



Websites of the month - Broadband continued ...

My column last month told the story of my efforts at getting something done about the very poor speed I was getting on broadband - which was downloading at about 0.2 Mbps (megabits per second) and should have been around 6.5 - this month is part II.

This stage of proceedings started when I was looking around online a couple of Sunday's ago to see if I could find anything about the structure of the BT company as I wasn't sure I had it right in my last column and I came across a report on the This is Money website that showed Mr John Petter, the chief executive of BT Consumer (the bit of BT that provides my broadband in the same way that Talk-Talk and other Internet Service Providers would) receiving the application of the worst customer service http://tinyurl.com/of93vog. He looked like a nice chap in the photo and I got to thinking it would be a good idea to send him a letter telling him what had been happening. So I looked around some more and found a website http://www.ceoemail.com/ that lists the email addresses of chief executives and John Petter's was there. The website is free unless you are using it for commercial purposes and as I wasn't it seemed OK to use the email and send him a letter.

In my letter I explained what had been going on and how I had tried over months, and in fact years, to get a reasonable speed. How I had spoken to a great many BT people, tested my speed using my laptop connected to my router by a cable lots of times and so on. I also asked about the cabinet that serves Trewetha - cabinet 83 – and whether it would ever get upgraded to Superfast.

You will understand my surprise when I received a very nice reply in less than ten minutes saying:

"I know Port Isaac well - it is a lovely place. I am so sorry broadband is compromising your enjoyment of it. I will ask our senior team to investigate and expedite matters. I understand how frustrating this must be. Please accept my personal apologies."

This was a very pleasant surprise, although I am beginning to worry about whether John gets any time off.

Anyhow, the senior team were impressive. Stephen from Newcastle Technical Complaints became my case manager and quickly got up to speed (if you will pardon the pun). Another contact that John linked me up with was Ranulf, who is in charge of superfast in Cornwall. He got in touch to find out what was happening about our cabinet. As it turns out Ranulf himself won't be able to get superfast, as he lives outside Falmouth and his cabinet is not on the list. In our case, from what Ranulf has passed on, we have 122 people linked to our cabinet, but some are so far from the exchange they won't get any significant speed benefit. You can read here http://tinyurl.com/d43zdpb about this. As you can see if people are more than 3 Km from the cabinet their speed drops below 10. There are no publically available maps as far as I know for how far the subscribers are from the cabinet, so unless someone can find this information, we have to take it on trust. Ranulf lists the reasons as follows:

"(1) too many people are too far from the cabinet and so would not see a significant speed increase, (2) that the existing broadband speeds are relatively good and (3) that the costs to enable this cabinet are quite high. Taken together it's therefore not one that we will enable this time."

I suppose the next thing that happened was that I started being in touch with other people in Port Isaac and Trewetha who were also having problems. In Trewetha it finally transpired that 11 of us were in the same boat having the MSO (major service outage) and also for slow speeds. The fact that the senior team were on the job resulted in many calls from people in BT locally, who are in charge of the exchange and reinforced the impression that there could be a lot done to improve the organisation of this system. It is not customer friendly. There is a really good website and book on service design thinking http://thisisservicedesignthinking.com and perhaps BT could have a look at this approach. What we as customers need is a seamless system that gets faults sorted, rather than the clunky, disorganised and not joined up approach BT has. I realise this is partly a consequence of the market arrangements, but something must be possible as some providers clearly have better customer service than BT.

So, with other people involved, and getting information from different sources, it transpired that the slow speed was nothing to do with my distance from the exchange as one of my BT contacts told me what this was and could never have accounted for the slow speed. Why did they tell me that was the cause? The reason for the slow speed was – wait for it – a congested virtual path in the backhaul network – now why didn't I think of that? So what needed to be done was for an extra bit of capacity to be installed in the exchange. It is a bit like running out of memory on your hard drive and needing a bigger one. This is not easy stuff to understand but if you want to try there is a wiki about it http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Asynchronous_Transfer_Mode . I did ask BT if they knew any good websites, but they didn't.

So my speed is now up to around 6.5 again. I raised the issue with Stephen about the engineer who paid me a visit in November 2013, made no improvement in my speed and charged me £130. Initially his response, after looking into it, was that as it was over 120 days ago it couldn't be refunded.

