Thank you to everyone who came along and shared their stories of times gone by, when the quickest way from the beach to the school was up the cliffs and over the wall! There were three routes apparently, all equally as appalling to all modern health and safety standards.

PISCES will be opening its 'Schooldays' exhibition for the summer and it would be nice to have another evening reminiscing on the old days. Maybe we could hear from a few of the 'younger' ex-pupils - those now in their 50s?

We have spent a lot of time reading the old school log books and would like to share some entries from 1877 when the first school opened:

July 23rd - 8pence should be the charge for 3 children from a family whether any are over 14 or not, with an additional twopence for each other child from the same family.

July 24th - Many children are kept from school on very frivolous pretexts. One or two prosecutions would probably remedy this ... If children found playing in the street, in the fields or on the beach were liable to be brought to school by the Board Officer, the disgrace would deter many from absence.


July 26th. About 20 girls absented themselves without leave, with no better object than to have a romp in the fields at 'Pine Horn' as they call it. These and similar regularities reduce the grant considerably.

Sept 13th - C. Connah having been invited by the Master to acknowledge his wrongdoing, and to give some promise that he would be guided and instructed as to the conduct he ought to pursue in relation to the Master in future - after having reasoned with him for more than two hours, and allowed him upwards of 3/4 of an hour to consider what reply he should make- deliberately and without hesitation said he had done no wrong for which to apologise and that he would make no apology!

Incidentally it is reported that when the school was begun by John Watts, Trevan names two school masters here in 1835 - William Davey from St Neots, and Warwick Guy Prout from this parish. He also refers to two former teachers, the late John Arnold and a Mr Hender. What qualifications they had to undertake their profession is not recorded, but Trevan states Warwick Guy Prout had been transported for seven years after embezzling money from the Devonport bank at which he was a clerk, and John Arnold was one of three local miscreants involved in looting valuables from the wreck of the Dutch ship Elizabeth Joanna which foundered off Port Isaac in 1822. Trevan also alleged Arnold was the father of Mary Ann Steer (born c1824), who herself later became a school teacher here. John Arnold died in 1832 and Trevan was one of the witnesses to his will (which left everything to his mother), so presumably he knew him.

PISCES hopes to produce a booklet for the 'Schooldays' exhibition to share these and lots of other wonderful gems.

At last the cruel East wind seems to Climate Friendly have gone, the sun is shining, the sky is blue (but a sharp shower meant the washing had to come in off the line weather is back to "normal". The experts on television suggest that the

Jet Stream is getting back to its traditional place, much further North, but time will tell.

The birds in our garden are interesting, completely different populations in the front and the back, and long-term changes appearing in their appetites! In the front garden peanuts are hardly touched, by blue tits in the main, and the last couple of fat-balls (relics of the energy-starved days of frost) dwindle away. Even the seeds do not seem to attract the hordes of house sparrows they used to, but nyger seeds (like thistle seeds) bring great numbers of goldfinches, once a rarity in our garden. Despite their small size, goldfinches can face up to much bigger birds — I once saw one, with wings akimbo, see off a starling when feeding on the ground, despite the latter's sharp and pointed beak. In the back garden tits and finches abound, with visits by groups of jackdaws, so both nuts and seeds disappear with surprising speed, while fat-balls are but a distant memory. The wires of an old nut-feeder show signs of attack from sharp beaks, probably jackdaws but I haven't seen them at it so far!

In addition to feeding garden birds, one can encourage them to nest and breed locally by putting nest-boxes in appropriate places. One source of such boxes is the shop at a National Trust property; kits of parts can often be found there, as well as complete ones. The National Trust, one of the country's greatest owners of land and, hence, a great conserver of landscape, has done much to encourage wildlife. The Trust has just announced a plan to reduce its energy use by 50% by 2020, starting with schemes at an initial five properties. One of these accounts for more than half the oil consumed by the Trust each year, so it is about time something was done. Innovative ideas, like heat-pumps using the difference in temperature of the sea and the air above it, are great portents of future development.

Acting together increases bargaining power, as demonstrated by Cornwall Together, the bulk-purchasing scheme for energy (electricity, gas and oil) in Cornwall. Our community must find ways of acting together, to achieve the future we desire. Taking part in shaping the Neighbourhood Plan is something we can all do, whether in traditional fashion or using the social media, like Facebook and Twitter, and by ensuring that any development proposed in it is truly sustainable. Businesses could co-operate by forming a sort of informal Chamber of Commerce to further the interests they have in common. Our aim should be, in the words of the Easter Communion Service, to seek "a fair and proper use of the world's resources", something we all ought to be able to agree on.

