

# Dan's Post Office initiative

The good news is that from around October 21<sup>st</sup>, when the Post Office closes, a wide range of services will be available at Dan Brewer's *Deli Kernow*, in the Courtyard at the top of the village.

This is part of the Post Office's Outreach Service that it is offering when a Post Office closes and will be far better for Port Isaac than the initially proposed mobile service. This 'Partner Service' will operate from a separate counter in Dan's shop but he stresses, "there will be no money left on the premises overnight" as all Post Office cash will be collected each day.

Services that will be available include: Post Office Card Account, Postage and Post Office Savings Stamps, Bill and Budget Payment Schemes, Banking Services, Inland letters/packets up to 6kg in weight plus recorded delivery service, International letters/ packets up to 2kg in weight, Special Delivery, E Top-Ups/Paystation. Available on a pre-order basis will be: Car Tax, Postal Orders Travel Money, Travel Money Card and Travel Insurance.

The Post Office counter will be open seven days a week, from 7.00am-5.00pm up to the end of October and then 7.00am-2.00pm from November 1<sup>st</sup> to the end of February.

Dan told *Trio*, "Obviously this new venture will help me during the quieter winter months but I do feel strongly that the village needs a Post Office presence.

Please note that all tickets must be paid for within five days of reservation. If not they will go back on sale – and this year we really mean it!!! Oh no you don't! Oh yes we do!

"My premises are ideally situated for most people and the long opening hours will give villagers flexibility all through the year. Customers will be able to send a letter or a parcel, or use one of the many other Post Office services available, at the same time as buying their morning newspaper (or their monthly *Trio*) or when they call in for Barnecutt's bread or pasties."

He went on to stress, "The success of this service will basically depend on how much it is used and I am on a six-month trial period. The Post Office will not be paying me a salary but I will receive a commission on transactions, so to keep this service in the village it must be used."

## St Endellion Climate Friendly Parish

W e managed to get a grant application in to North Cornwall District Council for the project to improve information about the bus service. We will know on 30<sup>th</sup> September so can plan next steps at our October meeting. The *Western Morning News* had an article about access to buses in the region and car use, which was out on the day of the grant application (see http://tinyurl.com/584gch)

"People in the South West have the worst access to buses, forcing them to travel by car more often than those living anywhere else in the UK, according to figures.

More households in the South West also have regular use of a car than elsewhere, according to figures from the Office for National Statistics (ONS). And in the South West, traffic on major roads has increased more than anywhere apart from Northern Ireland.

The figures show that the average person in the South West travels 7,079 miles a year in a car or other private vehicle. And the most recent figures from the ONS show that 47 per cent of households in the South West have regular use of a car, putting it at least 3 per cent ahead of all other regions in England and on an equal footing with Wales. Traffic on South West roads grew by more than 30 per cent between 1993 and 2006.

However, the South West still comes out almost at the bottom for public transport use, with just 32 per cent of people using it regularly and 69 per cent using public transport infrequently or never."

We thought we could add to the project by having leaflets based on trips people could take by bus from the Villages in the Parish, around Roberts existing articles in *Trio*. We should put these on the website as well as having a link to travel line http://217.171.103.36/nbindex.htm

The Wildlife project still has some work to do to get it going but Malcolm Lee has done some already! He emailed to say "Although not sunny weather, the walk with the children went ahead. We saw only a few insects, and I managed to catch a slow worm alongside the path so they could see one close up. The Razorbill and Guillemot colony at Welshman's Quarry had over a 100 birds on the ledge. I think they all enjoyed the walk." A vote of thanks to Malcolm for this.

You can see Robert Manders is on a video on Youtube (see www.youtube.com/ camelareafoe/) as the Parish was represented at the Friends of the Earth Green Fair earlier in the year.

Ironically, considering the focus of our work is climate change, the Camelford Agricultural show was cancelled due to the stormy weather so we did not have a stall there.

We have decided to hold a public meeting and AGM on Monday 16<sup>th</sup> February at the Village Hall, on Community-Owned Energy generation. We will aim to have speakers who have installed their own generating capacity and also someone from Community Energy Plus to explain about the ways people can invest in such schemes.



