Christmas Lights



We're going underground

e are pleased to say that Western Power Distribution will start to underground the Power Cables in Port Isaac willage beginning on January 12th 2009.

This has been made possible by help and funding from Western Power, NCDC and our St Endellion Parish Council. The trenching will be carried out by RBS (not the Royal Bank of Scotland). RBS Groundworking Ltd will work in conjunction with WPD (Western Power Distribution) who will be responsible for the laying and connecting the cables to the individual properties.

The village has been divided into four areas - Church Hill, Roscarrock Hill, Middle Street and Dolphin Street, including the lower part of Rose Hill. We anticipate each section taking two weeks to complete. Where the surface is already damaged we are working with the County Council to have the full width of the path resurfaced.

By starting in January we anticipate completion before Easter. There will be a break for half term, February 16th to 20th. However the schedule could change should any unforeseen circumstances arise.

As mentioned previously, we have been unable to enlist the help of British Telecom as they are still asking for £100,000 to cover the cost of putting their wires underground in our trenches. Unfortunately this means that a large number of poles that support BT wires will have to stay in place. However if a pole is on private land, and there are many, the land owner can ask for the pole to be removed by cancelling their wayleave should one exist. We would be happy to supply a sample letter setting out the request should any one wish to do so. Where poles are left because they are supporting BT cables, WPD will cut the pole above the point where the BT wires are joined in order to make them less obtrusive.

Many of the poles with BT wires also carry street lights and these we were hoping to replace with more sympathetic designs. However, due to the shortage of money, we thought that the funds we have would be better spent on undergrounding as many power cables in the village as this will be our one and only chance to do so. Where street lights are removed they will be replaced by lanterns similar to those that have been recently replaced in Fore Street.

We are sorry that for some residents and business concerns there will be some disruption for a few days due to road closures, but hope this will be kept to a minimum. However we feel this is a small price to pay for getting rid of those unsightly and dangerous power cables, making the village a safer and more pleasant place in which to live.

We are concerned by the large number of properties that will be empty during this time. Notices will be sent to all affected properties. If your property is one of these please inform WPD (address will be as per their notification) or STEER (address at the

Things you never knew your mobile phone could do

D id you know that your mobile phone can actually be a life saver or an emergency tool for survival? Check this out.

Emergency

The worldwide mobile emergency number is 112. If you find yourself out of the coverage area for your phone network and there is an emergency, dial 112 and your mobile will search any existing network to establish the emergency number for you. This can also be dialled if the keypad is locked.

Locked you keys in the car?

Does your car have remove keyless entry? Here's what to do if you lock your keys in the car and your spare set are at home. Call someone at home on their mobile from your mobile. Hold your phone from about a foot from your car door and have the person at your home press the unlock button, holding it near to their mobile. Your car will unlock! This saves someone having to drive your spare keys to you. Distance is no object. You could be hundreds of miles away and if you can reach someone who has the other 'remote' for your car, you can unlock the doors (or the boot).

Hidden Battery Power

If your mobile battery is very low – to activate, press the keys *3370# Your mobile will restart with this reserve and will show a 50% increase in battery. This reserve will get charged when you charge your mobile next time.

How to disable a stolen mobile phone?

To check your mobile phone's serial number, key in the following digits on your phone:

0 6 # (star-hash-zero-six-hash)

A 15-digit code will appear on the screen. This number is unique to your handset. Write it down and keep it somewhere safe. If your phone gets stolen, you can phone your service provider and give them this code. They will then be able to block your handset so even if the thief changes the SIM card, your phone will be totally useless. You probably won't get your phone back but at least you know that the thief can't use /sell it either. If everybody does this there would be no point in stealing mobile phones.

Dan Rogerson, our local MP, writes

his has been a pretty busy month all round. Rogerson number five has been the big news in my household as my wife, Heidi, gave birth to our third child, Elowen Ruby Rose. She was born on 19th November weighing 6lb 9oz. Big brothers Jago and Mawgan are very proud! Heidi was exhausted and there've been numerous sleepless nights for us all, but normal service in Parliament resumes today, as I write this article.

