The Parish Diamond Jubilee Beacon



Our beacon, organised by Robert Solman, is getting bigger by the day. It seems to grow overnight! There won't be a chance of anyone missing it when it is lit at

10.01pm on Monday June 4th

Our local MP, Dan Rogerson, reports -

One issue that I have been dealing with over the past month is the saga of the Council's new recycling collections, as residents across our area had to wait weeks for rubbish and recycling to be collected. When this problem first started, I was assured that the problems were merely teething troubles - but councillors should have anticipated and planned for any teething problems. Whenever a private contractor bids for a contract they will look to cut costs, but just as with the debacle when the out-of-hours doctor service changed, they need to budget for extra costs in the first couple of months until things bed down.

It might also have been a good idea to check on what residents liked about the systems they were replacing to get the best of all worlds. However, the Conservative/Independent administration seems to be going from bad to worse, with the resignation of the Conservative Deputy Leader, the Stadium fiasco and now this.

Another ongoing issue is the government's plans to charge VAT on a number of products including Cornish pasties - the so-called 'pasty tax'. All 6 Cornish MPs recently presented a well supported petition against the pasty tax to Number 10 Downing Street - later that day I, along with Stephen Gilbert and the Western Morning News, co-hosted a pasty giveaway event in Parliament. The Cornish Pasty Association and the National Association of Master Bakers joined us to urge other MPs, members of the House of Lords and government ministers to think again on this issue and to find out more about how the proposal would affect the industry here in Cornwall. I am continuing to raise this issue in debates in Parliament and with government ministers to urge a re-think on the issue.

In national political news, Parliament had a visit from the Queen recently. As part of the State Opening of Parliament, the Queen's Speech outlines which pieces of legislation Parliament will be debating and voting on in the coming year. As with all things Coalition, there was a mix of Liberal Democrat and Conservative priorities - and I was pleased to see a host of proposed legislation reflecting what the Lib Dems have been fighting for and campaigning on for many years.

The introduction of a Grocery Markets Adjudicator is one such priority. Cornish Liberal Democrats have long campaigned for a fair deal for farmers and the introduction of a supermarket watchdog or 'adjudicator'. This Adjudicator will strengthen the hand of farmers against large supermarkets who can abuse their power by passing on unexpected costs and excessive risk to the farmers, producers and suppliers.

Other important reforms include legislation to properly regulate the banks, so that they will no longer be in a position to hold the country to ransom when their financial gambles don't pay off, measures to improve support for children with special educational needs and to give parents more flexible maternity and paternity leave. A Green Investment Bank has been set up to invest in green manufacturing and technology industries and in addition there will be measures to look at improving pensions and social care for the elderly.

Whilst Parliament welcomed the Queen recently, I have also had the pleasure of welcoming one visitor to our area, the Olympic Flame, whose arrival has been long planned and another, the Deputy Prime Minister Nick Clegg, who came at rather shorter notice.

Nick Clegg's visit to Cornwall started off at Robartes Junior School in Bodmin to see how the new Pupil Premium money is being spent at the school. The Pupil Premium is extra cash given to schools to help make sure that children from disadvantaged backgrounds are given the best possible educational opportunities. This was on the front page of the Lib Dem Manifesto at the last General Election and has been championed in Coalition Government by Nick. In 2011/12 Cornwall's schools received £4,741,000 and the amount increased to over £9 million this year. Locally, Port Isaac Primary School should be getting an extra £4,200 in 2012/13.



At Robartes in Bodmin, Nick got to meet the pupils and see at first hand the kind of extra activities the school is putting on using their Pupil Premium money. The Head Teacher of Robartes, Ewan Murray, explained to the Deputy Prime Minister how the extra money is making a real difference to their budget. We also discussed a few ideas on how the Government could make changes in terms of supporting children who are fostered or being raised by extended family members.

At lunchtime I organised for a group of business people to meet with Nick. There was a cross-section of businesses from different parts of North Cornwall who came to speak to Nick about the challenges they are facing.