So I thought another letter to John Petter was in order, so on another Sunday, I sent a follow up, and got another equally nice reply. He agreed that not being refunded was odd, and confirmed that the superfast issue was out of his hands. In short order, and perhaps unconnected with his reply, Stephen got back to me to say he had discussed the repayment for the engineer with his manager and as I had complained about the speed then, they would refund it.

So to sum up, over some years I have not had the speed I should have and been advised by BT that it is either my equipment, or the distance from the exchange. I have been told, albeit reluctantly, that my £130 will be refunded. It has taken up a very large amount of time and has been a lot of bother at times (even though I have met a lot of nice BT people, and learned quite a lot on the way). I have found all the BT staff I have spoken to and had emails with very professional and helpful. They are all doing a difficult job. I just think it needs some reorganisation.

The Doc Martin Fund

It is now well over 12 months since an agreement between the local community of Port Isaac and Buffalo Films instigated the setting up of The Doc Martin Fund. This agreement said that the fund should be "to advance projects that enhance and benefit the wider community, particularly for the very young or the very old". Though it may seem that not too much has happened between then and now, there have been a number of necessary and important developments that have led us to the point now where we can begin to decide what projects and initiatives we should support.

- 1. A Trust Deed has been drawn up, in consultation with solicitors and the Charity Commission, which provides a framework for the trustees of the fund to work within/refer to when faced with making decisions about the fair dispersal of funds.
- 2. In addition to the two original trustees, Janet Townsend and Jon Cleave, additional trustees Andy Cameron, Marion Larkin, Damien Bolton, Sue Fairs and Richard Hambly have been co-opted to ensure a wide balance of interest, opinions, age-groups and skills.
- 3. The trustees have taken advice from a reputable and experienced body as to the mechanics of a fair and open dispersal of grant funds, based on a proven, accepted and widely used system of assessment.
- 4. The fund now stands in excess of £35k
- 5. The trustees are representatives of the community and it is important that the community is party to all decisions as to the use of the fund. So that the community can be up-to-date with developments, a website will be established to which the community can have access. The trustees also want to create a database of all those members of the community who have access to email. Not everyone, of course, has access to email and it is intended to keep everyone appraised of developments by regular updates in *Trio*. Those not on email will always be welcome to contact the trustees personally or by letter.

It would help, therefore, if everybody who does have access to email lets the trustees have their email address – all households will have had a letter with a form to include this information but if you have not received this letter then copies are available from the Boathouse Stores (the old Post Office).

There will be an Open General Meeting for all interested parties in the Church Rooms at 7.30pm on Thursday November 6th. It is the intention that groups/organisations in the Port Isaac community should make initial representations in order that they may be considered for support from the fund.

These groups/organisations should be properly formed, with constitutions clearly stating their aims and objectives. They should specify any projects, large or small, for which funds are required. These can be completed on the form that was included with the letters sent out to all the community, but again, if you haven't received one, get a copy from the Boathouse Stores. The cut-off date for receipt of these applications is October 31st but *Trio* has been told that late applications will be accepted.

This is an exciting project that, in this time of recession, will enable our community to benefit from the impact of Doc Martin; a chance to enhance local projects and organisations which have for too long been neglected.



As I write this, a well-respected scientist has reminded us of the effects of increased atmospheric CO2 on the oceans. Oceans absorb CO2 readily. forming carbonic acid, a weak acid. This causes problems for the vast number of sea-creatures with shells made of calcium carbonate, the same stuff as chalk and limestone. Fortunately the sheer volume of the oceans means that atmospheric CO2 does not build up as quickly as one might expect, knowing how much goes into the air from burning coal, gas and petroleum. However, it is well-established that atmospheric temperatures are rising. Water has a very much greater capacity for heat than air so, as atmospheric temperatures rise, the temperature of the oceans will also, but more slowly. As ocean temperatures rise, the solubility of gases like CO2 and oxygen falls, and the buffering effect of the oceans disappears. Therefore we cannot expect the present apparent slackening in global warming to continue. It is also worth remembering, as our fishermen know well, that warm seas are dead, it's cold nutrient-rich seas that are full of life, with an abundance to be harvested.

