

he whole of our community was saddened to hear of the death of Father Alan Wainwright after a long illness. A requiem Eucharist was held at St Endellion on Tuesday August 9th and a special Eucharist of the Resurrection in thanksgiving for Father Alan's life was held on Tuesday 16th August, again at St Endellion, when the church was packed with Father Alan's family and friends. Both services were moving tributes to a priest who was held in high esteem in North Cornwall and beyond.

Father Alan was a truly remarkable man. His ministry started in Gloucester in 1942. He then went on to serve in parishes in the Home Counties, during which time he was also a director of the Samaritans. In 1977 he retired from being a parish priest and came to Cornwall. With his wife Maggie and their long-time friend Nigel Pickstone they became hoteliers at Treyarnon Bay and then landlords of the Cornish Arms at Pendoggett.

Although Father Alan had retired from working for 'the church', for him once a priest always a priest. He carried on a ministry in the churches of the area where each

Sunday and on weekdays he would celebrate the Eucharist. His ethic was service to the community, in church and out of church. He took many services at the crematorium and families were always grateful for his meticulous care and kindness.

Father Alan was a remarkable man and a consummate priest. So many will miss him and so many of us are better for having known him.

Don't leave it too late to write your will

According to the Society of Will Writers, a stunning 70% of adults in the UK die without making a will. Local will consultant, Derek Wells, says that "the vast majority of people still assume that their partners will automatically inherit". This is not necessarily the case. If there is no will, then it is left to the authorities to decide what happens.

Apart from the long delays this can entail, there is no guarantee that someone's wishes will be respected with regard to their property and assets. This is particularly important for couples living together, especially if children are involved, same sex partners, single people, divorced and separated.

A major concern is the low inheritance tax threshold, currently £275,000. If your estate is above this figure you have to pay a whopping 40% death duty tax - but this can be limited by including an Inheritance Tax Trust.

Another concern, particularly affecting older people, is the fear of losing their home to pay for care costs. This can be addressed in many ways, the most popular being a protective property trust or by deed of gift.

Writing a will is not as difficult or as expensive as many people imagine and a properly drafted will avoids problems.

Compost Corner aka Manure Monthly!

re you sitting with your copy of *Trio* in one hand, a glass of chilled pinot grigio in the other, lounging decadently in the beauty of your garden in fabulous sunshine?! You're not? How disappointing! By now, we imagined you all gently tweaking your 'all-year-round interest' pots to perfection, occasionally plucking the odd weed from your newly cleared and mulched beds and borders. What's gone wrong??!!

We jest! Much more likely a vision; you read the first line of this column, thinking to yourself that since those pesky gardening girls

took up this monthly preaching, you've got one more job to add to the appalling list of 'things I know I should do if I had more time or money'.

The key to success in banishing 'Garden Guilt', is to have a realistic plan for your space which incorporates all angles - time available, your budget, the type of garden you aspire to, how you will use it and lastly, which plants are likely to survive here on the coast.

We favour the 'low-maintenance' approach for all our gardens and that really doesn't have to mean bland or boring results. After all, once you've got a workable base to launch from you can add risky and time-consuming elements if you feel daring later!

This month's challenge then, is to look at what you've got right now. What results could you achieve without spending any money at all and just a little time?

- If you have a lawn, is it nicely mowed and edged? Don't worry at this stage about the quality of it, even if
 it is full of weeds or thatch, a couple of good short cuts and a neat edge will work wonders for the overall
 look of your garden.
- Have you got a lovely slate patio with weeds growing where the grouting used to be? Remove the weeds using a sharp knife (a patio knife is best, £7.99 from Trelawney Garden Centre, but if you haven't got one, anything sharp will do!), spray the gaps with a residual weed killer, and finally, consider getting the patio re-grouted. It's a relatively quick and inexpensive job with fantastic weed-free results (we know a man who can, give us a ring for more information).
- Re-visit our article last month when we talked about low-maintenance beds and borders (what do you
 mean, you've thrown it away?). Tackle a section of a border at a time, if you feel overwhelmed by the task
 in hand. Remember, once you've laid that membrane and bark/gravel, you won't have to do that bit again!
- Though summer is not really the time for pruning, a light trim won't do any harm for out of control shrubs
 causing obstruction or looking out of proportion in the garden. Cut back to a healthy bud. This bud will be

a flower or leaf later and it's these that you want at the end of the stem or branch not unsightly bare sawn off bits!

