#### "will my son still want to play football with his Dad in ten years time?!"

#### Dear Trio

The Parish Council are pressing ahead with borrowing £376,000 over ten years at 2/5% interest, to do the car park - no toilets, no lighting. I haven't managed to see the plans yet (nor it would seem have most of the parish councillors). The bare bones of the deal are that the Parish Council generally accepts the figures detailed in the October Trio, give or take a few hundred pounds. They are making savings on some things, eg the ticket machines will be under guarantee for five years, Cornwall Council will collect and bank the takings saving admin costs. Cornwall Council will also undertake to pay any shortfall in paying back the loan so there should be no burden on the precept we all pay – instead the whole of Cornwall will make up the difference!! I estimate this will be between two and eight thousand pounds a year. In return for this generous deal, Cornwall Council will take ALL the money from the car park for a maximum of ten years.

The majority of the Parish will not benefit from the car park for ten years (120 months). Any improvements to the playing fields, skate park etc will have to wait until the car park loan is paid off. My children, aged 6, 8 and 10, will be 16, 18 and 20 by the time any major improvements are undertaken. If you have an unborn baby your child might just benefit.

There will be no more money from the Parish Council to do the small things like extra grass cuts in the playing fields. I went to play football on the field on Sunday October 23rd. The grass had been cut to four inches high and not picked up. I had trouble getting the ball to travel more than five feet despite numerous pleadings to the Parish Council to keep the grass cut and picked up. I'll have to wait until 2022 to get a decent kickaround – oh, I'll be 63 years old then and Oscar will be 20 and he won't want to play football with his Dad then!

An alternative is to improve the entrance with the £38,000 paid by Doc Martin and the car park money collected by Byron and Rphil (£75,000 divided 60%/40%) approx £30,000 this year. Add to that last year's car park income – more than enough, you would think. However, to my knowledge this option has never been explored or discussed - and we would be approx £30,000 a year better off. It's not rocket science! As I see it:

**Parish Council preferred option** - Year One - No money for the Parish, Year Two -No money for the Parish, Year Three-No money for the Parish, Year Four-No money for the Parish, Year Five-No money for the Parish, Year Six-No money for the Parish, Year Seven-No money for the Parish, Year Eight-No money for the Parish, Year Nine-No money for the Parish, Year Ten-No money for the Parish, Year Eleven-£30,000 for the Parish.

**Residents preferred option** - Year One-£30,000 for the Parish, Year Two-£30,000 for the Parish, Year Three-£30,000 for the Parish, Year Four- £30,000 for the Parish, Year Five-£30,000 for the Parish, Year Six-£30,000 for the Parish, Year Seven-£30,000 for the Parish, Year Eight-£30,000 for the Parish, Year Nine-£30,000 for the Parish, Year Ten-£30,000 for the Parish, Year Eleven-£30,000 for the Parish

#### Dear Trio

I need to raise my concerns over the recent proposals to complete the plaving fields car park at the entrance to the village. The September parish council minutes posted at the Co-op noticeboard indicate borrowing of over £450,000. Since John Browns intervention, with figures published in Trio last month showing a possible annual loss of £5000 and loan repayments of £38,000, I understand the parish council has now revised the loan figure down to around £350,000. There is obviously no business plan, there has been no public consultation and I don't believe our parish councillors are guite sure of the commitment they are making on behalf of the parish. Only six elected councillors are left. The remaining five were co-opted by the councillors themselves, not elected. Are they all going to be there at the next election or commit us to years of debt and then walk away?

It was well over ten years ago when the parish council was asked if it would put in a skateboard ramp. I remember the kids coming to the meeting to ask for it. The answer then was 'no money available'. If the parish council commit to this ludicrous loan it will be another ten years at least before any improvements in our playing fields take place as all the revenue will go to paying off the loan.

I would like to propose that the parish council commit to spending at least £20,000 on the playing fields . We know they have receipts from two years car parking plus a large sum from Buffalo productions. This must be nudging £100,000. The tarmac area used for temporary parking in the past is an ideal area to put a skateboard half-pipe. The majority of residents do not benefit from the day visitors who use the car park. The revenue must be used to benefit all in the parish not just the banks!

We do not need a fully tarmacced car park . You and I are no longer allowed to tarmac our front gardens for parking because of the water run off. So why should the parish council think its a good idea? I suspect a large part of this loan would go to pay for extensive drainage to prevent the rest of our playing fields turning into a quagmire.

We can dramatically cut the cost of this project by looking at more environmentally friendly alternatives. Sort out the entrance this coming year with the money we have and make improvements as more money becomes available from car park receipts.

