PACT meeting

C Malcolm Taylor has organised a PACT meeting on Wednesday September 9th at 7.00pm at Port Isaac School. PACT is a process where the police look to gather information on the concerns and issues within a local community and act upon them, together with other partner agencies (eg Council, Parish Councils, Housing Authorities, Highways, Environment etc). It will give the local community a chance to express any concerns they have regarding the village and surrounding area.

Very few problems have been raised with the Neighbourhood Watch co-ordinators this summer but his does not mean that individuals are not experiencing difficulties. This is an opportunity for everyone to voice their feelings and will give the appropriate authorities the opportunity to try to find solutions. Second homeowners can write to PC Taylor c/o Wadebridge Police Station expressing any concerns they have and I am sure that these issues will be raised at the meeting.

It is hoped hat some of the Neighbourhood Watch co-ordinators will attend the meeting and new residents will be able to find out who is their representative. There are still several roads in the village that are not covered by the scheme.

We were very sorry to hear of the death of Robin Penna who had been the co-ordinator for Dolphin Street. In fact he was the only resident there but he was still concerned if he felt that anything was wrong.

The PACT meeting has been arranged by our Neighbourhood Beat Manager, PC Malcolm Taylor, and I hope that as many residents as possible will attend. It is our opportunity to try to sort ot any community problems.



Taking place during the autumn half term week, the Festival will take place in the parishes under the ministry of Preb John May. It celebrates the vision of Bishop Bill to explore faith and Christianity in North Cornwall through the arts. And what a week it looks to be. This month *Trio* will concentrate on the events that are happening in and around St Peter's.

From Thursday October 29th there will be an Art Exhibition in St Peter's featuring work by local artists. 

Cornwall Council says ...

Since the last *Trio*, there are fewer traffic cones at the top of the village. Some now lie injured by the side of the road, others have moved on to pastures new and some, sadly, have gone to that bollard graveyard in the sky. What is clear is that they certainly fooled our visitors. In the first instance they did successfully stop them parking at the entrance to the village, but also they fooled them into thinking we were going to have a carnival or a fete! (In other parts of the country that's one of the things traffic cones are used for.)

Anyway, whilst they certainly did the job, they were never a pretty sight in the first place and they now look even more sad and sorry for themselves so *Trio* contacted Cornwall Council to find out what has happened to the yellow lines that the then Parish Council Chairman, at the Annual Parish Meeting earlier this year, assured us were about to be painted at any moment. The answer received was:

"Cornwall Council is aware of and support the towns wish and need for yellow lines at the entrance to Port Isaac. The installation of the lines will require a new Traffic Regulation Order (TRO) to amend the current parking restrictions. There is a cost associated with applying for TROs and unfortunately funding is not currently available and until it is - we are not able to progress any further. We continue to liaise with the Parish Council, who is aware of the situation. This sort of scheme was previously funded through local member small works budgets, which are no longer available."

Whilst in contact with Cornwall Council, *Trio* took the opportunity to try and get some answers to some other issues. The following answers came from the Communications Department at Cornwall Council:

The footpath to Trewetha?

"We have produced an estimated cost for the proposed footpath link between Port Isaac and Trewetha. Unfortunately funding is also not available to progress this scheme further. The Parish Council is aware of the situation and is looking at alternative funding opportunities to contribute should it be possible to proceed. The footpath would be subject to a feasibility study and public consultation prior to any decision."

The state of the cliff path from the main car park to the old village?

"The surface of the path from the main car park is in poor condition and our public rights of way officer for the area is liaising with residents along the private road regarding potential improvements and funding. Any new surface would need to be suitable for both vehicles and pedestrians and we are also looking at possible ways of managing parking in the area that would be acceptable to residents also."

Parking?

We assume that this answer refers to the existing main car park. "Yellow lines have been added to the roadways, restricting parking to only the marked bays. Although this has slightly reduced the maximum car park capacity, the adding of yellow lines has kept the access to the footpath/unmade track to the village clear for vehicular access and has generally made the car park a safer environment, particularly for pedestrians."