That Easter Communion Service also prayed for those who "strive for justice and peace among the nations", particularly appropriate as we see civil war in Syria, and skirmishes with the authorities in many other countries. On a smaller, and more local scale, we should hope and pray for harmony among our leaders, especially among those successful in the imminent Cornwall Council and Parish Council elections. Don't forget to exercise your democratic right, and duty, to vote on Thursday 2nd May. If you do, you'll probably get the Councils you want; if you don't, you'll get the Councils you deserve!



Catherine Chadband

Cath was born with Down's Syndrome on January 10th 1959 at Archer Farm, weighing less than 6lbs. She was a very contented baby and the medical opinion of the day advised me to let her do things in her own time. Progress was very slow but her abilities gradually developed, especially after she was joined by sister Jackie two years later.

Cath discovered mischief, rebellion and fun and generally became a happy little girl. When she was almost seven years old she had to go to school, not mainstream education but as a boarder in the only Cornish school for mentally handicapped children at St Blazey. After the trauma of being split away from her family had subsided, she enjoyed being at school during the week and being home at the weekends. When she was 16 she was transferred by Social Services from Doubletrees School to Adult Training Day Centres, firstly at St Austell, then Liskeard and finally Bodmin where she remained until the Autumn of 2012.

Cath was a very happy girl; she loved life and most people in it. Music dancing and partying were her favourite things along with holidays, short trips, days out, male voice choir concerts and stage shows in London, Plymouth and Truro - she really didn't mind as long as she was going out somewhere. As one-offs she loved her trip on Concorde with Annie and was very excited to be in Buckingham Palace watching Mum chatting with the Queen!

There was very little that she allowed to interrupt Thursdays and Fridays at Port Isaac School, initially helping Cathy Carney in the kitchen preparing the school lunches. A few dramas took place and Cathy handled our Cath marvellously well and everything subsided very quickly. The only reference to Cath being different that I know of was when Cathy Carney's twin grandchildren couldn't decide whether Cath was an old girl or a little lady!

Cath had a very honest approach to life and trusted everyone she liked. She said things as she saw them, complimentary or otherwise! If anyone was obviously ignoring her she would approach them with her right arm extended, saying "excuse me, my name is Cathy, what's yours?"

Port Isaac was a wonderful place for her to live; everyone was her friend and when she was able to go to the village alone she was delighted to tell who she had seen and who had given her a kiss and a hug - always included was George, Roy and Sam.

Six or seven years ago, changes in Cath began to take place. Her mental and physical abilities began to deteriorate, epilepsy and dementia began to develop. Medical experts, her social worker, equipment loan services and Cornwall Care (my choice) became involved and the inevitable became a reality. Going into care was never an option - I was determined to keep and care for her at home - so the added involvement of District Nurses, the Doctors at Port Isaac Surgery, Marie Curie and Macmillan "end of life care" nurses began. Always there were Annie,



Jackie, Steve and our eight year old little star, Matthew, (Cath's great nephew) who was always willing to feed her, give drinks, try and make her laugh and just sit talking to her any time he could. Frequent visits and offers of help at any time were given by Mel, Martyn and Joan and between us all we made her final weeks as clean, comfortable and stress free as possible. With the expert help and care of the medical profession she was pain free, contented, conscioius and responsive, finally very peacefully succumbing to broncho pneumonia on March 13th.

Thank you each and every one who has ever contributed to the richness of a happy and loving life that was Cath.

A bright light has gone out and a large empty hole has been left in our lives, but I am grateful I have been able to see her life completed before mine ends.

January and February are traditionally slow months for inshore fishing on the North Cornish coast with lots of Skippers taking holidays and undertaking maintenance work on boats and equipment. The few who carried on fishing this year only managed to get out on a handful of days.

The herring still seem to be making a comeback with a large shoal in and around the Camel Estuary arriving in late December into January with "shooters" in February. A couple of Port Isaac boats did well but the undisputed herring king was *Boy Darren* from Padstow. The herring were salted in for lobster bait to be used in the coming summer.

By the start of March, four out of the six full-time boats in Port Isaac were making a start. The season started with catches of good quality male 'cock' crabs – most female 'hen' crabs are in poor condition from spawning in December and January. We have seen a good run of male lobsters as the females are still carrying eggs and it is illegal to keep them in Cornish inshore waters as a conservation measure.

