In the papers - but for all the wrong reasons!

once again Port Isaac is in the papers with the Cornish Guardian (15/06/12) reporting "Visitors shocked by attack on car' and the Daily Telegraph (23/06/12) headlining "Cornish vandals target 'rich incomers'". However, our local PC, Malcolm Taylor told Trio, "Following tremendous local response to these newspaper articles and our house-to-house enquiries, we are gaining more information regarding the incident."

Every picture tells a story and the damage done to the visitor's Range Rover was extensive with deep scratches and the wing mirror smashed.



The vehicle was parked illegally on Church Hill in a passing space within a restricted zone. Residents informed the driver of this but were ignored and the vehicle did receive a parking ticket. However, the owners told the Cornish Guardian that "We saw no sign that it was a private parking space, nor was our vehicle blocking anyone's way".

At least three local witnesses were woken in the early hours of Bank Holiday Monday by 'animal like moaning'. One of them told Trio that she "witnessed a lady in a nightdress wielding a very large knife. Over a half hour period this lady 'knifed' the car extensively. At one point, when she reached the end of the car, she fell over onto the road."

The Telegraph reported that "Villagers in Port Isaac are speculating that an angry local may have been behind the attack on the Range Rover." Certainly everyone is speculating and there is a lot of anger – anger that this damage has been placed at the door of locals.

The Police are now carrying out very extensive enquiries and ask that if anyone has any further information regarding a suspicious female seen in the early hours, around 2am, on Bank Holiday Monday June 4th in the Church Hill, Middle Street and Dolphin Street areas to contact PC Malcolm Taylor, in confidence, on 0796 8087667.




Midsummer Music

Our local MP, Dan Rogerson, reports -

'd like to start with the good news about the government's change on the 'pasty tax'. Thankfully sensible voices in the Coalition listened and have accepted our position. The Government's change of heart came shortly after the Cornish Lib Dems called another debate in Parliament on the issue, where we continued to put the pressure on government ministers to think again. This was the latest step in the campaign and I would like to thank

everyone for their support. All the hard work locally and nationally to persuade the government that there was another way forward has paid off, and the fresh pasty from the bakers we have all grown up with will stay affordable and local jobs can be saved.

There has been some more good news for Cornwall recently as the Deputy Prime Minister and Liberal Democrat Leader Nick Clegg announced a shake-up for free pre-school education that will see extra help with childcare in rural parts of North Cornwall.

The exact details are yet to be worked out, but Cornwall has been picked as one of 10 areas in the UK where changes to extend the amount of free childcare available, and to make it more flexible for parents, will come in one year earlier than planned. So from this September, an extra 1300 two-year-old children across Cornwall will receive free early years education. This is on top of all three and four-year-old children who are already eligible to receive 15 hours of free early years education each week. This is great news for hundreds of two year olds and their families in our area who will benefit from free pre-school education a year earlier than originally planned.

The Coalition is also looking at ways to create additional nursery places specifically in rural parts of North Cornwall. Plans include developing a rural federation of childcare providers, improving childminder provision and working with JobCentre Plus to provide training for people wanting to work in childcare. I am extremely pleased that Liberal Democrat ministers have listened to my concerns about childcare issues in rural areas like ours, and are looking specifically at ways to extend and improve childcare in our communities.

By the end of this process 40% of families will get extra help in the form of free preschool education for their children from the age of two. Not only will this help working parents who may be struggling to juggle commitments with having young children, but early years education also gives a huge boost to young children and prepares them for school.

I have also raised the issue of school funding in the House of Commons this month. At Education Questions, I pressed the Secretary of State Michael Gove for a fairer system of school funding, asking the Government to better recognise the needs of schools in rural areas. The existing funding formula has meant that under the previous Labour and Conservative governments, Cornish schools received on average £350 less per pupil than the national average.

That's why I have been pressing the Government to make sure that when they are looking at changing how schools are funded, they need to consider a more transparent and fairer system which properly reflects areas of greatest need, whether that be in urban areas or rural ones like ours. However, at least the extra 'pupil premium' cash schools are receiving is ensuring that money can be used by schools to give the best start in life to everyone, no matter where they live.

