

Exciting Start to St Endellion Centre

The first phase of an exciting project to develop St Endellion as a centre for artistic and spiritual expression began recently when builders started work on the conversion of a stone barn at Glebe Farm, St Endellion, to provide accommodation for about 18 people. The work will be completed by the middle of March next year, before the arrival of participants in the St Endellion Easter Music Festival.

Endelienta, the body comprising representatives of the three groups with a direct interest in the project, namely the St Endellion Festivals Trust, St Endellion Parochial Church Council and the diocese of Truro, intends to develop the buildings around St Endellion Church. The vision is not only to provide the Music Festivals with the outstanding home that they deserve but also to create a well-appointed community facility that enables a year-round arts programme linked to retreats and courses as well as providing the local area with valuable rehearsal and meeting facilities.

Endelienta is seeking to raise £1.5 million in order to realise this vision and to provide accommodation and facilities for young musicians and youth groups; adaptable space for rehearsals, workshops and recordings; working capital necessary to market and administer the 'campus' in the early years; and a Bursary Fund to enable young people,

# End of St Endellion allotments

t our last meeting, the Parish Council regrettably had to serve notice on the four St Endellion allotment holders. It became apparent soon after I was elected Chair that there were problems with use of this land as allotments as it had been purchased as a cemetery from the Diocese of Truro. We also had a problem with the water supply.

After nearly two years of negotiations with the Diocese, who sought the reimbursement of legal and surveyors costs plus a one-off payment to the Diocese for the grant of a waiver of a restrictive covenant attached to the cemetery land for a four-year period only, we had not resolved this issue. At no time did I give an assurance that negotiations had resolved this situation as clearly they had not: this is on public record.

To install an allotment water supply required a connection to the water main on the south side of the B3314, which would have involved its partial closure to traffic and, I understand, a cost of thousands of pounds. These costs would have been borne largely by our Council Tax precept payers, which the Parish Council was not prepared to sanction.

After complaints to the parish council from Trelights residents about the untidiness of the allotments, an inspection revealed that only one allotment was being maintained. As this allotment was rented by my nephew I had to abstain from the vote, but I supported the resolution to serve notice according to the written agreement entered into by allotment holders. All councillors regret that this action had to be taken but the attitude of the Diocese and the cost of providing the water supply left us with no choice.

always has a great festive atmosphere of past times set in this fine historic building and presents an opportunity to browse around the house itself.

Whilst talking of our festive plans we should keep in mind, following the long established service of the Institution, our volunteer lifeboat crews are always there on 24 hour call, 365 days of the year around the country. Our charities lifeboats launched on average 42 times every day in June, July and August - an increase of 68% on the annual daily average. HM Coastguard requested lifeboats to launch 3,926 times and lifeguards responded to 12,911 incidents -rescues, first aid, lost and found children - across 152 of the UK's busiest beaches, a 16% increase on the same period last year.

The busiest RNLI lifeboat station was Tower on the River Thames, launching 179 times over the summer. The busiest RNLI coastal lifeboat stations were Poole, Dorset, with 79 launches, Southend-on-Sea, Essex with 66 launches, and Eastbourne, Sussex, where the volunteer lifeboat launched 56 times. True dedication to a voluntary service.

# Port Isaac is the fifth most Sustainable Village of the Year 2010 in Cornwall!

It's official! There were eight short-listed entries for the Cornwall Rural Community Council & SITA UK competition, half of them from North Cornwall – Blisland, St Breward, St Merryn and us. The others were Upton Cross (NE of Liskeard), Ladock/Grampound Road, Illogan and Fowey (surely that's a town!).

A couple were 'Highly Commended' and the other six were all 'incredibly close', according to the judges. We did well on local economy, village amenities and plans for the future, but were slightly weaker on buzz factor (rather a subjective thing to measure?) and 'Renewable Energy and Reducing Environmental Impact'- and that's our Climate Friendly challenge!

What did we win? Well, there was not a lousy t-shirt in sight! There was however a £200 cheque for the Climate Friendly Parish group who entered the village into the competition and, of course, a certificate (to add to our collection!). There was also a helpful report from the judges, taken together with their comments at the presentation.

