

# A follow-up on last month's Backalong Blog

Further to David Castle's 'Backalong' article in last month's *Trio*, there were other outlets and things of interest on Church Hill.

Above Mr Morman's shoe workshop lived Mr Dan Mutton who crewed on the famous *Cutty Sark* and next door was Mr Jack Collins who was quite a famous singer in the 1920s and 30s.

Further up the hill lived Mr Edgar Bate who had one leg considerably shorter than the other. He was a reserve postman and used to deliver telegrams to outlying farms for sixpence (2½p today).



Up again was Mr Dick Pooley who had a son, Dereck, who became a Professor in the nuclear industry.

Across the road is the entrance to the Old Mill which played a major part in Port Isaac's history. Further up on the right was the Port Isaac Conservative Club. This closed down about the time that the Liberal Club opened in 1911. The Snooker table was transferred to the new club and is still played on to this day, well over 100 years later.

Across the road was the Killing House where animals were slaughtered from Mr Worden's Homer Park farm at the very top of the Hill. The meat was then sold in his butcher's shop opposite Tremain Cottage.

Up a bit from there is the Old Quarry, now a private car park, where men used to break stones in various sizes. Lots of the fishermen used to do land jobs when they couldn't get to sea. My father used to say that when the Inspector or someone they didn't like visited, the men were adept at making stone chippings fly around their head - they never stayed long!

Near the top, another Port Isaac butcher, Mr Jack Hicks had a piggery.

Church Hill today, like all the narrow streets in the old village, is nearly 100% holiday homes.

## David's backalong blog - "I'll call you!"

Today we take the telephone system for granted, but the Port Isaac Exchange started just after the World War 1. It was based on the area of St Endellion Parish with the Exchange in Richard Prout's house, Fernlea, next to Pride of Place. Richard Prout was the agent for the L & SW Railway and had the contract to take parcels and fish boxes/fish barrels to the Station. The telephone exchange for the village was installed in the front room of Fernlea House. Initially it had 40 subscribers and 10 trunk lines to Bodmin exchange. The manual operators were Richard Prout's daughters, Ashley and Aura.

Some of the early subscribers were L Chapman & Sons - PORT ISAAC 2, Trelawney Garage (John & Mark Prout) - PORT ISAAC 8, G Sherratt, Bakers - PORT ISAAC 10, HM Coastguard - PORT ISAAC 25.

By 1935 the demand for telephones increased in the Parish increased and a semi-automatic exchange was built in Doctor's Meadow. This handled all local calls without an operator. All other calls were connected to Bodmin exchange by dialling 0. The building in Doctor's Meadow was enlarged in the late 1950s.

The growth of the telephone system changed in the 70's when STD dialling was available throughout the UK.

# Websites of the Month

The 5th report from the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) was published on September 23rd and is available to download from www.ipcc.ch. The IPCC was established in 1988 and provides a report every few years on the state of knowledge concerning climate change. The report is compiled from contributions from scientists on an unpaid basis and there is input from over 120 countries. It is a consensus document and represents the agreed common understanding across the people who compile it. Unusually for an organization, it was awarded the 2007 Nobel Peace Prize (awarded also to Al Gore for his work in communicating about climate change. You can read more about the history of this group http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change

The reports have not been without controversy as the issue of climate change policy is highly charged, with huge vested interests involved in the conclusions reached. Each time a new report is released it is picked over in detail to see what the flaws are, and there have been some. For example, the projected melting of the Himalayan glaciers were overestimated, which gave the critics a reasonable point that maybe there was a bias towards facts suggesting things were getting bad, and avoiding more 'good news'. Overall, however, the reports have been well received and are regarded as authoritative. So this latest report is well worth looking at if you want to know what state the global climate is in, and whether the predictions are of concern or not.