**F** ollowing on from last month's 'Traffic' issue of *Trio*, there has been lots of local discussion and suggestions to sort our problems in time for next year - see pages 11 & 18. These plans (not drawn to scale) are one practical solution sent to *Trio* by a local man. Everyone who has seen them think they are a good idea. Surely this is a good starting point for the Parish Council to progress. Let us have your views and suggestions

The benefits of this scheme are:

### <u>Stage One (in no particular order)</u>

- can be done with very little cost
  - can be done quickly
- Could generate a substantial income
- Access would be far better than for the proposed Park'nRide field
- Could be used in other ways out of season, eg car boots etc
- The picnic/play area would be in a much safer and nicer position
  - Would alleviate parking and traffic throughout the village
    - WOULD GENERATE LOCAL EMPLOYMENT
- Weekly/annual permits could be issued for locals and second homeowners for cars and boats
  - Would generate an income for the Parish


### Stage Two - with new mini-roundabout




# An apple a day ...

s we're enjoying a beautiful burst of autumn sunshine, the darker evenings are making us think of creature comforts. There's something about October that makes us reach for the hot puddings with custard that were somehow easier to resist in the summer. A bit of solace as we pack away those summer frocks which never looked quite so good anyway under three sweaters, an anorak and a brolly in August.

## Spiced baked apples

10 oz sultanas 8 fl oz brandy 1 tsp cinnamon ½ tsp allspice 4 oz soft brown sugar 6 med cooking apples



Soak the sultanas in the brandy for as long as possible (in an airtight jar) Core the apples

Mix the sultanas with the other ingredients

Fill the centres with the sugar/ sultana mixture

Place the apples on a baking tray with 1cm water in the bottom of the dish. Bake approx 45 mins 180°C, gas 4

Use the syrup that will have collected in the bottom of the tray to spoon over the top for serving

## Dee's Delightful, Delicious Toffee Apples

10 apples stuck on sticks

1lb Demerara sugar

- 2 oz butter
- 2 tsp vinegar
- 5 fl oz water
- 1 tblsp golden syrup

Heat all the ingredients until the sugar has dissolved. Bring to the boil and then brush the inside of the pan with water just above the level of the mixture

Boil rapidly for 5 mins until temperature reaches 290°F (or when a drop of the syrup sets in a saucer of cold water in 5 minutes) Dip the apples in the syrup and twist them to fully coat them. Set them down on non-stick paper.

If making ahead, wrap them in cellophane. They will keep for up to 5 days. Yummyee! Be warned, these toffee apples have been known to pull out fillings from your teeth - and a dentist's bill of £200!

"Apples originated in the Middle East more than 4000 years ago; fruit and vines have been grown in the UK since the Roman occupation, with specially cultivated apple varieties spreading across Europe to France, arriving in England at around the time of the Norman conquest in 1066. The demise of rural areas and apple growing, commencing in the 13th century with the Black Death, the War of the Roses and repeated droughts, was reversed by Henry VIII who instructed his fruiterer, Richard Harris, to establish the first large scale orchards at Teynham, Kent, scouring the known world for the best varieties.

Old English, recorded in 1204, was the main dessert apple in England well into the 18th century, being grown alongside its culinary counterpart Costard, the salesman for the crop being known as a costermonger."



### Sponge

4 oz SR flour 4 oz butter (or marg) 3 oz sugar (brown or caster) 2 eggs pinch of salt

Mix the ingredients together for the cake mix

In a cake tin, melt a further 2 oz butter and mix in 2 oz soft brown sugar.

Thinly slice 2 Cox's apples and lay them in a pattern over the butter/sugar mix.

Spoon the sponge mixture over the top of the apples.

Bake at 150°C for approx 40 mins.

Allow to cool before you turn the cake out onto a plate... upside down.

Serve warm or cold with clotted cream, custard or ice cream.

And finally ...

## Apple & Almond Tart

(bit of a cheat's recipe)

2 dessert apples 1 packet shortcrust pastry Apricot jam 2 oz marzipan


Roll out the pastry and line a shallow tin. Thinly slice the apples and lay them around the base.

