An engraved slate stone was installed in the St Endellion Churchyard recently, commemorating two life-long residents of Port Isaac:

William John Lobb (1855-1932) and Martha Alma Thomas (1855-1917)

Their marriage began in 1877, and their nine children grew up in Port Isaac, six of them emigrating to western Canada between 1906 -1912.

A gathering of descendants, including Canadians, together with other relatives and friends of the family, is scheduled for 3:30 pm on Wednesday May 13, at the site of this Memorial in the Churchyard where Rev John May will conduct a dedication service. Poole. Adrian attended the Station in March, checking out on training procedures, meeting Station Officers and Crew Members and joining a full crew sea excercise.

Shout

Crew members Nikki Bradbury, Andy Cameron and Matt Main were out on call on Sunday April 5^h. Having just returned from morning sea exercise, they were preparing to rehouse the boat when Falmouth Coastguard alerted the Station to launch and proceed to search the Trebarwith area for five people reported stranded by the incoming tide. On reaching the area and locating the position of the trapped walkers, heavy surf and rock formations at the tide line were considered to be unfavourable for a successful rescue. 771 Squadron RNAS Culdrose had also been called and the decision was made to carry out the rescue by helicpter lift. Our boat stood by throughout the operation.

RNLI Picture Draw



This multi media painting, 'Pulling Together', has been donated to Port Isaac RNLI by the highly respected and well known West Country Artist, Ray Balkwill, SWac. He has based his painting on the historic photograph of 'Richard and Sarah III ' being returned to Station following a noted rescue that took place from the port on December 11th 1911.

Over the past three decades, Ray's inspiration has come from the Cornish landscape. Living on the coast at Exmouth, Devon, it is little wonder that the wide open spaces of sea, estuary and sky have been the mainspring of his art. He is a regular contributor to The Artist Magazine and also runs painting holidays in the UK. He is also the author of five books and his work appears in many other publications. His next book on Cornwall wil be published by Halsgrove in September 2010. He was elected an Academician of the South West Academy of Fine and Applied Arts in 2006 and is also a member of the St Ives Society of Artists.

After seven successful years, STEER winds up

STEER (St Endellion Economic Regeneration) was formed in 2002. At that time, in conjunction with the Parish Council, we carried out a survey within the Parish - St Endellion Parish Survey. The survey included a list of suggestions for Parish Regeneration, including a visitor centre, outer harbour wall, a footpath from Port Isaac to Trewetha, additional car parking, beach cleaning, undergrounding the cables in the village, and improving the street lighting. Some of these suggestions turned out to be impracticable, others impossible. However, we have been glad to help and assist with projects such as rebuilding the old stone styles, bringing broadband to the village, provide a website for Port Isaac, notice boards for the village, plus financial contributions were made to Friends of the Main and Port Isaac Harbour. We also prepared plans for other projects including the footpath to Trewetha, since taken over by the by the Parish Council.

undergrounding the cables

What we considered was the most important project of all was to underground the cables before they were replaced by very large ugly insulated cables, and at the same time address the state of the street lighting. This was voted for by 82% of those who took part in the Parish survey. The highlight of this year was the start of the cable undergrounding. In spite of the procrastinations from British Telecom, who totally refused to join in with the scheme, we are delighted to say that a week after the trenching started, who should turn up and ask if they could put their wires in our trenches, but British Telecom!

We are not sure exactly how many wires BT are going to be put underground. So far the cables in most of Middle Street, the lower part of Church Hill and the lower part of Roscarrock Hill have been undergrounded and reconnected and we believe BT are in the process of undergrounding part of Dolphin Street.

In spite of the atrocious weather at the beginning of the year, RBS, Western Power and BT all made good progress, keeping to their schedule and avoided working over the half term holiday.

In our last newsletter we mentioned that, as BT was not joining in with the scheme, many poles would have to be left to support their wires; some of these also support street lights. We therefore decided that the funds set aside to replace the street lights would be better spent on further undergrounding, leaving the lights on poles to be taken over by BT. However now that BT has removed some of their wires, we will be left with a number of poles that only support street lights. These poles will now become the responsibility of the County Council. We have discussed this matter with the District and County Council who drew up the original plan to replace the poles with lamp standards and the County has confirmed that although it does not have funds available this year, it will allocate funds to replace the poles in 2010. We also offered to send copy letters to house owners with poles on their property, asking BT or Western Power to remove the poles by withdrawing a way leave if one existed. Several owners have acted on this suggestion and we understand that further cables will be removed next winter. This will not require much trenching as most undergrounding will be on private land.

