Parish Council to borrow nearly half a million pound loan to complete car park

Just before the recent Parish Council meeting, John Brown did a quick straw poll of some 40 local people about the proposed loan of £467,861 that the Parish Council are going to take on to complete the Trewetha car park on the outskirts of the village. Not many of those John spoke to had heard about the loan and the main concerns were that so much money was going to be borrowed without any public consultation and just what was going to be done that would cost so much money.

The Parish Bumble confirms in his article (see page 6) that this loan proposal was approved at the September Parish Council meeting. Since then, John Brown has written to Robert Harris, the Parish Council Chairman, and he has copied that letter to Trio:

"Dear Mr Harris

I am writing about the proposal by the Parish Council to borrow nearly half a million pounds to fund improvements to the car park on the outskirts of Port Isaac. I accept that the car park need some improvements as, at present, it is an eyesore and poses a hazard to traffic entering and leaving the village, but I don't understand why such a large investment is required. I have been unable to find copies of minutes of council meetings on the internet and even the councillors I have spoken to do not appear to know exactly what is intended to be done. This seems an exorbitant sum of money to spend on a small car park. I was also concerned that when I queried the cost of the proposed borrowing at the latest Parish Council meeting, at least one councillor appeared to be unaware that interest would be payable.

I have tried to work out myself how the cost of the proposed borrowing could be met from the revenue from the car park and have spoken to another car park operator for information on some of the likely costs. It appears to me that there is likely to be a considerable shortfall, as show in the figures attached [see below]. Obviously, without knowing the detail of the proposed 'improvements' (eg, whether the fees will continue to be collected at the gate or whether machines will be installed and whether it

is intended to build toilets etc), these figures can only be an estimate. However, I cannot see why the Council believes that borrowing nearly half a million pounds for this project is justifiable.

I also understand that the Parish Council has received a substantial sum from the 'Doc Martin' production company and that the Parish Council's share of the takings from the car park for last year was in the region of £28,000. I would have thought that these funds could be

reinvested in improving the car park without having to burden the Parish with a large debt.

As this proposal involves the Parish Council (and therefore all members of the Parish) in a very high level of debt, I feel that full details, including all costings (for the capital expenditure and anticipated ongoing costs) should be made available to the public on notice boards and on the internet before any irrevocable decision is made on this matter."

If the capital were to be borrowed over ten years the interest rate would be lower (2.5%) but the annual capital payments would be higher so the annual cost would be higher than \pm 38130 – though for a shorter period

Notes:

- a) If the plan is to construct toilets then there would be further costs water, cleaning, locking up etc at a conservative estimate £5000 per annum, increasing the loss to approximately £10000 per annum
- b) At the present time the Parish Council gets approximately £30000 per annum for the Parish from the car park (the operators getting £35000).

The Parish Bumble reports ...

St Endellion Parish Council held its monthly meeting at Port Isaac School on Monday September 12th. The Chairman took the Chair and most members were present, but there were some apologies.

Following the usual minutes and approvals we came to 'Public Discussion' at which three members (of the public) spoke.

Firstly, Mrs Carol Bush reported (again!) on the state of the lane by Mayfield; it seems Cornwall Council has washed its hands of all care/responsibility. Mrs Bush even offered a sum of money towards a solution of the problem. This ongoing matter is to be referred to our County Councillor, Mr Brian Gisbourne.

Secondly, Mr John Brown aired his concerns, having learnt that our Parish Council was proposing to take out a loan of £467,861 for completion of the Trewetha Lane Car Park. Mr Brown had conducted his own 'straw poll' among some 40 plus locals, nearly all of whom had expressed their disapproval of any such loan scheme. It was carefully explained to Mr B that:

- a) The sum was a contingency amount but it was not expected that the car park would cost that much – but better to have a larger than too small a loan.
- b) The loan would be for 25 years but the car park, when fully up and running, would pay for itself long before 25 years and, once paid for, would provide a good income for the village.
- c) The terms of the Licence to create and run the car park are very specific and must

be adhered to; furthermore, a great deal of time, effort and money had already been expended to get the car park to its present state and it would be wasted if the scheme is not completed according to the licence.

In spite of these considerations, Mr B remained unconvinced (Ed: See Mr B's comments on page 4).

Thirdly, Mr Childs reported that he had spent part of an afternoon with a senior member of West Country Ambulance Service and, following the recent blockage of Church Hill for over five hours, had shown the man the problem involved. The visitor said he would be sure to make all ambulances avoid the problem in future.

Mr Childs went on to praise the Fisherman's Friends for their fundraising on Friday nights but he reported that the huge numbers of people in the audience caused severe problems for passing cars – should some sort of temporary bar be needed for future years? Motorists and public alike were annoyed and frustrated and an accident is likely.

