

# Les Honey

Les was born at One the Villas, Port Isaac on January 31st1932, a son to Ada and Leslie Honey, younger brother to April and older brother to Leonard, Pearl and Jean.

His childhood was spent on and around the beach at Port Isaac and when old enough he went fishing with his father, inspiring his love for the sea. He attended Port Isaac School and at the age of 14 went to work as a cabin boy on the Isle of Wight under the guidance of Bernard Baker

He joined The Navy and was stationed at Culdrose where he worked on the fire engines, deciding one day to drive one home to Port Isaac to show the locals only to get a call from his CO telling him this was not allowed. Seeing that Les was going to be trouble on land, the following week he joined the crew of HMS Albion as a member of The Fleet Air Arm on a tour to the Mediterranean and Middle East. He used to mention how much he enjoyed his time in Libya and Gibraltar.

He had a very colourful life aboard various ships and throughout his life loved to tell stories to everyone he met. The family felt Les was mixing reality with fiction sometimes and they always compared him to Uncle Albert of Only Fools and Horses, teasing him with the phrase 'During the War' as he was about to start one of his tales of the sea.

After a courtship of four years due to her holidaying in Port Isaac, Les married Margaret at All Saints Church in Bexleyheath on the 25th May 1957. A year later Kevin was born and Lorraine followed in 1959.

By this time Les had left The Navy and had joined Trinity House working aboard the Owers Lightship then moving to Rame Head for a year working as a coastguard before moving back to Port Isaac and where a few years later Paul was born.

He got a job at Bambergers or Jewsons as its known today working with Brian Beare and Bill Vivien. He sold insurance, even tea, became barman at The Lawns and even went back to sea, helping his son Kevin haul lobster pots, always complaining that he never got paid.

He was a keen snooker and billiard player enjoying the competition of both leagues, and many afternoons were spent down the village playing billiards with Jack Spry, Mark Prout, Jack Hill, Jack Rowe, Micheal Collins and Bryan Richards and later in life with Bill Herring and Ron Burton. Many said he had a 'Alex Higgins' action about him when he was on the table, after an adventurous shot he would skew his cue to left wildly nearly taking out the lights above the table.

He loved to read, watch war films and documentaries like The World at War, watching them over and over again. Many times Margaret and Paul would tell him he only watched that film last week just so they wouldn't miss some of their programmes like Eastenders and the football and golf.

Margaret bought him a car in 2002 and they enjoyed many trips out, Les started to do car boots and would go off early in the morning with only just enough room to turn the steering wheel.

In 2009 he was diagnosed with Alzheimer's and as the months went on Margaret was unable to cope at home. In August 2010 Les was admitted to Bodmin Hospital for assessment and then on 1st January 2011 went in to St Breock Care Home in Wadebridge where he was looked after so well by the staff and nurses. They said he was quite a

character, telling his stories, dancing with staff to the sound of Jim Reeves and going in to other people's rooms and taking their boiled sweets. They couldn't believe that many years ago Margaret let him bring a boat in to the kitchen because he was afraid that it was going to blow away in the storm, forecast for that night.

Les would always try and help anyone if asked, whether shifting furniture, teaching people to drive, calling out bingo numbers or raising money for clubs and charities. We'll miss his stories of the sea and as they say, Port Isaac has lost another one of his characters.

Margaret, Kevin, Lorraine and Paul wish to thank everyone for their kindness, sympathy and support. We would also like to thank the Doctors at The Surgery, Bodmin Hospital and all the staff, nurses and carers at St Breock Care Home for looking after Les so well in the final years of his life.

# Peter Stirling Castle

September 7th 1920 - June 4th 2013

Peter was born in Solihull, the third son of Lionel and Maggie Castle. Educated at Solihull Grammar School and moved to Bristol Grammar School in 1932. He went to Cambridge University in 1938 to read Agriculture. He was well known in the village for his sailing and also farming at Roscarrock Farm with Edgar Thomas.

