



### A bit about Carn to Cove

Port Isaac has been a member of *Carn to Cove* for many years now. Claire Marshall, the scheme's administrator writes, "*Carn to Cove* is Cornwall's performing arts touring scheme – we bring professional artists into rural areas, helping small communities to put on something 'different' in their local hall and create a social event for the village. We underwrite the costs of professional acts, reducing the financial risk to the hall, but at the same time giving the community an incentive to maximise audiences and make some money for its own use. *Carn to Cove* is part of the National Rural Touring Forum and we also work in collaboration with the other small-scale professional venues in Cornwall such as the Poly in Falmouth.

We are extremely lucky in Cornwall to live in a vibrant, thriving artistic environment and continued overleaf



Summer and, if the weather's kind, the time for eating outside where it always seems to taste better! There's so much pleasure in being with friends or family, in the garden or on the beach, enjoying one another's company, talking together, having a drink and sharing everyday meals, as well as picnics and barbecues.

Eating together, is an ideal way to get to know

one another better, to strengthen friendship and to build community, as well as to celebrate special occasions. And going by the number of times Jesus and his disciples and other people are recorded as eating and drinking together in the gospels, both indoors and outdoors, they clearly enjoyed it as well.

There's the well-known story of the Feeding of the Five Thousand; Jesus cooking breakfast for his disciples on the sea shore; Jesus, breaking bread with the two disciples he's walked with on the Emmaus road, and, of course, his final meal with them before his crucifixion -the Last Supper.

Central to Christian faith is this shared meal of Holy Communion or the eucharist, given us by Jesus himself on the night before he died. Jesus took bread, blessed, broke and gave it to his disciples, and blessed and shared the wine in the same way, saying 'Do this, in remembrance of me'; and ever since, in homes and hospitals, in churches, chapels, and cathedrals, indoors and outdoors, whether thousands have gathered, or only two or three, Christians have obeyed his command and continue to do so today.

#### Carn to Cove continued ...

we are spoilt for choice when picking home-grown shows to offer our village hall promoters. As well as long-established Cornish companies such as Bash Street and Miracle, we have a new generation of younger professional companies working in dance, theatre and film.

Thanks to an Arts Council England (ACE) and Cornwall Council partnership over the past three years, the FEAST programme has enabled us to commission and tour new work and to increase our reach in market towns as well as in villages. This has been challenging, as our model of working with local volunteer promoters in villages does not easily lend itself to replication in a town, but we are starting to make an impression in towns which have been lacking in cultural activity for some time.

Of course the current funding situation is affecting us - we have less money, but there's constant demand to increase the number of venues participating in the scheme. We try to keep ticket prices as accessible as possible, but that can also lead to cutting back on fees to performers – often by choosing smaller shows. We've taken the difficult decision to limit the number of subsidised shows each hall can book per season, but we're delighted when they book shows independently of us - that's a testament to the growing confidence of the promoters and their loyal audiences.

We work with a range of partners to keep the programmes diverse and lively as well as building our audience. We've developed close links with the Young Promoters scheme in Cornwall to increase this section of our audience, and we were part of the ACE 'A Night Less Ordinary' programme with other Cornish small scale venues, giving away nearly 2,000 tickets to young people. It's a shame that this scheme has ended, but we are looking at ways to build on this and to continue to target this audience by offering substantial price savings for groups of young people.

We've been able to promote some great international work in tiny venues through collaborations with other rural schemes across the UK - these have often relied on extra Grants for the Arts awards but perhaps in future will be supported by new ACE touring funds. We're investing a lot of time in creating relationships with partners in Brittany for a potential project – very complex negotiations and financing, but with strong support from our local authority we hope that this cultural exchange will give us a big return on our investment by 2015.

So while times may be harder than they were, audiences are still looking for somewhere to go and have a night out - we make sure they don't need to go much further than their own doorstep to see some amazingly talented performers."

# Websites of the Month happiness, holidays and stress

As it is now (finally) summer and holidays and being happy are a lot on people's minds, I thought a peek at the subject of happiness would be in order. In recent years there has been increasing interest in the measurement of happiness, particularly in scientific and government circles.

For the scientists it relates partly, at least, to the availability of brain scanning which allows them to see changes in the brain when people experience different emotions. One particular person has been brain scanned because he has been dubbed the happiest man on the planet - Matthieu Ricard ( <a href="http://www.matthieuricard.org/en/index.php">http://www.matthieuricard.org/en/index.php</a>). He is a buddhist monk who has been an important link between the neuroscientists and the Dalai Lama who is very interested in this area. The findings are fascinating and have been applied in a range of clinical applications from managing pain to cheering people up who are depressed or anxious.

