If you want to send Christmas cards via the web there is some choice. Most of the best ones you have to pay for, but here are a selection.

One of my favourite is www.Jacquilawson.com. This one was founded by Jacqui Lawson who lives in Sussex. From their website it tells something of the history.

"Jacquie originally trained as an illustrator at St. Martin's School of Art, and worked for over twenty years' in many areas including architectural perspectives, book illustrations, and cartoons. In the autumn of 2000 she created an animated Christmas card – the "Christmas Cottage" e-card which is still available from these pages – and e-mailed it to a few friends. Over the subsequent weeks she was amazed to receive e-mails from hundreds of people all over the world asking for more of the same."

The cards are really delightful, with beautiful music as well as clever designs. Jacqui lives in Sussex with her partner Malcolm, who also designs the cards.

At the other end of the spectrum is www.Jibjab.com. This is a much more complicated site but allows you to create your own animated cards. Some of them are more tasteful than others, but all have some humour. For example you can create a card with 1 to 5 elves who do a Christmas dance. The way you do this is that you upload pictures of people you know (or could be yourself if you like) and then arrange the faces so that they become the faces of the elves. This is a bit fiddly but once you get the hang of it, it is quite fun. The faces you upload stay on the website, so if you want to use them again in future you can. I made Christmas card for my work colleagues one year and had the whole team doing a dance.

Both of these sites require subscription although you can use jibjab for free, but are limited in the cards you can send.

Another approach can be found at www.funkypigeon.com. This one enables you to upload photos and have them added to cards, t-shirts, mugs and so on, that are then sent on. This, like many of these sites, has only been in business a short time – this one since 2009. You can follow its history on its facebook page <https://www.facebook.com/funkypigeoncards>

If you want snailmail c.a.rds (ie ones you pop in the post), you can buy Cornish-themed Christmas cards from www.thecornishstore.com that is based in Falmouth. They have a wide range of gifts as well as cards all with a Cornish theme, and all made by local Cornish 'artisans'. The Cornish hampers look particularly nice. They have a good range of Cornish story books for children, although they don't have our own Gully range www.thegullery.co.uk where you don't only get books but seagull sounds as well.

Closer to home there is a good site for plants and perfumes www.stkittsherbery.co.uk that is near enough to Port Isaac for an easy visit, but its website is really nicely designed and you can get a good idea of what's available. They sell, amongst other things, a particularly good range of chocolates.

Of course there are businesses in Port Isaac where you can find in this issue of *Trio* that also have very good websites and I would encourage you to look at them as well.

Bruce Rowe Fisherman 1944-2014

Bruce was born in Edgware London in 1944 and moved to Port Isaac three years later with his parents Jack and Amy, and his sister Mary and his brother Charlie. His father Jack came back to fish in the family boat, the Boy Frank.

Bruce started school at Port Isaac Primary and then went on to Wadebridge Secondary. He left school at 15 to fish on his own, hauling pots by hand. At 16 he decided to fish with his father Jack and Brother Charlie, initially on the fishing boat the Hope then on the MCB, progressively opening up new fishing grounds further away from Port Isaac.

Bruce and Jackie married in 1963; his life then changed to both revolving around fishing and his young family, Sally-Jo, Robert and Justine. Sunday was always a family day even though the new boat the SRJ, named after his children meant longer days at sea as the fishing grounds of Hartland and Lundy were opened up. Throughout his lifetime he saw, led and embraced the progressive change to what modern commercial fishing is here in Port Isaac today. Wherever he travelled he sought out and befriended like-minded fisherman as far away as Freemantle, Eden, St Lucia, Cyprus, Portugal, wherever.....

Bruce will be remembered by many in Port Isaac as a constant identity associated with the harbour for the last 50 years. To his family he will be remembered as a loving husband, father, grandfather and great grandfather. We will all miss him.

The family thank everyone for their messages of sympathy which have been such a support over the past two weeks.

Special thanks to close friends Helen, Jill, Lesley and Anabel for love and support over the past 18 months; also to Noreen, Frank and Beth.

