

- ➤ Where should we keep it?



Websites of the month

Farming is one of the key industries in Cornwall and there are some excellent websites for farmers themselves and others to inform non-farmers. A good place to start is the Oxford Farming Conference site http://www.ofc.org.uk/ which takes place annually and had their most recent gathering at the beginning of January this year. You can download 16 of the key presentations at the conference which covered such issues as how farming is both a contributer to carbon dioxide emissisions but also holds one of the keys to absorbing carbon dioxide. It covered subsidies and the common agricultural policy, and how the government sees the role of farming in the future. All up to date information.

On the farming subsidy front you can see who gets what out of the European Union farming budget at http://www.farmsubsidy.org/ . This is run by someone who is keen to have as much openness in the way funding is allocated to agriculture and tells a good story about how so much across Europe is shrouded in mystery. Enormous amounts of money seem to be spent, but tracking down on what is very difficult. One way in which farming may develop, is through what is known as Community Supported Agriculture, CSA. The Soil Association website http://tinyurl.com/ytxyhd has a project to get these going where members of the public, the people who buy the food, are supporters of particularly farms and both buy food from them and help with the way the farm develops. The climate friendly parish group have had a meeting with them and a further meeting is planned for Thursday 21st Feb at 6.00 at the Soil Association in Bodmin. It is not just for organic, any grower can join in.

There is also the move to local food as exemplified by the Cornish Guild of Smallholders www.cgos.co.uk who have been operating the Lostwithiel Farmers Market and will be opening a shop in Liskeard on 14th February. You can also find lots of local food ideas at www.tastecornwall.co.uk .

Of course our local farms have very good websites too. One very interesting one is Carruan Farm http://www.carruan.co.uk/ which has a nice farming calendar which shows what is happening each month and details of how to get to their excellent visitor centre.



A BIG welcome Winter Warmers to our new atching the winter gales out over the harbour, comfort food is still very definitely on the menu.

Home-made soup has got to be the easiest, cheapest and most nutritious food, which ticks all the boxes. Nothing in a tin comes anywhere close.

A pressure cooker is just brilliant, but I know that people panic a bit and imagine it to be some sort of explosive device. You can buy one for around £20 and cook amazing soups in minutes. But if you haven't got one, a good large saucepan is just as good. Mrs Beeton even suggests baking your soups, in which case a casserole dish with lid is fine.

Chicken and Cannellini bean soup

(serves 4)
Inaredients

2 chicken breasts or meat from 4 chicken thighs, diced
Sliced onions (plus any vegetables that you have)
1 tin cannellini beans (or 80z dried soaked, preferably overnight)
Garlic and seasoning

Spoonful mild curry paste
1.5 pints stock (use good quality stock cubes/bouillon)
Half lemon



Method

Chop all vegetables into small chunks - carrots and potatoes can be scrubbed clean and chopped up $\,$

The, the most important bit ...

Fry all the ingredients for at least 10-15 minutes in a little oil and butter - this gives the flavour

Add the stock and lemon, put on the lid (has to be tight fitting) and simmer gently. Or pop it all in the oven and forget about it for at least an hour. If you have a pressure cooker it will take about 10-15 minutes.

Remove the lemon. Then liquidise only part of the soup for thickening (or use a potato masher). Don't pulverise the entire contents or you'll end up with baby food.

Serve with hot crusty bread/hot pitta bread/naan bread.

(another excuse to put off that 'bikini diet' for a few more weeks!)

Try these combinations for different soups

Smoked fish and potato (add milk after cooking for a creamy consistency or coconut milk for a special flavour)

Stilton and broccoli

Broad bean and bacon (use a cheap hock from the butchers), add parsley and splash of cider

Goulash soup (tinned tomatoes and minced beef with paprika pepper)

Homemade tomato (with pesto)

For that extra something, just before serving:

- Add a splash of sherry (cooking, of course - don't waste the good stuff))
- Add a spoonful of sweet chilli dipping sauce
- Stir in a spoonful of cream or greek yoghurt
- Stir in a spoonful of pesto (or coriander pesto) - homemade is even better.
- Add chopped chives or any fresh herbs
- Add a dash of soy sauce or Worcester sauce
- Sprinkle with grated cheese or parmesan croutons (easy to make)
- Sprinkle with crunchy fried onions (bought in a packet) or crunched up tortillas/crisps

In the meantime, Ed has decided to try and do a gardening column for this month! ...

gar-den-ing (gard'ning), n. the art of killing weeds, pests, flowers and vegetables

I think I'm what is decribed as a lazy gardener. I like the end result but do everything to avoid being involved with getting to that stage. So my best advice would be, if you're like, me enlist the help of a 'Busy Lizzy'. Obviously you have to help – make the tea and provide lots of cake and lunch etc – so you don't feel you haven't been involved.

