



Parish Council to finish the footpath to Trewetha

As everyone knows, the PC requested that Cornwall Council (CC) construct a highway's authority standard asphalt surfaced public footpath between Port Isaac and Trewetha but there is currently no CC budget for the work. Therefore, in order to provide pedestrians with an alternative to walking along Trewetha Lane and braving the traffic the PC has decided to create an unsurfaced path as a short term 'quick fix.' Terms have been discussed with the landowner for the grant of a right of way that will link up with the first phase through Port Isaac playground and the PC owned adjoining field, and a formal agreement will be prepared by the council's solicitor. The path will be fenced off and a gate constructed at the Trewetha end, although Cornwall Council highways engineers have warned that because of the contours of the land and discharge of stormwater from the adjoining road, sections of the path may become waterlogged during wet weather and a suggested gravel surface would not be suitable for push chairs.

We will continue to persuade Cornwall Council to construct a proper surfaced path. John Sproull has organised a petition and collected well over one hundred signatures, which is very encouraging particularly as only eleven people wrote to Cornwall Council supporting the footpath. In the meantime we will forge ahead with what the PC can afford.

On to the other footpath issue; the unsurfaced section of the Southwest Coast path between Cornwall Council's car park and the entrance to the Cliffside houses, which during periods of heavy rain becomes an impassible quagmire for visitors. The coastal path is not a Parish Council (PC) responsibility. It is outside the footpath maintenance partnership between Cornwall Council and St Endellion Parish Council and the PC has not been a party to the negotiations that have recently taken place between CC and private property owners - I am one - with rights of way over it.

The good news is that Cornwall Council receives funding from government agency Natural England to maintain the Southwest coastal path and has now confirmed that Natural England will fully fund drainage and surfacing works on this section using asphalt shavings. Confirmation of the date when the work will be carried out is awaited.

How often does your email inbox contain offers of a budgie, a gas fire and the complete Encyclopedia Britannica, all in one day? Since I joined the Wadebridge Freecycle group, these kinds of emails are an ordinary occurrence. It's a treat to open up your inbox and find people offering to give you stuff. For free!. Rob and I moved to Port Isaac in August and since we had a new home to fit out, someone recommended us joining Freecycle.

I wish I'd done it earlier. People regularly offer beds, TVs, fridges, and other things that could have saved us hundreds of pounds. The deal with Freecycle is that things are offered for free, and if you're interested you contact the person offering as soon as possible (I missed out on slate, on a compost bin, a SIM card, by being slow to send an email). Then you go and collect.

The inconvenient 40 boxes and packing materials which delivered our belongings to Port Isaac were picked up in two Freecycle loads by a guy from Wadebridge and a woman from St Mabyn. No need to keep them in our back room until recycling day. Meanwhile, their place in the back room has been taken by two bodyboards freecycled from a lady in Tintagel and a towel rail freecycled from a family in Bodmin.

I've posted some 'wants' too (a phone, curtain poles) - though nothing as daring as the girl in St Minver who said what was wanted was 'a man' (are you sure?) or the guys who asked for rabbit sexing advice... Any of you who have any of these to offer - or anything you are looking for to complete your home - can join Wadebridge Freecycle at http://groups.yahoo.com/group/Wadebridge_Freecycle/

Finally, as maybe the newest residents of the village, we wanted to thank people for another kind of Freecycle that operates here - all the advice, ladders, duvets, smiles, phone numbers and other help that people have lent or given us for free. A Post Office spokesman says ...

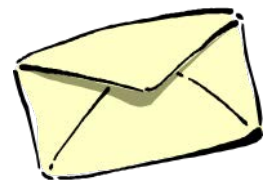

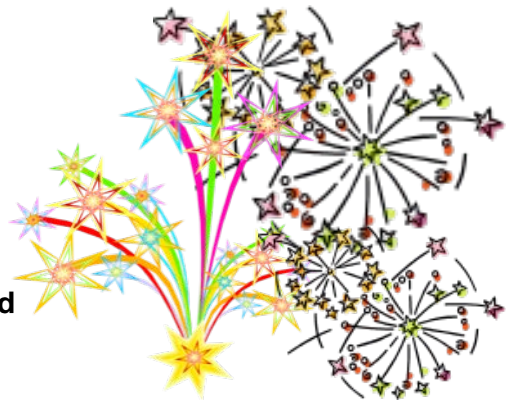
This year's Stride Cornwall, the 10km pink breast cancer walk for all the family takes place at Lanhydrock on Sunday November 15th.