I was granted wiggle room on the deadline for *Trio* this month, but the wriggling had to finish a day before the fifth report was published so I thought a guide to how to tackle reading it might be useful. One of the things that people often find difficult is that the report will speak about things in terms of probability. For example they have a set of statements associated with the likelihood that any particular climate event — say wild fires http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Wildfire, or flooding http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Flood is caused by greenhouse gasses associated with human activities.

So what do the probabilities and the related risks mean? A good presentation about this can be downloaded from http://www.ipcc.ch/pdf/unfccc/

IPCC\_assessements\_and\_their\_possible\_use\_Chris\_Field.pdf . Essentially they are saying that if the evidence stacks up really strongly that one thing causes another you can say, given that evidence, it is very unlikely that it could have happened by chance. An example might help. If you toss a coin it will come down heads or tails. If you toss it 10 times it is likely to come down roughly 5 times heads and five times tails if it is unbiased. However, by chance it might come down 7 times heads and 3 times tails. That wouldn't be the most likely but it still is fairly likely. You can estimate exactly what the probability is using simple formulas. A really good place to get an understanding about this is a book by Nate Silver called Signal and Noise http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Nate\_Silver. His claim to fame was that he successfully predicted the outcome of the US elections when the pundits got it all wrong. He uses an approach invented by the English minister and mathematician Reverend Thomas Bayes http:// en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Thomas\_Bayes who lived in the 16th Century. His work gives a way to understand risk and likelihood and Nate Silver has brought it up to date. We tend to see patterns in things http://forgetomori.com/2009/skepticism/seeing-patterns/ and using the maths you can decide whether these are real or random events.

So when you have a read about the risks and probabilities in the report on climate change, keep these up your sleeve as they will help to get some idea of how confident you can be in the findings.

If you want to go into this even more deeply have a read of James Hansen's latest work http://www.columbia.edu/~jeh1/.

#### Clean Earth Solar Farm

Council heard a presentation from Clean Earth with regard to their application for a Solar Farm/PA13/04287. Mitigating plans have been put before Cornwall Council's planning team and St Endellion PC is in discussions currently with regard to the amendments.

#### **Highways and Traffic Matters**

Problems continue with regard to Church Hill and Members will report back to the full Council Meeting on 14 October with regarding a meeting held with Mr Oliver Jones of the Highways Department to discuss Church Hill signage and other matters.

#### Car Park

It was resolved that the further £40,000 to complete the car park work was not necessary and would not therefore be requested. The Public Works Loan Board would be advised. Although final work to seeding and planting is not yet complete, there are sufficient funds remaining to enable this work to be carried out.

The Car Park is to be named 'The Main Car Park'. It is hoped this play on words will give the impression it is the 'Main' Car Park for the village, when in fact it offers wonderful views over 'The Main'.

The new Parking Places Order for The Main Car Park is ready to be submitted to Cornwall Council and once approved, advertisements will be placed as required in the press.

Litter problems in the car park continue and Members are speaking to contractors in order to have this matter fully addressed before the new season begins next year. The tender for the ice cream van failed to attract bidders in time for the season and so it has been shelved until next year.

#### **Environment**

Concerns continue with regard to the amount and type of litter spoiling the environment, particularly in the lower village. Members hope to speak to business premises informally, in order to gain support for a reduction in this perennial problem.

## NOTHER CREW AWAR

Our Station has just received notification from the Secretary General of The International Maritime Organisation Federation (IMO) that our crew members Senior Helm Damien Bolton, Nicki Bradbury and Matt Main are to receive an Award for Exceptional Bravery at Sea in recognition of the role they played in the rescue operation carried out on April 8th 2012.

The citation reads: That Damien and his fellow crewmen, in rescuing, on 8th April 2012, at great personal risk, two men, father and son, who had been swept off cliffs into an arc of semi-submerged rocks in very rough waters. The father, sadly, did not survive the

# Dan Rogerson writes ...

In late August the Speaker recalled Parliament at the request of the Prime Minister. We were to debate the appalling use of chemical weapons in Syria and the prospect of western military intervention in the conflict. When the motion for debate was published there was much in it with which I could agree; deploring the use of these weapons and calling for those responsible to be brought to justice. However, the most contentious issue was the possibility of intervention.