For the government it has been a mixture of things. Some see it as a bit sinister, finding ways to make us feel happy even though things might be getting worse; for others it is a genuinely different way at looking at how to measure successful communities and indeed nations - not just by gross domestic product, but by gross national happiness (see <a href="http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Gross national happiness">http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Gross national happiness</a>). Just last month this became a development indicator at the United Nations <a href="http://www.bbc.co.uk/news/world-14243512">http://www.bbc.co.uk/news/world-14243512</a>.

The job of finding out how happy we are in the UK has been given to the Office of National Statistics and their website <a href="http://www.ons.gov.uk/well-being">http://www.ons.gov.uk/well-being</a> has a link to a knowledge bank with shedloads of information on this subject. This website is likely to grow and grow as they collect more and more information about what allegedly makes us happy.

As usual the BBC has something on this topic and this would be a good place to start exploring. (<a href="http://news.bbc.co.uk/1/hi/programmes/happiness formula/default.stm">http://news.bbc.co.uk/1/hi/programmes/happiness formula/default.stm</a>). To find out if you are happy, you can go to a link on the BBC site to a test for happiness devised by one psychologist from the USA, Ed Diener, (<a href="http://internal.psychology.illinois.edu/~ediener/">http://internal.psychology.illinois.edu/~ediener/</a>) who has done a good deal of research on this topic. It is a nice easy test and I leave it to you to decide whether you believe it or not.

Sometimes stress can make you unhappy and on iPlayer <a href="http://www.bbc.co.uk/programmes/p00hqty1">http://www.bbc.co.uk/programmes/p00hqty1</a> there is a programme about scientists views about how this relates to wellbeing. Here you can also find links to a test on stress by a psychologist (<a href="https://www.bbc.co.uk/labuk/experiments/stress/">https://www.bbc.co.uk/labuk/experiments/stress/</a>), this time by a home grown one, Peter Kinderman. The test takes 20 minutes and is part of an experiment to see if stress is triggered by your genes or by your lifestyle? They say they want help to investigate the causes of stress, and you can get personalised tips for improving your mental wellbeing.

Holidays are nice, but they are stressful. To find out about holiday stress, this report <a href="http://www.greenbergresearch.com/articles/1843/2603">http://www.greenbergresearch.com/articles/1843/2603</a> HolidayStress.pdf from the United States provides a useful piece of research about the impact of holidays on wellbeing. It also includes some useful tips for managing holiday stress. Being on holiday in Cornwall is, of course, particularly happiness inducing, and also hopefully low stress.

One good website I found when writing this piece was happy news. The news generally is so awful, it is good to have a place to go on the web where you can find happy news <a href="http://www.happynews.com/">http://www.happynews.com/</a>. While it is a bit over-happy sometimes, the range of good news stories is impressive, covering business, technology, babies, and so on. The one unifying theme is that the stories are happy ones. Another site which is slightly different but good for a laugh is odd box <a href="http://news.bbc.co.uk/newsbeat/hi/newsbeat/newsid-7875000/7875393.stm">http://news.bbc.co.uk/newsbeat/hi/newsbeat/newsid-7875000/7875393.stm</a> well worth a look.

There are lots of blogs about happiness and wellbeing, but my favourite is one called the politics of wellbeing <a href="http://www.politicsofwellbeing.com/2010/10/moral-reasoning-and-mental-health.html">http://www.politicsofwellbeing.com/2010/10/moral-reasoning-and-mental-health.html</a>. You can sign up here to receive a monthly update on what is happening in this increasingly political world. This weeks is all about Aristotle and how he may have got it a bit wrong on the happiness front.

Finally, you wouldn't expect me to do a column without referring to something green. Well first of all walking can make you feel good <a href="http://www.wfh.naturalengland.org.uk/get-involved/start-walking/why-walk">http://www.wfh.naturalengland.org.uk/get-involved/start-walking/why-walk</a> and the Climate Friendly Parish column has walks which will certainly work this magic. There is also good research evidence that feeling at one with nature can make you feel good too <a href="http://chat.carleton.ca/~enisbet/index.html">http://chat.carleton.ca/~enisbet/index.html</a>, and the green gym is a good example of it in practice <a href="http://www2.btcv.org.uk/display/greengym">http://www2.btcv.org.uk/display/greengym</a>.

But there are other ways to find out what's going on. The Parish council website for instance! <u>WWW.STENDELLION.CO.UK</u>. - as advertised in the annual parish meeting council report in April. And when its up and running I'm sure it will be fab.