In Westminster, many MPs are obsessing over the arcane concept of 'parliamentary privilege' following the raid of a Conservative MP's office. To anyone looking in from outside, I suspect that the House of Commons has done itself no favours since the debates have really looked like a lot of politicians telling everyone how important they are. In principle, there seems to be no reason that an MP's office cannot be searched as part of a criminal investigation. The real issue is what the crime was. In my view it's quite wrong that anyone - MP or not - can be arrested just for knowing something and telling someone. What if the civil servant from whom the MP received leaks had gone straight to a journalist? Would they have had their homes and offices searched too? And, if they had, what then for our free press? My fear is that Parliament in asserting its own importance has missed out on the fundamental point which is one of freedom of speech for everyone, not just for MPs.

Back in Cornwall, it has been extremely frustrating month for everyone involved in the conversion of RAF St Mawgan from a military airfield to a civilian airport. This is a project that required unprecedented ambition on the part of Cornwall County Council, and the airport's managers. Conversions of this kind would usually require a closure for three years or so, but hard work by Paul Tyler before I was elected and continued pressure from me and others afterwards, convinced the MoD to support the airport while work went on. Airlines that are threatening to pull out of the airport know perfectly well that there is only a good business opportunity there for them, because of the work that has been done. The people who have really suffered are the passengers. Protestations as to the scale and ambition of the project are cold comfort to those who have been inconvenienced. The problems which were identified at the end of November should have been picked up months ago to give people prior warning if a closure was necessary. I am glad, therefore, that senior councillors have agreed to a full investigation into what went wrong once the airport is open again. People rightly want to know who is responsible, and see them held accountable.

Next year will be a difficult one for Britain's economy, since it seems we haven't seen the worst of the downturn yet. We can see and feel it here in Cornwall, with local firms

One Cornwall update Electoral Review - The Boundary Committee for England has accepted

in principle that there should be 123

members of Cornwall Council. The next step is for the Boundary Committee to publish a draft detailed electoral scheme for Cornwall and consult on these proposals. The scheme will say which parishes will be in which electoral divisions. We are expecting this scheme on 2nd December. Consultation will finish on 9th February. The Department for Communities and Local Government is exploring the possibility of moving back the election date from June to autumn but no decision has been made.

Town and parish council elections - The Government has said that these elections will now take place in 2013 (except for the parishes being created in St Austell. Their elections will either be in June 2009 or will be held at the same time as the unitary council election.

The Parish Council is not in support of this application as it is over development of the site and there are concerns that it was used as a petrol filling station previously and there maybe some contaminations and feel that the case officer should make enquiries in to what happened to the tanks. 

- (6) <u>That's Okay</u>: This is one of the most dangerous statements a women can make to a man. That's okay means she wants to think long and hard before deciding how and when you will pay for your mistake.
- (7) <u>Thanks</u>: A woman is thanking you, do not question, or faint. Just say you're welcome. However, 'Thanks a lot' is not thanking you at all. DO NOT say 'you're welcome' that will bring on a 'that's ok').
- (8) <u>Don't worry about it, I'll do it</u>: Another dangerous statement, meaning this is something that a woman has told a man to do several times, but is now doing it herself. This will later result in a man asking 'What's wrong?' For the woman's response refer to # 3.

I asked what plans were in hand to alleviate the parking problems that would ensue and also questioned whether, in twelve months time, everyone would still be just discussing options for additional parking. The Chairman said he was unable to give any positive assurance that there would be any progress to relieve the problem for the summer of 2009.

Christmas Poinsettia



A very popular Christmas plant, the Poinsettia comes from Mexico and its name means "Flower of the Holy Night".