I have handed over the first eight berried hen lobsters of the season to the Lobster Hatchery as they make a start on rearing this year's juveniles. The black eggs on the females (the eggs turn red and then red/green when they are about to be released into the water column) are kept in cooler water to extend the breeding season. Only as the water warms will the eggs mature.

New research at the Lobster Hatchery is looking at the number of eggs a Cornish lobster can carry. Similar research has been done in other areas of the country but not with Cornish stocks before. The Hatchery had a single female with 36,000 eggs. There's no credible research on survival rates of the eggs in the wild – even with genetic markers it would be impossible to catch and test every lobster from one broad. The main opinions from marine biologists vary from a maximum 10% to 0.05% but about 1% seems to be most common number. If only 0.1% survive then one single hen could produce 36 lobsters a year, with 90% staying in a 20 mile radius and only 10% with the wanderlust!

Unbelievably a few fishermen still persist in keeping berried hens due to historical reasons or short term gain. If you come across a berried hen you should send it back or refuse to buy it to protect the stock for the future of everybody. You can also contact IFCA (Cornwall's Inshore Fisheries and Conservation Authority) on 01736 336842 – this is the enforcement authority for the Cornish inshore waters.



It's looking like Parish Councils are giong to have to be responsible for a whole lot more in the coming months/years. Not all candidates are comfortable with extending the Parish Council's responsibilities or building relationships with the business community, who I think have been treated abysmally in the past.

Make sure you know who you are voting for and remember, you only vote for the candidates you want to see on the Parish Council, be that one person or eleven.

Work on this has already begun although we are still in the very early stages. It will be a major challenge for the new Council.

None of the future challenges can be achieved without a strong united Council working closely with **you** the parishioners. If you vote for me on the 2nd of May I will do whatever I can to make sure that we support the majority view and make this beautiful part of the world as you would wish it for you and your families future.

Rosie Brogan

I am putting myself forward to be a Parish Councillor as I believe I tick all of the boxes as to what the Parish Council needs.

following the death of my grandad Bill Dawe, who was on the parish council for 42 years. I have a lot of my grandad's views on things in the parish but I also bring to the table my own views and thoughts on how the parish should be run.

Visitors come to the parish, especially Port Isaac, as we have such a historic community. Local wise we also have a good

working community. So lets not ruin this by losing all our retail shops to second homes and restaurants. We are a working community and not here just for tourism. However, tourism plays a big part in our parish we just need to keep a healthy balance.

I live in one of the new build, affordable houses in Trelights. There was a lot of objection to building these eight homes. Nicola Williams

I have served as a co-opted member of St Endellion Parish Council since Feb 2012 and have been proactive in supporting the community with a particular interest in planning concerns. I walk daily through

the village and over the cliffs during which I keep my eyes and ears open for matters which concern local people and businesses. I am passionate in my love for this place and will keep the community's interests at heart when serving on your Parish Council.

This election is the most important ever in the history of our community. Changes in the form of the new Localism Act offer us a truly radical opportunity to plan positively for the future. It's vital to elect a Parish Council prepared to continue with the challenge of preparing a vibrant Neighbourhood Plan. Whilst many of us might rather see the future in terms of no change, the Localism Act, and its presumption in favour of development leaves us no choice but to act if we are to influence and protect the future of our Parish. - Reservation of a site for composting green waste from our restaurants and café's for community use and addressing trade waste issues.
- Enhancement of the Conservation Area in support of tourism.
- Ensuring a mixed retail environment to encourage visitors

I urge you to select candidates who are prepared to work positively together to create a robust Neighbourhood Plan. I'm committed to work assiduously to ensure we have a positive outcome when our NP is put to the electorate.

Martin Bell

I live in Port Isaac and was first elected a parish councillor in 2007.

There are inevitably disagreements about the new Port Isaac car park - it is the largest task the parish council has ever carried out - but in 2010 the council had no choice, action had to be taken when the harbour car park closed to visitors for safety reasons. Being a Chartered Surveyor I was asked by other councillors to take the lead on the project. All major decisions have been taken with independent professional advice by a majority of councillors, construction is underway by Cornwall Council/ CORMAC and will be completed before the school summer holidays. The finances are sound. They have been independently checked by our auditors, accountants in Cornwall Council Finance Dept. for their loan repayment guarantee, also by the Government's Public Works Loan Board who financed the project, and by the Chief Executive of the Cornwall Association of Local Councils who advises our Clerk. The construction cost of £397,000 was certified as 'best value' by a Truro firm of independent professional quantity surveyors.

