The trouble with resisting temptation is that you may not get another chance! Slugs and Snails



till no takers for a gardening column so we will now forget Chat one! In the meantime, let's talk slugs and snails. guess you've all, like me, been busy planting up your pots and baskets for the summer. Unfortunately, the slugs and snails

in our garden think I've put out all these baby plants just for them to eat. I have also tried some potted hostas - there was a brilliant display on the gardening programme that made me really keen. The problem is, as soon as the smallest bit of green appears above the soil it is munched away! I am therefore on a 'slug and snail mission' and would be grateful for any tips. It seems to be a never-ending problem, and despite however many of the pesky little beggars I get, there are the same number, if not more, back the next night - they must be very prolific breeders! I don't want to use poison because of Spottie and the birds.

Hopefully, for next month's Trio you will have sent in all your tips for slug and snail deterrents and killers that we can all try - that is if we have any plants left by then. In the meantime, here are some of the things I have tried so far - and they might work for you:

- Do not water your plants late in the day so that the soil is damp come nightfall (obviously if it rains you don't stand a chance!). This seems to work quite well.
- Slug Patrol Once it's dark go round with a torch inspecting all your plants and remove, by hand, all the slugs and snails you find (what you do with them then is up to you). This is a very sticky, slimy job but well worth it. The problem is that by the time you go out they may have already dined and after you go indoors another batch seem to materialise!
- Place a shallow container of beer between plants that are particularly tasty to slugs and snails. They seem to love it; they crawl in and drown - cruel, but what a way to go!
- Sharp stones surround your precious plants with sharp not smooth stones and these seem to provide a bit of a deterrent.

I've just got a vision now of lots of twinkling torches as all the gardeners in Port Isaac wander round their gardens in their jimjams in the dead of night!

w far can I go in a day? You arrive at 12.45pm, in time f



(suggestions for Concessionary Fare Card Holders)

n a Sunday you can go a surprising distance from Port Isaac by bus, leaving at 10.05am and returning by 6.51pm. The further you go, however, the shorter time you may have at your destination. The bus to Camelford

connects with one to Tintagel and Boscastle, where another bus takes you on to Bude, arriving at 11.30am. You could stay there for either three or six hours, coming back on the 2.30pm or 5.30pm bus, connecting through to Port Isaac.

If you feel more adventurous on your outward journey, you could immediately go from Bude to Hartland (for a 4 hour 20 minute stop), Clovelly (3³/₄ hours), Bideford (2½ hours) or Barnstaple (hardly worth it for only 1 hour 42 minutes!). It is worth mentioning that it's the 20th Anniversary of the Clovelly Visitor Information Centre, so there may be something special to see there.

In the other direction, Sunday travel possibilities are not so good with a later start and an earlier return. The 10.51am bus to Wadebridge does get you to St Endellion at 10.59am, only just in time for the 11.00am service and you'll have to wait until 12.57pm for a bus back afterwards. The 10.51am does allow you to continue at 12.03pm to Padstow, connecting with a bus along the coast to Newquay, arriving just before 2.00pm. You would need to start back at 3.05pm, which doesn't give you long there and you'd not be home in Port Isaac until 6.05pm. (Ed: Why not get off the bus at the Clock Garage in Rock and walk down to the ferry to Padstow?)

On weekdays, Monday to Saturday, some connections and frequencies are better, others are worse. The 10.05am to Camelford connects with the bus to Tintagel and Boscastle, but you have to wait an hour there if going on to Bude. You have to wait another hour on the return journey (and similarly at other times during the day), which does not give enough time to properly visit Boscastle. However, there is a connection from Camelford towards Launceston, Okehampton and beyond, which

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You arrive at 12.45pm, in time for lunch and start the return journey at 3.15pm. With just the one change in Camelford, you are back in Port Isaac at 5.51pm - how about that?!