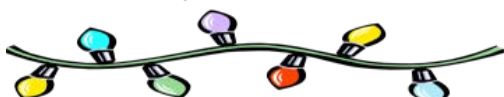
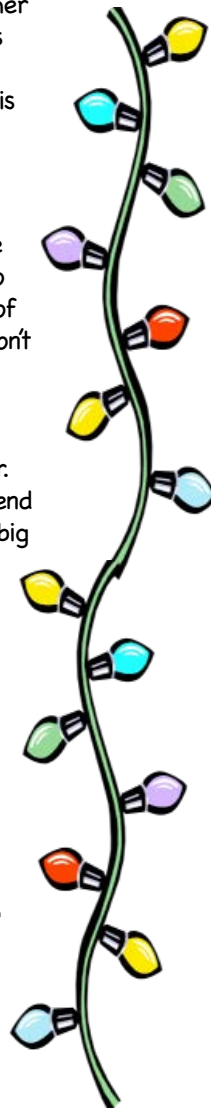
The Memory Tree will be put up in its usual spot on Little Hill.

RNLI rescues

During the past month or two our Inshore Lifeboat has been busy both with a full programme of Volunteer Crew Training Exercises as well as a number of rescues. A general overview shows seven sea-going exercises over a two month period, one of which involved Air to Sea and Sea to Air crew transfers arranged in conjunction with a helicopter from RAF Chivenor, essential practice for a day when it may be necessary to work in a combined rescue operation.

Rescue work has taken place on three occasions since July 16th when our crew successfully rescued a casualty from the surf at Barrats Nose. On August 7th the crew were called to carry out as search in the Beeny Cliff area near Boscastle Boscastle to investigate a sighting of a flare. This was followed on August 25th by a call out to the Boscastle area providing assistance to a capsized boat. This was carried out successfully and all passengers OK and the boat towed to Port Isaac. The most recent call on September 12th took crew members Nigel Sherratt, Nikki Bradbury and Tom Brown out to a capsized Kayak unable to make shore, three quarters of a mile off Bossiney. The casualty was taken into the Lifeboat and landed at Boscastle.

Additional to the Exercises and Rescues detailed above the crew gave an excellent display at Lifeboat Larks on August 23rd. It was much appreciated by the record number of spectators attending. Crew members also performed a moving Sea Service for the Stanyer family on September 13th, casting the Ashes and bouquet of flowers in memory of lifetime RNLI supporter Terry Stanyer's mother, Margaret - full story next month.

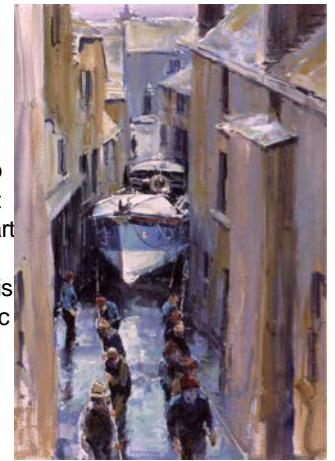

Not one, but two Christmas Cards from Port Isaac RNLI

With autumn sunshine and balmy days holding off the onset of winter, it may seem a little premature to start talking about Christmas. But with just over 12 weeks to go, and taking into consideration the high demand for last years Port Isaac RNLI Christmas cards, I thought we should let everyone know about the two great designs that have been donated by two well known artists Ray Balkwill and Roy Ritchie, now available as cards.

Many of you will no doubt have seen Ray Balkwill's original mixed media painting "Pulling Together", currently displayed in the Pottery. This renowned and popular Devon artist, who has given several presentations to the Port Isaac Art Society over the past two years and published a number of art related books, kindly donated this original painting to Port Isaac RNLI. It is based on the now famous photographic image of the historic Pulling Lifeboat "Richard and Sarah III" being recovered in Fore Street following a particularly arduous rescue in storm conditions back in the winter of 1911.



We have produced two sizes of special art reproductions and a Christmas card, size 6" x 8", from this image. The card has also been adopted by Sharps Brewery as part of their on going support to the RNLI. As well as the Christmas Greeting, there is a further illustration inside the card showing the Pulling Lifeboat taking part in the rescue operation and the back of the card gives details about the artist and a history of Port Isaac Lifeboat Station dating back to 1868. This card is also available with a blank double page spread inside.

In addition draw tickets are currently available to win this valuable painting at the RNLI Christmas Market on Saturday November 28th in the Village Hall.



