

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

PARISH COUNCIL WEBSITE

Following an offer from Tony Wainwright to set up and run a Parish Council website the Parish Council have decided to take him up on this offer. Minutes and agenda will be available in the near future online.

NEW CEMETERY

On Friday 5th October a few members of the Parish Council met with St Endellion Parochial Church Council and Ron Bray to discuss the new cemetery. It has been agreed to make a walkway through the wall of the existing graveyard by the bins to the new cemetery. The Parish Council has now submitted plans for change of use so that the field can be used as a cemetery. Slow growing trees are being ordered and will soon be planted around the field.

MAYFIELD CLOSE

The Parish Council has written to North District Council asking them to reinstate the lane behind following a complaint from local residents that the lane is hazardous for elderly people with the base being overgrown and unstable under foot.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS

Application 2007/01715 - Listed Building Consent to replace existing slate roof using existing and additional Delabole rag slate and replace any unsound timber to match existing and replace plastic gutters with cast iron and renew rotten fascia boards to match existing. NCDC advice on Bonfires

(not the Guy Fawkes type!)

Garden bonfires can ruin neighbourly relations.

Garden bonfires produce smoke and smells which can annoy neighbours as well as damaging the environment. Garden trimmings that are still green give off lots of smoke, and materials like plastics and rubber create poisonous chemicals when they are burnt.

Bonfires are definitely **not** the most environmentally friendly way of getting rid of waste. We recommend that you dispose of garden waste in other ways:

- composting householders can get reduced price compost bins from the Recycle Now Home Composting Scheme for further details please call 0845 073 2002
- taking the waste to a civic amenity site
- using our garden waste sacks which we will collect along with your domestic refuse (sacks are on sale at council offices)

What the Law says

There are no bylaws regarding domestic bonfires and there are no specific times of day when bonfires are prohibited, but under the Environmental Protection Act 1990, if someone persistently causes a nuisance through lighting bonfires, the Council can take action to prevent further problems.

If you feel you *must* have a bonfire, follow our advice to minimise the impact on your neighbours and the environment:

- only burn dry material
 - never burn household rubbish or anything containing rubber, plastic, foam or paint
- never add oil or other fuels to a fire
- check the weather conditions
- avoid damp days when the smoke will linger
- avoid warm sunny days when your neighbours are using their gardens or have washing on the line
- try to make sure that smoke does not blow directly into neighbouring properties or onto roads

Commercial premises

Commercial premises have the added responsibility to ensure that smoke from bonfires on their premises isn't dark and that any bonfires are properly contained.

Village Hall facts

1. The improved access is progressing well and, to clear up any misconceptions, the concrete steps are just the foundations on which the slate steps will be laid, so please save judgment until the project has been completed.

2. As with the steps, the unsightly and out of character concrete block walls are for retention of soil back-filled behind them and, by the time you read this, the stone walling facing will be well under way. By building the new walls this way a level garden area will be created to the front of the Hall which will make a lovely location for summer BBQ's and a safe outdoor play area for the playgroup. Once again save judgment until the project has been completed.

3. After much research and discussion with experts, it was found impracticable to create a full disabled access to the Hall. The first option of a ramp to comply with laid down regulations was not possible as there was insufficient room to build the correct gradient on the available space at the Hall. The second option of some form of lift was a bigger minefield than we could ever have imagined. Firstly, apparently, our salty air would rapidly corrode the equipment and, as it would only be used on a few occasions, it would seize up on a regular basis. Also it is a requirement that it is only controlled by a qualified operator and would require regular inspection and maintenance to comply with insurance. The final nail was the cost, which would be in the region of £35,000, which is an awful lot of fund raising. So if you know anybody willing to donate the required money, fund a maintenance contract, train as an operator and be available whenever the equipment is required we would be only to please to talk to them – the steps have been built in such a way as to accommodate a lift if ever feasible.

4. So what have we done to improve the access I hear you ask? We have talked to people with mobility difficulties and designed the new steps with their comments in mind. The combination (once completed) of the lower tread height, the straight run from bottom to top and the positioning of the three handrails will make access much easier for the majority of users of the Hall with mobility problems. The big plus is the positioning of the handrails. There will be a handrail on each side of the new steps with a third one located off-centre, which will enable our less able-bodied users to climb the steps with both hands easily reaching a rail.

