Trio subscription rate increase


The changes to postal charges and the now regular bigger Trio mean that, with immediate effect, the subscription rate will increase to £15 a year.

his month, with the days drawing in, I thought it would be interesting to see what the web has to offer about the seasons, and in particular about autumn.

In common with other topics we have covered, a useful starting point is the BBC's excellent site http://www.bbc.co.uk/nature/animals/wildbritain/ autumnwatch/. When you open up the site you get very jolly music and there is a video running, so if

you don't have broadband it may take a bit of time. However, there is an interactive section for people to record their first ripe blackberry, their sighting of the last swift, the first ripe conker and first ripe hawthorne. Also the first tint on the Oak tree and the first flowering of the Ivy. All these are indicators of Autumn. All the information you provide will contribute to over 300 years of observations and ground breaking research into climate change science.

You can get more information about this research on the UK Phenology Network website - http://www.naturescalendar.org.uk/ which is also an amazing source of information. While this is a veritable storehouse of data which shows how the climate is changing and the seasons with it, it does take a bit of getting used to, and again without broadband would be a bit slow.

For those of you who would like to take part in one of the local projects around this topic the National Trust is organising a 'breathing space' event. As they put it "Everything grows well in Cornwall some things unfortunately faster than others. Help us to control scrub, cut butterfly glades, open spaces for wild flowers, cut weeds in wetlands and of course, have huge bonfires." With the changing seasons we are likely to get unusual visitors to Cornwall. We have a local expert in Malcolm Lee on the stick insects who have been with us for many decades and you can read all about them on http://www.erccis.co.uk/species/stickinsects.htm . This excellent website for the Environmental Records Centre for Cornwall and the Isles of Scilly (ERCCIS) has now firmly established itself as one of the most eminent Local Records Centres in Great Britain. It was founded in 1997 and has been going from strength to strength.

Another thing that happens in October is that the clocks go back. There is another eye opening site about this at http://

wwp.greenwichmeantime.com/info/bst.htm , which has the handy mnemonic - Spring forward, Fall back (and of course there are websites about mnemonics but that can be left for another month!). Unfortunately we don't call Autumn Fall (this

refers to the fall of leaves and was first used in 1545, guite recently really). Apparently we adopted summer time in 1908, so that's been going for some time too, the first coun-

try in the world.



THE RETURN OF THE GRUMPY OLD MAN!

The list is huge but, to sum up, probably anyone who has likes, dislikes or opinions that differ from mine.

The older I get the more anarchic I'm getting. At the end of WWII there was a glimmer of hope, one of the outcomes was the NHS. What the politicians did not take into consideration was that mankind is greedy and competitive. So we get a national Government whose representatives are elected by a handful of party members in each constituency. The national bodies of these parties, more and more, are dictating to local affiliations who or what to put forward. Maybe the councillors, unlike Ted Childs, are not too interested in rubbish collection!! The public meeting at Camelford obviously had some effect – even if Mr Paynter was persuaded that public meetings are notoriously difficult to manage.

Dear Trio





It may be that this year there will be two groups performing two nights each. However, we'll see what the response is. Again, look out for the notices.

Two Minutes Silence

I'm glad the 'Two Minutes Silence' has now been restored to its original place at 110'clock on the eleventh day of the eleventh month. Although not everyone keeps it, it's important that we do have this pause in our national life, not only to remember those who gave their lives for their country in the two World Wars, and in other conflicts since, but to think of those who are risking their lives now in Iraq and Afghanistan.

Those two brief minutes on Armistice Day and on Remembrance Sunday, give us an opportunity to express thanks for the sacrifices of the dead, and of those who still bear the physical, mental and emotional scars of their service.

It's important, too, to think of also of the pain and sadness of the families of those parted from their loved ones, during wars and conflicts. Those who live daily with the fear that they may never see their loved ones again.

Dietrich Bonhoeffer, that courageous opponent of the Nazis, understood their feelings as he himself experienced the anguish of separation from those he loved. Writing from his prison cell he noted that, 'Nothing can fill the gap when you are away from those you love. It is nonsense to say that God fills the gap. He keeps it open, so that our communion with another may be kept alive, even at the cost of pain.'

In the face of great suffering, our own or that of others, often the only possible response, is silence. In such suffering we are taken to the foot of the cross, to Jesus, the one who stands with us in our suffering because he himself shared it to the full; to Jesus the one who also gives us hope, for he shows us by his resurrection that suffering and death are not the end.

We have been absolutely overwhelmed by your response to our request to help us make funds for the CLIC Sargent charity for children with cancer and leukaemia.