If anyone knows where he is spending his evenings and nights please let us know and if you are giving him a second home could you please be cruel and throw him out and then hopefully he will come home.



Book review - Gull Rock by RR Gordon

Gull Rock is the recently-published novel by RR Gordon. As the main character says in the story, 'Clever name... Half the rocks and islands along this coast must be called that', but this is a very specific Gull Rock precisely rooted in the beaches and pubs, the roads and people of the North Cornwall coast.

The Gull Rock in question is off Trebarwith Strand, which is where the book's action mainly takes place, though the story also takes in Polzeath, Port Isaac, St Kew, Tintagel, Boscastle, Launceston and Bude. As such, the book is a delicious tour of beautiful settings, even though in the course of the story there are dark events unfolding along the coastline. Anyone who knows this stretch of coast well (and, I'm sure, a good number of holiday visitor readers) will enjoy the action of the book and the evocative descriptions, 'the icy bear hug' of the waves when you're surfing, the landscapes and ways of life of North Cornwall.

I came across the book in the PISCES 'Inspired by Port Isaac' exhibition among other books written by people (such as myself) based in Port Isaac or featuring the village (think Robert Wilton's The Emperor's Gold). RR Gordon's Gull Rock, just published, was new to me, and of course I wanted to read more.

The book's basic idea is a clever one – where would you go if you were on the run, unable to contact your family or friends, unable to use your credit cards? The answer of the main protagonist - 'Dan' – guilty of a crime he doesn't consider a crime, is to find casual unpaid work in bars and hotels in exchange for food and a place to put his tent. Having been a city banker it gives his life the simplicity that many of us crave, but he – and we – know that the net is closing in on him, as the detectives paid to track him down are following him along the coast. They – in particularly the chatty, eager and likeable Vinod – are well-drawn so we are sympathetic to them too as we read, and wonder how this manhunt can possibly end happily.

The plot is simple then, but surprisingly gripping: the highest compliment I can give the book is that I read it at one sitting, staying up well after midnight. The ending is – literally – a cliffhanger. It is published as an ebook, available from www.amazon.co.uk for £1.53.

"Are 135 parking spaces enough?"

Dear Trio

Can three people tell me everything will be alright regarding the car park? My main concerns are:

- 1) How can it be ok to go down from 260 spaces plus to just 135 spaces? To my knowledge, since Easter there have been over 135 cars nearly every day, with the best day being clost to 280 over the Easter weekend. Should we really be turning away so many cars?
- 2) The Parish is very proud of being a 'Green Parish' but there are no spaces for coaches. As a coach can carry 50 people, shouldn't we, as a Green Parish, be encouraging coaches as this would obviously be more eco-friendly?
- 3) And is this reduction to 135 spaces, which unless you double the parking doesn't add up financially, why Cornwall Council are dragging their feet on signing off on the loan?
- 4) We have got the car park for another year despite being told that we definitely could not run it again as a temporary car park. Is not now the time to rethink the whole scheme? Some people will say it's too late and we've spent over £50,000 already, but I would quote the old saying, "Don't throw good money after bad".

It seems to me that we've got another chance. Let's get it right. It's our field not Cornwall Council's; we should have what we want and 135 spaces is not enough in this day and age with no coach facilities etc etc. Do we want a thriving, vibrant parish?

Trio put John's points to the Parish Council and Councillor Martin Bell responded:

- 1. The size of the permanent car park never was 260 spaces. The parish council debated the size it should be, members agreed on 135 based on the numbers being lost from the harbour car park closure plus some extra, a planning application was made for 135 spaces and approved by Cornwall Council. The only record I have of 260 permanent spaces being discussed was a suggestion by Andy Penny in the early stages of planning, before he resigned from the parish council. The permanent car park might be extended into the grass field below for a number of days in peak periods using plastic mesh. It depends on demand.
- 2. There could be coach parking spaces but we would lose car spaces. At the time it was felt the CC car park was a better location for coaches, being nearer to the passenger drop off point outside the church hall. Once the permanent car park is built the ticketing and revenue collection will be handled by Cornwall Council, charging decided in consultation with them and if the public want more coach parties than currently come here it can be discussed by the parish council. However, there is presumably a limit to the number of visitors the harbour area can accommodate without changing it's character.

