



# St Endellion Climate Friendly Parish Project

s with last month's edition we are a bit behind as our meeting is the day after Trio's deadline. However, we had a good meeting in May.

### Our BIG EVENT is happening on 7<sup>th</sup> July – you can remember it as it is 7.7.07!

To coincide with the Live Earth concert ( see http://liveearth.uk.msn.com/ for a good site, with videos and pretty pictures) we are having a Green Fair in St Peter's Church Hall, organised by the Camel Area Friends of the Earth. The exibitors will include experts on sustainable energy, both large and small scale, experts on housing and how to develop low energy dwellings. We also have the Cornwall Wildlife Trust, who have been in the forefront of raising the issue of climate change and its impact on our wildlife here in Cornwall. There will also be a bookstall with a range of books on climate and environmental issues. We are also hoping to have made some progress on developing our local food network and this will be at the Fair as well.

When you have been to the Fair, you can take yourself over the road and up to the Crow's Nest Pub where Tony Cunningham and his staff will be hosting the Live Earth concert on their big screen. Tony has had a long Interest in environmental matters and has been talking to other businesses about the project.

We will be coming round to your place some time over the coming weeks with a leaflet about 7.7.07 and the Green Fair, and to ask if you would like to join up with the Climate Friendly Parish project. We need help.

The other important development, which we are discussing is the reports from the University of Cornwall on the parish – farming, energy use in heating our homes and opportunities for offetting our carbon use. The resulting recommendations we hope to include in an updated action plan which will be presented to the Parish Council.

Next meeting will be on Monday 16<sup>th</sup> July at Port Isaac School 7.30 pm. All welcome.

### News from Hantsport, Nova Scotia



# Let the Children Come to Me

The telephone rings and I'm always delighted when the caller says, 'I'm ringing to ask if you can christen my baby?' Preparing for and then performing a baptism or christening, whether for a child or an adult, is one of the most rewarding tasks of ministry, yet these days it happens much less often than in the past.

Perhaps this is a good thing. No longer are people asking for baptism for superstitious reasons, and maybe parents with little or no connection with the Church are not prepared to make solemn promises on behalf of their child, knowing they're unlikely to keep them. If so, such honesty is to be applauded, for of course promises are important, especially promises made to God, and those who make promises should be sincere. But it's also important to remember that in baptism God also makes promises, and that unlike ours, his promises can always be relied upon.

There has been an occasional baptism in St Endellion recently, and a few more at St Kew - with one due to take place there in the family service this month- but although there are many babies and small children in Port Isaac, there have been very few baptisms in St. Peter's Church in recent years, the last one being in April 2006.

Clergy and churches do differ in their theology and thinking about baptism but no one who lives within the parish boundary can actually be refused baptism in their parish church. However, sometimes so many obstacles can be placed in the way, that an enquirer gives up. This seems to me a great pity. I hope the reason fewer parents are now coming forward is not because they feel they won't be welcome.

But if parents are unwilling to ask for baptism I wonder if they realise that the Church also offers another service, that of 'Thanksgiving for the Gift of a Child'? Many people experience a sense of awe and wonder at the creation of new life and wish to express their thanks to God. This service gives an opportunity for parents and families to give thanks to God for the birth or adoption of a child and to pray for family life. It may be a private celebration at home or in hospital or in can take place in Church.

So do think about this, and if you'd like to talk about either baptism or thanksgiving for the gift of a child, please contact me on 880181 or, after 16<sup>th</sup> July, the Revd Preb Dr John May, our new priest-in-charge on 862398.

### Joseph Saundry

1921-2007



what, besides watering, weeding and mowing (and buying birthday presents), should you be concentrating on in the next few weeks? Here's a few suggestions:

> eep on top of the pests - slugs and snails, aphids on your roses and other new shoots, vine weevil in your containers, red spider mite just about everywhere, caterpillars on your brassicas (sounds nasty...) and so on. They are all a real nuisance. Whether you choose chemicals or removal by hand, it really pays to put a little time aside each day to inspect your plants and take action, however unpleasant the task.

Ctake your tall perennials - foxgloves, delphiniums, hollyhocks, for example. Use bamboo canes and ties, obelisks, or the curved metal frames. If you only have string, tie them to other plants or to the fence. We know about wind and limp moments don't we readers, and a little assistance with both problems makes such a difference. Climbing plants such as honeysuckle, clematis and vines seem to be growing inches by the day, and as the new shoots tend to be very fragile, it is much better to guide them as they grow, than have to unwind them from other plants and their other unruly shoots.

lear away the limp foliage from Spring bulbs, and dead head your plants - camellias, rhododendrons and roses, and all your bedding plants which should in theory go on flowering a lot longer if you do. rune off leggy shoots on your shrubs and trees - and I am sure there will be many, thin out your clumps of crocosmia, tame your winca (periwinkle) and ivy - or they will take over. I have lots of all these in my little garden, and I feel like they are hemming me in, so I will be practising what I preach.

