



I count myself as an extremely fortunate person, to have lived as long as I have, to have done some interesting jobs when I was younger, and to have been (compulsorily) retired at an age when I could still do energetic things with my new-found leisure-time. I am also very fortunate to have married into a family with connections in Cornwall, which led, eventually, to my living in Port Isaac, and to my being able to see the sea from my bedroom window. In this village, even if you have nothing to do with fishing, you are always aware of the sea, catching glimpses of it between buildings or over walls. You are also aware of its moods; salt spray on windows reminding you of the Nor'Westerly gale that was forecast, blowing straight into the Harbour, and the boats sitting it out somewhere better sheltered.

For my birthday I was given a book which will keep me occupied for a long time: "Ocean of Life" by Callum Roberts, professor of marine conservation at the University of York. Roberts starts by explaining how, in the first place, water arrived on what had been a very hot, dry planet. That water dissolved substances from the underlying rocks, and interacted with the atmosphere, very different from that existing now. Around 4 billion years ago life came into existence and living organisms formed, at first in the sea, later spreading onto the land. Green plants developed, which converted atmospheric carbon dioxide into oxygen which, in turn, allowed free-moving animals to evolve. All this took a very long time but, eventually, the first recognisable human beings created communities in East Africa about 2.5 million years ago.

They were thought to be plains-living hunters, using fruit and nuts from forest trees as part of their food, but only having a nodding acquaintance with lakes and rivers. However, almost all remains of Homo Erectus were found in caves on the shores of lakes or the sea, and they seem to have adapted to eating shellfish, crabs and turtles, a diet not much different from catches landed now in Port Isaac. Some aspects of our bodies suggest that we evolved to swim and wade, only later adding the ability to run. Human beings spread out to Europe and Asia, following coasts wherever possible, and developing methods of fishing (spears, hooks and then nets) to tap a steadily wider variety of prey.

Fish have always formed a substantial portion of our diet, and there have always been folk who went out in boats to catch them, but it wasn't until the nineteenth century that an industry became established. Demand from the growing populations of industrial cities encouraged use of bigger net and longer lines, emptying nearby fishing-grounds. Then replacement of sail by steam allowed boats to go further away, stay out longer, and made them less dependent on the vagaries of the weather. New techniques allowed the sea-bottom to be scraped clean of all fish, shellfish, seaweed, crabs — in fact, of all life. Now modern technology has made it possible for wide audiences to see on TV these effects.

In some parts of the ocean, all mature fish have been caught. Progressively finer nets have taken fish more and more immature, until no fish are left that can reproduce, and fish stocks are reduced to levels which are not only low, but unsustainable.

And finally, if the amount of Carbon Dioxide in the atmosphere increases (which we know it is doing), the amount of Carbon Dioxide in the sea (which is in equilibrium with that in the atmosphere) will also increase. Carbon Dioxide dissolved in water is Carbonic Acid, which attacks and dissolves Calcium Carbonate, which is what shellfish shells are made of. Which is bad news for shellfish, and is a great worry for Port Isaac resident, Dominic Boothroyd, at the Lobster Hatchery in Padstow.

Well, I got a bit carried away by all that: I'd better go for a walk along the Coastpath, just to see if the sea is still there!

# American Tim

Anyone who knew Tim will never forget him - we all have our own special memories. But most people only knew him as the man who lived up at West Winds at Port Gaverne and then moved into Port Isaac. So here is an extract from Tim's obituary, written by Diana Webster, that gives an insight into the 'pre-Port Isaac Tim'.

# Tim (Clayton Lippincott) Andrews 1927-2012

"Tim arrived at Helsinki University as its first lecturer in American Literature in the autumn of 1953. To his students it was as if he had been dropped from a University on another planet! He was young (26), lively, outgoing, witty, charming and not afraid to show his emotions. He encouraged everyone to call him Tim at the outset, at a time when first names were seldom used, and certainly not at the University.

Tim concentrated his energy and gifts on teaching rather than research, inspiring his students with a lifelong appreciation and love of American poetry and literature. He taught informally and with humour, and was very generous with his time for his students outside University hours, writing and directing two musicals for them to perform, going to plays and films with them and welcoming them into his home. He was awarded the *Order of the White Rose* for his services to the University.