The Coffee Morning with Light Lunches held in the Village Hall on September 30th raised an unbelievable £2228.50.

Thank you so much to you all for your help beforehand, on the day, being there and spending your money, creating such a happy atmosphere, for donations of goods to sell and for the money sent from all over the country from people with family ties to Port Isaac and their friends. The generosity, kindness in different ways and all the support we have had from so many of you is very comforting. We, as a family, are so very grateful to you all.

The money raised is being split evenly between the CLIC House in Bristol and the CLIC Ward at Treliske Hospital, Truro.

Matthew continues his treatment on a regular basis and is soon to embark on an eight-week regime of intensive chemotherapy to the "limit of his body's endurance". We still have no prognosis, so please keep him in your prayers; his road is still very long.

Trelights Methodist Church had a very successful garden fete on August 22nd in the grounds of Park Villa, by kind permission of Mr & Mrs Charles Meek.



Note: This is an informal report and not taken from the minutes of the meeting. This month's meeting was held on September 11th, at Port Isaac Primary School.

Public Discussion

A number of people from Treliahts attended the meeting They felt that there was too much building going on and were worried about the future. Four to six properties were being built on the ground of one bungalow. The floodgates have been opened. A bungalow should be replaced with a bungalow, not a four-bedroom house. The Planning Officer cannot take any more objections at this stage (County Cllr was present and said that e-mailed objections could still be sent until the following morning. He added that there had been similar problems at Rock where they were simply following government guidelines. The Highways department would also be consulted.).

The Parish Council had only been concerned with over-development in Trelights and had made no other objections. The Parish Council has no role in planning and development and if plans are in accordance with the Local Plan then it has no grounds to make objections. A member of the public thought that the Parish Council should have a policy of 'no development', or limited development' or there was a danger that the place could be killed altogether.

Access through the village has been blocked by building materials etc. There was indiscriminate parking, the telephone box was blocked, building material lorries were damaging the roads, a fire engine would not be able to get through.

Trelights will no longer be the village it was when they moved there.

It was asked how much power does the Parish Council have. At a site meeting, the planning committee seemed to have foregone conclusions.

It was suggested that Trelights residents should lobby NCDC and that the Parish Council does not have a role in the planning process.

Building near the playground caused severe flooding.

Requests made for a pavement in Furze Park have not been met and the kerbs are now hidden by growth.

Parish Council News

A pressure group for Trelights could be considered although residents with points to make can attend Parish Council meetings.

It was asked why no first-time homes are being built, only luxury second homes. Cllr Brewer said that it is necessary to know how many are required. Many people say that they don't want houses with a non-selling-on' condition. When such a development was made at Rock, it created an undesirable area with the wrong sort of people.

A letter from Ros Roskilly was read about the Trelights over-development of luxury and holiday homes. The roads were being used by the builders' lorries, diggers, etc making it necessary to reverse. People, including children, and elderly people need to walk along the road to the bus. Horseriders, and cyclists also use it but there were no traffic controls. No agency seems to be interested in the problems which were merely passed on to another department. Perhaps notice would be taken if there were an accident. He hoped the Parish Council would be able to help with the problem and that some councillors would visit Trelights.

A letter is to be sent to the Planning Office, the Chairman of the Planning Committee, the Police, and the Highways Department, concerning the obstructions.

George Steer drew attention to the development at West Winds. Port Gaverne where there had been a tiddly bungalow there is now a huge development.

Meetings with Adam Paynter about rubbish research had been advertised in very small type in the North Cornwall Advertiser but were 'by appointment only' and the meeting at Wadebridge had been cancelled as no appointments were made. A French company, SITA, is taking over. No items would be available for sale at civic amenity sites. This had been a form of recycling.

George Steer spoke about the visitor centre, with a ramp for wheelchairs, at Boscastle, which will probably be replaced by a stone building but which perhaps could be moved to Port Isaac car park. It was pointed out, however, that it had proved difficult to find people to man the previous information point. The item will be placed on next month's Parish Council agenda.

Application 2006/01152 Formation of porch to front and rear elevation, alteration of various window openings and insertion of patio doors. Internal room alteration. Mr & Mrs A Roads, The Carpenters Shop, Trelights. North Cornwall District Council APPROVED this application.

Application 2006/01177 Erection of sheep shed. Mr G May, Tregaverne, Port Gaverne. North Cornwall District Council APPROVED this application.

County Councillor's Report

Cllr Collin Brewer reported that a new carpet at County Hall had cost less, with the same specification, than the old one forty years ago.

