It may not match actually living in the village, but at least our exile is slightly less lonely.



Websites of the month lost pets and online help

If you have ever kept a pet animal you will know how difficult it can be when they go missing. I was reminded of this when recently contacted about a missing pet cat and thought about what was available online. Also, a recent experience of finding a home for another cat made me think a bit of online exploration would be in order. So, starting with some statistics about pets. A website I found with some useful information is the Pet Food Manufacturers Association which, of course, needs to know how many pets we have, so they can work out how much food to produce. In the Southwest the figures show that about a quarter of households have dogs, a similar number have cats, fish are next followed by rabbits http://www.pfma.org.uk/regional-petpopulation-2013/. In Cornwall, of course, many of the dogs are working dogs, rather than pets, and the survey does not cover other animals people might keep either as stock in farms or on smallholdings. But there are a lot of dogs and cats living with us, and so there is a good chance some might decide to go walkabout, or just get lost. There are some statistics on stray dogs for example, which are collected by the Dogs Trust (see their website www.dogstrust.org.uk). They commission this study every year by contacting all the local councils. You can download the 2013 survey from their website. Between 1997 and 2008 the numbers dropped year on year from a peak of 136 thousand or so across the UK to 97 thousand; still a lot. The numbers then shot up reaching another peak in 2011 of 126 thousand and have started falling again since. This recent peak corresponds with the financial crash, and is an indication of the numbers of animals that don't just go walkabout, or get lost, but are actively abandoned. The information on stray cats and feral cats is less systemmatically collected, but the Cornwall Cats Protection League estimate that there are 9 million stray cats and one and a half million feral cats in the UK (http:// www.cats.org.uk/trurodistrict/feral-cats-page).

So when your pet goes missing, it is in this context that the organisations which are there to help have to work. A bit like missing persons I suppose but on a much bigger scale (http://missingpersons.police.uk/en/pressroom/statistics). The RSPCA has some useful advice on their website (http://www.rspca.org.uk/allaboutanimals/helpandadvice/straycats) on how best to find help with missing animals and they recommend using an organisation called Pets Located (http://www.petslocated.com). To register your lost pet, you pay a one off fee of £12.00 which is valid for a year. It has clever technology which is able to match found pets details with the registered lost pets details.

Another similar organisation is the National Pets Register (www.nationalpetregister.org) and is, as far as I could tell, free of charge. This works in a similar way and matches lost and found pets. Finally a site that is just for dogs is called, rather charmingly Fido Finder http://www.fidofinder.com/find-your-lost-dog.php and this one covers not only the UK but the USA and Canada. It

gives some really simple ideas for what to do if you dog goes missing, and while it is probably unlikely that the first thing you would do if your dog was missing was to look up how to search for it, the instructions can help in advance if your dog does disappear.

The other side of losing an animal is finding one, and then working out what to do. I have been reading about the Last Chance Hotel (http://thelastchancehotel.co.uk) charity in the papers as we have a local initiative here in Port Isaac (http://tinyurl.com/o9lsnkf). The Last Chance Hotel, as the name implies, is for those dogs who no one else would have. I think most people would agree that the way dogs are treated and managed is the key to how they behave. They rather touchingly have this as their mission:

"We are a home for unhomeable animals, who for one reason or another, rescue kennels cannot rehome (illness, age or temperament). But if they feel the animal really needs that one last chance, they will give us a call. Some will stay with us permanently, some are rehabilitated to go on to more experienced homes. That's what we do...'

I thought I would finish up on a conservation note. I am just reading a book (I am reading it electronically, so if fits in this column!) called The Sixth Extinction by Elizabeth Kolbert (read a review here http://tinyurl.com/q8paaxt) which tells the tale of how plants and animals have come and gone over the past millions of years that life has existed on earth. And it also tells the story of what has been happening to plants and animals in recent times. The rate at which they are dying out now is extraordinary, and one of the key reasons for this is, of course, us. The connection with dogs and cats and other pets, is that we have, sometimes unwittingly, sometimes on purpose, introduced species into places where they, like us, have been very successful, at the expense of the local creatures and plants. Apparently there were organisations whose purpose was to get plants and animals, particularly from Europe, and get them to grow in places we colonised. These groups were called Acclimatisation Societies and you can read about them here http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/ Acclimatisation_society. And another similar effect happens with escaped pets, as with the feral parrots which have established themselves in London and the Home Counties (www.nlpr.org.uk/ education/feral).