OK, how about the Cornwall Council website. Full of information – if you can find it! Consultation on traffic & roads – put in Port Isaac & get 'Truro'!!!? Oh well, email to Mr Leeson Technician, highways design, the guy who ran the consultation. And within 12 hours he had replied to me:

"I appreciate I have not sent final details yet, but this is because one small aspect of additional lining in Silvershell Road is unresolved and I intend to contact all those who responded to the consultation once this has been confirmed.

Because the settlements involved in this scheme attract numerous tourists, it was necessary to act quickly to complete the lining before the school holidays take over for the summer. Hence, details of confirmed lining were issued for completion on site before contacting responders to the consultation. I will, of course, contact everyone concerned as soon as possible.

In short, I have attached a plan of the proposed extension to restrictions in Silvershell Road, which includes the confirmed omission of the original proposed lining on Trewetha Lane, opposite the junction with Silvershell Road. All other proposals remain unchanged.

If you wish to comment on the proposed extension, please reply to me by email at your earliest convenience,



as this local consultation is now reaching its conclusion. The issue was raised through safety concerns with parking in this area causing an obstruction to traffic entering/leaving Silvershell Road. All comments received would be greatly appreciated."

I'm still trying to work out what Martin Bell thinks I got wrong a couple of months ago regarding 'which authority is responsible' for these yellow lines. Here's part of an earlier email sent to me by Gary Leeson - "The proposals within the scheme for Port Isaac have been requested by St Endellion Parish Council and the local member, Brian Gisbourne CC. I would therefore suggest that you would be best to contact the parish council or the member to discuss your concerns."

Let's hope with our new Chairman and Vice Chairman now in place, the communication between the parish council and parishoners improves.

## Dan Rogerson, our local MP, writes ...

he Government have announced that they are going to look into and change the way schools are funded. This is something that has needed to happen for a long time as the current system is completely unfair with similar schools in different areas receiving widely varying amounts of money. This has meant that in the past our schoolchildren here in Cornwall have been underfunded by around £300 per head (compared to the national average). The changes proposed will reform the system, protecting small schools and also ensuring that academies do not get more funding than maintained schools. The aim is to make the funding system much more transparent so that parents can see where the money goes and how it is spent. I questioned the Secretary of State on this proposal and have also been involved in debates on Bovine TB, the Finance Bill and the Government's new White Paper on Public Services. I have some concerns on the latter, despite being on the Government side of the House and will be pursuing those over coming months.

Last week, I urged Cornwall Council to think again with regards to proposed cuts to subsidies for bus companies operating in Cornwall. The Council were given their funding settlement back in April from central government and have only now decided that they want to cut the subsidy from 73.5% to 44%. I believe this is a terrible decision to make as it will inevitably mean that bus routes will have to be cut which will be a real blow to those living in very rural areas who do not have a car. There will be no way for people without private means of transport to travel to other towns and villages and this cannot be right. I have asked the Council to reconsider this ill-judged decision and very much hope they do the right thing.

Those who have occasion to visit Bodmin may have noticed that the first Bodmin market for many years was held on Thursday 21st July. It also provided a great opportunity to have a good natter with people about a variety of issues. Massive congratulations go to Sarah Horne who has tkane on the licence to get the market going again. As Bodmin is historically a market town, it has been a great shame that there has not been a market for some time and it was so good to see everyone getting involved with many local shops taking on stalls. The market will take place on the first and third Thursday of every month so do make sure you visit on one of these occasions and support the market.

## Port Isaac & Port Gaverne - Thirty Years of Village Life DVD OF VILLAGE HISTORY

With the spotlight firmly on Port Isaac, thanks to the popular ITV series *Doc Martin* and acclaimed singing group *Fisherman's Friends*, a unique film depicting life in the Cornish fishing village is about to reach a wider audience. Until now, the 45 minute portrait of Port Isaac and Port Gaverne, filmed in the 1930s, 40s and 50s, was only sold around Port Isaac itself. But now *South West Film and Television Archive (SWFTA)* is making it available from selected branches of *Waterstones* and via the internet. The DVD includes footage around the village in 1933, several local weddings, Port Isaac's celebrations of the coronation of King George VI in 1937, the 1943 Boys Brigade Parade and a remarkable herring catch in 1946.

Most of the film was shot by Lionel Castle in and around Port Isaac. Lionel's grand-son, Canon Peter Larkin, realised its worth and donated the family films to the SWFTA.

The film is obviously fascinating for anyone who lives in or grew up in the Port Isaac area,' said Jennie Constable, SWFTA administrator, 'but we think that holidaymakers will find it very appealing as well. Not to mention fans of Doc Martin and Fisherman's Friends. There is so much interest in Port Isaac at the moment that it was an easy decision to re-issue the film for a wider audience.'

