



WEBSITES OF THE MONTH

As we have recently had the elections for members of the European parliament, I thought I would devote this month's column for websites about the European Union and its relationship with Cornwall. I have become more interested in this area since my work has involved me in some European projects. Meeting people from all over Europe has perhaps given me a new perspective.

So to begin at the beginning, the history of the European Union is found on <u>http://europa.eu/about-eu/index_en.htm</u> and decribes how it all started after World War 2 with the idea of an economic trade area, which was eventually formed in 1958 – the European Economic Community – between six nations Belgium, Germany, France, Italy, Luxembourg and the Netherlands. The UK joined in 1973 and a really nice timeline with much more detail can be found on the BBC website <u>http://news.bbc.co.uk/1/</u> <u>hi/world/europe/3583801.stm</u> which also includes the results of the recent elections. You can see from this timeline that there is a steady movement towards more and more integration, something that many people find unacceptable and worrying. Others see it as a good thing, as it may make conflict less likely.

As Cornwall has agriculture, fishing and tourism as major industries, our relationship with the EU has been through these areas. Agriculture and fishing are two very contentious of policy – too complicated for a short article, but for the reform of Common Agricultural Policy, a simple account can be found on http://www.bbc.co.uk/news/world-europe-11216061 which also provides information about the amount of money we get back for farming subsidies. The reforms are being implemented now and details are on http://tinyurl.com/przx47h. There are two 'pillars' - direct payments to farmers, and grants for rural development.

The Common Fisheries policy <u>http://tinyurl.com/bnw79g</u>! has also been undergoing change. Again this has been the subject of much debate and involves large amounts of money. As it says on the website:

> "The current CFP has made it difficult for fishermen to run their businesses successfully, and has resulted in overfishing of EU fish stocks and damage to the marine environment. In the UK, the inshore fleet - fishing boats mostly under 10 metres in length which operate in coastal waters - has faced particular difficulties."

As with agriculture, this is being worked on and the different changes are being gradually implemented.

Some websites which give information about how Cornwall has been involved with the EU next.

Lets start with the Cornish Pasty

www.cornishpastyassociation.co.uk which since 2011 has had PGI status granted by the EU – protected geographical Indication. If you look at their FAQ section it explains all about it.

"A genuine Cornish pasty has a distinctive 'D' shape and is crimped on one side. The filling for the pasty is made up of uncooked minced or roughly cut chunks of beef (not less than 12.5%), swede, potato and onion with a light seasoning. The pastry casing is golden in colour, savoury, glazed with milk or egg and robust enough to retain its shape throughout the cooking and cooling process without splitting or cracking. The whole pasty is slow-baked to ensure that flavours from the raw ingredients are maximised. No artificial flavourings or additives must be used. And, perhaps most importantly, it must be made

in Cornwall."

Cornwall has also had money coming in and details of the various programmes and amounts are on the Cornwall Council website <u>http://www.cornwall.gov.uk/europe</u>. To take a few of the projects:

• Cornwall Air Ambulance Trust - <u>http://tinyurl.com/</u> <u>ntc7crk</u> winners of the Best Third Sector Business Received £949,760 in ERDF Convergence support for a new hangar and office space at the Newquay Enterprise Zone.

- Watergate Bay Hotel <u>http://tinyurl.com/nr3mayc</u> winners of the Best Digital Marketing award Received £107,305 through ERDF Convergence to install two combined heat and power units to help reduce their carbon footprint.
- Superfast Broadband <u>http://tinyurl.com/n9m2abl</u> represents the single largest and most transformational investment that the ERDF Convergence programme has made.

So whether you are in favour of the EU or want to see the back of it there have been substantial effects on Cornwall from being a member. *Tony Wainwright*

These students from Bristol University visit Cornwall each year for a short tour and it is always a delight to hear their


young fresh unaccompanied voices in St Endellion sing a wide variety of music ranging from madrigals to early music to jazz arrangements.



