





I write in Lent and in what feels like the depth of winter. But you will be reading this in Eastertide and with at least the promise of Spring. The eccentric pattern of occurrence of the festival of Easter, dependent as it is on calculations

of the age of the moon, means that it can sometimes happen in March (as this year) before the true spring has declared itself. This can play havoc with the school holidays.

Nevertheless Easter is a Spring Festival. The first Easter occurred at the time of the Jewish feast of Passover, the commemoration of the exodus of the Jews from slavery in Egypt. It is a time of rejoicing for escape and bursting forth. But Passover was itself a spring harvest festival which could not occur until after the Spring equinox. The exodus of the Jewish people from Israel was seen as paralleled by the recreation of nature in the blossoming of nature.

And so for Christians Our Lord's resurrection, his bursting from the tomb, conquering death and bringing new life to the world occurs at a time when all around us nature is in the bud, full of the promise of blossoming to come. The message of Easter is a message of Hope. Easter eggs, about to crack open and reveal the life within and Easter bunnies and above all Easter lambs are all true symbols of the message of Resurrection and New Life.

All may not be well with the world and those of us who live in it but Christ brings us a promise of better things to come. What Christ offers he offers freely and abundantly. All we need to do is to accept what he gives so freely.



The new Car Park saga continues ...

And the car park still remains the topic everyone is talking about (although the proposed closure of the Roscarrock Hill Public Toilets gave it a run for its money this past week!). On March 20th "TV 'Doc' gets new car park" made the front page of the *Cornish Guardian*, with a further mention of the proposed Port Isaac Car Park on page 34 and another article on page 36. Local opinions vary but with Easter looming, and at the time of writing, the Trewetha Lane car park remains closed and this is clearly going to cause problems.

To put things into context, Andy Penny attended the March 11th Parish Council meeting and submitted a report to *Trio*. Here are the main points of that report:

- There was a large public contingent at the meeting, in the main to ensure that the playing field was not commandered as temporary parking until the new car park is finished it is not.
- Andy Penny and others again made what seems the sensible suggestion of postponing the construction of the
 new car park until the end of the summer and using it as it has been used for the past couple of years. There
 seems to be several reasons why this cannot happen and construction on the new car park should have
 already begun it hasn't with a view to completion by July 4th.
- Our County Councillor, Brian Gisbourne, said that he was now concerned about the car parking situation said, "You cannot leave tonight until you make a decision".
- Local landowners are to be contacted to see if they can accommodate some temporary short term parking.
- 25-30 temporary parking spaces will be available for parking on the playing field hard standing.

Whilst the *Cornish Guardian* concentrates on the cost by CORMAC of £397,000 to build the new Car Park and an additional £40,000 spent on consultant's fees, a lot of locals are more immediately concerned with where visitors are going to park over the next three months, particularly as filming on the next series of *Doc Martin* is about to begin, bringing an additional influx of cars, plus three Bank Holiday weekends. The loan and costs are a fait accompli - it's how life in Port Isaac will be over the next few months that is causing a lot of worry. Hopefully next month's *Trio* will have better, more positive news. In the meantime, the following letters have been received in response to the *Cornish Guardian* coverage.

Dear Trio

Anybody reading Wednesday 20th *Cornish Guardian's* front page article on Port Isaac's car park would get the impression that Ed Fletcher's statement "Five councillors have left the council since the car park was first mooted, which speaks for itself" is factual. It is not. Ed Fletcher does not speak for us: we left the council for other reasons but not over the car park.

I am writing in a personal capacity as the St Endellion parish councillor who led on the new Port Isaac car park project, in response to a front page report in the 20 March Cornish Guardian headlined TV 'Doc' gets new car park. It quoted Mr Ed Fletcher and Mr David Raynor claiming that the cost of the car park would have been less if it had been put out to tender instead of being awarded to Cornwall Council's direct works organisation - CORMAC - at a price negotiated by an independent firm of Truro Chartered Quantity Surveyors. This professional firm, Crossley Associates, acted on our parish council's behalf and certified that the final price represented 'best value' for the parish.

