

# "Angry gavel-slamming Chairman silences dog walkers"

There's not much that would tear me away from a Food Hygiene course, but this month's Parish Council Meeting did. Chairman David Phelps had proposed that the Council apply for a Dog Control Order banning dogs from the whole playing field area, which includes the 'rough field' behind the football pitch. The period of consultation was over and it was time to vote.

There's a lot of us dog owners who, for reasons previously outlined in *Trio*, walk our dogs up there on the aforementioned rough field. Twenty-two families signed up to a list asking the Parish Council to reconsider (and this is by no means exhaustive), and after consultation with our MP Dan Rogerson, and a meeting with Parish Councillor Andy Penny, we believed our presence at the meeting might make a real difference. We are, after all, good folk, responsible dog owners, and this is a *need* for us. **Not** according to David Phelps who believes that there should be no compromise and that dog owners should make their own "alternative arrangements" – "go to Daymer Bay".

There were just five Parish Councillors at the meeting - Mr Phelps, Mr & Mrs Bell, Mr Penny and Mrs Rowe. There were ten dog walkers present (RNLI, Food Hygiene Course, illness, work and weather kept the others away), but nonetheless, a fair cross section of folk. We were given our say during the 'public discussion time'. We made our points of view clear, and asked for help and compromise from our Parish Council. We were thanked for our contributions and waited for their discussion on the matter, ever optimistic.

David Phelps made his position quite clear from the outset. A total ban is the only option and our opinions are irrelvant. A previous dog ban is in existance but the signs had been vandalised. The Parish Council is under no obligation to help dog walkers. Children have a "wonderful time" playing in the grass of the aforementioned rough field (NO THEY DON'T!), and it is cut annually by Mr Dawe and neatly baled, and we can't tell him there is not some dog waste in the grass.

Barbara Bell is also totally opposed to any dogs up there at all, and speaks with her Primary School Governor hat on. She explained that several years ago, it was proposed that the rough field we are fighting to use was let to pony owners for grazing. At that time she saw six letters from children who said they used the field and please don't let it happen. She also mentioned one complaint from a mother about dog waste on the main playing field.

Martin Bell was in favour of the ban, but not without naming an alternative area for dog exercise. He suggested the two green areas either side of Mayfield Road as alternatives, and then withdrew that suggestion when it was pointed out to him that it was right outside the school! He explained that in accordance with a current NCDC ruling, no dogs should be off the lead on Parish land.

Andy Penny (wonderful man) had been to the playing fields and believed that there is enough space there for everyone. He made sensible suggestions about sharing the area, erecting dividing fences and rearranging the layout.



Liz Rowe did not, by her own admission, have a complete understanding of the layout there.

During the Parish Council discussion, the frustration of the audience to certain incorrect remarks was too much for some, who cried out ,only to be silenced by an angry gavel-slamming Chairman. This resulted in some audience members leaving in disgust, disillusioned and disappointed. Those of us who stayed to the end saw the proposal carried, three to two - Dog Control Order to be put in place. Thank you to Mr Penny and Mrs Rowe who did not vote for the ban.

Once Mr Phelps had won, he permitted discussion between Parish Council and audience. The ban will not be put in place till May (not to benefit dog walkers, he emphasised, but because the Clerk is getting married...), and in the meantime, the Parish Council and dog walkers will enter into dialogue about possible alternatives. Better than nothing I suppose, but I am very sad. It's going to be a long old process.

The Parish Council can feel that they have done the right thing by the children - minimalising their chance of illness through contact with dog waste; the field will sit there unused; Port Isaac's streets and beaches will have much more of a doggy presence; and our cars will be used more as we make our "alternative arrangements" - very 'green'.

I would ask the Parish Council that, if this is such a priority to you, please follow the process through properly, don't stop at the easy bit. Clean up our pavements, deal with the persistant wandering dogs and irresponsible dog owners who give the rest of us such bad press and cause these problems for us. And please, provide more dog waste bins - for there will be a lot more doggy street-walking from May. We do understand your viewpoint, but we do not live in a perfect world, and we do all have different views and they are all important. I do appreciate all the hard work you do, and hope that our doggydialogue is productive.