5. The new bar is nearing completion and has already been used for several functions. The bar, funded from specific fund raising and totally voluntary labour, is intended to bring the facility up to date with regard to hygiene and licensing regulations. Whilst it takes up marginally more space than the previous bar, it will have little affect on the usable area of the Hall. With the ever increasing use of the Hall for parties, weddings and licensed fundraising activities by other organisations in the area, the new bar will make the Hall even more appealing, which can only increase Hall usage (nobody wants the Hall unused).





6. We plan to continue the on-going Hall improvements next year, once the current works have been completed. A new kitchen, disabled toilets, baby changing area and new side entrance lobby are all planned as funds become available.

Finally, one or two people seem to enjoy criticising the Village Hall, which I find very annoying, especially before projects have been completed. Whilst the Village Hall committee welcomes comments, good or bad, I believe they have the right to be treated with respect as none of the above would happen without them. The committee is made up of a variety of people with one thing in common, they all believe our Village Hall has a great future and work harder and give up more time, voluntarily, than you realise.

Websites of the month

I recently had the opportunity to meet with the people who run all the local libraries in Cornwall and enjoyed a lively discussion with them about how psychological and other sorts of self-help might be available through collaboration between the NHS and the library service. This got me thinking about libraries online, as one of the people at the session asked me if I knew about the Cyber-library. I didn't but do now. You can find it at http://www.plymouth.gov.uk/ homepage/leisureandtourism/libraries/cyberlibrary.htm (or http://tinyurl.com/3d4ud7 perhaps easier to type in).

This website brings together a huge range of information on topics ranging from adult education and ancient history to women's health and world faiths. They haven't got any entries for x,y and z yet, but watch this space. They also have links to online dictionaries like Oxford Reference and the Oxford English Dictionary. They link to partner libraries like the Cornwall library where you will see a newly designed website.

Your local library takes you to details of all the libraries across Cornwall and their opening hours and other details. The Online catalogue tells you what they have on their shelves. CWIC is Community Wide Information Cornwall and is a sort of yellow pages for community groups. Enquire allows you to ask any question you like and get an answer from someone knowledgeable about the topic. Joining online is what it says. The online audio books allows you to download and listen to audio books on your mp3 player. You can book a computer in the local library (you need a library card number and pin code for this). Naxos is an online music library and members of Cornwall library can listen to over 253,000 tracks of all sorts of music.

I think we should all support our local library as they provide a wonderful service .



the final final word on 'secret meetings'

Dear Trio

I'll try to keep this letter short. It's the only one I will write.

I'm not remotely interested in Malcolm Lee's Parish Council dispute with my wife Barbara Bell. The small number of people who were aware of it thought it had been satisfactorily resolved by the Council chairman almost two years ago. The same applies to the obscure issue of Parish Council procedure he mentions in his second 'final' letter to the Trio.

While Malcolm Lee was Vice-Chair of the previous St Endellion Parish Council, he had private email exchanges with a senior NCDC official about the Parish Council's controversial proposal to sell Port Isaac children's playground for a social housing scheme. They contained advice on how to increase the number of dwellings above the level approved by the Parish Council and a reference to discussing the housing scheme at a Trelights council meeting to discourage public attendance by Port Isaac objectors. The emails were disclosed by a Freedom of Information Act search of NCDC records. They were not copied to the Parish Council clerk or other councillors or to a publicly accessible Parish Council file. The Cornish Guardian dubbed them the 'secret emails' after Mr Lee refused to admit to their reporter that he was the

author. I was on the point of making a code of conduct complaint to NCDC when Mr Lee announced he would not be standing for re-election. Mr Lee is no longer a Parish councillor. The Parish Council elected in May 2007, the first in 11 years by a popular vote in the second highest turnout in North Cornwall, decided unanimously to cancel the proposed housing scheme.

These are the facts and I will not engage in further correspondence about them. If Mr Lee disputes them he can do so to NCDC's compliance officer and solicitor Ms Lloyd-Jones. I have advised her that if Mr Lee does not attempt to become a member of the Parish Council I will not waste my time, or hers, with a code of conduct complaint. If Mr Lee feels as strongly about the matter as he now appears to, he should have put his case to the electorate and stood as a candidate in the May election, as my wife and I did.

Sorry for smoking you out

Dear Trio

It was not until I received a deputation from the village, led by John Cleave, that I was aware just how unsociable my bonfire had become this morning (24th Oct)!

Having done a smoke 'test' to ascertain from which direction the wind was blowing (there was very little) and happy that it was heading up the valley, I lit up. Within a few minutes what breeze there was began to eddy around causing the smoke to drift in almost every direction. More surprisingly still, JC informed me that it was bellowing downwards into the Port, causing consternation all around. This was something I absolutely hadn't planned for!