Any progress or suggestions on additional parking? Has there been any progress on parking in Mr Cleave's fields?

"There is currently no further action or progress on the provision of additional parking for Port Isaac."

It's easy to blame our Parish Council for the status quo but they seem to be stuck between the devil and the deep blue sea. These issues are not part of their remit and

Websites of the month

As we don't have an update on the Climate Friendly Parish this month, as we are working on the same things as last month – basically working out sources of funding for our projects – the websites of the month is devoted to grants for energy efficiency in the home; how much are they, where can you get them from and who can get what. Unfortunately, like a lot of government grants and benefits, this is confusing territory and we are working on getting some very clear guidance for the Parish as part of the project. Grants change all the time, so these websites are only a as good as when they were last updated.

First of all the Energy Savings Trust is the place to go with any questions about this. It is one of the UK's leading organisations tackling climate change. They are funded by Government and the private sector. They describe their purpose as being

"to help reduce carbon dioxide emissions through energy efficiency and renewable sources of energy in the home, on the road and in communities."

Their website is <u>www.energysavingtrust.org.uk</u> and there is a freephone number 0800 512 012 where you can find out how you can save energy and money.

There are three main sources for grants: The Government, private suppliers and the local authority. The UK Government funds schemes provide grants to people either on benefits or over a certain age. One of the main schemes is called Warmfront. Their website (<u>http://www.warmfront.co.uk/</u>) states:

If you own your own home or rent it from a private landlord, you may be eligible for a grant of up to £3,500 (or £6,000 where oil, low carbon or renewable technologies are recommended) under the Warm Front Scheme.

And if: You are 60 years or older and are in receipt of one or more benefits. Benefits include: income support, council tax benefit, housing benefit, job seekers allowance and pension credit.

or You have a child under 16 or you are pregnant and have been given maternity MAT B1 and are also in receipt of benefits such as income support, council tax benefit etc.

or You are in receipt of one or more benefits such as disability living allowance, child tax credit with an income of less than £15,460, housing benefit and disability premium etc.

Then you could be entitled to a warm front grant.

In our neck of the woods where it isn't possible to get gas, it may be that oil or renewable would be the best option and a larger grant would then be available.

The sorts of things you can get include Loft insulation, Draftproofing, Cavity wall insulatio, Hotwater tank insulation, Central heating and Conversion of fires to glass fronted.

On the Community Energy Plus website, based in Cornwall, <u>www.cep.org.uk</u>, there is a useful section on grants available and you can get up to date advice by ringing them (see phone numbers below). What they say is as follows:

LOFT AND CAVITY WALL INSULATION

CEP provides grant funding for insulating homes of owner-occupiers and private tenants. This grant funding falls into 2 categories:

Fully Funded Insulation If a member of a household is over 70 or in receipt of a qualifying benefit or entitlement, CEP can potentially provide Cavity Wall and/or Loft Insulation with NO* cost to the householder.

Also we are currently running Home Health schemes in certain areas of Cornwall that can also potentially provide free loft and cavity wall insulation regardless of age or benefit entitlement. Please call to check if your postcode is within a qualifying area.

Partially Funded Insulation For owner/occupiers and private tenants who do not qualify for the above fully funded grants we can provide grant funding to reduce the cost to the householder to £145* per measure of loft or cavity wall insulation.

For more information on the grants available for your home, please call CEP on 0800 954 1956 or 01209 614978. Lines are open Monday to Friday, 9am to 5pm (voicemail operates outside these hours). We can arrange a free, no obligation survey to check the levels of insulation in your property.

*All grants are subject to a survey, some properties may incur costs (such as scaffolding, excess meterage) that are not included in the grant criteria.