Then there was a solar powered torch, which sounds rather like a contradiction in terms. However, if you heard the last of that wonderful BBC Radio 4 series, 'A History of the World in 100 Objects', you will know exactly what it is. Made in China, it consists of a small solarpowered photovoltaic panel, in three parts, which can turn energy from the sun (light and heat) into electricity, which is then stored in a rechargeable battery. This can, in turn, be used to power the torch, to charge up a mobile phone or any one of a whole lot of other things. The

whole device is reckoned by the Director of the British Museum to be one of the most significant pieces of equipment of the present day. This is certainly true, particularly in places where there is no mains electricity, but a reasonable amount of daylight.

Lastly, we received some sapling trees, which were gifted by the Tregothnan Estate and which we hope will form a really useful long-term asset in the development of the playing fields. They include some Sessile Oak (Quercus Robor) and a few of each of Dawn Redwood (Metasequoia Glyptostroboides) and Swamp Cypress (Toxodium Distichum). The trees are being looked after for the moment but will soon be planted on the playing fields in the places where they will need to be as the development takes shape. This will be in consultation with the Parish Council, Mor Design Ltd (the partnership who've drawn up the plans for the development) and the Woodland Trust. The tree planting will take place as soon as the details can be settled; look out for announcements of the date and see you then ... bring a spade!

# Dan Rogerson, our local MP - writes ..

ust over two weeks ago the country learned the details of the long awaited Comprehensive Spending Review. The priority and focus was inevitably to tackle the deficit and spread the burden as fairly as is possible so that vital services such as the NHS and our education system can be protected. As well as continuing to invest money in our schools and healthcare system we need to stimulate economic recovery and growth. We inherited the largest structural deficit in Europe; as a country we were paying back £120million per day for debt interest payments alone and whilst there are undoubtedly very difficult times ahead, what is needed is a clear plan for dealing with it and reducing this debt. I am pleased that the Spending Review contained proposals to curb the overspending and waste that has been allowed to clog up Whitehall for too long and I also welcome the fact that the welfare system will be simplified, helping people back into work, removing poverty traps and not allowing people to defraud the system. I hope that in time we will be able to increase investment in our public services although even with these cutbacks the Government will still be spending almost £7billion a year. These measures will inevitably affect us here in Cornwall and as I meet with various organisations and public bodies, I expect this to be at the tope of the agenda.

Last week I met with Paul Roberts, the Chief Executive of Plymouth Hospitals Trust, at Derriford and discussed the implications of the spending review as well as new ways the Trust will be working with GPs under proposals contained in the NHS White Paper. We meet several times a year and I always take forward those issues that constituents raise with me with regards to health matters.

I have also been concerned about the possibility of Camelford Leisure Centre closing. I have written to the Council to ask them to ensure they consider all the factors before taking a decision but at a meeting held in Camelford by residents to discuss the issue, it became apparent that the decision may already have been made. I do understand that efficiency savings need to be made but if this facility were to close, the nearest alternatives are over fifteen miles away and tricky to get to without the use of a car.

In last month's *Trio*, I wrote about the Parliamentary Voting Systems and Constituencies Bill and outlined my concerns about the possibility of new boundaries which would mean crossing the Cornish border. This Bill is now being debated in Parliament and I have put my name to amendments that attempt to ensure that this will not be allowed to happen.

I have been working with the Keep Cornwall Whole group who have been very active in recent weeks and holding rallies in order to raise awareness. Whilst I am in favour of the number of MPs being reduced as a way of ensuring that Parliament works more efficiently and cost-effectively, I think it is completely unreasonable to assume that the only way this can be achieved is by fracturing historic borders. Along with the other Cornish MPs, I recently went to No 10 to meet with the Prime Minister to outline our concerns. I am also working with colleagues in the House of Lords as we hope to

This message relates mainly to second home owners, but many of us live next door to properties that are not permanently occupied and the thieves are not only targeting unoccupied houses - yours could be the next property to be burgled. If you see anything suspicious, contact the police on 08452 777 444 or Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111.

Opportunist thieves are all too aware of the signs when people are away or out. Please ensure that you lock doors and close windows when you leave your property. Make sure that all ladders/steps are kept securely, not just left lying in the garden. When you go away, please ensure that you tell someone in order for them to report any unusual incidents on 08452 777 444.

So, this is a vital time for the Royal British Legion - to raise enough money to carry out their tasks throughout the year without letting any one down. I therefore ask for your


that we are all going through tough times financially. However, the RBL's commitment is vital and it is our way of showing how grateful we are to all those who have fought so bravely.