After a long 'public' session, the Council discussed and approved the proposed loan for the car park and a separate bank account to be opened to administer all car park monies. Work on the car park is due to start soon – after half term?

Next came "Planning Applications" – a proposal for a farm gateway at Brenton's Park, Trelights was firmly rejected.

Shortly after this discussion, your correspondent had to leave the meeting, so nothing further to report! But I gather support for the renewed Carnival was readily agreed.

Remember the dead, but don't forget the living

The Royal British Legion was founded in 1921, so 2011 is its 90th anniversary. Its primary purpose is to provide welfare for veterans and their families and to ensure that the sacrifice made by those who servein, and who are affected by conflicts are not forgotten. Many people think of Remembrance Day as a day to remember those men and women who lost their lives in the two World Wars, but it also is a time to remember all those who have been involved with, and affected by, the events of war and conflict since those wars.

In recent years, due to events in Iraq and Afghanistan, Remembrance has taken on a new significance. It has become increasingly clear that it should not just be the dead who are remembered, but all those injured whilst serving their country and all those affected by conflict, including the families of Service men and women and civilians. In today's conflicts, improved medical services means that many people survive attacks or bombs - but often with terrible life-long injuries. It is just as important to remember the sacrifices those people and their families have made, as it is to remember those who do not return at all. The men and women injured today are usually between the ages of 18 and 40 years old, and will need help for many years to come.

So, this is a vital time for the Royal British Legion to raise enough money to carry out their tasks throughout the year without letting any one down. Every week, the Legion spends nearly £1.4 million on its welfare work, so they really do need our help. I

therefore ask for your huge generosity, although we all know the financial tough times. This is our way of showing how grateful we are to all those who have fought so bravely in order that we may live in peace here in the UK.


Visitor Ben stages impromptu performance on the Platt

Cooking with Martin

his month I have a three course menu for you to have a go at. It is all pretty simple to make and is comfort food for the cold autumn nights. Let me know how you get on.

First, a simple to make soup.

Butternut Squash & Sweetcorn Soup



Ingredients:

1 tablespoon olive oil
1 clove garlic, minced
1 onion, chopped
1 butternut squash, peeled and cubed
150g (5 oz) sweetcorn kernels
750ml (1½ pints) vegetable stock
1 teaspoon dried basil
1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper
120ml (4 fl oz) natural yoghurt
1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg

- Heat the olive oil in a large pan over medium-high heat.
- Cook the garlic and onion in the oil until soft and translucent.
- Add the butternut squash and corn and cook for 3 more minutes.
- Pour the stock into the pot and bring to the boil; season with basil and black pepper.
- Reduce the heat to medium-low and simmer uncovered until the squash is tender, about 15 minutes.
- Remove pan from the heat and using a hand blender, or working in batches with a counter top blender, process the soup until smooth.
- Stir in the yoghurt and nutmeg and enjoy!

Oven-roasted sausages with ratatouille

Ingredients:

450g ripe plum or cherry tomatoes, quartered or halved, depending on the size
2 red onions, cut into wedges
1 red pepper and 1 yellow pepper, de-seeded, cored and cut

into chunks
3 garlic cloves, unpeeled
2 courgettes, trimmed and cut into chunks
Few fresh rosemary sprigs (optional)

2 tbsp olive oil 8 chunky sausages

- Preheat the oven to 220C
- Toss the tomatoes, onions, peppers, garlic, courgettes, rosemary and oil together in a large roasting tin and roast for 10 minutes, until softened slightly.
- Stir the vegetables well and arrange the sausages over the top.
- Return to the oven for a further 20 minutes, turning the sausages, until evenly browned.
- Push the sausages aside. Pop the garlic from their skins, and mash with some of the tomatoes and mix.
- Season and serve with the sausages.

Potato and celeriac gratin with mustard and crème fraiche

A wonderfully satisfying dish delicious waxy potatoes and celeriac in a flavoursome cream and mustard sauce

Ingredients:

12 waxy potatoes, sliced
1 large head of celeriac, peeled and sliced
1 clove garlic, finely sliced
butter, for greasing
500-600ml chicken stock
200 ml crème fraîche
1 tbsp whole grain mustard
2 tsp Dijon mustard
black pepper

- Pre-heat the oven to 200°C.
- Layer the potatoes and celeriac in a buttered gratin dish with the garlic, seasoning with salt and pepper as you go.
- Pour in enough hot stock to come nearly the level of the top layer.
- Cover with greaseproof paper and bake for 45 minutes.
- Mix the crème fraîche and mustards in a bowl, spread over the top of the gratin.
- Return to the oven and bake for another 10-15 minutes until the celeriac and potatoes are tender.

