Parish Council report

supplied to Trio by the Parish Clerk

Phew! What a lovely summer and autumn we have had. It has been a really good growing season. Runner beans galore, sweet peas in abundance, the sweetest sweetcorn ever, raspberries, strawberries, blackberries and apples, have all 'cropped' well. As have the visitors! It must have been a really good year for our tourist industry. I have driven all over Devon and Cornwall, from Plymouth to Penzance. 10,220 miles clocked up since April, and have had to add between 15 and 30 minutes onto every journey to get to the destination on time.

Port Isaac was quite a challenge but I 'cracked' that one! I have been driving in about 7am, done what I had to do, and away again before 8am. Bingo! No visitors.

Council business has gone along at its usual snail's pace! Decisions get made at Town or Parish level, but then a higher authority has to be involved and that is when the 'wheels fall off'. You send an e-mail, no reply, so you send it again. Still no reply, so you telephone the person concerned. They are 'in a meeting' or away on leave until the sun stops shining. They will ring you back, but they don't so you e-mail them...and so on. Eventually, months later, a person does make contact, but by now you have forgotten what it was you wanted them for!

But some things do get done. The shiny new swings are in place, the old ones removed. The Neighbourhood Plan is becoming a reality with all of you being invited to attend public events, see what a NP is all about, have your say about what concerns you, your family and friends. Before too long now a comprehensive questionnaire will be produced, this is when your Parish Council really needs you. We will want to know your views, your ideas, your vision of the future for Port Isaac, St Endellion, Trelights, Ports Gaverne and Port Quin. Your input will be vital to the success of the Neighbourhood Plan.

Planning Applications have slowed up a bit during the summer, but the following applications were considered at the September meeting:

PA14/06777. Conversion of roof space to form additional accommodation. 52, Fore Street, Port Isaac. Council supported this application. It has since been approved by Cornwall Council.

PA14/07251. Listed building consent for the proposed repair and enlargement of porch on south elevation. Leat House, 9, Middle Street, Port Isaac. Council supported this application.

The following decisions had been received from Cornwall Council: PA14/05021/05022. 68, High Street, Port Isaac, PA14/05298. 4, Cliffside, Port Isaac, PA14/05695. 7, Lundy Road, Port Isaac, PA14/06132. 87, Fore Street, Port Isaac and PA14/05885. Trevathan Farm, St Endellion have all been given approval. PA14/06082. 11, New Road, Port Isaac has been withdrawn.

Let's hope that October and November will be a bit quieter so we can gather our energies for the mayhem that the Christmas season brings. Oh, all those Christmas dinners, all that shopping, putting up the decorations, baking, wrapping, cleaning the house from top to bottom before the visitors arrive.

I was talking to a young woman in Port Isaac last week who said she had all but four of her presents bought and most of her cards written! Now that's what I call being organised, and optimistic that all her friends will still be friends by Christmas, and that by Christmas she will be able to find the presents she has 'squirreled' away... and be able to remember who she bought them for!

Many people came to enjoy the BBQ on the beach afterwards.



Maurice Brown and the Bencoolen Manuscript

It was my privilege to attend the 150th Anniversary Commemoration of the wreck of the 'Bencoolen' in Bude. With the kind co-operation of Billy and Barbara, I was able to take along the ship's bell, which was rung to mark the start and end of the service. This was attend by HM Coastguard, Coastwatch, Lifeguards, surfers, the police, swimming club members, civic dignitaries and members of the public together with the singing group 'Bencoolen Wreckers'. Following the service there was a procession to the Churchyard for a wreath-laying ceremony when a red rose was placed on the memorial for each sailor drowned in the tragedy.

On a recent visit to Port Isaac I was accosted and challenged, "What had it got to do with you?" My answer was short (and not very sweet), "Everything."

In 1947 I was taught to ring the bell by Miss Hills and rang it every Sunday thereafter till I left for National Service in 1952. Some work was carried out at the forge in Trelights on the clapper in the late 1940s and I carried the bell back through Coppin's fields to the Chapel where it was later rehung in a new belfry. It was only at that time that I learned the story of the bell and realised how few people knew its history.

In the 1950s I was lodging at the family home of Mr Geoffrey Francis, the then Heraldic artist to HM the Queen. He worked closely with Mr Don Abbott who was responsible for illuminated manuscripts. Realising that the centenary of the wreck was fast approaching I commissioned and financed the project for the manuscript, supplying the script and photos, so that it could be placed in the Chapel for visitors and locals alike to read. I admit to being disappointed to find that it had been placed in a heavy oak frame (which was not the idea) and attached to a wall in a dark corner of the Chapel where it could hardly be seen to be read.