I am a member of a new finance sub-committee that supervises the financial management of the parish council, chaired by retired business executive Mike Coles. who has done a superb job.

The Parish Council shouldn't take over Port Isaac's public toilets from Cornwall Council. In the last month Cornwall Council presented an ultimatum threatening to shut them, which was reported in April *Trio*. We receive no contribution from Business Rates and even if charging is introduced the cost of maintaining the toilets would increase Council Tax. I support Port Isaac Fishermen's Association's offer to purchase the fish cellars from Cornwall Council and run the harbour toilet.

St Endellion Neighbourhood Plan is the most important task facing the next council and probably the most difficult in its complexity. The Council for the Protection of Rural England and the National Trust allege the Government has seriously weakened planning protection of rural areas and we need this plan to defend our three villages from unsustainable development on surrounding farm land.

I helped stop two attempts to develop the Port Isaac playing field for visitor parking. I will always put the play space needs of our children first and protect public open spaces. I support proposals to raise funds for new play equipment.

I oppose more 'affordable' housing in Trelights without community facilities or public transport. New affordable housing should be in Port Isaac with three bedroom houses to rent and a Community Land Trust self-build scheme like the one in Rock. Existing council houses should be allocated to local families according to proposed new government regulations.

I personally negotiated with Cornwall Council to surface the coastal footpath between Port Isaac car park and the harbour, which was virtually impassable during wet weather. It cost Council Tax payers nothing. I took the lead on replacing the granite steps at Overcliff with a wheelchair and mobility scooter 'friendly' slope.



Robert Manders

The most urgent challenges to face the new Parish Council will be those things, such as the Car Park, which were started by the present Council, but remain incomplete. The basic

Car Park, together with widening at that bend in the main road, should be finished in early July, just in time for the main holiday period. However, much will remain to be done, such as some of the landscaping and planting. This will become possible later, when the season and weather allow, bearing in mind the cash which will become available when the Car Park is up and running. It will probably be another year before things really look as they were originally envisaged. Looking further ahead, we would like to add toilets, for which provision is being made in the works underway at present.

We will have to find a way keep open and improve the toilets on Roscarrock Hill, by ensuring that the Fish Cellars complex is acquired from Cornwall Council by the Parish Council, or by someone with whom the Parish Council can work. We must also try to find a long-term solution which will allow the toilets on New Road to remain open throughout the year.

It is vital that the Parish Council continues consultation on the Neighbourhood Plan, in order to ensure sustainable development of the Parish in accordance with residents' wishes, and to protect those features of the Parish we value. We need to decide where businesses can develop, and the relative importance of different types of business fishing, tourism, etc. We will also need to think about the mix of shops, cafés, hotels, and selfcatering accommodation in the tourism sector. while the residential/second-home ratio is of perennial concern. As part of the Plan, we may need to set up a Community Land Trust, to provide quality affordable homes for local need, while not forgetting the climate-friendly aspects, and seeking a fair and proper use of the world's resources.

Longer-term unfinished business includes the Footpath to Trewetha, paralleling the main road, which was started by STEER following the 2004 Parish Plan, taken over by the Parish Council, but is presently stalled. Bearing in mind the traffic which uses the B3267 in summer, it would be good if it had an all-weather surface and was usable by cyclists, rather than being just a basic footpath. The network of paths with which it would link at Trewetha, is a resource valuable, not only for visitors, but for use by residents as part of an increasingly healthy lifestyle.

The Parish Council inevitably includes people with differing views, often with very different approaches to the problems which crop up. We need that diversity, lots of original ideas, plenty of "out-of-the-box" thinking, to turn problems into challenges, and find the best solutions. It is my firm belief that I can contribute to this process, and encourage all members of the Parish Council to work together harmoniously, for the greater good of us all.

David Raynor

I am an Engineer and have run my own company for the last 40 years. My wife and I first came to Port Isaac in the early seventies when we bought a holiday home and fell in love with the people and the village. We said that when we retired we hoped that we could live here permanently which we did in 2000, and immediately became involved in the DIY rescue of the village hall, not surprisingly as we live next door.



Not long after I joined St Endellion Economic Regeneration group (STEER), later becoming Chairman. We started in 2002 with many objectives in view, one of which was to underground all the overhead cables in the old part of the village. We also had many other projects such as bringing Broadband to the village, rebuilding stone styles etc. Undergrounding the cables involved working with the then NCDC, Western Power, BT and other contractors all of which I was heavily involved with, and we eventually succeeded, burying the cables in 2009. Having completed most of our objectives we then decided to close STEER donating the balance of our funds to PISCES and the Parish Council.

