news & views from Port Isaac School

The School Governors are pleased to announce that with effect from June 3rd, Miss Sarah Duffy is to be our Executive Head Teacher. We will share her with Boscastle CP School where she has been the Head Teacher for the last 12 years. She will spend two and a half days in each school, overseeing all that goes on and planning for the future.

We have, of course, had an Executive Head Teacher for three years now, sharing Mr Bishop's services with other schools so the situation is not new.

The aim ultimately is to enter into a Federation with Boscastle School which will mean two schools, with separate budgets but one Executive Head Teacher and one board of Governors. We see this as the best way to protect and keep open both of these small schools in the future. Boscastle School is about the same size as us and the villages have great similarities (the Primary schools around us – St Kew, Delabole and St Teath are each already either successfully in Federation or moving towards it with other schools).

We have an excellent Primary School in the village where the children are happy and making very good progress. Under Miss Duffy's leadership we are sure that the school will continue to flourish and the opportunities for our children will be extended. We wish her every success.

Finally, small schools with falling roles are under threat of closure. As with the village shops, the old adage applies – use it or lose it!

Saintly legends

Could a book full of saintly tales ever become a best-seller? Improbable and yet the Golden Legend (or 'Acts of the Saints') was once as widely read and well-known as the bible was in Christian Europe at the end of the 15th century. Full of fanciful stories of Christian saints we might attribute



its popularity to the ignorance of its readers who couldn't tell fiction from fact. It was certainly the view of many reformers who condemned the book and its improbable tales.

On reading the stories of this book, however, it's difficult not to conclude that their popularity is explained more easily by sex and violence. For there is an awful lot of both in these saintly tales, even if the sex tends to revolve around vows of chastity and the violence around grisly forms of martyrdom. The stories of the Golden Legend can make Tarantino films seem prudish by comparison. Yet the violence of these saintly tales is not identical to that of today's popular culture. Whereas today's heroes most often use violence as a means to bring about justice, revenge or redemption, whether for themselves or others, the saints of the Golden Legend are the violence of their persecutors.

One also finds gentler tales in the Golden Legend such as the lovely story of St Josephat, the son of a pagan king who, so worried by the thought his son might become discontent and convert to Christianity, builds for him a pleasure palace where no intimation of suffering or need is permitted. Inevitably the son gets bored and leaves his palace whereupon, despite the best efforts of his father, he encounters the imperfections of this world – poverty, disease, ageing and death. The shock of these discoveries, and of being told that any man may suffer them and all will one day die, prompts the son to question the meaning of his life; questions that in due course lead him to embrace the Christian faith, become a better king, and eventually a desert hermit and teacher.

If this story reminds you of a central figure of another religion then you would not be wrong as it is considered a Christian re-telling of the stories told of the young Buddha.

As I write an act of real violence dominates the news. Once again it is tempting to look away or to respond with violence, if only of word and thought, or to look upon such deeds as revealing a dark and deeper reality to human nature. Much harder is it to contemplate the reality of such violence while refusing it the power to determine our reponse.

The tales of the Golden Legend remind us that the reality of violence and suffering needs to be faced, but accepted neither as the final word nor as more real than the reality of love, peace and charity. Sometimes we are right to be shocked – shocked into recognizing violence for what it is and denying it any place in either our faith or our lives.

SENIOR HELMSMAN & STATION TRAINING OFFICER'S REPORT

Training has been going well, recently involving an exercise with Navy Sea King 193. The importance of these helicopter exercises are paramount and it is essential but also a privilege to be able to train with both the RAF and Navy.

The exercise involved the tricky manoeuvring of under way transfers where the helicopter holds a course at around 12 knots. We then format underneath the helicopter as they lower the casualty into the boat.



These types of scenarios are very common in lifeboat operations and I have to say every helm on the day showed a good level of competency when carrying out the exercise.

You will hopefully see Navy 193 and RAF 169 back in the bay carrying out some more training in the next month or two, and don't forget Navy 193 will be with us on our annual Lifeboat Larks.

We have also seen Matthew Main signed off from his Helm development plan and he is now acting as a fair weather helm on station - congratulations Matthew and remember this is where the real training begins!

RNLI GALLANTRY MEDALS FOR NICKI, MATT & DAMIEN

It was a proud day for Port Isaac whe courage of three of our RNLI crew was recognised at a special ceremony at the Barbican in London on May 23rd. Nicki Bradbury, Matt Main and Damien Bolton were among seven RNLI volunteers who were awarded medals for gallantry, the RNLI's highest accolades.

Launching the Port Isaac lifeboat into extremely challending conditions, they faced rough and dangerous seas as they tried to rescue two people swept into the sea from from the cliffs in April 2012. Helmsman Damien was given a Silver medal and Nicki and Matt both were given Bronze medas for their part in the rescue.

