



This report has been compiled from the draft minutes, supplied by the Parish Clerk, of Parish Council Meetings held on September 10<sup>th</sup>, September 23<sup>rd</sup> (informal meeting held at the Playing Field) and September 24<sup>th</sup>.

#### **ROADS & TRAFFIC**

Members of St Endellion Parish Council met with County Councillors Jeremy Rowe and Colin Brewer and walked around the village with the County Councillors. The following problems were highlighted and the County Councillors will progress these suggestions:

- Secrets Junction a Stop sign to be erected.
- Trewetha Lane, Rose Hill, Church Hill, and Margaret's Lane – all overgrown hedges are cut back.
- A signs review at Daisy Hick's Corner
- A speed limit review on the B3314, especially at St Endellion where a 30mph speed limit is needed.
- That the speed limit on entering Port Isaac from Trewetha is reduced.

## AFFORDABLE HOUSING/SPORT PROJECT

The Parish Council has decided not to continue with the existing project with Westcountry Housing Association and has informed Westcountry Housing and Sproulls Solicitors of this decision.

However, the Parish Council is holding a meeting on Monday October 22<sup>nd</sup> at Port Isaac County Primary School where Alan Fox of Cornwall Rural Housing Association will become to talk to the Council and members of the public about alternative schemes.

## CAR PARKING IN THE PORT ISAAC PLAYING FIELD

The Parish Council met at Port Isaac Playing Field on Sunday 23<sup>rd</sup> September to discuss the possibility of using the second field as an overflow car park in summer months. Whilst it was felt that there maybe access problems, the Council is going to consult with North Cornwall District Council about the possibility of using part of the existing playing field.

## Parish Council News

#### **BMX TRACK**

The Parish Council intends to remove the BMX track as it is becoming an eyesore and is unused. The council has written to the Youth Group for any suggestions as to what the area could be used for. If no suggestions are received, the site will be reinstated as before. If anyone else has any suggestions, please let the council know.

#### BINS

The Parish Council has requested from the District Council, Nappy Bins for the Public Toilets in Port Isaac and Dog Bins on The Green' in the Barton Estate ,Trelights.

#### **PLANNING**

**Application 2007/01561** - Erection of a two storey extension to the side and single storey extension to the rear (extension to include annexe accommodation on ground floor). Mr B Heymann, 19 Mayfield Road, Port Isaac.

It was proposed by Cllr A Penny that the Parish Council supports this application. This was seconded by Cllr B Bell.

#### Approvals/Refusals

**Application 2007/01224** - Demolition of existing front porch, rear single storey extension and rear sun room and the erection of new front porch, two storey extension to rear and new sun room together with construction of new swimming pool within rear garden and general internal re-ordering. Mr & Mrs N Thomas, Waypast, 2 Cliffside, Port Isaac. NCDC *APPROVED this application*.

## **My Final Word on Those Mythical Secret Meetings**

It will have come as no surprise that when challenged to submit their 'evidence' of wrongdoing on the last parish council to the Compliance Officer, Martin and Barbara Bell have been unwilling to do this. Their bizarre claims of secret meetings and negotiations regarding affordable housing are complete fabrications, and Martin and Barbara know it now, if they did not already know it when they made them. The irony will not be lost that the two people who portrayed themselves as saviours of the Parish Council are the only ones who have been misleading our community.

From the comments made earlier this year in *Trio* and elsewhere, the impression was given that I used my position as acting Chairman to launch a personal attack on Barbara. The truth is more straightforward. Rather than follow the Parish Council's standing orders, Barbara tried to commit the Parish Council to her course of action by sending a personal e-mail to the council's solicitor instructing him to act. All councillors are fully aware that whoever draws up those instructions, only the clerk can send them out, and then only after being satisfied they represent the wishes of the full council, rather than the partisan views of an individual councillor. Although I had reminded Barbara of this when I found out she had previously sent a personal e-mail to the solicitor, it is my view that she did not forward her reply for the clerk to issue as she felt it unlikely it would be sent.