Going back to my initial reason for this column this month, I do still think if you lose or find a pet that what counts most is who you know rather than what you know. If you have contacts with people who you trust and who can recommend a good home that is usually the best way to go. Also getting people locally to keep their eyes and ears open if your pet goes missing is likely to get a good result. In these situations, the web is at least a good backup.



LENT FAST APPROACHING

As I write this Lent is on the horizon. Easter is so late this year, on April 20, that Lent, which occupies the 40 or so days before Easter, does not start until March 5.

Christians, like those of other faiths, have long prepared for feasts by fasting. Before the great feast of Easter a long period of fasting was traditionally practised. This has led us to think in terms of "giving something up" for Lent.

In our consumer culture we do not necessarily save our feasting for great occasions – we buy



But however we feel about fasting we cannot hope to enjoy the festival of Easter properly unless we prepare for it. There are various ways of doing this which can be profitable both to ourselves and others. Taking the time to be with others, whether at a "Lent lunch" or a Lent course like those being run at Endellion on Fridays in Lent (starting on March 14 at 12 noon), or just going to call on a perhaps lonely neighbour is always good. Making the decision to read the Bible or one of the many good Lent books: the Archbishop of Canterbury's recommendation this year is Graham Tomlin's *Looking through the Cross*. Just putting a short time aside each day to consider how life is going - some of us do this together in church every day at morning and evening prayer and all are always welcome to join in.

In whatever way you choose have a holy and profitable Lent!

*** 'Rescueman' aka David Castle

The first thing I would say about David would be that he was one of the kindest people one could wish to meet and to know. Many and various were the deeds and thoughts which he was always ready to bring into his daily life; selfish he was not.

When I first met David he was working as a traveller selling telephone answering machines - long before the days of mobile phones. Despite the many miles he covered every day arouind the West Country, he always insisted on returning every evening to his home and family here in Port Isaac. He loved his wife Kathleen, and his family, so much that he named his boat after them all; she was the

and he used that vessel for many years, catching many stones of mackerel with which to supplement his income.

It was while David was travelling around on his job that CB Radio was first introduced, and ever one for the latest ideas in telecommunications and technology, he soon gave himself a 'handle' - RESCUEMAN was on the road. Avery apt name as by that time he was heavily involved in the RNLI and the Coastguard service.

When the first Inshore Rescue Boat came to Port Isaac in 1967, David was one of the first cew members, and later three of his sons were to join him. Later still he was to become Chairman of the Branch Committee, Honorary Secretary of the Station and finally President of our Branch. But he and Kathleen did so much more - they were the most active of all in fundraising and organising and putting our small station 'on

the map'. David seemed to know everybody from the Director downwards and he never forgot a name or an event - indeed, he seemed to 'breathe' the RNLI.

When he retired with Kathleen to live in the Canary Islands he still watched out for every launch of our boat. His computer was permanently on the RNLI channel and latterly, when maroons were no longer used to call out the crew, he would surprise me in my home so close to the Station with a phone call, "Why has the boat gone out?" "I don't know, David. Ring me back in ten minutes and I'll go to find out!" This occurred on numerous occasions.

During his long association with Port Isaac Lifeboat, David organised and oversaw numerous events - naming ceremonies, Royal visits, AGMs, Inspections, visits by Directors and Planners, and the transfer from the original 'Boathouse' in the Fish Cellars to its present location. For all of this he can really be seen as the driving force in the life of our RNLI Station and Branch. He really was 'Rescueman'.

And what was his email address? Why, of course, it had to be rescuemandavid@yahoo.co.uk Sadly now offline. RIP.

Church Hill

Members of the Council heard further reports of damage to a property caused by vehicles attempting to use this route to access the village. Work is still awaited to install advisory signs and width restrictions at the top which it is hoped will alleviate the situation.

Public Toilets

Members of the Parish Council are to meet with Officers of Cornwall Council to discuss arrangements regarding the

provision of Public Toilets in Port Isaac. It is the intention to keep the toilets open but costs and refurbishment as well as responsibility must be agreed.

Code of Conduct

Arrangements have been made for Members of the Council to undertake Code of Conduct training w/c 20 February. Members from other parishes will also be attending this group training session which will explain the responsibility of Members in conducting themselves professionally whilst undertaking Council business.

