

Village Hall Curtains - An Appeal!

For those of you who don't know, I have offered my services for free to make up two sets of curtains for the Village Hall, one for front of house, and another set to hang at the rear of the stage as a backdrop. I have also made a new set of blackout blinds for the hall at way below my usual price! I have obtained fabric at ridiculously low cost for all these improvements.

Making days involve taking my workroom apart and transporting it all to the Hall, including my machines and my commercial steam iron, and then setting up all the tables - not something I am prepared to do unless people turn up to help.

To date, this task has taken two full days work. With the help of volunteers, I have completed one curtain, and the second only needs it heading tapes affixed. The second set has all been joined together; they now need hemming, pleating and taping. Each curtain is 6.5 m wide and 3 m long... in other words a lot of very heavy fabric!

I estimate that the remaining work can be completed in a day. So I'm sending out a desperate plea for help to finish the project. I can't do evenings, there wouldn't be enough time to complete and it would

necessitate too much disruption to my workroom to allow me to work too. You do not need to be able to sew, merely measure and pin under instruction. Neither do you need to be female! What you do need to be is fit enough to stand at the task, able to lift fairly heavy loads in tandem... and have a 3/4 hr time slot free. The larger part of the job is actually handling that amount of fabric to feed through the sewing machine, a task not possible alone.

Failing enough volunteers coming forward my next suggestion is that the committee pay me and an assistant to complete the task. Now do you really want all your hard earned fund raising to be used up on paying me?

Below are three dates in March when the curtains could be completed. I do not need more than four people at a time, in fact three would suffice. Neither do you need to commit a whole day; if we have enough volunteers we can work out time slots to ensure that I have the right numbers at any given time.

cooking with martin

March is a little thin on the ground for seasonal produce. Many of the winter favourites such as sprouts, leeks and parsnips are on their way out (although you'd never know it since leeks and parsnips are in stores all year round), to be replaced by incoming early crops.

In March the purple sprouting broccoli is almost cause for celebration. It's very tough and hardy, and is therefore able to withstand the winter without trauma, and be ready and good to go in late February and March.

Purple sprouting broccoli is almost on a similar culinary and gourmet level to asparagus, with such a delicate flavour and texture and short season, but with a few differences; first of all, it is much easier to grow, and less preparation - you can even eat them raw off the plant. When cooking, it's best not to cook them for too long - brief steaming or blanching is the best way, because overcooking will quickly turn them soggy and a dull looking colour and then tossed in a little butter, a squeeze of lemon, Cornish sea salt and a grind of pepper.

Spring Onions start their long season in March. Spring onions bring a fresh taste to the table in a pretty dull time of year for vegetables.

Wild Garlic available most year round. Wild garlic is commonly found all around the area. It's actually pretty mild. The young leaves can be eaten raw in salads, used as flavourings in soups and stews. I use the flowers to decorate plates, and no they are not wild orchids as one tourist tried to tell me whilst I was picking them on the bank of Trewetha Lane. The bulbs can also be eaten later in the summer if desired.

Leeks a staple ingredient of many stews and soups in the winter. Leeks are in season from August to March but at their best in the depth of winter, when few other vegetables are fresh in season. A true gourmet vegetable, it has a subtle flavour that its relatives such as onion and garlic long for, making it a delicious meal in its own right, steamed, fried or grilled.

Wild sea trout, or salmon trout, bears little resemblance to the farmed trout sold in supermarkets. Its time spent at sea means that it is closer to wild salmon in colour, flavour and texture but without the prohibitive price. It's difficult to make a bad dish using good sea trout. All wild sea trout should be sold with a tag through the nose to show traceability and that it has been caught legally - talk to John at the fish cellars and try it yourself, or if you can wait a little longer, Asparagus and Cornish earlies will be in season and make a killer combination.

Sea Trout Fillets with a Lime-Anchovy Butter

To make the butter, beat some chopped anchovies and chopped capers into butter and blend in a little lime juice and zest. Wrap the butter in cling film, shape into a sausage and chill (the butter can also be kept in the freezer ready for use with any other flavoursome or oily fish).

Grill the sea trout fillets under a hot grill for a few minutes.

Serve with a slice of the butter melting over each fillet and seasonal vegetables of your choice for a sensational meal.



Quiet Days & Study Days

Celebrations of the Book of Common Prayer

The 350th anniversary of the Book of Common Prayer is being celebrated in a variety of ways in St Endellion Church. Throughout the year less well-known services from the 1549, 1552, 1559, 1560 as well as services from the more familiar 1662 version will be used in worship on week days and some saints' days.