And we all know that field will sit there unused!!!

responsible minority within the village. Apart from the fact that they would never allow their dogs to be loose around a child who may be frightened by the dog, these people are the ones who can be seen, on many occasions, clutching a bag of doggie poo. Having two dogs myself, I am well aware of how offensive dog faeces is and make a deliberate effort to clean up behind my dogs at all times, both in my garden and when I am out.

According to the new Animal Welfare Act, brought out in March 2007, pet owners have a legal responsibility of care to the animals they own. Briefly, this act consists of five specific key facts, one of which is "to allow the animal to express natural behaviour". A grey area maybe until this is looked up on the RSPCA website where it states, under that heading:

#### "Find out how far and how often your dog will need to go for a walk. All dogs need to have timeto run around and stretch their legs ..."

It has apparently been suggested that dogs can do this adequately on the grass verges next to the road and on the beach. Quite frankly, I find the idea of any dog playing happily on the grass verge next to the main road into Port Isaac positively terrifying. If this is not the recipe for a potential disaster and possible fatality, human as well as canine, then I don't know what is.

The beach is an ideal place to exercise my dogs in the winter, but following the torrent of verbal abuse I received several summers ago, I can assure the Parish Council that there is absolutely no way that I am going anywhere near the beach with my dogs when there are other people and families trying to enjoy a day at the seaside.

Therefore, it would appear that from the end of March until sometime in October, my dogs and I are going to be reduced to pounding the pavements of Port Isaac for hours on end, every single day, in order to receive the legally required amount of exercise.

With this in mind, may I respectfully suggest that the Parish Council direct some of their energy towards doing something about the revolting state of the village? It is a truly stomach-churning event to have to walk anywhere in this village, including the cliff path. The playing field is one of the very few areas in Port Isaac that is not liberally decorated with the faeces of dogs belonging to people who are either too lazy to accompany their dogs on their walks or who are unwilling to accept their responsibility towards cleaning up after their pets. Port Isaac is, without a doubt, one of the worst areas for dog mess and it is the actions of these irresponsible owners that have forced our dogs back out onto the pavements where they are not going to be able to receive adequate exercise and playtime. Unfortunately, all dog owners have been tarred with the same brush and the Parish Council seem unable to distinguish our level of care and responsibility from that of the owners who cannot be bothered to pick up a bit of poo.

I am so very disappointed with the very narrow-minded view of the Parish Council over this situation and the fact that they are willing to assume that all dog owners are the same. Any walk around the playing field area would prove to the Parish Council that it is only the responsible dog owners who are using the bottom of the field. If a dog owner does not have enough respect for the village, its inhabitants and even their own reputation to clear up after their dog, why does the Parish Council assume that they would even take the time to go and play with their dog in the field?

The first signs of spring are not heralded by the return of the swallow but by the return of the Port Isaac shellfish to our tables. Just Shellfish opens again for the season, from Easter to the end of October,

selling the best Cornish crab and lobster. Jeremy and Tom Brown bring in the shellfish daily on 'Free spirit II", to be cooked by Liz, Wendy and Kim and sold the same day. Nowhere in the world could you buy fresher crab and lobster, and it's all on our doorstep.

The taste of a simple **crab sandwich** must surely be one of the life's real pleasures. Just a squeeze of lemon juice and a dash of black pepper is all that's needed. Keep it simple. Brown or white bread, although brown is traditionally used. Whatever floats your boat.

A popular Port Isaac dish is 'Crab Rarebit' - Toast topped with crab meat and covered with Davidstow cheddar and popped under the grill.

## Crab cakes with Coriander dip

Crabcakes

4 spring onions (thinly sliced and sautéed in knob of butter)
1 egg and 2 tablespoons sour cream (mixed together)
350 g fresh white crab meat
1 small yellow pepper (finely chopped)
40g fresh white breadcrumbs (for mixing)
160g fresh white breadcrumbs (for coating)
Olive oil for frying

Mix all ingredients together *(leaving the 160g breadcrumbs for frying later).* Shape into 24 small rounds and refrigerate for 30 minutes. Meanwhile.....