Travelling to Wadebridge, at nine minutes to even hours, on weekdays gives good connections towards St Columb, Newquay and Truro (even to Treliske Hospital), but less good ones towards Padstow and Bodmin. Hourly frequencies do make Newquay via Padstow possible and round trips from Wadebridge via Padstow, Newquay and St Columb, or even Newguay and Truro, or vice versa, but those trips are perhaps for bus enthusiasts ...

As always, you have to bear in mind that the last bus to Port Isaac leaves Wadebridge at 5.25pm every day and Camelford at 5.30pm (weekdays) and 6.30pm (Sunday).

Timetables are available from the Tourist Information Office (the octagonal building) on Eddystone Street in Wadebridge. So, why not plan a day out without the car?

Noughty but nice!

S ome days you just fancy a bit of stodgy, naughtiness, a plateful of "Oh what the hell, I'll start that diet tomorrow." So let's make it worth the pain. Nigel Slater can be relied upon to dish up the goodies, comfort food style:

Chocolate Toblerone Sauce

200g dark Toblerone 30g butter 100ml whipping cream

Melt altogether and pour onto anything!

Hot Ice-cream Pudding

(Now we're getting serious! This ticks all the boxes)

150g golden caster sugar500g good quality ice-cream150g sponge fingers or trifle sponges

- Put the sugar in a pan and boil it with just enough water to cover. Allow it to thicken and caramelise, don't stir it.
- Pour it into an oven proof dish. Allow to cool.
- Mash the sponge fingers into the ice-cream, keeping the ice-cream and biscuits both quite chunky.
- Pour over the cooled caramel.
- Pop it into the oven in a large roasting tin half filled with water.
- Bake 180°/Gas 4 for 20-25 mins.

Here's an easy recipe for Strawberry Freezer Jam

that a friend passed on to_me years ago and I've made loads of times, (no cooking required)

2 1/2 lbs strawberries (crushed)

- 4 lb caster sugar
- 4 tblsps lemon juice
- 1 bottle liquid pectin
 - Stir the sugar and lemon juice into the crushed fruit. Leave in a warm place for 1 hour.
 - Add the pectin and stir well.Spoon into small dry freezer
 - Spool into small dry neezer proof containers
 - Cover and leave for 24hours.
 - Seal the containers and freeze.
 - Take out of the freezer and defrost as required. Delicious on warm croissants or spooned over ice-cream or on freshly baked scones etc etc (it smells gorgeous too).

r expectations and experiences later I had my first bath using totally solar-heated water – free of cost, free of CO² emissions! But a

hat we were having solar panels installed on the roof of Garrick was obvious from the scaffolding. The panels were installed in mid-February and we started reading the temperature achieved up there straight away. We were told that we need at least 40°C before the system would begin to work. Through February and most of March, cold winds and lack of sun kept us below the magic figure. When severe gales blew the scaffolding on to the roof we did begin to wonder whether it was all worthwhile ...

We have been drawn into the Climate-Friendly Parish Project Group in 2006, which helped crystallise many of our previously unexpressed ideas on sustainability and the morality and ethics of our rapidly increasing use of irreplaceable resources. We decided in early autumn 2007 to stop using our oil-fired Aga when the contents of its (recently found to be leaking) oil storage tank ran out. A difficult decision as we enjoyed the constant warmth and instant cooking. How long would the oil last? Christmas was a nail-biting and finger-crossing time with up-country family members visiting ... but we got through.

In January 2008 the Aga which, apart from cooking, only provided hot water and heated the kitchen, used the last of its fuel. It was removed soon after. The weather was cold and we had to use a fan heater and the electric cooker, but we hoped eventually to use only sustainable, carbon-neutral fuel. We looked forward to the time when the solar panels would heat our domestic hot water enough to cut drastically the electricity used, the fuel burnt to generate it and the amount of CO² put into the atmosphere.

By late March we had reached the magic figure of 40°C and were 'harvesting' the equivalent of 10 units of electricity (£1.20 worth) during a good day. We still needed an immersion heater, on off-peak power overnight, to provide the rest of our requirements. Unfortunately, the highest (and therefore the most useful) bits of our roof face East South East and West North West, receiving morning and afternoon sun respectively. The afternoon sun is more powerful, so our panels face West North West and are much less effective than if they faced South or event South West.