At the outbreak of the War be volunteered for the Royal Navy and was Commissioned in the RNVR. He served in the South Atlantic, West Africa, and commanded an Air Sea Rescue ML in the North Sea. After the war he returned to Cambridge to complete his Agricultural Degree. He joined the Colonial Service in 1948 and posted to the Gold Coast [which in 1957 became Ghana] West Africa as a District Agriculture Officer teaching modern farming methods to the Africans.

Whilst there he met a Red Cross Worker, Patricia Welsh. They were married in 1958



and have 3 sons, William, Charles and Matthew. On returning to England he farmed in Norfolk and North Yorkshire. He retired to Calstock and for the past 10 years has lived in Tavistock.

Do you ever feel powerless — that anything you do to improve the state of things is so insignificant as to have no effect at all? If so, you should read a new book by Rob Hopkins called "The Power of Just Doing Stuff". Rob Hopkins was one of the first people to foresee the imminent existence of Peak Oil — the moment when production of petroleum worldwide reaches a maximum, after which consumption always exceeds discovery of new resources, the beginning of the downward slope of the graph of worldwide production and consumption of petroleum and petroleum products. Realisation of this, and of the inevitable consequences of climate change, led him and others to found the Transition network in 2005. Their idea was not to frighten people, but to find ways in which a smooth transition could be made from our present, fossilfuelled, economy to one not adding to the carbon dioxide content of the atmosphere, with all the problems that this can cause.

Towns like Totnes showed the way, and now more than 1,000 Transition initiatives exist in more than 40 countries. Rob says "Different groups try different things and, if an idea works, it spreads". Totnes, Bristol and others have established their own local currencies, so that money stays in the community. In Todmorden (Lancashire), vegetables are grown on every available bit of earth (rather than flowers) and are free to everyone to take away; in Topsham, a community brewery was started. Hopkins's theme is that no initiative is too small, too local, "...when there are thousands of communities worldwide, all weaving their bit in a larger tapestry, it adds up to something awe-inspiring and strong." A stimulating and positive message, indeed — and in that positive frame of mind we'll suggest an interesting walk, embracing two of the valleys in the parish, and a bit of newly-created path.

Start from The Platt outside the RNLI Boathouse, facing the Harbour, and walk left (South, away from the Harbour) up Church Hill. A little way up, take the signposted footpath on the left (Footpath 35 in Robin Penna's book and maps) along the valley side, not far above the bottom. On your left you'll pass Jon's Lake (a little nature reserve with its island) and (as quick as you can!) the Water Treatment Plant, and a couple of gates, to reach the (former) Mill, now a farm with holiday accommodation. Just beyond the buildings, go left through a gate, and drop down to follow the line of the old mill-race. Quite soon you come to a junction, where the path to Tresungers (Footpath 36) goes straight ahead but we turn left over a small slate bridge and then, immediately, right. The narrow path runs between the stream (left) and the silted-up mill-pond (right), eventually dropping down to cross the stream on a substantial bridge. Climb over the stile, and steeply up the hill (very slippery if wet) until the path gradually flattens out and becomes a farm track. Once past Archer Farm (dog!) you enter the hamlet of Trewetha, and reach the road (B3267) on the outside of a bend.

Bear right (South East) along the road [extreme care — fast traffic] past Bodannon Farm, for 300 metres (330 yards), and cross the road to a stile beside a gate on the North side. Walk across the field in an Easterly direction, now following Footpath 8, to cross a stile by a gate, and turn left to join Footpath 7. We follow the left-hand edge of the field to a flight of steps, at the bottom of which we turn left and follow the line of blue stakes past a lake (below, on your right) to a gate. Through this we follow the left-hand edge of the field to a waymark at the bottom. Here we bear left to drop down through the trees (very slippery if wet) to the valley bottom. [This Footpath 7 has recently been officially diverted, and is not as shown on OS maps or in Robin's book and maps]

We then join Footpath 4, aiming left (West, and later North West), over streams and stiles, straightforwardly following the bottom of the Port Gaverne valley back to habitation. Past the first row of cottages on the left, notice the cob wall of the Rashleigh fish-cellar (or "pilchard-palace"), then the remains of a slate-built lime-kiln and, finally, the cob wall of the Union fish-cellar, all on the left, and which brings you to the road at the small harbour of Port Gaverne. Return to Port Isaac is up the hill to the left, but you may wish to defer that climb and stay a while, possibly visiting the Hotel on the right, with its slate-flagged Bar.

