

Living in Port Isaac has many advantages: at the top of the village we have the most tremendous views. Within walking distance we enjoy events at the Village Hall, which people come miles by car from other villages and towns to share. Freshly-landed fish can be purchased with zero "food miles". Plus we have the "shared community exhibition space" in St Peter's Church with local history exhibitions.

But we live in a parish which is, according to many authorities, surprisingly isolated. We are, by modern standards, distant from what many would consider essential facilities. We may be fortunate enough to have a Doctors' Surgery and Dispensary, but we are 15 miles from the nearest Railway Station. We still have a Public House, but our nearest Cinema is 10 miles away. We do have a Bus service

(five or six journeys on most days), but we cannot spend an evening at the cinema and come back on the bus. We have several souvenir shops, but now have just the one remaining general provision shop; for anything more than the basics we have to go to Camelford or Wadebridge.

As a result, most of us do depend, at least to some extent, on having and using a motor-car. If we are at all concerned about Global Warming, we try to use it as little as possible, so as to minimise our consumption of fossil fuel and production of greenhouse gases, e.g. CO². In the same way, when driving we avoid bursts of acceleration and sudden braking, and use the highest gear possible, consistent with road and weather conditions. If we are buying a new car, we should choose one which will burn as little fuel, and make as little CO² as possible, which makes

economic sense anyway. During the last ten years the Road Tax, now known as Vehicle Excise Duty (VED), has been graduated to encourage the use of more efficient cars, which produce fewer grams of CO2 per kilometre (g/km). There are now available cars which produce fewer than 100 g/km, and these pay NO VED at all. What is almost more important is that these are not only the very small cars ("superminis") with 800cc or 1 litre engines, which achieve 87 or 99 g/km respectively. Some medium-sized cars with engines up to a respectable 1.6 litres can now manage 98 g/km. with correspondingly low fuel consumption. If you are thinking of buying a new car this Spring, it may be useful to check the AA web-site (which has links to a car-buvers' guide) or the Government's own site (http://carfueldata.direct.gov.uk/), to see which cars are in the no-VED "band A".

Whether we have a car or not, whether it's old or new, a gas-guzzler or thrifty, most of us can enjoy a walk. A pleasant one for a June evening starts at the harbour of Port Gaverne. With your back to the beach, take the road South Eastwards up the valley, with the Hotel on your immediate left. Go past Gull Rock (a former "Fish Cellar" or "Palace") on your right, and Brooklands Farm, also on the right. Shortly after this bear right into the field with caravans and, now on Footpath no.3 in Robin Penna's Guide and Map, walk through this to the far end. In the left-hand corner ("Withy Garden") go left over a stile (which should be clear, but has sometimes been obstructed) into a steeply sloping field. Climb up this, keeping a deep gully to your left until, at the top, you enter a track with a stone wall (hedge) on each side. Go through the yard of Tregaverne Farm, closing any gates you have to open, to meet the Port Gaverne—Delabole road. Turn right (East) and follow the road for about 700 metres (nearly 800 yards). About 100 metres short of a road junction on the right you will see a footpath sign in the left-hand hedge; carefully cross the hedge, and don't fall down the other side, descend the steps sticking out of the wall. Follow the left-hand side of the field (Footpath no.10) until you reach the South West Coast Path at a stile on the cliff top, above St Illickswell Gug. Turn left (West) here and follow the Path down onto a boardwalk across a marshy hollow (kept wet by St Illick's Well). Continue along the waymarked Path above Ram's Hole and Tartar Cove, round Tresunger's Point and past Welshman's Quarry, behind some very smart, recently-improved detached houses, to join a tarmac drive. Where this meets the road above Cartway Cove, you can go either of two ways: the quickest is to cross the road and take the steep walk directly down to the Port Gaverne Hotel. The alternative is to turn right down the road (past the Headlands Hotel) to where it bends left, there continuing straight on to The Main, the headland between Cartway Cove and Port Gaverne. Follow the old