Over 25 local people were able to attend the Barbican presentations to support our crew members. The RNLI now invites everyone to the annual Lifeboat Service on the Platt on Sunday June 2nd at 12.30pm during which there will be a re-issuing of the medals. Said Chairman Bob Bulgin, "We look forward to seeing you all there - it will be a truly special day in the long history of Port Isaac RNLI."

Chairman's note: It is interesting to note that the previous award of a Silver medal for gallant rescue work carried out by Port Isaac RNLI, was to Charles Mitchell in 1870 when three crew were saved from the wreck of Brig Stepheno Grosso of Genoa. In February 2011 crew members, Nigel Sherratt and Ian Johnson, received letters of commendation for the rescue of seven gig rowers who's boat had capsized in heavy seas off Port Isaac.

Finally a big welcome to another new crew member, Andrew Hallam. Andrew had a baptism of fire on exercise by being winched up and flown round in the Sea King aircraft. He will have to get his head round the fact that this is how we spend our Sunday mornings!

Since I last wrote for the *Trio*, Parliament saw one of the big set-pieces of the political year – the State Opening of Parliament at the start of May. Aside from all the pomp and ceremony of the State Opening of Parliament, the Queen's Speech outlines which new laws will be debated by Parliament in the coming year. We are now in the final 2 years of this Parliament and the Coalition Government, and whilst there are less radical reforms, I am pleased that many long-held Liberal Democrat policies are set to become law



in order to help us build both a stronger economy and a fairer society including: introducing a new 'flat rate' pensions system to make saving for retirement simpler and fairer, especially to thousands of women and the self-employed; new laws to tackle antisocial behaviour; capping social care costs so that people don't have to sell their homes to fund their long-term care; and more money to help families with the cost of childcare.

On May 2nd people went to the polls to elect new Cornwall Councillors for their areas. I would like to congratulate Andy Penny on his election as Cornwall Councillor for the St Minver and St Endellion division. As I write this, the political groups on the council are discussing how best to work together to serve the people of Cornwall. It is a privilege to represent my home area of North Cornwall in Parliament, and it is always my top priority to fight for a fair deal for local people. I look forward to working with the newly elected councillors from all parties and with the new administration at County Hall to continue to campaign to make sure that North Cornwall gets a fair deal from both the Government and from Cornwall Council.

One of the biggest issues I hear from people on doorsteps or in my e-mal inbox is the cost of fuel. Whilst the Government have frozen tax on petrol and diesel for 3 years, I would like the Government to go further. The Treasury has confirmed to me that they are looking at cutting prices further for rural parts of mainland Cornwall and the highlands of Scotland by extending the 5 pence-per-litre discount on fuel that is currently in operation on the Isles of Scilly. Making petrol and diesel cheaper will make it easier for people to be able to access job or educational opportunities further afield and so I am continuing to fight for to get this rural cut in prices extended to North Cornwall.

When it comes to railways, I am calling on the Government to maintain or improve direct Cornwall to London services when the Great Western rail franchise is renewed in 2 years time. I also want them to consider plans to build an Okehampton Parkway station next to the A30 to bring railway services much closer to the North and East of Cornwall and to boost for our local economy. I am also working with the Campaign for Better Transport to make sure we get the best deal possible from the government for subsidies for rural bus services, so that as many villages and parishes in North Cornwall as possible have access to a useful and reliable bus service.

Last month I also visited Sharp's Brewery in Rock to cut the ribbon at their new storage facility, and to hear more about their plans to continue to grow the business and provide job and training opportunities for local people. Over the past few years I have been working with Sharp's to campaign to get a fairer deal for the industry and so I am glad that our campaign to scrap the controversial 'beer duty escalator' - that saw tax on beer rise by 2 pence per pint above inflation every year - was been scrapped by the Coalition Government in March's Budget. The British Beer and Pub Association estimates that pubs and breweries employ around 2,100 people in North Cornwall, providing around £23.8 million in wages for the area, so it is good news that the pattern of rising tax on beer has been halted, which should keep pub-going remain affordable, help sustain local jobs and stop the closure of well loved community pubs.

Countryside Code



Websites of the Month The Countryside on the Web

As the weather has finally improved (a bit) I thought I would look at what the web has to offer in advice on how to be in the countryside as, for example, a walker or visitor.

The place I started with was Natural England, which hosts the Countryside Code which was started as the County Code in the 1950s and has been updated in 2012 as the Countryside Code (<u>http://</u> <u>tinyurl.com/7wnaj92</u>). I thought it would apply to just to visitors, but as it says on the website it has a much wider scope:

"The Code, which applies in England and Wales, makes it clear what the responsibilities are for both the public and the people who manage the land."