I have been Treasurer for the PI Branch of the RNLI for 5 years and am currently a member of PISCES and the Chorale.

I have put myself up for election as a Councillor because I am very concerned that following the demise of the District Council we in the north western part of Cornwall are being treated as the poor relation. The Parish Council has to act as one and in a very positive way to address what I see as very important issues ahead:

- 1. The preparation of a village Neighbourhood Plan. Without this we cannot fight any planning developments proposed for our Parish. We have little or virtually no control at present, and without a plan none at all. (STEER carried out the most successful survey of the Parish to date)
- 2. The proposed closure of the toilets at Roscarrock Hill, and the toilets at the New Road Car Park.
- 3. The ongoing expense of the new Car Park in Trewetha Lane, will it make any money? And what can we do if it does not.
- 4. Improving the way rubbish is collected from our streets especially rubbish left by visitors in black bin bags.
- 5. How the cutbacks at Cornwall County Council are going to affect the maintenance of our pathways hedgerows etc, and can we raise funds to maintain the playing field and equipment.

These are just a few of the issues as they appear. I think the Parish Council should work closer with the 30 or so organisations in the Parish to ensure St Endellion remains such a beautiful and lovely place in which to live.



Ed Fletcher

This election is far too important to waste space on personal promotion or sniping. I would hope that after forty years of living here people will know me well enough, I hope that in my three years as a co-opted councillor I have proved that I am willing to work for the community.

There are really important issues facing the new council. Firstly the lack of Parish funds due to profligate and unwise spending on the new car park, and Cornwall Councils

determination to flog our Parish Council off with the loss making village facilities which they have traditionally provided. Secondly, the Parish Council will be expected to create a village plan to ensure that as far as possible we will be free from outside interference and can reasonably expect to be able to protect and develop our community along the lines which we choose, not others. The founding of Mebyon Kernow in 1951, initially as a pressure group and more recently as a party is described, and the continuing high number of independent candidates. The article suggests this history, with distance from London being an important issue, has led to the distinctive Cornish identity in the political

The Cornish Stannary Parliaments and Stannary Courts were the representative and legal bodies that held key administrative responsibilities across Devon and Cornwall in the Middle Ages and there is a fascinating account by Paul Laity who describes himself as a Cornishman, a Bard of the Gorsedd, a solicitor and a judge, at http://www.kernowtgg.co.uk/laity.html.

Universal sufferage in the UK was hard fought for as you can see on the British Library webpage http://tinyurl.com/brk2cqv so I think voting is one way to respect the people who sacrificed so much for this in the past. So get voting!

cooking with martin



Asparagus is one of the great culinary joys of early summer and have just been on the phone to Roger my local supplier, who reckons that all going well the first week of May should see the arrival of the first of this years crop. But we have a bit of a two-tier spear system. First, there's the real deal: fresh-cut, grown locally in May and June. This is the asparagus that will make you go weak at the knees: earthy, sweet and ever-so-slightly farmyardy (in a good way).

Then there is the supermarket deal: year-round asparagus, mainly imported and, frankly, a bit of a travesty. Sometimes, when in season and UK-grown, it's worthwhile, but the rest of the year it's a shocking disappointment: woody, a bit mealy and missing that essential sweetness.

Asparagus is a delicacy, a treat. It may be a vegetable, but it's on a whole different level from carrots or spuds. View it more as you would oysters or steak – a proper indulgence. It's often pretty pricey, but that's unsurprising: this is a plant that takes three years of nurturing before it produces its first crop. And that crop is just a handful of slender spears – maybe a dozen per plant. The season spans barely 70 days and the stuff has to be cut by hand to boot: it's incredibly labour-intensive.

Look for asparagus with a bright green colour and very firm, undamaged stems. Old asparagus is bendy and even wrinkly at the base of the stems, with a dull brownness overtaking its vibrant green.

And when you have that first bunch of perfect, super-fresh asparagus in your hands, that initial, exquisite bundle should be enjoyed as simply as possible, for me it is almost like a ritual!