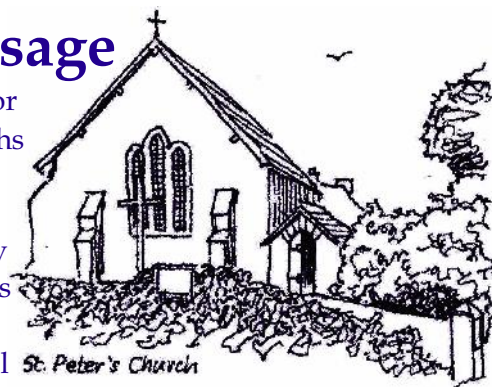

Arts Festival for local children

The Moor and Coastal Partnership, a Cooperative Education Trust, is organising an exciting Arts Festival, which seeks to involve children within their nine Trust schools (including Delabole, Camelford, Otterham, Tintagel, St Breward and St Teath), together with their communities. They will be delivering over 35 workshops over a period of six months leading up to the Festival, in art, literacy, music, dance and film, working with some of Cornwall's finest artists. Collaborators working on the project include Jill Murphy ("Worst Witch" stories), Nick Arnold ("Horrible Science" books), Margaret Livingstone (poet, winner of the Plough Prize 2004/2005), Jane Darke (author, painter and filmmaker "The Art of Catching Lobsters and the Wrecking Season"), Andrew Tebbs (sculptor, artist and curator), Phil Innes (musician/composer), Hookline Theatre, Falmouth Graduate Touring Students ("The Cheap Date Dance Company"), Cornwall College Dance Academy, illustration students under Mark Foreman at Falmouth University, Vanessa Lannen (artist at Zeath Gallery), Amy Scragg (textile artist), Daniel Sohi-Miles (sculptor), Story Republic, the Grenaways (local Cornish band) and Wildwood Kin (local Cornish band). All the work produced from the workshops will be performed and exhibited at Sterts Theatre on 14 July 2015.

Do you have an old fishing boat?

The Trust are looking for an old, out of service 20ft-30ft fishing boat (plus trailer) to exhibit the children's work. They would like to tour this boat around schools before the Festival, at the Festival on 14 July and afterwards at Tregona Chapel, St Eval for 10 days which will be open to the general public. Jane Darke will be leading the work of transforming the boat into an exhibition space, as well as exhibiting her work alongside the children's work.

Tickets will be on sale from Sterts Theatre next year, so look out for us in their Calendar of Events.

The Trust needs to raise £17,500, and whilst some funding has been secured from FEAST, they still have a way to go. The Crowdfunding campaign will go live on Wednesday 3 December. The New Year is still weeks away, but meteorologists are saying that 2014 was (is still?) the warmest year since records began, some two hundred years ago. They do acknowledge the wetness of last Winter and Spring, and that only August (our peak month for visitors) was not warmer than average. The February storms and floods not far up-country, and their effects on transport and communications here, are still a cause for concern. We must support the work of our MP and others to reinstate an alternative to the Dawlish railway, and to catch up on the backlog of maintenance work in the Somerset Levels.

As I write, it looks as though it might be colder over Christmas and New Year, but will it snow?? Will the sudden sharp gradients in New Road and near Poltrewoygey ice over and prevent visitors driving home?? What plans do the authorities have to assist vulnerable folk in the parish if we were to be cut off from supplies of coal, oil, gas and food?? Would the Pantomime go on, night after night, keeping people warm and snug in the Village Hall (and how?), until the blockade was lifted?? Would we find recipes for cooking Herring Gulls (and ways of catching them)?

But away from realms of imagination, and back to practical problems, like "when do we take a Christmas Day walk?" Do we go in the morning (with some coming back early to put the Dinner on), or do we have Dinner early and walk in the afternoon? Every family will have its own tradition, but most will include a walk at some time or other. If it's dry and sunny the Coast Path and the inland footpaths described in Robin Penna's booklet will beckon, but much exercise can be got without leaving Port Isaac itself.

From the Platt walk up Middle Street and take the first turning on the right, across the back of The Slipway Hotel, to Church Hill. Turn left up the Hill and take the next left, passing Leat House (formerly Mark Provis's butcher's shop) on the right, back to Middle Street. Turn right and follow Middle Street past the Pump and Wesley House to the end, where you bear left, soon up a few steps, into Back Lane. A little way up turn left down (CARE!) some steep slate steps along a cobbled path past front doors to Dolphin Street.