Nutella Cheesecake Brownies

Ingredients:

220g flour
440g granulated sugar
85g unsweetened cocoa powder
1 teaspoon baking powder
½ teaspoon salt
250ml water
180g apple sauce
2 tablespoons vegetable oil
230g cream cheese, softened
85g icing sugar
2 teaspoons vanilla essence
6 tablespoons Nutella

- Preheat the oven to 175 C
- In a large bowl, stir together the flour, sugar, cocoa powder, baking powder and salt.
- Pour in water, apple sauce, and oil, mix until well blended.
- Spread evenly in a greased 9×13 inch baking pan.
- In a small bowl, stir together the cream cheese, icing sugar, and vanilla essence.
- Microwave on high for 10-15 seconds or until soft and easy to pour
- Pour evenly over the brownie batter, drop the Nutella by the spoonfuls on top, and make swirls in the batter with a knife.
- Bake for 25 to 30 minutes in the preheated oven.
- Let cool for at least 10 minutes before cutting into squares.

Dan Rogerson, our local MP, writes ...

As I am sure you will all be aware, the Boundary Commission for England very recently announced their initial proposals for new constituency boundaries. These proposed changes would create a new constituency covering Bude, Camelford, Launceston and surrounding parishes together with the Torridge district of Devon. There would also be a Bodmin and Newquay constituency in which St Endellion would be on the very eastern edge of the patch. When the Bill was going through Parliament my Cornish colleagues and I backed amendments which would have prevented a new constituency crossing the Tamar. We were, unfortunately not successful. These changes proposed by the Boundary Commission for England do not take into account traditional boundaries and I think many MPs are now realising the real effect these new constituencies will have on communities up and down the country. If you would like to let the BCE know what you think about the boundary changes you can submit to the consultation which is open until the 5thDecember this year. You can contact them by visiting

The other very important issue that people have understandably been very concerned about is that of the Health and Social Care Bill. After a period of time in which consideration of the Bill was paused whilst issues raised by the Lib Dems and others were looked into and changes made, the Bill returned to the Commons for debate. I'm of the opinion that a central problem with the Bill is the ability of the Secretary of State to provide services as well as to commission them. I voted against the Government and for an amendment that was put forward to correct this, but unfortunately it was not passed.

I could not vote for the Bill at Third Reading because of this, but equally I felt that scrapping the whole Bill would lead to chaos at a time of immense pressure on the NHS. Due to these concerns on both sides, I decided to abstain which signals that I believe the Bill needs to change and I am hopeful that my colleagues in the Lords will make these changes and ensure that the Bill is fit for purpose. I very rarely abstain but felt that in this situation it was necessary to allow the Lords to make the changes that need to be made while signalling that I remain unhappy.

The Merlin Project, Cornwall MS Therapy Centre



The Merlin Project raises funds for the Cornwall MS Therapy Centre which is situated between St Austell and Truro at Hewas Water. The centre provides a haven for people living with Multiple Sclerosism their families and their carers. The centre opened in 2009 providing a range of orthodox therapies including physiotherapy and the only Hyperbaric Oxygen Therapy chambers in Cornwall, as well as complementary therapies such as Aromatherapy, Reflexology and Bowens. The centre also provides counselling and runs regular Yoga and Pilates sessions to those living with MS as well as other Neurological conditions. In August 2011 the centre opened a purpose built conference room, providing meeting facilities to the wider community.

As a non-government funded project, the charity relies on grant bodies and fundraising activities and events to subsidise the £55,000 worth of therapies it provides yearly, the purchasing of vital equipment, as well as the day to day running of the centre. As always the summer period has been busy with annual fundraising events such as Trewithen Family Fun Day and The Sticker Show; we also had presence at the Royal Cornwall Show as well as a variety of other summer events around the county. During the summer two of our greatest supporters, David and Lorraine Jasper, arranged a wonderful collection evening on the Platt with the Fisherman's Friends. Despite the bracing winds the support for the event was amazing and raised £800. Thank you to everyone who supported us and helped raise so much money for our charity.

Cornwall MS Therapy Centre is open Monday-Friday, 9am to 5pm. We welcome anyone to come and visit the centre to see what we offer.

Websites of the Month For us oldies!

Being of a certain age myself (65) and recently having been sent a link for apps for older people by my son, I thought websites of the month could focus on the silver surfer - originally a comic book character and now the popular term for older people using the internet. There is a wide variation in the experience people in my generation have of technology. My own introduction to computers was in 1967 where a computer much less powerful than the ones you can buy in high street shops filled a very large room, and the memory discs were called Winchester Drives and were the size of large commercial washing machines. Others have had less contact so would have much more worries about the new technology so the range of sites available for older people reflects this diversity.