Parish Council request a site meeting with planners over development proposal for The Killing House

Dear Trio

There are currently plans before the Local Authority for the development of the building on Church Hill known as 'The Killing House' used most recently as a garage but now sold.

The proposed house within the conservation area will dwarf all the surrounding cottages and is totally out-of—keeping with the character of the village. Though the architect considers it will not be seen from the bottom of the village, it will be highly visible from any point above the bottom of the village in every direction. The valley will be totally overlooked with the inevitable decking and balconies.

We have all seen and deplored the huge developments in Polzeath that impact so badly on the eye as you approach the village and it would be very sad if Port Isaac were to be spoilt visually in a similar way.

The valley is described in the Architects statement as 'under-developed' - yes it is but do we want to open the way to development? I am not against change but it must be sympathetic with the surroundings. I was involved with initially having Port Isaac designated a Conservation Area and have tried hard to ensure that we look after our heritage ever since. There has been change but largely it is in keeping and thousands come here and delight in what they find.

The Parish Council have asked for a sitemeeting by the Planning Committee so that they can see for themselves the site and it's likely impact. I hope that anyone concerned about the necessity of keeping our heritage will come to that site meeting and make their views known.

3. Last year I advised parish council members that the car park couldn't operate as a temporary facility for another season because CC Planning's enforcement officers had received a local complaint that we were operating in breach of planning conditions and an understanding was reached that we could continue operating it providing the permanent one was built in time for the 2012 season. That didn't happen because of a delay by CC in approving the road widening design and agreeing with the parish council a cash flow guarantee to ensure no revenue shortfall had to be met by local Council Tax payers to repay the Public Works Loan Board loan. Hence we are continuing with the temporary facility for a further season but the road widening detailed design has now been approved and what is called a Section 278 Highways Act Agreement is currently being reviewed by our solicitors. We are still waiting for Cornwall Council's cash flow guarantee agreement although a meeting took place recently in Truro between myself, our Cornwall Councillor Brian Gisbourne and senior Cornwall Council officers, to move this forward. The parish council will not sign the approved construction contract with CORMAC until we have Cornwall Council's financial guarantee although our target for starting work is October.

4. Is it time to 'rethink the whole thing'. Who thinks so? Only if Port Isaac's business community decide they don't want the new car park any more because they are the ones who demanded it. There is no alternative car park location, the idea of using the PI playing field was pure fantasy, knocked on the head by the Port Isaac parents' revolt, the ITV news coverage and a very clear message from elected councillors on the CC Planning Committee that they would turn down a planning application for the playing field. If it is going to be built by the parish council then we are stuck with the present site and the approved design, which will cost £395,000 repayable over ten years.

If this sounds complex it's because it is. You cannot plan a project like this on the back of a Golden Lion beer mat, although some keep trying to.

Websites of the Month

This month's column is about two environmental topics: The Jet Stream and how it affects our weather, and the local wonderful work on environmental issues being done in Cornwall. I wrote about the jet stream back in February 2010 when we had a very cold spell and it was the jet stream that was at the bottom of it. Our current strange weather is also due in large part to the jet stream being in an odd position for the time of year and also getting stuck - so called blocking events - see http://www.bbc.co.uk/news/uk-18367583. The wettest April on record, in the middle of a drought in the South East, with associated jokes about the wrong sort of rain, shouldn't hide the fact that these are weather patterns completely consistent with what is predicted from climate change models concerning global warming. The jet stream forms a boundary between the warm air coming up from the equator and the cold air at the poles (there is one in the southern hemisphere as well) and as the planet warms, the pattern of these air currents change along with the ocean currents, both driven by the temperature differences.