So here we have, in a summary form, what all our responsibilities are to make our use of the countryside enjoyable, useful and productive.

The Code is divided into four sections:

- Respect other people
 - o Consider the local community and other people enjoying the outdoors
 - o Leave gates and property as you find them and follow paths unless wider access is available
 - Protect the natural environment
 - o Leave no trace of your visit and take your litter home
 - o Keep dogs under effective control
 - Enjoy the outdoors
 - o Plan ahead and be prepared
 - o Follow advice and local signs
 - Code for land managers
 - o Know your rights, responsibilities and liabilities
 - o Make it easy for visitors to act responsibly
 - o Identify possible threats to visitor safety

Each of these standards has some detailed text describing in some detail who is responsible for what which I found quite enlightening. You can also download a hard copy to print. There is also quite a lot of detailed information about access rights for which Natural England has the overarching statutory responsibility. One thing I noticed was the Paths for Communities Scheme which was launched a year ago and had £2 million allocated to improve footpaths. It has published its first newsletter which you can download http://tinyurl.com/nsaxaj6 . As far as I can tell Port Isaac hasn't used any of this grant, but I am sure Robin Penna would have supported it being taken up. His book of our footpaths is still very good value and available from *Secrets* http://www.secretsportisaac.com in Port Isaac and has good advice on getting the most from our local footpaths.

For walkers a website which you can join up is www.walkingworld.com . The subscription costs £18 per year and this entitles you to unlimited access to all their walks on the website. You can try out some samples without paying. The walks are searchable by distance from where you are, how long and how difficult, and the walk type – say you want a walk with a lot of wildlife. The walks have good directions and also photographs to help guide you and I have found it to be a really useful source of ideas. If you go on a walk and take photos, you can add them to the website as well.

To P or not to P

There are things that your Parish Council gets the blame for, sometimes quite rightly, but one recent issue most definitely cannot be blamed on the Parish Council. The decision by Cornwall County Council to close our two Public Toilets. Here are some facts.

During the last 18 months or so the County Council wrote to us on two or three occasions asking if we would like to take over the two Loos. Our latest reply in September last year said, as before, that we would take them on providing they gave us something which would generate income so that we could afford the running cost of around £29,000 per year. We suggested that CC could give us back the Car Park on New Road to run to which we have had no written response. At no time was there any suggestion that the CC were contemplating closure of the toilets.

On the 15th March this year we received a letter completely out of the blue informing us that the Roscarrock toilets would be closed from the 8th April and the New Road loos would remain open during the summer but only open at weekends between the 1st November and the 31st March. Your Council immediately arranged a meeting with Cornwall Council to discuss the matter.

The result was that additional funding was secured from Visit Cornwall, due to our role as a tourist destination, to keep the toilets open until the 15th May. This enabled us to have further discussions during which it was made absolutely clear by Cornwall Council that the loos would close unless we were able to take the burden of running and paving for the toilets away from them. Your Council then decided that it would be the lesser of two evils if the Roscarrock toilets remained open and the New Road ones closed to be replaced by temporary Portaloos until a permanent solution can be found and this was agreed by CC. Your Council is still working on various possibilities, now that we have bought ourselves some time until the end of October half term, in order to find a permanent solution.

We regret that there may be some inconvenience especially to local businesses at the top of the village by tourists who want to spend a penny. Lets hope they can be persuaded to spend a lot more.

Climate Friendly Endellion

As I write the RHS Chelsea Flower Show is in full swing up-country, with nightly coverage on television, and we have had a (brief) warm and sunny spell, so Spring has, perhaps, finally arrived. One more than usually interesting person interviewed by Alan Titchmarsh at the Show was the man who, surprisingly long ago, pioneered the production and sale of Wild Flower Seeds. Nowadays many of the Show Gardens have one or more beds planted up with hedgerow and meadow plants, carefully chosen to give a varied and natural appearance, and this re-creation of nature within a cultivated context is so common it is scarcely worth comment. He was clearly proud of having started this way of working.

Another idea whose time has apparently come is that of only using, if at all possible, plants native to the British Isles which, of course, raises the question of how you define 'native'. One definition is 'plants that were here when Britain was separated from Europe during the last Ice Age'. Taking things a bit further would involve us in North Cornwall using only plants that enjoy salt-spray, and that survive with not too much — but very strong, sun! I suppose variety in gardens comes from introduction of plants that wouldn't, normally, be there at all. However, concern for climate change should make us wary of too many wide-spread introductions, from too far away, at the cost of too much CO2; even so, as a non-native of Cornwall, I'll not press the point!

