Websites of the month

The web has many sites devoted to maps and mapping. The most recent one to hit the headlines is Google's twin mapping systems, Google Earth and Google Maps.

Google Earth:

The idea is simple. It's a globe that sits inside your PC, and you can find it at <http://earth.google.com>

You point and zoom to any place on the planet that you want to explore. Satellite images and local facts zoom into view. Tap into Google search to show local points of interest and facts. Zoom to a specific address to find accommodation or shops. View driving directions and even fly along your route. The flying bit is the most amazing, as you can tilt the world so you fly over cities and lakes as you would in a plane. To get it you have to download a small programme which links you up.

Google maps:

The other mapping system that Google has developed is one to help you get from place to place. It is one of a number of systems. It has the advantage of being very simple and the maps are clear and uncluttered. This can be found at <http://maps.google.co.uk/>

Streetmaps:

Similar to Google maps is Streetmap (www.streetmap.co.uk) into which you can type postcodes or places and it will give you a map of the area with street-names.

Aerial Photographs:

If you are interested in aerial photographs then

<http://www.getmapping.com/home.asp> is a good place to look. It has comprehensive coverage of the UK and the detail of the images is wonderful.

Environmental information:

From the array of other maps one that is striking is www.magic.gov.uk which stands for Multi-Agency Geographic Information for the Countryside - a bit of a mouthful. It is full of really detailed information and describes itself as the first web-based interactive map to bring together geographic information on key environmental schemes and designations in one place. The National Geographic site is good for a variety of maps as well (<http://www.nationalgeographic.com/resources/ngeo/maps/>)

Both for Magic and for Google Earth you really need broadband as all the information that is loaded into the maps is held on the computer in the sky somewhere. But if you have broadband you are in for a treat.

Fun maps:

Finally for kids there are some fun maps. The national geographic has map and geography games., <http://www.nationalgeographic.com/geospy/>. Also you could try downloading a small programme from <http://www.yourchildlearns.com/megamaps.htm> which allows you to print out large maps for colouring in purposes...

Another site just started up for local interest is Jim Platt's Creighton Books - (<http://www.creightonbooks.nl/>). Creighton Books was named in memory of Jim's grandparents, James and Eleanor Creighton, both long-term residents of the village of Port Isaac in North Cornwall.

Port Isaac Breakwaters long overdue renovation

Our small fishing village is one of the leading shell fishing ports of the West Country, its peculiar speciality being the lobster and spider crab. Large quantities are exported every year to France and Spain.

Port Isaac's harbour is one of the most exposed on the North Coast and its small but modern fishing fleet has received some protection from its two breakwaters, which were built in the 1920s. The Eastern breakwater takes the brunt of the pounding from the open Atlantic and has been badly in need of repairs for many years. Not only do the breakwaters give some protection to the boats, they also protect the village itself although at Spring tides the bottom of the village does still flood occasionally.

After many years of trying, the Port Isaac Harbour Commissioners secured funding to carry out essential renewal works to the Eastern breakwater, which are now complete. The project has been funded by a number of agencies and organisations including: Objective One, DEFRA, Cornwall County Council, North Cornwall District Council, St Endellion Parish Council and Port Isaac Harbour Commissioners, to a sum in excess of a quarter of a million pounds.

The Chairman of the Harbour Commissioners, Mr Dugald Sproull said, "the completion of the essential renewal works to the breakwater will ensure that Port Isaac's fishing fleet will remain viable and also contributes to the protection of the village itself. Not only is a working fishing fleet important in its own right, but it provides one of the major attractions to visitors to the village".

It is interesting to note that exactly 80 years ago it was reported to Bodmin Rural Council (the predecessor to the North Cornwall District Council) that recent floods had caused ruts in the road two feet deep and the Council decided to "support the proposed harbour scheme on the grounds that it would keep the sea out".

'In my view'

Since the last edition of *Trio*, the Parish Council organised a meeting in the Church Rooms to which Malcolm Price, the NCDC Head of Development Control, was invited to attend. It was supposed to be a discussion but the Parish Council Chairman does not care for debate or argument, hence it became a session for Council members, and the general public, to make individual points and then pass on to the next person. If it was supposed to be a discussion it failed. Mr Price talked, at great length, about how good his department was; he was supported in this by Colin Brewer, one of our County Councillors, and the Chairman of the NCDC.

Apparently, NDCD Planning Department is rated in the top 10% in the country. What must the other 90% be like??

Dennis Knight was there. He has put in a planning application to develop the mini barn at the top of Margaret's Lane. A good idea, I think, before the roof falls in. It was opposed by Planning and by two families, one of these being a second home owner. The other family had a legitimate question which could have been solved by having a few words with Dennis. Our NCDC Planning Committee could not even be bothered to have a site meeting. One of the things against the proposal was that the door would open straight onto Trewetha Lane. I'm waiting for the Council to remove the steps leading through Dr George's Field, a far greater potential accident waiting to happen!