Our local weather is determined by very complex forces, but one of the major ones is the position of the jet stream. For those who are technically minded there is a very good website from the Met Office about all this together with some clever graphics to explain it all http:// tinyurl.com/cesovpw. And these weather patterns should remind us that there is a lot at stake. At the United Nations Conference on Sustainable Development in Rio they have been debating how to respond to the environmental crisis we face, of which the changing weather pattern is one symptom. Their website http://www.uncsd2012.org/ is packed with information. As I write this article it is half way through and the signs are not good that they will reach any more useful agreements than they did in Copenhagen at the climate change talks. However, it is better to talk than not talk and this message from Rowan Williams, makes the case for doing something to leave our planet in better shape than we found it for generations to come http://www.anglicancommunion.org/acns/ news.cfm/2012/6/13/ACNS5119

So on to the good news from our local environmental work which was presented at the Knowledge Spa, the base for the Centre for Environment and Human Health http://www.ecehh.org/ at Treliske Hospital in Truro today (June 22nd). The conference was part of a series put on by the Peninsula Public Health Network http:// pphn.org.uk/. Both these websites are full of fascinating information about work being done on the environment and human health and public health more generally. At the conference we heard from Mark Summers who works for the NHS and a colleague Mike Westley who has his own company http://www.westleydesign.co.uk/ on work they have done on green spaces. Mark showed work by NHS Forest http:// nhsforest.org/ which aims to plant over a million trees, the same as the number of staff in the NHS. Mike has developed gardens like the one we walked round in Treliske which is for kids and others to play and relax in called 'Play for Life'. We also heard about a project which gets families involved in surfing and other watery activities called Keep it in the Family, which is having really fantastic results http:// www.getactivecornwall.co.uk/.

Finally Sustainable Healthcare has a great website with lots of useful information, toolkits and the like http://sap.greenerhealthcare.org/ which features many local projects. There is a lot going on, which can't be bad.

Jubilee in Church and State

Our Queen's Jubilee weekend occurred on Trinity Sunday. Just as the Queen's Jubilee celebrates the reign of our earthly sovereign so Trinity Sunday celebrates the eternal rule of the one God whom we worship in the form of Father, Son and Holy Spirit. The coincidence of these two celebrations is so apt that one would like to hope that it was foreseen. By rights we should have been celebrating the Queen's jubilee on February 6th, the sixtieth anniversary of her accession. But February is cold for street parties and June was when the Queen's Coronation took place in 1953 – but this is only 59 years ago so those anxious to celebrate the Diamond jubilee of the coronation will have another chance next year!

Our Queen is a constitutional monarch and her rule is one which does not easily yield to simple analysis. She does not exercise day-to-day power in the State which she heads, nor does she have the capacity to make laws. Nevertheless her significance in the lives of many of her subjects and now fellow-citizens is very great. Her longevity has given her a profound understanding of the meaning of government in the long view — a sense which those who have had the political responsibility of reporting on the doings of her government are ready to acknowledge. Her longevity also means that a very large number of her subjects have known no other ruler, a state of affairs which mirrors the closing years of the reign of her great-great-grandmother Queen Victoria. Most people's image of royalty is therefore of our Queen — and this extends not only throughout the Commonwealth of Nations in most countries of which she is Queen but also in many other countries of different constitutional patterns where nevertheless the role and image of royalty retains an enormous sentimental hold.

There is more than a superficial link to the Trinity in all this. The Christian conception of the deity as an interaction of persons is a means of conveying the subtleties of our relations both to God and between ourselves. In much the same way the constitutional position of our Queen enables us to focus both our subjection to political power and our mutual responsibilities as citizens. Just as our image of the Queen as ruler is one of the significant ways in which we recognise our mutual dependence upon each other in society and those ties which invisibly link us together, just so the image of the Trinity seeks to express the way in which we acknowledge the creative strength, redemptive power and sustaining love of the Godhead. Just as we are able, as subjects of Her Majesty, to ignore our political differences in a mutual acceptance of our subordination to her and to each other, just so in our worship of the Trinity can we sink those differences of liturgical practice and theological refinement which so often divide Christians, in an acceptance of our mutual dependence upon God and upon each other.

We are now assured that a contract has been drawn up and that the grass will be cut. We wait to see if this happens and will keep you informed. The churchyard will not be cut every two weeks through the summer as it was when the PCC was responsible but hopefully it will be maintained in the future. If you have complaints the relevant contact numbers are on a board in the church porch.

