Fill a stocking; warm a family

A simple Christmas gift for a friend can be a transformation in the lives of a family on the other side of Europe

.People from Port Isaac travel all over the world, but there's one community which has particularly benefited from its visitors from Cornwall. Michaela, Nicola, Andy, Barbara and Billy, Cheryl, Liz and Lisa have all made visits over the past two and a half years to the community of Fushe Kosove, just outside Kosovo's capital Prishtina. They've all supported the work of our charity, The Ideas Partnership (www.theideaspartnership.org or on Facebook 'Theideaspartner Ship') registering over 200 children for school and supporting with health, adult education and microfinance initiatives for women.

We first got involved in this community when we met one particular family. Hatemja and Agron live with their six children in just one room, measuring a few metres squared. They have no source of water inside - just a standpipe outside, and when it rains, the basic outhouse toilet they've constructed overflows. There are rats in the room they live in, and the children talk about having to kill the rats before they go to sleep, so they don't get bitten during the night.

The overcrowding of eight people living together in such conditions means that the children (aged 2 to 11) are playing dangerously close to the woodstove where cooking is done, and 5 year-old Ramadan recently pulled a pan of boiling water over himself and has had to have surgery for burns from groin to shin.

We've helped this family to get their kids to school, and now found them some temporary rented accommodation, but it's urgent that they move into decent permanent accommodation. An American charity, Mercy Corps, have said that they will build a new home for the family, if a piece of land could be bought. The land costs 2500 euro, and with the help of kind people from all over the world, including many from Port Isaac, we have raised 1000 euro so far. We need to raise the remaining money by February so that building can start and the family can move into a proper home - where the children can keep clean, free from illness and have space do their homework.

We've produced some gift certificates for people looking for a 'Good Gift' to buy for family or friends as a stocking filler or Christmas present. If you





Websites of the Month

With Christmas coming up – and it seems to come round faster every year – I wondered what to write about this year. I have covered green Xmas presents (for example local food from www.cornwallfoodanddrink.co.uk), the origins of the various festivals associated with this time of year (http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/ List_of_winter_festivals), so what for this year. The sound of a Salvation Army band playing Christmas Carols in Bridport high street has inspired me to explore the origins of these wonderful songs through the internet.

Singing as part of a festival, of course, has very ancient roots and some of the songs we sing at this time of year go back to times when people celebrated the Winter Solstice and the passing of the seasons. The Holly and the Ivy is a good example of such a song. Yule songs are described with their lyrics and some of the history on this website http://piereligion.org/yulesongs.html .

Another good website (http://tinyurl.com/kle6t) describes Wassailing - the tradition of going from door to door and sharing the contents of your Wassail bowl - you may know the words of the Wassailing song:



"Here we come a wassailing Among the leaves so green, Here we come a wandering So fair to be seen."

Apparently, according to the website, there is a West Country festival associated with Wassailing, called Wassailing Trees,

"It generally took place on Twelfth Night (January 5th), or sometimes on 17th January, known as Old Twelfth Night. Farmers and their families would feast on hot cakes and cider, then they would go into the orchard with more "supplies."

A cider-soaked cake is laid in the fork of a tree and then more cider is splashed on it. The men fire their guns into the tree and bang on pots and pans while the rest of the people bow their heads and sing the special "Wassail Song." This custom is said to ward off bad spirits from the orchard and encourages the good spirits to provide a bountiful crop for the following year."

Much more about the Cornish traditions can be found at www.christmas.oldcornwall.org/ Wassail.htm which are the Christmas web pages of the Federation of Old Cornish Societies. As well as lots of information, it lists the old songs, has the lyrics and also some recordings which you can play online.

Christmas Carols in the Christian tradition also go back many centuries and there are a host of websites which provide much information. A particular Cornish reference concerns the wonderful 'Nine Lessons and Carols". According to the BBC website (which makes it definitely true) it started on Christmas Eve in 1880 in Truro by Edward White Benson, the Bishop of Truro. As the Cathedral hadn't been built then, the service was held in a temporary wooden shack. Again according to the BBC website http:// news.bbc.co.uk/1/hi/entertainment/arts/



1703517.stm the 'humble' purpose of having the service at 10 pm was to keep the men out of the pubs on Christmas Eve.

If you wanted to have a free Christmas songs there are some good music streaming websites. One I found is http://jinglebelljukebox.com which plays continuous merry xmas songs - it is playing Nat King Cole as I write this.






The Last Chance Hotel Animal Rescue Charity

A grant of £200 was awarded to the Golden Circle Group and a grant of £120 was awarded to the Christmas Light group.

Members of the Council hope this goes some way to assisting both groups to continue their good work.