No Chairman can ignore such a flagrant breach of standing orders by a councillor. Accordingly, after giving Barbara every opportunity to withdraw her unauthorised correspondence, action was taken to get the full council to resolve that it was not authorised and was withdrawn. This it did on the 5<sup>th</sup> March. Only Barbara can know the true motives for sending out that infamous e-mail, but a more prosaic reason springs to mind when its actual date and time is revealed - 11.38pm on the night of Saturday 24<sup>th</sup> February! What seems like such a jolly jape in the final minutes of Saturday night rarely survives the sober scrutiny of Sunday's dawn.

I have no further comments to make on this subject, although I would be happy to respond to any questions from the Compliance Officer, should Martin and Barbara wish, even at this late stage, to submit any evidence they may have substantiating their ridiculous claims. If they do, let us hope they put together their case at a more propitious time than the final hour of Saturday night.



## Websites of the month

Here are some ideas if you want to start your own website there are some new ways of doing so. This month I thought I would introduce some of the ways which are now available. If anyone local is trying to get a website going and wants any tips or help, please email and I will do my best to help.

The standard way to develop a website is to first of all get your website name. There are lots of websites which allow you to buy a name. For example, the one I generally use, for no particular reason, probably the first one I came across was www.soho-uk.com. This has a section where you can search to see if a particular name has been taken. As an example I have broached the idea of having a parish council website with the Parish Council Clerk, Elizabeth Harris. She will be putting this on the Council agenda. I went to soho-uk and searched for stendellionparishcouncil as a name. This has not been taken (no surprise there) and you can have a variety of endings like org or info. These are called domain names and cost about £10 per year. I bought www.stendellionparishcouncil.org in this way. Having got a name you then have to build a site which would be called by the domain name, and there are lots of ways to do this. I am typing this on a mac computer. This uses a web site maker called iWeb. You can see examples of what these look like at www.camelareafoe.org . Mac is very good at graphics and the interface is very easy. As you can see there is a welcome page and other pages with different topics. There are similar systems but all tend to be more complicated, like Microsoft Frontpage and Adobe Dreamweaver and there are many others.

The more interesting ones are called 'content management systems' or CMS and the one I am getting to know is called 'Drupal'. This is free and can be downloaded from www.drupal.com . In the STEER group we have decided to use this for the development of our new website – you can see the current one at www.portisaac.org . The big advantage of Drupal is that is is opensource – freely available to anyone. It is also very powerful as it allows communities to contribute to it, so everyone can have their own pages and so on.

So having written your website in either iWeb or Drupal or some other programme, you have to 'publish' it, that is put it on a computer somewhere, called a host, which is on all the time and which is accessible by the internet. I have some of this webspace on www.Soho-uk and it costs rather more than the domain name. You can get free webspace, but as the saying goes there is no such thing as a free lunch. There is usually advertising or hoops and hurdles to jump over to get to use it easily, unless you use the web design system provided.

So having got your domain name, you set up your webspace with it, publish the website you have written and there you are, online.

## Memories of my past

My grandfather, Edwin Charles Keat, said the worst hellhole in history was at the Somme. He lived most of his life in Cornwall, at Hayle, St Kew, Port Isaac and Port Quin and in 1929 he built a fine house, Highcroft, at St Minver (now Windmill Court).

In those days there was no TV, just the radio that switched on just twice a day. During the long winter evenings he would regale us with true stories of his past. During the Great War, 1914-1918, he was given some leave and he walked to see his son, Albert Edwin, whose regiment was many miles away. Albert's trench feet were in a terrible state and he was surrounded by wounded, sobbing lads. All around them was deep mud and blood and, even worse, large rats. My grandfather spoke to an officer who sent Edwin to hospital. However, his hearing was permanently damaged and his legs never recovered. Luckily, on his return to Cornwall, Albert secured an apprenticeship as a mechanic with Mr Allardice of Tregenna, Longcross. In time he married Lily Lawrence and he died in 1967, aged 70 years.

Edwin's son was a volunteer Royal Marine and was a gunner on HMS Dorsetshire. He was killed in 1938 and his name is on a monument on Plymouth Hoe where his sister, Joan, still lives. Two other surviving sisters, Hazel and Phyllis live in Bristol.

My father-in-law, William Spry, was awarded a DSM after fighting off the coasts of Greece, Turkey and the Dardanelles.

During the Second World War, as a young naval office, my husband William went to America to bring back a minesweeper. By some miracle it survived the U-Boat infested waters and despite breaking down eventually limped into Falmouth.