It was off to Padstow in the afternoon where we met apprentice and trainee chefs working with Rick Stein. Nick launched the £1 billion 'Youth Contract' earlier in the year to make sure that every young person had an opportunity of employment, education or training, and it was great for him to meet apprentices working in our area who now have the training and skills they need for the workplace. Those responsible for training and recruitment across their range of restaurant and hotel businesses set out how they welcomed this Government initiative. The young chefs themselves were very impressive in their cooking flair and their obvious love of their chosen career.

The next afternoon the Olympic Torch came to Lanivet and Bodmin, and I went along with my family to join in the celebrations. Whilst I had lobbied the Olympic authorities to get the flame to come through more towns and villages in North Cornwall, it was great to bump into people from all over the area who came to take part in the celebration.

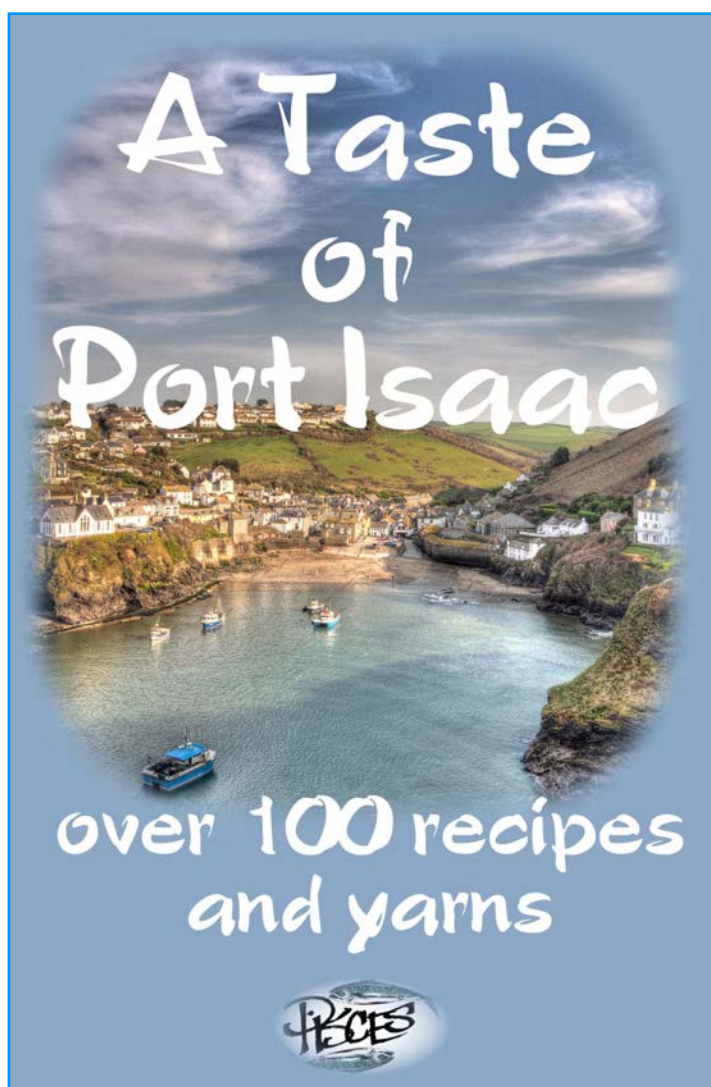

PIGS THE RYDER CUP AT TRETHORNE GOLF CLUB

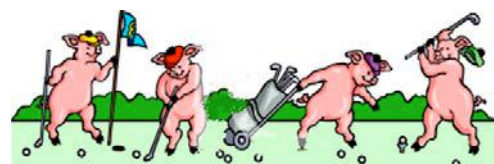

God Save Our Gracious Queen

No prizes for guessing the topic of this month's piece for June 2012 – it can be no other than the Queen's Diamond Jubilee.

In an age when few people in government inspire trust and when words like 'duty', 'obedience', 'service', 'loyalty' and 'dedication' seem out of place in our consumer culture, the Queen, before and throughout the 60 years of her reign has exemplified these virtues.

Even as the Princess Elizabeth, in a speech in Capetown on her 21st birthday on 21st April 1947, she declared, '... My whole life whether it be long or short shall be devoted to your service.' We know now it was to be a long life and also that she meant and has kept every word she said. Then, when she became Queen she said, '...Through out all of my life I shall strive to be worthy of your trust.'

