

#### New Licensing Laws - an open meeting Village Hall and them. Additionally, local licensed businesses

New licensing laws - it's been all over the newspapers and TV for month's now. No-one can fail to be aware that changes are afoot. On a local level these changes were going to really affect our Village Hall. It meant that we would be restricted to just a dozen events where alcohol was sold in a year (in the Hall and not per organisation) and live music events would also be affected. Therefore, after much discussion, the management committee decided that the only way forward was to apply for a full License. Mountains of paperwork later we can now announce that, from November 24<sup>th</sup> 2005, we will be fully licensed premises up until 11.00pm each night and this will also cover us for live music. At this point we would like to assure local residents that we will not be opening up every night selling alcohol!

In real terms, not a lot will change and things will carry on as before, with the exception that organisations holding fundraising events in the Hall that include a bar will no longer have to apply to the Courts for an occasional licence. It's a big responsibility for the committee and we are still discussing how we will operate the system. Obviously, the Village Hall will need to change its pricing structure for such events and this will be discussed at our next meeting.

In the meantime, we have invited PC Olver, who is the local policeman responsible for all things licensing, to come to a meeting at the Village Hall on Monday November 14<sup>th</sup> at 7.30pm. He will briefly outline the new laws and then be available to answer questions. We certainly have a lot of things to ask him. This will be an open meeting and anyone can attend. In particular organisations who use the Hall for events are invited to come along so they can see how the laws work and how it will affect both the



November has to be the month when something warming is in order. I have an image of going down to Gaverne to watch the fireworks and afterwards returning to Front Hill to baked potatoes and chilli, with sparklers on the terrace to entertain Martha.

Chilli is one of those recipes I tend to make up as I go along, adding a bit of this and a bit of that. It's been quite a job to decide on how much of each ingredient to add or not. I would encourage you to play around with this recipe. Once it's been cooking for about half an hour, start tasting as you stir. You might like it with a more sour flavour or less hot. Keep tasting as you go along, but don't ruin your appetite!

## Orah's Chilli (not for the faint hearted!)

serves 4 good size portions 800g beef (cut into mouth-size pieces) 400g chopped onions (about 4 small ones) 2 tblsp oil 4 cloves of garlic, crushed 2 tsp ground cumin 4 tsp chilli powder (Nige suggests you start with half this amount) 2 tins tomatoes 2 tins kidney beans 400ml red wine (about the amount to fit into an empty tin of tomatoes) 200ml stock (I tend to use a stock cube) 4 bay leaves 1 stick cinnamon 4tsp Lea & Perrins juice of one lemon 2 tblsp tomato paste

- 1. In a large, heavy based saucepan, fry the onion in the oil until glazed and starting to brown.
- 2. Add a good grind of black pepper.
- 3. Add the garlic, cumin and chilli and stir and fry for a few seconds.
- 4. Add the meat and fry until browned, about 5 minutes (better to have a little great meat than lots of chewy stuff).
- 5. Add the rest of the ingredients. Stir well and leave to bubble away, stirring now and then.

I let my chilli cook slowly for about two hours so the beef gets tender and the sauce thickens. It's even better heated up the next day.

Serve with basmati rice or a baked potato, chopped salad of tomato, cucumber and salad onions, Greek yoghurt and coriander.

# The Playing Field Saga - A Farce

Not often would one suggest that an evening sitting in the Trelights Chapel Hall would be more entertaining than being at home watching TV. However, this was the situation on Monday October 10<sup>th</sup> - at least for the first two hours.

The 'play' being presented was part of a drama that would put any TV soap into the shade. We had all the normal fare of all committee meetings at the start including reports from our NCDC rep, Bill Dawe, and both County Councillors, Jeremy Rowe and Colin Brewer. The plot was almost identical to any political scenario on our small screens, but with a local twist.

There were characters to rival 'President' Blair (PB) and 'Hope-to-be President' Brown (HTBB). The only thing was that two or three of the ladies in the cast had read the script of HTBB, did not care for it, and, owing no allegiance to either of the leading males, did their best to torpedo it.