To illustrate this range an interesting site called Spring Online http://springonline.org/ is a good place to start. It shows the results of the Silver Surfer's day last year when "during 16-20 May an incredible 2,500 events took place across the UK to help thousands of older people and other less confident users get a taste of computers and the internet. This marks the best ever 'silver surfers' campaign for Digital Unite since its inception 10 years ago." Next years events are on 23-27 April 2012. The site has photographs and accounts of the different events. Cornwall had only one - in Truro - so scope for others to join in next year. The finalists in the competition this year have been announced and you can read about what they did on the site.

The next one to have a look at is Richard Ingram's online version of his magazine The Oldie http://www.theoldie.co.uk/ which, apart from anything else is good for a laugh as there is always a cartoon on the front page and an archive of cartoons to have a look at. The one on the front when I looked to do this article was a nice lady doctor giving an old chap some advice and the caption is - and our pamphlet '101 things to do while waiting for your new knee. In addition to the humour it has articles and other material all available at no charge. This is a really good place to have a read of well written articles, and see some jokes, but also get a relaxing introduction to how to use the internet.

Linked to the article sent to me about apps (of which more later) is another that appeared in the Guardian Newspaper on 29th September http://tinyurl.com/3dlgq93 which describes a new scheme where youngsters who know about the internet adopt a care home http://go-onadopt.com/ and then spend time with the residents sharing their skills and knowledge about the internet and new technology generally. So far 37 organisations have joined in and are having really good results. In Guardian article sums things up well:

"Adopt a Care Home was started earlier this year, and has been recognised for its work on digital inclusion. Race Online, (http://raceonline2012.org/) the Martha Lane Fox-headed initiative that aims to get everyone in the UK of working age

using the internet by next year, is impressed by the effect of the scheme on some of the most difficult to reach people and the intergenerational relationships it develops. Around 62% of the 10.3 million over-65s in the UK have never used the internet, according to Race Online. That compares with 17% of adults overall."

The website give lots of examples of how to go about introducing people who are anxious about using the internet, particularly in this context older people, with videos, handouts, examples of projects that have worked, and personal stories.

An example of how older people with particular problems have used the internet very successfully are also worth looking at. One I have been a member of for some time is called DASNI http://www.dasninternational.org/ which stands for Dementia Advocacy Support Network International. It was set up by a small group of people with dementia who wanted to show that they had the ability and competence that many assumed they lacked. One particular woman, Christine Bryden, was very influential in setting it up. She was chief scientific advisor to the Australian Government when she was diagnosed with dementia in her late 40's. She wrote two books, 'Who will I be when I die' and 'Dancing with Dementia' both really wonderful to read. The DASNI site came out of her and others wish to communicate across the globe, and it has an active email discussion group. In addition there are occasions when they invite specialists to online question and answer sessions. There is information about the books members have written and you can download presentations and other articles. It is a real resource.

Finally then to the apps which are programmes you can use on one of the more recent mobile phones. This is a list of ten top apps for the over 50's. I am not convinced they really are for Oldies, but they are an interesting bunch and you can find the complete list here http://www.guardian.co.uk/society/joepublic/2011/sep/21/apps-for-older-people.

To describe two of them:

Pill reminder allows you to put in the details of the pills you take and it will remind you with an alarm or a buzz depending on what your phone can do when to take them. I imagine if you have a few to take you would probably just want one reminder so may be a bit complicated. It costs 65p, so if it works its a bargain.

iMutt is a virtual pet dog which you have to look after and it connects you to the charity called the Dogs Trust. If you haven't got a pet, and would like one, it has all the characteristics of a pet dog without the mess! And it's free.

Hope you enjoy them.



Both services were conducted by Canon Judith Pollinger and organist for the hymns 'Lead us, Heavenly, lead us' and 'All things bright and beautiful' was Angeline Seymour.

Tribute was paid to Robin by David Ray, an old and dear friend. Robin was born in Sutton Surry in 1941. His father was a fishmonger and his mother was a cook, which fostered his life-long interest in cookery and his preference for fish dishes rather than meat. He met his wife Janice in 1959 when they both worked for a large pharmaceutical company in Islington, North London. They were married in 1967 and lived first in Kingston, and then Chessington before moving to Cornwall. For the last 18 years of his career Robin worked as Accountant/Director for Fine Art Antiques in Dorking, Surrey. With his wife Janice, he enjoyed attending First Nights in London Theatres. He also had a great interest in horse racing and attended many of the meetings at local courses. At one time he ran an Alphasud Motor Racing Car Team.

Robin came on holiday with his family to Daymer Bay in the 1940s and was reintroduced to Cornwall in the 1970s by a dear friend, so when he took early retirement, he and Janice moved to their holiday home in Trelights in 1993. The couple already had many local friends, who were and continue to be welcoming and supportive. Robin was held in high regard and affection in the local community where he is especially remembered for his 12 years of voluntary work at Port Isaac School where he taught the children gardening and computing among other skills. Ellen Trenerry (Tren) Rush, Bendoggett

he local community turned out in large numbers for the recent funeral of Tren Rush, Pendoggett, St Kew. The service was held in the Parish Church of St James the Great, St Kew, followed by cremation at Glynn Valley, Bodmin.