Not long ago, on television, we watched 'The Masters' Tournament', the annual golfing spectacular from the USA. One of the attractions is seeing the beautiful surroundings in which the holes are played, the flowing green of the fairways and the glint of sun on the almost unavoidable water. There is, however, the odd sensation that it's all quite artificial, that this is a partial copy of the grass-covered, sandy coastal dunes of North East Scotland, where the game originated, surrounded by tall trees which could not have been present in the original. How much effort, how much carbon dioxide is expended, in creating this playground for seekers of a green blazer!

Another topical concern, voiced in national media, is that many species of native wildlife are in serious decline, in some cases possibly even terminal decline. Declines of 30% in quite a short period are quoted. We are so fortunate in having a good variety of birds and small mammals in this area, that even the occasional mole-run across a corner of the lawn, or badger 'toilet' on the edge of a flower-bed, is excusable!

Traffic & Transport

Congratulations to all members of the new Parish Council on their election, commiserations to those who were unlucky in the ballot, and thanks to those who have served the community well over the last few years. We must hold the Members to the promises they made in their election statements, especially with regard to the environment, but we also have a responsibility: to keep them informed of our views and concerns, and support them in their work. We are certainly aware now (from early morning until tea-time, six days a week!) of the work the old Council did to get work started on the new Car Park, to replace parking on the beach in the Harbour, and give us a largely traffic-free bottom of the village.

It is to be hoped that the new Car Park which, although incomplete, should be ready for use by early July, will not be used only by those in search of Doc Martin. It is close to the bus-stop near the School, and linked to it by a path inside the hedge, away from the main road and all its traffic. From 25th May until 31st August there will be more buses, admittedly not a regular two-hourly service, but double the number we've had since December, and it will be possible to use the buses to go to Tintagel or Polzeath, for example, and walk back along the Coast (but not for the faint-hearted!).

When we get the rest of the footpath paralleling the B3287, from the new Car Park to Trewetha, the Car Park will be directly linked to our inland footpath network, which will open up many more interesting possibilities for walkers, whether resident or visitor. Next month we'll re-visit one of the classic circuits, bringing our description up-to-date.

cooking with martin

This recipe sums up for me what cooking is all about, taking simple ingredients, cooking them well and then bring them together to make a harmonious dish that sums up spring.

Pan fried Pollock, Asparagus, Hollandaise and Cornish earlies

For some reason, Hollandaise Sauce makes normally competent cooks tremble with fear. You only have to watch Masterchef to see Greg and John banging on about how difficult it is to get right. But follow this easy recipe and you will wonder what all the fuss is about.

Reduction

25 ml white wine vinegar 25 ml lemon juice ½ onion diced 2 sprigs Tarragon

Bring all ingredients to boil reduce by half. Keep warm.

Hollandaise Sauce

3 egg yolks 250g butter salt and pepper

Melt the butter over a gentle heat, being very careful not to let it brown.

Placing the egg yolks in a food processor and blend them thoroughly for about 1 minute.

Keeping the blender running add the reduction and then pour in the butter in a thin, slow, steady trickle; the slower you add it the better. (If it helps you to use a jug and not pour from the saucepan) taste and season. You can keep the sauce warm in a Thermos flask until you are ready to serve.

Pollock

Pollock is a substantial alternative to Cod although it is more delicate than Cod so this is why I salt it first. This not only imparts some flavour to the fish, hence the curry powder, but also draws some water out of the flesh which helps hold it together whilst it cooks.

4 x 180/200g Pollock fillets, about 3cm thick, skin on, bones removed 100g course sea salt and 2 tsp mild curry powder mixed together

Lay the Pollock skin side down on a tray sprinkle the salt over the fish, leave for 20 mins, then wash off the salt and pat the Pollock fillets dry using kitchen paper.

Fry in a frying pan over a medium heat. When the butter is foaming and starting to brown, add the Pollock fillets, skin-sides facing down, and fry for 4-5 minutes, or until two thirds of each fish fillet has turned opaque. Using a fish slice, carefully turn each Pollock fillet over and continue to cook for a further 2-3 minutes, set the fish fillets aside on a warm plate to rest.

Asparagus

Snap off the bottom of the stalks and lightly peel the bottom third of the stem. Drop loose spears into a pan of boiling salted water and cook until just tender. The cooking time varies according to the thickness of the stems, but ranges between 2-5 minutes.

Cornish Earlies

Cornish earlies are not washed (unlike Jersey Royals) as they do not keep once washed. So wash well, place in cold salted water and bring to the boil, then simmer until cooked, drain and toss in butter season with salt and pepper.

Please give this recipe a try both asparagus and Cornish earlies have a short season,
