





## Seasonal changes are afoot

A new "Twelve Days of Christmas" Policy has been implemented due to the recent announcement that Donner and Blitzen have elected to take the early reindeer retirement package. The news has triggered a good deal of concern about whether they will be replaced, and about other restructuring decisions at the North Pole.



10) Ten Lords-a-leaping is overkill. The high cost of Lords, plus the expense of international air travel, prompted the Compensation Committee to suggest replacing this group with ten out-of-work MP's who could do with something to occupy there time. While leaping ability may be somewhat sacrificed, the savings are significant as we expect an oversupply of unemployed MP's this year.

11) Eleven pipers piping and twelve drummers drumming is a simple case of the band getting too big. A substitution with a string guartet, a cutback on new music, and no uniforms, will produce savings which will drop right to the bottom line.

Overall we can expect a substantial reduction in assorted people, fowl, animals and related expenses. Though incomplete, studies indicate that stretching deliveries over twelve days is inefficient and our aim is to improve our service levels. Deeper cuts may be necessary in the future to remain competitive. Should this happen, the Board will request management to scrutinize the Snow White Division to see if seven dwarfs is the right number.

## **Christmas or Winterval?**

M any years ago I made a decision only to send Christmas cards which pictured some aspect of the Christmas story, cards which illustrated the true meaning of Christmas. So, every year since I've bought such cards. Sometimes they've been copies of Old Masters and sometimes they've been modern designs, sometimes humorous, but mostly serious, but always they've shown such scenes as the Christ Child in the manger, the Holy family in the stable, shepherds in the fields, wise men, angels, stars and so on.

At one time, cards which celebrated the Birth of Jesus were on sale everywhere, and were very easy to find, but then, gradually it became increasingly difficult to find such cards. I had to ask assistants for help and to tell them I wanted 'religious' Christmas cards. I was annoyed by it, but apart from grumbling to family and friends, I didn't make any other kind of protest.

But now, not only is it difficult to find Christian Christmas cards, but there are town and city councils who have actually decided to take 'Christ' out of Christmas itself and to rename their celebrations as 'Winterval', their Christmas lights 'luminos' after Harry Potter, and to send 'Season's Greetings' instead of good wishes for a 'Happy Christmas'. As I'm sure you're aware, this year, too, the Royal Mail has decided to issue Christmas stamps with no Christian theme.

Thankfully, one of this country's Christian leaders, the Rt Revd John Sentamu, Archbishop of York has protested most vigorously about what is happening and urged Christians to be more politically active in combating this rising tide of what he terms 'aggressive secularism'. He notes the subtle way in which this is happening, with minor changes having a drip by drip effect in eroding centuries of Christian heritage, and with them the values which form the basis of our society, and he warns, "Christianity is being systematically eroded from public view, more often than not in the fear of offending those who would not be offended in the least, or, because of the mistaken belief that Christianity has no role to play in the public arena."

What he says is borne out by the support of a forum which includes half Christian and half Muslims. It is also critical of this secularist agenda declaring that as Christians and Muslims together, it is wholly committed to the religious recognition of Christian festivals. "Christmas is a celebration of the birth of Jesus and we wish this significant part of the Christian heritage of this country to remain an acknowledged part of national life. The desire to secularise religious festivals is offensive to both our communities."

So no *Season's Greetings* from me but a wish that you may have a joyful and blessed **Christmas** and a peaceful New Year.


## Port Isaac Carnival 1984



We shall stick to the Christmas delights of the Sunday School, our home in Winchester. I made my cake in October this year but the pudding will have to be M&S. How did you do I wonder? I always plan to make puddings the year before but it never happens. I'm not that organised.

Anyway what to give you for my last recipe for Trio. There are so many recipes out there at this time of year it can all get a bit too much.... do you know I think I said the same thing last year.... it must be time for me to go! God Bless and Merry Christmas to you all. Enjoy!!!!!