# Cooking with Martin

With autumn well and truly upon us I thought that I would do some recipes featuring apples that are in season right

now after a bumper harvest this year.

### Apple pie



12oz flour
6oz margarine
3 oz castor sugar
1 egg
3lb cooking apples
caster sugar
ground cinnamon
powdered ginger



For the pastry, mix the flour, margarine and caster sugar in a food processor by pulsing until it is the texture of fine breadcrumbs. Then crack in the egg again pulse it so that it just starts coming together, you might have to add a little splash of water) next turn it out and gently work into a smooth ball. Cut into two pieces and put it into the fridge to rest.

Next peel your apples and put into a bowl of cold water with a splash of lemon juice to stop them going brown whilst you peel the rest.

Roll out the first piece of pastry into a round using a large deep wide rimmed 12" plate as a guide to the size, roll the pastry quite thin as it is not going to be blind baked. Now line the plate with the pastry and trim around the edges with a knife. Place the plate in the fridge whilst you prepare the filling.

Roughly chop up the apples and put into a bowl now season with sugar, cinnamon and ginger, mix well to coat all the apples and then taste, the apples will taste slightly bitter but the sugar and spices should cut through.

Roll out the second piece of pastry this time make sure that it's about 2" wider than the plate. Pile the apples into the centre of the pastry lined plate keeping the edges free. Brush the outside edge with a bit of water and then gently cover the pie with the pastry seal the edges and trim the sides again with a knife, crimp the around the edge of the pie. Brush with egg wash (1 egg yolk mixed with a little milk) and dust with a handful of caster sugar. You can use the pastry trimmings to garnish the pie. Then bake for 35 to 40 minutes at 180°C turning half way through cooking if, like my oven, yours has hot spots! Serve with a big pot of clotted cream yum!

### Toffee apples

200mls of water 300g caster sugar 6 apples on sticks

Pour the water into a saucepan with the caster sugar. Stir with a spoon to mix and then leave on a low heat until the sugar has dissolved.

Now turn up the heat and cook the sugar to a golden caramel. During this time you might find some of the sugar crystallizing at the side of the pan. If so, wash it away with a pastry brush dipped in cold water.

Once at a golden brown stage take off the heat and very carefully coat the apples in the caramel and place on a oiled tray to cool.

**Preparing for Marriage?** 

O ne of the most successful initiatives of the North Cornwall Cluster of Churches has been the introduction of marriage preparation days.

No longer does preparation for marriage consist of a couple being ushered into the Vicar's study for a half-hour chat; now, thanks to the knowledge, expertise and hard work of a

married couple from St Minver, who attend St Endellion Church, couples have the opportunity to explore many aspects of marriage with each other, to meet other couples on the brink of marriage, and also to get to know other members of the church.

It was in 2008 that David and Jenny Coltart held the first marriage preparation day for those being married that year in the churches of St Enodoc, St Minver, St Michael's, Porthilly, St Endellion, St Kew or St Peter's, Port Isaac, and since then 69 couples have taken part in what has proved to be a most enjoyable as well as helpful experience.

Jenny Coltart is Branch Leader of the Mothers Union in St Endellion, St Minver, Port Isaac and St Kew and David Coltart is chairman of Relate Cornwall and chief executive of Explore, a national educational charity which works with young people to help them with relationships including those leading to marriage.

Held mainly in the Perceval Institute, St Minver and occasionally in St Endellion Church Hall, each day runs from 9.30am until 3.00pm. The programme, which is professionally presented through power-point slides, questionnaires and discussion, includes exploring relationships and commitment, recognising difference, understanding the marriage service and managing conflict. As well as Jenny and David, the local clergy who will be marrying the couples also attend and contribute, as sometimes do churchwardens, and Jane Pain, the churches' wedding administrator, while embers of the Mothers Union help with serving drinks and lunches, the latter provided by the couples attending.

After some initial uncertainty about what was involved, word soon got around that marriage preparation was enjoyable as well as valuable; feedback from couples who've attended has been very positive and the days have become increasingly popular. There were only two the first year, but there were four days in 2009 and five this year.



Clearly this has entailed a huge commitment by David and Jenny and they would welcome hearing from other married couples, especially younger ones, who might be interested in sharing in this work.

They plan to hold a session later this year in the Perceval Institute to explain what they do to anyone who is either interested, or, who might be willing to help. Meanwhile, you can contact them to find out more on 01208 862742.