She has always acknowledged the devoted support of her husband, Prince Philip, the Duke of Edinburgh, but I feel sure that the main reason she has been able to fulfil these promises has been her deep Christian faith. She has lived her faith rather than spoken about it, except for last year on Christmas Day, when she made explicit reference to it when speaking about Christ's birth.

She said, 'Although we are capable of great acts of kindness, history teaches us that we need saving from ourselves – from our recklessness or our greed God sent into the world a unique person - neither a philosopher nor a general, important though they are, but a Saviour, with the power to forgive.'

And she went on to say, 'Forgiveness lies at the heart of the Christian faith. It can heal broken families, it can restore friendships and it can reconcile divided communities. It is in forgiveness that we feel the power of God's love.' She then ended her speech by quoting the prayer which is last verse of 'O Little Town of Bethlehem' saying, 'It is my prayer that on this Christmas Day we might all find room in our lives for the message of the angels and for the love of God through Christ our Lord.'

On Sunday June 3rd there will be special Jubilee services in all our churches so come and celebrate and give thanks to God for our most sovereign Lady Queen Elizabeth and join in the Jubilee prayer asking that 'she continues in faithful obedience to God and in devoted service to her lands and peoples, and those of the Commonwealth now and all the days of her life.'

Websites of the Month



The World Wide Web has not been going long - just a tad over twenty years. In that time it has grown in an extraordinary way and in recent times Port Isaac and its environs have increased the number of websites about us and our area. So this month I thought it would be timely to have a look at what websites Port Isaac and the surrounding villages have. As well as websites there are blogs, wiki, video sites together with facebook pages and twitter (to name but a few!). There is too much to cover in one column, so this is just a sample.

The Early days: One of the early attempts to get a website for the village going was part of a project called STEER - St Endellion Economic Regeneration - one main task of which was the undergrounding of the cables in Port Isaac village. The website we worked on had a rather troubled time, with complications with the way it was hosted, and actually getting content onto it. However it is still there www.portisaac.org.uk/steer and while some of the links are a bit out of date, having looked at it again after a few years, it looks rather good. Perhaps this can be reborn with some enthusiastic input from someone. It has links for local business, voluntary groups, community news, emergency services. It is a very good structure and just needs the gaps filling in. Another site, which needs some upkeep but still has some useful information, is the Climate Friendly Parish www.stendellion.com/ which has the history of that project which was started over seven years ago.

The Steer website is an example of a community site which when done well can provide a 'one stop shop' for all businesses and events, and there are a number of sites that are a bit like that, but don't quite do the job. Mostly they are bigger sites with a link to our area. One that might be local, but it doesn't say who is running it is Port Isaac Online (www.portisaac-online.co.uk/) which has some nice photographs and description of the local area and a good list of bed and breakfast and similar accommodation. Another example is www.cornwalls.co.uk/Port-Isaac/ which has slightly different information, but it is well laid out and also has a good local map. A final example is http://www.thisisnorthcornwall.com/port_isaac.html which has a very informative page and is packed with information and photographs.

Facebook: Local people have their own Facebook pages, but there are also Facebook groups. One group for PISCES (Port Isaac Shared Community Exhibition Space) has a lot of information. Join the Facebook group called Port Isaac Shared Community Exhibition Space and you can see what is going on and also contribute yourself.

Blogs: The term blog comes from weblog, originally a way for people to record their thoughts and ideas, a bit like a log book. Now they have many of the characteristics of websites and a local example is the Port Isaac What's On at www.portisaacwhatson.wordpress.com/ which is also on

Facebook. This has up to date information on community activities including, at the time of writing, the upcoming Carnival.

Twitter: Known as microblogging has grown very quickly, and when I did a search on Twitter for Port Isaac I got over a 154000 hits.

Video sites: Far and away the biggest is Youtube and it has a large selection to choose from which include, of course, clips from Doc Martin and performances of the Fisherman's Friends, but many other short films, including peoples holiday videos showing what a good time they had here. However, they don't all show a positive picture. One, which is rather funny as well as being spot on about the traffic problems, shows cars trying to navigate their way through the village. This was in 2009 and has had over 25000 views and has some good discussion with it.

Pictures: There are many ways people can put their photos of the village online and they are there in great numbers. One of the main sites is flickr.com where a quick search found over 5000.