This month's walk is fairly straightforward, an updated version of Walk 5 in Robin Penna's "15 Walks in the Parish", and should take about two hours. Leave The Platt by walking SSE a short way up Church Hill. After the last cottage on the left, take the valley path (F.P.no.35), also on the left. Along the path, through a gate, past Jon's Lake, a metal gate and the Water Treatment Plant, and another gate to the former Port Isaac Mill. The metalled track between the house and the holiday accommodation leads to a wicket-gate, left. The path drops down, left, along the old mill-race to the former mill-pool, now silted-up. Ignoring the small slate footbridge, left, site of the sluice that controlled the water from the pool, carry straight on (now F.P.no.36) along the right hand side of the pool to a stile, just beyond F.P.no.40 dropping down from Homer Park, right.

Follow the path to the right of a gate, up into a large sloping field. Bear left along the lower edge, then through a wooded are with a high bank, right, and former orchard, left. You emerge into Fuzzy Parc, a large sloping field, with the remains of a fallen tree on the left. Around here you may find a displaced roadside "Public Footpath" sign, pointing left towards a dilapidated footbridge over the stream, which you cross. Turn right and follow the lower edge of the fields, keeping near the stream. Through two gaps and their barriers, into a large field and up to the gate in the opposite corner, you then pass along a lane, often extremely muddy, into Tresungers farmyard. The right-of-way ends here, so it is polite to ask permission to walk through if you see anyone in the yard.

Turn left and go to the top end; out of the yard turn right and, keeping about thirty metres from the wall, right, straight (F.P.no.17) over the hilltop to a gate. Through this, turn right, to the corner of the field, then left and down the steep hillside to the bottom, keeping close to the hedge, right. Over the stile there is no footbridge or stepping-stones, just a muddy crossing and steep cow-trodden bank opposite, and a further stile. Climb diagonally left up the fields, making for a gate onto the main road, B3267, just to the right of Bodannon farmhouse, and the hamlet of Trewetha.

Turn left along the road about 100 metres to the bend, a Decision Point. You can follow the track left here, past Archer Farm and Twelve Acres, soon becoming F.P.no.35 and dropping down into Port Isaac valley. Over a stile and bridge over the stream, turning right beside the former mill-pool, left, and ,finally over the small slate footbridge mentioned earlier, there turning right to join the valley path back to the village, and sources of refreshment.

The alternative is to follow the road a further 100 metres, crossing over to a stile (to the left of Trewetha Farmhouse) and F.P.no.2, which leads over three stiles to the top of about 120 steps down into Port Gaverne valley. At the bottom follow the path left, eventually between former "fish palaces" and past a lime-kiln, left, to the harbour at Port Gaverne. You can either find refreshment here, or return by roadside path, the bottom tier of the Car Park and the Coast Path (F.P.no.1), to Port Isaac harbour, where you started.

Let's hope the weather keeps reasonable, happy walking!

Remembering Zofia - 'Babcia'

On September 1st a funeral was held in St Peter's Church for a very remarkable lady, Zofia Fry. Zofia was a character in Port Isaac, sharp to the point of abrasiveness, but of great integrity. Her accent revealed at once her Polish origins, and it was ironic that her funeral was 75 years, almost to the day, after the invasion of Poland by the Nazis. She rarely talked about her past, but the funeral eulogy by her grandsons was a revelation of Zofia's life. The horror and sadness that she had overcome is astonishing, which is why it is shared with you, with the family's permission.

Born in the palace of a 15th century Polish King in Krakow, Zofia Sekowski was the eldest child of Henryk and Janina Sekowski, sister of her beloved Tadeusz, and mother of Piotrus, Tadeusz, Andzrej and Teresa. As a young woman, she lost her father, her mother and her brother in the atrocity of the 1939-45 war, in unimaginably horrifying circumstances that could only be understood by those who suffered in a similar way. Her father survived Buchenwald and Auschwitz, but was killed by a Russian firing squad for being a member of the Polish underground resistance. Her mother died in Auschwitz in 1944, and her brother, having survived Auschwitz, was gravely ill and died after the Nazi retreat.

So, at the age of 22, Zofia had to rebuild her life, now without those whom she loved. With the end of the war, Poland became a part of the communist Soviet Union, having been moved from one oppressive dictatorship to another. Poland was not a good place to be if your family was connected with an underground movement that fought against both Nazis and Russians. One has to remember that Germany was divided, and that it was highly dangerous to attempt to leave East Germany. Somehow, she managed to cross a war-torn Europe working as a translator for the Allies, then on to the UK in 1946.