Please note applications should be in writing and if possible on the group's 'letter headed' paper (This may simply be created on any computer!). It should also be noted that a set of audited accounts may be requested in order to meet audit requirements. Please check with the Clerk for info and don't be put off asking for a grant!

Christmas Tree Festival

The Council is taking part in the Church Christmas Tree Festival this year. Cllrs Penny and Brogan have volunteered to 'dress' the tree and we wait with baited breath to see how they represent the work of the Parish Council!





1921-2013



He was doing duty as a wireless operator and Ida and Dorothy just happened to be riding their bicycles past his camp. Cyril saw Ida and said, "That's the girl I'm going to marry", and he did.

At the end of the war in 1946 they were married in Hampshire and came to live in Port Isaac, Cyril's home village. Subsequently Pauline was born in 1949 and Harvey followed in 1961. They lived in Hartland Road for 60 years and it was here she had two special friends, Arona and Josie, who shared many a laugh over coffee. Ida had a great sense of humour and loved a joke – just ask Joan about their days at the Cornish Café.

For a good many years Ida and Cyril attended the "Tuesday Fellowship" held sometimes in their home and led by Wesley Blake. Alf and Grace Hooper and Velma Knight were among many regulars who met together.

Ida was a founder member of the Port Isaac Singers, formed in 1969, under the leadership of Janet Townsend. These were some of the happiest days of her life, singing in Churches, Chapels and Music Festivals all over the country and in 1985 abroad at the Inter Celtic Music Festival in Lorient.

Ida's life was centred round her family, living for them and loving every family gettogether. She was so proud of her children Pauline and Harvey and their spouses





Colin and Sara, her grandchildren Richard, Sophie and Katie and more recently her dear great grandson Lowen.

Cyril died in 2009 and Ida missed him very much. However, she continued to live a fairly healthy life until the last few months when her health worsened. Throughout it all she always stayed cheerful, stoic and patient.

Of all the irritatingly catchy jingles on television, the one for that insurance price-comparison web-site is probably the most irritatingly catchy. I can't get it out of my head, but it sums up how I feel and, it seems, I am not alone. Her Majesty's Government is sending out very confused signals over both price and conservation of energy, and Her Loyal Opposition is just as bad. Prices will be frozen, or held (what's the difference?) for a period, but what price-hikes will happen just before or just after that period? — and are concessions to consumers on price merely transferred elsewhere as increases in general taxation? Are house insulation firms going to be put out of business by changes in policy? Isn't there an element of hypocrisy somewhere?

Of course, politicians are not the only ones guilty. For as long as I can remember, our family paid for electricity with a daily "Standing Charge" plus an amount for each "Unit" used, and the "Price per Unit" deceased as the number of Units increased. The "Standing Charge" was intended as a sort of rent for the mains supply installation to our property, and the decrease in unit-price took account of 'economies of scale'. All very logical. However, it does mean that those who use least pay a disproportionately high <u>overall</u> price per unit, and those who use most pay a disproportionately low price per unit. For large users there is little incentive to reduce consumption, while small users face Fuel Poverty (defined as "having to spend more than 10% of one's income to maintain a temperature of 21C in one room"). Where's the fairness in that?

We need to find some way of encouraging everyone to use less electricity, not more. This will become urgent when our generating capacity decreases as coal-fired power-stations become life-expired, unless they are replaced by climate-friendly sources of power. We may rejoice that views on our Heritage Coast and near the AONB have been safeguarded by rejection of another wind-turbine, but we may soon have to consider exactly which aspects of our present lifestyle we are prepared to give up, as energy prices inevitably increase, and climate-change becomes more and more obvious.

A more cheerful and positive approach to things was described at the recent Benson Lecture in Truro Cathedral, by Dr Ruth Valerio. She is Theology Director of 'A Rocha UK', and she was speaking about sustainable living. Ruth certainly didn't give us a list of 'DOs-&-DON'Ts', she suggested just six 'BEs': virtues we should cultivate, individually and collectively. The first virtue to be cultivated was Humility, knowing our place in Creation, the universe, and as just one species on our planet, not expecting everything to exist solely for our benefit.

Then came Frugality, living within our means, in the simplest way possible, with just what we need day-by-day, no great bulk-buys to get a low price (but risking pest-damage), really living in <u>today</u>, not in some hypothetical future. Obvious, especially from a climate-friendly point-of-view, but difficult when assailed by so much advertising...and at this time of year, too! The next was Generosity, and its counterpart, Thankfulness: if we have abundance (of personal gifts, of natural beauty in our Parish, or of relative wealth as a nation) we can afford to share it with others. The trick is to recognise what we actually have in abundance.