Prebendary John May welcomed everyone and conducted the service, assisted by Canon Judith Pollinger who gave the address and Peter Coster, who offered prayers. Pauline Lobb, god-daughter paid tribute to Tren in an affectionate and amusing poem. Organist for Tren's favourite hymns 'Immortal, Invisible' and 'When I survey the wondrous Cross' was Marjory Hamlyn. At Tren's request the Church bells were rung before and after the service.

Ellen Trenerry Rush known as 'Tren' to all was born at Dinnabroad Farm in St Teath parish in 1920. She lived at the farm with her parents Tom and Liz Cleave, and her three brothers - Bob, Tom and Richard. The three boys between them used to carry her on their backs to school at St Teath and generally spoilt their young sister.

On leaving school, Tren helped out on the farm with her family and took an interest in the parish of St Teath. She loved dancing, and It was here one night at the Imps Ball that she met her future husband Sydney. Two years later, during the Second World War they were married and in 1944 came to live at Pendoggett. Syd died in 1990 and Tren remained in her home until three days before her death in the Royal Cornwall Hospital, Treliske.

Tren loved her garden and flowers. She was a stalwart member of the Conservative Association all her life and President of the St Kew branch for many years. Tren and Sydney were faithful members of the congregation of the Church of St James the Great, St Kew and active members of the Parochial Church Council. In Tren's words, 'she helped out wherever she was needed, and especially running raffles for the Church and all charities, for which she was justifiably famous! Each Christmas, for very many years, she organised the collection of food, clothing and blankets for the Night Shelter at St Petroc's, Bodmin, Breadline in Penzance and the Salvation Army, sometimes using a similar tactics to her raffle selling!

But Tren's desire to support charities and to provide for the homeless and those in need stemmed from her strong Christian faith, which was both prayerful and practical. She was a regular communicant and prayed every day and she also had a genuine care and concern for the poor, the sick, the lonely and disadvantaged and did what she could to help them.

She was a member of the Church's healing group, until she became too frail to attend any longer, and used to visit sick and lonely people around her.

Tren's proudest moment was when she was among those chosen to meet the Queen and be presented with the Maundy money in Truro cathedral on Maundy Thursday, 1994.

Although suffering from angina for many years, Tren lived to celebrate both her 80th and 90th birthdays with lavish parties for her family and friends arranged by her niece Winnie. In her final years, she was lovingly cared for by Win and her nephew Bill in particular, and by her neighbours.

She died on Wednesday August 31st after a short illness. A retiring collection was held for Port Isaac Surgery.

he funeral of Major Peter Edwin Barnett, aged 93, was recently held in St Endellion Church and conducted by Canon Judith Pollinger with internment in St Endellion Churchyard. Chosen hymns were 'For the Beauty of the Earth' and 'O God our help in ages past.' Organist was Angeline Seymour. A poem was read by his granddaughter, Chloe-Mae. Major Barnett had a distinguished army career and the nine medals he won during the Second World War were placed on his coffin which was covered with the Union flag. Peter leaves a widow, Valerie, three children, James, Richard and Sophie and three grandchildren Jay, Chloe-Mae and Arlo.

Peter Edwin Barnett was born in Born in Romford, Essex in September 1917, just five weeks after his father Captain Edwin James Barnett (Royal Engineers) was killed in action at Ypres. In 1923, at the age of six, Peter had his first taste of Africa on a visit to his Aunt at Avondale, near Salisbury, Southern Rhodesia, now Harare in Zimbabwe. Travelling out on the Union Castle Liner "Goorkha Castle". He attended his first school in Avondale and travelled a lot with his aunt in what was then a very pleasant and peaceful country.

Peter's mother, married again in England in 1925 to Noel Doorly, then a magistrate in Kenya and his half brother John was

The funeral of Major Peter Edwin Barnett Military Cross, the 1939 to 1945 Star, Edwin Barnett, aged 93, was

born in Zanzibar in 1926. His parents were now stationed in East Africa while Peter attended boarding school at Cranleigh, Surrey UK and then at the age of 13, Sherborne School in Dorset. Having passed matriculation examinations for university entrance he was articled to a firm of land agents for a three year apprenticeship. He bought his first car for £6 and a Calthorpe motorcycle for £2 a year earlier. After leaving school he played rugby for Hereford.