Dear Trio

Andy Penny's letter in last month's *Trio* is mistaken. St. Endellion Parish Council is not the Highway Authority, it doesn't control Port Isaac's roads and it doesn't make Road Traffic Orders extending or modifying 'yellow line' street parking restrictions. Cornwall Council is responsible for that. In fact *Trio* briefly mentioned the possibility of changes to Port Isaac's 'yellow line' restrictions in its 'Parish Beadle' column last December. Also, parish councillors leafleted those most likely to be affected - residents in Trewetha Lane and New Road - and Cornwall Council publicised its draft traffic order in the Cornish Guardian, on its website and on posters attached to electricity and telephone poles alongside the affected roads. Cornwall Council's statutory consultation process ended on 20 May. If Andy thinks the draft traffic order was inadequately publicised or consulted upon then the people he should complain to are Cornwall Council, not the parish council.

A second home owner, Annie Price and Andy Penny have all complained in Trio that the parish council doesn't give Trio enough information. Annie and the second homer compared St Endellion PC unfavourably with parish councils elsewhere. Trio is not a parish council newsletter. Unlike many parish newsletters around the country it is independently owned and focuses, successfully I think, mainly on Port Isaac's social and cultural events. What this appears to be about is the unofficial Clerk's report that used to be sent to Trio with a summary of the main issues discussed at parish council meetings, and written to meet Trio's end of month deadline before the council's official minutes were approved at the following month's council meeting. I recognise the difficulty. The council meets monthly, Trio publishes monthly, and by the time the official council minutes are reported they would be almost two month old 'news'. However, in a statement last year to Trio following his resignation from the parish council, Andy Penny alleged that one of these Clerk's summary reports was selective. Summaries are by definition selective and there will inevitably be occasions when someone's pet topic is left out. It did, however, raise the possibility that the Clerk's Trio report could be construed as misleading the public, which is guite a serious matter in local government, even a humble parish council. The council therefore voted to end the Clerk's Trio report, the assumption being that if Trio wanted to cover parish council matters it could either wait for the official approved minutes or send someone along to our public meetings and produce its own independent report of proceedings. Hence its 'Parish Beadle' column.

Those who are either too busy to attend parish council meetings or live elsewhere can, like *Trio*, ask the Clerk to email them a copy of the approved minutes, and we have also created an internet website where these will be posted. If you don't have a computer the Clerk will continue to post draft minutes on the three notice boards outside the Port Isaac Co-op, opposite the Old School Hotel, and in Trelights village. Finally, parish council meetings are held in public at 7.30 pm on the second Monday of the month in Port Isaac Primary School. The meeting agenda is posted on the parish council's notice boards the preceding Thursday.

These are my personal opinions and not necessarily those of other parish councillors.

Doc Martin money to improve access to new car park

Dear Trio

I wrote earlier in the year giving my thoughts about Doc Martin giving a decent sum of money for the benefit of the village as a whole, as Port Isaac is the star of the series and should get some benefit from it.

Following on from that, the Harbour Commissioners and the Parish Council asked me to try to negotiate a sum with Buffalo Pictures. My aim was to try for £100,000.00, having read of the millions of pounds which Buffalo Pictures had earned from sales all over the world. Many of your readers will know the result of the correspondence. Buffalo Pictures said that they "couldn't afford" to pay £100,000 but they were prepared to pay £50,000 but that had to include twelve days filming on The Platt and the beach, for which the Harbour Commission would normally be paid £1,500 a day.

It was agreed that the Harbour Commission would receive £18,000 and the Parish Council £32,000. So far as the Parish Council is concerned, the understanding is that this money must be spent on improving the accessway to and the appearance of the temporary car park in Trewetha Lane. Doc Martin are not actually making use of any of the Parish Council's property but the Council has signed an Agreement to the effect that it would co-operate with the filming in return for the payment.