Spoon warmed apricot jam generously over the apples. Grate the marzipan over the top

Bake in a hot oven for about 35 mins (careful not to burn the topping)

Cool before serving (the marzipan and jam create a nice chewy topping)

### PLANNING APPLICATIONS AND NOTICES

Application 2008/01556 Erection of a single storey side extension.

Mr & Mrs C Tabor, 1 Overcliff, Port Isaac. Mr M Bell felt that the design was not in keeping with what was already there and that stainless steel and glass were not in keeping with the conservation area guidelines. Mrs Liz Rowe felt that it was to big in relation to what was already there.

It was proposed by Mr M Bell that the council write to North Cornwall District Council stating:-The Parish Council is not in support of this application in its current form with stainless steel and grass around the patio as stainless steel and glass on roof in breach of conservation area guidance, the council would prefer a pitched roof. This was seconded by Mrs Liz Rowe and carried nem con.

Application 2008/01512 Erection of dormer window, Mr & Mrs Adams, Westaway, Trelights.

The Parish Council made no observations.

**Application 2008/01507** Erection of extension to existing roof slope to cover bay window and replace side porch extension. Mr & Mrs Daly, Cleardaze, New Road, Port Isaac.

The Parish Council made no observations.

**Application 2008/01475** Erection of 2 dormer bungalows. Mr S Ward, 5 Furze Park, Trelights.

Mr W Dawe felt that the Parish Council should not support this application as it would spoil the development.

Mr M Dingle could not see how it was possible to get two properties on the site. Not possible to get 2 in there.

Mr M Bell felt that it would set president, for the other detached house and bungalows in the village to do the same, if the application is approved Furze Park very high in density.

It was proposed by Mr W Dawe that the Parish Council do not support this application as it would set a president for other properties in Furze Park and is over development of the site.

#### **PARKING CONCERNS**

Following on from a meeting with Viv Bidgood Area Surveyor at County Council, the council received a letter relating to Parking on the road, grass cutting, and problems in Fore Street. It was agreed that the council could not do anything about taking over Grass cutting in the village until they heard from Sharon at County Council.

The yellow lines will hopefully be implemented after April 2009. County Cllr's J Rowe and C Brewer have agreed to support the project.

The letter suggested making Fore Street Access for residents only. The letter has been copied to the Harbour Commissioners for there comments.

### CAR PARK

The Parish Council have agreed to submit a Planning Application for the development of a car park on land owned by Mr Barry Cleave, Trewetha Lane, Port Isaac. The reason the Parish Council was submitting the application was so that it would be seen as a community project.

### TRELIGHTS

Following on from concerns raised by Mrs Peggy Haynes at the August and September meeting the Parish Council has now written to County Highways about the overgrown state of Green Lane, Trelights. The council has also written to Environmental health regarding Fly Tipping in Green Lane.

# More traffic options

Perhaps I could venture some ideas for car parking. As I was born down on the corner in Fore Street in the late 1920s and our family was in business there for over 50 years, I think I know a bit about cars going up and down Fore Street. In the 1930s there were only a handful of cars in the village but now it is absolute chaos and something needs to be done.

Traffic lights have been mentioned but would be impossible to work because of tail backs, tides and the volume of visitors in the streets. The only proper answer is to close the beach car park and then 90% of the problem would be gone overnight. Negotiations should begin at once with the Harbour Commissioners for next year. I was Harbour Clerk for a lot of years and closing the beach car park was discussed from time to time. For those locals who wish to use it, permits could be purchased. This would free up Fore Street considerably; locals tend to get out of each others way very quickly. Closing the beach car park to visitors is the only option to what has become a very serious problem.

Regarding Park and Ride. To my mind the proposed site is too close to the village. In a very concentrated area we would have visitors and cars, a playing field, dog walkers, the Doctor's Surgery (the real one!), the school, a proposed footpath and a nasty road bend, all very close together, which would inevitably create its own problems. Perhaps the ever helpful Barry Cleave could be asked if he would be prepared to use his field up near Poltreworgey where there should be no problems. It would be a true Park and Ride only.

