

All the results from the Consultation Day and the Village Hall survey are now in and have been collated by Cornwall Rural Community Charity (CRCC). The good news is that there is overwhelming support for our access improvements and extension to include a new kitchen and multi-access toilets. Now all we need to do is get the money! However, all the support is a definite plus point when applying for grants so a huge thank you for everyone who has taken time to complete the questionnaire - it wasn't a quick task ...

Just some of the comments made on the day:

- "Disabled access, a brilliant idea."
- "Toilets that are on one level; I can't manage the steps."
- "Better access for wheelchair users and buggies."
- "Wheelchair access yes."
- "Better pushchair access."
- "Baby changing/disabled toilets."
- "Easy access to kitchen and toilets and of course the entrance steps."
- "Outdoor lift fantastic idea."
- "Outdoor lift great idea, I know lots of people who struggle to access the Hall at the moment."

There were several comments that really showed that local people benefitted from using the Hall and lots of people felt that attending events/meetings in the Hall made them feel more connected to the community. The Hall definitely shone as a venue for local people to meet friends and neighbours as well as encouraging people to get involved with local organisations. Again, this is all good information to include with our grant applications.

It was also very interesting to see all the activities you would like to see in the Hall. Top of the list was film nights and this is something we will be looking at in the winter months. Also high on the list was the resurrection of uniformed groups such as Scouts and Brownies. Other suggestions included Bingo, Lunch Club, Arts & Crafts including Painting and Pottery Classes, Cookery demonstrations and Cake Decorating Classes (as soon as we have our new kitchen we will get on to these), Drama Club, Dances and Dance Classes, Keep Fit and Yoga (Monday mornings with Tracy!), Youth Club and Homework Club, Book Club, Bridge, Floristry, Football, Skateboarding and Tennis. 



Sadly, the dog did not survive the fall and the crew returned the body to the owners who were at Port Isaac lifeboat station. The dog was a Chocolate Labrador called Teddi and had been walking within lead distance of her owners when she fell. Despite being completely devastated her owner, Kate Maloney, has paid thanks to our crew for their

response that day. She said "I would like to thank you all, on behalf of our family, for recovering the body of our dog Teddi. Thank you too, for the kindness you showed us and support you gave us. My husband is a sailor and I grew up a stone's throw from the sea, so we have always appreciated what an amazing job the RNLI volunteers do and we will continue to support your work in the future." All the crew and committee would like to thank Kate and her family for their donation to the RNLI and we send our condolences on such a terrible tragedy.

Well, the Cornish Cafe was still the Cornish Cafe, we had a mobile ear piercer, riding stables up at Homer Park, a barber, Robin Penna had just been selected as the new Parish Clerk, Ted Childs was the RNLI Station Hon Sec and there was a Port Isaac & District Tourism Association chaired by Chris Harris from the Headlands Hotel - the group had just started work on the 1999 Guide. Also, Scouts, Cubs and Beavers were scheduled to start in September.

As is the norm in *Trio*, parking was mentioned! Robin Penna wrote, "... a park-and-ride scheme would be impossible ... a scheme was suggested which would use a new car park somewhere between Trewetha and the village from which a mini bus could run down the road, down Back Hill to the junction with Fore Street, it could then travel back to the car park via Fore Street and New Road." It might take a few years but some things do work out.

Our MP, Scott Mann talks to Trio

The Government has wasted no time since May 8th in setting out its agenda and implementing its election manifesto before the summer recess starts.

At the time of writing this column, only 26 days have gone by of debating Government bills and legislation, and already we have seen significant milestones being passed, including the Summer Budget, the announcement of English Votes on English Laws (EVEL), progression of The Scotland Bill (devolution) and the Assisted Dying Bill, as well as bringing forward the end to on-shore wind subsidy and the introduction of the EU Referendum Bill.

Sadly, this period was overshadowed by the tragic events in Tunisia, which reminded us all how fragile life is, and that even in a place of retreat and relaxation, there is always a threat to our safety.

Terror attacks are nothing but counterproductive for those who commit them, as the resolve of those affected only becomes stronger to repel such evil. Nothing proved this more than when the country stood united and remembered the events of 7/7 the following week.

The Chancellor's recent budget unlocked a new vision for British politics, where the policies and mistakes of the previous Labour government can finally be laid to rest. It was a budget that rewards hard-work, entrepreneurism, business and growth, while the vicious circle that is the welfare state, which saw us spiral into so much debt, was finally cut down to size.

Among it was a compulsory living wage that will rise to $\mathfrak{L}9/hr$ by 2020, a new 8% tax on bank profits, a new family home allowance of $\mathfrak{L}175,000$ per person on top of the $\mathfrak{L}325,000$ inheritance tax threshold, a commitment of 2% of GDP on defence spending, the abolition of 'non-dom' status so wealthy individuals who choose to live here pay more tax, a levy on large employers to take on more apprentices while their corporation tax is slashed to 19% to support the new living wage, and most importantly, an increase in NHS funding of $\mathfrak{L}8bn$ on top of the $\mathfrak{L}2bn$ that was pledged before the election.