As some of you may be aware, I have for a while now, happily accepted combustible garden waste and timber in the bottom of our paddock off Rose Hill - in exchange for a donation to the RNLI and I try to have a 'burn-up' three to four times a year when we are in the village. So please be assured that it is not just Harbour Heights causing all the smoke but several others contributing over a long period, albeit in a nonparticipatory and proxy manner!!

In future, I shall do my utmost to adhere to NCDC guidelines which are:

- only burn dry material (burning wet material doesn't make much sense)
- never burn household rubbish or anything containing rubber, plastic, foam or paint(I never do by the way)
- never add oil or other fuels to a fire (pity 'cos Trelawney Garage sump oil does marvels!)
- check the weather conditions (lighting a fire in the rain is tricky!)
- avoid damp days when the smoke will linger
- avoid warm sunny days when our neighbours are using their gardens or have washing on the line (but fires light better on warm sunny days!)

I am quite sure that no-one leaves their front door open when their central heating is on. Maybe they do drive their cars on one-minute journeys when they could walk, but perhaps they have to work for a living and time is of the essence, or possibly health reasons. Who knows? Also, have I not passed your open front door Bob and seen RNLI yellow waterproofs and boots inside your hall, probably purchased from funds raised by the RNLI fundraisers in woolly jumpers?

I understand the small number of the RNLI committee that man the Funday had to make a decision at 9.00am on the day whether or not to go ahead or cancel. There were almost gale force winds blowing up from the sea. It was not a decision taken lightly but it had to be made, not least for Health and Safety reasons as all RNLI events now have to have a risk assessment. Sadly, there was just not enough manpower to move everything to another site and also a licence has to be obtained to cover each venue. Therefore, the Funday had to be cancelled. Unfortunately the car park was overlooked and I know that apologies have been made. We all make mistakes especially when under pressure.

I do not think the Christmas Lights team are fed up with hanging up the lights. They have to apply to the County Council for a certificate before they can do so. In order to get the certificate there has to be £5,000,000 public liability insurance in place, a written consent from Western Power to use the poles, an electrical test certificate for each circuit and supply point, the submission of detailed plans showing fixing points and route spans, circuit protector details and isolator points. Obviously because of all this legislation and cost it is simpler to ask householders/businesses if they would display lights outside their own properties.

I think it was not so many years ago, when you too Bob were a second home owner from up-country, but now you have been fortunate enough to retire into your second home in Port Isaac you have conveniently forgotten this.

Finally, as far as the Trio is concerned, I think it is excellent value whatever the cost. Let's be a little more positive about all the lovely active people of the village and not so negative.

Dear Trio

A 3rd October Western Morning News report headlined 'Secret paper reveals hit list of Cornwall primaries', listed 34 primary schools in Cornwall that appeared to be under consideration for closure by Cornwall County Council. Port Isaac Community Primary School was one of them.

The same day Dean Ashton, the County Council's Director responsible for schools, wrote to all Head teachers and Chairs of Governors. He explained that unauthorised comments about whether a school should be closed, of which he had no knowledge, had been placed on the council's internet website and reported by the newspaper. Mr Ashton stated "there is currently no school under review with an intention to close it....May I emphasise that there are no plans to close any of our schools".

The staff and governors of Port Isaac School are dedicated to supporting the school in every way possible and ask you to do the same. Our school plays a central role in the life of Port Isaac, helping to keep it a viable community where families can thrive. We are carrying out improvements to the school buildings and the outside play area. European and Government funding has recently been invested to set up the Happy Days nursery within the school grounds, which is proving very successful and contributing to the current upward trend in the school roll. Our last Ofsted report and recent County Council audit were both very encouraging and we see the future for the school as being very positive. 

hen I heard that one of the hymns sung at the funeral of my very dear friend Wendy Smith was "All Things Bright and Beautiful", I thought how appropriate it was, as you couldn't find four words which described her better than "bright and beautiful", "wise and wonderful".

I worked with Wendy, on and off, for ten years at the Slipway and my abiding memory of her will be how, however busy the job might get, she always seemed to radiate calm and, with her self-deprecating sense of humour, she made even the most stressful times so much easier to put up with. With her around, it was impossible to feel anything other than cheerful. Patient, unflustered and uncomplaining, never happier than when helping someone else, she brightened up the lives of all who knew her. She made the start of a day's work spent in her company something to look forward to.