Our second card is available in two sizes, 6" x 8" and a smaller 6" X 4". It shows a wonderful Christmas scene created by the well known New Polzeath artist Roy Ritchie. It shows snow dusted cottages and glowing windows of the village with carol singers around the tree outside the RNLI store house on the

Platt, not forgetting Father Christmas flying overhead in a bright moonlight sky - a scene very familiar with the residents of Port Isaac over the years as they wend their way home from Christmas Eve celebrations! The back cover carries a photograph and profile of this fine artist.

The original painting caught the eye of Doc Martin star, Martin Clunes whilst filming here. Martin signed a limited edition with best wishes from himself and the Doc Martin Crew to Port Isaac and the RNLI

Lots of ideas for Playing Fields

Andy Penny called this Public Meeting to give the local community a chance to have their say about how the Playing Field and the second field should be used in the future. It was a chance for local people to make their views heard and over 18 local people turned up during the evening to do just this. The suggestions made are listed below:

- Parking seemed to be the topic of most interest. It was pointed out that the playing field has a restrictive covenant on it that parking should be limited to those taking part in activities on the area. However, most people thought attempts should be made to change this as some sort of parking could make money to fund other activities on the area. (*Ed: I'm guessing that this should be possible taking into account there were plans to build houses up there at one time and there has been public parking there during the summer*)
- A multi-surface area was suggested, one that could include facilities for farmer's markets, car boots etc. In addition, the Youth Group would like a hard court area for netball, basketball, five-a-side football etc.
- Another Youth Group suggestion was a Zip Wire.
- A timber building for use by the Youth Group.
- Above building to have external toilets and storage facilities for community groups.
- Cricket nets and golf driving nets.
- Football pitch – full or junior size. Would a full size pitch attract a village team or would it just be a waste of space?
- A skateboard half pipe – would it be used enough taking into account how little the existing skateboard area has been used?
- An asphalt track around the perimeter for jogging.
- Picnic areas with plenty of seating and flowers in planted areas.
- A circular walk.

It was pointed out that the recycling bins from the main car park could be relocated here. This would help with funding from Cornwall Council who would also be asked to look again at road safety at the entrance.

Andy made it clear just how big this project is and felt it would help if different projects could be led by different groups who could then work on grant applications etc.

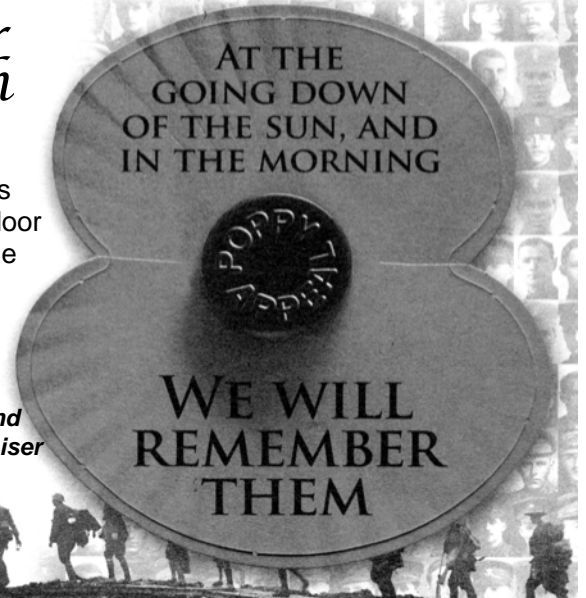

Taking things for granted ...

Last month I wrote about our rescue by the Royal Navy from the Island on South Georgia (Sub Antarctic) and what a crazy time we experienced once back in the UK. Both Cindy and myself were convinced the media had made a meal of the fact that us two girls, thousands of miles away from civilization, had experienced no end of hardship from the 350 Argentinians who had taken us prisoner. But it really wasn't the case and we were so lucky.

After the chaos of radio and television interviews, Cindy and I got down to completing the book we had started to write in the Falkland Islands and finished on South Georgia. We then had to go through the process of meetings with the editors and publishers, plus deciding on the photographs we wanted to use. Once this was completed in 1983, we had to put up with the rounds of appearances including our highlight, being invited onto Desert Islands Discs which in those days was presented by Roy Plumley. Well, that was an experience. We were allowed to choose four records each. One of mine was an Elvis record. I was never allowed to take an Elvis cassette (no CDs in those days) on our trips! We were only meant to take for 40 minutes to record the programme. Come three hours later we were still there, having drunk a lot of wine thanks to the BBC and we had a riot!