The Christian feast of the Annunciations on March 25th marks the visit of the angel Gabriel to the Virgin Mary when he told her she would be the mother of Jesus, the Son of God

Our local MP, Dan Rogerson, reports -

Performance statistics for secondary schools across the country were released recently, but with an important difference from those that have been published in previous years. For the first time, the Government is publishing separately the GCSE achievements of looked-after children and those on free school meals at every school. Nationally, the statistics show that children on free school meals or in local authority care for at least six months are half as likely to achieve five A* to C grade GCSEs including English and maths compared to their more well-off classmates.



However, schools across Cornwall will now receive extra money through one of the Liberal Democrats' key policies, the Pupil Premium. This gives extra cash to schools to support children from disadvantaged backgrounds (nearly £500 per eligible pupil this year), for example by providing extra one-to-one tuition, more teaching assistants or afterschool activities.

Wadebridge School will receive £33,600 this year. The total Pupil Premium funding for next year nationally will rise to £1.25bn, double the amount, in 2011-12. This means an extra £4,741,000 for Cornwall - Wadebridge School would be projected to get £92,400 in 2012/13, whilst Port Isaac Primary School would get an extra £4,200.

The new information about how schools are performing will give us the opportunity to see the effect the Pupil Premium money will have on the lives of those pupils that were routinely overlooked by the previous Government: those from the poorest and most vulnerable backgrounds.

I recently wrote to schools across North Cornwall, to invite local students to get involved with the Speaker's School Council Awards, a national awards scheme designed to celebrate the achievements of school councils. Open to every infant, primary and secondary school in the UK, the awards asks school councils to nominate their most successful project. Projects can be big or small: what matters most is that they have made a difference to the school or community. Four winning schools will be invited to an awards day in Parliament where they will receive a special trophy from the Speaker of the House of Commons, John Bercow, and take part in a host of activities to celebrate their win. Young people often first experience the democratic process through their school councils (I know I certainly did!) and this scheme is a great way to connect this experience to the work of Parliament. It is vital that we encourage opportunities that offer young people the chance to speak up about the issues that interest and affect them, and the work of school councils are helping to do just that.

I have also been able to welcome a £68,000 investment in WREN - the Wadebridge Renewable Energy Network. The cash from the Coalition Government has been awarded as part of the Local Energy Assessment Fund (LEAF), which awards funding to organisations to improve understanding of energy efficiency and renewable energy generation issues at a local level.


The money is another boost for WREN and for North Cornwall. The cash will help people to save energy and keep costs down at a time when we are all concerned about rising energy and fuel prices.

'March comes in like a lion and goes out like a lamb' - the month usually starts cold and windy and ends with mild pleasant weather

I'm sitting in The Core Educational Centre cafe at the Eden Project writing this. The weather is fantastic and despite the fact that this cafe only opens at weekends during the Winter, there are lots of nice eating places in other parts of the Project. And did you know that if you gift aid your ticket you can get an annual free pass? So I thought a suitable topic for this month would be what websites are connected with the Eden Project. You could start with the Eden Project generally, which everyone will know a lot about already, and has an excellent website www.edenproject.com which gives you lots of information. One of the new things you can do inside the tropical dome is to climb up to a viewing point right at the top and look down on the rain forest canopy. Its all held up by wires and you can see through the steps, so not for the fainthearted. There is such a lot to learn here. From where I am sitting there are displays of where food comes from, what foods provide in terms of vitamins and minerals and a place for drawing your own favourite food. With the sun streaming in the window it is a fine place to be.

In the Core there is a giant nutcracker from which you can learn about energy processing by winding its handle (which is being wound as I write. There is Seed, a 70-tonne granite sculpture which is surprisingly impressive. It has the pattern of a pine cone, but this pattern turns out to be one which illustrates the fractal appearance of natural things. You see it on sunflower seed heads and pine cones and in the way branches form - in fact all over the place. The web has some great sites about fractal geometry, so to take a detour here have a look at one website, an example of many, where there are pictures of fractals in nature http:// tinyurl.com/7bmjcwl ranging from sea shells to snowflakes. The main thing they say about fractals is that they are 'self-similar' that is as you zoom in you see the same pattern repeating. So a fern will have a certain structure of leaves, but if you zoom into a leaf you



will see the same pattern again, and zooming in deeper will see the same thing. The remarkable thing is that you see this with the non-living world as well. A coastline will have a certain pattern, and as you zoom in the rocks and crags are organised on a different scale but in the same way. If you want to know more about this the wiki is a bit complicated http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Fractal but has some lovely patterns.

Back to the Core and you can see a film about how they made the Eden Project which, love it or not, is an extraordinary achievement. Then there are the solar panels, which are now much less of a novelty. We have quite a few in the village, and there are lots of solar farms going up. But even so there are some useful tips about how they work. The rainwater collection system is worth a look as it has very large pipes with funnel all the rainwater so that it can be used in the project. The fact that the UK is facing a water shortage, which was on the news this morning, is a reminder that water is a scarce resource for us, but also world wide. A place to read about that if you are technically minded is the International Water Management Institutue http://www.iwmi.cgiar.org/which contains up to date research on the state of water systems globally. The conflicts about water are worryingly serious and these can be explored at a website which has a history of conflicts concerning water which they have been working on since the 1980's http://www.worldwater.org/conflict/.

