New Waste Charges

The Council will be introducing a charge for certain waste streams that are deposited at the HWRC sites by the public. The charges will take effect from Monday 1 September 2014. The waste we will be charging for and the respective charges are:

- Soil / rubble (including bricks, blocks, tiles, rubble, paving slabs, concrete posts, sanitary ware, toilets, etc) - £1.75 per sack
- Plasterboard (including gypsum related products) £4.40 per sheet
- Asbestos bonded type only £10.10 per sheet
- Tyres commercial and agricultural vehicle types will not be accepted. There will be no charge for bicycle tyres. - £3.20 per tyre.





STAMP COLLECTION DONATED TO RNLI

Over 50 years ago RN Medical Officer Petty Officer Arthur Chadwick encouraged his young daughter. Barbara Ruby, to combine with him in starting a Stamp Collection. They both worked diligently, slowly building a fine collection painstakingly mounted in albums starting from one Arthur had obtained whilst serving in the Royal Navy in the 1940s. During that time he saw action, first on board the Heavy Cruiser HMS Frobisher serving in the 4th Cruiser Squadron, later in support of the D Day Landings on Sword Beach where it is recorded she fired five rounds per minute of her 7.5 inch hand loaded guns scoring direct hits on the major German Grand Bunker. Later Arthur served on board the Ch Class Destroyer, HMS Chaplet, ending his naval career ashore at RN Naval Base Portsmouth. To his original collection he added further stamps from his extensive

travels and Barbara also added to the mix. Later some very interesting First Day covers joined this unique collection. However, as time passed and Barbara found other interests, the stamp collection was stored safely away where it has remained these past decades.

Throughout his life Arthur was always a great supporter of the RNLI. In fact when he passed away in 2001 his family made special arrangements for his Ashes to be cast on the sea from an ex-lifeboat at Scarborough. Following on from this traditional family link with the sea, Barbara Ruby, who now lives at Delabole, has decided to further celebrate her Father's memory by donating this fine Stamp Collection to Port Isaac RNLI.

We are honoured to be entrusted with this collection and hope to raise some worthwhile funds for Port Isaac RNLI in memory of

Planning Applications considered by Parish Council

PA14/03014. Khandala. 7 Roscarrock Hill, Port Isaac.

To strip and re slate roof and slate hanging to rear elevation. Take down and re build brick chimneys and renew lead work. Replace all windows with like for like hardwood sash windows, replace existing roof windows on rear sloping roof. Carry out general refurbishment of brick quoins and arches and repoint stonework, minor general works and renewing services as found necessary. *Council supported this application.*

PA14/03869. Little Tremiro, Trefreock, Port Isaac. Construction of extension and subterranean garage. *Council supported this application.*

PA14/03286. Trefreock Barn (Cobbles Cottage) Port Isaac. Construction of single storey extension to rear of property consisting of a garden room and a utility room. *Council supported this application.*

PA14/04145. Co-operative Retail Services Ltd, 31 New Road, Port Isaac. Erection of single storey extension. *Council supported this application.* **PA14/04549.** This application was later withdrawn by the applicant.

Planning Decisions Received

Dan Rogerson writes ...

People often contact me with problems about the out-of-hours doctors service currently run by Serco. The service has been controversial since the last Labour government handed it to a private company, and over the past few years I have been campaigning for extra weekend medical clinics and an out-of-hours GP services where people have been having problems accessing out of hours medical care.

I was pleased to hear that local NHS chiefs, under new powers given to them by the Coalition Government, have decided against simply giving a new company control of out-of-hours services when Serco's contract ends on May 31st 2015.

NHS Kernow's decision to take 12 months to re-design the service is a very welcome one, and is an opportunity for us to make sure that we get the new out of hours service right. Residents in our area, particularly in rural communities in north Cornwall must have the same access to a decent out-of-hours doctors service as everyone else.

I am campaigning to crack down on nuisance calls. Not only are the likes of unwanted marketing calls, silent and abandoned calls, spam texts and recorded messages pestering people day in and day out, but for vulnerable residents they can be a menace that put people at risk of scams and fraud just as much as a crook or a pushy salesman turning up at their door.

