

t's all good news. At long last we have been successful with a grant application and North Cornwall District Council have promised us £10,000. This means we can now confidently proceed with phase one of the improvement plan, which will provide a much better access to the Hall. As you are probably aware, we were hoping to commence work in August but we had to get a structural engineer's report before starting. This has now been completed and we now have the all clear to commence work and it is now scheduled for the last week in September. In the meantime we are going to make use of the August Hall closure to complete all the internal jobs which will include the new bar, stage equipment cupboard and additional storage cupboards across the back of the stage plus the ongoing maintenance jobs that require urgent attention.

Being an old building, the Village Hall seems like a never ending uphill struggle as far as maintenance is concerned, but the hard working band of volunteer helpers continue to give their time freely, without to many moans and groans. I am sure the whole village would like to join me in saying a huge THANKYOU.

More good news! Work on the electrics have now been completed so a big thank you to Steve Hewett and his team.

Even though we have been lucky enough to receive a grant it's just a drop in the ocean compared to the money needed to complete all the improvements planned. With this in mind we are organising the following fundraising events:

Can any of your readers help me with a query? I want to know what local newspaper covered the Port Isaac area in the years 1878 and 1882.

I have been trying to find out the circumstances of the drownings of my husband's great grandfather, Edward Avery, who was drowned at sea on October 23rd 1878, aged 41, and his son, also called Edward, who was drowned at sea on March 3rd 1882, aged 20 years. They were from Port Isaac.

I have tried various sources to discover the details but with no success, so I thought that a local newspaper may have carried the stories of a local family's losses.

I would be most grateful for any help.

Over 300 people, packed into St Endellion Church on Monday July 16th for the licensing and installation of the Revd Dr John May as Prebendary of St Endellion and Priest-in-charge of St Endellion, Port Isaac, St Kew, St Minver with St Enodoc and St Michael, Rock. More than 50 people from Dr May's former parishes travelled to St Endellion to attend the magnificent service which opened with the Deanery Choir singing *Fanfare* by Martin Shaw.

The licensing of Dr May as the Priest-in-charge of the newly formed cluster of churches was performed by Bishop Bill, the Rt Revd William Ind, Bishop of Truro and the installation was carried out by the Ven Clive Cohen, Archdeacon of Bodmin. 

Tiger Prawn Skewers



Makes 3 to 4 per person 16 tiger prawns

3 limes



For the Marinade: 5 tbsps olive oil 1 tsp finely chopped red chilli Juice of 2 limes 2 tbsps fish sauce 1 tbsp brown sugar 2 tbsps soy sauce 1 tbsp finely chopped garlic Handful of fresh coriander, finely chopped Coriander to decorate

1. Cut the prawns open in the back and remove the black veins.

2. Mix all the ingredients for the marinade.

3. Cut each lime into 8 pieces and arrange prawns and lime onto skewers (3 prawns onto each skewer) and place in a large dish.

4. Pour the marinade over the prawns and leave to marinade for 1 hour.

5. Grill on the barbecue until the shells are crisp.

6. Decorate with a bunch of fresh coriander.

Makes 6

1.5kg minced lamb

1 bunch flat leaf parsley, finely chopped 2 cloves of garlic, finely chopped Maldon salt and pepper 12 thin slices of pancetta Rosemary sprigs (to use as a skewer) plus to decorate

1. Mix the mince with parsley, garlic salt and pepper. Form six balls.

2. Wrap each meatball in two slices of pancetta and hold in place with a sprig of rosemary

3. Grill on barbecue until cooked through.



We had a busy time this last month with the Green Fair and the global concert *Live Earth*. Thank you for everyone for helping and coming and seeing the displays. The Crow's Nest also did good business so thank you to their customers as well. We wondered if we might have an annual Port Isaac Green Festival. At our last steering group meeting we covered a lot of ground, but here are the main headlines.

Working with Schools

We hope to develop links with the Kyoto in the home (see http://www.kyotoinhome. info/UK/welcome.htm) and similar projects with Port Isaac School and the secondary schools where St Endellion children attend (eg Camelford & Wadebridge).

Use of Energy monitors

We have had an interesting report from our first family to try the monitor and it has raised interesting questions like is it better to keep your immersion heater switched on all the time, or heat it up and then switch it off. As yet we don't have an answer. If anyone would like to borrow an energy monitor please get in contact. They can tell you how much power you are using. For example, Sharon, who has been trying the monitor out, found that making toast under the grill used shedloads more than using the toaster (which had been in a cupboard). These small changes can both save CO2 and also money.