We would like to thank the Parish Council for their donation, the District Council that was, in particular Charlie David, who instigated the Council grant and also appointed James Ortiz to help organise the whole project and Western Power, especially Adam Walker, who has been a great supporter from the start. Last, but not least, thanks and recognition to Robin Penna who started the ball rolling all those years ago.

a job well done!

The present forum decided at their AGM that, as all the original proposals as far as possible have now been addressed, and as the undergrounding of the cables together with the upgrading of the street lights are underway, there will be little or no further need for STEER in the foreseeable future. Also, due to the change from District to County Council, we believe we will lose the limited funding that was available to us. However, we will see through all arrangements currently in place and will continue to sponsor the website <u>www.portisaac.org.uk</u>

Funeral March?

Not many of us want to talk about our funeral, but a recent survey about what music has been chosen in the last few years has helped to prompt such discussion. The Co-operative Funeralcare questioned 242 undertakers and found that in England traditional music is now less popular than contemporary songs. 'Pop' accounts for more than half the music chosen, while the proportion of hymns, played has fallen six per cent since the last survey four years ago.

Apparently, The Lord's My Shepherd, Abide With Me and All Things Bright and Beautiful remain the most requested hymns, although in our cluster of parishes of Port Isaac, St Kew, St Endellion and St Minver, Will Your Anchor Hold, The Old Rugged Cross and Eternal Father, Strong to Save are particular favourites.

Frank Sinatra's classic My Way remains the number one choice of contemporary funeral music, followed by Bette Midler or Celine Dion's version of Wind Beneath My Wings. Other favourites such You'll Never Walk Alone by Gerry and the Pacemakers, Whitney Houston's I Will Always Love You, and Angels by Robbie Williams stay in the top ten, four years after the last survey was conducted.

But unless the departed one has made his or her wishes clear, it's usually their family who has to try and decide what would be most suitable, and although most clergy try to accommodate requests for particular music, one in every ten is rejected, usually because the clergy feel that the choice is inappropriate.

I've officiated at funerals where My Way has been the song chosen to be played at the end of the service, and although I think it's a wonderful song, its words of human pride seem to me be out of place at such a time.

Music and readings carefully chosen to reflect a person's life and character can be of great support and comfort to those who mourn, but many a grieving relative finds it difficult to decide what would their loved one would have wanted.

Dan Rogerson, our local MP, writes ...

I hope you had a good Easter. I've spent much of the Parliamentary Recess going round talking to as many people as possible across North Cornwall. It's much the most important and most enjoyable part of my job, to hear what people are thinking and to take up the issues and difficulties they raise with me.

At the end of April, I met up with Lord Adonis, the Transport Minister. He has been taking a tour of Britain's railways, in an effort to see first-hand the problems that people face everyday as they use the network. I introduced him to campaigners in Newquay, who are pressing hard for a new loop to come off the Newquay-Par line, linking Newquay with St Austell. But that was far from our only discussion. I wasn't going to miss an opportunity to talk to him about the A30 between Temple and Higher Carblake. He took a constructive interest and I'm going to follow up our recent victory in getting the scheme into the regional priority list by pursuing the issue with him either in a meeting, or at the very least in correspondence over the coming weeks.

As I send this article to press, everyone is talking about the effects of Alistair Darling's latest Budget. It seems to me that he has again missed an opportunity to create much-needed jobs and create new infrastructure. Britain now has record levels of national debt but there's no sign we will have anything to show for when times improve, since so much money - £12.5bn - has been spent on a pointless VAT cut that has largely failed to stimulate the economy. All of it is money that could have been spent on affordable housing, and insulating the homes, hospitals and schools we do have to save energy and money later on.