Our top tip for success is not to try doing all these things at once on your only day off!! Draw up a really simple plan with your top five priorities (eg, mow lawn, weed border one, trim old heads from hydrangea, weed patio, trim hedge). Nibble away at it - half an hour, a couple of times a week, with a glass of wine on a warm evening. It's a great way to relax and who knows, maybe next month, you'll be reading this column, with a glass of chilled pinot grigio, lounging decadently in the beauty of your garden in fabulous sunshine - you get the picture?!!

A LITTLE ABOUT THE COOK: I love food and eating and discovered a long time ago that the best way to guarantee I get the food I like is to cook it myself. You could call it a control thing! I live in Winchester with husband Nigel and three children, Will, Josh and Martha. I'll be telling you a little of their culinary likes and dislikes too!


We bought a house in Fore Street in 2003, but having completed a two-year building project on Fronthill, I have needed a break and have mainly let the house out to holidaymakers. I haven't made the journey along the A303 from Winchester for some time.

Seeing the request in *Trio* for someone to write a cookery column reminded me of an idea to bring together and share the foods I enjoy in Winchester and Cornwall. 'Two Kitchens One Cook' was to be the title for a collection of all my favourite recipes. It was an excuse to think and discover more about the food I love and enjoy. So I will start here rekindling my passion by sharing with you the beginnings of this journey. I shall begin with my favourites. The recipes are those I most enjoy; some I have created and others are borrowed and adapted. I will try to focus on what's in season and keep it simple, but forgive me if I get excited and offer the odd fiddly affair.







FOCUS ON FOODS FOR AUGUST: There is so much choice in August. Sea Bass, Peppers, Tomatoes, Basil, New Potatoes, Courgettes and Raspberries in abundance; just some of the seasonal foods I adore. I love fried fish with crisp skin, salad potatoes roasted with rosemary and chilli, courgettes in olive oil and butter, slow roasted peppers and cherry tomatoes drizzled with basil and garlic oil - I could go on.









It is difficult to know where to start but I have decided that, rather than leave the best until last, we'll begin with dessert. Raspberries have to be my favourite fruit and the recipe overleaf is for a Raspberry and Almond Tart - it is delicious.





Raspberry and Almond Tart

There is always something about raspberries. The smell, the sweet/sharp thing that tingles the taste buds, married with a frangipane topping. Garnish with extra raspberries and cream. Don't wash the raspberries they go soggy and yuk!

Almond Pastry

175q (6oz) plain flour 75q (3oz) butter 50g (2oz) ground almonds 25g (1oz) caster sugar 1 egg yolk 2 tblsp water

Frangipane Filling

125q (4oz) butter 125g (4oz) sugar 2 eggs plus egg white from pastry 125g (4oz) ground almonds 25q (1oz) plain flour 2 tsp almond essence 200g (8oz) raspberries 50g (2oz) flaked almonds

- 1. Preheat oven to 190°/375°/Gas Mark 5.
- 2. To make pastry a bit fiddly but worth the fuss. Sift the flour into a large bowl. Rub butter into the flour, using fingertips, until the mixture resembles fine breadcrumbs. Stir in the ground almonds and sugar. Add the egg yolk and enough water to mix with a palette knife to a soft, but not sticky, dough. Chill for 20 minutes before rolling out onto a floured surface. Use to line a 20cm (10") flan case. Roll the rolling pin across the top of the tin to cut off any excess pastry and then prick the base with a fork. If you have any difficulty rolling it out, just patch it up - it'll taste fine. Chill again for a further 30 minutes. Bake blind for 5-10 minutes.
- 3. Meanwhile, prepare the filling. Whisk the two eggs and egg white together. In a separate bowl, cream the butter and sugar until light and fluffy. Sieve in the flour, adding the ground almonds, eggs and almond essence at the same time and stir until well mixed.
- 4. Scatter the base of the flan case with the raspberries and cover with the frangipane mixture, smoothing over the top with a palette knife and sprinkling with flaked almonds.
- 5. Bake in oven for 25 minutes until it is just firm.