Sustainable Tourism

We are working with Coast, the sustainable tourism group (http://www.cstn.org.uk/). The Crow's Nest pub is linking with them for an energy audit. We intend to extend this opportunity to all businesses in the parish and have a green tourism zone, perhaps linked to the Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty.

On the evening of Friday November 16th our local MP will be available to discuss with us his views about climate change, the rising cost of energy and other issues, and how these affect us in Cornwall. We are planning an informal session - maybe a dinner, perhaps by invitation. If you would like to be invited, please contact me.

News from Hantsport, Nova Scotia

On top of that they have live music and entertainment paid for by 'The Windsor Business Enhancement Society', a group of downtown businesses working together. The market an informal affair run by the sellers who meet together for a few minutes after each session.

* Even before environmental concerns became an issue, people from Hansport have been going to the Nova Scotia Tattoo in Halifax the carefree way – by bus. No driving fuss. No parking fuss. This year the bus was full. The Tattoo included a feast of gymnastics and parades with pipes, drums and kilts.

* Keith Schofield of Lockhartville has a good business making apple ladders, handles and paddles but he can't find anyone to take over the operation.

He goes into the woods for the ash for the ladders, which have been used for generations for picking applies. The ash rungs will hold 1000 pounds. Websites of the month

W hen I did a talk to the Golden Circle a while back it was clear that many people already were very green it was just how they have always lived. And this impression that there is a generational thing about being green was confirmed by a report on the Telegraph website last month (http://tinyurl.com/ysuxcj). This describes a survey carried out by a mobile phone company who have launched a recycling scheme for their products. They found that three out of four questioned for the survey say they are committed to recycling and almost one-fifth say they are recycling more than 75 per cent of their household waste. Younger people give a rather different story. Teenagers are the least likely to recycle (15 per cent) with more than one-third (40 per cent) saying it is too much trouble and a further 30 per cent saying they are too busy. Which is good news that the oldies among us are already on to this, but is it a bit of a problem when young people - and this applies to the under 55's but not as much as to the teens among us - don't really reckon that recycling is worth the effort. There is a really good site for kids and recycling, though, called Recyclezone which is colourful and fun. http://www.recyclezone.org.uk/

There is a bit for teachers entitled 'Learn to teach rubbish'...ho ho. There is a games section with quizzes (is your brain full of rubbish) a virtual school (does your school have to be rubbish) and so on. Schools have a lot of information available online on teacher net http://www.teachernet.gov.uk/ sustainableschools/ with downloadable guidance for governors and teachers and kids.

And the floods have been a bit worrying. Friends have been trapped overnight on the motorway, others couldn't get back after being on holiday down here. This is bringing the impact of climate change a bit close to home. There is some clear data which shows that there is a steadily increasing risk of flooding as a result of climate change. You can find this information here http://www.staff.ncl.ac.uk/h.j.fowler/extremerain.htm#fig1 at the University of Newcastle website where they have been monitoring it for some years. And there is also a very good parallel data set from temperature readings in central England from the met office which shows the steep rise in temperatures since about 2000 - http://hadobs.metoffice.com/hadcet/

Wildlife is changing too and I recently had some correspondence with someone who has a parish based wildlife project around Launceston with the Cornwall Wildlife Trust http://parish-wildlife.org.uk/ We were discussing the proposed windfarm near Davidstow http://www davidstowcommunitywindfarm.co.uk/ and whether birdlife, particularly Golden Plover would be affected. He said that with climate change, these wonderful birds no longer seem to be making the trip and so are unlikely to be affected. Again good news and bad news and yet another indication of how quick it is all happening.

* PC Malcolm Taylor was in attendance at the meeting and reported on the annual crime figures for the period April 2006–March 2007. Total of 49 reported crimes - 21 thefts, 16 criminal damage, 5 burglaries, 2 assaults. An overall increase of 5 on the previous year.

* The Parish Council has written to Cornwall County Council Highways about the possibility of residents parking. CCC informed the PC that it is only doing this in major towns at the moment. However it will look into 'No Through Road' signs at Silvershell, Mayfield and Hartland Road.

* The Parish Council has written to Cornwall County Highways asking for a speed limit review for the whole parish. CCH advised that it could not further this without the support of local County Councillors. The Parish Council is contacting them regarding this matter.