For those of you who are not up-todate with the plot, let me give a brief outline of the script to date! Once upon a time the Council (Parish) decided to sell off part of the playing field, which we all own, for affordable housing. A few lucky people would benefit but, to keep everyone relatively happy, the proceeds from the sale would be used, together with grants and monies that could be drawn down from a Local Education Fund, to build a Sports Centre. This, they said, would be extremely beneficial to the school children of Port Isaac. To show how democratic they were, a questionnaire (written by NCDC) was delivered to each household in the Parish (St Endellion at that time). It was thought to be of no consequence that the agenda of NCDC, in drafting the guestionnaire, might be for the furtherance of its own agenda.

The Council (Parish), legally, decided to go ahead with affordable

housing <u>and</u> a Sports Centre, the inference being that, when the Centre was built and running, adults would be able to use the facility. To this effect, a Sports Facilities Committee came into being. Are you still with me? Good! Then we'll fast track to the evening of October 10<sup>th</sup>, but I warn you, the plot becomes complicated, so complicated in fact that PB was forced to admit that he did not know the answers to a number of questions put to him by the awkward ladies in the cast.

A letter from the Westcountry Housing Association (WHA) states that it would need to acquire ownership of the land to enable it to secure funding for the development of the affordable housing, and further suggested a number of options that the Council (PC) should debate. It would like a 'legal' option to purchase the land. It would appear that it could then do much as it pleased with the land, and it may mean that the PC is obliged to sell further land to WHA. It would need a committee of lawyers to understand all the ramifications. What emerged (I think!) is that:

- a) Malcolm Lee <u>was</u> ready to go ahead with giving WHA what they were asking for.
- b) David Phelps would do the same but with the added proviso that the Sports Field should be landscaped to provide a first rate football pitch (no changing rooms mentioned).
- c) Barbara Bell wanted the whole question passed back to the electorate, as the goal posts had been considerably shifted.

Sensing that they - PB and HTBB - were losing the argument, the spin started. By this time the drama had gone on for far too long - the County Councillors gathered up their papers and left.

The arguments went round and round repetitively at which time the Chair did not do his job very well. The District Councillor raised his hand and said a few words. The audience (both of us) became restive, probably due to the state of our bladders.

A motion was put by HTBB, saving face. All the bit players voted for it, possibly realising that not doing so would have meant another round of the same. The PC had only got through two-thirds of the agenda by 9.30pm. Heaving a collective sight of relief we all went home.

#### COMPOST CORNER AKA MANURE MONTHLY!

I love this time of year - fantastic scenery, mad weather, dramatic sea, thick jumpers, winter boots and hot soup. Fabulous! As I write, I'm being driven across Bodmin Moor and the colours are amazing all shades of green, brown, yellow and orange. To my left, the rain is hammering down through the angriest black clouds and, to my right, the sun is breaking through the gloom, giving the poor sodden ponies, all huddled together, hope for a drier evening. The only birds brave enough to be out in this are crows who are 'giving it large', as they do. They remind me of us 'ere Rockery Chicks, battling on through hostile weather, dressed in black from head to toe, scruffy, muddy, dishevelled, but quite happy, wanting only for a cuppa!



It's funny though, that despite all this 'weather' and the problems it causes, I look around and sense that our flora is breathing a huge sigh of relief - 'thank God that's over for a few months, time to slow down, rest, relax, take it easy now ...' Unfortunately, it you manage a garden, the same is not true for you! While plants are resting it's time to give them a hand - 'tis the season for pruning and clearing and also the season for great big bonfires - a perfect coupling!