As regards attention to old family graves that have kerbs on them we would like to encourage you to maintain these and any that belong to a family that you knew who have now moved away. It is important that we all work together to look after this special place of remembrance.

cooking with martin





There's very little you can't do with strawberries - from succulent salads, indulgent cakes, ice creams and gateaux. The list is endless.

For a simple fruit salad, lightly sugar strawberries, add a few ripped mint leaves and a dash of orange liqueur. Leave on one side for an hour or two - until the fruit has made its own delicious, scented syrup. Serve with ice cream or a dollop of whipped cream.

Balsamic vinegar's rich-caramel-like flavour makes a good match with strawberries – for a spicy kick, try grinding over a dusting of black pepper too.

No cream tea would be complete without a pot of strawberry jam. Make a big batch after you've visited a farm and brought back plentiful supplies. You'll need to add quite a bit of lemon juice (a natural setting agent containing pectin – a setting agent) when making jam, because strawberries, on their own, don't make well-set jam.

Strawberries don't freeze well and lose their shape on defrosting. A better bet is to purée the fruit and use it in mousses, soufflés, ice cream and smoothies. It's a really good way to deal with a glut of the berries.

Making the puree

Just take 2kg/4lb 8oz strawberries and 100g/3½oz caster sugar. Wash and halve the strawberries and mix them with the sugar in a stainless steel bowl. Cling film the top and place over a pan of boiling water for two hours. Pass the cooked strawberries through a sieve, keeping the juice and the pulp. This can then be frozen.

Basic Strawberry Jam Recipe

4 cups strawberries 4 cups sugar 1 tablespoon lemon juice 1 tablespoon fruit pectin

Blend the strawberries in the blender Mix with sugar (usually its 1:1 fruit and sugar, but you can try with a bit less if you like).

Pour in the lemon juice and fruit pectin. Boil mixture then simmer for 5-10 minutes. Stir frequently. When finished take off the foamy top layer of the mixture. Pour the hot strawberry jam in hot sterilized jars. Make sure to fill it up to the top. Clean the jars with a damp towel. Close tightly. After 10 minutes turn the jar upside down onto its lid. Let cool down, turn around again and store.

Tip for better conservation - Please don't try this tip if you don't feel comfortable working with fire!!!!

Add one tablespoon of vodka, whiskey or gin on top of the strawberry jam before closing the lid. Light it and close quickly the lid. The fire will consume all of the alcohol and the oxygen. Inside the jar you will have a vacuum that allows for longer storage without using preservatives.

A fabulously summery English strawberry dessert with rosé wine jelly, macerated berries and elderflower cream. Strawberries treated three different but simple ways - a wine jelly, macerated fresh berries and a cream with elderflower.

For the jelly

300g (10½oz) strawberries 150g (5½oz) caster sugar 6 small sheets gelatine 300ml (10fl oz) rosé wine

For the cream

3-4 tbsp elderflower cordial 200ml (7fl oz) double cream 3 tbsp caster sugar

For the fresh berries

350g (12oz) strawberries 3 tbsp caster sugar

Make the jelly first. Hull and halve the berries and put them in a pan with the sugar and 100ml ($3\frac{1}{2}\text{fl}$ oz) water. Bring to the boil then turn down to a simmer and cook for about eight minutes. The berries should be completely soft but not collapsed into a purée. Strain, reserving the fruit, and measure the syrup. You should have 200ml (7fl oz). If necessary, top up with water. Carefully spoon the white froth off the top.

Soak the gelatine in cold water until it is completely soft - about five minutes. In the meantime heat the wine until it is just warm, but not hot (and certainly not boiling). Lift the gelatine out of the water and squeeze out the excess. Put the leaves in the warm wine and stir to help it dissolve. If the liquid is too hot it ruins gelatin's setting properties, so be careful. Add the strawberry syrup, stir and pour into six glasses to set (use glasses that have enough room for the jelly, a layer of sliced berries on top and then the cream on top of that). Put in the fridge to set - allow about four hours. Purée the cooked strawberries with the elderflower cordial. Whip the cream and stir in the purée. It's nice if this is marbled rather than completely incorporated. Set the cream aside until you're ready to serve (if you put it in the fridge make sure it comes out well before serving or it will be solid and 'fridge cold' - not pleasant).

