Channel paddle race is on

Visitors to Port Isaac over the past few weeks have, on many evenings, been surprised to see a light blue surf-craft being paddled into the harbour at speed. Peter Craske, joint proprietor of *Surf's Up* Surf Lodge at Homer Park has been in serious training for his race with James Cracknell, Olympic Gold medallist (Rowing, coxless fours), across the English Channel. By regularly paddling from Polzeath to Port Isaac, Peter has been building his strength for the 23-mile distance between Folkestone and Calais.

Two specifically designed surfboards have been imported from Australia and are of the design used in the famous Hawaii Molokai Race.



The challenge is to beat the record time of 6hours 52minutes and it will take about 60,000 paddles to achieve it.

It is anticipated that the race will take place on September 5th (or the first weather window after that). Sea France is the main sponsor in an attempt to raise \pm 50,000 for the charity 'Access Sport' which, among other things, enables surfing training at subsidised rates to be available for local children via Surf's Up Boardriders Club.

For instance, if you use a lot of





Just a pong at twilight! It is hoped that either the problem has solved itself

hroughout the summer the village has been plagued, some evenings, with a strong and offensive smell.

Calls have been made to South West Water via their 'emergency' number (as listed in the phone book - 0800 169 1144) asking for the cause of the smell. Little help was available there, however, because that number merely connected with a call centre where the 'advisers' didn't have the necessary information and told callers that someone would call them back. That didn't happen, no return calls were received. Apart from a number for people having trouble with their bills. no other number is listed for South West Water in the phone book. However, it has since been discovered that the number for the Exeter headquarters of South West Water is 01392 446688.

The problem was reported to Environmental Health at North Cornwall District Council and the Parish Council arranged an impromptu, 'emergency' meeting with the representative Miranda Flannigan, who visited the village on the evening of August 17th. Unfortunately there was little evidence of any smell at the time.

The meeting walked up to the 'Waste Water Treatment Works' in Port Isaac valley where, apart from the rather unkempt appearance of the works, there was also no evidence of any problem. Since then, it has been learned that South West Water have found the works to be in correct order and now say that

Port Isaac sports facilities project anybody's ideas on how we can develop these recreational and

I seems a long time since we wrote in the November edition of *Trio* that, following the preparation of the Parish Plan in 2003 and the subsequent public meeting on 6th October last year, we were embarking on a feasibility study to asses the practicalities of building sports and recreation facilities in Port Isaac. The feasibility study will provide a professional evaluation of the information that is necessary, to progress the development of sports and recreational facilities that will be available to all ages within the community.

In April we submitted an application, to 'Awards for All' for lottery funding, which was supported by NCDC Sports Leisure Unit. and we are delighted to announce that we have been awarded lottery funds of £2807 to support the study. We have appointed Heighway Field Associates as the Architects and Randall and Simmonds as the Surveyors to work on the project. The grant will enable us to obtain a professionally designed and fully costed project. This will then be presented to the community for approval and be used to support the grant application of the final build scheme.

We hope to present our proposals to the community for their endorsement at the latest early 2006, and then we can start to search for potential funding. Part of the feasibility is the need to prepare an operational plan that will ensure that the facilities will support themselves financially. A number of activities have promised support but we would be delighted to discuss

A fundraising sale raised £350. Special thanks to Dr Baird and to everyone who made donations and gave items for sale.


CHURCH NEWS

By a coincidence, five days later I had a phone call from a man in Ontario, Canada, whose photograph I have standing beside a Walrus seaplane at the head of the beach. He was last here over 60 years ago with the Canadian forces.

I think a good time was had by all who attended. There was certainly a great deal of talking going on,



hese past two months have been busy for Port Isaac RNLI, both from an operational point of view and for the Fund Raising Committee. Starting with the sharp end and what the RNLI is all about -Saving Lives at Sea - the end of July saw Port Isaac Inshore lifeboat crew busy on two rescue operations within days of each other.

