Apparently Port Isaac doesn't need a Post Office!

t's common knowledge that our Post Office is scheduled to close and be replaced with a mobile service in the main car park on Monday and Tuesday mornings between 9.00am and 12noon and Thursday and Friday afternoons between 2.00pm and 5.00pm.

A lot of people have questioned the logic in having this service in the car park in the summer months. As has been shown over the past few years we have little enough parking for visitors without space being taken by a mobile post office. It is also unlikely that post offices customers will be able to find space to park in the busy periods. Alternative sites suggested include outside the Church Rooms and the Playing Field parking area.

However, nothing is as yet written in stone and there are things that we, as a community, can do to possibly stop the closure but at the very least change the alternative post office arrangements that have been made by people who clearly have no idea about the logistics of our village. Our local MP, Dan Rogerson is campaigning to save Port Isaac Post Office (see his article on page 9). As he says, "Post offices are at the very heart of our local community and we are determined to help local people campaign to keep them open." He strongly urges people to fight against the closure by:



Youth Group update



well known as possible. We are also planning a two or three year project so that the aim of getting people on the buses is achieved over a longer period and are hoping to get a grant to fund Leap Media (they have a couple of websites www.leapmedia.co.uk and http://www.gojute.co.uk/) to help us with publicity. They have worked on other transport projects like the Truro Park and Ride and also the Eden Project. The timetable is printed in this issue of *Trio* on the opposite page and we will continue to have articles about trips which are possible on the buses just to give people ideas about what is possible.

These projects are springing up all over the country as people realise that buying energy is getting more and more expensive and generating your own and selling on what you don't use might be more economical. For individuals this can be very expensive but if communities band together and contribute it can work out very well.

Growing old is the only way to live longer!





Taking things for granted it, but it is a fantastic experience. Once back from a days filming, we were off to

oving on from last month's instalment, Cindy and I headed back to the Falkland Islands for our second year of filming, this time to stay on Carcass Island. On New Island, we had concentrated on the Rockhopper penguins and the Blackbrowed albatross. On Carcass Island our aim was to capture on film the Magellan penguins, found only in the Falklands, who burrow underground to nest.

This time however, we were to live in the lap of luxury. The island was owned by a lovely welcoming couple called Rob and Lorraine McGill, with their two children, along with sheep dogs, sheep, chicken, and cattle. This meant that apart from having to bring in petrol and diesel, loo paper and washing up liquid, they were virtually self-sufficient.

We had arranged with them to stay in 'Valley Cottage' just a few hundred yards up the hill from the main house and we couldn't believe the 'luxury' we would live in for the next nine months. We had proper beds, a loo that flushed and a cooker, plus a beautifully enclosed garden and a vegetable patch for us to cultivate. On our first night we were invited down to the Main House to join the McGills, to be fed till we burst, plus far too much alcohol. Bliss!

We soon learned that the day started with milking the cows; milk for us all, plus the most glorious cream - proper cream. Lorraine also made the most glorious butter from the milk. We made our own bread to go with it. Our first effort of making rolls ended with us bashing them with a hammer because our teeth couldn't get through. However, with practise, we soon made the most fantastic loaves and rolls.

We also learned to shear the sheep. I don't know if any of you have ever done

the shearing shed with Rob, Cindy help-


ing with the shearing and it was my job was to get the shoes off and fold the fleeces. Once folded they are graded and put into sacks and I had to stamp on the fleeces to get as many as possible into a sack. I tell you, my feet have never been softer with all the lanolin from the fleeces.

As well as being a major source of income, the sheep were also the main food for the Islanders. Rob used to give us half a mutton every ten days. Our job was to cut it into joints and eat it as we wanted. Well, you should have seen our first efforts. I think a butcher would have had a fit, as nothing resembled a leg, a shoulder, ribs or chops, but again, with practise we got pretty good at it, and I was proud of my efforts.

We obviously required a vehicle to get around the Carcass Island, so Rob provided us with a fantastic 25-year old landrover that hadn't been used for over 14 years. Cindy, loved all mechanical jobs and I'm fairly practical, so we set about getting it to work. It took us three weeks, and we nicknamed her the Blue Lady, because we painted her dark blue, and I made her a new canvas roof. She never let us down, got us over hills, through bogs, snow and water whilst Rob's far more modern I androver needed a tug from us on numerous occasions! We loved her.