### **Twice Baked Cheese Soufflés**

Makes 4 ramekins 300 ml milk ( 1 onion sliced, 2 bay leaves, 8 peppercorns) 65 g butter 40g plain flour 115g mature cheddar grated ½ tsp mustard powder 3 eggs separated 4 tsp chopped fresh parsley 3 eggs separated 250 ml double cream salt and pepper

1. Preheat oven to 180° C/350°F/ gas Mark 4.

2. Put the milk in a pan with the flavouring ingredients and bring slowly to the boll, then set aside to cool before straining into a jug. 3. Melt the butter in the pan and stir in the flour cooking for 1 minute.

4. Gradually add the milk and bring to the boil until thickened and smooth.

5. Cook stirring all the time for 2 minutes.

6. Remove from the heat and stir

in 75 g of the cheese and mustard
7. Beat in the egg yolks, chopped parsley and season to taste with salt and pepper.
8. Whisk the egg whites in a large

bowl until stiff but not dry.
9. Mix a spoonful of the egg whites to lighten the cheese mixture then fold in the remaining.
10. Spoon the mixture into 4 well buttered darioles or ramekins and put in a roasting tin filled with boiling water half way up the sides.

 Bake the souffiés for 15-20 minutes until risen and set.
 Remove immediately from the tin and leave to cool until ready to serve.

 13. When ready to serve preheat the oven to 220 °C/425° F/Gas 7.
 14. Carefully turn out the soufflés into a buttered shallow dish.

15. Season the cream, pour over the souffiés and sprinkle over the remaining cheese.


16. Bake for 10-15 mins until golden brown.

17. Serve immediately

#### **Fish Pie**

675g haddock or cod fillet 350 ml milk 1 bay leaf 1 small onion sliced 1 fresh thyme sprig 8 black peppercorns 4 hard boiled eggs chopped 50g butter 25g plain flour 115g peas 75g prawns 2 tbsp chopped fresh parsley 1 tsp anchovy essence lemon juice 500g potatoes cooked(see 10) 60ml hot milk 25a butter 4 tbsp grated cheddar salt and pepper

1. Preheat oven to 180 °C/350° F/Gas Mark4

2. Put the fish skin side down in a shallow pan. Add the milk and onion slices, bay leaf, thyme sprig and peppercorns.

3. Bring to the boil then lower the heat and poach for 5 mins until just cooked.

 Strain off and reserve milk.
 Remove the fish skin and flake removing any bones then add the egg.

6. Fry the mushrooms in 25 g of butter until the juices have evaporated then add to the fish.7. Melt 25g of the butter stir in the flour and cook gently for one minute.

8. Remove from the heat and whisk in the reserved milk then return to the heat and bring to the boil stirring.

9. Simmer for 4 mins then remove from the heat and add the peas and prawns
10. Mix the fish egg and mushrooms and put in a dish.
11. When the potatoes are cooked add the warmed milk and butter and mash with an electric whisk.

 Spoon the potato over the fish and fork the surface.
 Sprinkle the cheese over the pie and bake for 25-30 mins until golden.



# Parish Council News

**Planning Approvals and Refusals** 

- Approval received for re-roofing The Mote Restaurant, Fore Street, Port Isaac.
- Approval received for work at rear of Bunts' Garage, Trelights.
- Appeal by Louise Houston for raised wooden terrace at the rear of The Old School Hotel dismissed on the grounds that it affects the listed building and is an intrusion on the neighbours' privacy.

#### **Climate Friendly Village**

A full report was given in the November issue of Trio.

#### Footpath Report

Roundel arrows have been placed on the waymarker at the top of the path down to Pinehaven from the back of Lobber.

A price of £134.31 plus VAT and delivery, has been obtained from Plymouth industrial Services for a three-finger post at the footbridge in Pinehaven valley. The three fingers to be engraved with 'Port Isaac', 'To the Coast Path' (on both sides), and 'Port Quin' respectively.

It seems that, this year, a smaller proportion of our paths will be eligible for trimming cost reimbursement. We have relatively few 'Gold' paths for trimming as most of them are Coastal Paths and the responsibility of Cornwall County Council. The greater proportion to be trimmed, therefore, are 'Silver' paths which may not be eligible for reimbursement and would leave the Parish Council responsible for the trimming cost. The small number of 'Gold' paths would only be eligible for reimbursement of £500 and the earlier reimbursement of £1,500 would fall away, leaving the Parish Council to find the balance of £1,000. Steve Crummay, Manager for the Living Environment, Cornwall County Council, has been asked to comment on this situation.