Once all this hard work, trying to be smart and polite (not my strong point) was over we then had to complete all the films that we had made on South Georgia, which then went out on air to much acclaim. Sadly, Cindy and I didn't get any money for this, because we were under contract to ITV. However, when one of the films sold to the USA we were flown first class to the States and had three weeks of publicity rounds. Quite exhausting, but actually so exciting and I did love being so spoilt. Nothing was too much trouble, and we had everything we requested. Those were the days.

On our return, it was back to the real life and attempting to get ready for our next trip, which was to be Ascension Island. This was the island that we stopped off at following our return from South Georgia back to the UK. This was to be very different ballgame. Instead of minus 35 degrees, we were to experience 100% humidity and 90 degrees heat. This was going to test us up to the limit, and to be honest, I wasn't that much looking forward to it.

I will tell you more about it next month. It actually turned out to be a fantastic thirteen months on this tiny island and I wouldn't have missed it for anything. Again, my motto - never take anything for granted. We never know what is round the corner.

Dan Rogerson, our local MP, writes ...

Parliament's summer recess is nearing its end and the political season is again well underway. I've just returned from our party conference in Bournemouth, and I promised in my last article to give you a brief run-down of the issues we covered.

Our focus was on three things: first, rebalancing the tax system, so that you get the first £10,000 of your income tax free – a big increase in the present allowance, which would lift four million people on low incomes or pensions out of tax altogether and give a big annual boost to struggling families; secondly, providing green jobs and new infrastructure to rebuild our economy and protect our environment; thirdly, cleaning up politics – taking the big money influence out of our political system, and introducing fair votes, so that no matter whom you vote for, in what part of the country, your voice counts. Meanwhile, the bulk of my time over the past four weeks has been spent visiting every parish in the constituency. I'm writing this just after I spent an afternoon in Port Isaac, and naturally I found a great many people who read *Trio*, and who read this column. Of course, the most vexed issue on the doorstep is that of car-parking. As we emerge from another congested summer, people are rightly asking what can be done to relieve the pressure. Unfortunately there are no easy answers, since space is so limited, but I'm always happy to make representations to the Council if residents have new ideas about a remedy.

As I go round to each village and town, I've also been keen to introduce people to my 'fair deal' campaigns on six important areas: council tax, water rates, education, housing, farming and rural services. In all these matters, Cornwall has been let down for far too long: Council Tax hitting the poorest hardest; water rates the highest in the country; our schools underfunded compared to other parts of the country; second homes dominating – and then evacuating – our villages; our farmers' livelihoods jeopardised by Bovine TB and rural services like job centres and post offices always the first for the ministerial chop. I've campaigned on these issues throughout my time in Parliament – and before that too – but now I want to build their profile with support from residents all over Cornwall. I'd be delighted if people from St Endellion parish can tell me their priorities and show their backing for change. To do so, just visit my website, where you can sign petitions on all the issues I've mentioned and take my online survey. When Parliament reconvenes, I'll be seeking a debate in the House of Commons so that Ministers have to answer the tough questions about their neglect of rural areas like ours. And as ever, I want to hear from you if there's any other issue you want me to raise on your behalf.

Recycling day changes to Wednesday

From November our fortnightly recycling day is due to change to a Wednesday, the first one being on November 4th. Leaflets will be distributed to everyone during October and recycling days will continue to be included in the Diary Dates section of *Trio* (back page). No other changes will be made to our recycling system; the same materials will still be collected in the same blue, red and clear bags and these bags will need to be out by 7.00am on collection day.

The reason for these changes is that more efficient recycling rounds for East Cornwall (our area) have been developed with the collection contractor, SITA UK. It will mean less fuel is used, so reducing the carbon footprint of the collections.

This change will not affect normal refuse garden waste collection days. These will remain the same.

In the meantime, you can view a pdf version of the recycling leaflet and calendar for our area online at www.cornwall.gov.uk

Just for information, in 2008/09, Cornwall produced 289,626 tonnes of household waste. Of this 24.55% was recycled and 11.68% composted – that's a total of 36.23% recycling in Cornwall. The remaining household waste was disposed of in landfill. These figures might seem high but in Cornwall the amount of waste per head of the population is falling; in 2008/09 it fell 3.74% to 544kg per person.