I also just want to say just a few words about the present state of politics. As I talk to people around our area, so many tell me that they are disillusioned with the whole system. Whether they see MPs being arrested just for doing their jobs properly, or other MPs failing to discharge their duties while claiming for homes their parents live in, or Prime Ministerial apparatchiks hatching plans to smear opponents, people just see a system that looks rotten through. In my view, we need more than just a root-and-branch reform of the expenses system, if we are to regain public confidence. This is one of those moments when those of us who have advocated fundamental changes in the way our politics works want to scream it from the rooftops: the lessons of recent months must be learned - if not in this Parliament then in the next - overhauling our creaking political system so that all MPs are elected with majority support of their constituents, so that people in the House of Lords get there not as a matter of patronage but by democratic means, and so that our Parliament as a whole is more effective at holding whoever is in government to account. I'm of course very interested to hear what you think about everything that's been happening in the past few months and what should be done, so do let me know.





Another issue I want to hear from you on is that of broadband. I'm campaigning to get coverage to every home in North Cornwall, and I've been working with a group at the other end of the constituency, in Bolventor, who are without any coverage at all. It's difficult to know absolutely every spot in my 500 square mile constituency that has the same problem, so if you are affected please let me know.

Plus of course the Reindeer (introduced during the whaling days for fresh meat) and numerous different birds, that eventually all took to nesting on the ground near our hut.

In all honesty, it was pure magic (on a good day), but we had plenty to worry about on the bad days, and this turned out to be an average of 14 days of the month, when we could not even venture out of the hut, such was the wind speed and driving snow. We were in so-called spring by this time, but as the weather slowly (very slowly) began to warm up, we noticed a remarkable change in our surroundings. Firstly, we were able to ditch the sledge as the snow decreased and it was then a matter of backpacking all our filming, recording and survival gear in our rucksacks.

It also became obvious, that the three glaciers within St Andrews Bay were starting to melt, causing some concern. When glaciers melt, they start to melt underneath the huge layer of ice called the nose of the glacier, which starts as a gentle stream and then with the huge volume of melting, causes a raging torrent. These torrents were impossible to cross. Well, we did try it once or twice to get to the penguin colony, only to be washed off our feet. Thankfully the camera equipment didn't suffer but we were badly cut by the chunks of ice that made contact with our sodden bodies.

There are many stories of the lengths a male will go to to mate but few can be as devious as the Nursery Web Spider. He lures females into his web by playing dead - lying motionless with is legs outstretched - while holding a piece of spider friendly food in his mouth. When the unsuspecting female spider goes to pinch this tasty

morsel Mr Spider springs back to life and wrestles her into the position for sex. (Ed: there should be a moral here but I just can't think of it at the



can't think of it at the moment!)

Such fun. It took forever to dry our clothes and, as we only had one set of spare clothing, we were to be a bit more careful after that. However, this meant an exhausting walk over three glaciers to get to the colony. Imagine walking on ground that groans and moves constantly under your feet. I hated the experience and was always so relieved when we reached the beach!

Imagine what it must be like now. We hear on the news constantly, how the earth is warming up and the glaciers in the Antarctic and the North Pole region are retreating far more drastically than originally forecast. We may not think this will affect us here in the UK, but it will. We will lose much of the wildlife we so enjoy seeing around our shores, because the sea will have warmed up too much for them to survive, and all the low-lying areas, such as down by the seashore, will be underwater due to the melting of the huge ice fields. Not too cheerful for our future generations. So again, we must not be complacent and take things for granted.

What a doom and gloom person I am, but I have been so lucky and privileged to see this amazing part of the world before it all started to change, and I am just so sad about the state of the world now.

Websites of the month

If there is one site to look at this month it is this one – <u>www.equalitytrust.org.uk</u>. It contains the main information from a new book by Richard Wilkinson and Kate Pickett called 'The Spirit Level'. It is all about how unequal societies breed social problems ranging from crime and large prison populations to mental illness, teenage pregnancy, drug abuse, murder rates – and (this is where my interest in this comes in) – low recycling rates. They have written a relatively easy book to read (some of their other work is very technical and dry), and on the website it is even easier. They have been able to show something that many of us always believed, that more equal societies do better than unequal ones. And the cost of inequality is huge. To give one short quote comparing Britain to other rich countries

"...If Britain became as equal as the [most equal] countries (Japan, Norway, Sweden and Finland), levels of trust might be expected to be two-thirds as high again as they are now, mental illness might be more than halved, everyone would get an additional year of life, teenage birth rates could fall to one third of what they are now, homicide rates could fall by 75%, everyone could get the equivalent of almost seven weeks extra holiday a year, and the government could be closing prisons all over the country."