So I want to hear from people who are suffering from nuisance calls so I can make sure the Government's Nuisance Calls Task Force know how much of a problem this is for people in our area and to see what I can do to help. If you have been having problems with nuisance calls please let me know about it by filling out my quick survey online at http://bit.do/nuisancecalls.

I have also been raising local people's concerns about bus services in and out of Port Isaac with Western Greyhound and Cornwall Council, and to try and protect and improve bus services. In July the Government announced a £48.9 million 'Growth Deal' investment for Cornwall, to help boost businesses, skills in the local labour market, help infrastructure projects and improve public transport.

As part of the package, there will be a review of the existing Cornish bus network to identify and progress improvements. It is right that public transport improvements are a part of this economic growth strategy - North Cornwall is already poorly served by bus routes and we don't have access to local rail services either, which is why I will be working to make sure that we seize the opportunity of a new 'Bus and Integrated Transport Strategy' for Cornwall to try to protect and expand the bus network in north and east Cornwall.

Every summer I spend the time visiting villages and parish in the North Cornwall constituency to knock on doors and listen to concerns, so that I can raise the issues that matter to people when I speak up for us in Westminster. My MP's summer tour is a tradition that was started by my predecessors John Pardoe and Paul Tyler and I am looking forward to coming to Port Isaac, Port Gaverne, Trelights and the surrounding communities soon to speak with people and see if there is anything I can help with.

I wonder how many of our summer visitors, on their way to or from Doc Martin's Surgery [aka Fern Cottage, Roscarrock Hill], have found any of our internal village footpaths, lanes, alleys, opes, snickets, ginnels, jowlers (or whatever the local name is for such short-cuts). As the village has grown haphazardly over centuries, there are now about twenty, long or short, steep or flat, broad or narrow, tarmac or concrete, earth or rock, fenced, hedged or walled pathways to be found. At one time or another I have used the following (and you may know many others):

Margaret's Lane (Trewetha Lane to Rose Hill) and its diversion *via* Mount Pleasant

Meadowstile Lane (Trewetha Lane to Rose Hill)

Back Lane (Rose Hill to Middle Street) and its connection to Dolphin Street

Shuggy's Ope (Rose Hill to Fore Street)

Bottom of Rose Hill (to Fore Street)

Golden Lion Passage (Fore Street to The Platt)

Temple Bar, aka Squeezy Belly Alley, (Fore Street to Dolphin Street)

The short-cut behind The Slipway (Middle Street to Roscarrock Hill)

The short-cut in front of Leat Cottage, formerly Mark Provis' shop, (Middle Street to Roscarrock Hill)

Doctor's Meadow - Doctor who? (Hicks' Corner to Trewetha Lane)

The alley beside the Co-op (New Road to Tintagel Terrace)

The other alley parallel to this (New Road to Tintagel Terrace)

The steps below Garfield House (The Terrace to Port Gaverne Hill)

The path at the end of The Terrace (The Terrace to "garage access") and its continuation ("garage access" to Tintagel Terrace)

There are also the obvious South West Coast Path (Fore Street to New Road Car Park) and its link (Fore Street corner above the Fish-&-Chip shop to Coast Path), sections of a national walking route.

Many of the above will be of interest to visitors looking at a Historic Fishing Village (as our road-sign proclaims), as well as to Doc Martin fans. Others are of interest only to residents of particular areas, like the Hartland Road "back-gardens complex" and the short-cuts linking Mayfield with Silvershell and the main road, probably nameless so far.

If you know other paths, or names (or different names) for any of the paths mentioned, <u>please</u> let me know, possibly *via Trio*, so we can keep our maps up-to-date.

Letter to Trio

Bob Monk copied Trio with a letter he has sent to the Parish Council outlining his ideas for the "use of available funds for the benefit of all persons living in the Parish Council area, not just the elderly or the young, or the sportsmen or the church users or the business people or the church hall fund or the visitors BUT EVERYONE WHO LIVES HERE".

He writes:

We all use two items, water and electricity (I did think up a scheme to build a hydroelectric scheme dam across the valley which would have provided both water and power as well as sailing, canoeing and fresh water fishing but I don't think those living in the valley would be pleased to see their houses under water, plus we would have to move the sewage works – not as far-fetched as it may appear; it is done in North America, Scotland, Canada and the rest of the world by villages and towns, but too difficult here.)