Next month, another old favourite, re-visited.

With the support of Sharps Brewery, this last decade has seen a tradition established between Port Isaac RNLI and well-known West Country artists who have created various images of lifeboat operations associated with the village. These paintings have been made into cards, notelets, special limited edition signed reproductions plus have been the prize in Station's annual Christmas draw - all helping to raise important funds for Port Isaac RNLI.

Seen here with Emma Bebbington, General Manager and Richard Smith Sales Manger of Sharps Brewery, local artist Caroline Cleave and her husband Jon, joins with Port Isaac RNLI Fundraising Committee and Chairman Bob Bulgin presenting a fully framed and dedicated signed copy of her painting **Safe Home in Port** to the management of Sharps.

Caroline and her husband, Jon own what was the original Lifeboat Station high up on the East side of the village - now know as "The Boathouse Stores", so Caroline's creative illustration in Victorian style has a close affinity to the history of Port Isaac Lifeboat. It depicts an imaginary scene outside the Boathouse at Christmas back in 1926. The sheet music references the importance of song and music in Port Isaac - still very much an integral part of this villages life - and the crew gathered about are taken from an actual photograph from Yvonne Cleave's collection.

Yvonne Cleave, Jon's mother, can trace many members of her family to this actual lifeboat crew and she passes down tales of the greasy `say` boots worn by these brave and hardy men. The boots were purchased from a cobbler in nearby Trelights, sized small, medium or large, neither right or left footed. but well fitted for a lifetime at sea.

Caroline has also included in her painting her constant companion, Fig, a little Jack Russell, so forming a link in time from the past and the present.



The Plan will shape how the local area develops over the next 20 years, the time when you will be trying to establish homes and careers in the local area.

# sooking with martin

There is no more classic British dessert than Trifle and although this Strawberry Trifle recipe takes a little bit of time to construct, and make all the components, it will make the perfect version of this popular dessert. *This recipe it is all about the stages and layers, each one needs to be fully complete before the next one, and each layer needs time given so it can set.* 

'Trifle' actually has hundreds of years of heritage, being one of the first dishes to be fully developed by English Chefs. The earliest known use of the name 'trifle' was for a thick cream, flavoured with sugar, ginger and rosewater that was a recipe published in 1596 in London, in a book by Thomas Dawson. Yet it wasn't until sixty years later, when milk was added, and the custard was poured over alcohol soaked bread, that we begin to see it take shape as a layered dessert – with the fruit and jelly being a much later addition to the recipe, coming in the 20th Century.

Strawberry Trifle

Note: You can make the Strawberry Sponge Roll and the Strawberry Juice for the Strawberry Jelly the day before and if you're short of time buy the sponge roll and use strawberry jelly.

### For The Strawberry Sponge Roll

4 large free-range eggs lcing sugar, to dust 2 tbsp caster sugar
100g caster sugar, plus extra to dust 2 tbsp strawberry liqueur (optional) 3 tbsp strawberry conserve
100g self-raising flour 300g strawberries 2 tbsp toasted flaked almonds

Preheat the oven to 190C/Gas 5. Grease and line a large, flat, roasting tin measuring about 25 x 35cm and 3cm thick, with baking parchment, leaving the edges of the parchment sticking up around the sides. Whisk the eggs and sugar together in a large bowl for about 10 minutes until the mixture is pale, creamy and tripled in volume.