Music: Again lots to choose from here. The St Endellion Festival site is beautifully designed giving details of the history of the festivals, photos and diary dates www.endellionfestivals.org.uk Then there is the official Fisherman's Friends site <http://portisaacsfishermansfriends.com/news/> which has details of all their free Summer performances. There is also the Port Isaac Music Festival site www.portisaacmusicfestival.co.uk which shows pictures from the 2011 event. Finally a band which is making a name for itself is Alt J <http://altjband.com/> and one of the group hails from Trewetha.

Businesses: Many local businesses have excellent websites and rather than go into detail here, have a look yourself.

Why not take a look at our local GP practice site which is having a bit of a makeover. See how it turns out at <http://www.portisaacpractice.co.uk/>.

The RNLI also have a site http://www.rnli.org.uk/rnli_near_you/southwest/stations/portisaaccornwall which gives details of latest launches and fundraising, and also the people who provide this vital service.

And our local school has a very nice website <http://www.portisaac.cornwall.sch.uk/> with some very clever graphics and has a great set of pictures of the kids having a good time. There is also a link to a site where you can access free ebooks called Oxford Owl <http://www.oxfordowl.co.uk/>. The books are read to you and you can read along with your children. A really nice idea.

General information: General information about Port Isaac can be found in wikipedia en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Port_Isaac which, as you will know, you can contribute to yourself. It covers some history, places of worship, transport, local culture, film locations, well known people and some external links and talking of places of worship, there is a good site covering the six churches of North Cornwall there is lots of information here about history and activities http://www.stendellion.org.uk/st_peter_port_isaac/index.php.

And finally, one site that has been in the news is the Nitrogen footprint calculator and echo's some of the comments in the Climate Friendly Parish column this month. Global greenhouse gas emissions continue to grow and carbon dioxide is not the only one. Nitrogen in the form of chemically active compounds is a potent greenhouse gas and it has only recently been appreciated how much of a risk this is. cooking with martin



The strange start to the year from a overly hot March to a cold wet May, has made it hard for everyone but hopefully now we can start to enjoy the wonderfull produce Cornwall is blessed with

Broad beans

Broad beans are the only bean native to Europe and have been eaten - at least - since the Bronze Age. Their long, flat, slightly dimpled green pods are lined with a pale velvety padding protecting up to eight large seeds or beans inside. Also known as fava, broad beans are best in spring when they are young, sweet and have a nutty, vegetable taste. Towards end of season they are larger, tougher and more floury. The pod is usually discarded, often the skins of the beans are too, this is time consuming but well worth the effort!

Elderflowers

Though often called a tree, the elder is a shrub that grows like a weed. It is widespread in Britain, growing on railway embankments, parkland, roadsides, and in hedges. The elder's creamy yellow flowers start appearing in May and continue blooming through June and into July.

Think of elderflowers as a flavouring - something like a fresh spice or herb. You could add them to a gooseberry compote or apple jelly, or steep them in hot cream to use for making custard. Elderflower cordial is very easy to make and can then be turned into sorbet. Traditional Italian recipes blend the flowers with ricotta and spices to make tart fillings and fritters. Whole flower heads can be dipped in batter and deep-fried to make a dessert. Savoury uses include mixing elderflowers with honey, wine, mustard and garlic to make glaze for roast lamb.

Strawberries - I will include some strawberry recipes next month.

Even though we can buy strawberries throughout the year, nothing compares to sweet, home-grown varieties which ripen in June and remain in-season through to mid-August. Berries should be enjoyed soon after picking - if ripe and sweet, all you have to do then is hull them and tuck in. If you don't get a chance to pick-your-own at a farm, keep an eye out in the shops for strawberries with a sweet aromatic scent - they'll have the most flavour. Wash and hull soft summer berries just before you're going to eat them - if rinsed beforehand, they'll only go soggy and lose their shape. If they're reasonably clean, a quick wipe with kitchen paper should do the trick. Over-chilling tends to rein-in their natural flavour - you'll find that they have a fuller flavour when served at room temperature.