ADVICE In addition to insulation grants, some households may qualify for a free central heating system. If you are installing renewable energy technologies at home, you may also be eligible for a partial grant of up to $\pounds 2,500$

Every day three million people are denied the Right to Read

Three million people in the UK are being denied the right to read just because they have a sight problem or print reading disability. Research from the RNIB shows that a shocking 96% of books are not available in large print, audio or braille. The few books that are printed in accessible formats are rarely available at the same time as the print versions and are often more expensive. Cornwall Blind Association want everyone in Cornwall to be able to read the same book at the same time at the same price.

If you are visually impaired but still want to read, or someone who would like to start reading despite your sight loss then you should be registering with the Truro Sight Centre for Cornwall Blind Association's Right to Read Show at New County Hall, Truro on Thursday September 17th from 10.00am-4.00pm. There will be more than a dozen local and national organisations on hand, demonstrating what they can offter to assist with reading for visually impaired people.

From 1.30pm there will be readings from well known celebrity authors and readers taking place in the Council Chamber next to the exhibition hall. This will include Patrick Gale who will be reading from his latest book and Cliff Snell who will be talking about John Betjeman and reading some of his poems. Dan Rogerson, our local MP, writes ...


have a busy few weeks ahead, conducting my 'street surgeries' in all seventy parishes across North Cornwall, from Summercourt in the West to Morwenstow in the East. I'll be

in the parish on 28th September, so look out for my street surgery sign. If you'd like me to call on you, then give my office a ring on the number below. I'm really looking forward to

getting around to so many communities since, for me, meeting constituents, listening and taking their views and concerns back with to Westminster, is what being an MP is all about.

It's been very concerning this month to read about soaring youth unemployment. Not since the dark days of the Thatcher government have some many school leavers faced the dole. Though employment is presently a problem at all levels – I have seen all too many constituents who have lost their jobs and their homes – the particularly acute difficulties for young people are a reflection of the mistakes made in our education system over the past twenty years. Employers say they meet too many school leavers who lack the basic skills they need to do any job, and there are too few vocational courses. We're lucky in Cornwall to have some real leaders in practical schooling, allowing young people to gain skills in a trade, rather than concentrating solely on academic study. But we need more of that, across the country, and a real investment in the children from low-earning families, like so many of those in Cornwall. It's the only way to level the playing field and end a situation in which a disproportionate share of those who leave school with few or no qualifications are from poorer backgrounds.

Meanwhile, those who are losing their jobs at the other end of the age spectrum need proper assistance too. The Government has flirted with 'life-long learning' but the recession reinforces the need to promote it so that redundancy means a new chapter with new skills. Absurdly, though, Ministers have presided over job centre closures all


August – the month when the tractors are prevalent, and no, not the ones with sat nav, alloy wheels and Radio 4, although there are a few too many of those

Four day Arts & Literature



the Parish Clerk's report from the meeting held on August 10th 2009 FINANCE

The Parish Council has agreed to make a donation of £156 to the Golden Circle.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS AND NOTICES

Application 2009/01031 Certificate of Lawful use for the continued seasonal use of a building as a dwelling. Mr G Sylvester, 2 A Tintagel Terrace, Port Isaac. **The Parish Council is in support of this application.**

Application 2009/00987 Change of use from A1 Retail shop to A3 Café Restaurant. Mrs S Large, 76A Fore Street, Port Isaac Case Officer: Mark Wigley.

Mrs Townsend read a letter from Nicola Vickery raising concerns. Mr B Nicholls felt that Environmental Health would need to look at the issue of food smells and the effect of opening hours on local residents. He was also concerned about the safety issue of the outside table being so close to the road and being on a busy corner. Mr D Phelps could not see anything wrong with the application. It was proposed by Mr R Manders that the Parish Council support the change of use to a café, but ask Cornwall Council to check the following three concerns first.

