustic concert

he line-up for 'Unplugged in Port Isaac' – an acoustic concert, that takes place in Port Isaac Village Hall on Saturday August 13th, is now finalised. Says organiser, Rupert Willder, "It's very much a singer/songwriter evening with local songsters being joined by national and international musicians".

Kicking off the evening will be Paul Johnson from Tinker's Cottage, Port Isaac who has supported folk music greats like Martin Carthy and Roy Harper in concert. His solo acoustic set mixes original songs ('David Gray meets Tom Paxton with laryngitis') with blues and ragtime ('Mississippi John Hurt meets Robert Johnson with a sprained wrist') - a must for guitar fans.

Next up will be Emily from Boscastle who has just released her first CD, After The Storm, featuring 11 tracks of her own material. She has been writing songs since her teens and spent four years in London playing acoustic venues while doing a day-job to make ends meet before returning to Cornwall to do the same. Last year's flood changed her whole outlook on life and as she clung to a drainpipe in the waist high torrent she determined to concentrate on her music and resign her day-job if she survived. The rest, as they say, is history.

Billy Hawkins and Rupert Willder then take the stage. They have been playing together since 1998 and their set will feature some covers and some of their own material with influences from traditional folk to blues and country. The common denominator in their varied programme is that it's "all what we like to play".

Stopping off in Port Isaac as part of their 'Transatlantic Tales' tour, UK songwriter Sharon Lewis and US songstress Rose Polenzani will close the show. Accompanied by piano and guitar, Sharon's songs are classic and soulful and she has toured in the UK, USA and Europe alongside The Levellers and Al Stewart. Rose has been described as a female Leonard Cohen and this is her first tour in the UK. She has released four albums to date and toured with David Gray and Ron Sexsmith.

It's definitely going to be a night not to miss so get your tickets, priced £6 each, now from Secrets or Port Isaac Pottery. A big turnout is expected and

It's twenty years ago, and a plane is flying at 20,000 feet over Germany. If you will recall, Germany at the time was politically divided into West Germany and East Germany. Anyway, during the flight, TWO of the engines fail. The pilot, realising that the last remaining engine is also failing, decides on a crash landing procedure. Unfortunately the engine fails before he has time and the plane fatally crashes smack in the middle of "no man's land" between East Germany and West Germany. Where would you bury the survivors, East Germany or West Germany or in "no man's land"?

Answer: Why would you bury survivors?

A few more words of wisdom from the SOG Noney? Noney? Noney?

I am an easily confused person, so when I heard that there was a G8, I naturally thought that those nice young boys from the X Factor were getting together with some mates for a little jolly. It was explained to me that this was not the case, although I again became confused when I heard there was a Live8, so again I thought the boys were definitely getting together with some friends for a singalong.

When associates of mine collapsed in laughter at my ignorance, I thought I had better find out what an earth all this is about. After extensive research of at least ten minutes, I have come to the conclusion that although I was confused at the beginning, I am definitely confused now.

The G8 summit has nothing to do with the X Factor. It is the gathering together of the leaders of the eight richest countries in the world – well, the richest seven plus Russia. On their agenda is the ending of poverty world-wide, so I understand (recognising my limited ability to understand anything in this world of ours). Also, just before this summit, the EU is meeting to discuss its finances. In both of these forums there is a great deal of disagreement. Apparently, Britain wants to eradicate poverty by cancelling debt and increasing aid to the poorest nations in the world, most located in the continent of Africa. The United States wish to eradicate poverty by trade agreements which will encourage the entrepreneurial skills of the peoples of these downtrodden countries and enter into the world of the global market.

In Europe, they are debating whether Britain should still receive it's rebate of something like three billion pounds, and Britain wants to re-negotiate the Common Agricultural Policy, because we don't get much out of that. Somewhere in amongst this everyone wants to reduce the emission of greenhouse gases so that the earth's resources will last a little longer and we will be able to survive on this planet without suffocating or burning.

Now although this all seems a lot, apparently, according to some, this is all achievable by a bit of a re-think of the way we do business. And that is where everything comes to a halt.