By the time I next write here, the "who's up, who's down" hysteria of the party conference season will be out of the way, and MPs will finally be back in Westminster. In the first week, I am handling the *Local Democracy, Economic Development and Construction Bill*, which returns to the floor of the House of Commons for consideration after a period in Committee. Unfortunately, the Bill seems to do little to improve local democracy, engender economic development or assist the construction industry. But I'll report back on our debate next month, and perhaps give some more details on the issues involved.

St Endellion Climate Friendly Parish

The project this month has been continuing to work on possible grant applications for projects in the parish and the monthly steering group meeting covered a lot of ground.

We had a visitor from Pensilva Village Green, Paddy Young. Paddy gave a brief background to the project he is representing. It began with opposition to a large 1.7 Megawatt wind turbine, which was proposed to be erected at Pensilva. This was originally turned down, but has been given the go-ahead on appeal. While they continue to oppose it, they are also working on making Pensilva a Green Village, which is why he attended. He said they have already many good things going, like the renewable energy projects in Upton Cross School (<http://www.upton-cross.cornwall.sch.uk/>) and it is hoped we can link up with them.

Grants for community wide projects. We discussed possible funding for this, and we are still a bit in the dark about possibilities, but Hilary Gooch, from Cornwall Council, who was at the meeting gave us some very useful information. The main source of funding is likely to be the Low Carbon Buildings Programme, which can then be used for match funding with, for example EON. There are other sources, e.g. the proceeds of the Landfill Tax. Paddy Young reported that in their area, the National Trust had funds from this which are being used to develop a hydro generation scheme. We thought we could look for the location of old water mill wheels in the Parish and perhaps do a feasibility study, as there is funding for such work. Also a group called the East Cornwall Local Action Group has some funds.

Farming is an area where there are funding opportunities and Mark Symons reported he had attended an excellent session by Business Forward <http://www.businessforward.org.uk/index.php> which provided him, and about 15 other farmers, some from our Parish, with information about grants for sustainable farming practices. The Cornwall Agricultural Council are exploring a variety of environmental ideas and may be a source of advice. <http://www.cornwallac.org/>

Port Isaac School. As noted above, Upton Cross school has some sustainable developments, and St Kew Highway school has installed some renewable energy generation. Two of the governors of Port Isaac School are members of the group and the Climate Friendly Parish project is looking for ways to support them. Again there seem to be funds available.

We intend to link up again with Western Greyhound and to see if we can have a system to get new timetables to the holiday lets and retail outlets in the Parish to encourage bus usage.

PACT

Despite a low attendance, PC Malcolm Taylor and his colleagues were not deterred. He was joined by PCSO Claire Drennan, Geoff Townsend from the West Country Housing Association and Jason Drew from the Public Health Department of Cornwall Council (also responsible for the Dog Warden Service).

PC Taylor's main message was that this was a chance for the local community to have their voice heard aired. Those present raised their concerns over various matters and from these, four major issues were highlighted. These issues were then voted on by those attending as follows:

Joint first place: **Drug and drink related issues in the parish**

Second: **Traffic congestion in Port Isaac**

Third: **Footpath to Trewetha**

The plan is that the police go away and come up with an action plan for these problems and report back to the local community. In the meantime, we were assured that they would give immediate Police support for the footpath to Trewetha and for the traffic problems and that drink and drug related issues are being dealt with as they arise. 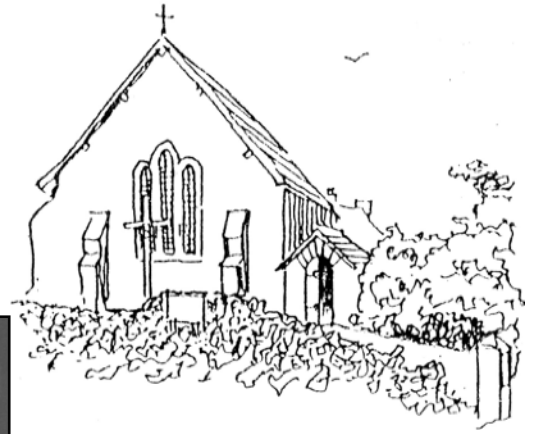

the Parish Clerk's report

PUBLIC DISCUSSION

Mr Philp informed the council that he had received 15 letters from residents of Silvershell Road re parking. Representing the residents of Silvershell Road Mr Green asked if there was any progress with the parking problem in village, and what is going to happen.

Mrs B Bell replied that even though the Parish Council is not the parking authority, we were trying to alleviate the situation and had opened up the playing field for parking this year. Mr Green informed the council that people tend to park in Silvershell and Mayfield Road first as they know they do not have to pay. He also felt that residents parking was needed as the roads were completely blocked. He informed the council that people staying in holiday cottages are told there is free parking in Silvershell Road.