Bring a large pan of lightly salted water to a boil. Snap off the woody ends (they break naturally at the point where the stem becomes tender) and give the spears a thorough rinse (asparagus is grown in sandy soil and its feathery tips can often harbour grains of grit). Drop the spears into the boiling water and cook for the least time possible, just until the tip of a knife pierces a stem without effort — with really fresh stuff, you're looking at about three minutes. (One- or two-day old spears need more like six.) Drain and transfer to a warmed dish. Trickle over a little melted butter, season and you're away.

My second favourite way to eat the finest asparagus is with what I call dippy egg hollandaise: boil two eggs for four and a half minutes, slice off the tops, then into the hot, yellow yolks go a nut of butter, a few drops of good cider vinegar and a pinch of salt and pepper. Dip just-cooked spears into this instant hollandaise or if you have time give the recipe below a try.

Griddled asparagus with poached duck egg and chervil hollandaise sauce

20 asparagus spears, woody ends trimmed
2 tbsp olive oil
salt and freshly ground black pepper
125g/4½oz butter, melted
2 tsp freshly squeezed lemon juice

2 tsp white wine vinegar

2 large free-range egg yolks

3 tbsp chopped fresh chervil

4 free-range duck eggs

Bring a pan of salted water to the boil, add the asparagus spears and blanch for 1-2 minutes.

Drain well, return the asparagus spears to the pan, off the heat, and drizzle over the olive oil. Shake the pan to coat the asparagus spears, then season, to taste, with salt and freshly ground black pepper.

Meanwhile, heat a griddle pan over a medium to high heat. When the pan is smoking, add the seasoned, blanched asparagus and griddle for 3-4 minutes, or until tender. Add the butter to the pan and, when foaming, shake the pan to coat the asparagus spears in the butter.

In a separate, non-reactive pan, heat the lemon juice and white wine vinegar until just boiling. Place the egg yolks and a pinch of salt into a food processor. Set the motor to run slowly, then gradually add the hot lemon and vinegar mixture to the egg yolks in a thin stream, until all of the mixture has been incorporated into the egg yolks. With the motor still running, gradually add the melted butter to the mixture in a thin stream, until completely incorporated. Add the chervil to the hollandaise sauce and season, to taste, with salt and freshly ground black pepper. Set aside and keep warm (cover the mixture to prevent a skin from forming on the surface).

Bring a small pan of water to a gentle simmer. Stir the simmering water vigorously to create a vortex, then carefully crack two of the duck eggs into the water. Poach for 2-3 minutes, or until the eggs are cooked to your liking, then carefully remove from the pan using a slotted spoon and set aside to drain on kitchen paper. Repeat the process with the remaining two duck eggs. To serve, divide the asparagus spears equally among four serving plates. Place one poached egg on top of each serving of asparagus. Drizzle over the chervil hollandaise sauce. Serve immediately and enjoy. Mx

Somewhere below me, in the aeroplane's hold, are the shoes I've been given to bring back with me from Cornwall, to put on the feet of children in Kosovo who've been wearing slippers to school, for the 2km walk through the mud. And safe in my bag is the £410 donation that was handed to me this week as a result of the fabulous fundraiser tea held in the Village Hall on 2 April!

We were in Kosovo on 2 April so we weren't able to be at the fundraiser in person, but we've seen photographs of the wonderful heaps of cakes, the beautifully decorated hall and the people who came to offer their support on the day. It was a fantastically generous contribution of time, money - and cupcakes - and will be a huge help for our work with children and families in need.

Most of our work goes on in a converted flat above a minimarket in a slum community just outside Kosovo's capital, Pristina. The centre has already

Longfellow Lanyon

benefited from a lot of loving from Port Isaac - not only Michaela's help with a summer project in 2011 but also the team of Barbara, Billy, Cheryl, Harry, Lisa and Liz who came out last year to teach art and music and do a makeover of the space, and Nicola and Andy who came out earlier this year to hang the wonderful warm curtains made by Port Isaac volunteers under Nicola's direction. The money raised on 2 April will go directly to the centre which is now used by over 200 people a week. As well as the teaching we do every Saturday for an average of 120 children, the centre hosts our daily literacy classes for adults, and every week a German class and computer class for grown-ups, an art class and weekly dance class for kids as well as being the space where the women in our handcrafts and soapmaking projects work to produce the goods they sell to support their families and keep their children in school. It's also here that we distribute secondhand clothes that we're donated (so far 1500 people have been given clothes by us) and where families come to access the health support programmes (funding contraception and emergency medicine) we provide.

None of that is possible without financial support; thank you to everyone who came, helped and ate at the fundraiser tea to keep our centre open, and keep it looking great.