Having been a Trustee of the Chapel for over 60 years I was less than happy not to have been informed of the sale of the Chapel and its contents. Not knowing what the fate of the building might be, I would (rightly or wrongly) have removed the manuscript before the sale. It was a great relief therefore to learn of Billy and Barbara's plans and I am more than happy for the manuscript to be in their custody. However, I hope that whatever happens in the future, the Bell and the Manuscript will always remain together as part of Port Isaac's heritage.

My thanks to Billy and Barbara for their interest and custodianship of the Chapel of behalf of the community.

All crew, as part of their competency based training, are assessed on this subject area so it was decided to put Rafa through the same test.

Helmsman Del Allerton-Baldwin conducted the test one evening at the boathouse and by happy coincidence two district trainers/ assessors from RNLI headquarters at Poole were on hand to witness Rafa's performance.

Early questions were fairly straightforward for young Rafa but Del had to get a little technical in order to fully test his knowledge. Digging deep Del asked, "What's the maximum fuel capacity of the two fuel bladders on board the 'D' class Lifeboat?" Bouncing around the boat, "Fifteen gallons", declared Rafa to everyone's surprise. All present agreed some crew wouldn't have got that question right!

Fair to say our youngest prospective crewmember performed extremely well making his Mum and Andy proud by scoring forty-five out of a possible



The collect or prayer for the week in which I write speaks of God's greater readiness to hear our prayers than is our will to pray and His greater willingness to give than is ours to ask. We must learn to trust Him more. In the end it is our personal participation in bringing about the kingdom of God upon earth which matters most. And as John reminded us in his last words at his leaving service in St Minver, there is no Interregnum in the Kingdom of Heaven.

Websites of the month - Broadband

The world of broadband has become increasingly complicated over the years, with now many different companies providing the ISP or Internet Service Provider function with a wide variety of deals. Working out which one to pick is not easy and I won't be able to provide any advice on that in this column. I thought it would be helpful to describe some of my experience in trying to get my broadband speed increased, as it may be useful to others, and on the way show some hopefully useful websites. Apologies as I'm afraid this column will be rather technical this month. For those of us who are going to be left out of the high-speed internet age, perhaps we could do with organising a campaign of some sort.



The starting point for this could be Superfast Cornwall http://www.superfastcornwall.org and here you will find details of where this is currently available. It is a really fast technology and is funded by a combination of the European Union and UK government. It is about 60 times as fast as a typical broadband service and means that the usual things you might use your internet connection for are much easier. You can find out where and when it is available on one of the links in the above website and for Port Isaac it reports coverage of 72%. I was pretty excited about this when it first was announced, as my speed is slow and I was told by my ISP that I would be getting it! However it kept getting delayed and I got a whiff of the problem when I found a BT Openreach engineer having his lunch and he kindly checked our exchange cabinet. It turned out that this was one of the cabinets that would not be included – not enough subscribers he said. It is possible now to tell if you are in this situation by going to the home page of Superfast Cornwall and there is a place to put your phone number. If you enter it, it will tell you if and when you can get it. When I put my phone number in I get this message: "Your area is one of those that is expected to make up the 5% (13,000 premises) that will remain beyond the fibre footprint. " – meaning you are out of luck chum.

I was not happy about this and got on to the Superfast people who were very helpful and suggested some alternatives. If my speed was below 2 Mbps (megabits per second download speed) there is a subsidy you can get for a satellite approach http://www.superfastcornwall.org/how-to-get-it/satellite but my speed was just above that so I don't qualify.

So how can you measure your speed? The way BT recommend is to use their BT Wholesale speedchecker http://www.speedtest.btwholesale.com . This is a bit complicated to set up but if you can do it you will get an accurate measurement of your speed. Another speedchecker that is very useful and quite reliable is Ookla http://www.speedtest.net . The information you get is the 'ping' speed – how long it takes one bit of information to get to your nearest internet link place – usually for us Bristol), your download speed and your upload speed. You can also get a smartphone version from http://www.speedtest.net/mobile/ .