Port Isaac Leat

Members heard concerns that this leat is blocked and may cause problems in the current weather situation. The Environment Agency has been contacted and hopefully this potential problem with be attended to without delay.

Playing Field

Following reports from the Inspector confirming the swings had come to the end of their useful life, the Finance Committee are obtaining quotes to replace them and the safety surface from funds made available in the next financial year (begins 1 April). Quotes should be available at the Council meeting on 10 March and it is hoped agreement can be reached to enable an order to be placed.

Slate Quay

Photographs taken twelve years ago of the Quay and compared to those taken recently confirm that no damage has been incurred despite the storms particularly over the past few weeks. However the security panel preventing access has been washed away and will be replaced shortly.

Grants

Sowpys Dorry

This Sowpys Dorry (Onion and Almond Soup with Toast) comes from the medieval manuscript 'The Forme of Cury' written in 1390 A.D. It makes full use of olive oil to flavour the dish "oyl d'olyf", which comes with toast – like a fore-runner to a more modern French onion soup.

"Nym onyons and mynce hem smale and fry hem n oyl d'olyf Nym wyn and boyle yt wyth the onyouns roste wyte bred and do yt in dischis and god Almande mylk also and do ther'above and serve yt forthe."

Serves 2: 500g finely chopped onions
3 tablespoons olive oil
600 ml white wine
100ml almond milk (see below)
3 tablespoons ground almonds
4 slices of bread (toasted)
a little extra olive oil
Almond Milk
300ml milk
100ml single (light) cream
60g ground almonds
1/4 tsp bitter almond essence
2 tbsp orgeat syrup

Making the almond milk: simmer all the ingredients together in a saucepan for 15 minutes on a low heat. Allow to cool, strain through a fine meshed sieve (pushing all the milk out with the back of a spoon).

In a saucepan heat the olive oil and fry off the sliced onions on a low heat until tender and golden (but not browned). Add the wine and almond milk. Add salt and pepper to season. Simmer for 30 minutes

Mix the ground almonds with a little olive oil and almond milk until a paste is formed. Toast the slices of bread with olive oil drizzled over them. Spread the ground almonds on the toast.

Pour the soup into 2 shallow heat-proof bowls, add two slices of toast to each bowl. Place the bowls under a hot grill – toast the ground almonds until golden and serve.

Lange Wortes de Pesoun

This pea soup has green beans and onions added, 'Lange Wortes de Pesoun' comes from the medieval manuscript 'Harleian Manuscript 279' written in 1430 A.D. During the Middle Ages dried peas became a staple food and in their dried form peas could be stored throughout the winter months. They were inexpensive and plentiful, and made a wholesome meal that the poor could afford.

"Take grene pesyn, an washe hem clene an caste hem on a potte, an boyle hem tyl bey breste, an banne take hem vppe of be potte, an put hem with brothe yn a-nober potte, and lete hem kele; ban draw hem borw a straynowre in-to a fayre potte, an ban take oynonys, and screde hem in to or bre, an take hole wortys and boyle hem in fayre water: and take hem vppe, an ley hem on a fayre bord, an cytte on .iij. or iiij., an ley hem to be oynonys in be potte, to be drawyd pesyn; an let hem boyle tyl bey ben tendyr; an banne tak fayre oyle and frye hem, or ellys sum fresche brobe of sum maner fresche fysshe, an caste ber-to, an Safron, an salt a quantyte, and serue it forth."



In a saucepan put the dried green peas with the water and a little salt. Bring up to the boil and cook on a gentle simmer for 1 1/2 hours (90 minutes) partially cover the pan with a lid. After 90 minutes drain most of the water out, leave about a third. Add the vegetable stock (broth) and a few saffron strands. Put on a very gentle heat as you prepare the onions and green beans (string beans).

Clean, top and tail, and strip the tough 'string' on the backs of the string beans – boil them in a little salted water for a few minutes until tender. Refresh under the cold tap so stop them cooking.

In a frying pan with a little olive oil fry the fine sliced onions until tender and golden. As the onions are frying chop the string beans into pieces and add to fry alongside the onions for the last few minutes. With a slotted spoon, spoon them out of the frying pan, draining off the oil. Add them to the pea broth. Taste and season with salt and pepper. Cook until everything is tender on a gentle simmer and serve.

Please try these recipes, they do work, and take heart that according to the Met Office, winter ends on the last day of February? Roll on in Spring. Enjoy Mx



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