Many Port Isaac people remain unhappy about our village being "taken over" and spoilt by the presence of Doc Martin with the hoards of day trippers which it attracts but, as it seemed inevitable that they were going to come, at least we have benefited financially for which we should be grateful.



e are delighted that Bishop Tim is to spend three days in the North Cornwall Cluster of Churches in June.

On June 19th the Bishop will attend services at St Michael's, Porthilly (9.15am), St Minver (11am) and St Enodoc (3pm). We would love to think that the churches would be full, so please come and join us!

On Thursday June 23rd the Bishop will visit St Minver School, Rock RNLI station and Sharpes' Brewery, and he will also join our weekly Bible Study Group. Individual Stableford winner - Karl Dalv with 32 points (next year he will be paying double just to pay for his prizes). 2nd - Jon Poupard



Port Isaac music festiva

Did we have a good weekend or what? Port Isaac Music Festival 2011 has been the best so far - these are not just my words but the words of plenty of the people who attended part, or for some, all of the performances.

It all started off with Port Isaac's favourite sons, *The Fisherman's Friends* on the Platt - Friday evening and a great crowd who responded to the witty banter and what I have to say is some of the best shanty singing in the world today. The boys stand out in their genre. It was also great to see some of them at other performances over the weekend, giving their support and speaking to some of the younger artists backstage.

Saturday's weather was against us but it didn't dampen spirits. We battled on on the Platt and the artists and crowd gave a determined performance - thanks to *Annie Appleby, Paul 'Sunset' Johnson, Just Jazz Guitars*, and *The Larrick Lads*. Early evening in St Peter's Church and the *Roscarrock Gospellers* sang their own kind of inspirational music.

Saturday night we had a full 'Big Band' on the Village Hall stage when the *Skyliners* took flight. They played a fantastic set of songs from the big band era, and we were treated to an exhibition of 1940s jive, by a couple who came to absolutely everything (I do apologise, I didn't ask your names). Websites of the Month

Money, saving it and being green

Learning about money, and saving money is a good plan in these days of austerity, and as it happens saving money can be good for the environment as well. So this month I thought I would have a look at what the web has to offer about that. Before looking a specific sites, I thought I would let you know about a very good independent weekly compilation of current internet articles and blogs relating to Global Banking Crisis. This is provided by Dr Mike Hayward, an environmentalist as well as a financial advisor. He recently has been saying he needs some support so you can make a donation when you sign up if you like. His weekly digest is his views of the best of the web and, so long as you don't mind being faced with some uncomfortable realities, is very useful (contact Mike Haywood at mike@mikehaywoodart.co.uk). One website he suggests a look at is http://www.chrismartenson.com/page/what-should-i-do which outlines, as the link suggests, what you can do to build personal and community resilience.

Money as a topic in itself is also fascinating, its history and future and you can find out at a website called www.positivemoney.org.uk which has a very good podcast about the future of money from Professor Mary Mellor, who knows a thing or two about the future of money (http://tinyurl.com/posmoney). Some places like Totnes have got their own currency and you can read about Lewes in Sussex which has also done this http://www.thelewespound.org/ . Perhaps we might have the St Endellion pound one day.

First stop though, on saving money and being green, could be a website called www.lovemoney.com which might not be a promising name, but it has some useful information. The section to look at http://tinyurl.com/savebygreen has tips on nappies, books, transport and energy, together with a miscellaneous section. Nappies are an example of how much of what we spend money on is wasted. Some of us are really skilled at not throwing things away. I remember when I was at school (over 50 years ago, so going back a bit) Mr Pledger used to lecture us about waste, so nothing new. But we do waste astronomical amounts of stuff and on the nappy front: They say –

Figures from www.recycle.co.uk reveal that we throw away a whopping 3 billion disposable nappies in the UK each year, 90% of which end up in landfill. However, according to the Women's Environmental network, you can kit out a baby in washable nappies for as little as £50, and save, on average, £500 on the cost of keeping a baby in nappies – this takes into account initial costs, washing and detergent." The website gives more details.