* The Parish Council is to write to Environment Health regarding seagull problems, ie children not being able to go out and play at lunchtime, and ask for a legal notice advising not to feed seagulls and the consequences. The PC will also ask for more seagull proof litter bins. Liz Rowe will prepare a poster for holiday cottages, to be pinned on notice boards, advising what to do with rubbish.

* The Parish has received a letter from Sarah Mason of the Cornwall Association of Town and Parish Councls saying that all decision taking meetings of the PC have to be conducted in public.



Patience Strong

F or the last couple of years, 'Compost Corner' has passed on tips for maintaining and beautifying your gardens. I hope you have found some things useful. However, we have been through the seasons twice, and if as a regular reader of *Trio* you haven't picked up enough know-how to make year round improvements in your garden, then frankly, there is no hope for you and I suggest you turn the page immediately and read the adverts! Joking aside, I'd like now to pass on some different gardening skills – a bit more technical, but keeping it seasonal and most relevant to local readers.

This month I'm going to explain a way of take *cuttings* from plants. A cutting is simply a piece of a living plant (the stem, root or leaf), encouraged to form its own roots and grow into a new plant. Apart from being really satisfying, you get new plants for nothing which is always nice. However, it is a bit fiddly, you do need a few bits of 'kit', you need heaps of patience, and somewhere to store them while they grow. There are several ways to propagate plants in this way, but August is a good time to take what is known as "semi-ripe" cuttings. This cutting is taken from this year's growth which has started to ripen – so the base of the new shoot has begun to go brown and woody.

So what do you need?

- A suitable parent plant try fuchsia, hydrangea, berberis, box or potentilla, all do pretty well down here, and grow well from cuttings.
- Secateurs for cutting the limbs from which you will take the cuttings, and a plastic bag to put them in until you are ready to do the business!
- A sharp, clean knife for making the cutting.
- Rooting and anti-fungal compound.
- Compost (free-draining mix of sand or grit and compost) and small plastic pots.
- A cold frame, seed propagator or plastic bags and elastic bands for covering the cuttings.

So how do you do it?

- Take plant cuttings in the morning with sharp secateurs. Choose healthy, non-flowering limbs about 20cm long containing new shoots.
- Fill a small pot with the compost mix, moisten compost and "dib" a stem wide hole, 1-2 inches/ 3-5cm deep.
- Select a new shoot, soft at the tip but starting to firm up at the base, and cut just below a leaf node, so the cutting ends up about 10cm/4 inches long.
- Remove the lower leaves with a knife, avoiding touching any cut surfaces as you might introduce disease. Dip cutting into rooting compound, and pop into hole in compost.
- Place pot in cold frame or propagator, or cover with plastic bag and secure with elastic band, ensuring that cutting is not touching plastic.

So what do you do now?

- Cuttings will need light and warmth, and positioning out of direct sunlight. Keep the compost moist – never wet or dry, and treat with fungicide every couple of weeks to keep mould at bay. Keep the covering over cuttings free from condensation and air the cutting once a week by lifting the covers.
- Have great patience! Never be tempted to wiggle the cutting to see if it has rooted, even if it has grown. Cuttings of this type will take several weeks to properly root. Remove any yellow or dead leaves.
- Make twice as many cuttings as you need some will fail allow for a 50 per cent success rate the worst you will end up with is too many plants which you can pass on to friends.
- Keep an eye out for growth at the tips of the cutting this is a sure sign of successful rooting.
 When you feel the cutting has really begun to grow, you can pot on into 10cm/4 inch pots.

In most cases it will take a couple of years for the plant to be big and strong enough to be planted out. You must keep them sheltered according to their size, and feed and water them, but that's about it. It isn't rocket science, and once you get the hang of it you might find you become a compulsive taker of cuttings, keeping a pair of secateurs and plastic bag to hand at all times! One of the largest gardens I take care of is filled with a huge variety of plants, and most of them were grown from cuttings. A glorious riot of colour all year round and a garden built, not with money, but with time and patience. A real inspiration. I hope you will give it a go. If you need pots, give me a ring – I have many and would be pleased to pass them on to good homes.

I hope that your flowers and vegetables are growing well after all that lovely July sun (ho ho!) and that the weeds are not winning the war!! Here's to a dry, sunny August and may all your fingers be green.

PS: Keep an eye out for seed heads on your plants – save them and dry them out and we can have a go sometime at growing from seed – I've been collecting poppy, love-in-the-mist and phormium, but there will be lots more round the garden – pop them in an envelope and be sure to mark the envelope with the plant name!

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

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