Martin Bell commented that if people wanted Residents Parking everyone in the road would have to agree and there will be cost involved. He spoke of a similar scheme that was tried in Fowey or Falmouth, when County Council made the draft order the majority of residents opposed it. Cornwall council will not do it for free. Mrs Bell agreed to put this item on the next agenda. The council will pass on these concerns and the letters to Cornwall Council.

Mr Green asked why local farmers had not been taken up on their offer of a park and ride. Mrs B Bell replied that the farmer has yet to submit an application for his scheme, which would be supported by the Parish Council. He was informed that when we complete the footpath from Trewetha this scheme may become more viable. Mrs Bell informed Mr Green that there was a meeting regarding the Playing Field being held at the village hall on the 28th September between 6-9pm. With the increased space and usage it is hoped that provision will be made for a multi purpose area that could also be used for parking.

John Sproull informed the council he was at the meeting to find out about the footpath to Trewetha. He had a petition in support of the completion of the path. The petition had 100 signatures. Mr Bell informed Mr Sproull that Cornwall Council had nothing in this year budget for the project, they were going to put something forward in next year budget, and try to obtain a EU grant, for the remainder. However there has been insignificant evidence of strong public support as they had only received 11 letters and 1 was in opposition. It was felt that the petition was encouraging. Mr Sproull agreed to obtain more signatures and then send a copy to CC and copy it to the clerk.

Mrs Peggy Haines raised concerns about a big dinghy blocking the road in Trelights. Other issues in Trelights related to access to Green Lane, hedge cutting and housing.

Allotment holders at the meeting expressed concerns over their security of tenure, at present the council is trying to negotiate a suitable fee for lifting the restrictive covenant on the new cemetery/allotment land.

PCSO REPORT

PCSO Claire Drennan informed the council that she had recently held a PACT meeting in Port Isaac and the top priority for Port Isaac was the footpath to Trewetha. She informed the council that the Police were looking at accident stats and would present them to Cornwall Council Highways.

PCSO C Drennan gave the following Summer Crime Report. In June 2008 there were 0 Crimes, in June 2009 there were 10 crimes, 1 burglary at St Endellion, 4 thefts (1 at St Endellion, 2 at Port Gavere, 1 at Fore Street). 5 Criminal Damage (1 at St Endellion, 2 at Fore Street, 2 at New Road). In July 2008 there were 5 crimes, in July 2009 there were 5 crimes, 2 criminal damage (1 at Trelights, 1 at Fore Street). 1 theft at Port Gaverne, 1 alcohol related incident at Port Isaac. 1 fraud at Trelights. In August 2008 there were 2 crimes in August 2009 there were 5 crimes. 3 assaults 1 at Trelights, 1 at Port Gaverne and 1 at Port Isaac. 1 criminal damage at Port Gaverne. 1 Theft at Port Gaverne.

PCSO Drennan informed the council that the 3 top priorities for Port Isaac that came out of the PACT meeting were:- 1) The Footpath to Trewetha, 2) Traffic in Fore Street, 3) Drug and alcohol related issues

PCSO Drennan informed the council that they were going to set up a Pub Watch scheme working with licence holders to ban trouble makers from all licensed premises. The

scheme has worked well in Wadebridge and Padstow.

PLANNING APPLICATIONS AND NOTICES

Application 2009/00346 Application for Listed Building Consent for the conversion of existing store for use as a farm office with annexe accommodation above. Mr R Sloman, Roscarrock Maner Farm, Port Isaac. Cornwall Council APPROVED this application.

CHAIRMANS REPORT

Mrs Bell informed the Council that the pathway and hedges behind Mayfield Close has been cut back by the housing department. She had also spoken to Joan Murray and there were problems with garden waste tipping at the steps at Mayfield, the concrete steps are also deteriorating. Mr B Nicholls would like the ownership of the parcel of land behind Mayfield investigated and asked that this be put on next agenda.

Mrs Bell informed the council that she had received a message today from David Wood, from Cornwall Council regarding the cliff path from car park. They are going to pave the Cliff path at their own expense, but first they have to sort out the legal situation.

GULL GUARDS

The Parish Council has bought two Gull Guards as a trial to be placed in a rubbish collection area along Fore Street.

PICNIC BENCHES

The Parish Council have agreed to buy 2 new picnic tables for playing fields.