Are you growing any veggies or fruits? I have visited a few friends in recent weeks and have been really pleased to see that most are giving it a go in some way - from tomato and salad plants in containers and baskets, to full raised beds, and proper allotments. I think it is fantastic. I hear updates from several villagers who are keen veggie growers, and it is really interesting to hear about their successes and problems, and great to be able to swap or pass on excess young plants. I have been given some lovely flowers and plants to grow on at the school garden club, so thank you to all our very kind donors.

A last word - reassurance for a very lovely lady in the village, a keen and conscientious gardener, who has been having trouble with her bedding plants. We looked together at the troubled plants, and ran through a checklist to see if we could identify what might be causing their problems, and, unable to find any one thing, decided to blame the weather. We do have extreme weather here in as far as when it's sunny its REALLY HOT, when it rains it rains REALLY HARD and when the wind blows, it is REALLY FIERCE - and salty! It is always handy to have a good trouble shooting plant book to hand, but as long as you keep plants appropriately fed and watered, deal with pests and damaged limbs, and remember how badly many plants need protection from the wind, you should have more winners than

### The Parish Council minutes will now be available for everyone to see on the main Parish Council notice board next to the Co-op.

During the public discussion Mr Childs raised concerns about the on going problem of seagulls and rubbish in Port Isaac. He expressed concerns of the increasing number of seagulls breeding on roofs and brought the Parish Council's attention to an article on St Ives where they had employed birds of prey to discourage the gulls from breeding on the rooftops and sending them back to sea. He also reported that Lou Baker had recently been attacked by a seagull.

Mr Childs also reported on the litterassociated problem and he apologised for repeating himself on this matter. He informed the Council that more litterbins were needed in the summer than the winter as more people using them. He felt that the only gull proof bins were the dog bins on the cliff tops. He also reported that visitors staying in holiday cottages at the bottoms of the village were still unaware of the rubbish collection situation and that rubbish was still going out in black bags, which are not gull proof.

The Parish Council will now write again to North Cornwall District Council asking for more bins and stressing increasing concerns about the escalating seagull problem. This item will also be discussed further on the next agenda.



# Dudley Taylor at 90

ne of Port Isaac famous sons celebrated his ninetieth birthday at his home in Kenilworth earlier this month. Born in Port Isaac on 6<sup>th</sup> June 1917, Dudley was the youngest of four

brothers, Geoffrey, Alfred and Cecil. The Taylor family has lived in Port Isaac for many generations. Dudley's father, William, was a carpenter and builder who married Beatrice (nee Udy) one of nine daughters from Port Isaac mill. The boys all pursued different careers but Cecil carried on the interest in property development and lived in Port Isaac all his life. Indeed, Evelyn his wife still lives in the house he built in Lundy Road.

Dudley was educated at Port Isaac School and later attended Bodmin School as a weekly boarder. As William's business prospered, the family moved to what is now the Crow's Nest. Dudley left school at 16 and became an apprentice Pharmacist at Boots the Chemist in Truro, finishing his pharmaceutical studies at Nottingham

University just as war broke out. Dudley completed his studies and joined the RAF and trained in the then newly formed and highly secret world as a radar officer. After the war Dudley went back to pharmacy and used his savings and de-mob money to buy his first chemist shop in 1947. His father had retired by then and he and

Beatrice had moved to Bridgwater to be with their eldest son Geoffrey. It was there that Dudley met Dawn, who he married in 1948; just before moving to Kenilworth, where Dudley's skill and business acumen progressively led to the creation of one of this country's largest privately owned pharmaceutical businesses, including an

extensive chain of chemist shops, many in Cornwall, with branches in Camelford and Wadebridge. In a strange quirk of fate, when Dudley eventually retired, this chain of shops was bought by Alliance UniChem who later merged with Boots, Dudley's original employer.

Dudley's heart never really left Port Isaac and every year he and Dawn and their family of seven children would spend most of the summer in an old fisherman's cottage in Fore Street that Dudley had bought for a few hundred pounds in the 1950's. The family all developed a love for Port Isaac and the North Cornwall coast and the tradition is carried on to the next generation with the original cottage being occupied most of the time by one or more of Dudley's twenty-three grandchildren.

# Special celebration at Lifeboat Service

**S**unday June 17<sup>th</sup> marked a very special day in the history of Port Isaac lifeboat station, providing the opportunity for crew, committee, Coastguard Officers, villagers and visitors alike to attend the annual Port Isaac lifeboat harbourside service, this year celebrating the 40<sup>th</sup> Anniversary since the establishment of an Inshore Lifeboat at the port.

The Service, attended by over 200, was taken by Reverend Judith Pollinger with music from the St Breward Silver Band. Readings included Psalm 107 by Senior Helmsman Richard Hambly, St Pauls, I Corinthians, Chapter 13 by Operations Manager Phil Tidey and the closing reading of "If" by Rudyard Kipling by Chairman Bob Bulgin.