A few suggestions for garden work in November:

- Sweep paths, steps and patios clear of leaves and trim plants overhanging these areas slippery suckers, those leaves. Bag them up damp in bin liners, poke a few holes in the bags and tuck them away to rot ready for digging into next year's soil. Free organic loveliness.
- Give hedges a last trim fro the winter so they are in good shape for the start of the next growing season.
- Cut your lawn if you have a dry day, but raise the cut so grass is left a bit longer.
- Lift and divide clumpy perennials such as geraniums and crocosmia. Break big clumps into smaller pieces and get rid of the old stuff. Replant healthy bits in different areas and pass some on to your neighbours and friends. Plant swapping is a great way to save money!
- Empty containers of dead summer planting and have a think about refilling with some winter bedding and bulbs.
- Clear your beds of dead foliage.
- Prune your shrubs and trees for shape and size getting rid of any broken or unhealthy looking bits. Don't be afraid - plants want to grow. Get rid of spindly or criss-crossed branches and rampant leading shoots. Be brutal with your buddleja and hypericum and if an old woody, leggy shrub needs a

damn good haircut leaving it looking bald and boring, then do it (*Ed: I'm sure this doesn't mean that bald = boring in all species!*). It probably should have been done years ago and will hopefully reward you with lush, new bushy regrowth next year.

Take tender plants such as potted geraniums to somewhere sheltered to over winter - ideally a greenhouse. Next to the house, where it is generally a few degrees warmer can be just as effective.

I think that's enough to keep you busy. Earlier I spoke about a 'perfect coupling'. It inspired me to write this short ditty E

So maybe my husband did well to get out, A lucky escape from a girl with a pout? It can't have been easy being taken for granted, And if he were here he'd have ended up planted! If words can change their meaning so drastically, then I wonder why I get so annoyed by the change of names of places in Port Isaac, eg The Temperance Hall to The Village Hall via The Social Hall, the stream through the bottom of the village from the lake to the leat and The Entry to Squeeze-belly-alley. To me the linking factor is history.

One definition of 'lake' is that it derives from the Old English 'laen', meaning a small stream. Am I the only one who thinks that the word in common usage until WWII is much more appropriate than, say 'leat', which was a mining term?



Those of us of my age would never dream of using the name Squeeze (ugh!) rather than 'The Entry'. Ted Robinson (yuck!) gave it the Squeeze name to sell postcards, hoping to rival 'The House on Props' at Polperro. Unfortunately, Robin Penna (who had been helped by Ted) perpetuated the name in a number of very good little pamphlets that he produced when running the Blackthorn Press. At least he also gave the thoroughfare its old name, whereas some subsequent writers have not.

The History Group can make a very good case to suggest that 'The Entry' was what it says - the entry to the village, possibly from Trewetha.

It appears to me that history is a subject that is unfashionable. Our grandchildren, who have started taking GCSEs, are expected to choose what to study from a list that has a number of divisions. From one of these divisions they have to opt for either history or geography. What a shame! There surely is a need for both.

To finish this ramble, I leave you with a further piece of history. Last week there was the first of a two-part dramatisation of Queen Elizabeth I with Helen Mirren supposedly being of childbearing age.

If you turn right at the top of Poltreworgey Hill and then take the first left turn (which leads to St Kew ford), the road is called 'Gravelines Line'. When Lord Howard and Drake and a few more privateers were fighting the Spanish Armada, then Howard sent in fire ships among the Spanish fleet, which, together with bad weather, meant that we won the battle now called 'Gravelines'. To me there isn't a great deal of imagination needed to suggest therefore that the lane has carried its name since 1588. The lane was probably there for centuries before that – but I don't know what the original name could be! Surely this proves that history and geography are linked, even at local level!

Since I began writing a few notes for this month's *Trio*, the History group has had its October meeting. Luckily we heard a mention (on Radio Cornwall) of an iconographer at work in St Endellion Church (why wasn't it advertised in *Trio* I wonder?).

The term 'icon' is bandied about so much that any mediocre 'celebrity', usually someone about whom we have heard little or nothing, becomes an icon. [In the Eastern Church, an 'icon' is a figure representing Christ, the Virgin Mary or a Saint].

Being inquisitive, and not having met an iconographer before, we nipped into St Endellion Church and found ourselves a speaker - and what a find!!