Let me start by saying that I respect the motives of colleagues who have argued that the use of chemical weapons crosses a line which demands action, sending a strong signal to others who might consider using them elsewhere. I found myself struggling to see how launching missiles would really take away the capability of anyone using these chemicals if they are delivered by mortar fire or similar means. Rather such bombing would risk further civilian casualties and possibly strengthen the resolve of Russia and Iran to supply more resources to the Syrian Government. therefore voted against both Labour's motion which recommended action following a UN vote and the Government's motion which opened the way for a further vote and then UK involvement with or without United Nations backing. That does not mean that the UK should do nothing, but hopefully our efforts can be aimed at building an international peacekeeping effort based on negotiation and humanitarian support for those injured and forced to flee to neighbouring countries.

When Parliament wasn't in session I spent the summer and time in late September/early October visiting parishes across North Cornwall to knock on doors and listen to concerns, so that I can raise the issues that matter to people when I speak up for us in Westminster. This was a tradition started by John Pardoe and Paul Tyler, and I really enjoy being able to speak to as many people as possible – if I didn't manage to catch you in when I was knocking on doors in Port Isaac please don't hesitate to contact me by e-mail, letter, telephone or arrange a time for us to meet using the details below.

In last month's article I wrote about the news that the Lib Dem Schools Minister David Laws is introducing a fair funding formula from 2016, that will end decades of underfunding for Cornish schools. In addition to this fair funding forumla, the Coalition Government has also introduced the 'Pupil Premium' which is extra cash for schools and for disadvantaged pupils, whereever they are in the country, to make sure that all children have a fair start in life.

The Pupil Premium was on the front page of the Lib Dem manifesto at the last General Election and I am proud that we are now delivering it in Government. As children went back to school at the start of September I looked up the figures for how much pupil premium local schools would be getting. The amount has increased from £600 per eligible pupil last year to £900 this year, and is due to rise to around £1,200 next year. This year Port Isaac Community Primary School will be receiving an extra £5,400 in Pupil Premium money. Wadebridge School gets an extra £171,000 this year whilst Sir James Smiths School in Camelford is getting an extra £121,800. Schools can spend the Pupil Premium as they see fit, to provide things like extra-curricular activities, more tutoring or one-onone support and other opportunities that would otherwise only be available in the likes of fee-paying schools. Through the Pupil Premium and through a fair school funding formula Liberal Democrats are working hard to make sure that we build both a stronger economy and a fairer society, so that everyone - no matter where they live or what their background - has the opportunity to get on in life.

I was also pleased at the announcement at Liberal Democrat Party Conference in September that the Lib Dems in Government are going to make sure that all children in reception, year 1 and year 2 will receive a free hot, healthy school meal at lunchtime. This will help boost concentration, raise school standards as well as cut the cost of living for millions of parents who are feeling the squeeze.

We have also had news that the economy grew by more than was original predicted over the past few months. Fixing the economy was always going to take time, but these upgraded GDP figures are another encouraging sign that, slowly but surely, the economy is on the mend. Of course we cannot be complacent – unlike the other two parties Liberal Democrats are determined to build **both** a stronger economy **and** a fairer society, enabling everyone to get one in life. Getting growth going and creating jobs is at the heart of that and will continue to be our focus. We have already helped create a million private sector jobs since 2010 and are working on creating a million more. I am talking to colleagues about the best way to create more job and apprenticeship opportunities locally and I will be continuing to work in Parliament and with our team of Lib Dem councillors at County Hall to stimulate jobs and growth in Cornwall.

# Rosie's adventure to Borneo

Rosie Collings has just left Port Isaac for Cardiff University where she is studying BioChemistry. Yes, she is probably feeling a bit homesick but she has got used to being away from home having spent the summer on an amazing adventure in Borneo with Raleigh International.