Sift the flour over the mixture in batches, carefully folding it in after each addition. Pour the mixture into the prepared tin, spread it evenly into the corners and smooth the surface. Bake in the oven for 10-12 minutes or until the sponge turns golden and feels slightly springy when pressed.

Cut a piece of baking parchment slightly larger than the size of the tin and lay it flat on the work surface. Dust with caster sugar. Remove the tin from the oven and pull the parchment to loosen the sponge from the sides. Invert the sponge on to the sugared parchment and peel away the lining. Drizzle with a little strawberry liqueur, (if using). Roll the long edge of the cake and parchment over to form a neat log, use the parchment to help you, then leave the sponge to cool, rolled inside the parchment.

Meanwhile, hull and quarter the strawberries and put them into a bowl, sprinkle with the caster sugar, stir to coat and leave for 5 minutes.

Unroll the sponge again, and leaving a 2cm border all the way around the edges, spread the strawberry conserve, or Home-made Strawberry Jam, over the unrolled sponge, followed by the fresh strawberry quarters, and sprinkle the almond flakes on top. Then roll the long edge of the cake over to form a neat log, (tightly) using the parchment to help you. Making sure that the seam side of the roll is facing down, chill for at least 30 minutes before using in the trifle (can be left overnight). Slice into 3cm thick circles when ready.

### For The Strawberry Jelly

600g strawberries, sliced 40g caster sugar 8g silver leaf gelatine, soaked in water 250ml British sparkling white wine

Make the night before: To make the strawberry juice for the jelly, mix the sliced strawberries (400g) with the sugar and place in a glass heat proof bowl cover well with cling film. Place it above a simmering saucepan of water. Cook on a low heat for 90 minutes. Pour the strawberry mixture into a muslin bag (a clean tea towel and a sieve works just as well) and suspend over a bowl. When cool refrigerate overnight so that the juice collects in the bowl. Discard the strawberry solids.

To make the jelly, heat the strawberry juice. Squeeze the gelatine after soaking it, and add it to the strawberry juice. Stir to dissolve. When the gelatine has dissolved, transfer the mixture to a bowl, leave to cool then refrigerate until partially set – about 1 or 2 hours. Then whisk in the British sparkling white wine (Champagne will do at a pinch!) and add in the remaining thin sliced strawberries (200g). Put it back in the fridge for a short time before assembling the trifle: we do not want it to set in the bowl, so get it to this stage when you are ready to make the trifle. The jelly must be poured onto the slices of Strawberry Sponge Roll and left to set before pouring on the cooled custard.

#### For The Custard

250ml of whole milk 250ml of double cream 1 vanilla pod (or quality vanilla essence) 6 fresh egg yolks 50g of caster sugar

Proper English Custard is a mix of sugar, egg yolks, cream and milk, flavoured with vanilla

Put a heavy based saucepan on a medium heat, add the milk, cream, and vanilla pod. Stir and slowly bring up to the boil. When near the boil, take off the heat. Meanwhile beat and whip the egg yolks and sugar together in a large bowl, until the yolk is almost white. Then add in the hot milk and cream little by little to the egg yolks and sugar, making sure you whisk continuously as you do so. Transfer all the ingredients back to the saucepan, split the vanilla pod and scrape the seeds out into the custard, and return the custard to a medium heat for a few minutes – stir continuously with a spoon until it is thick enough to coat the back of it, and then it must be withdrawn from the heat. If the custard sauce reaches too high a temperature, it will curdle – but note: the higher the temperature, the thicker the resulting custard, and as it cools it will thicken some more. Finally strain the custard through a fine sieve into a clean bowl or serving jug, and as it cools stir occasionally to stop a skin from forming. Get it to this stage and cooling 30 minutes before assembling the trifle in the trifle bowl.

TURN OVER TO FIND OUT HOW TO FINISH YOUR TRIFLE



The only way to describe the Spring fishing this year is disastrous. With the cold weather and constant easterly winds, the old saying "when the winds in the east the fishing is at its least" is ringing loud and clear. Catches were down to about one fifth of usual with most boats running with a minimum of one fifth expenses. The start of the year was financially crippling and morale was at an all-time low.