He reported that the Lyons Report, to organise local government, was considering a single authority for Cornwall with 40 members.

The list of people needing housing in North Cornwall had now reached 3000 and thought was being given to the use of empty holiday homes.

Chairman's Report

Cllr David Phelps spoke about the amount of rubbish on the playing fields and asked members of the Council to meet there on Tuesday evening at 6.00pm to clear it.

Committee Reports

Cllrs Malcolm Lee and Robin Penna are to represent the Parish Council at a County Council meeting announcing a new system to cost footpath trimming.

Full details of the work undertaken on local footpaths and details of the recent meeting can be obtained from the Parish Clerk.

Daisy Hick's Corner

The Highway Authority is to be asked again to renew the signs at the corner.

Clerk's Correspondence

Notice was received of the intention to change the name Bunts' Old Garage' at Trelights, to Bunts' Mews'.

The ROSPA report was received for consultation.

A notice from PC Taylor regarding the re-introduction of double yellow lines in the conservation area was received. A proposal that the Parish Council opposes the re-introduction of the yellow lines, for reasons to be given, is to be placed on the agenda for next month's meeting.

Next Parish Council meeting

The next monthly meeting will be on Monday 9th October, 7.30pm at Port Isaac Primary School.

However, an interim Parish Council meeting was held on September 25th.

Public Discussion

Some local people expressed their opinion of the possible re-introduction of yellow lines in the Conservation Area. None of those present were in favour, the general feeling being that they would be non-aesthetic and would be no use in deterring people from parking in the village because they would not be policed adequately or often enough. It was also pointed out that the current system was not clearly signed and the signs that are there are old, small, and tatty.

Another point expressed was the abuse of the parking by regular offenders who were, apparently, happy to pay the present level of fine, in some cases budgeting for it in their business finances. Vehicles blocking various places and preventing access was another point that it was felt that the police should be doing something about. A short period of 'zero tolerance' was called for, and that traffic wardens should visit the village during daylight hours.

Liz Rowe told the meeting that she had written to NCDC asking for an improved pattern of litter bin [which would be seagull-proof] and perhaps stronger plastic bags for household refuse.

George Steer reported from a meeting he had attended in Camelford that the Bowithick refuse amenity was not to be closed after all but would be maintained and upgraded. This was as a result of the huge outcry from people at Camelford and goes to demonstrate that a lot of people making a fuss will get things done.

He also thought that extra Parish Council meetings were for matters outstanding and planning applications. David Phelps, Chairman, said that interim meetings were called when there was something that needed to be dealt with quickly, and that these meetings were always advertised and agendas given.

Finance

The Council is to make a donation of £250 toward the Christmas lights.

Sports/Affordable Housing -

Correspondence from Solicitor Chisholm was discussed and a reply drafted. Problems with the definition of 'resident' and ensuring that residents of St Endellion Parish have precedence were tackled and also removing the need for the Parish Council to be involved with matters in the covenant that were best dealt with by the Housing Association.

We would also be interested in hearing if you find the Parish Council reports useful; whether you would prefer more in-depth information or a much shorter report. About this time last year, looking at my poor ripped lower arms, I reassured you that I am not a self-harmer - t'was merely the results of busying myself with brambles and such like - though the injuries,

innocently obtained, were (and are again) rather unsightly. This month I wish to end any rumours that I have lost my marbles ... read on.

How many times have you walked into the web of a garden spider? Revolting. I've lost count over the last few weeks. Colourful, industrious little beggers they are, and they're everywhere at the moment. I'm very happy for them to live in the garden, but I don't want them, or their webs anywhere near my face. Hence my new, rather eccentric looking practice of 'the whole garden stick sweep' - to be highly recommended. It's not very technical, but it works. I have not gone mad - I'm on spider patrol.

Instructions: 1. Find stick. 2. Walk around the garden wherever you are likely to be working and wave stick around in an up/down, side-to-side motion.

Whilst I am on the subject of creatures, I will speak up for all garden wildlife at this time of year. This is a critical time for hibernating animals. They are frantically searching for supplies to see them through the Winter - bats, hedgehogs, toads, butterflies, wasps, bumblebees and such like will be feasting on our garden's rich pickings such as seeds, nuts, berries and flowers. They all need to find a safe place to hide so I am asking you - please don't be too neat and tidy!! Now don't use this as an excuse not to put your garden to bed, but what about ...