Raleigh International is a 'Youth and Sustainable Development Charity' that offers expeditions with community, conservation and adventure elements in a variety of worldwide locations. Volunteers work on sustainable and worthwhile community and environmental projects alongside young people from the host country and local skilled workers. Writes Raleigh on its website, "Volunteers also undertake a tough adventure challenge. All our volunteer expeditions are designed to be challenging, life-changing experiences. The more you put in, the more you get out of it!"

*Trio* caught up with Rosie before she started off on the next chapter of her life at Uni to find out all about her summer.

"I was part of a group – the biggest group Raleigh had ever taken anywhere – that went to Borneo. There were 150 of us and the first time I met any of the people I was to spend the next seven weeks with was when I arrived at Heathrow – and a 16-hour flight is a good way of starting to get to know people!

Once in Borneo we went to a hostel in the main city Kito Kinabalu – I especially remember the amazing Phillipino food market there. We were split into small groups of 12 and we trained together for five days, gaining an understanding of what we were there to do and also going on a practice trek. Most expeditions are split into three sections – Environmental, Community and Adventure - but I was only there for seven weeks so I was just going to do the Community and Adventure sections.

After training I was put into another group of 12 volunteers for our Adventure Phase starting in Long Pasia, a 12-hour trek away, four hours of which was off-road! At this point I didn't realise how hard it was going to be, being with the same people 24/7. Luckily I was with a lovely group who came from all over the world including Kuala Lumpur, Jordan, Germany, Sweden, Switzerland and Albania. We were accompanied by two managers, one a medic and the other a radio operator. I knew what was planned for us but nothing could have prepared me for tracking in the jungle for 12 days, making our own camps each night and sleeping in bashas (hammocks) tied between the trees covered with just a tarp (tarpaulin sheet) and digging our long drops (toilets). Most days we trekked for five hours, although one day we kept going for seven hours, hacking our way through the jungle with parangs (machetes). It was gruelling as we each carried around 20kg on our backs which included enough food for us for six days – all pretty basic and consisting of rice, noodles and crackers. On the seventh day our guides headed back to base camp to get our food the rest of our journey.

So what can I tell you about the jungle – well, it rained a lot and we washed in rivers. There were gibbons and spiders all over the place and as for the leeches, well, they got everywhere, and I mean everywhere. You had to roll them over and flick them off. Behind an amazing waterfall was a bat cave that my friends said was pretty cool but I avoided going in as I had burnt my hand and couldn't risk getting it infected from the bats.

We then trekked back to Long Pasia where our guides lived and were lucky enough to be invited to stay with them in their homes. Their families cooked us amazing meals and we all stayed up late dancing the tribal dances they taught us.

As a reward for getting through the trek I then went for a week to Mamuitik Island with the Borneo Divers and did Open Water Padi (a diving qualification). The time passed far too quickly and before I knew it I was starting the Community phase of my trip.

Again we were put into groups, this time with three managers, and we set off to Kampong Tiong to start our Community work. Our first job was to refurbish the local kindergarten. Under the guidance of our managers we built a toilet (a bit more than a

hole in the ground!) and extended the kitchen that was on stilts. We then had the task of painting the building using massive extension poles so that we could reach Refurbishment might not sound much be we stripped the whole inside of the building and then sanded and painted. We also designed a mural – a massive globe of the world - for one whole wall, and added to it all the national flags where the venturers where from.

Another task was teaching English to some of the local children as well as





having Malay and Dusan (the local language) lessons ourselves. This was really useful as although most of the children could speak English fluently only two adults were able to.

I was lucky enough to celebrate my 18th birthday in Kampong Tiong. It was a lovely hot day and I got a tan as I was outside planting rice in the paddy fields. The scenery was beautiful and amazing and I thought to myself what a lovely way to spend my birthday. Little did I know what the villagers had planned for me – a surprise birthday party! They made me a cake and we all shared a huge feast. It was so special and we were taught a local song that we all sang together.