In 1938, on his 21st birthday, he was reunited with his parents in West Africa, the Gold Coast (now Ghana). On his return to England in 1939 it was apparent that war against Germany was inevitable and he enlisted in the Royal Artillery. After a few months in the 120 Field Regiment he joined the 61st Division in Northern Ireland and after two and a half years with the same regiment he applied for a posting overseas. He joined a draft of reinforcements for the Middle East arriving in Egypt and based at the main reinforcement depot. In October 1942 he was posted to the regular 7 Field Battery of the 4 Field Regiment, Royal Artillery.

He was promoted to Major at the age of 27. During his service to the country Peter was awarded nine medals - The

the Africa Star, the Burma Star, the
Defence Medal, the War Medal, the
African General Service Medal, the
General Service Medal Cyprus and the
Territorial & Efficiency Decoration.

He retired from the army in 1959 and was then appointed Secretary to the British Turkey Federation where a colleague introduced him to Valerie Woodford. They soon became engaged and were married at the parish church of Evershot on 31st March 1962. When Peter's offices were to be moved to London, he decided to leave the Federation and become self employed and in 1972 bought a restaurant in Port Isaac, which they ran for 21 years. It was a huge success, although there were 'Basil Fawlty' moments from time to time!

Son Richard remembers his father buying them a boat complete with outboard motor. He (Richard) was already working on the fishing boats after school and weekends and he was soon fishing for mackerel, lobsters and crabs. He recalls, 'We had a fairly tidy arrangement: I would catch fish and supply the restaurant at weekends and in return dad would pay - 50p for a lobster!

"He was a loving father a devoted husband, a kind, gracious and honest man - in fact a most remarkable man."

Raymond Provis, Port Isaac

It Peter's Church, Port Isaac was full with people standing at the back for the recent funeral of well-known former local fisherman and harbourmaster Raymond Provis. The Fisherman's Friends, who had sung 'The White Rose' at Ray's 80th birthday celebration, sang it again during the service, which was conducted by Canon Judith Pollinger, who also conducted the interment afterwards at St Endellion Churchyard. Chosen hymns were 'Eternal Father, Strong to Save' and 'Will your Anchor hold?' and the organist was Janet Townsend.

Ray's eulogy was written by Geoff Provis, who has very fond memories of Ray from childhood onwards: Ray was born in 1926 at Vine Cottage, Rose Hill, Port Isaac. He was the youngest child of Anthony and Gladys Provis. His siblings were Harold, Cyril and Doreen. His father was the harbourmaster of Port Isaac and a fisherman, as was his grandfather. During the summer months of Ray's early days, his father regularly went away yachting as the shell fishing then was very poor. Many youngsters at Port Isaac similarly missed their fathers in this way.

When Ray was a few months old, his family moved to the new Council Houses in Trewetha Lane, and they were pleased to make the move, as the new houses offered some modern conveniences. Ray attended Port Isaac School, and he always intended to follow his father into fishing. After leaving school he was too young to enlist for the War, so he assisted the War effort by carrying water to the Liberty Boats at Plymouth.

He started his fishing career on the *Boy Fletch*, helping his father and grandfather. Meanwhile, his future wife Madeleine came to work at Port Isaac in the Wheelhouse. In 1947, Ray married Madeleine Curtis, at Port Isaac, and they had two children, Carol and Howard. In that year he also bought his first boat, the 17 ft *Why Not*, with which he fished for shellfish with withy pots between Port Isaac and Polzeath. Ray and Madeleine lived in a cottage in Dolphin Street, and Ray was also a member of the Port Isaac Football Club, the Badminton Club and the Liberal Club, where he played billiards and snooker. Ray cut his withies at the family withy garden at Pine Awn, and at times he could be seen carrying large bundles on his back across Lobber towards Port Isaac. He then made his own withy pots, and he became quite expert at it, later making smaller ones to sell in local shops.

Ray often took younger boys out on his potting trips, such as Jimmy and Dugald Sproull, giving them their first taste of potting. He was very strong, and in his younger days he sometimes carried Leonard Honey, an asthmatic, up the hills from the beach to the Council Houses. The family moved to the Nook in Middle Street, and there Ray and Madeleine began boiling their crabs in a Burco boiler to sell as dressed crabs to make a little more money. In 1962 the *Why Not* was sold, and Ray became the owner of the *Maple Leaf*, his father's boat. He then worked her for shellfish with his cousin Warwick Provis. Ray was very good working on the Kelvin engines, and he put an extra engine in the *Maple Leaf*. Madeleine fully supported Ray with his fishing activities.

Ray succeeded his father as harbourmaster at Port Isaac, but he soon began fishing from Rock where he worked larger vessels. He began making good friends with Padstow Fishermen with Ray making good use of his sense of humour and fun. There was much radio chat between Port Isaac Fishermen and Padstow Fishermen whilst trawling in Port Isaac Bay, and the Padstow Fishermen presented Ray with a large wooden spoon which was signed by them. Ray was proud of this, and it hung on his front room wall. He was friendly with many Port Isaac people including Harold Brown and Mark Townsend.