1)Outside Chairs - The council feels they are to close to road

2) Opening hours should be restricted, due to the close proximity of houses with elderly residents

3) Environmental Health look into the effect of food smells on adjoining properties. This proposal was carried, Mr D Phelps abstained.

CORNWALL COUNCILLORS REPORT

Mr Gisbourne informed the council that he did not wish to step on anybody's toes, or disregard what had been done in the past and the efforts of the old council, but felt that he did have the benefit of being a new councillor and it will be interesting to see what happens in the next 12 months time. Mr Gisbourne informed the council that he would chase up the removal of concrete blocks.

Mr B Nicholls informed Mr Gisbourne that Mayfield Lane was in a state and un-walkable for someone older, it is hardly good enough for him to walk. It is very slippery. Mr Gisbourne agreed to look into this.

Mr Gisbourne informed the council he had been contacted by a lady who wanted residents parking. He said that he had spoken to highways and they could not do this. If we get a park and ride next year, it maybe easier to get. For now its just something people will have to put up with for 8weeks.

Mr Gisbourne informed the council that 5 of the planning cases they had to listen to at Camelford were for wind farms. They had a journey around last week and had a look at the sites. Some of the new wind turbines would be as high as 126 meters The wind turbines at Delabole were coming down and being replaced by 4 110 meters turbines. Mr Gisbourne informed the council that it was interesting, and some will be refused. Mr Gisbourne informed the council that they had not the planning right yet and sometime Camelford area cases were being decided at Liskeard and vice versa. Which means people have to travel.

Mr Gisbourne informed the council that they would experience the first budget cuts in 2010/11, so they would have less money from the government next year and that it was going to be tough.

CHAIRMANS REPORT

Mrs J Townsend read the following report from Mrs B Bell.

Lane behind Mayfield Drive (Mr Bushells blocks etc): I spoke to Philip Jones at Cornwall Council, who had recommended that the railings be removed. He informed me that the blocks are not on council owned land (which I reported to Joan Murray). The footpath is maintained by the housing department and I spoke to Caroline Osborne who will report on state of the path and inform us.

Rospa report: repairs to play equipment, fencing etc will be carried out by Dave Dingle asap. The picnic tables are not repairable and will be on the next agenda to be replaced.

Car parking in playing field has proved to be successful although cars are still being parked on side roads before this is used. Dave Phelps asked me to look at the allotment site as it has accumulated quite a lot of mess,; parts of it look very untidy at the moment - put on next agenda to contact the allotments holders. Gullies were cleared in Fore Street, at Hicks' corner and along Trewetha Lane. Inadequate street cleaning was also reported.

Mr Doney was contacted re the one-way signs in upper Fore Street, near no.65 (the signs aren't visible when you enter Fore St from either next to Denis Knight's or from Peace and Harmony Terrace). Mr Lewis the Highways supervisor will inspect.

With LEPRA to Malawi .. and a brothel! July 2009



LEPRA healthinaction

We're too old for this! 460 miles in 2 weeks! But we've done it before in India and Madagascar and the work is important! Pack up our bicycles in the garage at home – lighten them as much as we can and let down the tyres. Up to Heathrow in a taxi, where we meet Charlie, Ruth, Susan, Ian and Louise. Kenya Airways say that I have too many bags, but we MUST take the antibiotics and other medicines that we've collected, so we quickly stuff them into the others' rucksacks. OK – off to Lilongwe.

Arrive Lilongwe11am – met by the LEPRA team who will accompany us en route - transfer to rest house to reassemble our bikes (on the way our driver stops to buy dead mice from the road side to fry for his supper – a delicacy, we're told!). We meet groups of British school children on their way to and from holiday projects in Malawi schools.

Cycle 15 miles out of Lilongwe, up hill along tarmac road, to spend our first night at Nathanje Rest House – pass many people travelling barefoot and carrying (in shawls on their backs) solemn, woolly hatted babies with big brown eyes. We were cold that night. Ian and I shared a single bed with a torn mosquito net – no light, no running water, no working loo, but we enjoyed a local dance in the compound with a live band. As happened each evening, two of the LEPRA team built a fire on the ground to cook for us – chicken, rice and cabbage, beer and bottled water.