African countries have received billions in loans over decades. They are very poor so, for most of this time. They have only been able to pay the interest on these loans. Now if you add up all the interest they have paid, you will see that they have paid more than the original loans by many times. This seems very similar to those loan sharks which operate on many of our estates across the country who lend money to people who can't really afford it at interest rates that they definitely cannot afford, and then give another loan to cover the extra debt the recipient has got into because they took out the first loan. So the answer seems obvious. Cancel the debts because they have paid them really. However, some would say we have *given* much more money than we have loaned and a lot of this has gone into the pockets of corrupt African politicians, so make them pay back the loans and not get any aid until they put their house in order.

So how does this relate to the EU's difficulties I hear you ask? Well, the way I see it, we think we

are putting too much money into the kitty
(a bit like the aid to Africa) and we
deserve to get some back. We also
think that others, ie France, are
getting more in subsidies than they
should, so we will look at how much we
get back if they will look at how much
they get back. The attitudes are very
similar. Everyone is trying to look after

their own interests. The United States want African nations to trade their way out of poverty, but if a commodity comes onto the market which is of good quality and a lot cheaper than the States can produce, they slap restrictions on the importing of such goods (remember steel) so competition and entrepreneurial skills are not rewarded. They and other powerful countries want democracy to spread across the world. Most sane thinking people would agree. However, the democracy has to be the type which they want, and at the pace they want, or else they might invade and impose democracy (is there a contradiction there somewhere?).

I heard this week an American spokesperson talking about the EU. It took the news program some time to find one as no one in America seems to know where Europe is, let alone realise that there is a Union of sorts in existence. This spokesperson, who follows European developments closely, stated that, in supporting the EU, 'as long as Europe continues to move in the right direction the United States will let them'. Well, let's hope we don't tread on their toes or else who knows what will happen.

My conclusion to this month's ramblings is that the world is a very complicated place which appears to run, not very smoothly or particularly successfully, on protectionism disguised as market forces, and fear of the change which might happen if we take any positive steps to achieve what we say we want to see happen. But, if you take away all of that, we have a simple problem with a simple answer - the complication is in the small print.

All of this about world poverty and not one mention of that Gandalf bloke.

A time for change?

The Archdeacon of Cornwall, the Venerable Rodney Whiteman, recently highlighted a situation which many of you who are involved in



voluntary organisations may have had to contend with. Nowadays, more than ever before, we are faced with so much legislation that it becomes almost impossible to find people willing to take office in our organisations.

Legislation on such matters as health and safety, disability discrimination, child protection, and the charity laws governing finance are all having an impact on our organisations, particularly on churches and the way we manage church life in our community. It is easy at times to become bogged down by the work and responsibilities of office. We are most fortunate in our church community to have people still willing to take responsibility. But it must be said that they are being more and more challenged.

The biggest challenge has been with us for some time and must be faced now. Several years ago the church council of St Peters looked into the future of the church rooms. The recent survey by the STEER group highlighted possible future development.

A new plan is in the hands of the church lawyers at this moment, drawing up plans to create or find a group who will be willing to take a lease on the building for a period of 30 years or so. They could then obtain grants to bring the building in line with current legislation for health and safety, disabled access and so on and then administer and oversee its use. I would be happy to talk to anyone who might be interested in carrying these ideas forward.

Parish Council News

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

County Councillor Mr Jeremy Rowe thanked the Parish Council for inviting him to the meeting. He paid tribute to Mrs Helen Richards saying she was a great loss to the Council. He said that Mr Colin Brewer and himself now had nine Parishes to cover. He reported that the first County Council business which took place last week was a discussion on waste management. He indicated that he would attend as many Parish Council meetings as possible and was asked to chase up the traffic control at Church Hill which we hope will be up and running for the summer season. Mr Rowe's telephone number will now go on all Parish Council Notice Boards and he is happy to be contacted.