Anyone who laid eyes on her could see how physically beautiful she was, stunningly but unselfconsciously so, but those who were lucky enough to get to know her and, like myself, were privileged to become her friend, soon discovered that this was simply a

reflection of her inner self. She literally wouldn't hurt a fly and wouldn't do anything to hurt the feelings of even her worst

enemy, if she could help it. She was immensely loyal to her friends and employers, even when they sometimes didn't deserve it.

Although capable of being as daft as anyone (I will always

remember her sending out a cream tea tray that had everything on it except cream and tea), she was wise in the things that really mattered. She knew the pointlessness of bearing grudges and never willingly either gave or took offence. Always ready to

forgive a wrong against herself, she was equally ready to apologise if she thought that she might be at fault or, sometimes, even when she knew she wasn't. She knew it was better to be owed than to owe.

While it is impossible to imagine the intensity of the pain they must be feeling at her loss, Roy and Jenny have every reason to feel an equally intense pride at having been the parents of Wendy, and Oz a similar pride at being the man she chose to spend the rest of her life with. He couldn't have done better and neither could she. She was wonderful in every way and has left me with a thousand happy memories of her.

his year we received our first Christmas card at the beginning of October. No, it wasn't that our friend had got confused about what season it was, but that he was going to Africa for six months. He's the Revd. David Canon Steven, who lives in Wadebridge, and who's been taking services in our cluster of churches during the vacancv.

Canon David, spent many years of his ministry in Africa and has been instrumental in forging the link between our diocese of Truro and the diocese of Umzimvubu- pronounced UM-ZIM-VOO-BOO - part of the old Transkei region of Southern Africa, where he once ministered.

As Chairman of the World Church Committee in Truro, a post from which he retires at Christmas, Canon David has given many Christians in Cornwall an insight into the realities of life in that beautiful, but deprived region of the world, ravaged by HIV/ AIDS and beset by famine and poverty.

Canon David left Cornwall on11th October and will spend the next few months in Truro's link diocese of Umzimvubu. In 2008 he will welcome groups of Christians from churches in Cornwall including one lay person from St. Endellion.

Two years ago, a group led by Bishop Roy Screech, Bishop of St. Germans, visited Umzimvubu and were profoundly changed by that experience. On their return they visited many parishes to share what they had learned and to raise funds to help those in need. Now, many individuals as well as parishes and deaneries, contribute money on a regular basis to initiatives like the Feeding Project , which needs £3,000 each year to feed 150 orphans three times per week. HIV/AIDS has left countless children orphaned.

Children themselves die daily from hunger, disease and poverty, and one horrifying statistic is that in Umzimvubu, one child dies every minute of every hour of every day. Often older children have to assume parental responsibility for their younger brothers and sisters. The Mothers Union there also does amazing work in caring for orphans as some of us in our local churches learned when one member, Phyllis Buso visited Cornwall and spoke to us last year.

Although it might seem that the giving is all on our side, this isn't so, for African Christians have much to teach the Church in Cornwall about the use of resources, about the service and deployment of lay people, and, above all about the fervour with which they gather together to worship, praise and thank God so that their churches are filled to overflowing.

'With God We Can' is the motto of their diocese, and it's not surprising that Bishop Bill has borrowed it for the second part of his People of God initiative in Cornwall, for Christians in Umzimvubu really do live it out in lives alight with faith, hope and joy. Judith Pollinger



St Endellion Climate Friendly Parish Project

Two particular projects have been taking time this month. The first is a big conference at the Eden Project where we had a stall showing what the Parish has been doing. The conference, called *Climate Change: So what can you do about it?*, was funded by the Climate Change Challenge fund and jointly sponsored by Community Energy Plus (who have been giving our project lots of support), the Cornwall Rural Community Council, and Interlink Cornwall (another interesting website here as it links up lots of community groups see http://www.cornwallinterlink.org.uk/). A full report will be in next month's *Trio*, but we expect the conference to be an exciting and stimulating day where we can learn

from others as well as show them what our Parish has been achieving.

The other event is an evening discussion on the way climate change may affect us locally and what the Government is doing about it. We have booked The Edge restaurant for the evening and Dan Rogerson, the MP for North Cornwall, and Andrew Yates, from the Diocese of Cornwall will be there to speak to us. Dan has been a Member of the House of Commons Environment, Food and Rural Affairs Committee since July 2005 and has visited centres and schemes where renewable energy and other climate friendly projects are in operation. Andrew has been a key person in the establishment of the Cornwall Faith Forum, the aim of which is to provide a voice for worshipping faith communities in Cornwall and the people they serve. In addition the Forum promotes understanding and dialogue between faith communities, whilst challenging intolerance and providing a network for local faith representatives and groups.