On the July 22nd the boat launched at 19-15 hours with Nigel Sherratt on helm and crewmembers Damien Bolton, Laura Barnden and Andy Cameron on board. This was in answer to reports of a boy in the water at Port Quin with injuries caused by "Cliff Jumping". When the lifeboat arrived the boy's friends had managed to get him out of the water. The Air Ambulance was called and Port Isaac Coastguard marked out a suitable landing area in a nearby field for the helicopter boy was then flown for specialist treatment at Treliske Hospital.

(Ed: This incident was mentioned on the BBC Radio 2 Jeremy Vine programme in a feature about the dangers of cliff jumping).

Three days later at 16-47hrs, the lifeboat was called out by Falmouth Coastguard to go to the assistance of a capsized canoeist in Port Quin Bay. Richard Hambly was on helm with Paul Gregory and Laura Barnden as crew. The canoeist had been in the water for two hours and suffering from hypothermia. First aid treatment was administered and the casualty taken into Port Quin beach, where Port Isaac Coastguard were in attendance, to be collected by the Air Ambulance Helicopter. (Ed: I happened to be at Port Ouin when this incident occurred and witnessed a spectacular beach landing by the Air Ambulance helicopter).

Then on our actual RNLI Fun Day on August 21st another call out came in just minutes before our crew were about to put on a demonstratiion of sea to air rescue techniques with an RNAS helicopter. Four people in a powerboat with engine failure were being swept out to sea. Our crew scrambled with hundreds of spectators gathered out on the beach, breakwaters and headlands all eagerly awaiting the scheduled demonstration - it took everyone a minute or two to realise this was the real thing!

Our boat, already at the waters edge, was away with Nikki Bradbury, Kevin Dingle, Richard Hambly and Sam Williams on crew and in a matter of minutes had reached the powerboat and began to tow it into Port Gaverne. Meanwhile, the RNAS Helicopter was already on the way to carry out the planned air to sea demonstration. However, ex lifeboat crewman Eddie Fletcher, who was at sea in his boat, saved the day taking over the final tow to the beach allowing the lifeboat, crewed now by Nikki Bradbury, Kevin Dingle, Richard Hambly and Nigel Sherratt, to rendezvous with the helicopter and continue with the much appreciated sea/air display as planned.

An hour later our boat once again set out across the

harbour to complete a joint exercise together with Port Isaac Coastguard Cliff Rescue Team transferring display a casualty from a particularly difficult location on the west side of the harbour down into the Lifeboat and then to shore. This demonstration was co-ordinated by Coastguard Station Officer Ken Richards

Since I am referring to our most recent event, the RNLI 2005 Fun Day, I should like to thankall those who dedicated so much time, energy and fun to the planning, setting up, running, providing entertainment and the grotty end of it all, the clearing up. Without these supporters, which not only include the hard working RNLI committee but many others, this day would not take place. Some statistics are worth noting - six barrels of beer all dry, 25 bottles of Pimms empty, 550 Burgers and 200 Mackerel BBQ'd, 25 or so bags of rubbish. What would we do without that very special support man Richard to whom we give a special thank you and of course to Byron who donates us our car-parking slot. The list could go on; there are many more who contribute in many ways to the success of this special day. The outcome of all this looks as if the RNLI will benefit with a record sum in excess of £3500. It is appropriate to say a big thank you here to Sharps Brewery who, as always, is most generous withsupport.

Additional to the Fun Day programme the stage was set for the start of the 'Victory Challenge 2005' for which Port Isaac Rowing Club have loaned their gig *Unity;* the plan being to row from Port Isaac to London over 20 days, by which time it will have covered over 300 miles and been through a hundred plus locks! At 1-30pm, with cheers echoing in their ears and the St Minver Silver Band playing 'Rule Britannia', Unity set off with an all nurse crew from Treliske Hospital to row the first sea leg of 21 miles. Everyone

rowing in this Challenge has arranged personal sponsorship of a minimum of £50 per leg and all funds are to be split equally between the RNLI. The Fire Brigade Benevolent Fund and Youth Rowing in Cornwall by agreement with the Cornish Pilot Gig Association. Full details on this event in next month's Trio.

The proceeds from the memorable RNLI Trafalgar Ball at Colquite Manor that took place on May 28th have now been fully accounted for and I can confirm that the amount raised, clear of all costs, is just over £30,000. This has gone towards the Padstow Lifeboat Appeal.