# Cooking with Martin

Some ideas for Bonfire night, to go alongside the traditional favourites like bangers and mash and hot jacket spuds baked in the fire.

## Nulled cider

a hot toddy to keep you warm

100 g brown sugar 1 pinches salt 2 litres cider 1 tsp ground allspice 1 tsp whole cloves 1 pinches nutmeg 2 oranges, peel only, cut into segments 6 cm cinnamon sticks 50 g blanched flaked almonds, lightly toasted



1) Combine the sugar and salt, and add to the cider in a large saucepan.

2) Tie the spices in cheesecloth, you could use a clean J cloth or tea towel, and add to the cider. Slowly bring to the boil. Cover and simmer for 20 minutes.

3) Remove the spices and add the orange peel, cinnamon stick and toasted almonds before serving in a punch bowl.

#### Toffee apples

please be careful when making this dish as hot sugar hurts a lot if you burn yourself with it!

> 225 g demerara sugar 110 ml water 0.5 tsp vinegar 2 tbsp golden syrup 25 g butter For the apples

6 apples 6 wooden skewers, for holding the apples – ice lolly sticks will do

1) Dissolve the sugar in the water over a moderate heat. When it has



dissolved, stir in the vinegar, syrup and butter.

2) Bring to a boil and cook without stirring until it reaches hard-crack stage (138C) or hardens into a ball when dropped in a jug of cold water. This should take around 10 minutes boiling time.

3) While the syrup is cooking, pierce each apple with a wooden stick.

4) Once the toffee is ready, dip each apple into the hot toffee, turning it around in the syrup so that each one is fully coated.

5) Leave to harden on a lightly oiled tray before serving. If you're planning to keep them for a day or two, wrap the apples in lightly oil greaseproof paper.



#### Parkin

Parkin is essentially the Northern English form of gingerbread. Yorkshire Parkin is eaten on Bonfire Night, November 5th, celebrating the famous failure of Guy Fawkes to blow up the Houses on Parliament in 1605. Guy Fawkes was a Yorkshireman.

This Parkin Recipe is easy to make and creates a lovely, moist sticky cake - though you can eat the cake almost immediately it gets stickier if you wrap and store it for several days.

8 oz/220g soft butter 4 oz/110g soft, dark brown sugar 2oz / 55g black treacle/molasses 7oz / 200g golden syrup/ corn syrup 5oz/ 150g medium oatmeal 7 oz/ 200g self raising 4 tsp ground ginger 2 tsp nutmeg 1 tsp mixed spice 2 large eggs, beaten 1 tbsp milk

1) Heat the oven to 275°/140°C/gas 1, grease an 8" x 8"/ 20cm x 20cm square cake tin.

2) In a large heavy-based saucepan melt together the butter, sugar, treacle, golden syrup over a gentle heat. Do not allow the mixture to boil, you simply need to melt these together.

3) In a large, spacious, baking bowl stir together all the dry ingredients. Gradually add the melted butter mixture stirring to coat all the dry ingredients and mix thoroughly.

4) Gradually, beat in the eggs a few tablespoons at a time. Finally add the milk and again stir well.

5) Pour the mixture into the prepared tin and cook for 1½ hours until firm and set and a dark golden brown. Remove the parkin from the oven and leave to cool in the tin.

6) Once cool store the Parkin in an airtight tin for a minimum of 3 days if you can resist eaten it, you can even leave it up to a week before eating and the flavours really develop and the mixture softens even further and become moist and sticky. The Parkin will keep up to two weeks in an airtight container.

Enjoy and stay safe.

## Eric Stokes

We mourn the passing of Eric Stokes, who lived in Port Isaac for over twenty-five years, and whose deep love for both the village and its' inhabitants was often reflected in the poetry he wrote.

Born in South Norwood in 1923, Eric grew up in a large family. After he'd finished school, the announcement of war halted any further plans. Eric joined the R.A.F 600 squadron and his subsequent years in the war took him to Algeria, Italy and Greece. In particular, Eric looked back on his time in Italy with fond memories, often joking about his ability to charm sophisticated Italian beauties! The end of the war brought Eric back to London. Although happy to be home, the memories of the war never left him. Among his poems about Cornwall's charming cliff paths and crashing oceans, there were poems about the futility of war and the brave friends that he'd lost but not forgotten.



In 1951, Eric married Audrey Weekes and their son, Stephen, was born in 1955. Around this time, Eric became the manager of a building company that worked on some of London's most famous sites. After their son had grown and married, Eric and Audrey decided to leave the bustling city in search of a quieter life. They settled in Port Isaac where they opened a clothes shop 'Eric & Audrey's'. Eric fell in love with the rugged beauty of Cornwall and the warmth of Port Isaac's small community. Eric soon became a fixture in the village, known for his stripy shirts and poetry writing. The new millennium brought Eric an opportunity to be Quiz Master in his local pub- a role he cherished. Even after he retired from it, Eric often attended the quiz. He remained a recognised and well-liked character in Port Isaac.