Saving energy on heating can save money of course and the energy savings trust www.energysavingtrust.org.uk provides reliable advice on this on its frequently asked questions section (see http://tinyurl.com/estrust). This covers such areas as loft insulation, cavity wall insulation and so on, together with the government grants that are available or other sources of assistance. In March this year, the government brought in a new grant for renewable heating systems (see http://tinyurl.com/renew-heat) which will provide funding for installation of things like solar heating panels (Robert and Penny Manders have installed), heat pumps among other heating arrangements. There seems to be some uncertainty in the documents about quite when you can apply for this scheme as some say domestic systems are in the first phase, others say in 2012. If it is the latter, still not long to wait. Things change very fast here and the energy savings trust site provides good up to date information.

Dan Rogerson, our local MP, writes ...

May has proved a very busy month both in Westminster and in North Cornwall. I have been visiting schools including Lewannick, Berrycombe and Morwenstow Pre-School, businesses and organisations across the patch including a visit to Bodmin Football Club to see them beat AFC St Austell in the final of the Cornwall Senior Cup! I have also been holding all my regular surgeries as well.

I have been continuing my regular meetings with the other Cornish MPs and Kevin Lavery, Cornwall Council's Chief Executive and the Council Leader Alec Robertson. At the most recent one, I expressed my concerns about the fact that staff who offer home care in the area have had their mileage allowance cut which will serious affect those who are already lowly paid for what they do. This has an especially detrimental effect on carers in North Cornwall as they clock up many more miles due to the geography of the area and the fact towns and villages are a lot further apart than in other parts of the Duchy.

The plans for a Stadium for Cornwall have also been discussed. I wanted to find out what public money, if any, the Council are proposing to use to take forward this project. As a Cornishman, my heart tells me that it would be wonderful to have such a modern facility for sporting and other events, but given the cuts that have to be made elsewhere, I think it is crucial that this is lead by the private sector and not be a burden on Council Tax payers.

In Parliament, the Education Bill which I have been involved in had its remaining stages in the Commons and has now gone over to the House of Lords, to be scrutinised there. The Bill contained many reforms which will ensure every child gets a fair chance in life. Free nursery places for 2 year olds from disadvantaged backgrounds and strengthened powers for intervention in poorly performing schools are just two of them. I am also pleased that teachers who have been accused of an offence will be given anonymity up until the point of charges being made. Innocent people's lives and careers have been ruined by the 'mud sticks' principle and this is a welcome step to prevent this happening in the future. Where a teacher really has committed an offence, this protection will be removed. Other parts of the Bill will help teachers retain discipline in the classroom which is something I know is important to many teachers I have



spoken to. The Bill also looks at the role of Governors and I had some concerns with the original proposals. I therefore welcome the changes which the Minister has offered to make following what I had to say in Committee on the subject. The Bill as it was originally published removed the duty for there to be someone on the governing body elected or chosen from the local authority and also abolished the requirement for a staff governor. After putting pressure on the Minister during Bill committee and through meetings, the Bill was changed to include both and I am glad the Government listened to my concerns and acted accordingly.

Finally the Localism Bill went through Parliament recently, parts of which caused me some concern. The Bill includes many excellent ideas on reforming the planning process and devolving more power away from Whitehall. However, it also proposes removing the security of tenure for new social housing tenants and instead allows councils and housing associations to offer tenancies of as little as two years. I do understand that the aim is to reduce waiting lists and concede that some element of flexibility might be a positive thing but am not happy with the safeguards in place to prevent vulnerable individuals and families with children from being affected by this. I therefore voted to remove this part of the Bill but the majority of the Government held sway and now the Bill has gone over to the House of Lords.

Being in a coalition does mean that compromises have to be made; at the last General Election, we won 57 seats and taking that into account, the amount of our manifesto that made it into the coalition agreement is significant. However, there have been times when I feel strongly that what is being proposed is not something I can agree with and on these occasions, I will certainly take a stand. These proposals to remove security of tenure were certainly not in the coalition agreement so I voted against.