By late April our capture rate was up to 15 or 16 unit-equivalents on good days and we were still gaining useable heat into the evening, often until 8.00pm. Early in May we felt confident enough to switch off the overnight immersion heater. A day or so

dull day sees the immersion heater ON again overnight; while after a good day it goes back OFF. Let's hope it'll be off most of the summer.

The panels will probably never pay for themselves in hard financial terms but they may put a bit of added value on the house when we (eventually) come to sell it. If they do a little to cut CO² emissions (or at least stop them growing), we think they'll be worth it. When the technology is a little more reliable, we look forward to installing Photo-Voltaic panels on the East South East facing roof and generating our own electricity, even perhaps putting a bit back into the mains ...

Websites of the month Happiness

This month, happiness and sustainable living. I have been researching this topic, partly for my own benefit (good idea to be happy and live sustainably), but also as I am helping to organise a conference which will be held next year by the British Psychological Society, and this is one of its themes.

In recent years there has been a big increase in the study of happiness. In the past it was felt it was too fuzzy to be the object of serious researchers, but due to the

work of some key people it has taken off and now there are international journals, professional bodies and websites too. The chart shows the sort of thing I mean where you get very different scores on happiness surveys and it doesn't go hand in hand with increased consumption.

A good place to start is with Chris Johnstone's website Bristol University's Centre for Public Engagement, who developed the Bristol Happiness Lectures which have established a reputation for being both enjoyable and interesting, and feature



leading speakers on the science of happiness. This year's were on Happiness and Sustainability and they comment that in the last fifty years, material wealth levels have doubled in the UK, yet surveys show people are less happy and levels of depression have soared. Research also suggests that the more materialistic people are, the less happy they tend to be. They ask whether our Western consumer society has taken a wrong turning in promoting increased consumption as a path to happiness. Not only does this generate an unsustainable appetite for resources, the research suggests it may also be making us more miserable. (www.chrisjohnstone.info/happiness_lectures.htm)

Along the same lines the New Economic Foundation (www.neweconomics.org/) publishes a report called the Happy Planet index. In this they have devised a way to work out what criteria you can use to rate different countries on how happy the population is. As they describe it ," the Happy Planet Index (HPI) is a measure of the ecological efficiency with which human well-being is delivered. In an age of climate change, it gives a better picture of the true health and wealth of nations. Using new data this report reveals that Europe is less carbon efficient now than it was 40 years ago at delivering human well-being in terms of relatively happy, long lives to its citizens. The Index explores why some European countries produce well -being at a much higher cost than others. Strikingly, the research reveals that people are just as likely to lead satisfied lives whether their levels of consumption are very low or high. This means there is huge potential to reduce environmentally damaging consumption, and that good lives don't have to cost the earth."

As part of this work they have established The Centre for Wellbeing which aims to enhance individual and collective wellbeing in ways that are environmentally sustainable and socially just. Set-up in 2006, the centre builds on nef's established well-being programme and significantly expands the work in this area. The centre promotes well-being as legitimate and useful objective of policy and gives individuals, communities and organisations the understanding and tools to redefine their wealth in terms of well-being. They believe it is possible to lead long and happy lives that don't cost the earth. The centre advances understanding of well-being by undertaking research and consultancy, measuring well-being and the factors that influence well-being, and by providing the training and tools for others to assess and positively influence well-being. Dan Rogerson, our local MP, writes ..

Post Office Limited's assessors are now in North Cornwall working out where the axe should fall on our local branch network. My extensive tour of Parish Councils has only served to reinforce my conviction that Post Offices often play a vital role at the heart of our communities. The closure programme is unnecessary, divisive and arbitrary. Across the country, many profitable branches will close, while villages are set against each other in their bid to keep the local Post Office open. I will be preparing some campaign materials for those areas affected, so we can campaign hard for the individual branches which face the axe. In the meantime, my colleagues and I have been putting the case in Parliament for a reinvigorated and even an extended Post Office network.