Copies of the DVD can be purchased in Port Isaac and if you get yours from either the *Pottery* or *Secrets*, £3 from each sale will be donated to PISCES.

#### Summer holidays

As school is still closed in August there will be no schoolchat in the September Trio but we will be back as usual in the October issue.





At last! We've been officially registered with the powers-that-be as a Generator able to feed power into the mains. We've been asked for a meter reading, so that we can receive payment under the Government's Feed In Tariff, and I can tell you that in three months we have generated about one thousand kiloWatthours of electrical energy. That is about 10kWh per day, enough to keep a 3kW electric fire going for three hours or so. When it's sunny and our solar water-heating panels are working, we don't use more than 7 or 8kWh per day, but in winter when there's no solar hot water we can use up 40kWh, most of it for room-heating. We'll have to see what proportion of our consumption through the year we can actually generate, how near to carbon-neutral we can get...

A week or so ago members of Parish and Town Councils in North and East Cornwall had the opportunity to meet and question Alec Robertson, the Leader, and some Cabinet Members of the new Cornwall Council. After they had introduced themselves to us, we were shown a ten-minute film explaining what a mess the former County and District Councils had left, and what a grand job the new Cornwall Council is doing, putting things right. Then followed about two hours of questions to the Leader and portfolio-holders, which demonstrated the considerable lack of confidence our local councillors have in the Unitary Authority. Quite a good illustration of democracy at work...

The Cabinet Members with an interest in Climate Change matters, Julian German, was asked what the Council was doing to increase the county's use of renewable energy, bearing in mind the resources available here. He was reminded that, while we have more of them than most parts of Britain, wind and sunlight are not completely reliable sources of energy, and that waves are no more reliable since they derive their energy from the wind. Further, that geothermal energy and tidal power are reliable, particularly available in Cornwall, and free; he replied that biomass provided a further reliable source of energy. He added that there were projects underway, such as

geothermal boreholes at Eden and elsewhere, while the Wave Hub off Newquay will be linked several different mechanisms for harnessing wave energy, which will be compared. Research work in progress should lead to design work rather than manufacture of the new technologies in the near future. It seems that Climate Change might lead to some more jobs in Cornwall. Nothing new then.

We had better have a walk that looks towards the waves they aim to harness and, for this month, variants for the more or less energetic.

Leave the Platt (Port Isaac Harbour) by walking up Roscarrock Hill past the Pottery (former Methodist Chapel) and Fern Cottage (Doc Martin's surgery exterior shots only, don't peer through the windows). At the top, take the path (no.33 in Robin Penna's Map & Guide )below Hathaway B&B, up through a gate to stone steps, and on to Lobber Point. Look back to possibly the best view of Port Isaac from anywhere in these parts. Continue round the Point, enjoying views over Port Isaac Bay, and down to Pine Haven ("Pine Awn" to locals) [Point A].

The less energetic follow the path up Pine Haven Valley, keeping fairly near the stream, until you come to a muddy patch in front of a footbridge over the stream [Point B]. The more energetic continue on the South West Coast Path (footpath no.16) from Point A, over a stile and the stream, and up a tremendous flight of steps. I will not give the details of the rest of the path to Port Quin, since you cannot really lose your way — the path is fenced in most of the way but, because of the incredible ups and downs encountered, allow at least  $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours to get there.

To return from Port Quin, set off up the road towards St Endellion and, after some 200 yards/metres, when the road bends right, take the path (footpath no.34) straight ahead, Eastwards, over a stile. This is the "Inland Path" back to Port Isaac. With the stream on your right go through one field, and slant left up the hill to a stile beside a gate. Follow the track through three more fields, until you are just to the Northeast of Roscarrock Farm. Here turn left (away from the farm) and follow the edge of the field round to a stile (the path officially crosses the field diagonally but may be difficult to see). Over the stile follow the path slanting right down the hill to the (Pine Haven) valley bottom and a footbridge. Over the footbridge and stile you find the muddy patch [Point B] the less energetic will have reached coming up the valley from Point A.

All walkers climb the steep hill Northeastwards, with a hedge on your right. At the top follow the drystone wall on your right to a gate in the corner. Through the gate walk almost Southwards along Washing Pool Lane until you reach a gate, and the road at Homer Park. Turn left and follow Church Hill down into Port Isaac again, admiring the views over the village as you lose height.

By the time you read this, we will have attended the Renewable Energy Conference & Exhibition, organised by Cornwall Council, and held in the former Gaia Centre near Delabole. The first of the two days is aimed at industry and business people, the second at communities and households. There should be some interesting speakers and subjects, including microgeneration (of electricity) and heat-pumps (for using heat present in the air or the ground). We'll report on any new developments next month.

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