Along with all other parish councillors, Mr Fletcher voted to award the construction contract to CORMAC but waited until the contract document was signed before telling the Cornish Guardian it was all a big mistake and he's effectively changed his mind. With the parish council election just five weeks away you can suspect why he had this dramatic change of heart, trying to drop all the other councillors in it, but voters are entitled to know the true facts. Neither he or David Raynor have produced a single piece of evidence to support their allegation that a competitive tender would have resulted in a lower construction

Doc Martin and the Car Park

When I saw the headline in this week's *Cornish Guardian* "TV Doc gets new car park" I thought that Buffalo Pictures had at last decided that they were going to pay for the car park but, no, it was just a story about the shenanigans in the Parish Council.

I do not know anything about the Cormac Contract, the money that has been borrowed or the money which the Council has already spent, save what I have read in the papers but I have been trying for a long time to convince Buffalo Pictures that they ought to pay for the car park so that the council tax payers do not get saddled with such a huge debt to build a car park which is largely needed because of the number of day trippers who come to see Port Isaac.

Buffalo Pictures have made millions out of Doc Martin. Their accounts are publicly available on the Companies Registry website if anybody wants to know the details.

Martin Clunes may be the star but Port Isaac should have equal billing. It is our village which thousands of people come to stare at, not Martin Clunes, except when he is actually in the process of filming. They make use of our village for three or four months and then go away and leave us to put up with the hordes of people who now come throughout the year. I can see from my bedroom window the queues of people lining up to take pictures of the "surgery" even in the depths of winter when it is pouring with rain! The peaceful village which we used to have out of season is no more.

Of course, some businesses make good profits out of the day trippers and some local people are employed during the filming. That is good, but why should the rest of the council tax payers have to pick up the tab to build a car park to accommodate these tourists?

cost. At no time prior to the *Cornish Guardian* report did Mr Raynor write to the parish council expressing a wish that the construction work be tendered out.

There were good reasons why the parish council decided to use Cornwall Council for the construction work. It is quite common for small Cornish parish council's to have a partnership with the county council on larger projects because most don't have the expertise. Firstly there is no risk. Cornwall Council can't go bankrupt halfway through the job, which private Southwest building contractors have been doing with depressing frequency during this recession. Because CORMAC, who maintain most of Cornwall's public highways, will also build the car park the parish council is not required to give Cornwall Council a substantial financial performance bond, which would otherwise be the case.

Cornwall Council is also providing the parish council with a public works loan repayment guarantee, it has included the parish car park in it's new statutory Car Park Order enabling charges to be legally enforced and penalties imposed for non payment, which Cornwall Council will administer. The parish council is also allowed to 'piggy back' on existing Cornwall Council contracts for the supply of car park signs, pay-and-display ticket machines, refilling with tickets and the collection of money from the machines. On top of all this senior officials in Cornwall Council's Procurement, Finance and Transportation departments have vetted the parish council's procurement process, our car park business plan and our application for funding to the government's Public Works Loan Board. The construction contract is just part of a wider arrangement with Cornwall Council, and Messrs Fletcher and Raynor don't explain who else would have done this work for our small parish council, with just one part-time Clerk working ten hours a week, if Cornwall Council hadn't stepped in to help us.

Voters should treat these allegations by Messrs. Fletcher and Raynor with scepticism because there is no substance to them.

Dan Rogerson, our local MP ...

As I write this, the Coalition Government have just announced the 2013 Budget, and there are lots of things to be welcome by people across North Cornwall. The Chancellor had good news on something which the Liberal Democrats have been working hard for in government - raising of the personal tax allowance to £10,000 next year. This means that people on low and average incomes won't pay any income tax on the first £10,000 earned. That's an extra £700 in everyone's pockets to help with the rising cost of living. This also brings the lowest earners out of paying income tax altogether, and helps to make sure that work always pays. This was the Liberal Democrats top priority at the last General Election and I am glad that we are delivering it in Government.