Tim was also a hugely entertaining and witty colleague and friend, with an enjoyment of life and a sense of fun that was infectious. He was memorable for being a generous and imaginative host and, though totally informal himself, he embraced celebrations and anniversaries of all kinds and their rituals. He taught his friends many things, not least how to make the perfect American dry martini.

Tim's road to Finland was via New Jersey, where he was born, Amherts College, the American University of Beirut, and finally Helsinki where he spent half his Ife. Early on he bought a small island on the outer Pellinke/Pellinge archipelago, which was then quite remote and relatively uninhabited. The island, later known as Timso, became his great love and he went out to it as often as he could, in all weathers both winter and summer. It was a rare day too when he did not have guests, both Finnish friends and ones from other countries (including Port Isaac!).

Some other things, inextricably associated with Tim, were his passion for ships, from cargo boats to the great passenger liners, as well as his love of the great American musical comedies and songs, always playing somewhere in the background.

When he retired he spent more time traveling but wherever he was, however, he always went back to the island for the Finnish summer. Gradually, however, ther various ills of age affected his life until he was no longer able to travel, but he still returned to his beloved islands in his mind.

Tim often quoted a favourite saying of his mother's, "Always leave the party while you're still having fun." He just managed to do that himself, and died peacefully on June 28th to the strains of Ella Fitzgeald and a much loved godson at his side."

Thanks also to Dugald Sproull who provided us with the main entrance piece of a very nice James Bond style Astin Martin parked outside displaying 007 number plates.

After enjoying the buffet it was time to start gambling. Each player was given £10,000 worth of chips to start them off and could purchase more chips in multiples of £20,000 for £5. It was not long before all three tables were buzzing with eager gamblers trying to beat the house. Throughout the evening the numbers on the roulette wheel were raffled and near the end of the evening the wheel was spun. The ball spun and bounced around the numbers but eventually settled into the pocket of lucky number 2 putting the £50 prize money into Ellen's purse. Another £150 was available for the best gambler of the evening. This was won by Dave Danson who managed to walk away from the tables with a pocket full of fun chips totalling £180,000.

There was a good atmosphere all night with many asking if we intended on repeating the event or possibly making it a regular thing. It is definitely food for thought so watch this space.



# Our local MP, Dan Rogerson, reports -

Over the summer I have been talking to local dairy farmers about the problems they are facing with the prices they get for their milk and dairy products. Government agriculture ministers have announced up to £5 million in additional funds under the Rural Economy Grant scheme for high quality projects from the dairy industry, which can help producers to increase their competitiveness and add value to boost their market returns.

However, we can always do more, and for

farmers in North Cornwall, the current economic situation means an already difficult job is getting harder. That's why I have signed up to support the National Farmers Union's Stop The Cuts' campaign to help provide support and end the uncertainty for dairy farmers, and I will be continuing to press government ministers to get a fair deal for farmers in Cornwall.

I am glad that an initial voluntary agreement has been reached between farmers and processors, which should mean that contracts for milk will be freely negotiated, fairer, more transparent, as well as making it easier for farmers to leave a contract if they are unhappy with the price they are receiving.

I think everyone wants this voluntary Code to work out, but I am pleased that the Government haven't ruled out changing the law if this is the only thing that would lead to a solution to the problem. I am continuing to meet with local farmers to make sure that their voices are heard loud and clear in Westminster as the Government looks to make sure that a sustainable, long-term salutation can be reached so that customers, dairy farmers, and local producers can all be guaranteed a fair deal when it comes to the price of British

As MPs returned to Westminster in September exams were on the political agenda as the Department for Education announced some plans to change the system of GCSE exams. In the House of Commons, the Secretary of State for Education, Michael Gove, made a statement to announce the proposals, and I responded welcoming the positive aspects of changes to improve GCSEs. However, I also asked Mr Gove about the need for flexibility when it comes to things like coursework counting towards grades as well as exams in certain circumstances, so that all students can have the opportunity to demonstrate the best of their abilities.