A Cornwall County Council schedule of future recommended trimming work was examined and a draft letter with suggested amendments is to be drawn up and sent to Steve Crummay.

The Parish Council will be asked to include for £1,000 in the annual budget towards the cost of trimming the footpaths, in case the new County Council arrangements result in a shortfall to that amount, and £500 for any other works.

#### Notice Board in Playing Field Car Park

A proposal for a sign to advise visitors parking in the car park that it is only for use by people using the playing fields was not carried.

#### **Cleaning in Old Part of Village**

A meeting is to be arranged with the new NCDC Waste Minimisation Officer.

#### **Coast and Valleys Project**

The Council is to write a letter of support for the Project.

#### **Correspondence Received**

A letter from RD McCrohon complaining about Buffalo Pictures was read out.

A letter from Wadebridge Old Cornwall Society stated that yellow lines in Port Isaac would be unnecessary and environmentally unfriendly.

Daniel Sproull is taking over work concerning the Affordable Housing and Sports Hall project and a reply to an enquiry from the Cornish Guardian, will say that St Endellion Parish Council is looking for a suitable scheme

At the interim 'planning' meeting held on November 26th 2006 at Port Isaac County Primary School, there was no Public Discussion as no members of the public were present.

The following planning applications were discussed:



Poppy Appeal 1988 - A total of £406.24 was sent to the British Legion.

Port Isaac School - The school held a Medieval Music Workshop when the older children, together with children from Delabole School, spent the day working on music related to the crusades and then performing in front of the younger pupils.

If you want a good laugh, usually in lovely countryside, go and watch (novice) dogs trying to obey signals from the shepherd and get sheep to do what the shepherd wants them to do!

Not many people have been to the site of St Illicks in Port Gaverne valley, or to Hockens, on Bill Dawe's land above Fuzzy Hill. Indeed, many people who write articles about Port Isaac and its surroundings know very little about it.

Robin Penna lives in a house that had two dwellings attached to it and Yvonne Cleave knew well a now demolished house, called iona, which was level students, IF it met the criterion of the curriculum.

Jack Hill, when a lad, was 'oss mad and used to deliver mail for the St Breward postmaster over the moor in order that he could get to ride the postmaster's horse while he was doing it. The weather gets rough up there in wintertime. But when you're young and mad keen on something, who cares about a bit of rough weather!

Talk to people - they usually have a story to tell, often they themselves think it's of no interest to anyone else - and look for the places I have mentioned.

Did you know that Mrs Neal had a private school where Bob & Sandie Bulgin live? Kate Townsend and her sister, Marge Mewton were student teachers there. Mrs Louise C Pascoe had a girl's school at Trefreock from 1893 to 1897.

There is so much of interest in such a small area if you care to look.

But be careful of people such as Peter Stephens who has written a feature for Cornish World on Port isaac. It would appear that he has expanded on (perhaps) a NCDC pamphlet about the village. Among other things he calls alleyways 'drangs' when everyone knows they are 'opes. He also perpetuates the name Squeeze Belly Alley for 'The Entry'. Squeeze Belly Alley is a name given to the narrow passageway under Honey Cottage by Ted Robinson. Without becoming foulmouthed, I cannot express my loathing for that man. But he was kind to Robin Penna and Robin, in one (or more) of his booklets carried on the name (for which I have difficulty forgiving him). I hate the name Squeeze Belly Alley even more that I detest the name 'The Village Hall' instead of 'The Temperance Hall' and Robin was involved in that! I don't know why I still speak to him!

There are so many people in Port Isaac who do not stretch their legs to walk, to Pine Awn on the one hand or to Welshman's Quarry on the other. Very few even bother to walk to the Town Platt. If they walked as far as the top of Lobber and looked back over the village they might appreciate that we and the planners have made a right pig's ear of a once beautiful village.