Next month, I will tell you about the very different filming schedule we had on Carcass Island, with all the ups and downs and all the fun and excitement.

Dan fights to keep our Post Office open

The big story this month is clearly the threatened closure of Port Isaac's Post Office. I have been running meetings across the North Cornwall area for people to grill officials about these plans, but I was furious to find that they pulled out of the Wadebridge meeting at the last moment. I intend in the next few weeks of the consultation to summon them back to the area, and would welcome your interest in having another such meeting.

I do not believe claims that an 'outreach' service can be a sufficient replacement for a real Post Office. The proposed mobile offering will only visit for 12 hours a week, where our present office is there for 43.5 hours. That's a very different service, and I know from experience elsewhere in the constituency that these solutions prove inadequate. In Altarnun, for example, we've been round the block with this idea once already. The local Post Office has already closed once and the mobile service that replaced it was fundamentally inadequate. It was inconvenient for local people, because by definition it wasn't permanent, and

when it was there residents had to queue outside in the rain to get in! A proper Post Office was eventually re-opened, but now officials want to repeat their failed experiment and close it down again. Since the closure proposals were published, the Business, Enterprise and Regulatory Reform committee of the House of Commons – which crosses party lines – has confirmed it thinks that 'the funding provided for Outreach services may be inadequate'. They go on, 'If this is the case, Outreach services will fail and network will be diminished.'

I will be making a detailed submission in defence of each of the 24 branches affected in our constituency but I want to do so after I have seen the evidence from people living near each threatened branch. It's vital that we visit a tidal wave of letters on Post Office HQ in objection to these closures, if our fight to save local branches is going to have any chance of success. I'd urge you therefore to write to National Consultation Team, Post Office Limited, FREE-POST CONSULTATION TEAM, or email consultation@postoffice.co.uk

Proceeds for Chapel Funds

PC Malcolm Taylor attended our Parish Council meeting on Monday 14th July. He also bought PCSO Claire Drennan to the meeting. He informed the council that she had been with them for about twelve months but this had been the first time she had been available to come to a meeting. PC Taylor then read out the crime figures for the year. They had recorded a total of just 36 crimes. This compares favourably with last year where for the same period 54 crimes were recorded. That is a reduction in crime of 18 from last year and the breakdown was:-

- Burglaries 5 compared to 8 last vear
- Theft was 9 compared to 23 last year
- Assaults were 7 compared to 2 last year ٠
- Criminal damage was 7 compared to 17 last year.

PC Taylor reported that in the whole of Wadebridge area, reported crime is under target by 19.8%, compared to the force figure of 27.5%. Also, violent crime is under target by 18.4% and burglary by 46.2%.

Flowering plants for Christmas

This might be the last thing you want to think about in August, but come the end of August you need to prepare your Poinsettias and Christmas Cacti



ready for Christmas flowering. (*Ed:* Clearly this advice is not aimed at me because I thought you bought a Poinsettia every Christmas and then threw it away in the New Year when it was dead!)

If you've put them outside for the summer you need to bring them indoors and from mid-September they need 14 hours total darkness a day. You can put the plant in a cupboard or an unlit room or cover it with a black bin bag or black cloth on a frame or even stand a cardboard box over the plant. The plant must then be returned to the light each day and given a minimum of four hours of direct sun, or ten hours of bright light.

The application of plant food this month and again next should help encourage the development of flower buds, then feed your plant every two weeks with a high nitrogen fertilizer once colour has begun to show.

Soul food

Cooking is more than just feeding the body; we often express ourselves through our culinary efforts in the kitchen. We can provide love and caring for those we care about through our simple baking skills.

There is many an excellent cook in Port Isaac and it's my mission to find the secret of their success. My starting point is Janet Chadband who must have baked enough scones over the years to feed the British Army. I asked Janet to tell me her story;

Moving back to Port Isaac with her family as a young girl, her mother stated firmly that she wasn't going to do the cooking. At the time they ran Archer Farm, both as a farm and a guesthouse, and so the culinary finger pointed to the 13 year old Janet. Not only did she milk three cows each morning before school, she also did all of the breakfasts and a milk round. After the milk round Janet and her brother Rob had milky cocoa and yeast cake with clotted cream - "If you've never tasted that, you've never lived"

Amy May and Olive Cann taught her how to cook the traditional Cornish fare of pasties, splits, yeast buns and make her own butter. Everything was cooked on the range, when temperatures were either "hot enough" or not!