Go left down the street, noting the way houses have infilled gaps, until an opening appears on the right. This is Temple Bar (known to some as "Squeezy Belly Alley"), and it once continued across Dolphin Street; traces of a paved path have been found beneath the floor of the house opposite, at the right level. Go through Temple Bar to the bend in Fore Street, and bear right up the street. Soon an alley appears on the right (known to some as "Shuggy's Ope"), climb up this to narrow Rose Hill, and turn right. Up the Hill past the top of Dolphin Street (right) you meet the top of Back Lane (right). Here turn left beside Vine Cottage up Meadow Stile Lane (sometimes known, because of its muddy state, as "Sh'tty Lane") to Trewetha Lane, a metalled road. Follow this (right), past the top of Rose Hill, to the main road.

Turn left down New Road to the Co-op shop. Take the narrow path immediately to the right through to Tintagel Terrace, then go left as far as the next path on the left, which leads through to New Road again. Turn right down the hill as far as Hicks' Corner, and look for the footpath beside The Old Dairy, which used to run across Doctor's Meadow. More steep slate steps down (CARE!) into Trewetha Lane, which you cross to descend Margaret's Lane. Near the bottom you pass The Birdcage before joining Rose Hill, which you follow (right) to Fore Street. Not far down, just past The Golden Lion, there's an opening on the right; through this cobbled alley you will find yourself back on The Platt.

There are many other paths, alleys, lanes, snickets, cuts-through, jowlers and passages, whatever you like to call them (and every region has its own names) in the village. Finding them, and those with good views of the sea, is a good way of walking-off those extra calories you've just ingested!

Martin's recipe from the Padstow Christmas Festival

Well what a year it has been! I can't believe it's gone so quickly and what a great summer we have finally had! For me some of the highlights were the Gig in the Garden @ The St Kew Inn, *Olive* magazine including us as one of the top 10 places in the UK for Sunday roast, and my first cooking demo at the Padstow Christmas festival. So for my last recipe of the year here is a copy of my notes and the recipe that I cooked on Thursday December 4th at Padstow.



Pan roasted Hake, mussel and saffron cream with crushed new potatoes and wilted spinach

Salting the fish

Hake 180-200 gram fillet steak
Cornish sea salt.
Espelette

Mix the Cornish sea salt with the espelette pepper. Place the hake on the tray skin side down season well with the salt mix. Leave for 15 minutes depending on the thickness of the fish.

We salt the fish as hake is a very flaky fish and it helps keep it together whilst cooking, the salt also draws out some of the moisture and seasons inside the fish

Cooking the mussels

Mussel cream
Mussels
Onion
Garlic
Bay leaf
White wine



Pick the mussels, remove barnacles and beard wash twice to remove any sand or grit. Diced onions and chop the garlic. In a hot pan add the onion, garlic, bay leaf and chuck in the mussels, add a good splash of white wine and cover with a lid and let steam until the mussels are cooked.

The mussels are cooked when they open up, we don't want to overcook them as they will be cooked again later. The mussels come from Porthilly!

When cooked remove the mussels and allow to cool. Strain the cooking juices from the pan through a sieve using a j cloth as a filter. The j cloth is used to remove any grit that is left in the mussels juice after cooking.

Spinach and potato garnish

Cornish mids
Spinach
butter

Cook potatoes in salt water until just cooked but still with a bit of bite. Wash and drain the spinach. Drain the potatoes and crush a little, keep warm until needed. Heat a sauté pan ready to cook the spinach. I use salted butter for this as the cooking is not at a high temperature.

Mussels picked from the shell
Diced onion
Butter
Saffron
Chopped chives

Dice half a onion finely, sweat gently in a pan with butter. Add the mussels heat gently and finish with a pinch of chives and saffron.

Frying the Hake

Wash and pat dry the fish. Preheat the pan medium hot and add oil. Place the fish in the pan skin side down to crisp up the skin when it is starting to turn golden brown, place in the oven for 3/5 minutes.

To serve

Sauté spinach in a hot pan when cooked put into a sieve to drain the excess water off. Mix into the potatoes check the seasoning. I call this flash frying as it is hot and quick.