After each project everyone returned to Base Camp. Probably one of the hardest things throughout the whole venture was there when we had to put on skits and sing and dance in front of the rest of the 150-strong main group. It was ridiculously embarrassing but we also had lots of laughs! (Ed: Come on Rosie, a Port Isaac panto veteran like you shouldn't be embarrassed by making a fool of themselves!). But what a group we were! Between us we refurbished one kindergarten, built a new kindergarten, installed a gravity water feed system at a conservation camp and also built a suspension bridge. I made friends that I know will be friends for the rest of my life and I wouldn't have missed any of my trip for the world.

But I couldn't have done it without all the local Port Isaac support. I had to fund the trip myself and I did this by working and holding sales along with all the donations and gifts I received. Thank you so much to everyone, you all know who you are – I appreciate your help and support so much. I am so lucky to have had the opportunity to undertake such an experience and it has set me up to go out into the world."

So will Rosie Collings be sitting in her room in Cardiff wishing she were back home? I think not. She will be embarking on the next challenge of her life, looking for where the next adventure is coming from!



# Dudley Taylor



Dudley Taylor, aged 96, passed away peacefully on 28th August after a short illness. Born in Port Isaac on 6th June 1917, Dudley was the youngest of four brothers, Geoffrey, Alfred and Cecil. The Taylor family lived in Port Isaac for many generations, Dudley's father, William, was a carpenter and builder who married Beatrice, one of nine daughters from Port Isaac Mill.

Dudley was educated at Port Isaac School and later attended Bodmin School as a weekly boarder, travelling by pony-trap from the village to catch the train from Port Isaac Roads station. Dudley left school at 16 and became an apprentice pharmacist at Boots the Chemist in Truro, finishing has pharmaceutical studies at Nottingham University just as war broke out. Dudley joined the RAF and was commissioned in the then newly formed and highly secret radar branch.

After the war Dudley went back to pharmacy, completed his training and used his savings and de-mob money to buy his first chemist shop in 1947. His father had retired by then and he and Beatrice had moved to Bridgwater to be with their eldest son Geoffrey. It was there that Dudley met Dawn, who he married in 1948; just before moving to Kenilworth, where Dudley's skill and business acumen progressively led to the creation of one of this country's largest privately owned pharmaceutical businesses including an extensive chain of chemist shops, many in Cornwall, with branches in Camelford and Wadebridge. Dudley was a popular Rotarian and a very competitive bridge player, a keen golfer and a life-long supporter of Coventry City. Friends and customers will recall his generosity, his love of a good story his mischievous sense of humour and above all his real interest in their well-being. After fifty-seven years of happy marriage, Dawn predeceased Dudley by eight years. He is sorely missed by his seven children, Anne, Christopher, Richard, Michael, Louise, Philip and Alison and his twenty-six grandchildren. A Service of Thanksgiving was held on Monday 9th September at his local church of St. Nicholas in Kenilworth to celebrate Dudley's life, as he was fond of saying "I don't want people to be miserable at my funeral!"

Dudley's heart never really left Port Isaac and every year the family would spend most of the summer crammed into an old fisherman's cottage just off Fore Street that Dudley had bought for a few hundred pounds in the 1950's. The family all developed a love for Port Isaac and the North Cornwall coast and the tradition is carried on to the next generation with the original cottage being occupied most of the time by one or more of Dudley's twenty-six grandchildren.

Why do the media always have to tell us what politicians (and others) are going to say, before they actually say it? Anyway, they'll go on tell us what they said, after they've said it. I suppose telling us everything twice fills up space when there's not enough <u>real</u> news, but I wish there was an embargo on telling us the content of speeches until they were actually made, and of reports until they were actually issued.