FOOTPATH TO TREWETHA

In light of the recent Cornwall Council statement to *Trio* which states there is no funding to progress this scheme, the Parish council have agreed to continue with the original footpath idea (i.e. unpaved footpath to Trewetha).

CEMETERY

The Parish Council have agreed to allow Byron to reserve a grave next to the tree in the new cemetery. This is an exception and other future requests to reserve grave sites will not be granted.

FOOTPATH TO CHURCH HILL

The Parish Council has written to Cornwall Council informing them of the state of this footpath and asked for a site meeting.

Websites of the month

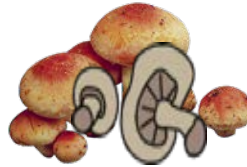


As Autumn arrives, with the lovely Indian Summer and so many blackberries and other wild fruits to enjoy, I thought we could go for some of the websites which look at what you can eat from the countryside. I should add a get-out clause here, that anything you try, you need to be really sure it is OK, and don't rely on websites (or this column for that matter). There are some species that are very edible, but others which are very similar-looking, are not. So be warned!

So for a fun start I would go to the website of the Wild Man of food, Fergus Drennan, <http://www.wildmanwildfood.com/>. He describes himself as a forager extraordinaire, and foraging is the act of looking or searching for food or provisions. There is a blog, which shows his progress over the year, and the difficulties and triumphs he achieves. Some of it is not for the squeamish, like the 'roadkill' he sometimes eats. But it is a fascinating read. The legal issues surrounding foraging are well covered, as you don't want to be stealing from anyone and there is a good guide to what you can and can't, should and shouldn't do. The website also has some lovely recipes – for example nettle and wild garlic soup. He also describes something I hadn't heard of before, Leaf Curd. Doesn't sound your cup of tea? Apparently it is really good, and have a look here for details http://www.leaforlife.org/PAGES/leaf_concentrate.htm.

You can also sign up for courses in all this, but all his seem to be full up – very popular apparently. He gives links to others though, and there may be some locally which I don't know about.

There is a very good section on mushrooms and also seaweed and there is a link to a lovely mushroom website from here <http://www.rogersmushrooms.com/> which used to be restricted, but now it is available for free.



From one website (<http://www.countrylovers.co.uk/wildfoodjj/>) you can download a free book on this subject called www.countrylovers.co.uk/wildfoodjj/fastfood.pdf

One of my favourite plants is Alexanders as it grows all over the place here in North Cornwall. It was apparently introduced into the UK by the Romans. The whole plant can be used in different ways and it has a peppery celery-like taste. Sadly it is one which can be confused with a poisonous species so do be careful. This website <http://tinyurl.com/ydqg98d> gives you all the details.

The above rambles put me in mind of introduced species and how some turn out to be OK, like the Alexanders, but some not so nice. There are many we are familiar with, like the Grey Squirrel, some are less well known and some are not here yet! One possibly on its way to us is the Asian predatory hornet (see <http://tinyurl.com/y8jeu9f>)

The good news is they don't like heavy rain, and if we get lots of wet Summers we will be OK. But if they do come, they unfortunately eat bees. So if the bees don't get got by one of the other hazards facing them, they may be gobbled up by this hungry hornet. Doesn't sound too nice.

One species with a very mixed press is one of my favourites. When I stay with my sister in Ealing, in London they fly around in quite large groups. These are mostly parakeets, and you can read all about them here <http://news.bbc.co.uk/1/low/education/3869815.stm>

Of course, locally we have our stick insects which live wild in and around the Parish. I have seen them two years running in the garden, and folks in Port Isaac see them very regularly and you can read Malcolm Lees account of them (he is big in stick insects among other things!) on the Cornwall and Isles of Scilly, Environmental Records Centre website www.ercis.co.uk/Resources/ERCCIS/stickinsectspdf.pdf . Malcolm also has some lovely photographs of visiting species which have come to Port Gaverne on his Gull Rock site <http://www.gullrock-port-gaverne.co.uk/cornish-fauna.php>