Gooseberries

Gooseberries are small soft opaque fruits with finely veined skins that can be furry or smooth. They have an acidic flavour that is strident early in the season but becomes sweeter as the berries are more exposed to the summer sun. Widely considered the quintessential British fruit, gooseberries were in fact not recorded here until the 13th century and grow in

cold countries right up to the Arctic Circle. The cape gooseberry, or physalis, is a different plant altogether.

Even when unripe, gooseberries are excellent for cooking. Their tangy flavour suits oily fish such as mackerel and salmon, plus veal, pork and roast game birds. Try them braised with carrots and dressed with balsamic vinegar and olive oil. Their high pectin content is a boon for making jams, jellies and other preserves such as fruit cheese and spicy chutneys. Gooseberries can be simply made into a compote to serve with cream or custard, or to fill a tart, crumble or steamed suet pudding. Good flavour matches include elderflowers, apples, lemon, sweet wine, sorrel, fennel, mint, parsley and nutmeg. The young leaves of the plant used to be included in salads.

Pan fried Mackerel with Gooseberries

(you should prepare the gooseberries before you start cooking the Mackerel)

4 whole mackerel, gutted & cleaned
2 tbsp olive oil
1/2 lemon, juice only
60 g unsalted butter
50 g caster sugar

400 g gooseberries, washed and drained
25 g ginger, finely chopped or grated
1 orange, zest only

For the tarragon vinaigrette

160 ml white wine vinegar
500 ml extra virgin olive oil
1/2 tsp lemon juice
25 g tarragon, lightly bruised
2 cloves garlic, crushed

To serve

handful rocket
handful baby chard
handful frisée
handful lollo rosso

First catch your Mackerel! Wash the fish under cold running water and dry thoroughly with kitchen paper. Turn the fish on its side and fillet it, cutting down each side of the backbone. Discard the bone remove any pin-bones from the fillets by cutting a small V shaped cut down the middle of the fillet, you will see a natural line in the fillet to follow, pull out this strip and you will have a pin boned fillet.

In a large frying pan, heat the olive oil until it is smoking hot. Lay the mackerel fillets in the pan flesh-side down and fry for 3 minutes or until golden brown. Turn over and cook the other side for another 1 minutes. Add half of the butter to the pan and when it melts and begins to foam the fillets are ready. Finish with a squeeze of lemon.

Melt the remaining butter in a small lidded pan and add the sugar. Stir in the gooseberries, ginger and orange zest. Cover with the lid and cook on a gentle heat for 5 minutes. Remove the lid and turn up the heat to evaporate the liquid, stirring occasionally. This should take about 10 minutes. Put the sauce to one side and keep warm.

For the tarragon vinaigrette: put the vinegar in a mixing bowl and season with salt and pepper, whisking until the salt has dissolved. Pour in the oil, while whisking, followed by a few drops of lemon juice to lift the seasoning. Add the smashed garlic cloves and tarragon and leave to infuse.

Put the salad leaves in a separate bowl and dress with the vinaigrette just before serving. Place the mackerel onto serving plates with a spoonful of the gooseberry sauce on the side and the dressed salad leaves.



Climate Friendly St Endellion

When this project started, three or four years ago, the first thing we tried to do was get some sort of an idea how much energy the Parish used in a year. Students, from one of our local colleges, drew up a questionnaire, which we delivered to every household. From the replies we received, we hoped to be able to estimate the total energy used domestically, while other members tried to obtain similar figures for all the local businesses, farms and fishermen. Of course, it was not just a matter of taking readings from electricity meters, one had to estimate the quantities of petrol, oil, gas, logs, etc used in the house and associated vehicles, in a year. We expected to be able to repeat the procedure a year later, when we would see whether the Parish's use of energy had increased or decreased. Our hope was that increased efficiency in the use of energy sources, better heat insulation and so on, which we would promote, would lead to a decrease. We could then truly claim to be a "climate-friendly" Parish.

Of course, things were not that simple! The replies to the questionnaire were not as numerous as we had hoped, despite the bribe of a prize for one lucky local resident. As a result, the estimates of total domestic energy consumption were statistically less valid than we had hoped, while it proved extremely difficult to collect equivalent figures for businesses, etc.. You might have thought that at least we could ask the electrical power distributor how much had passed through their network in a year. Well, we could ask, of course, but the answer was not forthcoming! So our attempt to set a "bench-mark", against which we could compare energy usage in later years, was doomed to failure, and we turned to other ways of promoting climate-friendliness in the Parish. The Village Hall roof has received additional insulation, largely financed by an award we obtained, while our members have tried to show what can be done, by e.g. installing solar water-heating and solar PV panels. We have attended Green Fairs elsewhere, and held one in Port Isaac, at which the latest information was available.