I'm sorry about that outburst, it was occasioned by the announcement, as I'm writing this, that the UN's International Climate-change Committee was going to report that the rate of global warming had slackened. That sounds like good news, and we should welcome it, but we should be a little cautious about how far we rejoice. The report presumably will say that global warming is still taking place, and that human beings are the root cause. Our burning of fossil fuels, thereby increasing the CO<sub>2</sub> content of the atmosphere and its greenhouse effect, still continues. It is only the rate at which things are happening, which is still many magnitudes greater than previous rates of change, that seems to have decreased and, at present, we don't know by how much.

Everything Homo Sapiens does seems to have equal and opposite effects (an echo of one of Newton's Laws of Motion?). We find a new source of energy (Shale Gas), but it's a fossil fuel, which we should not burn. Harvesting free energy from the Sun by solar farms covers up good farming land, while harnessing tidal energy can affect the movement of shoals of fish. Wind turbines on land, and even offshore, disrupt the flight patterns of birds — how did birds manage to avoid all the tower-mills and smock-mills which used to function fifty or so years ago up country?



Even the poor inhabitants of Pakistan, Nepal, Bhutan and other countries are not blameless! Smoke from their cooking-stoves deposits soot on Himalayan glaciers, making them more absorbent of solar radiation, which is powerful at high altitudes. The absorbed heat is melting the glaciers faster than had been thought ...

The Parish Council is drawing up a Neighbourhood Development Plan, which will indicate where, and how much, development should take place over the years to come. Many of you will be asked to contribute to the plan, incorporating your knowledge and experience, for the long-term creation of a stable but improved environment. We must try to ensure that, in every part of the plan as it evolves over the next few months, we bear in mind the condition of our planet, the global climate and its consequences for our locality, and how they are likely to change with time. What we burn today will decide just how comfortable we will be tomorrow.

No walk in the Parish this month (but see the map in the new Car Park notice-board, copies of Robin Penna's masterpiece available interalia from *Secrets*), but recommendation of a good hour-and-a-half's stroll not far away.

# all things end ...

All things comes to an end. Curacies are no exception and sadly mine is soon to do so. It is often only when we reach the end of something that we truly begin to appreciate the beginning. Perhaps it is only now I am realising what an extraordinary place Cornwall is and how the church in Cornwall is no exception.



I am always surprised by how much the church is still seen as an integral part of 'public life'. On a personal level this has involved everything from being invited to speak at the Wadebridge Farmers' dinner to switching on Christmas lights.

And then there are our extraordinary host of Cornish saints (even if most of them seem to be Breton, Irish or Welsh) and their even more extraordinary names. Where else do we find such a richness? And of course there are our many beautiful and historic churches.

It would be easy to take see all these peculiarities as problems requiring a solution. Are all those public events a distraction from the church's real duty? Should we be celebrating saints if we not know what they did or when they did it? Why, we might think, could not previous generations thought a little more about practical problems when building their churches; like how we heat them or what do we do with them outside a Sunday morning.

And yet from another perspective they are all strengths and teach us something about the Christian faith. Firstly that the church is there to celebrate God's presence not simply in the lives of those who might call themselves Christian. I haven't often quoted popes in recent years, but I will make an exception with the present pontiff. The Church, he recently observed, is the home of all, not a small chapel that can hold only a small group of selected people.

And those wonderful saints about whom we may know so little, can still nourish the imagination and remind us that faith should be a creative act. If art, literature and music can inspire, why should we not celebrate the colourful lives of colourful saints — even if that does mean a little creative licence. As for our churches — yes, they can indeed seem burdensome to maintain, but then again they also remind us that faith is not a practical affair. It is and should be extravagant and even excessive at times. A Christian faith should make a mark in this world — whether in the lives of believers and unbelievers or in marking the landscape with its steeples and towers. What I wonder will this generation leave of equal beauty and endurance?

Most of all however I have come to simple realisation – that there a few better places to spend a curacy.