This led me to my next idea which was reinforced when I received an email form the Cornwall Energy Fund offering funds to help support groups with their community-led renewable energy projects. I did start to tell my idea to a member of the Parish Council who dismissed it in a very few words, "It's an area of outstanding natural beauty."

My idea is to build one large power generating windmill – the same size as the ones at Delabole (and there are hundreds if these all over the county) – that would supply enough electricity for approximately 1950 homes for 333 days per year and to have the windmill in an area which, by no stretch of the imagination, could be called an 'area of outstanding natural beauty'. An area with a view of 28 existing electric poles, a small housing estate, some 24-odd signs of various sizes including one threatening visitors with fines for missparking, a rather misleading sign giving directions to "The Village", another misleading sign saying there are no signs, paper signs saying what was on in the village two weeks ago. Plus a sign saying "Main Car Park" – to my mind it is not the main car park but an overflow car park. Back to my idea, which is to put the one windmill just below the new car park. We are all different, some hate modern windmills but I like them and think they rate alongside E-type Jaguars, Concorde, Hunter aircraft and Clipper ships for grace and beauty. Definitely a lot more attractive than old heaps of flapping sacking and bits of wood that appear in old Dutch masterpieces as windmills!


Why not get one windmill with help from the energy fund and from the Doc Martin fund and the car park and have FREE ELECTRICITY FOR ALL RESIDENTS?

Could lobster farming become a new industry for Coastal areas?

The Technology Strategy Board (TSB) have teamed up with Biotechnology and Biological Sciences Research Council (BBSRC) to joint fund an industry and academic partnership which aims to develop a novel approach to sea based rearing systems for the European Lobster. *Lobster Grower* is a 15 month project Consortium driven project led by the National Lobster Hatchery at Padstow. The project aims to develop the technology required to grow lobsters at sea in containers. This will help the partners to assess the potential for aquaculture of the species, which could have great long term benefits to coastal communities around the UK.

Dom Boothroyd, general manager of the National Lobster Hatchery believes: 'This project is a huge step forward for the charity, it will generate technology that will enable us to grow juvenile lobsters to a greater age before releasing them into the sea to enhance local stocks, whilst at the same time providing them with environmental enrichment so that they are better able to cope with life in the wild. Secondly it will generate the intellectual property within the charity that we hope will generate funds in the future for our ongoing conservation, education and research work. Long term it could facilitate the development of a lobster farming industry that would not compete with the existing market (which is fed by the fishery) but actually generate market diversification as we have seen with the development of the Bass aquaculture industry. This will also create jobs and wealth in our small coastal communities'.

Websites of the Month

This time of year it is a real delight to spend time in our beautiful countryside and one of the best ways to do this is walking the footpaths. So this month I thought a look at websites and apps that can enhance our enjoyment. I have divided them into two groups: One is to provide information on the Countryside Code, the other are apps and websites for walking and rambling. So the Countryside Code first. Natural England is the home of the Countryside Code and you can read it and download it here http://www.naturalengland.org.uk/ourwork/enjoying/countrysidecode/. The important thing about this Code is that it applies to everyone – those who use the paths for rambling, those whose land it crosses, and those responsible for their upkeep.

For those using the footpaths it says:

Respect other people

- Consider the local community and other people enjoying the outdoors
- Leave gates and property as you find them and follow paths unless wider access is available

Protect the natural environment

- Leave no trace of your visit and take your litter home
- Keep dogs under effective control
- Plan ahead and be prepared
- Follow advice and local signs

It has this advice for land managers:

Most people who visit the countryside are keen to act responsibly and problems are normally due to a lack of understanding. There are a number of ways you can help them to realise their responsibilities:







- Keeping paths clear and waymarks and signs in good order and up to date will help people stick to the right routes and access points. Contact your local authority or National Park Authority to find out what help is available.
- Where there is public access through a boundary feature, such as a fence or hedge, create a gap if you can or use an accessible gate or, if absolutely necessary, a stile. When installing completely new gates and stiles, make sure you have the permission of the local authority.
- Encourage people to respect your wishes by giving clear, polite guidance where it's needed. For example, telling visitors about your land management work helps them to avoid getting in your way.

It is worth downloading a copy as it has good simple advice.