Another battle we face locally is to save local callboxes. I have a list of 54 payphones that BT wants to remove across the North Cornwall constituency (covering the whole District and part of Restormel). They say the phones are no longer profitable and aren't used enough. I went to a special parliamentary briefing on their plans and challenged them to tell me exactly what the cost was of maintaining a payphone; they spoke in broad brush terms about the problems of vandalism and maintenance, but these of course apply mostly to urban centres, not rural hamlets. Even if callboxes are used infrequently, when they are used it's likely to be because the call is important or urgent. A good number of my colleagues from the Scottish Highlands were also at the briefing, and we pressed the point very strongly with BT Executives that rural areas like ours are simultaneously most in need of call boxes and will see most boxes removed.

Since Councils and MPs are charged with responding to BT's plans, it'd be very helpful to know what you think, whether you use your local callbox, and even if you don't use it, whether you think it should stay in your area or not.

Grace Hooper, 1912-2008

Pat and Barbara and families would like to thank all those who have sent messages of sympathy at this sad time and also for the donations to the children's charity NCH in Grace's memory.

Grace was born in 1912 in London. Her parents were both teachers and she vowed that she wouldn't go into teaching too. Instead, she went into the Public Trustee Office, a department of the Civil Service. She also loved travelling and visited among other places Norway, Germany and Switzerland. She stayed in Port Gaverne not realising that several years later she would be actually living next door in Port Isaac.

In 1946 Grace was on holiday at Willersley Castle, a Methodist Guild Holiday in Derbyshire. It just happened that a group had come up from Cornwall on holiday as well. Love blossomed with one of them, Alf, and, before the week was out, he had proposed to Grace. They were married the next year, starting married life in Frome, Somerset and soon moving to Palmers Green in North London.

In 1957, Alf was offered a position with the Co-op back in Cornwall so Alf and Grace moved to Wadebridge and then two years later to Port Isaac where they also ran Rockmount as a Guest House on The Terrace.

Both Grace and Alf were always committed to the Church and the

community around them, working tirelessly not just for Roscarrock Hill Methodist Chapel which they attended, but the Circuit as well. Grace was involved with the Sunday School, playing the piano and taking classes. She ran a slide show every week for the summer visitors in the Sunday School Room, showing the visitors the beauty of Cornwall and raising money for charity at the same time.

Grace played the portable organ for the Open Air Services held on The Platt every Sunday night during the summer. When needed, she also played the organ in the chapel. When a Port Isaac Quartet of lady singers needed a pianist, Grace volunteered and they performed at many chapel venues.

Grace and Alf ran the Circuit Youth Festival for many years, organising all the handicrafts before the day and the many varied musical and elocution performances on the day. They also produced the Circuit Magazine, Grace typing the articles and Alf printing it on a Gestetner machine in the garage. Together they took Meals on Wheels to people often younger than themselves.

Grace with her usual zest for life and abundance of energy decided to start up a Brownie Pack in Port Isaac. Her hard work paid off and many girls, now grown up, can remember working for their varied badges and also their trip to London, being allowed into the grounds of Buckingham Palace. However, Grace couldn't understand why the younger generation couldn't keep up with her as she whizzed them around the city! Grace loved her work with the Brownies and was given special dispensation to carry on leading them, past the official retirement age.

When Gwel Arvor, their lovely bungalow overlooking the sea, became too much to cope with, they moved inland to Sheltered Housing in Camelford. Alf died in 2002 aged 97 years. Grace was no longer able to live alone and just before Easter 2003, she moved to a Methodist Home for the Aged in Hathersage in Derbyshire, not that far from where she and Alf had met all those years ago.

Grace was full of life and laughter and was much loved and respected for her kind and thoughtful ways, always putting herself last and ensuring that those around her had all that they needed first. Her faith in God was reflected in all she undertook.

Our Mum passed away on March 2nd, which was Mothers' Day. Her funeral service and cremation took place in Derbyshire. We are bringing her ashes back home to be buried with Dad's in Delabole.