Rise at 6.30am - uphill all day on tarmac roads - not too hot but VERY hard work - much encouragement needed. Stop every hour for bananas and bottled water. Little faces gather round us - I doubt they will have eaten today. The other Ian does a magic show at the side of the road - much laughter and jumping about. The LEPRA team talk to the villagers about how to detect the first signs of leprosy and how to ward off the diseases of poverty - TB, malaria, polio, elephantiasis and HIV/AIDS. We hand out leaflets in the local language, Chichewa. I give mine to the older school children and to Mums telling them to share them with their friends. It's tough cycling – up, up, up. The distant hills of Mozambique shimmer in the sunshine. Smoke rises from huts. Maize is growing everywhere. Barefoot children run out to greet us with, "asungu, asungu" (white man, white man!). We give them pencils and biros, sweets and Christmas cracker toys huge smiles! We shake hundreds of hands. We stop at woodcarvers' stalls along the roadside - exquisite work - meet a group of 12 boys between 8 and 18 - all AIDS orphans - see an infant immunisation clinic taking place under a baobab tree.

Next day 40 miles downhill to Mua Mission, passing many coloured birds and baboons in the trees – comfortable beds tonight – smiles all round!

Downhill again to a camp on the shore of beautiful Lake Malawi where a Nutrition and AIDS conference is in progress. AIDS is rife in Malawi and life expectancy is 40 years. As yet, only in the towns is the message of the benefits of using of condoms and smaller families getting through. Most children receive immunisation against childhood diseases and two hours education a day until the age of 12. The clever ones go on to secondary school.

Visit spotless regional hospital at Mangochi - too many patients for the beds so some sleep on the floor. The dispensary lacks drugs. There are male and female TB wards and quiet children with sad eyes and swollen bellies. 90% of the patients have AIDS.

Cycle off-road 42 miles to Mvuu game park – evening safari as the sun goes down to see hippos, baboons, water buck, crocodile and wart hogs. Hippos tramp past our hut all night. Morning walk at sunrise – no elephants but lotsof elephant pooh! Bright flowers and kingfishers.

Uphill again (but I'm stronger now) to Zomba, the old capital of Malawi and its market. An elderly lady runs to me out of the crowd, barefoot, waving, smiling, "Grandmother!" she calls, "my sister!"

On to Malosa - don't go there! Accommodation minus 5 star - loo another hole in the ground but smell indescribable - had to beg buckets of water - much drunkenness in the local bar - we're staving in the town's brothel but there's nowhere else. 37 miles to Balaka and Utale leprosarium run by Roman Catholic Missionaries. The residents come to greet us and sit on the ground in a semi circle. We listen to their stories told with much dignity. All suffer from the after effects of leprosy. The stigma means that many have been abandoned by their families. All are painfully thin and ragged. LEPRA provides physiotherapy and protective shoes and gloves for damaged limbs. We have brought maize, sugar, salt, oil and soap. We gently touch blind faces and ulcerated and shortened limbs. We feel helpless. We must go. We turn away to hide our tears. Many of us leave our clothes.

But there is hope! Malawi is at peace and leprosy is probably under control there are few new cases. President Mutharika is improving the country's infrastructure, the immunisation of children and the schooling. There is hope for Malawi.

One of the many things noone tells you about ageing is that it is such a nice change from being young

Taking things for granted ... sent my stomach to my mouth, but no damage done!.

hen I last wrote, I took you up to the time that we had been rescued by HMS Endurance from Argentinian occupation. We were taken to the base camp at Grvtviken, and transfered to a huge naval destroyer, HMS Antrim. Now that was an eye-opener. Our first task was to get ashore to the Base Camp to photograph and film the terrible damage caused by the Argentinans and the sunken Argentine submarine in the harbour that only had the tower slefthowing; a result of the bambardment by our British task force. This permission took an hour to negotiate. due to the tight schedule that HMS Antrim was under to get us away and to travel North.