# Sausage, pumpkin & sage casserole

This comforting sausage casserole is the perfect Bonfire night recipe to warm you up on a sparkling night. I know bonfire night is a while off but this is a great recipe that can also be used as a quick easy family meal. You could use baked beans instead for a more child friendly version. just add the beans 10 mins before finishing cooking. Also if you have lots of mouths to feed, cut the sausages into chunks after browning and bulk it out with tinned sweetcorn and frozen peas, again add 10 minutes before the cooking is finished, and serve on top of a jacket potato. If you wrap the jacket spuds in tin foil before you cook them you can leave them in the oven with the casserole on a low heat, so everything is ready for you without any last minute work.

50g butter
6 good-quality sausages
1 onion, peeled, thinly sliced
2 onions finely diced
2 garlic cloves, peeled, finely chopped
1 tbsp chopped fresh sage
1 small pumpkin, peeled, seeds removed, cut into equal-sized pieces
1 tbsp white wine vinegar
1 tsp caster sugar
200g/7oz canned chopped tomatoes
400g/14oz canned cannellini beans, drained, rinsed
500ml/18fl oz chicken stock
salt and freshly ground black pepper

- 1) Preheat the oven to 180C/350F/Gas 4.
- 2) Heat half the butter with a splash of oil in a large casserole over a medium heat and fry the sausages for 4-5 minutes, or until golden-brown all over.

2 tbsp chopped fresh flat leaf parsley

- 3) Add the remaining butter, onion and shallots and fry for three minutes, or until softened. Add the garlic and sage leaves and cook for a further three minutes, stirring well.
- 4) Add the pumpkin and stir the mixture until well combined. Increase the heat to high and add the white wine vinegar. Continue to cook until most of the liquid has evaporated.
- 5) Add the sugar, tomatoes, cannellini beans and stock and season, to taste, with salt and freshly ground black pepper.
- 6) Bring the mixture to the boil, then transfer the casserole to the oven for one hour, or until the sausages are cooked through and the pumpkin is tender.
- 7) To serve, ladle the casserole into two large bowls and sprinkle with the flat leaf parsley.

# Toffee apple muffins

These delicious muffins take no time to make and are perfect for baking with children

2 free-range eggs, lightly beaten
80g caster sugar
240ml milk
100g butter, melted
300g plain flour
2 tsp baking powder
½ tsp salt
pinch of cinnamon
2 eating apples, peeled, cored, finely chopped
200g/7oz shop-bought toffee pieces

- 1) Preheat the oven to 190C/380F/Gas 5 and line a 12-hole muffin tin with paper cases.
- 2) Mix the eggs, sugar, milk and melted butter in a large bowl. Sift the flour, baking powder, salt and cinnamon into the bowl. Stir well to combine.
- 3) Add the chopped apple and lightly mix.
- 4) Using half of the mixture, quarter-fill each of the muffin cases with the mixture and top with a few pieces of toffee. Cover with the remaining filling so the cases are half full.
- 5) Bake for 30-35 minutes until well risen and golden.
- 6) Transfer to a wire rack to cool. Serve warm or cold.

## Eerie eyeball pops

I found this recipe on the internet on the BBC Goodfood website and thought that it was a great idea for halloween and also easy to get the kids involved

100g/4oz Madeira cake 100g Oreo cookies A splash of milk 100g bar milk chocolate, melted 200g bar white chocolate, meltedYou will also need A few Smarties and icing pens, to decorate

10 wooden skewers ½ small pumpkin or butternut squash, de-seeded, to stand the eyes pops in.



- 1) Break the Madeira cake and cookies into the bowl of a food processor, pour in the melted milk chocolate and whizz to combine.
- 2) Tip the mixture into a bowl, then use your hands to roll into about 10 walnut-sized balls. Use a splash of milk to loosen the mixture a bit if needed, Push a skewer into each ball.
- 3) Chill for 2 hrs until really firm, then carefully spoon the white chocolate over the cake balls to completely cover.
- 4) Stand the cake pops in the pumpkin, then press a Smartie onto the surface while wet.
- 5) Chill again until the chocolate has set.
- 6) Before serving, using the icing pens, add a pupil to each Smartie and wiggly red veins to the eyeballs.




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
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