Making the sauce

White wine
Double cream
Milk
Saffron
Lemon juice



Return the juices to the pan add a splash of wine and turn the heat up, this is to burn off the alcohol. Add the cream first then the milk and pinch of saffron. Leave on a simmering heat until reduced by half. Taste and adjust the seasoning using the lemon juice if needed.

Dress the plate

Potato and spinach in the center of the plate. Sauce-drizzle around and add piles of the saffron mussels. Garnish with some watercress and lemon, and finish with the fish.

So it just leaves me to wish you all a very merry Christmas and a Happy New Year, and on behalf of The St Kew Inn, thank you for your custom and support throughout the year. Mx

Update from Dan Rogerson MP

I have been speaking with residents about proposals to remove 40 public telephone boxes across North Cornwall, including at Trelights. I understand why BT want to get rid of call boxes that aren't used very often, but I am concerned that if the telephone boxes go then it could be difficult to make an emergency telephone call, especially where there is poor or no mobile phone signal, or if there is a fault with the mobile phone networks. I am lobbying BT to keep as many telephone kiosks as possible.

Not only are mobile phone 'not-spots' a huge inconvenience to local residents but they have an impact on businesses and our local economy too. As both local MP and as Government Minister for Rural Affairs I have been working to improve reception in rural areas to make sure that mobile phone customers in our area get the decent service we deserve and that we are paying for.

In November the Government announced plans to change the law to make sure that mobile phone companies work together to improve mobile phone and mobile 3G internet signal in rural areas like ours. This could be done by sharing existing masts and equipment or introducing a national roaming scheme where coverage being provided by one mobile network operator would be made available to other companies as well. I am also keeping up my campaign to get companies to improve their signal across North Cornwall in the summer months to meet the extra demand.

As well as keeping up with my campaign to get mobile phone companies to improve their reception in rural North Cornwall, I am also taking up people's concerns about slow internet speeds and unreliable telephone connections. If you're having problems with BT or Superfast Cornwall do let me know about it, and I will see what can be done to help.

I have been campaigning to improve the non-emergency 101 number that people can use to contact the police. Many people tell me that they have given up trying to contact the 101 number because it takes so long to get through to someone, or because calls go unanswered. This simply isn't good enough. I have urged the Conservative Police and Crime Commissioner for Devon and Cornwall to urgently deal with problems with the non-emergency 101 number and to get it up to scratch.

Norman Lamb, my Liberal Democrat colleague and Government Health Minister has allocated funding to Cornwall to improve care for the elderly and for those with complex health needs. The money is being used to improve care and provide more dignity for older and vulnerable people. It will bring GPs, community nurses and care workers together so they can provide better care closer to home - keeping people independent and healthy for longer. The scheme also aims to reduce hospital admissions, saving money that can be re-invested in local NHS and care services.

It is vital that people get the right care when and where they need it, including at the weekend. Too often care is uncoordinated, leaving many people needlessly going back to A&E again and again. By getting local health and care teams working together to focus on prevention, not just the treatments, we can stop families and the NHS from paying the price for unnecessary crises.

NHS Kernow announced that they are asking for bids to run Cornwall's out of hours GP

contract from 31st May 2015, when the current contract with Serco ends. I want to make sure that the new contract delivers a decent weekend and out of hours GP service for

residents in rural communities, as well as avoiding some of the problems people have experienced over the past few years.

We must use the opportunity of a new contract and a new provider to improve services for patients in north Cornwall who need easy access to a doctor out of hours and at weekends. If you have used the out of hours GP service and have any comments, good or bad, or have any ideas about how the service could be improved, please contact me.

Finally, I would like to take the opportunity to wish everyone a happy and peaceful Christmas and wish you all the best for the coming year.

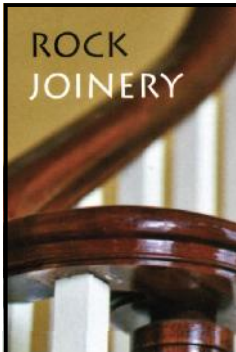

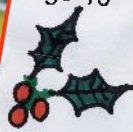