However, after much persuasion, we managed to go ashore and get the filming and photos we wanted. Remember we were the only so called "Press" in the area, so it was vital that we had evidence of the capture of the island, and the subsequent retake by our task force to give to the press on our return to the UK.

That trip was memorable. Firstly we set off in this huge destroyer, only to be transfered to a smaller ship called HMS Antelope mid way to Ascension Island due to the sinking of HMS Sheffield down in the Falkland Islands (the retake of the Falklands had started). On our way north, we passed no end of ships going south, and one ship in particular organised a helicopter drop on Antelope's flight deck with all the post for the ships company. Amongst all the mail was a letter addressed to the two wildlife film girls, somewhere in the South Atlantic. Can you belief it, having gone to about a dozen ships on route, we did finally receive the letter. Marvallous ship mail service.

On board Antelope we were able to film the action station work and on Sundays (a let your hair down afternoon,) we joined the crew in football and cricket on the flight deck. Such fun. If you hit a six, no need to worry, because the ball was attached to some long string, so could be retreaved iif it went overboard. I was on the winning side may I add.

And so eventually we arrived on Ascention Island having been airlifted

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from Antelope with a brilliant roll of honour in mid air, which

Ascention Island was frantic so we kept out the way by being shown round the island by the Governor (very British) but then it was time to board the flight to the UK. An RAF VC10 along with various high officials, our fellow scientists from South Georgia, and two ducks, who decided to find their way out of their boxes and run amok round the plane.

We were informed near the time of arrival at Brize Norton that we would be arriving at precisely 2.35am. and that once the plane doors opened, for some reason, Cindy and I were to go out first (womens perogative!). I was then advised by the pilot that perhaps I should change from my filthy clothes into something more respectable. For what reason I wondered? When the plane landed and we ground to a halt, the doors opened and a mass of flood lights exploded. I remember turning to Cindy and saying "There must be Royality about". "No says the Captain, they are waiting for you two".

It was all so surreal. What had we done to deserve this media attention. Press conferences, front page of all the newspapers, and so it went on. Both Cindy and I were not comfortable with it all when we were well aware that all the time this maddness was going on, our forces were fighting to regain the Falkland Islands, men we knew and Islanders who were risking their lives to make it possible.

We thought of them then, and indeed still think of those fighting as I write. Their dedication and bravery should never be taken for granted or forgotton.

The Parish Council has arranged for Dave Dingle to carryout the repairs on the play equipment following the report from ROSPA. The two benches have also been removed for safety reasons.

SPEED LIMIT/SLOW SIGNS/SLOW HORSES

The Parish Council has written to Cornwall Council informing them that we believe that all country speed limits were being reviewed and we would like to know what their intentions are for the B3314, B3267 and Trelights. The Parish Council has also raised concerns regarding speeding vehicles and the dangers to horse riders and small children.

MAYFIELD DRIVE/LANE

The Parish Council has contacted Cornwall Council and asked for a dog bin at Mayfield Drive/Lane.

HOME FINDER

The Parish Council has contacted Frances Walker at Communities and Local Government, Zone 1/J6, Eland House, Bressenden Place, London, SW1E 5DU The Parish Council is supporting new guidelines which state 'also strengthens councils' freedom to prioritise specific local needs alongside those households who are in 'reasonable preference.' In some areas this will mean giving more priority to people who have been on waiting lists for a long time or more priority for people with strong local connections. In the letter the council gave example of local people having lost out on local housing to people from outside of the area when there needs have been the same.

HEDGE CUTTING

The Parish Council contact Cornwall County Highway and Westcountry Housing Association asking them to arrange for the hedge to be cut back opposite the Playing field as it is restricting visibility to school.