CHURCH ROOMS

It was agreed that the Parish Council make a donation of £60 to the Church Rooms and also that the Council donate £150 for Memorial grass cutting for 2004/05 and 2005/06.

TRAFFIC CALMING ENTERING PORT ISAAC

It was proposed that the Parish Council write to Cornwall County Highways and request an urgent meeting to discuss traffic calming and pedestrian safety between Trewetha and Port Isaac.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS AND NOTICES

Application 2005/01042 - Listed Building Consent for the installation of information panel within powder blue coated aluminium frame with Perspex front on exterior wall of toilets. Listed Building. Delegation Possible. St Endellion Parish Council, Public Toilets, Roscarrock Hill, Port Isaac. The Parish Council declared an interest and is unable to comment on this application.

Application 2005/00955 - Erection of new four bed dwelling with annexed accommodation. Full Planning. Delegation Possible. Mr & Mrs S Bushby and R Bushby, 40 New Road, Port Isaac. The Parish Council has no observation on the

main structure, however is against the Annexe as it makes the site into two dwellings which is overdevelopment of the site. The Annexe is currently and has always been a workshop; therefore change of use needs to be applied for. This building also overlooks adjacent properties.

Application 2005/01003 - Erection of single storey extension to form main entrance to existing dwelling and link corridor as access to existing store, insertion of 3 no garage doors and replacement of two gable ends on store with barn hips. Full Planning. Delegation Possible. Mr K Richards, Bodannon Bungalow, Port Isaac. The Parish Council is in support of this application.

Application 2005/01100 - Erection of extension to provide new main staircase to first floor level. Full Planning. Delegation Possible. Mr G Christie, Pennti-Ros, Trefreock, Port Isaac. **The Parish Council is in support of this application.**

Application 2005/01060 - Listed building consent for the erection of raised wooden terrace. Listed Building. Delegation Possible. Ms L Houston, Old School Hotel, Port Isaac. Objection letters were received from Saul Sufi & Jean French, and Mrs M Hill. The Parish Council is not in support of this application for the following reasons;

- 1. The Old School Hotel is an important listed building occupying a most prominent position within the harbour area.
- 2. The materials used are unsympathetic to the character of this listed building.
- 3. It is noted in the Port Isaac Design Guidelines issued by NCDC that balconies are not suitable additions within the Conservation Area. as they result in loss of privacy to neighbouring properties and are an alien feature on most buildings. This would appear to apply to this proposed development.
- 4. The development will have a significant impact on neighbouring properties with respect to overlooking and noise.
- It is noted that several light fittings are in the process of being installed.
 This will have a detrimental effect on neighbouring properties and the harbour area generally because of the increase light pollution.
- 6. It was also noted that a metal flue has recently been installed adjacent to the new terrace, and boxed in with wooden sheeting, which would need a separate planning application.

It was also felt that a site meeting was needed.

Application 2005/01059 - Retention of raised wooden terrace previously erected without consent. Full Planning. Delegation Possible. Ms L Houston, Old School Hotel, Port Isaac. **The Parish Council is not in support of this application, see above.**

Application 2005/01082 - Erection of a three bed house and garage. Full Planning. Delegation Possible. Mr J Graney, Land adjacent, Merrywood, Trelights. The Parish Council is not in support of this application as it is overdevelopment of the site and of unsuitable design for the area.

Approvals & Refusals

Application 2005/00630 - Erection of restaurant and associated car parking. The Castle Rock Hotel, Port Isaac. Arrow Developments. North Cornwall District Council REFUSED this application for the following reasons;

- 1) The restaurant proposed is not considered to fall within the definition of a community facility and therefore its location outside of the Development Boundary for Port Isaac without any overriding justification would be contrary to Policy SAF11 of the District Local Plan April 1999.
- 2) The restaurant proposed, including its extensive glazed design together with the associated parking and access arrangements and ancillary use, would result in a significant increase in the built form and commercial activity outside of the established Development Boundary of Port Isaac. The existing site forms an important open area adjacent to the coastal path and its development in the manner proposed would have a negative impact on the Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty and as such would be contrary to