She met and married Stanislav Liguz, a Polish war hero, and they settled in Sutton Coldfield. The marriage was not happy as they both struggled with the turmoil of coming to terms with what had happened to them in the war years. It was a very hard marriage for Zofia in many different ways, and it ended very badly. The second part of her time at Sutton Coldfield was a happier and active time. From her flat in Mason Close she certainly threw herself into work and many different activities. She became the hub of many social events for family and friends, and it was there that she made some of her closest and dearest friends. Over the years she kept frequent and regular contact with them. She often said that she could not see herself moving from her flat or the area. Things were just too good.

Then she met Gordon Fry and everything changed. They found their way to Port Isaac, with their caravan and their sense of adventure. Her life with Gordon and their dogs in Port Isaac was the happiest and most fulfilling time of her life. The house they rebuilt, their travels, the imaginative and sometimes eccentric things that they did in nearly thirty years formed something very special, and it seems that she saved the best until last.

It was a sequence of events which would have broken a lesser woman. It would have been easy for Zofia to let herself become bitter and hardened, to surrender to self-pity and regret. Nobody could have blamed her for that. But that, as people who knew her will testify, was not Zofia. She attacked life with energy, a sharpness and a focus that few people possess. She rarely talked about the events of the war and its aftermath, and in her life there were many events that were just too painful for her to talk about. It was the same when her eldest son Piotrus was mentioned, whom she buried after a life that ended far too soon in 1991. At the funeral as the rector concluded and people began to walk away, Zofia said "You should never walk away from an open grave". The grave was filled in by hand, by each member of the family who was there. It was the same with her only daughter Teresa, who was born a special baby with very special



needs, and who also died at a very early age.

Most of us go through a period of trauma and need at some time, and at such times to have a friend, mother or grandmother such as Zophia was a source of tremendous strength, comfort and guidance. At a time of deep need, she read a book entitled "The Cave of the Ancients" by Lobsang Rampa. It was a book about the Buddhist experience of self-awareness, the abuse of power and the meaning of life and death. The words in the book changed her life. Although fundamentally a Christian, like many other things her belief system was well developed, intelligent and complex.

Zofia leaves behind her sons Andrzej and Tadeusz. Zofia – Babcia (Granny in Polish) – leaves behind her grandchildren Sharna, Jgesh, Olesch and Janek, and six great grandchildren. She leaves her dear friends and many who know her. The young woman and survivor Zofia Sekowski became the devoted mother and grandmother Zofia Liguz and then the happy and contented Zofia Fry, the rock of the family. A remarkable woman indeed.



Church Diary Dates | Remembrance

Update from Dan Rogerson MP

The Coalition Government recently announced a £1,114,000 investment in the South West Coast Path, which will see much needed repairs to the path at Barretts Zawn as well as at Daymer Bay and Trevone following damage in last winter's storms. I have been working with local people to secure this much needed funding which will be used to repair, improve and promote the South West Coast Path. As well as the urgent repairs to the path there will also be new information boards, signs and marketing to help to promote the path as a tourist attraction.

I am on the hunt for areas that are in need of a new post box. Royal Mail are going to install 2,000 new post boxes across the country, particularly in rural areas and on new housing developments that don't have decent access to a post box. If you think your area is in need of a post box please let me know so that I can press for any new post boxes to be installed.

I am also continuing with my campaign to cut the tax we have to pay on petrol and diesel in North Cornwall. In areas like ours where using a car is a necessity not a luxury, I think it is right that we pay less fuel duty. The Coalition Government have extended the 5 pence-perlitre reduction in tax on petrol and diesel to some rural areas, and I am continuing to keep up the pressure for the reduction to be brought to North Cornwall.

The Government have also awarded £4.3 million to help fix potholes across Cornwall. One of the most common complaints I hear as local MP is the state of some of our roads, so I am pleased that the Government has responded and is offering this muchneeded funding to invest in our roads. Of course money will not be the solution to all of the problems across Cornwall, but if you are having problems with specific potholes on your street or in your area, please do let me know and I will try and get any problems fixed.

Turning to national issues, I have been working with my Lib Dem colleagues in Government to rebuild trust

in our migration control system this week. Key to that is to bring back exit checks. Britain used to have exit checks but successive governments phased them out. We have insisted on reintroducing them but there has been problems reaching agreement within the Coalition. Before the 2010 General Election around 57% of entry and exit points were covered by proper checks. By March last year we were at 65%, and now we are up to 80%. We are working with Eurotunnel and the big ferry companies to continue plugging the gaps, and will keep on campaigning for full and proper exit checks so we know who is coming in and out of the country.