POTHOLES

The Parish Council has contact Cornwall Council regarding the potholes on all three roads into Trelights.

Martin from The Mote talks curries!

So things that I miss from Oxford, taxis, Mr 18 (his cab number), Laytiff was his name and he would always fly like the wind to pick me up and take me home way into the late hours. I also miss the diversity of cultures which lead you being able to find many different cuisines often within walking distance and so this month I would like to give you my take on how to make a curry. Bear in mind this is a British take but if you put the love into making this dish you will be rewarded or at the very least someone might offer to do the dishes after!

To make a good curry it is about building layers over layers to achieve the balance of spice and heat (1) and so here is the basics to making a good curry and then you just play around with developing your own style. Remember if you take the time to make your own blends of spice you can always add more but you can't take it out!

Garam Masala. The word garam refers to temperature, not spice intensity; Garam masala is pungent, but not "hot" in the same way as a chilli pepper, and is the first layer to make. I have just brought a spice blender (2) but a pestle and mortar will work or even a rolling pin and a bowl will do just as well.

2 cinnamon sticks 4 bay leaves 2 Tbs cumin seeds 1 Tbs coriander seeds 2 Tbs cardamom seeds 2 Tbs cardamom seeds 2 Tbs black peppercorn 1/2 Tbs nutmeg 2 Tbs cloves

Toast in a frying pan on a low heat and keep the spices moving to prevent burning and ruining your curry very quickly you should get a intense smell of the spices. Grind up to a fine powder.

Base Curry Sauce. Make a batch and freeze it down in smaller portions and if you make it a day or two before it just gets better.

2 large onions 1 bulb of garlic 75g ginger chillies as you wish 5 Tbs garam masala 1 Ltr water

Gently fry with a little oil for 5 mins, add garam masala, fry 5 mins, add water plus 2 tins of chopped tomatoes and simmer for 1 hour. Then blend into a smooth sauce and add some more water if it is to thick.

(1) If you like reading try this The Mistress of Spices By Chitra Banerjee Divakaruni

This wonderful novel is about an Indian woman, Tilo, who is trained in the magic of spices, on a faraway island (much like in *The Mists of Avalon*). Once her training is completed she is mystically transported into a spice/herb store in the middle of a city, disguised in an old woman's body. She is not supposed to leave the store, touch anyone she helps, and must obey the spice's words at all costs. It is in this store that most of the story takes place.

(2) spice grinders can be found at I think it's called Glanvilles in Wadebridge but do not try to use a food processor as they go to fast and as they say movement causes friction and friction causes heat and heat causes burnt spices.

Chicken tikka masala

for 4 people

4 chicken supreme's skin off 1 Tbs chilli paste 1 Tbs garlic purée 1 Tbs ginger purée 1 tub natural yoghurt 1 tsp cayenne pepper zest + juice of 2 limes salt and pepper.

Dice the chicken into large chunks and add the rest of the marinade, leave overnight in the fridge.

Next day, heat a large frying pan to let it get hot, add just a touch of oil as the idea is to let the outside of the chicken burn to give you a mock tandoori taste.

Fry the chicken over a high heat for 3-4mins until slightly charred.

Add enough of the base sauce as to cover the chicken, turn down the heat and simmer 2 mins.

Next add 2 tbs garam masala, natural yoghurt (1 tub) and a splash of lemon juice. Depending on your taste you can add more chilli, ginger and garlic paste. Simmer for 5 mins and then finish with a hand full of chopped coriander.

Serve with rice and with my favourite Sag Aloo

1 bag of spinach boiled for 1 min 400g cooked and crushed potato diced onion butter 1 tsp garlic puree 1 Tbs garam masala

Fry the onion gently in the butter with the garlic until soft add the garam masala fry 30 seconds add spinach and potato stir whilst reheating season with salt and pepper and a squeeze of lemon.

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
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
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
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
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


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