Whilst they look lovely when we buy them, after a few weeks the leaves often drop and the plant turns yellow. This is most likely because of the reduced light levels in this country and these tips will help keep your plant in good condition and live on to bloom again next Christmas. One of the most important things to remember is be very careful when handling your plant as the sap can cause irritation – gloves and long sleeves are advised.

- Do not let the temperature drop below 13C/55F.
- Place in a well lit location.
- Water thoroughly but let the compost become quite dry before you water again – overwatering is the most common cause of failure in poinsettia.

To make the plant bloom again for next Christmas, in early spring cut back the stems to 10cm/4". Keep the compost almost dry and place in a cool, shady position. In early May water and repot the plant and shoots will then soon appear. Remove some of these new shoots leaving 4-5 stems (you can use the prunings as cuttings). In September cover the plant with a black bin bag from early evening until the next morning so that the plant is in complete darkness for 14 hours a day. Continue this routine for eight weeks then treat as normal and your plant should flower for Christmas 2009.



Websites of the month

If you live in the Parish, you will by now have received one of the handcrafted origami Christmas greeting cards from the Climate Friendly Parish. This got me thinking about origami and other similar crafts on the web and there is a lot on offer.

Before I had a look at these sites, I thought that Origami was the Japanese art of paperfolding. But things are never simple are they? It turns out that Oru means to fold and Kami means paper, but paper folding was not originally called origami, and that folding of all sorts of other things are part of the 'craft'. Apparently the original use of origami referred to the way the Japanese used to fold certain certificates to guarantee their authenticity. And from there the folding became generalised to mean what we understand by the term today.



For starting out www.paperfolding.com is excellent. There is page which goes through, for example, the different types of folds and the symbols used in Origami diagrams. A good place to get an idea of what you can do with origami go to www.origami.com. Here you will find diagrams you can download, and links to their photograph gallery. It shows you how to make anything from dinosaurs to roses. This site is very simple and does what it says. It provides you with many diagrams and instructions for how to create models from paper.

For those of us who find following instructions a bit tricky there are some excellent videos on www.youtube.com which show you how. For example there is a very short video showing you how to make a frog (http://uk.youtube.com/watch?v=sOUgrJo2klg) and seeing the person do it is much easier than trying to make sense of the diagrams. And there are videos showing all sorts of creations, from dragons to beautiful flowers. Now as it is Christmas, you can make an origami santa (http://uk.youtube.com/watch?v=mJo9ComfsKs) or decorations like simple stars (http://uk.youtube.com/watch?v=_Wt0CN8bQNU). If you can't don't want to copy these rather complicated links you can put in to the search box on youtube something like origami Christmas decorations and you will get lots of videos to pick from.

And for one site which is specially for kids go to activity village and click on the origami links at http://www.activityvillage.co.uk This site is full of puzzles and activities for children and is lots of fun.

Míllicent Couch

1923-2008

Millicent, or Milly as she was known, was born at Trewoon, near St Austell in 1923. Tragically, her mother died when she was only two years old, and although her sister Mona was only two years older than Milly, she always took a special care and responsibility for her. Both girls were cared for by their father until he re-married some years later, and had four more children.

Milly was educated in St Mewan School and then, like many girls at that time, when she left school she went into domestic service. She worked for the proprietors of a large tailoring business in St Austell and, probably because they had no children of their own, they treated Milly more like a daughter, taking her with them in their caravan when they went on holiday and, when she got married making and giving her as a present, the costume she wore on her wedding day.