And to end on a brighter note about human nature, the Bakery restaurant at Eden started a new system in May last year which relies on honesty. The food is all locally sourced as far as possible and prepared in full view, which is fun to watch. You go and pick what you want from the tables, where the really nice food is laid out and a coffee from one of the coffee making people, or whatever drink you fancy. Having eaten and drunk what you want you go and tell the cashier what you had and pay. They don't check up on you! I asked a couple of the staff how the system has been working and they say they would have expected their takings to be a small percentage (perhaps 3%) higher but they were very pleased with the way it was going. They don't make much by way of savings by this approach, but it impressed me and will be a reason to tell people about it. It is not often these days people trust you, but here they do. A nice comment on the spirit of Eden in my view. People are basically OK, you just need to bring the best out of them and if you want to read the research about honesty and how it works, here is a website http://blogs.hbr.org/cs/2008/01/how_honest_people_cheat.html

I recently had the interesting experience of seeing democratic local government at work, a site-meeting of the Planning Committee (East) of Cornwall Council, in St Kew Parish. The committee was assembled to consider a proposed wind-turbine, on a hilltop at Treharrock Farm. About thirty people from Pendoggett and other parts of the Parish were present to express views on the subject. Our own Parish Council was represented, as its opinion had been sought (at a meeting late last year, when our Council had narrowly supported the proposal).

An officer from the Planning Department described the scheme. and the farmer concerned explained why a wind-turbine, rather than an array of solar panels, was proposed. He received support from several other farmers, while the scheme was criticised by a number of local residents, including the immediate neighbours. The views expressed were often made very strongly, on each side. Complaints were made of noise and flicker, but it was alleged that many who had objected in writing were 'up country' and rather far out of earshot. The views of the National Trust, the **Environment Agency and many other** official bodies were heard, some in favour, some against but making positive suggestions for modification of the scheme. (So many members of St Kew Parish Council had "declared an interest", and withdrawn from their meeting, that the meeting was no longer quorate and could not come to a decision, either way). At the end, in fairly friendly fashion, heavily-loaded 4x4s left the field, and the biggest traffic-jam ever in the lane from Pendoggett to Churchtown dispersed.



A couple of nights later, in Council Offices in far-off Liskeard, the Committee considered several similar proposals, and rejected the majority, including this one. The farmer is expected to appeal.

The topic of wind-turbines is one that does polarise public opinion: on the one hand people are worried at the possibility of proliferation, with a wind-turbine on every hill (and if they're not actually in Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONBs), they are visible from them). And it should be noted, in this county of ours, we are sensitive to any desecration of the landscape, despite the fact that the landscape has been evolving continuously for centuries.

On the other hand, this country has a duty to produce as much power as possible from renewable sources, and wind is certainly in that category here in Cornwall. However, wind is not absolutely reliable, and it is suggested that every wind-turbine has to be "covered" by another form of generation to allow for the times when it is not producing power. The background coverage in this country, at present, is by coal- or gas-fired power-stations, or nuclear-powered ones, all of which use non-renewable resources. Some, at least, also produce the "greenhouse" gases, carbon dioxide and oxides of nitrogen, and should therefore be doubly avoided. The only conclusion one can really come to is that wind-turbines are not the whole solution to our energy problems, although we do not agree with those who say they are (part of) the problem.

One answer, with which it is difficult to disagree, is to absorb as much energy from the Sun as we can, either by solar panels of one sort or another, or by green plants using sunlight to power the conversion of carbon dioxide and water into sugars, starch and cellulose. These latter can provide energy in many ways, directly or indirectly, such as food for us human beings, or fuels, to name but two. Although it is known that the Sun is gradually using up its own hydrogen fuel, there seems to be enough for the next few thousands of years, and we can safely assume that the output of solar energy, which we can harvest, is more or less constant.

The other answer, with particular relevance to Cornwall, is to abstract energy from the (absolutely reliable, almost regular, constant) rotation of the Earth, e.g. by harnessing the tides. By doing this we will, of course, gradually slow down that rotation, but such is the mass of the Earth and the resulting amount of rotational (kinetic) energy in it, that we could abstract vast amounts of energy over long periods of time before we noticed, for example, any difference to the length of a day. In any case, that rotation is already slightly slowing down, as we can see from the occasional "leap second" that is added to the year nowadays. So, to conclude, we should put as much pressure as we can on Cornwall Council and the Government to build generating-stations capturing the latent power of the tides around our coast, and sow as many plants and trees as we can.

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