As readers of this column will know, over the past year the Climate Friendly Parish has been finding out the easiest ways in which we can respond to the problems we face in the future from climate change and rising energy costs and we will have this information available during the evening.

There will be a buffet meal, and drinks will be available at the bar. We hope it will be a lively exchange of views and suggestions for how we plan the next steps for the Parish becoming (even more) climate friendly. Following Cabbage Night in 1902, Truman Trefry felt that he had been targeted. He complained to the police and vowed that, if nothing was done, he would take matters into his own hands. On October 31 1903, Percy Corkum, age 15, was shot on Main Street.


A Medieval night to remember

• **I** love November - I love the colder weather, the Autumn colours and the fact that I don't have to work quite so hard! November is the time for collecting fallen leaves and composting them, pruning back your fast growing plants such as fuchsia and buddleia, trimming hedges and trees and clearing away dead foliage. It is also a really good month for taking root cuttings. A couple of months ago I explained how to take cuttings from the stems of plants - how about tackling a root or two?

Autumn/Winter time is best to work with root cuttings because the plant will be dormant. Many of the plants suitable for this method of propogation are hardy so as long as you keep the cuttings protected from frost in a cold frame or greenhouse, they should be fine without heat. Root cuttings take longer to develop than stem cuttings, but they will have a good chance to develop strong, new roots and should establish quickly next growing season. Try using any of the following plants - Japanese anemones, sea holly, lilac, oriental poppy, phlox, acanthus ("Bear's Breeches"), rhus, hardy geraniums and wisteria - most of which which grow well by the sea.

So what do you do? It's really simple:

1. Find yourself a nice root - you will want one about as thick as a pencil. You can lift a herbaceous plant to gain access to it's roots, but will have to dig out a root from a shrub.

2. Using a sharp knife, take a cutting about 5cm long - make a straight cut at the top and a diagonal one at the bottom, so when you are planting up you will know which end goes in first! Try not to take more than a third in length from a root as this can harm and sometimes kill a plant.

3. Dip the cutting in fungicide, and pop it, pointy side down, into a small pot of compost. Make sure that the top of the cutting is level with the top of the

compost and then sprinkle about half a centimetre more compost or horticultural grit on top, just to cover the cutting - this reduces the risk of rot. You can put several cuttings in a 15cm pot if storage space is tight.

4. Moisten the compost (and keep moist - not wet). Place the cutting in a cold frame or greenhouse.

The cutting should have rooted well by the Spring when you can re-plant into a larger pot. Keep cuttings fed and watered until they are large enough to plant on.

You need to be patient don't rush the little darlings. Top growth will appear before the roots have fully developed, so wait a few more weeks than you want to, to allow the roots to really develop well.

Go on, give it a go. It's quick, easy peasy and it's free!!! Good luck.

Some days all you want is a delicious slice of cake, especially after the clocks go back. There's usually a bit left in the tin going stale and here are some suggestions on how these leftovers can be transformed into the richest of desserts, perhaps a baked pudding or to accompany a hot, sweet sauce.

Rich Fruit Gratin

Serves 6

This is for all the bread and butter pudding lovers who will know that anything that is fruited, from panettone to a Christmas pudding, is winning material.

> 900g rich fruit cake, cut into 1 cm slices 350ml milk 300g whipping cream 100g caster sugar 3tbsp rum or whisky 3 medium eggs Icing sugar for dusting

1. Preheat the oven to 170°c

2. Lay the cake slices in overlapping rows in a rectangular dish.

3. Whisk the milk, cream, sugar and rum or whisky in a jug and strain the mixture over the cake, making sure you coat the whole surface.

4. Place the pudding in the oven and bake for 40-45 mins until the custard has set and the surface is golden brown.

Leave to cool for 15 minutes. Dust with icing sugar before serving.

Honey-fried Fruitcake with Ice cream

Serves 4 A knob of unsalted butter 1 tbsp runny honey 4 slices of fruitcake Vanilla ice cream

Heat the butter with the honey in a frying pan over a medium heat and fry the fruitcake slices for a minute or two either side, turning carefully, until the honey and butter turn into a glossy caramel.

Serve the syrupy pan juices spooned over the cake with a large scoop of ice cream.

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

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
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