For the fresh berry layer just hull the fruit then cut lengthways into slices about the thickness of a 50p coin. Toss in a bowl with the sugar and leave to macerate for 30 to 45 minutes (no longer, as they will get too soft). To serve, spoon the strawberries over each jelly and top with the cream.

Strawberry Daiquiri is a popular drink originating from Cuba, where it is known as a Fresca daiquiri. Making a strawberry daiquiri is really easy. This is the recipe for the frozen version of this amazing cocktail, which is made by blending all the ingredients. Contrary to popular belief, the classic non-frozen strawberry daiquiri is not made in a blender but shaken in a cocktail shaker.

6 fresh hulled strawberries 2 shots of light rum 3/4 shot of lime juice 1/2 shot of sugar syrup

Blend all ingredients with crushed ice and serve in chilled margarita glass. Garnish with split strawberry on rim. You could use the strawberry juice recipe from above replacing the strawberries and the sugar syrup with 2 shots of the juice.

Now all we need is some sun to ripen those strawberries. Enjoy Mx.



Tim Andrews

Tim passed away in Bodmin Hospital on Thursday June 28th.

Everyone who knew 'American Tim' will have their own special memories of times shared with him. He will never be forgotten.

Tim moved to Port Gaverne from Finland in the mid 1990s and lived at West Winds until he moved into Silvershell in Port Isaac. He was a lovely man and a friend to many - and he made a mean Martini!



How short a memory one has! — is it a sign of insipient Alzheimer's Syndrome? Last month I wrote of this project starting three or four years ago, but I was reminded soon after that it actually began in 2006. I first heard of it when another member of the North Cornwall "Local Agenda 21" Forum mentioned that Camel friends of the Earth planned to start such a project in the near future. As a local resident, and Parish Councillor, I was interested in their plans, asked some questions and, as so often happens, found myself involved. Both Penny and I already shared FoE's concerns, and found a kindred spirit in FoE member and Trewetha resident, Tony Wainwright, who contributes the "Website of the Month" article to *Trio*.

To come back to 2012, the international environmental conference known as "Rio+20" has just finished, with not really very much to shout about, unfortunately. The final communiqué was reported as being weak, and not committing anybody to anything much — it will be interesting to see the text, which will probably be out by the time you read this. It was a pity that there was a G20 conference at the same time; world leaders attended that, rather than Rio+20, showing where their priorities lie. The one thing that is certain is that there are now "Sustainable Development Goals" to continue after the "Millenium Development Goals" programme (established following the original environment conference in Rio twenty years ago), which comes to an end in 2015. We don't know the details yet, but we hope they are both attainable and 'extending'; if they are too watered-down, they may not be worth attaining.

The real problem is whether "development" is what we should be seeking in the first place. It may be that we cannot stay where we are (i.e. continue to live as we do now), or move forward, without irreparably damaging our environment. In which case we should be moving towards "Sustainable Retreat", rather than "Sustainable Development". Unfortunately, 'retreat' has a rather negative sound to it, so we had better use a positive-sounding word like 'transition' instead. This is precisely what the good folk of 'Transition Town' Totnes have done, in trying to re-adopt the best of earlier ideas and ways of doing things. People may think of it as moving backwards, but adopting lower standards than those to which we have become used may be the only way forward. I have even recently heard an economist on the radio (I almost wrote "wireless"!) say that "to bring everyone in the world up to the same level, those of us at the top (the 'developed' nations) will have to accept a reduction in our standard of living". And economists are usually the ones to stress the necessity of continued development.

The next big conflict of interests will come over the proposed wind-turbine at Treswarrow, right on the western edge of the Parish. While able to generate a similar amount of electricity to one of the Delabole turbines, this would dominate a wide area on our border with St Minver Highlands Parish. Preservation of our countryside, which has never stopped evolving, will exchange arguments with production of 'green' energy: may the battle be fought amicably, and with respect for the beliefs of both sides. 