Every summer - and during September and early October when Parliament breaks up for the party conference season - I spend the time visiting towns, villages and parishes in the North Cornwall constituency to knock on doors. My annual door knocking tour aims to give as many local people as possible a chance to speak to me in person about any local or national issues, problems or concerns. It's a tradition that was started by my predecessors as MP, John Pardoe and Paul Tyler, and it's a vital part of my work to keep in touch with local people all year round – not just at election time – so that I can campaign on the issues that matter when I speak up for us in Westminster.

This is my tenth summer tour, and it has good to be able to see so many familiar faces and many new faces too as I knocked on doors in Port Isaac and other communities across North Cornwall. If I didn't managed to catch you in or if there's anything I can help with or which you would like to discuss with me then you can always contact me by e-mail, letter, telephone or arrange a time for us to meet using the details below.

Some easy to do family meals

Let's face it, a roast dinner can be a bit of a "faff" to cook – there's all the peeling of vegetables and then the slow cooking time for the meat; then there's the stuffing to make and the whole issue of who is going to carve. So, in reality, it's not really the best meal to cook mid-week after a long day at work, and you would need to feed the family a small snack before dinner was served, given that most roast dinner's take about two and half hours to cook.

This recipe has all of the elements of a roast chicken dinner – that's the chicken (of course!), the stuffing, the roast spuds and all the vegetables such as carrots, parsnips and sprouts. Even though the sprouts cannot be cooked with the rest of the ingredients, you will still have a roast dinner on the table in under an hour and with the minimum of washing up too.

All that is left to make is the gravy, and on this occasion it's perfectly fine to make a commercial gravy mix for the meal (as well as a packet stuffing mix) - I make mine with the water that the greens or the sprouts were cooked in, so you also get all the vitamins and goodness from the vegetable water, as well as some residual taste.

All-In-One Roast Chicken Dinner (serves 4)

Ingredients

8 chicken thighs, skin on
a little vegetable oil
750g potatoes, peeled and cut into even size chunks
4 to 6 carrots, peeled and cut into even size pieces
4 to 6 parsnips, peeled and cut into even size pieces
Sea salt and freshly ground black pepper
1 x 170g box of stuffing mix

Sprouts or seasonal greens to serve Gravy to serve

Method

- * Pre-heat oven to 220C/450F/Gas mark 7.
- * Make the stuffing mix according the instructions on the packet and when cool enough to handle, shape into 8 balls.
- * Add a little oil to a large roasting tin and add the vegetables to the tin
- turn them over in the oil to cover and sprinkle some sea salt and pepper over the top of them.
- * Cook the vegetables for 10 minutes, before adding the chicken thighs
- sit the thighs on top of the vegetables. Add the stuffing balls, tucking them in and around the chicken and the vegetables and cook for a further 30 to 40 minutes, until the chicken is cooked and the skin is crispy and the vegetables are crunchy on the outside but soft on the inside.
- * Serve with gravy and seasonal greens or sprouts.



Thrifty Mexican style Spicy Bacon and Baked Bean Casserole makes for a quick and delicious meal.

This is so quick and easy and relies on storecupboard ingredients, bacon and a green pepper which most of us have in our fridges! I also keep a stock of fresh chillies in my freezer as they are so easy to use from frozen and can often be found reduced in the vegetable aisle!

The chillies in the dish give a gentle warmth that won't put children off but if you wanted to pep things up then you could always add some of the chilli seeds!

Spicy Bacon and Baked Bean Casserole

Ingredients

1 large onion, finely chopped
1 Green pepper, diced
3 mixed chilli peppers, de-seeded and finely
chopped
1 tbsp Rapeseed oil
210g unsmoked back bacon, chopped
400g tin chopped tomatoes
400g tin baked beans
Freshly ground pepper
75g mature Cheddar, grated

Method

- * Fry the onion, green pepper and chillies in oil on a medium heat for about 8 minutes until softened.
- * Add the bacon and fry until cooked. Add the tomatoes and baked beans, cover and simmer gently for 5 minutes. Season with pepper.
- * Transfer to an ovenproof dish, sprinkle with grated Cheddar and brown under a grill. * Serve with rice.