When it was first suggested by the Conservatives that they wanted a return to CSE and O-level style exams, I joined the Deputy Prime Minister Nick Clegg in making it clear that we would not tolerate a return to a regressive and inflexible two-tier education system, and I am glad that these new exams will continue to be available to all children who currently sit GCSEs.

The plans would also look to end different tiers of exam paper, which mean that some pupils cannot be given higher than a 'C' grade, and unlike the old O-Level there will also be no cap on the number of pupils who can achieve a top grade if they deserve it. The Coalition Government is also proposing to introduce a single exam board for core academic subjects in order to end the "race to the bottom" whereby exam boards have been competing by offering schools the easiest exams in these subjects.

The Department for Education will now be consulting on their proposals, so that teachers, parents, pupils and businesses can have their say on how we make sure exams stretch all young people and prepare them for life after they leave school, and I will continue to monitor the plans to make sure that they are not only rigourous, but flexible and fair to all young people too.

### Soldiers, Sailors, Airmen and Families Association (SSAFA) Forces Help



# Chocolate Covered Hokey Pokey

Hokey Pokey is the Cornish term for honeycomb toffee, which is similar to the Irish Yellowman, and it is wonderful when covered in thick dark chocolate. Both Hokey Pokey and Yellowman are what were once termed 'Fairing Foods', ie they were sold up and down the land at regional fairs and country shows in bags as treats for children and adults. This is a great treat for any time of the year, but particularly so at Halloween when it can be bagged up as a homemade treat.

Hokey Pokey acquires its unique bubbly and crunchy consistency due to the reaction of the baking soda. The more you rapidly stir it when it is bubbling from adding in the bicarbonate of soda, the more it will bubble and the more air will be trapped when it cools, and the lighter your Hokey Pokey will be. So you need a very tall saucepan to allow for this rapid expansion, (it expands perhaps as much as five times the initial volume) as well as to safely get the golden syrup and sugar on to a rolling boil before adding in the bicarb. We always use a much taller saucepan (stainless steel) than is necessary, for safety (the temperatures of melted sugars reaching the hard crack stage are very hot) and it also stops splashes when it is vigorously bubbling.

The most common mistake when making Hokey Pokey is not getting the golden syrup and sugar mixture to reach the 'hard-crack' stage (160C or 300F) - the temperature at which boiled sugar becomes brittle when cooled - put the mixture onto a rolling boil long enough so that any drops of the mixture dropped into cold water will form a ball and when you squeeze the ball it is hard and brittle and not soft, if it is still soft it is still at the 'soft-crack' stage. Be careful though, much higher than the hard-crack stage and the mixture will burn and you will get a burnt taste in the toffee.

Also there is a balancing act when you add the bicarbonate of soda. You want to thoroughly mix the bicarb into the sugar and syrup mixture, (after adding in the vinegar) but you do not want it left too long in the very hot pan, as the bicarb will discolour the mixture to a dark golden colour the longer it is left. We are after a lovely yellow colour on the top and bottom and a darker golden centre.

So, this is what to do ...

You need: 450g golden syrup

400g caster sugar

1 heaped tablespoon of bicarbonate of soda

200g of chocolate (chopped up)

Grease the cooling tins you are going to use lightly with butter. You can use small square cake tins, to make a good sized individual portion, but one large tin from which pieces are broken off a slab is also fine and traditional.

In a very tall non-stick saucepan add the sugar, stir, then add the golden syrup to the saucepan. Gently boil the mixture on a medium heat for a few minutes, stir until all the sugar has dissolved. Then turn the temperature up under the saucepan and put the mixture on to a rolling boil - stir occasionally as it comes up to the boil. You need to be careful the mixture does not catch and burn, (if it starts to catch turn down the heat a fraction and stir).

Hokey Pokey - Boiling The Sugars Up To A 'Hard Crack' Stage - To know it is reaching the hard crack stage you are looking for thousands of tiny bubbles across the surface and the mixture to visibly thicken, and also darken slightly - it starts to look like a thick toffee froth. Stir occasionally and keep it at this stage for about two minutes. After two minutes use a thermometer or test the mixture by dropping a small amount into a glass of cold water. When the mixture can turn into a ball on contact with the cold water, and be brittle, remove the pan from the heat.