Before we put this copy of *Trio* in the bin. we need to think about waste, and what we do with it. Paper is easy, it goes in the blue container which we put out every fortnight for recycling. Cardboard (red container), plastic bottles and metal cans (orange container) go for recycling in the same way, as long as they are out by 7.00am. The large black box takes glass (but not broken or window-glass. Pvrex and other oven-proof glass), and is usually stuffed with the empty containers afterwards to stop them blowing away. It's a good scheme, pioneered by NCDC, our late-lamented District Council, but taken on and developed by Cornwall Council.

What is much more of a problem is domestic food-waste, waste from holidayhomes put out on the wrong day, and commercial waste such as packaging, and food waste from our cafés and restaurants. Not everyone has the space for a compost-bin, so we did investigate having a communal composting area, but there were too many difficulties. An anaerobic digester on one of our farms would make sense, producing gas (to burn and make electricity) and a solid



residue which could be used as a soil-conditioner. However, there are difficulties in working on a sufficiently large scale to be commercially viable while not clogging up our lanes with lorries bringing in the raw material. We hope these will, eventually, be overcome.

A new group called 'Untrashed Cornwall' is just being set up down west, supported by Transition Falmouth, looking at the particular problems we have in Cornwall in dealing with waste. They have organised two showings of the film "Trashed", fronted by Jeremy Irons, which poses lots of questions and may suggest some answers. They are on: *Friday 6th June, 7.00pm in the Chapter House, Truro Cathedral, and Thursday 19th June, 7.30pm in the Royal Cornwall Polytechnic, Church Street, Falmouth.*

An admission charge will be made to defray costs. The film is well worth seeing.

A big problem with recycling is separating different materials, particularly all those types of plastic, with their names, numbers and abbreviations. Polypropylene is obviously PP, while PET is polyethyleneterephthalate (phew!) and, of course, PTFE is polytetrafluoroethylene (show-off!) but not everybody has the space to keep them separate. The main thing is to **REDUCE** our use of things as much as possible, **RE-USE** as many things as we can, RECYCLE those things we can't re-use, and only send to landfill the very few things left.

Get your walking shoes on...

The weather has suddenly changed for the better, and my thoughts turned to using our footpath network again. A good one if it stays dry is from Port Gaverne to Pendoggett and back. There's a pub at each end, and you should allow an hour-and-a-half each way.

It starts along the South side of the valley (the right hand side, as you stand with your back to the sea), initially Footpath (FP) no 2 in Robin Penna's book (available from Secrets, Port Isaac). It goes through two stiles, continuing along the valley as FP no 4 when FP no 2 goes off Right up the steps towards Trewetha. After some three stiles, and some confusing animal paths, you come to a shallow stream crossing (very muddy if it's been wet!), which you cross and bear Right, now on FP no 6. You soon come to a stile over a stone wall and a small stream, which is the Parish boundary. Once across this, strike up the hill on St Kew Parish FP no13, to a gate in the corner. Through this, you cross the field to meet a hedge on your left, following it briefly. Some way along this is a gap, through which a waymarked 'permissive path' takes you round the edge of a field (avoiding a former farmhouse) and into a lane leading to the Cornish Arms at Pendoggett.

Walk 250 metres (300 yards) west along the main B3314 road, then turn Left (South) along a lane, following it over a crossroads, past Lane Park and Lark's Mead, for about 1 km (about 1/2mile). Over a gate on the Right (North) you take St

Kew Parish FP no 12 down across a field to a gate. Once over this you climb a lane to a summit, then down again into the yard of Treharrock Farm which, it being a dairy farm, is often muddy. Straight through a couple of gates you take a sunken lane which curves uphill to an open field (electric fence). Follow the Lefthand side until you meet the B3314, which you cross to a stone stile (care!). [This detour has saved you a dangerous and unpleasant half-mile along the main road.]