As for Doc Martin – from the 1930s various film people have used the village from time to time, and now Port Isaac has landed the big one with the surly Doc. With the very volatile money markets around the world in great turmoil, which will affect all in one way or another, I say Port Isaac should make hay while the sun shines. In twelve months time things could be very different indeed.

### Dan Rogerson, our local MP, writes

s I am sending this to print, the list of those Post Offices definitely shutting in Cornwall was announced. Despite hundreds of submissions to the consultation team, it has been decided that none of these will reverse the fate of some 17 of our local Post Offices and I am just one of the many, many people angered and frustrated by the whole process. In Port Isaac, they are offering an "Outreach Service", although it is not yet clear what form that will take.

I have spent the last week visiting towns and villages all round the North Cornwall area, including Trelights and Port Isaac, to speak to those who don't always have time to make it to my regular surgeries. The one topic that has come up again and again is this issue of rural services being broken down seemingly beyond repair. Something that has emerged as a recurring theme is this sense of how meaningless 'local consultation' actually is and how under this Government, communities are becoming more and more isolated with less and less power to affect what actually happens within and to them.

Also raised repeatedly and an issue I have been battling with since becoming local MP, is the concerns people have over the lack of affordable housing. Speaking to residents in Port Isaac, it is clear that this problem is one that is no nearer to being resolved. Everyday the news is saturated with reports of an economic slowdown - house prices falling and the market stagnating. Yet at the same time, according to figures recently released by the Council of Mortgage Lenders, the numbers of first time buyers is at an all time low and North Cornwall is one of the least affordable areas for housing in the UK.

The Government's attempts to remedy this situation included recently a 'stamp duty holiday', suspending this tax on all homes under the value of £175,000. Most experts on the subject agree this will have little real effect on the housing market. We need more Community Land Trusts to ensure that housing is affordable and earmarked for local people. Councils need to be able to have the power to be much tougher in stating what percentages of new developments are to be affordable and action needs to be taken by this Government to limit the number of second homes in the area, preventing people who have actually grown up and are living in the area from being able to buy their own homes. I certainly will not let this matter drop and it will be something I return



St Kew won overall with 385 Stableford points just in front of Port Isaac with 384.



# St Endellion Golden Jubilee Appeal

Wednesday 30<sup>th</sup> July 2008 marked the opening of the fiftieth St Endellion Summer Music Festival with a concert in St Endellion Church. To achieve that vision in bricks and mortar,, the St Endellion Music Festival Trust, in partnership with the Parochial Church Council, is now appealing for funds. The aim is to:

Convert the Stone Barn to provide sleeping accommodation for young musicians and youth groups

Convert the Old Dairy into a new adaptable space for rehearsals, workshops and recording

Modernise the Church Hall to provide a better kitchen, improved universal access toilets, a Parish Office and storage facilities

Create Bursary Fund to enable young people, who may not be able to afford the cost, to participate in the Festivals and the other events which will be developed within the Arts and Spirituality programme

## 'Sat Nav is the problem'

### Dear Trio

Rereading parish council minutes may suggest I should get out more, but I was glancing at the August ones and noticed Billy Hawkins 'Hell on Earth' remark that received so much media coverage, and his description of a traffic jam in the harbour, including six cars coming down Church Hill. Why? There are two county council road signs at the top of Church Hill near Longcross that state the road is not suitable for access to Port Isaac. Another member of the public said he had seen motorists driving down Fore Street, not stopping and leaving via Church Hill. There may be a simple explanation . Drivers turn on their satnav and switch off their brains! I use a Garmin satnav and if I enter a start at the Longcross Hotel postcode and an end at the Peapod postcode, nice Miss Garmin tells me to go down Church Hill into the harbour, instead of the route I always take via St Endellion Church, the B3314 and 3267, which is the way the internet AOL / Mapquest website directs you. So there you have it. Apparently Cornwall Council highways officials haven't got round to telling the satnav suppliers that they are directing their customers into a 'hell on earth'. CCC has written to the PC suggesting that access to the harbour be restricted to residents and businesses during the holiday season and the PC resolved to support the idea at it's September meeting.