### Coriander Dip

clove garlic
 green chilli seeded
 tsp ground cumin
 tsp sugar
 g fresh coriander leaves
 fresh mint
 tblsp lemon juice
 ml coconut cream
 avocado

Mix all ingredients together, adding the avocado last after the other ingredients are already smoothly blended.

Coat the crab cakes in the remaining 160g breadcrumbs. Fry in the oil for 2-3 mins each side until golden brown. Serve with teaspoon of coriander dip.

900g fresh crabmeat 1 Cos lettuce 1 kg cooked Cornish new potatoes or

1 Naan bread, cut into strips and lightly fried on each side using 1 tsp Cornish butter

Fold in the crabmeat into dressing. Tear the Cos lettuce into large pieces and serve with the crab, potatoes or naan bread strips

## Bum Gardening tips!!!!

Nobody seems to want to take on the role of *Trio* gardening writer so we were about to knock the column on the head when, at the Hospice Sale, I came upon this little book called 'Gardening Trade Secrets'. Flicking through I found

some tips that had to be shared with *Trio* readers, so courtesy of Katherine Lapworth, here are just a few gardening hints you will really value ...

- Make your own hanging basket using an old colander with some chains attached.
- Spank your trees to stimulate growth.
- Elder trees protect your house from witches.
- Provided you get permission from the planning department and inform the environmental health officer, you can be buried in your garden (when you're dead, that is!).
- To test if your soil is warm enough for sowing, gardeners of old would remove their trousers and sit on it.

- Sow parsley on Good Friday as the devil is unable to affect it.

Easter is the oldest and one of the most important Christian festivals. It is celebrated to commemorate the resurrection of Jesus Christ and was originally called 'Pascha' from the Jewish festival of Passover. The word Easter came from a pagan Anglo-Saxon festival commemorating Eastrem.

Easter Day is now celebrated (in the words of the Book of Common Prayer) on the first Sunday after the full moon, which happens on or after March 21<sup>st</sup>, the Spring Equinox.

### The Easter Egg

Eggs and Easter seem to have become synonymous with each other, yet the Easter Egg predates the Christian celebration. The association goes back to traditional spring rites. From the earliest times, the egg was a symbol of rebirth. Eggs were often wrapped in gold leaf or, if you were a peasant, colored brightly by boiling them with various plants.

During the Christian period, it was believed that eggs laid on Good Friday and kept for a hundred years, would have their yolks turn to diamond. It was also believed that if Good Friday eggs were cooked on Easter Day they would promote the fertility of the trees and crops and guard against unexpected disaster. Anybody finding two yolks in an Easter egg was very lucky and it was believed that they would become rich.

In medieval times a festival of egg throwing was held in Church, during which the priest would throw a hard-boiled egg to one of the choirboys. It was then tossed from one choirboy to the next and whoever held the egg when the clock struck 12 was the winner and retained the egg.

### The Easter Bunny

The Easter bunny is a symbolic rabbit, which owes its origin to the pre-Christian goddess, Eastre, the mythological goddess of spring and fertility.



"The first of April, some do say, Is set apart for All Fools' Day. But why the people call it so, Nor I, nor they themselves do know. But on this day are people sent On purpose for pure merriment." **Poor Robin's Almanac (1790)** 

In Cornwall, an April Fool is a 'guckaw' or 'gowk', another word for a cuckoo. If a child succeeded in 'taking in' another, he used to shout after him ~ "Fool, fool, the guckaw." If the person resisted the trick, he would say ~ "The gowk and the titlene sit on a tree, You're a gowk as weel as me." A Titlene is a hedge sparrow.