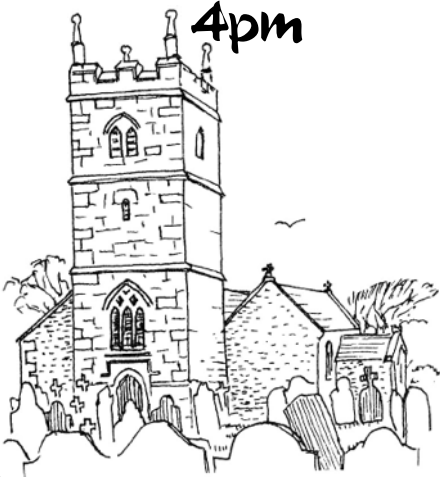

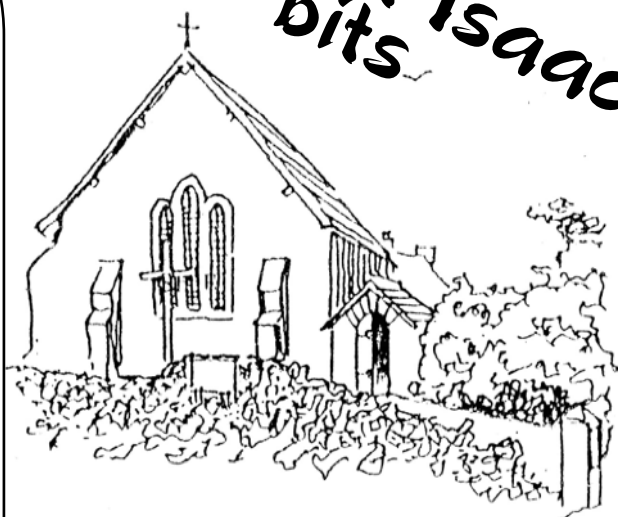

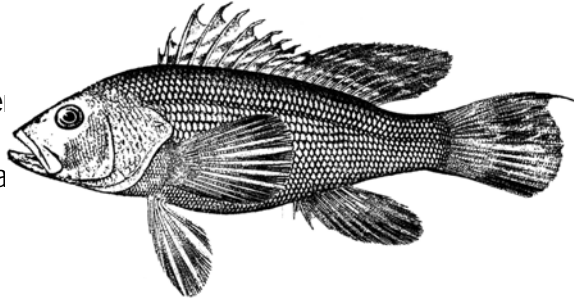
Martin from The Mote talks about salting!

Salting food has been a method of preserving food throughout the ages, although in today's modern age of fridges and freezers seems to have become forgotten. Here is a recipe based around Gravadlax, the Scandinavian recipe for salmon, although I would recommend that you try it with sea bass.



Salting mix for one side of salmon or two sides of sea bass

6 juniper berries
6 whole star anise
2 tablespoons fennel seeds
1 teaspoon whole black pepper
500g coarse sea salt
2 tablespoons granulated sugar
½ lemon, roughly chopped



First catch your bass.

It should then be filleted, scaled and pin boned (your fishmonger will do this for you if you ask).

Place the juniper berries, star anise, fennel and peppercorns into a food processor with 1 tablespoon of salt. Pulse the mixture to break up the spice.

Add the rest of the ingredients and pulse for 1 minute until the lemon is broken up and you have a well mixed coarse mixture.

Scatter a 1 cm layer of the salt into a high-sided container that can fit into your fridge.

Place the pieces of fish side by side on the salt and then cover with a layer of salt mix. Repeat until all your fish is covered - you might need to cut the fish so that it is all the same size, which is important as to let the fish salt at the same time.

Cover with cling film and leave in the fridge for 8-12 hours. The fish will become hard and pale in colour.

Rinse off the excess of salt under cold water. Next soak the fish in water for 10 minutes. Then change the water. Repeat this twice.

To finish

freshly ground pepper
zest of a lemon
handful of freshly chopped dill.

Place the fish on a clean chopping board. With a thin sharp knife cut off slices horizontally, as thinly as possible. Use a gentle sawing motion and let the knife do the work.

Lay the fish slices on a double layer of cling film. Sprinkle with dill, lemon zest and pepper. Cover with more cling film and gently roll to make all the fish the same size.

Remove the cling film and serve try it with a peppery rocket salad and a horseradish crème fraise.

Also I would like to raise a glass to Keith Floyd who, so I'm told, worked at some stage at the Wheelhouse Restaurant. Whether this is true or not I don't know.

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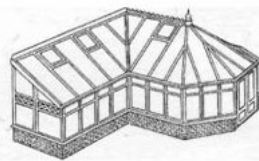
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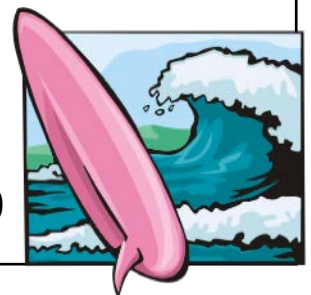