I would like to comment on the question raised in the September *Trio* asking why the parish council field next to the Port Isaac childrens playground can't be used as a seasonal car park for 28 days without obtaining NCDC planning permission. My comments are personal, they don't represent the collective view of the PC. I looked at this soon after my election in May and it isn't that simple. I've been practising as a Chartered Surveyor for 35 years and land tenure and town planning rarely are. Firstly, when the land was conveyed to the PC I understand it had a restrictive covenant attached that precluded commercial use, and a car park that levies charges would be a commercial use. Secondly the government funding for the purchase of the field was for the benefit of the community and I'm already in touch with Sport Cornwall who have offered to help the PC with professional advice on the sport needs of the community and sources of further government grant funding to meet them. At the very least I would hope that we could obtain a full size soccer pitch and modest changing rooms, but they would extend into the second field. Thirdly you may be able to use the second field without planning permission for 28 days but you can't create a vehicular access to Trewetha Lane without CCC consent, and there is nowhere on the PC's frontage where you could do that safely because cars waiting to turn right and enter the field would form a queue on a blind bend. That is why we have been looking at the next field up, which belongs to Barry Cleave. The September meeting of the PC resolved to make a planning application for a car park on the Cleave land and authorised me to prepare it. I hope to meet with NCDC planning officials in the near future and report back to the October PC meeting. At the same time the proposed footpath to Trewetha, which will provide access to the new car park and an amenity area that dog walkers can use, is moving forward. CCC is the footpath authority and their officers are currently preparing tender documents and legal agreements to create this new dedicated footpath.

With regard to the coastal footpath, I'm negotiating, in a personal capacity and on behalf of other house owners with Cornwall County Council who are the body responsible for it's maintenance. I have made some progress and will keep the PC informed at the October meeting. The coastal footpath is not a PC responsibility. The issue of ownership is difficult to say the least but not uncommon in Cornwall. We are also trying to reach agreement with CCC on a surface that doesn't look like an asphalt road that would encourage visitors to drive along it in the hope of parking closer to Doc Martin's surgery. Believe me, they would try.

The yellow lines have not resolved the problem, traffic wardens sometimes came out from Wadebridge in the early afternoons when there was parking available on the beach. Police traffic cars very rarely came into the village due to commitments on the main roads, so enforcement of the No Waiting/Parking regulations were virtually nil.

Looking forward what can be done? Firstly to resolve the problem it is entirely the responsibility of the Highways Department, Cornwall County Council. It may seek the assistance of other parties such as the Harbour Commissioners, and land owners who may have space for parking. Secondly, once the parking and traffic flow problems have been sorted it is again Cornwall County Council's responsibility to enforce the regulations at all times.

# have been found!

**D**ear Trio I've lost my current *Trio*, so cannot remember who raised these points in the last issue, but here's my perspective on some of the comments:

Firstly you will all be greatly relieved that the Parish Council bollards reported missing have been found.

Parking/Traffic problems: The impact of press reports was useful, if distressing. Parking and Traffic are the remit of Cornwall County Council (CCC) and North Cornwall District Council (NCDC). If anybody in CCC or NCDC was still unaware of the problems (as one Councillor claimed) they should have no illusions now. These issues have been regularly raised at Parish Council meetings. One of my first meetings as a Parish Councillor, seven years' ago was in the NCDC car park with an official who outlined a scheme to extend the car park onto the other side of the lower access road. Great we said, at last someone is listening, but we heard nothing after that meeting, even after many reminders. One of our meetings last October was with yet another NCDC official who wished to help the PC (on our suggestion) to form an overflow car park in the second playing field. At last, I thought etc etc. We've heard nothing since.