Don't take my word for it, have a look at the website, it is all there. And the good news is that if we get on with it, it would be a way to sort out the bankers on the way, and get a sustainable and stable economy back.

Swine Flu

By the time you are reading this we may be in a pandemic of swine flu, or hopefully not. There are some very good websites which give information about this and as it has been predicted for some time, even if we have managed to escape it this time, it will happen. The first place to look is the good old NHS direct (<u>http://tinyurl.com/dert3</u>]) which explains how you can get treatment and the steps you should take to avoid infection. This is a big deal. In the Spanish Flu pandemic in 1918 approximately 50 million people died. That is a lot of people. The Annual Parish Meeting

I attended the recent Annual Parish Meeting with the intention of writing a report for *Trio*. However, I left more confused than when I arrived as mixed messages galore and contradictions came across. This then, is my take on the meeting – I guess the Parish Clerk will have a more verbatim report if you want to follow up any points.

PARKING

Probably the most worrying thing is that we are no further along with a car park than when a huge contingent of locals attended the Parish Council meeting last September.

- Barbara Bell categorically stated that NCDC had advised that planning permission would not be given for a car park on Barry Cleave's field.
- When asked by *Trio* if the Parish Council were pursuing an adaption of the playing field and adjoining field to incorporate a car park the Chairman said, "No." Yet, a bit further into the meeting it transpires that the farmer using the adjoining field for grazing sheep was given 12 months notice to vacate the field in December last year!
- Andy Penny stated that we should stop knocking the authorities when we have two fields that could be adapted and we have done nothing.
- It was said that children and cars don't mix yet it was announced that the gates to the playing field were being left open for emergency parking. Surely if a proper car park were to be made and the playing field and apparatus moved this would be a safer option?
- Bryan Nicholls suggested that the existing cliff top car park be adapted to incorporate another tier that should be able to accommodate up to another 100 cars. Charlie David from Cornwall County Council, whilst no longer having any remit for car parks, did say that the costs would be very high and that "Port Isaac is not the only village with parking problems!" However, our problems are known and will be passed on to the new CCC department. The man in charge of car parking now is Peter Moore and another contact would be Community Network Manager Sarah Simms.
- Barbara Bell outlined the horrendous and dangerous start to our tourist season caused by parking on the roadside from Hartland Road and out of the village. She asked Charlie David for CCC to come up with a tangible way to help.
- The parking spaces being taken up by the recycling and rubbish bins were also discussed and Charlie David said that if another site could be found for them they could be moved.
- The Chairman reported that we had been promised yellow lines from Garrick to the 30mph zone in the new financial year, so this should be soon. However, he was told in no uncertain terms that yellow lines are needed at least from Lundy Road.

DOC MARTIN

Doc Martin will not be using the Playing Field – the reason given by the Chairman was that it was not big enough for them.

FOOTPATH TO TREWETHA

The Chairman proudly announced that Stage One of the footpath had now been completed and thanked Andy Penny and Martyn Dingle for working on the path in their own time to cut down on costs.. However, Bryan Nicholls was concerned that the path increased to 40ft wide in the second field. Apparently this was to accommodate the dog walkers but means that the person renting the field for grazing would need to be paid compensation. Another of Bryan's concerns was the safety aspect of the wire used.

Andy Penny pointed out that STEER originally had everything in hand for the footpath - plans, permissions and a quote for £8000 - for it to go all the way to Trewetha. Then the project was hijacked by the Parish Council and everything has come to a standstill.

Rumour has it that due to all the messing about by the Parish Council, Barry Cleave has rescinded his verbal permission for the footpath to go across his land. Watch this space.

STEER

David Raynor gave a verbal report on STEER's success with the undergrounding of the cables (see separate report on p8 for full details).

POLICE REPORT

PC Malcolm Taylor advised that the Police are no longer able to do anything about illegal parking. It is now the responsibility of Cornwall County Council Traffic Enforcement Department and the more telephone complaints they get, the more visits we will get from the Traffic Enforcement Officers (see page 2).

On the crime front, the good news is that there has been a 43.7% reduction in crime since 2005.