# Dan Rogerson, our local MP, writes ...

ast Wednesday the Westminster village was aswarm with journalists for budget day. It may not have escaped your notice – and it certainly won't in April – that people who earn in the range of £5,645 and £16,505 are set to pay more income tax, when the Chancellor abolishes the 10p basic rate. Tax presently paid at that rate will double to 20p in the pound. The average income


in North Cornwall is around about £16,200 – and that takes account of some the wealthiest people. Half of the employed individuals on in North Cornwall earn less than £12,700. So you can see that this could affect people here very substantially. Someone earning £10,000 could pay another £130 a year in tax, while someone earning £40,000 will pay nearly £500 less! In my view these changes are quite wrong, and we have opposed them from the beginning.

Meanwhile, closer to home, I've had several letters from people concerned about the ban on walking dogs on the playing field. This was a controversial subject when I came to see the Parish Council in January, and I hope that a solution can be found that will suit everyone in the area. Of course, it's right that final decisions on these matters rest with locally elected councillors. In future, I hope to see parishes take on more responsibilities from the new Cornwall Council. All five MPs pressed hard for new elections to the parishes to take place in 2009, when the Cornwall Council itself is elected. If parishes are to take on more responsibilities sooner rather than later, they should all have the sort of democratic mandate that St Endellion enjoys – with well contested elections, and real debate.

While recent storms didn't cause quite so much damage as we'd feared in North Cornwall, I know that Port Gaverne was seriously affected. I understand the County Highways Department are making progress on fixing the road there and I would be most grateful if local people can keep me informed as to how it goes. Residents are

so often my valuable eyes and ears on issues right across the constituency, so I rely on you to keep me posted.

I'm told this is the earliest Easter since 1862. It's certainly divorced Easter from the Easter school holidays! No matter, I hope all *Trio* readers have a very happy Easter, and enjoy the bank holiday break.



# Websites of the Month

We have had some proper stormy weather these last few weeks and the web offers a good deal of useful information. The recent storm on 10<sup>th</sup> March started off as a bit of an anticlimax - with all the media interest I expected some drama. *The Times* described it in this way :

"The storm yesterday was a rare example of a weather "bomb", a tempest that explodes into life at a ferocious rate. The same phenomenon drove the notorious storm of October 1987 that caught forecasters unawares, although this time the storm was well predicted. The engine that drives these storms is the jet stream. This river of wind blows around the world a few miles high, speeding up and slowing down as it heads eastwards. On Sunday a surge in the jet stream burst across the North Atlantic at speeds over 200mph, a kick known as a "jet streak". Those winds helped to draw up air from the core of a depression in the Atlantic and as the air shot upwards it pulled in winds rushing faster over the sea into the centre of the storm. It was rather like winds blowing over a chimneypot, sucking air up the chimney from the fireplace and room below."

However, by the evening things took a more dramatic turn up here in Trewetha and two large trees came down, one pulling down power lines and telephone cables. Port Gaverne also was pretty badly hit and the sea wall and the road have been damaged.

Our northerly Jet Stream is a very fast flowing air current that is formed at the boundary between the warm tropical air and the cold arctic air. The direction it takes has a big impact on our weather and its position relative to the UK determines whether we have floods or violent storms as we have been experiencing. As usual the BBC has a good section on it (http://www.bbc.co.uk/weather/features/understanding/ jetstreams\_uk.shtml ) and you can also read about it on Wikipedia (http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Jet\_stream ) where there is a full account of how it works. It has an important role in aviation as flying with the jet stream significantly reduces travel times, as you have the wind behind you. Its role in our weather systems is likely to be more worrying for us in the future. You can see the location of the jet stream at any one time by looking at metcheck (http://www.metcheck.com/V40/UK/FREE/



jetstream.asp ) an interesting site as it has lots of general information about weather systems. The current view on 12<sup>th</sup> March as I am typing this shows it smack on top of us.

I have been asked how does climate change relate to the Jet Stream and this is a complicated question. It is likely that as the averaged temperature across the planet rises, all our air and sea currents will be changing their patterns, flowing faster or slower, changing direction and so on. So it is with the Jet Stream. Quite how it will change is much harder to determine. The general consensus seems to be that the jet stream is moving northwards as there is more warmer air coming up and less cooler air coming down. However, it wiggles a lot and quite how wiggly it might get is harder to determine. Also there are the so called 'blocking events' in which a big weather system sits over the UK and splits the Jet Stream so it goes North and South of us. If this happens, it changes the weather considerably. You can download a short article about this blocking from here (http://tinyurl.com/ yq9nbh).