Coastal path: also the remit of CCC. It has been discussed regularly in the Parish Council over the years and at great length this year (please refer to PC minutes). At last, through my husband's efforts as Parish Council footpath co-ordinator, CCC has accepted (in writing) responsibility for maintaining a footpath width. However, they have asked that vehicle users contribute to the cost. Martin has taken on the task of liaising with house owners who use it and so far some have agreed to contribute, but others feel they cannot, for various reasons. There are also residents whose approved vehicular access is via Fore Street, but who regularly drive along the coastpath instead. Also the main beneficiaries of the coastal path are businesses in the village, so it seem a bit unfair that only seven houses are being asked to cough up. The irony for Martin and I is that we have agreed to contribute towards the cost of improving the path, but as we are deemed to have an interest we cannot vote on the issue in PC meetings!

budget reports. Over the three years' that *Doc Martin* film company has been using the playing field for parking we have received around £12,000. We recently replaced a piece of play equipment costing £8,500: preparing the ground, removing old equipment and other playing field work cost another £1,300. I admit asking for all *Doc Martin* income from parking on the playing fields to be used for improvements to the play area.

The Parish Council takes pride in delivering services whilst keeping the Council Tax parish precept (the cost to individual households) down. PC members voted last year to contribute £20,000 towards the undergrounding of electricity cables in the old village and to increase the precept by only £2,000 per year over the next four years. It's easy to be dismissive of these relatively low figures, but some of us have to watch our budgets and increasing the precept to pay for facilities and services which do not benefit the whole parish would rightly bring complaints from many parishioners.

I have taken Dee's comments on the PC meeting reports to *Trio* on board. The clerk currently has to decide what to include, which I feel is an unfair burden on her. My proposal for the next agenda on 13<sup>th</sup> October is: ' PC members to agree at <u>the meeting</u> which items to include in the *Trio* report'. We may not be able to give details of the discussion or decision as minutes have to be approved at the following meeting. But as Dee said "It may inspire those interested to read the full Parish Council minutes".

Finally I am disappointed that in spite of advertisements in *Trio*, the *Cornish Guardian* and on PC notice boards we could not rouse ten people to write to the NCDC electoral office to request an election for two replacement PC members. I was verbally abused by one person who thought it was my responsibility to personally inform him when to write in (even though I was away at that time)! I pointed out that one notice was on the other side of his boundary wall, but was told to stuff myself. Being a Parish Councillor makes me feel so appreciated and gives me a lovely warm fuzzy feeling. Come and join us sometime: you can't hide behind anonymity, often get misquoted (or misinter-preted) but the craic can be good and it sure beats Corrie on a wet Monday night.



he term Halloween comes from All-hallow-even or All Hallows' Eve the evening before All Hallows' Day or All Saints' Day. Celebrated on October 31<sup>st</sup>, it is widely assumed to be an American festival but it actually originates from an ancient Celtic pagan celebration known as Samhain. The festival of Samhain is a celebration of the end of the harvest season in Gaelic culture, and is sometimes regarded as the "Celtic New Year". Irish and Scottish immigrants carried Halloween festivities to America in the 19<sup>th</sup> century.

The ancient Celts believed that during this time the gap between this world and the afterlife was at its smallest, enabling the ghosts of the dead to mingle with the living. Bonfires were lit to honour those that had departed and help them on their journey to the next world as well as bringing the living good fortune for the year ahead. Costumes and masks were worn at the festivals in an attempt to mimic the evil spirits or placate them.

In old Norse religion, sacrifices were made to the elves and food was blessed and stored for winter.

The carved pumpkin, lit by a candle inside, is one of Halloween's most prominent symbols and is commonly called a jack-o'-lantern. Originating in Europe, these lanterns were first carved from a turnip or rutabaga. Believing that the head was the most powerful part of the body containing the spirit and the knowledge, the Celts used the "head" of the vegetable to frighten off any superstitions. The name jack-o'-lantern can be traced back to the Irish legend of Stingy Jack, a greedy, gambling, harddrinking old farmer. He tricked the devil into climbing a tree and trapped him by carving a cross into the tree trunk. In revenge, the devil placed a curse on Jack, condemning him to forever wander the earth at night with the only light he had: a candle inside of a hollowed turnip.

In England there was a tradition of eating 'soul cakes' - flat round or oval cakes flavoured with saffron, mixed spices, and currants - as well as apple tarts – on Halloween. They often contained coins, rings and other items with symbolic meanings and were left out overnight for wandering spirits and fairies.