Father Alan Wainwright

The whole of our community was saddened to hear of the death of Father Alan Wainwright after a long illness.

A requiem Eucharist was held at St Endellion on Tuesday August 9th and a special Eucharist of the Resurrection in thanksgiving for Father Alan's life was held on Tuesday 16th August, again at St Endellion, when the church was packed with Father Alan's family and friends. Both services were moving tributes to a priest who was held in high esteem in North Cornwall and beyond.

Father Alan was a truly remarkable man. His ministry started in Gloucester in 1942. He then went on to serve in parishes in the Home Counties, during which time he was also a director of the Samaritans.

In 1977 he retired from being a parish priest and came to Cornwall. With his wife Maggie and their long-time friend Nigel Pickstone they became hoteliers at Treyarnon Bay and then landlords of the Cornish Arms at Pendoggett.

Although Father Alan had retired from working for 'the church', for him once a priest always a priest. He carried on a ministry in the churches of the area where each Sunday and on weekdays he would celebrate the Eucharist.

His ethic was service to the community, in church and out of church. It is said that he heard more confessions in the Cornish Arms than he did in church! Another aspect of his ministry was his care and compassion for the bereaved. He took many services at the crematorium and families were always grateful for his meticulous care and kindness.

Father Alan was a remarkable man and a consummate priest. So many will miss him and so many of us are better for having known him.

"70 years ago, July 27 1935

Mr H May, secretary of Delabole Football Club, writes to the Editor complaining of 'poaching' by Port Isaac AFC in endeavouring to attract players from Delabole and other clubs."

A ccording to the Society of Will Writers, a stunning 70% of adults in the UK die without making a will. Local will consultant, Derek Wells, says that

"the vast majority of people still assume that their partners will automatically inherit". This is not necessarily the case. If there is no will, then it is left to the authorities to decide what happens.

Apart from the long delays this can entail, there is no guarantee that someone's wishes will be respected with regard to their property and assets. This is particularly important for couples living together, especially if children are involved, same sex partners, single people, divorced and separated.

A major concern is the low inheritance tax threshold, currently $\pounds 275,000$. If your estate is above this figure you have to pay a whopping 40% death duty tax – but this can be limited by including an Inheritance Tax Trust. Another worry, particularly affecting older people, is the fear of losing their home to pay for care costs. This can be addressed in many ways, the most popular being a protective property trust or by deed of gift.

Writing a will is not as difficult or as expensive as many people imagine and a properly drafted will avoids problems.

Lands End to John O'Groats ... and back again!



Well, mission accomplished; I actually made it back in one piece - although only half of me actually returned!

I have been amazed by the interest shown by the village and the amount of sponsorship pledged. All money raised will be divided

between Port Isaac School and the Air Ambulance.

Anyway, I finally set off at 9.00am on July 11th with the children from Port Isaac School waving me off. I had already given a presentation at the School the week before - the most nerve-racking part of the whole trip! - so they knew who I was and gave me a rousing send off.

It was hot and sunny and thirsty work with the weight of my tent and other kit. First stop was in Redruth for a quick service of my bike at *Bike Chain* where I had obtained it two weeks previously. Then, on to Lands End. Up to this point, the going had been relatively flat but the hills now started and I got tired due to lack of training, the hot weather and not enough drink. The last ten miles is very hilly and, to be honest, I was knackered! However, Geoff Harris was waiting to take some photos and, after a drink and some food I quickly recovered. I soon discovered that the secret to stamina was loads of carb foods the night before and loads of drink during the day; dehydration has a massive effect. I was in bed in my tent by 8.00pm.

Next morning and it was hot again but I was feeling better and got back to Port Isaac and spent the evening on the Platt - first stage over. On Wednesday, after sorting things out, I didn't hit the road until 5.00pm and only made it as far as The Mill at Trebarwith and then Trewarmett Lodge where I camped. It was promotion, honestly, and I did raise £100 that night!

So, 6.00am Thursday morning and the journey started properly and I made Taunton that night. The campsite had peacocks roaming round. Next stop was Cheltenham and I made good time before getting lost coming out of Bristol - the signs are rubbish if you don't want the motorway. That night I slept in a nice soft bed at my daughters.