Ruth's fourth virtue was Justice, in all its forms, including fairness and equal sharing of resources. I hadn't realised that poverty is mentioned on almost every page of the Bible, proof that poverty of one sort or another has been around for a long time, and that redressing imbalance of access to necessities is essential. In Ruth's fifth place came Hope, and its necessary companion, Patience. Rome wasn't built in a day (no builder from North Cornwall was involved!), we need to be patient until changes we hope for finally happen. We will find solutions to our present problems, but probably in unexpected directions.

Underlying all the other virtues was Love, developing proper relationships with God, other people, and the land (including the air we breathe and, here in our coastal Parish, the sea). As we can now see, two hundred years of burning fossil fuels, pumping C02 into the atmosphere and the oceans, has damaged our relationship with our surroundings; in 2014 we'll have a chance to begin to repair that damage.

One suggestion for a Christmas present book: a paperback, "'L' is for Lifestyle" by Ruth Valerio (Inter-Varsity Press, 2008), lots of gentle good-sense.



Games played up to December 2rd 2013

Martin's Christmas Game Pie "well worth the effort"

One of the reasons I moved to Cornwall was to work with quality fresh fish, which I love, but since working at St Kew Inn I have found myself cooking more game dishes in the winter. Recently whilst reading old recipe books I came across this little gem - it reminded me of 4 and 20 black birds baked in a pie!

To make a Game Pie - The Art Of Cookery by Hannah Glasse, published 1740

"First make a good standing crust, let the wall and bottom be very thick; bone a turkey, a goose, a fowl, a partridge, and a pigeon, Season them all very well, take half an ounce of mace, half an ounce of nutmegs, a quarter of ah ounce of cloves, and half an ounce of black-pepper, all beat fine together, two large spoonfuls of salt, and then mix them together.

Open the fowls all down the back, and bone them; first the pigeon, then the partridge; cover them; then the fowls then the goose, and then the turkey, which must be large; season them all well first, and lay them in the crust, so as it, will look only like a whole turkey; then have a hare ready cased, and wiped with a clean cloth.

Cut it to pieces, that is, joint it; season it, and lay it as close as you can on one side; on the other side woodcocks, moor game, and what sort of wild-fowl you can get. Season them well, and lay them close; put at least four pounds of butter into the pie, then lay on your lid, which must be a very thick one, and let it be well baked.

It must have a very hot oven, and will rake at least four hours. This crust will take a bushel of flour. In this chapter you will see how to make it. These pies are often sent to London in a box, as presents; therefore, the walls must be well built."

The best way of getting all the pie filling ingredients is talking to a local butcher who also deals in 'game' meat. The more advance notice you can give to your butcher, the better quality meat they can source for you.

Christmas Game Pie Recipe

This is a large pie, hand raised and therefore it will take the better part of several hours to make. Try to have patience, and make sure the integrity of the pie pastry is strong enough to hold all of the meat. This might sound like a lot of work but your guests will never have eaten a pie as good looking, or as tasty, as this one.

For The Pastry **Making The Pastry:**

1.2kg (1200g) Plain White Flour (strong) 300ml Water

200g lard 200g butter 2 tsp Sea Salt

2 Egg yolks – beaten (to glaze the pie crust)

Sift the flour and salt into a bowl, making a well in the centre. Place the water, butter and lard into a saucepan, when the butter and lard has fully melted bring this just up to the boil for a minute or two. Once at the boil remove from the heat, then pour this hot mixture into the centre of the flour. Working very quickly mix with a wooden spoon to bring the flour, butter, lard and hot water into a smooth pastry dough.

Once cooler start to gently knead with your hands to produce a smooth dough which is starting to stiffen a little - add more flour if it is a little sticky and wet. At this stage bring it into a ball and cover the pastry in a bowl – leave to cool for 30 minutes. This hot-water crust pastry must be used whilst still at room-temperature, otherwise it will become brittle and too hard to mould.

For the Sauce and Spices

2 tsp ground sea salt 2 tsp ground black pepper 1/2 tsp ground mace 1/2 tsp ground nutmeg 1/4 tsp ground cloves 250g butter 200g shredded suet 300ml white wine

Preparing The 'Sauce' and Spices

In a saucepan melt the butter over a low, gentle heat.

Once the butter has melted, tip in the shredded suet and stir for a minute, then turn off the heat.

Pour in the white wine, stir.

Then stir in the ground seasoning and spices.

Leave to cool.

For the Meat Filling

2 turkey breasts (skinned) 2 turkey thighs (boned and skinned) 2 goose breasts (skinned) 2 goose thighs (boned and skinned) 2 chicken breasts (skinned) 2 chicken thighs (boned and skinned) 2 pheasant breasts (skinned)

> 2 partridge breasts (skinned) 2 rabbits (boned and skinned)

Preparing The Meat

Dice all the meat up into similar sized 'large' pieces.