Once the pan is removed from the heat allow to cool for two or three minutes - then add the white wine vinegar carefully, (this will spit as a cold liquid is being poured onto a boiling one) stir it in, then quickly add the bicarbonate of soda and stir the mixture rapidly. Expect the Hokey Pokey to vigorously froth up, tripling in size, and turn bright yellow. Pour this frothy mixture quickly into a greased tin and allow to harden. If you did not boil the Hokey Pokey mixture enough to reach the 'hard-crack' before putting in the bicarb it will slowly sink and collapse as it cools, and you will need to start again.

Once cooled and set (about an hour) turn the toffee out onto a chopping board. Using a sharp knife cut it into small chunks, retain the larger pieces and remove the dust and rubble. In a bowl above a gently steaming saucepan of water, melt the chocolate. Turn off the heat and give the chocolate a stir and wait for it to cool for a minute. Use some tongs to dip and coat each piece of Hokey Pokey in chocolate and then place on a piece of greaseproof paper. Once all the pieces have been coated allow the chocolate to harden before bagging it up.

Enjoy and be safe as sugar burns hurt a lot! Mx

# Websites of the Month Climate Change and Farming

This Summer has been distinctly odd. Quite how odd can be found from the website UK Climate Projections (www.ukclimateprojections.defra.gov.uk). The main feature was the record amounts of rain, which seems to have been mainly due the position of the Jetstream, which has featured before in these columns. In recent times there has been a steady increase in what is known as the CET, or Central England Temperature, which dates back to 1659, and the rise since the 1970's has been considerably faster than the global rise in temperature. This echo's the news that the Arctic sea ice is at its lowest since records began, and it is melting much faster than had been predicted. The organisation which monitors this, the US based National Snow and Ice Data Center has a great website with really good views of the Arctic (www.nsidc.org). Reports in the press suggest that this change will have a significant impact on our climate. Given all this change, I thought this month a look at what's on the web concerning farming and fisheries would be worth a look.

In a recent survey of farmers views about climate change, around 60% believe that it will affect their farm / land in the next ten years, and in the South West it was 66%. This was reported on the Farming Futures website www.farmingfutures.org.uk which has been conducting surveys since 2008. They are supported by government (defra), the farmers (NFU) and a variety of other producer and retail outlets. Their aim is to support farming being a profitable and sustainable industry in the context of the challenges posed by climate change and other changes affecting the world. The website is packed with useful information presented in a variety of formats - videos, handouts and so on. Case studies describing particular farms approaches to these issues are also really well presented.

Farming Futures are part of a wider organisation called the Centre of Excellence for UK Farming (www.ceukf.org) which was established jointly by Waitrose and Aberystwyth University in 2010, to promote sustainable efficient production in farming and food supply. Its aim is to look at where innovation can provide some answers to the enormous challenges we face. They have four components to their work: A knowledge hub, Foundation projects, training, and farming futures. The knowledge hub describes some key projects they have been involved, and although I couldn't find any in Cornwall, some may have something for our local farming community, for example sustainable lamb production is described, bringing together real farming practice and innovative approaches from universities and institutes. The foundations studies are trying to find the right method to tell whether a particular approach will be sustainable or not.

As you will see from both websites this is early days for this work and the fact that many farmers (not a majority yet) say that climate change is already affecting them, accounts for the urgency behind their activities. Away from the more technical aspects of farming organisations like Natural England (www.naturalengland.org.uk) who promote a variety of projects for farmers on land management including environmental stewardship, energy crop schemes, woodland grant schemes and so on. They have a section devoted to farming and climate change with a special calculator called CALM-ES which allows a farm to estimate its greenhouse gas emissions and to suggest steps to reduce them. Apparently over 7000 farmers have used it, but it doesn't say how many have found it useful.

On the fisheries side, the current review of the EU Common Fisheries Policy, has prompted discussion of how best to preserve fish stocks. The recent report from the Plymouth-based Marine Biological Association.





Sadly, there seem to have been many deaths recently in our local communityfrom a six week old much-loved baby to a woman, full of years, aged 103. 


The concert at St Endellion Church on Saturday 13th October is 'Lyrical Ballads' with an evening of poetry and song.