In the early years of the second world war, Milly joined the Navy and this was how she met Jack, the man who was to become her husband for the next 63 years. At first Milly was stationed at Fowey, billeted at Ferryside, Daphne Du Maurier's house and then she was sent to St Merryn. Meanwhile Jack, who had also joined the Navy early in the war, spent quite a long time in Scotland where he'd been posted. They eventually met when Jack was promoted to Petty Officer and was posted to Salcombe. As there was not a great deal to do and he was so close to home he applied for weekend leave and set off on the train. Milly was also on her way home to Trewoon and it so happened that all the rest of the servicemen and women who were on the train, changed at South Brent to go up country, leaving only Milly and Jack. It was love at first sight and when Jack got off at Bodmin Road Station (as it was then) Milly arranged to look out for him on the return journey. The rest as they say is history. T hey were married at St Mewan on VE Day, May 8th 1945. Originally Jack, who was back in Scotland, had been told he was being sent to fight the war effort in Japan, but the Atom Bomb put an end to that plan. He managed to obtain a few days leave to get married, getting an extension plus 48 hours added for the celebration of VE Day. Gordon their son, who very sadly died two years ago, was born after three years of marriage and their daughter Margaret, four years later.

A joiner by trade, having been apprenticed to Mr Taylor in Port Isaac, after the war Jack went to Canada with the idea that the family would follow him. But, after 12 months he realised that the sort of life there was not for him and he returned to his home in Port Isaac. After living for about two years in a prefab in Trewetha Lane, they moved to 55 Fore Street which they rented at first, for £15.00 per annum, and then bought, and where they have lived ever since. Milly worked at Bowdens on the Terrace, and for the Lewins and also helped out at the Box Tree Deveolpment Company as a cleaner.

Milly was totally devoted to her home and family and was an excellent cook, especially of traditional Cornish fare-pasties, saffron buns, and splits. Jack kept chickens and she really enjoyed watching them. She would even walk all the way to and from Port Isaac Road Station to collect a new batch arriving on the train.

Her son Gordon's death was a tremendous blow to Milly, from which she never really recovered and her health deteriorated during the last two years. She was lovingly cared for by her daughter Margaret and by the nurses from the Port Isaac Surgery.

hristmas Cards! We always get into a last minute tangle sending Christmas cards ◆ to friends who live in other parts and then we have the joy of receiving a jolly good supply! And I love them! Among them are many cards of the Archangel Gabriel appearing to the Virgin Mary to announce that she is to have a baby. This scene from the Gospel of Luke is called 'The Annunciation' and it not only features in countless stained glass windows in churches around the world, but has been a favourite subject of most of the greatest artists. You could Google (images) `annunciation'!

Typically, an angel of gold or of pure white light hovers with its feet barely touching the ground, perhaps with a blue sky behind - the angel is from another world: Heaven.

Mary is often seated - she looks submissive: she is about to say "Be it unto to me according to thy will". And in her hands she often carries an open bible - occasionally if you look really closely you will see it is open at the prophet Isaiah - it will be chapter 7 verse 14, where the prophet says "Therefore the Lord himself shall give you a sign; Behold, a virgin shall conceive, and bear a son, and shall call his name Immanuel." In addition she often carries a lily, the sign of purity. Often there is a doorway behind her: she is caught up in this moment with the heavenly messenger, but she will go back to her normal earthly existence.

The Holy Spirit is present: "And the angel answered and said unto her, The Holy Ghost shall come upon thee, and the power of the Highest shall overshadow thee: therefore also that holy thing which shall be born of thee shall be called the Son of God." Artists normally show the Holy Spirit as a dove, perhaps flying in a ray of light from heaven to Mary. Sometimes the ray of light goes to her head, sometimes to her heart, sometimes even to her womb, and sometimes there is even a slit in her robes where the light enters her.



St Endellion Climate Friendly Parish Project

inally at the end of November the Climate Change Act has become law and the independent committee which will recommend the annual Carbon Budgets has been established (http://www.theccc.org.uk/). This has set some reasonable targets for reduction in Greenhouse gases (GHG) which will be legally binding. This is the first such legislation anywhere in the world, and whether you agree with it or not, it does give the UK some authority when trying to persuade other countries to reduce their GHG emissions. So for our little project this is the national picture. When we have our AGM on February 16th (7.00 pm in the Village Hall). We will have Dan Rogerson, our MP to explain to us the implications of the new law. We will also have short talks from local people who have installed power generation from sunshine or wind, or heat generation from renewable sources. If you look at the project website it has all the details (www.stendellion.com). We will also be able to report on the Cornwall Climate Change Action Plan which is currently being produced by Cornwall Sustainable Energy Partnership. This will provide a local framework for the way the Climate Friendly Parish can develop.