As well as reducing the tax bill for lower earners, the Coalition has also announced measures to curb tax avoidance. Stuffed Chicken Thighs on Pea Risotto

Just bringing the risotto rice to an 'al dente' texture is a skill in itself; but this dish rewards patience and a delicate touch. Garden peas really do bring a little bit of spring to this recipe - use good quality frozen peas which is what chefs do! And the stuffed chicken thighs wrapped in bacon are a classic marriage of flavours and a cheap cut.

I keep on saying this but find yourself a good butcher and build up a friendly relationship with him and you will find that he is more than happy to do the preparation work for you and, after "Horse-gate", do you really trust supermarkets! Ask your butcher for chicken thighs "oyster cut" - this means that they take the meat off the backbone making it easier to bone the thigh, which is pretty straightforward, by running a knife following the line of the bone and then using a sawing motion whilst pushing the bone away from you and the bone should just come out. Also pull off the skin which is not needed in this recipe but could be roasted like pork crackling and used as a garnish.

For the chicken stock there is no problem using stock cubes - the Co-op has those MPW sponsored Knorr stockpots (other stock cubes are available!). Just make sure you taste the stock before using it as a weak tasting stock will result in a dull tasting risotto. Also remember that the stock will reduce and be absorbed into the rice so watch the salt content - this can be adjusted at the end of the cooking - and using a good fresh Parmigiana adds a saltness and helps finish the risotto.

So, for two people you need:

Chicken

6 boned-out chicken thighs 24 rashers mindless streaky bacon 3 tbsp olive oil

1 tbsp sherry vinegar

2 tbsp Marsala

1 ladleful of chicken stock

Stuffing

350g good-quality pork sausage meat handful of skinned pistachio nuts, roughly chopped 1 egg yolk 4 thyme sprigs leaves stripped and chopped handful flat parsley chopped

Pea Risotto

400g risotto rice (such as arborio or carnaroli)
1 litre brown chicken (or vegetable) stock
250g garden peas (or petits pois), thawed if frozen
50g freshly grated Parmigiana, plus extra shavings to serve
25g butter cut into cubes
handful fresh chives chopped
sea salt and freshly ground black pepper

To make the stuffing: Mix the sausage meat with the chopped pistachio nuts, egg yolk, chopped thyme and parsley – season well with sea-salt and freshly ground black pepper

Open out the chicken thighs, season with salt and freshly ground black pepper and then divide the stuffing equally between them. Lay about four bacon rashers on a board, overlapping them slightly. Tightly roll each thigh and put one stuffed chicken portion on top and wrap the bacon around to cover completely. Repeat with the rest of the chicken thighs.

Wrap each chicken parcel tightly in cling filml, twisting the ends to seal. A good tip is to roll the parcels back and forth over the board to even the shape out. Poach the chicken parcels, in a large pan of boiling water for 25 minutes, until the chicken is cooked. Allow to cool in the cling film, then refrigerate for 30 minutes (this helps the bacon to 'set' around the chicken). After the allotted time remove the cling film and pat the thighs wrapped in bacon dry to remove any excess moisture – reserve for later.

To make the risotto: Wash the rice in cold water and strain off. Put the rice into a pan with 500ml of chicken stock, 500ml water and a generous pinch of sea-salt. Bring the stock up to a simmer and simmer the rice for about 7 minutes. Drain the rice well and then spread it evenly out on a lightly oiled baking tray to cool down.

To finish the chicken: Heat the olive oil in a large frying pan and carefully sauté (brown off) the chicken parcels until the bacon is brown and crisp on all sides, but not breaking away from the thighs. Transfer these to a warm platter and rest in a warm place.

De glaze the frying pan with the sherry vinegar, then add the Marsala and stock. Keep the heat under the pan until the liquid is reduced by half, then skim off excess fat and check the seasoning.