Eric Curtis Stokes passed away peacefully on Monday the 17th of October 2011. He is survived by his wife, Audrey, his son and daughter-in-law and his two granddaughters. He will be greatly missed by his family, his friends and by the village of Port Isaac, his feelings for which he summed up in the final lines of his poem 'The Soft Heart A' Beating';

"I came as a stranger, you called me your friend, With these humble verses this 'thank-you' I send, God prosper your village, and still to the end Keep your soft heart a' beating"

Eric's funeral will be held at St. Endellion Church at 2.30pm on Wednesday November 2nd. All are welcome to attend. No flowers, donations to Cornwall Air Ambulance please.

his month's column is all about electronic books (ebooks), which have become popular through ebook readers like the Kindle. This is a good example of a company, in this case Amazon, turning a threat into an opportunity when it seemed like books would become much less attractive to people as they could get all the information they needed through the television or the internet. Amazon, the biggest online retailer of books, came up with the Kindle book reader and this has stimulated a rapid growth in the electronic book market. Now you can get the free Kindle ebook reader for your computer (windows or mac), for the iPad, for various smartphones including the iPhone.

Cleverly they linked up the reader to the Amazon online book store, so that you can purchase books from them and then read them on your Kindle, or any of your appliances that happens to have the Kindle reader installed.

The amazing thing about this is that as well as stimulating the book market for recently published books, it provides a way of reading classics which are out of copywrite and can be obtained for nothing. It is sometimes a bit complicated so I thought I would use this column to explain.

I have recently downloaded some of Joseph Conrad's books, all for free. Heart of Darkness might not be your cup of tea, but I thoroughly enjoyed it, and wouldn't have read it probably if it wasn't so easy to get.

Now the next bit is quite technical, so probably a teenager might be useful here if you have trouble. And things might go wrong, so proceed at your own risk. It shouldn't as Amazon has taken great care to make their Kindle 'app' very resilient and it should work on most computers.

Anyway, I will press on as it is worth the effort. So to start with you need to install a copy of a free Kindle reader and I will take you though what you need to do if you have an ordinary Windows PC. First of all you need to log on to Amazon (www.amazon.co.uk) and find the Kindle download page (<u>http://tinyurl.com/6dn7q9r\_</u>). Click on download and then install (run the programme). This should work fine as I mentioned above.

Having downloaded and installed it you can click on the icon and it will open up with a nice startup screen. You may be asked to register it with Amazon, and I am not sure if you have to as I have been registered with them for some time and forget whether you need to. Once the programme is open you need to locate where your ebooks are stored. There is a toolbar along the top with a tab called 'tools'. Click on this and then click options, then to 'content' which will show you where the folder 'My Kindle Content' is. This is the place the computer stores your ebooks. You will probably have some free gifts from Amazon already in there.

Ok, now to the good bit where you can get your free books. Firstly if we have a look at Project Guttenberg. Johannes Gutenberg (born in 1398) as you will probably know, was a blacksmith who invented the first printing press. Project Gutenberg (<u>www.gutenberg.org</u>) is named after him and has the same aim of bringing books to as wide a readership as possible. It offers ove 36,000 freee ebooks to download.

Supposing you wanted to get Charles Dickens' 'A Christmas Carol' (it being that time of year), you put the title in the search box and up it will come. You can download two versions, one with and one without images. When you download it, save it to the folder called 'My Kindle Content'. Then when you open up Kindle it will be there for you to read.

A rather advanced tip, but well worth a try, is to download copy of the magic catalogue from http://freekindlebooks.org/ MagicCatalog/magiccatalog.html and load this into your Kindle reader. When you read this catalogue you can click on the book titles.

I did 'Alice's Adventures in Wonderland' and it takes you straight to it online in the project Gutenberg website and download it for you. You only to need to make sure it's saved in the right place, ie 'My Kindle Content'. For an entertaining video about how to get the best our of your Kindle for PC, have a look at http:// www.youtube.com/watch?v=R3Eos6C2hAQ

If you are interested in Cornwall and the Cornish, and why wouldn't you be, The Federation of Old Cornish Societies has a cracking website and you can download over 400 free ebooks about Cornwall from there - www.oldcornwall.org/Library.htm Project Gutenberg also has a few historic books about Cornwall.

Hope you enjoy the read.