You could also make smaller tarts in individual tins; just bake for 10-15 minutes. This recipe also works really well with blueberries.

Basking sharks have been silently gliding through the water just outside the harbour and round to Port Gaverne. For those who don't know a lot about these magnificent creatures, here are a few Basking Shark facts:

1 The Basking Shark is the largest wild animal to regularly visit the UK and is the second biggest fish in the world, after the Whaleshark.

- 2 They can reach 11m (36ft) in length and weigh up to seven tonnes.
- 3 Despite their enormous size, they do not pose a threat to humans. They have tiny teeth and filterfeed on small copepod zooplankton.
- 4 In order to take in enough food, they must filter approximately 2000 cubic metres of water an hour equivalent to an Olympic swimming pool of water!
- 5 It can take 12-20 years to reach maturity.
- 6 Gestation may take from 18 months up to three years and a litter is though to consist of five or six pups.
- 7 The Basking Shark has, in the past, been hunted primarily for liver oil. The Basking Shark is extremely vulnerable to high fishing pressure and all fisheries around the UK and Ireland have collapsed in the past.
- 8 The greatest threat facing the Basking Shark today is the high market price the fins fetch on the Asian market. These fins not only end up in shark fin soup but are also displayed in people's homes as status symbols.
- 9 It is illegal to kill, injure or to recklessly disturb Basking Sharks in British Waters; any person committing such an offence could face up to six months in prison.

Jack Collings, A Singer on the Wireless

In answer to Dugald Sproull's suggestion for more information about Jack Collings (Trio 254, June 2005), Eileen Spry of St Minver sent us a copy of an article she wrote about him in Old Cornwall, Vol. XII, No.5.Autumn 1999, and the following is extracted from that.

"Jack Collings was born at Port Isaac and his brother Tom was also a good singer. He married Eva and lived in Church Hill and had one son, Dennis (later a schoolmaster) and daughters Nona, Beryl, Maureen, Shirley, Velma and Peggy. He was initiated as a Cornish Bard at Perran Round in 1946, taking the Bardic name 'Pyscador a Gan' (Fisherman of Song).

Jack launched his career in St Kew School Room. Dr Wilson Gunn, conductor of Wadebridge Male Voice Choir, was struck with the richness of his voice and asked sing bass in the choir; 12 years later he gave up fishing. His father, 79 years old, still went searching for the elusive fish in a little lugger, *Hilda*.

Topical Times (1924) said Jack Collings "gave pleasure with his songs of Cornwall". At music festivals in 1927 he won 13 firsts and three silver medals. All listened to him in perfect silence as he faded his voice in 'After the Storm' and 'Skipper of St Ives' (Western Morning News, August 1927).

Jack's first broadcast, transmitted from the Foster Hall, Bodmin, was with St Dennis Band before a full audience on a Sunday afternoon. In 1928 he went to London to sing at the annual Devon and Cornwall Cornish Festival in the Wesleyan Central Hall, Westminster. Two thousand West Country people attended. Jack brought the house down with 'Pasties and Cream' and ended with 'Pasties of Polperro, Polruan, Lansallos and Looe'.

A concert of Clayworkers' and Fishermen's Choirs sang to an audience of 600 in Bodmin and this was relayed on the BBC West regional transmitter to the National wavelength. The wireless reception was excellent and monthly concerts followed. Jack sang with deep feeling of the sea he knew so well and was heard by thousands up and down the country. Said Jack, "I have had letters from so many people I do not even know"."

A few more words of wisdom from the SOG SO Live 8 and G8 came and went ... What was achieved?

I don't know if I know the answer to that. Everything has been somewhat overshadowed by the terrible events in London.