## **Climate Friendly Parish Project**

We had another really good meeting in November and planned the next steps. We are now at the stage of getting some sort of baseline picture of how we use energy in the Parish and this will involve people filling in a survey. So Saturday 16th December, as well as being switch-on day for the Port Isaac Christmas lights, is SURVEY DAY. We, that is the steering group and any other volunteers, are meeting at 10.00 at Robert and Penny Manders home, Garrick, Trewetha Lane, Port Isaac ,Cornwall, PL29 3RW so we can spend the day posting the survey through all the households in the parish. If you can spend some time doing this with us. we would really appreciate it. If you come to collect some surveys and take them away to your road or hamlet, that would be fine too.

The plan is that the forms will give us vital information on the Parish so we can see where best to put the effort to reduce CO, and to give people the best advice and help in doing this. There will be a collection box in the Port Isaac Coop (thanks to Roy Smith and his staff) and every completed survey will receive a free energy saving light bulb! But wait there's more. We also will be entering all the forms returned into a prize draw for a Cornish Christmas Hamper. The website has more information so please do have a look there and send any ideas you have for how we should progress.


We have been invited to meet with Withiel Parish Council to explain to them what we are doing and we will report back on their ideas next



vehicles including our lifeboat. Police and Traffic Wardens will be taking

positive action at all times regardless of whether you are a resident, visitor, business or tradesman. time. It is good to see the idea spreading.

I thought I would now introduce two areas which underlie climate science. The first is greenhouse gases and what they have been doing.



The three graphs show how greenhouse gases, carbon dioxide, methane and nitrous oxide have been changing over the past 1000 years or so. There are graphs that go back much further but these illustrate the point quite well. These graphs come from the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change http://www.ipcc.ch/ and show the very dramatic rise in concentrations over the past century - coinciding with the Industrial Revolution. While this was, in some ways, the crowning achievement of our country, it is now clear that the power behind this revolution carbon based fossil fuels - their burning is likely to exact a terrible price. This is because the rise in greenhouse gases is associated with massive changes in climate, which we have been reading about and seeing on television.

The second area is about farming practice. Farmers Weekly (01.12.06) has a very good section on climate and energy; the scope for green energy, how the weather will change, and farm-scale energy kits. The NFU are actively involved in working out the implications for farmers and farming, but it is clear that farming will become more and more important in the coming years as locally produced food will be much in demand as it lowers transport demands. In addition, Farming Today on the radio had a recent feature highlighting the importance of considering the way slurry is managed as different ways produce much more methane than others. In the graph you can see nitrous oxide. This, like methane. is a very powerful greenhouse gas, much more powerful as an insulator than CO.. It is produced by artificial fertilizer. Both slurry and fertilizer management turn out to be really important. The good news is that there is also recent research that soil itself stores very large amounts of CO,, and if we play our cards right, it could hold one of the many solutions to how we reduce our emissions.

In my view, if a line is drawn from the Church Room, down Back Hill (Deep Hill in our deeds) to the pump and then up to First & Last, with one or two exceptions anything above that line could be transposed to almost anywhere. Economics has manifested itself in the concrete block as far as building is concerned. Concrete is probably the most impressive of all building materials and has done its best to ruin regional character. It is not just Port Isaac.

Stand on Pentire Head and look over to Polzeath – and weep. In my view the old Bodannon Farm should have been Grade One listed. It was not and so it was pulled down and replaced with the bungalow that Pam & Roger Richard's daughter lives in. What were the planners doing? I am just as guilty. With hindsight (what else?) we should have been advised by (a) NCDC Planning Department and (b) our builder that our bungalow would have looked better had it been stone faced. In our defence, it looks better that when we bought it.

There are so many things that I don't like. I will have to try and think of some things that I do like!

Then he was offered a place at six universities and chose to read for a Bachelor of Technology Degree at Bradford University. One year he represented the firm at the Lord Mayor's dinner. Among his other interests were card-playing and football.

Aged 58, he was unmarried and lived in Bradford.

Burial took place in St Endellion Churchyard.