John Coleman is no icon, what he was doing was working on producing icons, particularly one of St Endellienta. He was prepared to talk and answer questions about his work and this he carried over into his lecture. His lecture embraced art and craft (painting and gold gilding), history and geography. He talked about where he had been learning the art and the people he had learnt it from, including a 92year-old monk. Thrown in for good measure, were liberal doses of religion, chemistry and geology. He described how the traditional paints that he uses are made; from black (soot) to the traditionally most expensive purple, obtained, in ancient times, from various types of shellfish. It was so expensive that it was reserved fro the clothes of emperors. Those who came could not help but be enthralled!! What a diminution of the word icon - to compare some second-rate celebrity with a really first-rate work of art is something I find difficult to understand.

I'm finishing this article on Trafalgar Day (October 21<sup>st</sup>). Most of us have heard of Horatio Lord Nelson and of Napoleon; but not too many, I guess, know that two men from Port Isaac died in one of Napoleon's Prisoner of War Camps.

# Letters to Trio "Most of our parish councillors are elected by default"

#### Dear Trio

At the October Parish Council meeting in Trelights we were asked to consider a letter from West Country Housing Association asking for a legal option to purchase land for affordable housing. In the issues to be considered was an area of land "to include for future phases", along with other issues I felt went beyond the mandate given by the Parish as a result of the Parish Plan of 2003 and Consultation Day of 15th November 2003.

Along with statistics showing a need for more affordable housing, (most people wanted the option to own, or partially own rather than rent their properties), the mandate given by the Parish was also based on a plan presented at the Consultation Day showing 15 houses, a Sports Facility and a fully landscaped area, this architects' plan was also published in *TRIO*.

The Parish Council meeting in Trelights was also presented with minutes of a meeting at NCDC offices indicating that this plan would now not be acceptable because of a Government directive demanding greater density of houses. These minutes also indicated that the land valuation could be substantially lower than the one we had been previously offered.

I am a great supporter of affordable housing for our village, we need people to bring up their families here, send their children to our wonderful school, stay in the area, and keep the village alive. But if we wish to start negotiating on conditions that were never discussed by the people of this parish we need to seek a fresh mandate, or face a Parish Referendum.

After much discussion the Parish Council voted to proceed with negotiations with West Country Housing Association based on the original mandate given by the Parish.

Personally, I believe that this item should have been discussed at a Port Isaac meeting; if this project goes ahead it affects the people of the village much more than the rest of the Parish. I can remember the Hillsons Close project being discussed at a Trelights PC meeting with very few people able to attend.

Who says Parish politics is boring? Make a point of looking at the agenda for the meetings, come along and express your views at the public discussion.

Most parish councillors were elected by default at the last election because not enough people were willing to stand to require an election. Important issues are being decided by them on your behalf, so make sure you know what they are.

In any case, if all the eligible children attended the school, the numbers would obviously rise. And what about a bit of good oldfashioned loyalty?

Perhaps the parents have other reasons. Snobbery has been mentioned, but hopefully that is not one of them. It just seems to make no sense to drive miles out of the village, twice each day, past a perfectly good school that your child could have a good, healthy walk to and from, with friends from their own village. Indeed, the parents of these 'travelling' children may well be risking their children not having many village friends at all, with children from Port Isaac School thinking of them as 'outsiders'. This could result in the 'travelling' children not integrating properly into the village community.

The children and staff at Port Isaac School are a credit to the village; no doubt their loyalty will be rewarded at their thriving local school. Long may we see and hear the children of our school enjoying the best days of their lives around Port Isaac.





#### SOUTH WEST WATER ODOUR PROBLEM

The Chairman read out a letter from South West Water reporting that the odours during the summer were caused by the sewage network in Port Isaac. After investigating this, systems were cleansed and some manhole covers sealed. The letter also informed that it was unlikely that the odours were originating from the Sewage Works. The Parish Council is not satisfied with this response and is requesting a visit of its Members to the Treatment Works in the spring to ascertain why the odour only occurs at certain times of the day and lasts up to approx 1½ hours.

#### **HIGHWAY ISSUES**

The Chairman proposed that the Council writes to Cornwall County Council Highways regarding health and safety issues with the dual use by pedestrians and motorist in Fore Street, Port Isaac, and has requested a site meeting.

#### AFFORDABLE HOUSING/SPORTS FACILITIES

The Parish Council agreed to enter into negotiations with Westcountry Housing Association to give an