Before setting off the next day I got an extra drinks bottle and a lightweight foil sleeping bag as I had forgotten how cold it gets at night. It was a lovely day again but the worst night was to come in Newcastle under Lyme. No campsite or B&B would accept me and it was too rough to camp on the roadside so I ended up in a 'travel lodge' that appeared to be owned by some East European mafia and frequented by the local lowlife. When I asked about a safe place for my bike I was told to take it to my room – two flights up!



Monday was the first serious rain and the hill climb over Shap that was easy, showing

how my fitness was improving. Bad weather again the next day and, at one stage, I had to get off and push my bike downhill! By now the roads were getting terrible and almost dangerous with ruts, holes and protruding drain covers. I got through Glasgow OK - apart from a few wolf whistles and then went along Loch Lomond where, once again, the campsite had peacocks - plus the dreaded midges, aaaaargh!

Wednesday was off over Glencoe, which was easy, but going downhill to Fort Williams was pretty difficult due to headwinds. I decided to have Thursday off because although I was fine physically, mentally I was very tired. I spent the day sunbathing in Fort Augustus, which is a lovely place.

Friday dawned and I decided on a big push, hopefully to John O'Groats. By Inverness I realised this was possible – and then I got a puncture! It only took half an hour to fix and I was sailing along again until Helmesdale where it got very hilly but I made it to John O'Groats by 10.30pm – it was still light. By the time I had I'd camped up it was quite late but I decided to ring the Golden Lion to share the news but no-one answered the phone so it was a bit of an anti-climax.

I had another rest day on Saturday and then on Sunday morning it was the start home. This trip was generally less newsworthy but I was now up to 150 miles a day. I took a different route through Scotland and did my highest point of over 1516ft at Drumochter Pass, then along Loch Tay, which was a bit like being in the English countryside. A couple of times I got stuck between campsites at the end of the day and camped on the side of the road. One morning I was woken at 5.00am by the police as there had been breakins locally the previous night and they wanted to check me out ... in a tent with my pushbike outside?

Another time, south of Stone, a pub beckoned from across the road as, wet and cold, I prepared to camp and I got a warm welcome. After chatting I discovered that the landlord had considered buying the Crow's Nest a few years ago and knew Port Isaac well!

My longest day was the last one. I left Winchcombe in Gloucestershire at 7.00am and after 195 miles finally made home at 9.30pm. The weather was fine until the last 20 miles when the heavens opened and the wind blew - what a homecoming. But what a welcome I got when I finally made it into the village. I was forced to sit in the Lion, soaking wet, and was plied with drinks. Welcome home!

Compost Corner aka Manure Monthly!

Well, have you spent any of August nibbling away at your unruly bits? Are your lawns neatly edged and your weeds brown and shrivelled? Or, did you just pour a glass of vino while you thought about the first task and then found the second and third glass slipping down rather too well to be safe holding a pair of secateurs?

Well, so what! August is, well, August - Mad - Busy. If you have seen us looking haggard and fraught it's mostly due to 'August' (honest, we scrub up quite well if you look through dirty



specs or forget to put your contact lenses in!). We would like to quash any rumours. August has not driven us to self-harm. Our shredded lower arms are war wounds in the never-ending battle against brambles, nettles and things of a most prickly nature. So, August may have been a month with little progress in the garden. What challenge then shall we issue for September?

A bit of a tidy up? Get rid of weeds before they seed. Snip off dead flower heads and obtrusive limbs from your plants.

And what about planting some bulbs? They are fairly inexpensive, easy to plant (most bulbs should be planted deeper than you might think - three times their own depth) and bulbs will pop up year after year, at different times of the year, in a range of glorious colours. They need next to no attention (*Sam Ed: A bit like men, really*) and reproduce themselves quite happily.