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## One Cornwall update

### **Chief Executive**

The new Chief Executive of Cornwall Council is Kevin Lavery who comes with extensive experience at top level in the public and private sector.

### Putting the customer first

From 1 April it will be much easier and more convenient to contact and do business with the council. There will be a single main telephone number supported by some themed numbers. The Council will use the new public service "0300" numbers which are cheaper to use even if phoning from a mobile.

Telephone contact centres, staffed by trained customer services advisers, will operate from 8 am to 8 pm on weekdays and from 9 am to 12noon on Saturdays. Within three years most enquiries will be dealt with by the first person callers speak to.

A new website will encourage more residents to do business on line with the council - whether reporting a problem, paying a bill, renewing a library book or finding out about local events. Users will be able to personalise their home page and sign up for email alerts on the thingsthat interest them.

For those who prefer the personal touch, friendly council staff will beavailable in one stop shops and other locations across Cornwall including a mobile out and about service operating in some rural areas.

### Payment methods

Cornwall Council will drive down costs by securing lowerrates with credit card and payment agencies. Residents will be able to pay in a variety of ways including credit and debit cards, automated telephone payments, online transactions, and payment kiosks in one stop shops. The new council will also accept cash payments but will encourage people to use post offices for this (*Ed: If there are any left!*)

### Better deal on rate relief for local clubs and charities

A new single policy on rate relief under Cornwall Council will make more charities and clubs across Cornwall eligible for financial assistance. Previously there were different systems operating in the six districts of Cornwall; from April next year the new criteria will apply. This is a real investment in Cornwall's local communities.

### Planning

In September the Implementation Executive agreed how the planning service will operate including things like delegation, enforcement, public speaking at meetings, advertisement of planning applications and how local members will be notified of applications in their community network. In the new council there will be one strategic planning committee with three area planning sub committees (East, Central and West).

## Active Partnering with town and parish councils

One of the key features of Cornwall Council will be the way in which it works with parish and town councillors. The "active partnering" model agreed by the Implementation Executive sets out the different ways in which parish and town councils can work with the new council. These include monitoring service performance, setting local priorities, negotiating contracts, delivering services in partnership or taking full responsibility for delivering some local services. This way of working will be supported by a training programme for town and parish councillors and clerks. This builds upon the aim of the new council for Cornwall to give a stronger voice for local communities.

### Free swimming for the over 60s

Cornwall Council will take advantage of a government-funded scheme to give free swimming for the over 60s for two years starting April 1 2009. In early October, the Implementation Executive will give careful consideration to the cost and other implications of offering a similar scheme to the under 16s. It will not be a simple decision as councils are not permitted to restrict this to local residents which, in a tourist area like Cornwall, could mean a considerable loss of income for leisure centres.

### **Electoral Review**

It is virtually certain that the Boundary Review will not be completed in time f or implementation in May or June. In practical terms, therefore, it seems that the only way the new council could start with123 councillors is if the elections are delayed till the autumn. This would require a statutory order from the Secretary of State.

Although this is not an ideal solution, there was strong agreement amongst members of the Implementation Executive in September that if it is not possible to have elections for 123 councillors in May or June, it would be better to postpone elections for a short time than to start the new council with only 82 members. The Chair of the IE will be writing to all councils to urge them to give cross-party and cross-Cornwall support for this position.

To continue from my last article, if any of you read it, you will know that Cindy Buxton and I are currently on Carcass Island, way out on the West of the Falkland Islands; an island run by the McGill family. We lived in a cottage up the hill from the harbour, with a garden, vegetable plot and all mod cons. Well not quite all, no washing machine but we did have a loo that flushed and a calor gas cooker. We even had electricity, from the generator, until about 10.00pm at night. Then it was over to romantic candlelight; a bit wasted on us, as there were no handsome men around, except Rob who was happily married!

We also inherited a pet heron that had been hanging around the homestead for years. Basically he was bone-idle and couldn't be bothered to find food for himself, so relied on us to supply him with mutton. When he was hungry he would appear on the corrugated roof, stamp about and then slide down making such a din. Our cue to go out to the bird table to feed him, or even by hand if he was in the mood. I do remember cutting up some meat for him with a very sharp knife and managing to slice my finger to the bone instead. Of course, there was no way I could go up to the surgery, or in our case fly into Stanley to the hospital. As a result, I continued my job of taking photos wearing a huge bandage. I now have a finger that doesn't work properly.