However, there are some nice jobs where you don't get dirty or end up aching all over and planning pots is one of them. I've been doing some research into what you could plant in a pot NOW to look nice NOW and have come up with this:

Find a nice pot and put some bits of old broken plant pot in the bottom, or bits of slate or something like that. Fill with nice compost and then all you have to do is put in a few plants. I have found that it is best to fill the plant with compost once it is in situ otherwise you will have to lug a really heavy pot round your garden.

On to plants, I have it on good authority that Ivy, Cyclamens and Senecio Cineraria (silver leafed Box plant for those who don't know!) will do well at this time of year and withstand a bit of wind and weather. So, off you go to the garden centre to get your plants and whilst there get a bit of advice of any other plants that might be good at the moment.

Cyclamens – don't get the ones that are grown as house plants as they won't be tough enough to live outside in the winter. Ask for a hardy variety and a bright red mini-cyclamen will look lovely next to the ...

Silver-leaved Box plant. Apparently this is very easy to grow and they are easy to raise from seed or cuttings but we are talking dead easy here so just buy a few nice plants. A tip I've read is once they are established in your pot, pinch out the main growing shoots regularly to stop them flowering and to get a nice bushy plant.

Ivy – there's lots of really nice, bright variegated ivy in the garden centres. Don't try and save money by planting a bit of that dark green creepy stuff that grows over everything round the village.

How you plant your newly purchased plants is up to you but I'm going for ivy round the edge, trailing down the side of the pot, with the silver stuff and the cyclamens in the middle.

So, good luck with your pot. I'll update you on mine next month (if it's looking good I might even take a photo) when hopefully we will have a new gardening correspondent.

Tips to bear in mind to keep your newly planted pot in tip-top condition:

Don't let the soil become waterlogged. I'm not sure how to stop this happening with the amount of rain we've been having but am told that a pot with feet helps! At the other end of the scale, don't let your pot become dry and water as necessary.

It would make sense, after spending money on plants, to try and find a bit of a sheltered spot for your pot. For instance, I am definitely not going to put any new pots outside *Secrets* until the summer and less chance of wind. This new pot will go outside my back door in the corner where it won't get any wind, well, not much!

Church & Cake

The second Church & Cake service held in St Peter's Church, Port Isaac on Sunday afternoon, again proved popular with all age groups and especially children.

The theme of the Epiphany service was the welcoming of the Three Kings. Figures of the Three Kings, their camels, a star and other characters, made by Mrs Julian May, were used by the children in re-telling the story of the journey to Bethlehem to find the Baby Jesus. Prebendary John May produced gold, frankincense and myrrh and lit the incense and myrrh so that their perfume filled the church. The service was led by the Revd Judith Pollinger, a prayer was offered by Rosie Collings and Mr Edmund May accompanied the singing on the piano.



Afterwards hot and cold drinks, were served by Mrs Tracey Greenhalgh and Mrs Penny Bolton with delicious cakes, buns, biscuits and mince pies they had made. Mrs Margaret Cann helped the children in activities with worksheets.

The next Church & Cake service at St Peter's is at 4.00pm on Sunday 3rd February – Candlemas or the Feast of the Presentation of Christ in the Temple.

Shrove Tuesday, aka Pancake Day

Shrove Tuesday always falls 47 days before Easter Sunday so the date varies each year between February 3rd and March 9th.

This year it is on Tuesday February 5th.

The day gets its name from the ritual of shriving, when the faithful confessed their sins to the local priest and received forgiveness before Lent. As far back as 1000 AD, "to shrive" meant to hear confessions. (Trivia note: the term survives today in the expression "short shrift" or giving little attention to anyone's explanations or excuses).

Historically, Shrove Tuesday also marked the beginning of the 40-day Lenten fasting period when the faithful were forbidden by the Church to consume meat, butter, eggs or milk. However, if a family had a store of these foods they all would go bad by the time the fast ended on Easter Sunday. The solution was to use up the milk, butter and eggs no later than Shrove Tuesday. And so, with the addition of a little flour, pancakes were made.

The day was often celebrated with games, sports and dancing. Football was played in the streets and the Cornish Nickanan Night (the Monday night preceding Shrove Tuesday) was a time for boys to run riot in the villages; hiding gates, taking off door knockers and making off with anything not locked away!