On D-Day my father, an excellent shot, was landed at Arramanches. He was issued with just five bullets for his rifle. Did he ever imagine when he

left Port Isaac School just what was going to happen in his lifetime?

I do not want anyone to be depressed with my reminiscences – just look at our lovely coastline and appreciate our safety and freedom.

On International Day of Peace, St Enodoc Church sent money collected to the White Poppy Peace Pledge.

## Neighbourhood Watch

**S**ummer is now over and at the end of October it will be dark much earlier in the evening. This is the time of year for us all to be good neighbours and watch out for anything that is amiss and to ensure that we look after the elderly residents of the village.

Plus we have mothers with young children who may also be tied to the house if any of their children are ill and the offer to purchase some shopping from the Co-op or even post a letter would be much appreciated by anyone who cannot get out.

We had an incident at the end of September when it was reported by neighbours that they felt a house was not securely protected and the owner was away. The police reacted to this call and all was found to be well.

I have had a couple of reports recently from the Devon & Cornwall Police, one concerning charity collectors – "Recently there have been several reports that people purporting to be collecting for charities have used high pressure and intimidating tactics to gain bank details. These collectors may or may not be official, however, please do not feel pressurised into giving out your bank details."

The second report concerns Cold Callers – "Please be aware that Cold Callers are in your area. These callers will offer to buy items from you, namely antiques and items of military interest such as medals. If such persons call upon you, please exercise caution as they use high pressure and intimidating tactics. It is not advisable for the elderly or vulnerable to engage with these persons."




## also to be known as Bunty's Day

We have been on Radio Cornwall explaining about the best ways of reducing our carbon footprint (switching to green energy see www.cornwall-switch.org or insulation) and the spiritual aspects of environmental responsibility. There are plans on both of these themes.

On the second theme we are hoping to draw together a gathering of the faith communities locally to reflect on environmental matters and to consider how best to respond to the changing world. I have been getting interested in the marine environment and the impact carbon dioxide is having on the oceans – so called 'ocean acidification'. I am going to attend a conference at the marine aquarium in Plymouth called Marine Futures, which will cover renewable energy from the sea and also what to do about the  $CO_2$  in the sea. The sad thing about the dissolved  $CO_2$  is that it makes the ocean more acidic and this will severely affect the plankton on which all the creatures depend for food. The National Lobster Hatchery is working on research on this issue. I have put a page on www.camelareafoe.org on all this. As a fishing community this is important stuff for us.

A message from Father John



## DVD review

I wanted to write to you to comment on the DVD compilation ("Port Isaac and Port Gaverne, thirty years of village life") of 16mm film footage taken in and around Port Isaac and Port Gaverne in the 1930s, 40s and early 50s by Mr Lionel Castle, produced by his grandson Canon Peter Larkin, and presented so handsomely for viewing with such an informative commentary by Peter, George Steer and Ian Honey. I ordered and received a copy and watched it with the greatest of pleasure, loving all that I saw. All those involved in this project from the film maker (a terrific picture of him on the cover), ahead of his time, to the finished DVD product deserve the best of congratulations for making such a record available to the viewing public.

It will have a huge appeal to all who lived in the contemporary Port Isaac on show, or otherwise had relatives who lived there. The great thing about a DVD is that the action can be paused, so it was possible to go virtually frame by frame through the film and spot those who featured in the passing parade as they entered and left the frame. The scenes of the procession of attendees at social events such as Carnival, flora dance and weddings was pure genius in hindsight and it was such a joy to watch so many familiar and well-loved characters, young and old, come up one by one. The result is a record of a way of life which no longer exists and an outstanding achievement that adds greatly to the substance of Port Isaac.

I thought that the sequence on the DVD dealing with shaking out of the herring nets (what a catch!) made a marvellous record, but really all that is on show in the DVD will bring and revive great memories. It was very heartwarming for me to see my Gran Creighton appear in her prime, and a thrill to make acquaintance for the first time ever with my great grandfather Sam Honey. I am sure that others who watch this DVD will have similar experiences with their own close relatives and friends.