I must say being without power and phones overnight and for most of one day is a bit of a wake up call. It did have its very positive aspects – sitting having a candlelit chat with neighbours, reading by candlelight, knowing I couldn't contact anyone by email or phone (actually by leaning out of my upstairs window I can just about get a mobile signal). But it does make you think. If we really are going to have very expensive energy, the sooner we sort out local energy generation for ourselves the better.

# "You shall not be overcome"

can quite understand why some people give up watching the news on television or even listening to it on the radio. So much of what we see and hear is 'bad' news. Reports pour in of acts of terrorism, warfare, starvation and disease and other atrocities from abroad, and of child-abuse, rape, murder and drink and drug -induced violence at home. And added to all these is the threat to our world from global warming.

It's enough to make anyone despair, but thankfully Easter gives us hope. Easter shows us that we live in a world where God has the last word. In Jesus Christ we see God choosing to share our human life - to suffer and to die - that his purpose of love might be clearly seen, and that we might know that this love is stronger than evil, stronger even than death.

One of the writers I turn to when I'm feeling down and the news has been particularly bad, is the medieval mystic, Mother Julian of Norwich. She was writing at a time when the population of this country was being decimated by the Black Death and all around her there was intense fear, suffering and despair. Rather like our own times, the future must have seemed bleak indeed.

Yet, despite all this, her trust in God never wavered. She didn't believe that God would miraculously remove all difficulties and make everything perfect, but she heard him say to her the following words of comfort and assurance - words which were not only for her, but for others also. In her *Revelations of Divine Love* she wrote: "Our Lord spoke these words with utter certainty. 'You will not be overcome.' The words, 'You will not be overcome,' were spoken firmly to give assurance and comfort against all troubles that might come. He did not say, 'You will not be tempest-tossed, you will not be troubled, you will not be distressed.' He said, 'You will not be overcome.'"

May these words strengthen you and may the Risen Christ bless you this Eastertide and always.





## Taking things for granted

So we are stuck on New Island in this little hut with nothing but a chemical loo and a small burner for heating water. But we kind of got used to it and relished that cup of tea when we got back from a hard days filming.

A hard days filming went as follows. Up at whatever hour "The Boss" announced. Dawn for dawn shots, (murder – don't you just hate getting up in the dark), but if this wasn't required, then a more reasonable hour of about 7am and off we went. Our main objective on New Island was to film the largest Rockhopper Penguin colony in the Falkland Islands and the Black Browed Albatross. These two species share the same colony. The poor penguins lay their eggs on the ground, mud and all, but the Albatross build their nests from mud and grass over a number of years so they can be a least three feet tall, which gives them a huge advantage over the poor little 18" high penguins. However, they seem to tolerate each other pretty well, although I often felt the penguins would love to catch a ride on the back of an albatross so that they could fly. Remember, long ago penguins could fly.

We found that filming amongst this chaos was not that straightforward. I for one, with totally no sense of balance (not the drink might I add!) often fell over in the muddy colony. Most times I managed to stop myself being totally covered in mud by hanging onto an albatross nest, only to be bitten by the nesting bird. That or I fell onto a nesting penguin, who would whack me to bits with its very hard flippers. Neither was too pleasant and I suffered bruises, infected bites and a big loss of dignity.

The Falkland Islands as, I'm sure you are aware, are very windy and pretty chilly, and when we had to venture out to film, whatever the weather, we got wet and cold. I suffered from third degree frost bite and neither of us had the medical equipment to deal with our ailments. No surgery up the road or a Boots chemist to go to for medical supplies.