Today, the Shrove Tuesday pancake tradition lives on throughout Western Europe, the United States, Canada and Australia, but is most associated with us here in the UK where it is simply known as *Pancake Day*.

- In France it's known as Fat Tuesday which kicks off the Mardi Gras festival with wild celebrations just before the austere Lenten season.
- In Sweden, Fat Tuesday translates to Fettisdagen.
- In Lithuania it's Uzgavens.

- In Iceland the day is knows as Sprengidagur which translates as 'Bursting Day'.
- In Poland, traditional celebrations take place on a Thursday a week before Ash Wednesday and so it's Tlusty Czwartek, or Fat Thursday.

The Pancake Bell

Shrove Tuesday used to be a half-day holiday. A church bell, called the 'Shriving Bell', would have been rung signalling the start of the holiday and to call people to church to confess their sins. In other places the church bell was rung at eleven o'clock in the morning, as a reminder to housewives to prepare their pancake batter and so the bell became known as the 'Pancake Bell'. The bell is still rung today in Some villages across England.

Superstition

In the Midlands, the first pancake made was given to the chickens, to ensure their fertility during the year.

Elsewhere it was believed that the first three pancakes cooked were sacred. Hence, they were each marked with a cross before being sprinkled with salt and then set aside to ward off evil.

Enjoy your pancakes!

Food Hygiene Training Course at the Village Hall

Tood Hygiene legislation requires all food handlers to be trained in food hygiene, to enable them to handle food safely. This not only means people who work in food businesses of all sizes such as cafes, restaurants, pubs, hotels, shops, sandwich bars etc but people who prepare or serve food at charity events.

A couple of years ago the Village Hall organised an NCDC training course for its members and other local people to obtain the necessary certification. This certificate has now expired and the Village Hall is planning to run another Food Hygiene Course - CIEH Level 2 Award in Food Safety in Catering - in liaison with Sequel Training. Subject to enough interest this will take place in the Village Hall on two evenings from 5.30pm to 9.00pm, over two consecutive weeks. The cost will be about £40 per person. If you are interested and either you, or a member of your staff would like to attend, please contact Dee on 01208 880905. We need to know numbers before we make the final arrangements.

St Endellion Climate Friendly Parish Project

It has been a quiet time for the project over Christmas and New Year so this is a brief report. We meet again the day that this edition of Trio is on sale (21st January). We will have had two important meetings to discuss, one is the peak oil and agriculture evening at Wadebridge Town Hall, which we have organised with the Duchy College. You can see information about the ideas which will be presented by Rob Hopkins at www.transitiontowns.org . Anthony Gibson, a key figure in the local food movement, and who is the current Communication Director of the National Farmer's Union will also be speaking. We will also be having feedback from the faith group which met at St Peters Church on Sunday 13th which will have discussed climate change and the response faith communities might make to it.

We have also been developing what you might call the natural history side of the project and I described the five parish project in the last column. We are also hoping to collaborate with Marlin on a marine life recording project www.marlin.ac.uk/marine_aliens/detectives.htm which looks very interesting. The general aim is to look out for species that are indicators that the waters around our coast are warming and in more detail:

- to generate usable scientific survey data for a selection of non-native (alien) and climate indicator species;
- to raise awareness of how people can affect the environment including climate change and the introduction of non-native species;
- to get children involved in identification of species, survey techniques and exploration of the natural environment. Exploring adaptation and habitats in marine species;
- to encourage children to become interested in and excited by science.

A new member of the group is linking us up with this programme and we hope to get it going in early Summer, together with the other recording project.

Despite this minor setback, I agreed to go, having absolutely no idea what I was taking on. I saw it as a challenge and an adventure. Just how much of a challenge and adventure I could never have imagined but I'd had enough of London so I was ready to go.

In future issues of Trio I will tell you the stories of our filming in this remote part of the world with absolutely no luxuries. I hope that, by the time I've finished rattling on, you may really think about just how lucky we are and appreciate living in this remarkable part of Cornwall - the climate, the seas and the countryside change every day; different colours, different conditions. Those who work at sea do notice but I'm guessing very few others do, so wrapped up in our own little worlds. Do we really see the wildlife, the raging sea, the sunsets, the calm and serene sea? Do we go out for a walk in the howling wind and driving rain (it really is invigorating!)?

I hope I can open your eyes just a fraction!



The story goes that he left a farewell note for the jailer's daughter, who had become his friend, and signed it "From Your Valentine".

Whatever the real story, by the Middle Ages Valentine was one of the most popular saints in England and France and remains so today, particularly amongst florists and card manufacturers!

A condition in which it is almost impossible to fall in love.

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
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
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