It is interesting to note that now Anglican and Methodist churches are now being asked for this sort of information each year. The Church of England has established a system of "bench-marking", while Methodists have an extra page to complete in their annual "Schedule A". When the figures are in for the second time, congregations will be able to see if they are getting better or worse at saving energy. It is suggested that, once the information is collated, it may be possible to suggest to churches/chapels in an area that they could purchase electricity (or other fuel) in bulk from the same supplier, and so obtain cheaper rates. We wish them success in their search for more efficiency.

Our Footpath Network

The weather has suddenly changed, and one's thoughts turn to using our footpath network again. A good one if it stays dry is from Port Gaverne along the South side of the valley (the right hand side as you stand with your back to the sea). It goes through two stiles, continuing along the valley as F.P.no.4 when F.P. no.2 goes off Right up the steps towards Trewetha. After some three stiles, and some confusing animal paths, you come to a shallow stream crossing (very muddy if it's been wet!), which you cross and bear Right, now on F.P. no.6.

You soon come to a stile over a stone wall and a small stream, which is the Parish boundary. Once across this strike up the hill on St Kew Parish F.P. no.13, to a gate in the corner. Through this, you cross the field to meet a hedge on your left, following it briefly. Some way along this is a gap, through which a waymarked 'permissive path' takes you past a house which did not want a (historic) footpath going past, and into a lane leading to the Cornish Arms at Pendoggett.

To return, you walk West along the B3314 (beware traffic!!) ½-mile (800 metres) until you find a stile and (St Endellion Parish) F.P. no.13 on the Right (North side). Cross the first field diagonally to a stile in the hedge; over this, go down the next field, keeping to the Right of all the farm buildings (Poltreworgey Farm), to a stile in the hedge surrounded by trees. Go over the stile in the fence directly in front and turn Left. Go down the field to a stile (with electric fence), hedge (care! big drop!) and another stile. Cross the field (recently cut for silage, then treated with slurry.....) to climb up just to the left of the embankment hiding the tennis-court, and come out on the B3267 at the entrance to Trigg Court.

Follow the Right hand verge (freshly mown!) of the road for 150 yards/metres, over a stile on the Right, and follow F.P. no.7 down the Left side of the field for 150 yards/metres. Go over the stile on your Left on to F.P. no.8, climbing diagonally towards a stile (not initially visible) in the far left corner. Over the stile turn Right along the B3267 (care!) towards the hamlet of Trewetha, from which you can find your way back to the Car Park (330 yards/metres along the road), Port Isaac (via F.P. no.35 and Port Isaac Valley, to the Left at the first bend in the road), or to Port Gaverne via F.P. no. 2, which begins on the Right just after the second bend in the road.

Clearing the undergrowth

The undergrowth which tends to partially block many of our footpaths is trimmed back once, in July, just before most of our visitors come. The Port Isaac Valley Path, no. 35, from Church Hill to the Mill, and from the Millpond to Twelve Acres (Trewetha), and the Postman's Path from Roscarrock Hill up the back of Lobber, are trimmed twice, in late May and late July/early August. Some other trimming is done as necessary, but we ask you to be understanding if any of the trimming has taken place just before a few days of warm, wet weather, when brambles burst into new life, growing as you watch! It is difficult to keep up with sudden spurts of growth. Happy walking!

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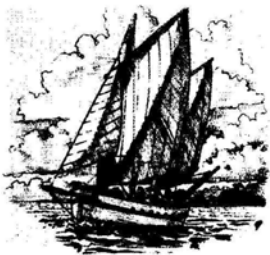
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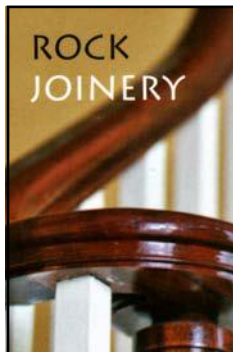