A couple of good websites to look at for ideas are Walking World http://www.walkingworld.com/ which has a free sample of walks and over 6000 for an annual subscription of £18. The second one that is completely free is called Walking England and is a sort of 'portal' for walks in all English counties and http://www.walkingincornwall.info/index.php is the one for Cornwall. The clever thing about this site is that it collects together links to other sites where there are walks listed that are free to download. For example the AA have a walk on their site for Port Isaac and you can link to it from the Walking England site. There are lots of other Cornwall walks listed.

What has really developed recently are apps for smartphones which use the latest GPS technology linked to maps that you can download. This allows you to know where you are and to see the map as well. It can show you the direction you are waking in as well. The real value with some of them is that you can see the footpaths marked and even if a field has become overgrown, or for some other reason has been made less passable than it should be, you can see where it goes and navigate with confidence.

The basic principle is the same and these three apps are good. None are free.

Routebuddy atlas http://www.routebuddy.com/atlas has downloads for all the standard maps and organises them for you. Once downloaded you can select the one you want, at the resolution you need and you are up and walking!

http://www.viewranger.com/en-gb also has various different maps available and, like the others, shows the direction you are walking in. It also links up with the Walking World website and allows you to download the walks you have selected so you can have them on your phone. As it says on the Walking World website:

"Software from ViewRanger for Symbian, Android and iPhone allows you to view your position and plotted routes on your mobile phone. In all cases the app is completely free and you can view the walks on a range of 'open' mapping and aerial imagery. It's a great way to access and follow your Walkingworld walks. Walkingworld subscribers can download walks direct to their phone for no extra cost."

With the app that works with UK map http://ukmapapp.com/ you can download a detailed map, but it doesn't show the footpaths in as much detail as routebuddy or viewranger.

I have to admit that I have only been using these apps for a short while, and they have some features that look very helpful, but I haven't quite worked out how to use them. I just need more practice!

Martin loves Mackerel

I love Mackerel not only because they are the only fish I ever seem to be able to catch at the moment but also for their versatility. This recipe is from Raymond Blanc and involves pickling the mackerel first and then grilling to get a nice crisp skin. If the weather stays like this you could also pickle the fish and then BBQ skin side down.

Grilled mackerel with soy lime dressing

For the mackerel

250ml/9fl oz cider vinegar, or white wine vinegar 250ml/9fl oz water

40g/1½oz caster sugar 35g/1¼oz red onion, finely sliced ½ tsp whole pink peppercorns

3-4 lemon slices

2 whole mackerel, filleted, pin bones removed 1 tbsp oil

For the soy and lime dressing

1 tbsp soy sauce 1 tbsp water 1 lime, juice only

1 tsp fresh root ginger, peeled, finely diced ½ tsp dark muscovado sugar

For the fennel salad

1 fennel bulb, finely sliced on a mandolin, slices soaked in ice-cold water for 20 minutes, drained

1 tbsp olive oil
½ lime, juice only
1 bunch rocket leaves
2 pinches sea salt
1 pinch cayenne pepper
1 orange segmented

METHOD

- 1. For the mackerel, heat the cider vinegar, water, coriander stalks, caster sugar, red onion, peppercorns and lemon slices in a medium saucepan over a medium heat. Heat the mixture until just warm(about 60C), then remove from the heat. Transfer the contents of the pan to a flat, shallow container and set aside to cool.
- 2. When the mixture has cooled, place the mackerel fillets into the container, flesh-side down. Set aside

and marinate for 20 minutes.

- 3. For the soy and lime dressing, combine all the dressing ingredients in a small pan and gently heat through until the sugar has dissolved. Set to one side.
- 4. Preheat the grill to its highest setting.
- 5. When the mackerel fillets have marinated, remove them from the marinade and pat dry with kitchen paper. Make several diagonal scores in the skin, going across the length of each fillet to stop them from curling up during cooking.
- 6. Brush a baking tray all over with oil. Arrange the mackerel fillets onto the greased tray, skin-sides facing upwards. Place under the grill and cook for 4-5 minutes, or until the skin is crisp and the flesh is cooked through.
- 7. For the salad, combine all the salad ingredients in a large bowl.
- 8. To serve, divide the fennel salad equally among four serving plates. Place a grilled mackerel fillet on top of each portion. Spoon the salad dressing around the edge of the plate.

So have a good silly season, and keep calm and remember, they are on holiday! Mx