Filming continued to be a challenge, albeit a lot easier than the previous year, because this time we had an old Landover to get about it. We did however have to contend with the Falklands ever changing climate. Rain, wind, hot sunny days, and always the ever-present wind. On numerous occasions we got stuck in the mud and the peaty bogs. No kind man from the local garage to come to our rescue. Instead, it was a matter of

## Bananas

Cindy was keen to do a first in filming. This involved filming the Magellan penguins, (known as the Jackass penguins in the Falklands) because their call resembles a donkey, in particular following the progress of laying their eggs and the hatching all underground in their burrows. Not too hard we thought! So we built a hide cut into the side of the burrow, and very slowly introduced lights in order for them to get used to our presence and eventually we had enough light to film by. All great, except that after six hours down in the heat and the smell of the hide, we were overcome by the smell of their droppings and covered, literally, with fleas. Such fun. Thankfully we had a bath in our little cottage so in we went, clothes and all, and came out squeaky clean and I stopped itching all over.

Filming on Carcass Island was sheer delight. We filmed very rare birds of prey, only found in the Falklands, the penguins, the seals and many varieties of ducks, geese and seagulls (a lot prettier than ours here in Port Isaac); but above all, we loved the simple, peaceful, uncomplicated way of life. You worked for everything and therefore appreciated things so much more. We took nothing for granted, and I still miss that simplicity.

## Websites of the month

This month, all things Wiki; no not a new religion, but the remarkable way in which the internet has allowed an enormous number of people to contribute to online information, the largest being an encyclopaedia - Wikipaedia.

The first ever wiki site was created for the Portland Pattern Repository in 1995. That site now hosts tens of thousands of pages. It is an online database that allows multiple users to edit and change the web pages, but in a systematic way which allows for others to check and double check. While people initially thought the information would be unreliable, it has turned out that the checks and balances built into the system have resulted in a remarkably authoritative source of information, rivalling the big boys like Encyclopaedia Britannica. The articles are written completely voluntarily and all the work is done on an unpaid basis.

Locally we have a wiki called WikiProject Cornwall (http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/ Wikipedia:WikiProject\_Cornwall). This currently has over 40 contributors. These include 'Teapot George' who describes himself as "born in 1954 in Northampton, I escaped to Devon in 1975 and now live in St Mabyn Cornwall. I keep hens, make teapots and websites". He has started over 20 articles. These range from an article about St Mabyn Primary School to the The Sparta Teapot Museum in the United States.

As you can see the Wiki format caters for the specific interests of the contributers. Each user has a talk and contributer page. The talk page is place where you can have a discussion with, in this case 'Teapot George'. Recently he has been discussing pottery wiki's.

There is also reference to a thing called a suggestbot, which is an automated piece of software that trawls the net to find articles like the ones you have written which you might like to have a go at editing. These include Stubs (incomplete articles) to ones that need merging, ones that need expanding or correcting. It says that the Wiki Project for Cornwall covers articles relating to Cornwall, which as one of the six historic Celtic nations, has a distinct culture and identity than that of England. Cornwall has its own flag, language, patron saint and anthem. There is a movement for greater autonomy in the county. The Duchy of Cornwall is one of two royal duchies in England, along with the Duchy of Lancaster. Iconic Cornish images include pasties, surfing, tin mines, and clotted cream. WikiProject Cornwall hopes to improve the standard of all related articles to introduce Cornwall's unique culture to the wider Wikipedia audience, and to educate and inform the world about all things Cornish. The Cornish Portal (http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Portal:Cornwall ) brings all the information on the Wiki about Cornwall together in one place.

To find out what other wikis there are there is a wiki of wikis! Called Media Wiki (http:// www.wikiindex.org/Category:MediaWiki ) which includes hundreds and hundreds of wikis. Why not join up yourself. All you do is create an account and off you go.