The history of our Lifeboat Station is worthy of note, formed as it was 138 years ago in 1869 and operating through to 1933 with no less than a succession of four pulling lifeboats serving for 64 years during which time a number of significant rescues were made. Then, with changing circumstances the station was stood down, although some cover was provided by a local fishing boat over the wartime and post war years. Port Isaac RNLI President tells us "From what I was told, after the Port Isaac lifeboat was withdrawn in 1933, the fishermen declared that they would be available for rescue purposes if requested by HM Coastguard. This system of self-help worked reasonably well except the boats were slow and not always available. If the tide was out and the boats had to wait to get afloat this made them unavailable for a quick response. It wasn't until after the war that punts had outboard engines, and these boats were used within the Bay if big boats were not available. Again a slow response to an urgent service. An example of this was a call out to a swimmer in difficulty off Trebarwith. It took the Maid M, with a small engine, 50 minutes to get across the Bay. Unfortunately the casualty had drowned before any assistance could be given. The introduction of the RNLI Inshore Lifeboats in 1963 made a lot of difference to coastal search and rescue. The re-opening of Port Isaac Lifeboat Station in 1967 was a great step forward but it didn't carry out a service in that year. The following year it was called out 17 times and has been a busy Station ever

On the July 10<sup>th</sup> 1967, the first boat donated by Cullumpton (Devon) Rotary Club came into service operating for 10 years. This was then replaced by a boat given by Cornwall and Isles of Scillies Round Tables. The next boat was donated in 1988 by Peter and Mollie Tabor and the last donated in 1997 by the Royal Logistic Corps. This boat was lost on operations in 1998 and replaced in 1999 by the present boat.

Over this 40 year period the voluntary crew of Port Isaac RNLI has launched on 581 occasions and saved 299 lives, the most recent taking place the day before this service when our boat, crewed by Helm Richard Hambly, Nikki Bradbury and James Bolton was called at 15-20 hrs, whilst out on exercise, to an elderly woman who had

With relatively calm conditions prevailing and nearest vehicular access a kilometer away and the casualty in shock, the decision was taken to bring her back to Port Isaac by lifeboat where arrangements had been made for an ambulance to be standing by. Our boat was refuelled and ready for further operations by 18-20 hrs.

The Port Isaac RNLI Inshore 'D' Class Lifeboat is used in sea conditions up to Force 6, day and night and is ready for service 365 days a year. This class of lifeboat has saved more lives than any other type of RNLI boat .



Hi everyone in Port Isaac, Port Gaverne and every one that reads the *Trio*. My name is Andy Cameron and I own and run *Wavehunters*. We are a small Cornish surf business based right here in Port Isaac. We operate our own surf school in Polzeath, our shop down by The Platt and also organise surfing holidays in Cornwall and Morocco. Last summer we decided to open our beach shed in Port Gaverne - we simply thought that holiday makers and locals would like a facility that could offer beach goods, teas and ice cream when you are on the beach. There are no

facilities available in Port Gaverne for teas, coffee and ice cream, so without further ado we spoke to the land owner.

As you already may know, the area was used mainly as a tip, so it was going to take some effort to clean it up and, unfortunately, the old tea shop was condemned! We cleaned the area up, taking away tonnes of rubbish, ranging from broken bottles to needles! We cut away all the weeds, unblocked the river, put up a little fence, cleaned the deck and laid hard core down, bought some tables and benches and then we stuck up our little shed! We decided on a little shed that we painted white as we thought that it would fit in and not look out of place.

The beach shed was really well received by locals and holidaymakers alike. Many older and established locals really seemed to like what we had done, and often came down for a cup of tea and to reminisce about the old tea rooms, that used to be really popular and do great tea that you could take on the beach. We also had many

holidaymakers who seemed to really like what we were doing. We thought that we had added something good for the community and enhanced Port Gaverne, giving it a little focal point.

We decided over the winter it would be great to do it again. We took on board a lot of really useful suggestions and came up with some of our own. Young Fleur Jon asked if she could manage the business as her own and she came up with her ideas. We really liked the old idea of having tea delivered to you on the beach, and decided to invest in some cool tea sets that would be brought to the client while on the beach.

Anyway that was last year and now we seem to have a problem! There have been some complaints to North Cornwall District Council by a couple of people who don't like the shed. NCDC has told us that we will be unlikely to keep the shed shop, even though we have paid business rates and had Environmental Health/Food hygiene checks. The shed is outside the existing plan of the tea shop - this is because the old tea shop is condemned an unsafe. So now we need to apply for full retrospective planning permission that will cost in the region of £700! When you add that to the rent, stock, wages and business rates, it's a lot. The planners at NCDC have also said that we are VERY unlikely to be gain retrospective planning!

Now, I know, there are few people that hate anyone getting on and actually doing something for a living, and I know there are plenty of people with serious jealousy issues of anyone, because they are so lazy, and I know there are a few people who have nothing better to with their time except try and stop anyone getting on, so you people need not read on. But for everyone else ,what do you think?

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

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