Here's a selection of Janet's recipes that most of us have enjoyed at some local event.

Gran May's Fatless Sponge 4 large eggs

8 ozs caster sugar 8 ozs SR flour

Whisk the eggs and sugar together until pale, light and frothy. Gently fold in the sieved flour. Bake in 2 tins at "150° -ish until it's cooked. You can tell by the smell Fill with jam and cream - clotted cream if you're eating it straight away"

A lthough Janet's mother didn't do the cooking ,she did decide to make Ribena one day, unbeknownst to the family. That is until it all exploded in the cupboard under the stairs into a blackcurrant bloodbath.

I asked Janet for her favourite meal and it's a dish named

Layer Pie

Piece of skirt beef, cut thinly across the grain. Potatoes

Roll each slice of beef after dusting with Bisto or cornflour and salt/ pepper. Place in a single layer in a shallow oven-proof dish, barely covered with water. Seal the top with foil and bake slowly until tender. Peel and thinly slice potatoes, boil until nearly cooked. Cover the meat with the potato layer, topping up any lost liquid. Brush top with lard, olive oil or dripping. Return it to the oven until golden brown.

There ought to be a disclaimer for the cooking times and temperatures in these recipes. It's just one of those things that experience brings. Ovens are all different and Janet swears that the electricity is better before 6.30am. We'll have to take Janet's word for that, unless you too get up at the crack of dawn to do your splits!

And to finish, a quote from The Sun 26.07.08

"CORNISH pasty makers are asking the EU to grant protected status to the pastry treat. Cornish Pasty Association members produce 86million pasties — worth £60million — a year." (Ed: It was granted)

Flat Buns

(aka Roll-outs and Ed's favourites)

1 lb butter 1 lb sugar 1lb 14ozs SR flour a little milk for mixing

I asked Janet how many buns this quantity made but she didn't know. My guess is this is where the British Army comes in. If you have fewer mouths to feed, divide the amounts proportionately.

Mix all ingredients to a stiff dough, but be warned, add the milk sparingly. Don't make the mixture too wet.

Roll out approx $\frac{3}{4}$ - 1" thick and cut into rounds with a 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ " cutter.


Brush the buns with an egg/milk wash and place on a floured baking tray.

Oven at about 160° and "bake until cooked". (Roll-outs also freeze well)

B ack in the 'old days' life was not as sedentary as it is today and the calories were needed for work on the farm. To start the day Janet's brother had a whole box (yes, a whole box) of porridge followed by a full cooked breakfast and never put on an ounce.

Tips on feeding garden birds

Tip number one is always put food for the birds off the ground, ideally on a bird table with a rim round the edge to stop the food falling off and ALWAYS clean up any left over crumbs – otherwise you will encourage rats and mice to your garden and ultimately into your house (the NCDC rat man speaks vehemently about people who feed the birds! – you have been warned!).

Although we traditionally feed wild birds with stale bread all it does is fill them up without providing much nutritional value. What birds really like and what is good for them are breakfast cereals, crumbled biscuits and cake.

There's no need to buy expensive wild bird seed, you can make your own at home with pinhead oatmeal and black sunflower seeds. Most birds like this but different seeds attract different birds –

- Millet attracts house sparrows, dunnocks and finches
- Robins and wrens love crushed peanuts
- Whole peanuts and sunflower seeds are loved by tits and greenfinches

This might not work in Port Isaac, but if you live in area where there are woodpeckers, nuthatches and treecreepers, try smearing fat on a tree trunk to attrack them.

Try building homemade feeders out of halved coconuts or hang a small log from a branch, filling the cracks with fatty foods.

Raft building, sailing and kayaking kept everyone busy and even though they capsized, Tomas, Gus and Liam thought the sailing was the best!

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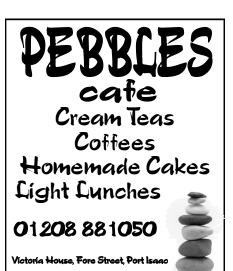
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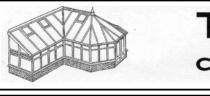
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
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