However, he did warn that householders should remain vigilant, particularly making sure that sheds, outbuildings and garages are kept secure.

COASTPATH FROM MAIN CAR PARK TO OLD VILLAGE

The dreadful state of the path was discussed and Andy Penny advised that he had offered to attempt to fill in some of the pot holes some time ago. His offer had been declined by the Parish Council. Cornwall County Council has now taken on responsibility for the path and hopefully a walkway will be made shortly.

MAIN ROAD BETWEEN TRESUNGERS AND THE STRAWBERRY FARM

"This is probably the worst bit of road in Cornwall. I have never seen the road surface so bad." said Bryan Nicholls. Whether anything will be done about this remains to be seen!

WHERE I CAME IN!

Going back to the beginning of the meeting, Bill Dawe presented David Phelps with a medal on green ribbon – he wore this for the rest of the meeting. Lots photographs were taken but I never got to the bottom of what it was all about.

Spring Sensations

Asparagus

It is the dawning of the age of asparagus! Late April sees the beginning of the asparagus season, which lasts 6-8 weeks and 'is the highlight of the foodie calendar' (according to the Asparagus Society and if anyone should know, they certainly should). Keep it simple. Steam, or

lightly poachthe asparagus and serve with a hollandaise sauce. It makes a wonderful starter. Mary Berry offers this very easy recipe that I've used a thousand times and never fails (you will need a food processor or blender). Serve with homemade Soda bread.

Mary Berry's Quick Hollandaise Sauce

1 pint (600ml) hot water 1 tbsp lemon juice 1 tbsp white wine vinegar 4 egg yolks (at room temperature) 150g (50z) unsalted butter, melted

Put the hot water into the blender (processor) and switch on to heat the bowl. Working quickly, throw away the water and dry the bowl. Put in the lemon juice and vinegar, add the egg yolks and process briefly. With the machine running, gradually pour in the melted butter and process until thick and creamy. Season to taste. Top the cooked asparagus with the sauce and place under a heated grill for 30 seconds or until bubbling and golden brown.

Soda Bread

11b plain white flour 1tsp bicarbonate of soda 1tsp salt ½ pint buttermilk (or half milk/half plain yoghurt) 3 floz tepid water Sunflower oil for greasing

Pre-heat oven to 200C (400F) Sift dry ingredients together. Pour in all the liquid. Mix to form a soft dough. Form into a round shape with a cross slashed into the top. Place onto a lightly oiled baking dish. Bake in a pre-heated oven for 30 mins, turn over and bake a further 10 mins. Leave to cool on a wire tray. Serve the same day.

Fresh Herb and Feta Omelette

with warm asparagus, avocado and Cherry tomato salsa (Denis Cotter, 'Paradiso Seasons') Omelette – 4–5 Eggs, 50g Feta cheese

Salsa – 6 pieces asparagus, grilled or steamed until tender then chopped 8 Cherry tomatoes, lightly fried with garlic and chilli in olive oil for 2 mins. Add chopped avocado when ready to serve.

Another wonderful spring delicacy is the first appearance of English rhubarb.



I found this deluxe recipe for that traditional English dish 'Rhubarb Crumble' (again from 'Paradiso Seasons' by Denis Cotter, published by Atrium). It comes highly recommended and worth that extra bit of effort for a special crumble. Rhubarb, along with its seasonal friend the strawberry, makes a lovely Spring combination in desserts.

Rhubarb & Glazed Pecan Crumble

Syrup – 1 bunch rhubarb 400gms caster sugar

Crumble – 100g flour 30g light musc sugar 60g butter ½ tsp ground ginger

Glazed Pecans – 30g caster sugar 1 tsp maple syrup 50g pecans

Cook rhubarb and sugar, strain and keep the juice. Put rhubarb into base of pudding dish. Blend the flour, brown sugar, butter and ginger together to make the crumble until like breadcrumbs. Spread this out onto a baking sheet and bake for 5-6 minutes @ 180C /350F Melt the sugar and maple syrup over a low heat until the sugar has melted. Stir in the pecans. Spread them out onto an oven tray lined with parchment paper. Bake 120C/250F for 20 mins. Leave to cool until crisp and dry. Add to crumble mix. Add crumble mix over the rhubarb and bake for 15 mins at 180C. Warm the reserved juice to serve.