To finish the risotto" Place the blanched rice in a shallow pan and pour in just enough chicken stock to cover. Bring to the boil quickly and cook until nearly all of the stock has evaporated. Taste the risotto to see if is 'al dente', cooked and still firm, adding a little more stock if it needs a bit more cooking. Add the peas, Parmigiana and a few knobs of butter. Cook this for a further few minutes until the peas are tender. Season to taste. Finally add the fresh chives.

Spoon out a little of the pea risotto onto a warmed plate, cut the chicken into thick slices and arrange over the risotto, pour over the Marsala sauce and serve immediately.

Well there you go a cheap and simple recipe, give it a go and soon you will realise how easy a risotto is to make, also one final point most of you will not have Marsala so just use white wine instead, the sherry vinegar is well worth sourcing as it is great for making vinaigrettes as well.

Springtime and Easter

The web is a fund of information about history and so for this column I thought I would explore the history of Easter and the activities associated with it. For many of us it is a Christian festival, but at the same time there are other things which we see around this time of year which suggest a different heritage. Of course it is near the time of the start of Spring (although you wouldn't know it from the weather) and maybe that is why the shops are full of Easter eggs and nesting is just starting (our chickens have just started laying too).

I started with wikipedia http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/ Easter which has a very good account of the Christian festival and its probable links to the older Jewish festival of Passover. St Paul is quoted as describing 'Christ as our Pascha' which is the word used to describe Passover and of course the last

supper was a Passover meal. The festival is a time of hope and sorrow which is also found in the Passover festival as I understand it. This wiki has an extensive section about the arguments concerning the date on which Easter should be celebrated. This causes some fearful rows in the Church and details can be found here http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Easter_controversy . The date moves around our calendar in what seems to be a rather unpredictable way but in fact it is very predictable. In contemporary times the definition is found in the Book of Common Prayer (www.churchofengland.org/prayer-worship/worship/book-of-common-prayer.aspx) which says

"Easter Day is the first Sunday after the full moon which happens upon, or next after the 21st day of March; and if the full moon happens upon a Sunday, Easter Day is the Sunday after."

This is chosen, because March 21st is the vernal equinox, the day on which the length of the day equals the length of the night. The link with the phases of the moon goes back to the Jewish calendar, which was linked to this too. Using this method, Easter can only occur between March 22 and April 25. On the Book of Common Prayer website you can find tables to calculate when Easter will fall up to the end of the century, very handy if you are planning your school holidays.

Another tradition that seems to be linked to Easter is from the name. Why is it called Easter? Well one explanation is that it derives from the Anglo Saxon goddess Eostre. She was associated with eggs and hares apparently. There has been much debate about whether there really was a goddess called Eostre, or whether she was invented, but many authorities seem to agree she was a fertility goddess, and rules over the new beginnings associated with Spring - hence the eggs. But what about the hares and rabbits. Nobody seems to be really sure, but they seem to have had a sacred history going back to very early times (http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Eostre).

The word we have for the season Spring, of course, comes from to leap, burst forth, spring up, all referring to the new growth we see all around us. There are some great websites celebrating what we have in store in terms of wildlife, both plants and animals.

For Spring flowers in Cornwall there are many gardens, particularly associated with the stately homes. Boconnoc is a good place to start www.boconnoc.com/ events-calendar/ where you will see wonderful displays. Closer at hand is Lanhydrock House www.nationaltrust.org.uk/lanhydrock/ which will have a great display of flowers this time of year. You can find details of gardens to visit in Cornwall at www.greatgardensofcornwall.co.uk which has a very comprehensive list. One I would particularly recommend is to go and see the magnolias at the Burncoose Garden Centre near Redruth. The gardens are really wonderful.

Of course all round the cliffs the spring flowers are coming out so no need to visit a special place and you can find a handy identification site at www.wildlifeinsight.com/ where you will find wonderful photographs and information about west country wild animals and plants.