- 1 providing hiding places such as dark, damp corners or a pile of stones or bricks for toads and frogs or a pile of logs for hedgehogs which they can leaf line and sleep in? Leave a climbing plant un-pruned for butterflies to hide behind.
- 2 Leaving some leaves in corners for crawling creatures to live under and eat, and having a good supply of them in your garden is great for hungry birds.
- 3 providing a reliable supply of drinking/bathing water through the next few months for all for your wildlife.
- 4 Feeding the birds regularly. Only begin this is you can guarantee to continue as I am sure you aware, they do come to rely on a source.

Work in the garden is still very much of a 'putting it to bed' nature, though if you have some nice, evergreen shrubs and Winter bedding plants, there is no reason why your garden cannot still look good through the Winter. Last month I suggested you took care of dead foliage, divided your clumps of perennial plants and gave some attention to your lawn. I am sure there will be more cutting back to do this month, and your lawn will appreciate an Autumn feed now that it is weed and thatch free and breathing well?

This month I will be planting lots of bulbs. Bulbs are fab. I always marvel at how such dull little blobs can have the information and means to produce gloriousness. They are really good value for money as they come back year after year and they reproduce happily all by themselves. You can get packs of bulbs for only a few pounds - I saw 100 crocus bulbs for £2.99 recently. Tulips, narcissi, snowdrops and irises are cheap favourites although you can pay a bit more for special hybrids. My advice to you is to first think about where you are going to plant them. If they are going outdoors, exposed to all the elements then buy the cheaper packs and go for dwarf varieties or those with strong stems (such as Darwin tulips) which will stand up to the wind better. Planting advice will be available on the packs, but a general guide is to allow twice their own depth of soil above them and

make sure the pointy end is skywards. You can plant with a trowel, but there are devices to help - a dibber for soft soil and a bulb planter, which lifts a plug of soil you can then drop in over the bulb when planted. Don't plant bulbs in areas which can become waterlogged as they will rot (although snowdrops do prefer damp soil). The packets will also tell you planting time and flowering time. It is good practice to make a note somewhere of which bulbs you have planted where, so if you are doing any other garden work - new planting or membrane-laying for example, you can allow for their arrival.

I am praying for a gentle Autumn but the wind outside, as I write, is ferocious. Good luck out there and hold on to your hat! **Busy Lizzy**





O ctober Issue already and wasn't the last of the Summer wonderful. One of my favourite ways to spend a Sunday is to have friends over, with lots of little people, and all sit outside together for Sunday Lunch. With the last of the summer in September we were able to do this a few times. My lunches aren't often roasts but I did do a fab nut roast en croute with dauphinoise potatoes. Those days are over for now as it starts to get a bit chilly. So what to offer up this month ... I gave you a nut roast in June so I thought how about a little bit of cake and another chicken dish. Hope you enjoy! Orah



Apples and Bananas Cake

225g butter 225g sugar 2 medium bananas mashed 2 unpeeled cooking apples 4 eggs 200g self raising wholemeal flour 60g ground almonds 1 tsp baking powder

1. Pre-heat oven 150 °C/300° F/Gas Mark 2 2. Line a loaf tin of 20cmx9cm with parchment paper and really grease well.

 Cream the butter and sugar together then mash and add the bananas mixing well.
 Coarsely grate the apples to the core and mix with the beaten eggs.

5. Sift the flour and baking powder putting back any bits left in the sieve.

6. Add the flour, almonds and egg mix to the butter mix giving it a really good stir.

7. Bake for 1 hour, the cake is cooked when a skewer comes out clean.

8. Leave to cool in the tin slightly then turn out onto a wire rack.

Chicken with White Wine and Mushrooms (Serves 8)

2 medium chickens jointed into 8 small pieces each (keep the wings and carcass and make a stock)

250 ml stock 250ml wine about 3 tblsp oil for frying 50 g butter 3 onion peeled and chopped 6 cloves of garlic crushed 400g button mushrooms 250g bacon chopped 1 heaped tblsp cornflour 3 Bay leaves

1. Preheat the oven to 190 °C/375 °F/Gas mark5 2. Fry the chicken with the bacon until it has a good colour, then remove from the pan and arrange in a casserole dish. You will need to do this in batches.

3. In the same pan fry the onions until glazed and golden then add the mushrooms and butter, fry until the juices evaporate and the mushrooms start to colour then add the garlic and sprinkle over the flour giving a good stir. 4. Add the stock and wine and stir well.

5. Add the mushroom sauce to the casserole over the chicken.

6. Jiggle it about a bit and pop in the Bay Leaves.

6. Bake in the oven for 1 hour until the chicken falls off the bone