Place the diced meat into a very large mixing bowl and mix together.

Pour over the butter and white wine sauce and coat all the meat with it. Leave covered.

Making the Pie

There is a balance to hand-raising a pie crust - the more you work the pastry, the cooler and stiffer it becomes, so you need to work quickly, but the harder the pastry gets the easier it is to shape. Keep the part of the pastry not being worked on covered to prevent it cooling and hardening before use. Care must be taken during the shaping of the pie so that cracks do not appear in the pastry through which the liquid from the pie filling can escape.

So, to finish your pie ...

Divide the pastry into 5 pieces -

- 1. The largest piece needs to make the pie walls (12cm wide by 120cm long and 1cm thick it is perhaps easier to make 2 x 12cm wide by 60 cm long and 1 cm thick and 'fuse' the two halves of the walls together)
- 2. A piece to make the pie base (40cm round, 1cm thick)
- 3. A piece to make the pie crust (40cm round, 1cm thick)
- 4. A piece to make a 'Rope' (a thin sausage shape 120cm long)
- 5. The smallest piece (and offcuts) to make pastry shapes to decorate the pie

Grease a large flat baking tray (over 50cm long and 50 cm wide). Place a similar size of baking parchment (50 cm x 50 cm) on it and grease this too.

On a floured work surface roll out a piece of pastry so that it is at least 1 cm thick and that you can cut a perfect circle, 40cm wide out of it. Place this circle of pastry (the pie base) on the greased baking parchment on the oven baking tray. Then brush some water around the outer edges of the base where the walls will join -3cm in from the edge.

On a floured work surface roll out a piece of pastry so that it is 1 cm thick and that you can cut a perfect rectangle out which is 12 cm wide and 60 cm long . You will need two of these shapes to fit together to make the walls to go around the pie base – or make one shape which is 12 cm wide by 120 cm long.

Before fitting the pastry walls to the pie base roll out a thinnish sausage shape of pastry which is 120 cm long – this will help fuse the pastry walls of the pie to the base.

Place the pastry walls standing up on the pastry base, but not right to the very edge of the base, leave a 3cm gap on the outside of the base. If you are using too shorter lengths for the walls overlap where they join and 'fuse' them together using a little water. Brush a little water on the bottom of the pie walls – all the way around – both on the outside and on the inside. Once this is done put the long (120cm) sausage or rope shape pastry piece on the inside of the pie, right up against where the walls of the pie meet the base.

Using both hands, one on the inside, and one on the outside of the pie, merge the pie base with the walls.

This entails pulling up the 3cm 'overhang' on the outside of the walls and pressing it into the bottom of the walls, whilst simultaneously pushing in the pasty rope on the inside of the pie, with your fingers, into both the base and walls where they meet – in effect this is 'sandwiching' the walls between the pulled up 'overhang' on the outside and the pasty 'rope' on the inside, helping them stand up and fusing them into the base. What you are making is a very strong base where the walls meet and allowing no liquid from the pie filling to escape.

Take your time, this might be fiddly at first, but it will come good in the end, with a little bit of patience. Go round the base of the pie a few times, slowly, fusing the walls and base together. Go around the whole base of the pie fusing the base with the walls until it is strong and the walls are standing up straight and are firmly fixed to the base.

When you are happy with the strength and integrity of the pie pastry and the shape carefully spoon into the pie the meat filling and tip over any remaining liquid from the mixing bowl.

On a floured surface roll out a piece of pastry so that it is at least 1 cm thick and that you can cut a perfect circle, 40cm wide out of it. This is the pie crust. Place it on the pie, covering the filling, and using a little water brushed on fuse the pie walls with the pie crust, crimping the edges with your fingers and thumbs. When the lid is on and sealed the pie is far more stable and you can then use your hands to go around the pie making a much more round shape etc. cleaning the look of the pie up. Use any left over pastry to roll out and cut shapes (such as leaves and seasonal shapes) to decorate the outside of the pie. Finally egg wash the outside and the top of the pie case with the beaten egg yolk. Leave for the pie for ten minutes.

Fold in half a long sheet of baking parchment so that it becomes a double thickness, wrap this around the pie tightly so the pie is helped to stand up straight. Use three pieces of string to tie the baking parchment around the pie tight to help keep its shape when baking. Bake the pie in the oven at 150C for three hours. Serve warm, or more usually cold. Allow to cool once taken from the oven and when cold keep it covered in the fridge.

So all that remains is for me to say tis hank you to all of you that come and support us at St Kew Inn, and to wish you all a Happy Christmas and here's to 2014.