Mr Price, in my view, wields an inordinate amount of power. He may have been on course galore, but his opinion is only one of many in the District and should be questioned by Councillors – the large number of applications that get passed at appeal underlines the reason why.

Two new additions to the periodic table of elements:

Element Name: **WOMANIUM**

Symbol: **WO**

Atomic Weight: (don't even go there)

Physical properties: Generally soft and round in form. Boils at nothing and may freeze any time. Melts when treated properly. Very bitter if not used well.

Chemical properties: Very active. Highly unstable. Possesses strong affinity with gold, silver, platinum, and precious stones. Violent when left alone. Able to absorb great amounts of exotic food. Turns slightly green when placed next to a better specimen.

Chemical properties: Attempts to bond with WO any chance it can get. Also tends to form strong bonds with itself. Becomes explosive when mixed with KD (Element: **CHILD-IUM**) for prolonged period of time. Neutralize by saturating with alcohol.

Usage: None known. Possibly good methane source. Good samples are able to produce large quantities on command.

Caution: In the absence of WO, this element rapidly decomposes and begins to smell.

In recent times the church here in Cornwall has launched an initiative to encourage people who are Christians to become a channel of blessing to others. We in Port Isaac want to be part of this initiative, so over the next few months we will be publishing a plan of action in which I hope the whole community will involve themselves.

This new initiative will obviously lead to the need to develop a local ministry team in order to fulfil the church's mission to all people. Some people have already trained as Local Pastoral ministers and there will be a programme to train more to care for people and to lead them in worship. Over May, June and July we will be asking the community to tell the Church in what way we can help.

Many months of fundraising, skilled work and community involvement culminated at St Kew Church on 3rd February with the rededication of the "internationally important" medieval stained glass window. Compost Corner aka Manure Monthly!



I've just sat down in my new kitchen, from where I have a bird's eye view of the comings and goings of the village, to write March's *Trio* column. I'm smiling at the irony of my chosen subject for this month, 'Spring - the real New Year!', as all I can see is a real hoolie blowing outside and people walking past wrapped up like Nanook of the North! On the other hand, two weeks ago, Liz and I had lunch in the garden in our shirtsleeves - it was still January then! So confusing ...

Nevertheless and notwithstanding today's joyless weather offering, we can all feel Spring creeping up from behind, ready to pounce and catch us all out. Are we ready, I wonder? I'm talking in purely horticultural terms you understand, I can't take any responsibility for your new season's wardrobe, or the diet you promised to start in January!

This year, I feel like I can go on a journey with you all, dear readers, as 'post house conversion' and with our dividing and very tasteful (!) fence going up tomorrow, I turn my mind to the little patch of land that will become my own garden. Without one for approaching two years, I am very excited at the prospect of creating a space that has to fulfil a very tough brief. I want storage space for the tools of my trade; somewhere private to sit and relax; a vegetable/fruit garden; space for a small greenhouse; an instant yet evergreen six foot hedge to give me privacy from the road; all year round colour; low maintenance shrubs; delicious looking pots; a water feature ... you get the picture? I could go on!

The truth is I can't have many of these things just yet but it's Spring and March so, in gardening terms, it's New Year and I can plan, scheme, plot and dream my new garden and that's where you come in. It occurred to me that lots of us face the same problems and issues with our gardens. We inherit a space and then we need to give some serious thought about how to make best use of it in a way that suits our own needs and desires. So I thought that it might be useful to share with you my diary of how I plan to develop my garden, using established design principles but on a tiny budget of both time and money! You might feel motivated to join in and tackle your own patch of land. If you do, I'd love to hear from you - we could have a regular update on everyone's progress with before and after pictures!

I've set myself the following tasks for the first two months. Please join in!

In order to fully understand the scale of the project and develop a plan that works for you ...



1. DEFINE YOUR REQUIREMENTS

Carry out an audit of your family's requirements. Try to include everyone, even your pets! Here's some things to consider:

Aesthetic (nice views!!) - How does the garden look from inside the house, within the garden, outside the property?

Garden Leisure Activities (what you will do in your garden!) - Eating/drinking/cooking, relaxing, children's play area, family sports

Amenity Areas (ugly bits!) - Oil tanks, dustbins, compost bins, laundry area, sheds/outbuildings/greenhouses

Food Production (Health! Health! Health!) - Kitchen garden, fruit trees/bushes, herb garden

Desires - Formal or informal garden, types of plants, colour scheme, water feature, garden ornaments

Resources (with what shall I fix it?) - Budget, time available to carry out work, people available to carry out work, timescale (completion date)

2. SITE ANALYSIS

Next you review the site as it currently stands. This should help you establish exactly what the gap is between the reality and your dream space!