There were some plus points though. Taking into account that we had no fresh food, only tinned rations, we found that we could, at low tide, pick bucket loads of huge mussels off the rocks. Having no wine, we couldn't make a decent sauce, but we still relished the meal. We also found hundreds of mushrooms in a field where once they used to graze cows. Sadly the cows were not there when we were, otherwise we could have had lovely fresh milk instead of that revolting dried stuff.

That's enough for now. Next month I will tell you about living on a really desolate and uninhabited island for two months and just what a test of perseverence and survival it was.

# STEER - a year of achievement

#### STEER - St Endellion Economic Regeneration Group

Projects on hand at the start of the year were:

- 1. Under grounding of the power cables in Port Isaac.
- 2. Beach cleaning.
- 3. Footpath from Port Isaac to Trewetha
- 4. Monitoring of a Park and Ride Scheme if the scheme goes ahead.
- 5. Upgrading the Port Isaac web site. www.portisaac.org.uk

#### Under grounding of the power cables

We started the year with plans and an offer from Western Power of £54,000 plus £9,450 VAT. During the next few months we received an offer from North Cornwall District Council of £50,000 plus the help of one of their officers, James Ortiz. Also we were delighted to hear from the St Endellion Parish Council that they had reserved funds over the next two years totalling £20,000. Finally we made contact with BT at Truro and Plymouth and were quoted some £285,670 to underground their cables, with an initial payment of £3,808.18 to produce a specification.

After recovering from the shock we decided to ask our MP Dan Rogerson if he could help. Dan very quickly arranged a meeting in Port Isaac with the South West Regional Director, Bob Challacombe, who assured us that BT would cooperate and arrange a survey to be carried out by their local engineers. This duly happened and we have now received a revised estimate of £173,00. Unfortunately they were unable to confirm how much they were prepared to contribute to the upgrade until we made an outlay of £1,500 for further investigations. With the help of NDCD this has now been paid and we are waiting to hear the outcome.

James Ortiz has been working hard, not only with BT but also the County Council. James has introduced us to two executives from the County who we hope will be able to take on the task of Project Management, and in particular help us with the Street Lighting which will need to be replaced. The County have already given a very rough estimate of £12,000 to replace the existing lighting, without, unfortunately, saying who would pay. However, a County Council engineer is looking into lighting designs that would be sympathetic to our village environment.

At our last meeting with James from NCDC, and a representative from the County Council, together with Adam Walker from Western Power, Adam said that he hoped to start the project this Autumn. This is ideal as the project has to be agreed before the end of the year if we are to secure the funding from the District Council.

#### **Beach Cleaning**

During the course of this year, the running and operating expenses of the publc toilets at Port Gaverne were transferred from the Friends of the Main, to the recently formed Fishermans Association who raise funds from launching and storage fees. We therefore did not feel it necessary to make a donation. In addition, sand for Port Issac beach was not available so our contributions were not required.

#### Footpath - Port Isaac to Trewetha

This time last year we had received permission from Barry Cleave, the land owner, to use his land to make the footpath. We have had plans drawn up in order to obtain

quotations for the work and to obtain funding. The plans have been forwarded to the land owner and the Parish Council who have sent us a letter of support for the project. We are in the process of arranging meetings with suitable contractors, and the District Council funding advisors.

#### Monitoring of a Park & Ride Scheme

This project did not take place as there was insufficient time to make the necessary arrangements. However, we understand NCDC and the CCC are considering plans to utilise land adjacent to the playing fields to make an additional Car Park which we hope will alleviate the problems of street parking and road congestion in the village.

#### Upgrading the Port Isaac website

After much consultation with various concerns, we have finally decided to utilise new software and change the server. Tony Wainwright has found the new software and is looking for a new server. This will obviously be more expensive than using the facilities from Plymouth University, but hopefully will be more practicable for our needs.

#### The coming year

The under grounding project has taken up so much time we feel it should be divided into three separate sections.

- Under grounding of the power cables, which will go ahead with or without the inclusion of BT Openreach
- 2. Replacement of the street lighting for the Conservation Area
- 3. Removal of as much overhead telephone wiring as possible

Upgrading of the Port Isaac web site.

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

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