Fingers crossed for some nice weather.

It all happened a long time ago, around the time I was born [here the writer removes the dormouse that had tried to hibernate in his long white beard!], in fact even before the Second World War. There was a civil war in Spain, which split families and communities, as well as the nation. When I was at school it was still fairly recent, and hadn't yet become History, so we weren't taught about it. In any case, I didn't like (i.e. wasn't any good at) History. As a result, I must admit that I don't know as much about it as I should, but I do know that pain caused by that war is still being experienced, by descendants of those originally involved.

Many of those who were on the, mainly socialist, Republican side, which lost the war, had to leave the country afterwards. Among these were the family of the British former MP, Michael Portillo, now most certainly not inclined towards socialism. Since leaving Parliament he has found an ecological niche, making television films about railway journeys, loosely based on Bradshaw's Railway Guides, both British and Continental. In these he diverts from the railway to visit obvious tourist attractions, such as stately homes, staying in some now converted as hotels. He also visits factories producing well-known items, including regional delicacies like Eccles Cakes, Kendal Mint Cake and Melton Mowbray Pies, usually trying (but unsuccessfully) to produce an example himself. I hadn't realised that Eccles Cakes, actually made in Eccles on the West side of Salford, are made from a square of pastry, which is folded by hand round the Vostizza currants; if you turn one over you can see where the four corners come together.

It is good that travelling by train is receiving such a good "airing" — we are now into the fourth series of Portillo's British journeying, based mostly on Bradshaw's 1863 Guide, with a further series using Bradshaw's 1913 Continental Guide late last year. When you can avoid the Rail Replacement Bus and the holiday peak crowds, find a seat opposite a window rather than a wall, and fathom the depths of the fare structure, the train can be a really pleasant way to travel, and not necessarily expensive. There are so many scenic lines to travel over, especially in this part of the world. Try the branch-line from Liskeard to Looe, for example; the last time we went that way there was a "Two-for-the-price-of-One Offer". Even on the main-line there may be reductions: a Family Return from Bodmin to Penzance was cheaper than one Senior, one Adult and two Child Singles. You can also enjoy the feeling that you've improved your carbon footprint by not using the car.

George Bradshaw was an interesting man, born in 1801 at Pendleton, near Manchester, he became an engraver specialising in maps. In the 1820s, just when interest in them was at its height, he published maps of canals. He also produced Guides for shareholders of canals and, from the 1830s, for those of the new railways. By the late 1830s railways were beginning to link up with each other, and longer journeys were becoming possible. He started to publish their timetables, soon on a monthly basis, and later producing the Guides with their descriptions of the towns and cities served. He was a life-long Quaker and, at least initially, avoided using names of months (and even days) of non-Christian origin in his timetables, calling January "First Month" or "1st Mo.", February "2st Mo." and so on.

It is now more than sixty years since the first small group of enthusiastic amateurs took over an apparently insignificant non-nationalised narrow-gauge line in mid-Wales, on the death of its owner. This, the Tal-y-llyn Railway, dating from the 1860s, became the first 'preserved' railway in the country. The earliest portion of our local Bodmin & Wenford Railway is even older, the first train running from Wadebridge to Ruthern Bridge in August 1834. Unfortunately you cannot yet ride on any part of that portion, but you can enjoy later sections of line, from Bodmin General to either Bodmin Road or Boscarne junction (or both!). The award-winning café in the Signal Box at National Rail's Bodmin Parkway Station is run by the B&WR, and can be thoroughly recommended.

Provided you keep your eye on the time, and have a good map with you, you can often use the train (or the bus) to make an interesting walk, without retracing your steps. Leaflets are available at stations, suggesting walks accessible from the Liskeard-Looe line, for example, taking the train to one station but returning from another. Then you can reduce your carbon footprint and improve your health at the same time! Happy riding! Happy walking! Happy Easter!




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


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