Measure your plot - Size, shape, level or sloping

Relationship of plot to house - Views from the window, access to garden, shade cast by the house

Aspect & Climate - Find your North point, prevailing wind, areas of sun and shade at different times of the day

Soil Conditions - Depth of topsoil, condition of soil (texture, structure, drainage), PH of soil

Services - Establish routes for water, power and drains

Existing Features - Keep, hide or remove trees, hedges, outbuildings, hard standing, fences

Now, review your requirements against your site analysis. Do a quick reality check! If you have a small garden maybe a shed, summerhouse and greenhouse is too much to hope for ... and, like me, you'll have to come up with a cunning plan to incorporate as many features from your wish list whilst maintaining harmony, proportion and balance ... the key elements of a cracking design.

Happy planning till May when I hope to share the results of my initial planning. Then we can look at the principles of design and maybe get the colouring pencils out and come up with a winning plan for our own individual havens.

TWO KITCHENS ONE COOK



Thoughts this month seem to be mainly on the theme of feeding the family.

The Fantasy: Imagine a family meal sat round a large kitchen table. Conversations, laughter and feelings of togetherness. The enjoyment of the meal starts with the cooking. Little helpers chopping away. Offers to set the table. Questions of what's for tea? And oh that sounds nice. The pleasure of serving as others admire with appreciative and expectant comments.

The Reality: Somewhat different, but I'll leave that to your imagination. What I will give you first is a very simple recipe/idea my guys enjoy. I will follow this with a veggie lunch for mates. It's a simple choux pastry mix with goats cheese which I love. Some kids love this too but it goes without saying that, for my guys, I would leave out the goats cheese. I have thought of trying this out with those organic Swedish meatballs in a sort of alternative toad in the hole type thing (my guys love toad in the hole) but I'll get back to you on that one.

Recipe in order of cooking. To serve 4 small child size portions

Pasta - a couple of handfuls for each portion, cooked then add a knob of butter
3 Eggs made into an omelette and cut up • Ham chopped up
Sweetcorn cooked in pan then added to omelette and ham
Philadelphia about half a pack warmed gently in a pan with a splodge of milk
Broccoli cooked and chopped up
Parmesan to serve and a few dashes of Tabasco for Will who likes that sort of thing.



Follow the instructions for each of the ingredients then mix together. Put in an oven proof dish and sprinkle on the parmesan then warm through in an oven. I have left quantities to you as you can decide how much sauce/broccoli/sweetcorn etc you like. The philadelphia and milk make a simple sauce I can even get past Joshua. It's a mess around mix of ingredients that the kids can help cook.

Goats' Cheese Melt



4.5oz/125g gouda cheese, diced • 4.5oz/125g plain white flour
6floz/175ml milk • 2.5oz/75g unsalted butter cut into pieces
4 eggs beaten together • 4.5oz/125g goats cheese cut into 6-8 slices
1tblsp chopped rosemary • 2 crushed garlic cloves
1 tblsp olive oil • Sea Salt



1. Pre-heat the oven to 190 °C/375 °F/Gas Mark 5.
2. Sift the flour ready to use. Heat the milk, butter and salt together bringing to the boil then taking off the heat immediately add the flour and beat vigorously.
3. Beat over a low heat so the mixture dries slightly, about a minute will do. You're looking for the point at which the mixture comes away from the sides of the pan.
4. Taking off the heat let the dough cool for a couple of minutes before beating in the eggs a little at a time. You may not need them all. I stop at the point where the mixture starts clinging to the sides of the pan.
5. The dough should be shiny and fall off the spoon. Now add the cheese
6. Spread the mixture out on a well oiled baking sheet and flatten out to the size of a dinner plate in a rustic sort of round.
7. Top with the goats cheese. Mix the oil, rosemary and garlic together then drizzle over the dough. Lastly add the salt. I use coarse crystals because I like a salty crunchy hit.
8. Bake for 10 minutes then turn the oven down to 150 °C/300 °C/Gas mark 2 for a further 25-30 minutes until crusty and brown.
9. This is best eaten at once straight from oven to table all puffy and smelling gorgeous.
10. Enjoy!!!!!!

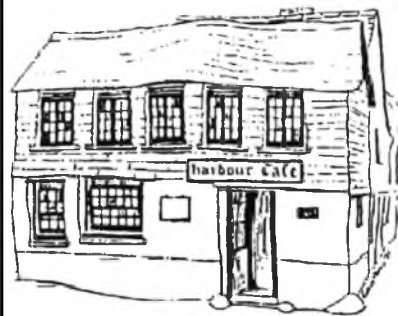

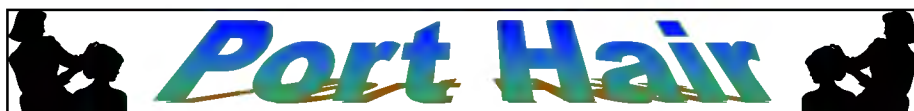

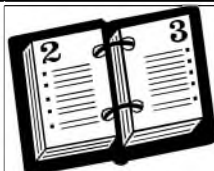