In addition to individuals installing power, we will be asking whether St Endellion would like to have a community project where we all chip in to own some local power generation. Such projects are usually wind turbines, and people have strong reactions to these, so it should be a lively discussion.

Of course at the moment, with the recession, oil prices have dropped again, and we may think we are out of the woods as far as energy costs are concerned. Unfortunately this is unlikely to be the case and it is probable that prices will go up again in a year or two as demand picks up and supply 'tightens' as they say. So that is one of the projects we are considering.



The other is to make the bus time-tables easier to understand and more available. Going along with this we are collecting examples of trips that can be made on the bus from the Parish. Robert Manders has already published some in *Trio*. We will have the time-tables available at the AGM in a number of formats, small cards, laminated A4 size to be put up on the wall and so on. We hope this will encourage the use of our bus route as the more it is used the more likely we are to keep it.

taking things for granted

ou may remember that at the end of my last article, I told you that my Pa died two days after my leaving him. Cindy and I were, in fact, in Rio waiting for the ship that was to take us down to the Sub Antarctic. I remember it so well. There we were in a lovely hotel in the heart of Rio, intending to go on a sightseeing tour that afternoon. However, we were tired so decided to have a short rest in our room. During this time, Cindy got food poisoning so for three hours I played nurse etc (too much information!). Then, the weird thing was that once she had finally fallen asleep I felt a chill run up my spine - I just knew that Pa had died. So I rang (eventually got through) only to hear that Pa had died at the precise time I had experienced that feeling. Such is the power of love and connection.

Once Cindy had recovered, we were off to the ship, the John Biscoe, owned by the British Antarctic Survey, which was moored in the smelly and extremely hot docks. Being the only girls on board, Cindy and I were allocated a twin cabin with our own bathroom and loo and, after storing all our equipment safely and a very hot and uncomfortable night, we set off for the Antarctic, a journey that was to take fourteen days. I will always remain eternally grateful to one of Cindy's sisters, who was a famous yatchsman (or yatchswoman!) for giving us a good supply of seasick pills which, in 1981, were not available over the counter. I can tell you that in the old days, crossing the channel filled me with complete horror, but on this trip, Cindy and I were the only ones keeping the crew company. The scientists on board, heading for South Georgia took to their bunks early on, and didn't appear again until we landed at the Island. I felt so sorry for them, but I needed my pills!

As you may have gathered, the trip was a trifle rough. The wind was so strong that we could not even venture onto the decks for fear of being blown overboard and the temperature so low that our breath froze if we attempted to go outside. We battoned down the hatches in more ways than one, ate out of tin cans on the floor of the crew's mess and prayed that we would eventually get to our destination. Along the way encountered signs of Antarctic wildlife, such as the odd Albatross flying overhead - a good luck sign as mentioned by many a seafarer - plus petrels and other weird birds that we had never seen before. It was all so

Twelve Days of Christmas?

elebrated since Medieval times, the Twelve Days of Christmas start on Boxing Day (because Christmas Day is considered holy and not for partying) and end with Twelfth Night (January 6th)

It took the 'Three Kings' twelve days to find the baby Jesus. Their arrival on the twelfth day led - centuries later - to the creation of the Feast of Epiphany.

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

Ten Lords-a-Leaping: £4,285.06 - £428.50 each, fall of 10% since cash for honours enquiry


Eleven Pipers Piping: £2,213.40 -£201.22 each, up 4.2%. Now available for engagements all year round after their final Riverdance Tour.



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
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