What about making your garden more 'nature friendly'? It doesn't take much effort, needn't cost anything and there are big advantages. If you do your best to avoid the use of chemicals and provide food, water and shelter - particularly during the winter period - you are sure to notice an increase in the wildlife in your garden. Birds are a natural pesticide, hedgehogs will do you the service of scoffing snails (they like dark corners, logs and dried leaves to hide under) and insects such as ground beetles, ladybirds, hover flies and centipedes will help to keep populations of 'undesirable' bugs at bay. Any form of water will not only quench the thirst of those mentioned, but will also encourage slug eating frogs and toads to your garden. Anything from a pond to a birdbath will be appreciated. Even old containers filled with water are better than nothing, though a shallow, sloping edge is preferable for those without wings.

If you are happy to spend a bob or two, you could buy a bird box, a bird table and plants that are particularly attractive to wildlife - lavender, mint and marjoram are wonderfully fragrant herbs loved by butterflies and bees, sedum and helenium are less fragrant but lovely and colourful and are favourites of our winged friends too. Wildlife friendly trees and shrubs provide shelter and food for birds and insects - why not buy a hawthorn, cotoneaster or pyracantha, all a fabulous source of berries for birds, a buddleia for the butterflies or a fuchsia for the bees?

Is it a bit cheesy to admit that we are at our happiest working with Mr Robin at our side, bees buzzing around us, a slowworm or frog searching for cover and a blackbird singing from a tree? Cheesy or not, it's very, very lovely, very natural and very easy to achieve.



So, picture yourself with that glass of chilled pinot grigio, lounging decadently in the beauty of your tidied garden in fabulous sunshine, with a myriad of activity of a natural nature going on around you ... and hope in all that loveliness you aren't bitten, stung or left a colourful calling card by our berryscoffing feathered friends!!!

What's Cooking? Aubergines in September

Aubergine and Goat's Cheese Filo Pie. Crisp pastry and a squidgy sour filling. A simple recipe I've served after a busy day at the beach, as a starter on the terrace at Front Hill and here in Winchester as a vegetarian main course. Although I have focused this month on aubergines, I also want to introduce a sweet and sour flavour, Tamarind. It is an ingredient in Indian cooking, chutneys and Worcestershire sauce and can be bought, ready to use, in jars.

With aubergines, I don't bother with all that salting and draining, which is meant to reduce their bitterness. I have never found the aubergines I use bitter. Although salting can reduce the amount of oil absorbed, I find that by roasting, rather than frying, this isn't a problem. I use a non-stick roasting pan and coat each slice of aubergine with olive oil and then I simply roast for 30-40 minutes at $200^{\circ}C/400^{\circ}F/Gas$ Mark 6. The aubergines are then ready to use as the recipe requires.


Aubergine and Goat's Cheese Pie

2 large aubergines, sliced and roasted as above
250g/8oz soft goat's cheese
2 tbslp rosemary, finely chopped
100g jar tamarind
270g/11oz packet of filo pastry (can be bought frozen)
about 6fl oz olive oil
2 crushed cloves of garlic

- 1 Preheat oven to 170°C/325°F/Gas Mark 3
- 2 Prepare aubergines as above
- 3 Add garlic to the oil and brush the inside of a large lasagne dish
- Working quickly so that the filo pastry doesn't dry out, line the dish with one layer of filo and brush with the oil and garlic and then sprinkle with rosemary. Don't worry about going over the edges with the filo as these will be crumpled at the end. Add another layer of filo and again brush with the oil and garlic and sprinkle with rosemary. Give the base three sheets of filo with three or four for the top, depending on the size of your filo sheets and your dish.
- 5 Layer the base with aubergine and crumble over the goat's cheese. Then spoon the tamarind over evenly. There are lots of strong flavours and you may find you want less tamarind, but I like it this strong. Give it a go and see. Season with pepper but not salt as the goat's cheese will be salty enough.
- 6 Finish with layers of filo as in step 4 but sort of crumple the top and push in the sides. You may need to keep a damp tea towel to hand to cover the filo as it does dry out very quickly. Finish with a good brush of the oil and garlic and a generous grind of black pepper.
- 7 Bake for 30-40minutes.

This pie can be prepared in the morning and cooked for supper. At the end of step 6 cover with a damp tea towel and leave in the fridge until ready to cook.

I love this served with a tomato and onion salad, but add a little honey to your salad dressing as you won't want any more of the sour thing going on.