Ray was a talented artist, although he had no lessons, and he produced many paintings, mostly of Port Isaac and of a nautical theme. Madeleine was also a very talented artist, and she supported Ray in all his activities.

Ray was a hero to his children Carol and Howard, and he was always there for them with his sense of fun and humour.

In 1965 whilst trawling in Port Isaac Bay in the *Deo Gratius*, Ray and his fishing mate Bailey Trayes were rescued during high seas by the Padstow Lifeboat, whilst RAF Shackletons lit up the sea with flares.

Between 1974 and 1979, his son Howard crewed with him on his fishing vessels. Ray eventually worked a boat named the *Lady Jane* based at Rock for John Watts. He took paying anglers on sharking trips mainly in the Crackington area, where Ray had noticed that many sharks were getting tangled in his ropes and nets. Whilst Ray was skipper, six world line records were broken, and one large porbeagle shark caught by the *Lady Jane* was listed in the Guinness Book of Records.

Ray eventually injured his shoulder in a car accident forcing him to give up fishing. In 1995, Madeleine died and this was a huge blow to him. Ray remained in his house at Mayfield Road, and on many occasions he cooked for his family, and also made pasties for them.

He was a great help to his nephew Geoffrey whilst he researched his book on the Fishermen of Port Isaac, but being very modest, he did not want his picture on the back cover.

Incredibly, Ray retained his sense of humour and fun whilst desperately ill and in some discomfort. This made it much easier for his family, especially Carol to cope. Even the carers remarked that he was an exceptional patient, given the extent of his illness. Carol can be proud that, due to her efforts, Ray remained at home which was his wish.

Many years ago, Ray made friends with two Bristol visitors to Port Isaac, Terry and Janet, and they became lifelong friends. Recently they have been taking Ray out on car trips during his illness.

Ray will be much missed by his children, grandchildren, extended family and many friends in Port Isaac.

The Provis family wish to thank Reverend Judith, the Fisherman's Friends, Allison and Katie for keeping the teapot going and last but not least, the people of Port Isaac, for making Ray's funeral such a fitting tribute to a good Cornish man. Ray would have been very proud.

Robert Manders reports:

The answer to last month's little poser is that there are **NINE** wind farms in Cornwall (and, of course, there are innumerable individual wind turbines, like the one at St Kew School). Incidentally, have you seen the new 50kW turbine at the top of the hill at Burlerrow, St Mabyn, on the way to Bodmin? The proposal for a similar one overlooking Pendoggett has been withdrawn, but we can expect more to appear in the future.

It was interesting to hear that Dick Strawbridge's house at Tywardreath, adapted for green living and featured in a series of programmes on BBC television, is up for sale: if anyone wants a property with ALL the attributes we've been advocating, it is available! I wonder if he found it even more difficult "going green" than the TV series suggested, or has he become just another TV "celebrity" and moved out? I remember he built a wooden waterwheel and launder to harness the power of a stream on the property and generate electricity. There are now all sorts of equipment to suit every kind of head (the pressure available) and flow (large or small), including Archimedian Screws and turbines. The traditional problem is intermittent flow. which is only cured by storage of water, hence the large millpools or "lodges" in our valleys, which are not transposable to the average back garden.

Anaerobic digestion sounds like an ideal solution to a lot of problems: it can use all

sorts of organic material (including food waste and farm refuse), and it produces gas (which can be burnt to fuel an engine driving a generator) and a solid residue. It could be useful in this area since we have quite a concentration of restaurants/cafés. which have problems in disposing of their waste, and we are surrounded by farms. However, to make a digester economic it would have to be large, and that would imply lots of lorries bringing in the raw waste, which would overload our narrow roads, and that obviously creates difficulties, particularly in the tourist season of the late Spring, Summer and early Autumn. I think they ran this problem as a story-line not long ago on "The Archers", and abandoned the idea, but here, perhaps......

A longer walk, out to St Kew for lunch and back to Port Isaac for tea - wellies necessary

From the Platt go via Church Hill and the Valley path (Robin Penna's Guide, Footpath nos.35 and 36) to Port Isaac Mill and Tresungers Farm (as in Trio July 2011), and on via their entrance lane up to the main road, B3314. At this point we leave St Endellion Parish and, I must admit, enter "unknown" territory, i.e. St Kew Parish and a path I've not walked. However, cross the road (care!) and take St Kew Parish Footpath no. 10 uphill through one field, downhill through a second, keeping to the righthand hedge both times (and admiring the view from the summit), to Trevinnick Farm. Turn right and follow the lane (which eventually joins the lane from Tregellist Farm) until it meets Gravelin's Lane (the road from the B3314 to Chapel Amble) opposite a post-box. Turn right and, at the next junction, turn left towards St Kew School. Just past the entrance turn right, then immediately left down towards the Ford. Just before this, cut through left, below the Parish Hall to the Church, and the Inn just beyond. Allow about an hour-and-a-half for the outward journey.