The main problem was the water temperature. A diver off Port Isaac recorded sea temp of 7.6c in mid-April, when the annual average is 10.5c The ideal temperature to store Lobsters is below 8c as, being cold-blooded, they move very little and are in a virtual stupor. Initially there was a panic that the Gulf stream was starting to fluctuate, mirroring the changing patterns of the jet stream. However, it was soon discovered that the fishing for crabs and lobsters was very poor throughout the whole country with Scotland being the worst hit and reports of their fisherman starting the day with a trip to the food bank. The sea still remained cold into May and this was reflected in the continuing poor catches.

With the under 10 meter Cornish fleet in dire straits a large Belgium fleet of beam trawlers and French stern trawlers was fishing 24/7 off Trevose Head and all the way through to Bude and farther north outside the six mile limit and with full consent of the UK government. The effect of beam trawlers on the stocks and the seabed is the equivalent of ploughing virgin rain forest as this is the most destructive form of fishing.

On April 7th there were 14 Belgium beam trawlers and three French stern trawlers, all very large boats in the 30m class, fishing the north Cornish waters when all the local boats were tied up due to poor weather. You can view this for yourself on the "ais shipping" web page. Most boats over 16m give a position

which can be viewed on this site with a description of the vessel. The wet fish stocks will never recover if they are allowed to be exploited in such a manner.

We are fortunate that the majority of the Lobster fishery is mainly based inside the six mile limit and is nonmigratory or that stock would also come under the relentless pressure from large nomadic boats.

#### The sex life of a lobster

Yes, it has got two penises. It all starts when the female lobster casts its shell and is soft. The male only approaches the female when she is soft and therefore vulnerable as she is by far the more aggressive. The male flips the female onto her back and inserts its penises into the two seed collecting glands in the missionary position.

After a few days the seed forms a hard plug to the seed glands to prevent loss. The seed can remain fertile for two years. A female can also flush the seed pods if she finds a better mate (one who is genetically better option).

The egg production then starts in the ovaries located in the cephalothorax, with a average female producing 20,000 eggs. This stage can take up to a year.

Each egg is then fertilized and glued to the underside of the tail one at a time. The lobster carries the eggs for around further nine months until they are released into the sea as fry, usually in mid May.

Back to fishing - Will the sea temp ever make it to a average this year and bring the shellfish out to play?

Next time - summer fishing ...

#### For The Cream And Toppings

600ml double cream

1 vanilla pod, split and seeds removed

2 tbsp icing sugar

½ lemon, zest

100g dark chocolate, grated (min 70% coco best quality chocolate)

100g strawberries, sliced

When ready to serve, (the jelly and custard has set) whip the cream with the vanilla seeds until it thickens. Sift in the icing sugar and continue to whisk to create soft peaks, then stir in the lemon zest. Spoon the whipped cream on top of the trifle. Sprinkle with grated dark chocolate.

### FINISHING MARTIN'S LOVELY STRAWBERRY TRIFLE

### Assemble The Strawberry Trifle

You can decide to either make the strawberry trifle in individual sized portions, or make it in one very large glass bowl, it is up to you. Into the large trifle bowl, (or individual glasses) add in the slices of strawberry sponge (3cm thick slices, I like to soak the sponge with sherry.). Pour over the sponge slices the chilled and setting strawberry jelly, leave to fully set in the fridge – about 2 hours. When the jelly is set and when the vanilla custard is cool to cold (remove any skin) pour over the layer of jelly a layer of custard (spread a piece of cling film over the custard to prevent a skin forming). Put the trifle back into the fridge until the custard is fully set – about an hour. When it is set (remove the cling film) and ten minutes before you want to serve, make the cream topping and spread over the custard layer. Shave over some grated chocolate, add some strawberry slices on top and serve.

Now that is what I call a proper dessert, please give it a go. Enjoy, Mx




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




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