One thing that I was very taken to see on the screen was the tank traps on Port Gaverne beach. I wrote about them in connection with a wartime beach picnic in my book "South of Lobber Point" and there they were in the film, exactly as described. The connection with the tank traps in the book involved my burying a marmite sandwich alongside one of them and for all I know, although the tank traps are long gone, that deadly item may still be there!

Port Isaac always seems to turn up the goods!

hat a sudden change in season! Summer feels like a distant memory to me, and the cold, dark mornings and rain are not filling me with the desire to jump out of bed and get out gardening. So I have decided this month to talk about houseplants as there should be next to no 'outdoorness' involved!



Houseplants come in all shapes and sizes and can add enormously to the atmosphere of a room. Most are fairly undemanding and will give you years of lovely foliage or flowers, given just the most basic of care - water, food and light - so here are a few tips.



















Vatering - Providing regular water is vital, but giving them too much can cause the compost to become airless, and plant roots to suffocate and die. 'Over the rim' watering is most usual (slowly dribbling water directly onto the compost). An alternative way is to stand pots in a bowl of water until moisture seeps to the compost's surface. The pot is then removed and the excess water allowed to drain away. In Summer, houseplants need more water than in Winter, though the compost of Winter flowering houseplants must be kept moist. Remember to mist spray the leaves regularly too, to provide the humidity that many houseplants require.

General maintenance - Cut off dead flowers and leaves, and as with outdoor plants, if any shoots appear to be growing disproportionately to the others, pinch them out to keep the plant bushy. Clean the leaves of foliage plants with a cloth wrung out in tepid water. Keep an eye out for any sign of disease, and treat immediately. If you have any variegated plants, ensure they are positioned in good light so their colours are enhanced. Remember to rotate plants about 90 degrees a couple of times a week to prevent leaves turning towards the light. Regular feeding (every couple of weeks) from early Spring to late Summer is best for really healthy growth.

Re-potting - Check the roots of the plant to see if it needs to be re potted in a larger pot (the best sign is roots growing out of the pot's base). Repotting gives the plant more nutrients, and the extra space for roots creates a firmer base for the plant to grow. However, make sure that when you do this you use a pot only slightly larger as too much space for the roots can mean that they become saturated with water and rot. After repotting, place the plant in light shade until you an see new shoots appearing. If a house plant is in a large pot and cannot be repotted, the compost needs to be top dressed - remove the top couple of inches of compost, taking care not to damage the roots, and replace with fresh (best time for this is each Spring).

Positioning - Make sure you read the care label for the plant regarding its positioning because many plants are very sensitive to temperature change, draughts, and inconsistencies of light. If a plant is not thriving, sometimes just a change of position can make all the difference.

In summary, bear in mind the conditions the plant would be living in if it were growing in it's natural environment, and try to recreate that as well as you can in your home. Good luck!

## **Bat Cakes**

makes 10 cakes

100g butter
100g caster sugar
2 eggs
100g self raising flour
2 tbsp cocoa powder





Icing
100g butter
175g Icing sugar
2 tbsp cocoa powder
1 tbsp milk
1 tube of black icing
Edible silver balls

- 1.Pre heat oven to  $180^{\circ}$ . Beat together the butter and sugar until light and fluffy.
- 2. Beat the eggs into the mixture one at a time.
- 3. Sieve the flour and cocoa powder into the bowl and fold in until blended.
- 4.Line a bun tray with paper cases and spoon in until two thirds full.
- 5. Bake for 15-20 mins. Place on a wire rack to cool
- 6. For the icing, beat butter until creamy.
- 7. Sieve the icing sugar and cocoa and gradually beat in the butter together with the milk.
- 8. When the cakes are cooled, cut the tops off and cut into three sections and use the two curved ends to make the wings (keep the middle section)
- 9. Draw a 'V' with black writing icing on the wings. Spread a thick layer of icing on the wings so they can stand up.
- 10. Use the middle section of cake to act as props to hold the wings in place.
- 11. Stick edible silver balls as the bats eyes and dust with icing sugar!



## **Pumpkin Oranges**

These oranges are cut to look like mini-pumpkins and then filled with a selection of cut-up fruits or chopped jelly.

Cut a slice from the stalk end of each orange and hollow out using a sharp knife and teaspoon. Cut out eyes, nose and mouth shapes from the shell and cut a small sliver from the base of the orange so that it stands

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
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