Coming out of the Inn, turn left up the narrow, winding road, bearing right at the top. Continue along the road past turnings for Lanow (on the right) and Pennytinney (on the left) until, after about a mile, at the top of the hill, you take St Kew Parish Footpath no.12 through a gate on the left. Go straight down towards and through a gate at the bottom, and follow the lane leading uphill, with views opening up on the left. At the top, through the gate you walk past a muck-heap (mud, etc.) and down a lane (care! slurry) to the farmyard (more gates). Straight through, bear left up the hill (more slurry!) and bear right (gate or electric fence) to follow the left-hand hedge to the B3314 (stile with binder-twine top). Cross the road (care!) and the stile (a little

to the left) back into our Parish and onto Footpath no.14. Diagonally left across the field you find a stile in the hedge (concrete blocks sticking out, but beware of loose stone by left hand!), then diagonally across another field (now on Footpath no. 13) towards Poltreworgey Farm. Make for a gap to the right of a large building and cut through with the silage-clamp immediately on your right, then turn right uphill to a stile. Over this turn left down the field and aim for a gap in the hedge; over the stile there's a vertical drop down the far side of the hedge, and another stile. Cross the field, making for the left-hand edge of the embankment hiding the tennis-court. A stile or kissing-gate should be installed here soon; climb up and bear right towards a stone hedge and the main road into Port Isaac, the B3267.

Cross the entrance to Trigg Court (new name, it's Bodannon Bungalow on some maps and Coldstanton on others!) and follow the verge (thank you, Ken for mowing it!) until in 150 yards you find a stile on the right. Over this, keep close to the left hedge as you go down the field on Footpath no.7, finding a stile on the left after 150yards. Go over the stile onto Footpath no.8, climbing diagonally towards a stile (not initially visible) in the far left corner. Over the stile turn right along the B3267 (care!) until you can cross to the left-hand verge (thank you, Roger for mowing it!). Follow the road through Trewetha [footpath no.35 on the left leads to Port Isaac via the Valley path], cutting the corners by the grass verges, to reach the entrance to Trewetha Farm. Here you must decide whether to take the footpath no.2 down to Port Gaverne, or follow the road (care! almost no verge!) for 330yards to the Car Park, and our footpath back to Port Isaac. Allow an hour-and-ahalf for the return journey.

One last titbit of information: overall around 20% of the electricity used in this country is for lighting, while for non-residential use (factories, farms, roads, etc.) some 40% is for lighting. You can understand why the 60W incandescent lamp bulb is no longer produced – we should all change over to long-life, low-energy lamps, it would make a difference!

National Trust news

So you have just finished a huge roast dinner on a Sunday afternoon, what could be better than going on a gentle stroll along this rugged coast to walk it off?

Port Quin to Epphaven circuit

Follow the coast path to Epphaven and come back along the road.

Parking: Port Quin car park.

Walk length: 2 miles

Time: 1 hour

Walk description:

- From the car park turn left, over the bridge and past the slipway, walk up the road, past the hairpin bend until you get to a Slate stile on your right. Go over the stile and follow the coast path. This gives you great views of the Port Quin inlet. This inlet was a sheltered haven for vessels unloading coal and manure, and taking out antimony and lead from local mines.
- Further along you will see two fenced off areas using slate posts and wire. Now
 be careful when approaching these, as you will see as you get closer that they
 are in fact two very deep mine shafts! They are the remnants of a now disused
 antimony mine which was closed at the end of the 19th century. Antimony was a
 yellow pigment used in ceramics and was used as an additive to other metals.
- From here stroll along the coast path through the meadows up the gentle hill towards Trevan Point. You will go through two gates and at the top, over a slate stile in a wall. From here enjoy the fabulous view over Epphaven, Lundy Bay and the Rumps. All of this area is grazed in winter by Dartmoor ponies, which help us by keeping back the scrub and encouraging wild flowers and maritime grassland habitats to thrive.
- Follow the path down the slope if you wish to have a closer look at Epphaven Cove. (Alternatively part way down turn left at the waymarker and follow until you find the gate). Here is a delightful sandy beach at low tide fringed by rock pools and caves. At the bottom of the slope turn left at the waymarker, before going through the kissing gate. This will take you inland, up through the scrub. At the top turn right, through a field gate.
- Here, keep going straight on, up the track until you get back to the road. At the road turn left, and this will take you all the way back to Port Quin.

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
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

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