A Service of Thanksgiving will be held on Saturday November 1st at 2.30pm in Camelford Methodist Church. All those who remember Grace are very welcome to join us then.

Taking things for granted

Living on the Island of Steeple Jason was, to me, a major experience in how to improvise, put up with hardship and become what we would now describe as 'a bit native'.

As I mentioned before (I think), the Falkland Islands are known for their winds. Well, on Steeple Jason, the furthest West island, we experienced some whoppers. One night we thought the shed was going to collapse on top of us. Cindy and I ventured out to attempt to secure our radio aerial. I do wish we had filmed ourselves. Howling wind, in our pyjamas and I was literally picked up by the strength of the wind and thrown against a fence (once to keep the sheep out years ago). But we had no alternative. Without our radio aerial we would have had no communication with the outside world .

Filming was such a delight and so rewarding, albeit very hard work, and when finally the ship, on its third attempt, made it to the island to collect us and all our equipment, we left with heavy hearts and much sadness, knowing we would be unlikely to ever return. However, what an experience, and a major lesson in life - never take anything for granted.

The new unitary council for Cornwall – monthly update

ONECORNVALL A new unified council for Cornwall

On 1 April 2009 a new council for Cornwall will start. On that day Cornwall County Council and the six

existing District and Borough Councils will become one single council for Cornwall. A unified council will save at least £17 million a year. This money can be used to improve services or to keep down council tax rises.

One council will make life easier. A telephone contact centre and website will mean that your enquiries can be dealt with quickly and efficiently. The new council will provide all public services. Here are just some of them:

recycling schools council housing roads libraries street cleaning social care food safety housing benefits town planning refuse collection fostering and adoption business support car parks swimming pools

Will everything move to Truro?

No. Cornwall is a huge county. There is no way that the council could provide services effectively if all staff were in Truro. Although the headquarters are likely to be at County Hall, only a minority of the new council's staff will work there. Most staff will be working from locations all across the county.

How will I contact the new council?

There will be local offices all over Cornwall where you can walk in and get information, advice and guidance. Local offices or one stop shops are planned for 22 towns and you will be able to use any of them no matter where you live or work.

What will you find in the local offices?

- Welcoming, friendly staff
- Free phone line and computer link to all council departments
- A place where you can meet your councillor
- A confidential area for you to talk to someone
- Information on all public services including the police and health

Over time, the facilities in the local offices will be improved to meet the needs of the community they serve.

What if I want to contact them a different way?

If you prefer to contact the council by phone or email, this should be simpler too. There will a co-ordinated range of telephone numbers for the council. The first person you speak to should be able to deal with simple things there and then, but also be able to refer you to specific service experts if necessary.

If your call can't be dealt with right away then it will be logged so that you can track what is happening and who is dealing with your query.

Will the new council make all the decisions in Truro?

No. The new council will set up between16 to 20 Community Networks across Cornwall. The networks, based around the towns and their surrounding parishes will reflect the county's natural communities. They will bring councillors, residents, partners and local organisations together and form the focus for local consultation and devolved decision making.

Will my town or parish council disappear?

No, not at all. In fact town and parish councils will have the opportunity to do even more under the new arrangements. They may be able to deliver some local services themselves by agreement with the new council.

The new council will have a close relationship with town and parish councils and will help them take on more responsibility if they want to. A training package for local councillors and clerks is being set up with the University of Plymouth.

More say for local communities

Through the community networks and by helping town and parish councils develop their roles, the new council will bring decision making closer to local communities.

What about elections?

Elections for the new council will be in May or June 2009.

We do not yet know how many seats there will be on the new council. The Implementation Executive, which is the 24-councillor committee leading this transition, has submitted a proposal for 130 seats but the final decision will be taken by the Boundary Committee for England after further consultations this summer.

Have your say

Make sure you and the people in your household are eligible to vote. The electoral canvass forms will be delivered in August or September.

Perhaps you would even consider becoming a councillor yourself. It is a great way of achieving something for your community. Keep an eye on the One Cornwall website and the local press this coming autumn for more information and guidance about standing for election.