Take our Parish FP no14 diagonally across to a stile (projecting stones in the hedge), then towards a gate, and finally down the next field, keeping to the Right of all the farm buildings (Poltreworgey Farm), to a stile in the hedge surrounded by trees. Go over the stile in the fence directly in front and turn Left. Go down the field to a stile (with electric fence), hedge (care! big drop!) and another stile. Cross the field (recently cut for silage) to climb up just to the left of the embankment hiding the tennis-court, and come out on the B3267 at the entrance to Trigg Court.

Follow the Right hand verge (freshly mown!) of the road for 150 yards/metres, over a stile on the Right, and follow FP no 7 down the Left side of the field for 150 yards/metres. Go over the stile on your Left on to FP no 8, climbing diagonally towards a stile (not initially visible) in the far left corner. Over the stile turn Right along the B3267 (care!) towards the hamlet of Trewetha, from which you can find your way back to Port Gaverne via FP no 2, which begins on the Right just after the second bend in the road, and the steps which you saw soon after you started this walk.

I hope the weather keeps fine. Happy walking! Robert Manders

Elderflower Champagne

It is fitting that this Trio is published on June 1st. Despite the very early appearance of this year's blossoms, I always consider the first day of summer to be the start of the season for elderflowers. The blossoms normally continue until the middle of July, gradually becoming harder to find as they transform themselves into that other hedgerow treat – the elderberry.

The elder is a roadside tree rather than a denizen of the hedgerow. Farmers will often grub out an elder from the hedge as its brittle stem and lack of spines make it a poor choice for stock-proofing. However, the elder is also an opportunist and will colonize any disturbed corner of ground, both out of town and in. Elderflowers are easily harvested and yet they still seem to be a seriously under-used resource.

Elderflower Champagne

20 elderflower heads (this is more than in most recipes, so reduce if you find elderflowers a little overpowering)



900g sugar 150ml white grape juice concentrate 3 lemons, washed Champagne yeast (follow the instructions on the packet) Yeast nutrient (follow the instructions on the packet) 4.5 litres of boiled water cooled to room temperature



Elderflowers - You only need the florets themselves (too much stalk can add an unwanted bitterness to the brew). Remove the florets with a fork. "Forking off" as we call it.

Put the florets in a sterilised bucket and thoroughly mix in the sugar. Leave for about three hours to extract the flavour. Add the water and stir until the sugar has dissolved. Add the grape concentrate, yeast and yeast nutrient. Halve and squeeze the lemons, then throw in the peel as well. Stir.

Cover the bucket and leave for up to a week, stirring occasionally for the first three or four days. Siphon into a sterilised demi-john and add a bubble-trap. The liquor will still be sweet and has quite a bit of fermenting to go. The bubbles in the trap will appear at about one per second. This will slow down after one or two weeks and this is the time to test your brew with your "hydrometer". This measures the specific gravity of the liquor, which in turn gives a good indication of the amount of sugar remaining. To do this, remove the bubble-trap and carefully drop in a sterilised hydrometer. It should read "1010". If not, then replace the trap and leave your brew a bit longer.

Sparkling elderflower wine has been the source of much joy but also much pain; it suffers more than most wines from the calamities that can befall the wine-maker. Chief among these, and certainly the most dangerous, is exploding bottles. This is caused by bottling before the speed of fermentation has slowed to a sufficiently sedate pace.

Once the magic number "1010" has been achieved, siphon off into champagne-style bottles, fit new corks (plastic "corks" are the easiest) and a little wire cage to prevent accidents. If you can't be bothered with this level of authenticity just use plastic fizzy drinks bottles

Leave for several weeks to allow the fermentation to add fizz to the wine. A sediment will form at the bottom of the bottles. This is normal and commercial producers of sparkling wines go to great and complex lengths to remove it. At home it is easiest to cool the bottle in the fridge then decant carefully into a chilled jug just before serving.

PS - I would recommend using Milton to sterilise the plastic bottles beforehand as it would be a shame to see all your hard work go to waste!



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


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
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