### Websites of the Month

I thought this month's websites could focus around the celebrations that happen around this time - Allantide, Halloween and Bonfire Night.

The Cornish festival of Allantide (Cornish Calan Gwaf or Nos Calan Gwaf) http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Allantide has been traditionally celebrated on October 31st. As with the other celtic festivals it marked the end of harvest and while it has its origins in pre-Christian times, the name comes from St Allen or Arlen, a Cornish Saint and what is know about him and the parish named after him can be found here http://homepages.tesco.net/~k.wasley/Allen.htm. Some have seen a similarity in the name Allantide and Halloween and that they are the same festival both derived originally from the Celtic New Year. On the http://wapedia.mobi/en/Allantide there are two nice descriptions from books published at the turn of the last century and the references can be found on the website as well.

"The shops in Penzance would display Allan apples, which were highly polished large apples. On the day itself, these apples were given as gifts to each member of the family as a token of good luck. Older girls would place these apples under their pillows and hope to dream of the person whom they would one day marry. A local game is also recorded where two pieces of wood were nailed together in the shape of a cross. It was then suspended with 4 candles on each outcrop of the cross shape. Allan apples would then be suspended under the cross. The goal of the game was to catch the apples in your mouth, with hot wax being the penalty for slowness or inaccuracy."

"The ancient custom of providing children with a large apple on Allhallows-eve is still observed, to a great extent, at St Ives. "Allan-day," as it is called, is the day of days to hundreds' of children, who would deem it a great misfortune were they to go to bed on "Allan-night" without the time-honoured Allan apple to hide beneath their pillows. A quantity of large apples are thus disposed of the sale of which is dignified by the term Allan Market."

They also say that "There are a number of divination games recorded including the throwing of wall nuts in fires to predict the fidelity of partners and the pouring of molten lead into cold water as a way of predicting the occupation of future husbands, the shape of the solidified lead some how indicating this."

Apples are also an important part of the festivities and a recent addition to the festivals is Appleday. This was launched in 1990 by a group called Common Ground (http://www.commonground.org.uk/) who link together environmental issues and art and culture. Their Appleday festival is fast becoming as much a part of the festival calendar as Halloween. Of course Apples were part of the picture all along.

The web also has a lot to say about the other forms of the ceremony. Well, if we start with bonfires. The origin of the name 'bonfire' appears to be 'bone fire' and is linked to a gaelic festival coinciding with a time of year when there was slaughtering of animals and bones to burn. You can read about the Samhain festival here 'http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Samhain. Apparently it marked the end of the lighter half of the year and the coming of the darker half, and we can all relate to that. So bonfires are, traditionally in fact, fires of animal bones, rather than as I always thought, good fires (from the French) or bonny fires (from Scotland). Oh well. An entertaining blog by the name of http://pleaseshoveoff.blogspot.com/ has an account of fires being lit in Cornwall called 'Tindle Fires' lit for good luck. You can also see a picture of the Allantide Game made by Jane Cox, which has hanging apples from a horizonal cross with candles on it. As it says in the quotation above you have to get the apples with your teeth and avoid the hot wax. Allan apples are large and so at least give you a good target to aim at.

October 31st is, of course, Halloween, the feast of All Hallows. The word Halloween means the eve of All Saints Day. Hallow itself appears to come from the Old English se hálga meaning "the holy man" and it has recently taken on a contemporary meaning in the Harry Potter books (.. and the Deathly Hallows). It also appears, of course, in the Lord's Prayer 'Hallowed be Thy name'.

Various websites describe how the Christian celebrations were connected with these older traditional Celtic ones. The 7th Century would seem to be an important time for the change in the way the festival was celebrated when the Catholic Church sent missionaries throughout Europe to convert the Celtic people. It would seem that the strong Celtic traditions were merged into sanctioned Catholic activities. So in the 7th century, the Church began celebrating All Saints Day on November 1st, a celebration was for those saints who didn't have a saints day. Allhallowmas was said on this day for all those who were hallowed or holy. The night before All Saints Day became known as All Hallows Eve or Halloween. Then, at the beginning of the 11th century November 2nd became All Souls Day, a day in celebration for all our ancestors and, like Samhain it had bonfires and dressing up in costumes. Unlike the Celtic animal costumes, however, the Christians dressed up as saints, angels and devils to invoke the spirits of their ancestors.