It still leaves the question. Did Live8 raise any awareness about the need to fight poverty? Did the G8 go anywhere near the job of tackling poverty?

Probably not, mainly because I don't think there is anyone around, living today, who doesn't know that almost half the world are needlessly starving. I say needlessly because the world has the capacity to feed all these people, there is a choice being made not to. Now I've heard all sorts of high moral arguments of why we shouldn't feed these people, but what I hear in them is ill-informed, pseudo-intellectual tabloid philosophy which just gives us enough of a comfort feeling to carry on being selfish.

I have also heard a great deal of counter arguments as I am sure all of you have. For that reason I am going to cease talking about debt and food for the world for the time being. Not because I think it isn't important, I think it is very important. No, it's because I can hear people's groans already with yet another person babbling on about the same subject.

Instead I will talk about ... the Olympics, another topic I am well informed about. Almost everyone who has voiced an opinion on this has come down in favour of London staging the games. But I have a strange feeling that this is because we beat the French to it rather than the prestige of holding the biggest sporting event in the world.

Is anything wrong in that? I hear you ask. After all, they are trying to get us to give our rebate back, this is the least we could do. I understand that the

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French have accused us of cheating to get the games. They're probably right. I'm not sure that I was ever a fan of that Lord Coe, but I think if it was looked into closely we would probably find that what we did was to cheat better than the French did. In my opinion, if we did that, then in its own right, there is an achievement worth celebrating.

Of course I am now falling into the trap of having a go at the French, because it is easy. I make no apology for that as they appear to make no apology for having a go at the Brits as often as they can. I am hoping we are all doing this with tongues firmly placed in our cheeks.

Now I know how the French are planning their revenge. No not in the EU or any other diplomatic circle. They are just going to try and win more gold medals than we do. Or is that just too straight forward for the complicated relationship that is Anglo-French?

Parish Council News

LIGHT NIGHT REVELRY

Complaints had been received that there has been a great deal of noise and late night partying on the Platt and in the harbour area which has been disturbing local residents. It was agreed that the Parish Council would take this up with the Police, the Harbour Commission and Environmental Health Department, to ensure that this problem did not get out of hand.

VEGETATION AT LITTLE HILL

Several people have commented on the state of the vegetation on the cliff side of the wall at Little Hill, which has grown up to obscure much of the harbour view. As a cliff-top site, this is a difficult place to work, but the Parish Council has now located and engaged a contractor prepared to clear this.

INFORMATION GATEWAY PROJECT

It is hoped the grant aided illustrated panels will be in place within the next few weeks, to provide locals and visitors with information on our local heritage and diverse birds, flora and fauna.

TRELIGHTS

The Chairman reported that, with other Council members, he had met with Matthew Odger, Assistant County Tree Officer, regarding work to the very fine horse chestnut tree on Coronation Park, Trelights. He recommended sensitive crown raising and some branch reduction close to electricity cables and he would be on site when the work was carried out. The Parish Council would obtain quotes for this work and also apply for planning permission as this tree is subject to a Preservation Order.

At the request of Trelights Village Green Committee, it was agreed that the Parish Council would write to North Cornwall District Council requesting a dog bin with an appropriate pick-up sign to be placed at Coronation Park, Trelights as there are many more dogs in the village and more children are using the park.

REFUSE BINS - COAST PATH & PLATT

A proposal was put to the Parish Council that, as the existing bins along the Coast Path and on the Platt are inadequate, North Cornwall District Council be asked to provide larger size bins in these locations.

VISITOR CENTRE

Since the loss of the shared Mobile Visitor Centre in the car park, Port Isaac is now the only village, once served by that Centre, that has no permanent Visitor Information Centre. It was proposed to the Parish Council that they approach North Cornwall District Council to investigate the possibility of siting a permanent Visitor Information Centre in Port Isaac Village. Two suggested sites were - in front of the NCDC toilets in the car park or the Church Rooms.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

The Chairman reported that he and other Council members had met with Robert Constance from Cornwall County Highways at Trewetha to discuss traffic calming measures.