To continue with my story, as I write this, my current ping is 67 thousands of a second and my download speed was 0.22 and my upload speed was 0.34. My line should give me a download speed of 8.0. So you can see it is over 30 times slower than it should be. It has been like this for two weeks. Over the past few years that I have had broadband it has hovered between 2.5 and 3.0 but a month or so ago, a really nice engineer came round and fitted a box over my phone socket called a BT Openreach MK2 faceplate filter. The speed went up to 7 Mbps. It was like an early Christmas present and stayed up for the next two weeks or so. This proved to me that the explanations I had in the past, that I was too far from the exchange, couldn't be true. So it was disappointing when it dropped to the very low speeds I have had. Despite the fact that the speed went up so dramatically, I have been told it wasn't the box on the wall that did it but some other unknown change.

I am with BT and I thought it would be useful to conclude with some information about who talks to you when you ring up. Of course it will be different for other providers. I have managed to find out a bit although I am still very unclear about it and it may not be completely right. There are level one and level two teams who take you through the wholesale speed test above. They also do their own tests. If you start with level one and it doesn't get resolved, they say they have escalated it to level two. If level two can't sort it, you may be referred to the priority care team. I think they are based in Lincoln, at least that's what one person told me. They gave me a phone number with a pin number to go with it and you seem to get to speak to a person sooner.

My experience has been of long conversations, much testing of the lines, and nothing sorted out. But patience is a virtue as they say. It is currently being dealt with by the 'Diagnostics' team. I asked the person from the Priority Care



Team what the difference was between that team and the people who come and fix the exchange, but I couldn't really work out what it was. There is a website about it though, https://www.btwholesale.com/pages/static/Support/FAQs/Fault_Diagnostics/index.htm which gives you some information. I think whoever is your ISP, they will probably use the same approaches.


As my speed remains very slow all this is work in progress

As I write, the UN Climate Change Summit 2014 meeting has just taken place in New York, in preparation for the big Conference next year in Paris, and I tried to remember what Climate Change Conferences there had been. I had dim memories of Rio, Kyoto, Cancun, Copenhagen and others, but what exactly, and when, were they?

They all started in 1992 with the UN Conference on Environment and Development, held in Rio de Janeiro. This was concerned with world problems including transport and emissions of "greenhouse gases", and potential scarcity of water. It led to a "Declaration on the Environment and Development", "Agenda 21" (looking towards the 21st Century), and "Forest Principles" (for sustainable forestry). At that time worldwide emissions of CO₂ into the atmosphere amounted to about 28billion tons per year.

Many of the agreements proposed were not realised owing to the problems of poverty, and cleaning up the environment. However, local "Agenda 21 Forums" were set up, including one covering the former District of North Cornwall; this met regularly, but eventually ceased to function a couple of years or so ago.

A series of annual UN Conferences on Climate Change started in 1995, in Berlin, when worldwide emissions of CO₂ amounted to 32billion tons per year. Two years later in Kyoto (Japan), in 1997, a Protocol was proposed to "establish legally-binding obligations for developed countries to reduce their greenhouse gas emissions". This was accepted by many, including the President of the USA (but not agreed by Congress, and completely rejected in 2001 by President Bush). Conferences continued in major cities in every continent, e.g. The Hague (2000), New Delhi (2002, when CO₂ emissions were 34billion tons per year), Buenos Aires (1998, 2004), Nairobi (2006) and Copenhagen (2009).

The 2010 Conference in Cancun (Mexico) recognised "that climate change represents an urgent and potentially irreversible threat to human societies and to the planet..." The next year, in Durban (South Africa), it was proposed that "a legally-binding deal comprising all countries, which will be prepared by 2015, and to take effect in 2020..." should be agreed.

As a follow-up to the original one in Rio (1992), a Conference on Sustainable Development was held in 2012, called "Rio+20", while this year's Conference on Climate Change will be in Lima (Peru) in December; CO₂ emissions now amount to 40billion tons per year. Next year's Conference will be the one mentioned earlier, in Paris.

The really disheartening thing is that no action ever seems to be agreed by everyone, there's always some country that wants to hold back, and deadlines retreat ever further into the future. China's CO₂ emissions will peak "as soon as possible", the USA has discovered Shale Gas, a new fossil fuel to be exploited to the maximum — and we will allow "fracking" to supply our needs into the foreseeable future; and so it goes on! But, we must not give up!

Some years ago, I was asked to represent ecumenical (mainly Anglican and Methodist) church interests on the North Cornwall Agenda 21 Forum, and there I eventually made the acquaintance of a member of the group (mainly Friends of the Earth) who were about to start up the St Endellion Climate Friendly Parish project. Penny and I have been involved with the project ever since, which is why I find myself writing articles for *Trio*. Next time, we'll find a nice gentle walk for November.