Welfare cuts will be spread over a longer period, meaning we will end the deficit and reach a surplus a year later in 2019/20. Elements of welfare which concern disabled adults and children will not be reduced, while claimants of tax credits will be on a more even keel with those who do not claim them, but are likewise on lower incomes.

I also welcome the announcement that the Government will look at devolving some powers to Cornwall Council, as well as addressing the threat to small cider producers, where the EU is trying to lift their excise duty exemptions. I have signed an Early Day Motion to reject this, and have had personal reassurance from the Treasury that efforts will be made to address this in Brussels.



I have attended several local events in North Cornwall over the last few weeks, including coffee mornings, fetes, and schools, as well as welcoming visitors in London and showing them around the historic building that is Parliament.

Through August I will be back in Cornwall for the summer recess, during which time I will be holding surgeries and attending events. If you see me about, then please come over and have a chat - whether it's to raise a concern or chew over the glorious weather.







Defibrillator / FirstAider

Mr Mike Trebilcock (FLEET) gave a presentation on defibrillators at the start of the July full Council meeting. He explained heart attacks are the biggest killer in the UK. Of the 250 people who have heart attacks each day, only 12 will live to see tomorrow. A defibrillator greatly increases the chance of survival. It is the aim of FLEET to have one in every local community. Each machine costs £3,000 to purchase and £300 p.a. to service. When the defibrillator is activated 10 local First Aiders and the Ambulance Service are notified.

Cllr. Raynor reminded the meeting that £3,000 had been raised locally for a defibrillator, which is believed to have been handed over to FLEET.

The Parish Council is considering a suggestion to pay for the training and insurance of 10 x First Aiders. It takes a long-time for an ambulance to reach the village. It is envisaged that the same ten local people who would respond to the defibrillator call-out should also be available to train as a First Aider. The cost is approximately £1,200 to train 10 people plus £350 p.a. annual insurance for the whole team.

Websites of the Month

I thought I would take the opportunity this month to discuss the way faith communities have approached climate change and to look at some of their websites. In addition on November 30th this year, a conference will be held in Paris that will be trying to finalise an international agreement on tackling climate change and there are some useful websites associated with this too. I have decided rather than writing a lot myself, I will use some quotes to illustrate what they say.

Many faith communities have been making clear that the issue of climate change and global warming, for them is not just practical, but moral.

In May this year, Pope Francis published an encyclical, Laudato Si', on the environment – subtitled 'Care for our Common Home' http://tinyurl.com/pope-climate and it has added interest as Pope Francis has a background in science – and that is clear from what he writes. Here he outlines the way the Catholic Church approaches the question – essentially from the point of view of Stewardship – that is how we relate to the environment is part of a Christian's duty. He is also clear that the scientific consensus is overwhelming that the activity of human beings is causing climate change and that it will disproportionately adversely affect the poor and vulnerable. Laudato Si' states:

"The urgent challenge to protect our common home includes a concern to bring the whole human family together to seek a sustainable and integral development, for we know that things can change. The Creator does not abandon us; he never forsakes his loving plan or repents of having created us. Humanity still has the ability to work together in building our common home. Here I want to recognize, encourage and thank all those striving in countless ways to guarantee the protection of the home which we share. Particular appreciation is owed to those who tirelessly seek to resolve the tragic effects of environmental degradation on the lives of the world's poorest. Young people demand change. They wonder how anyone can claim to be building a better future without thinking of the environmental crisis and the sufferings of the excluded."

Then in June the Lambeth Declaration http://tinyurl.com/lambeth-declaration was announced and supported by Dr Justin Welby, the Archbishop of Canterbury It says on the website that "Signatories include representatives from the Muslim, Sikh and Jewish communities as well as the Catholic Church in England and Wales, Methodist Conference and other denominations and faiths, with more leaders continuing to sign the Declaration."

The declaration states:

From the perspective of our different faiths we see the earth as a beautiful gift. We are all called to care for the earth and have a responsibility to live creatively and sustainably in a world of finite resources.

Climate change is already disproportionately affecting the poorest in the world. The demands of justice as well as of creation require the nations of the world urgently to limit the global rise in average temperatures to a maximum of 2oC, as agreed by the United Nations in Cancun. We have a responsibility to act now, for ourselves, our neighbours and for future generations.

The scale of change needed to make the transition to a low carbon economy is considerable and the task urgent. We need to apply the best of our intellectual, economic and political resources. Spirituality is a powerful agent of change. Faith has a crucial role to play in resourcing both individual and collective change.

And then there is the conference in Paris. The aim is to achieve a binding agreement on climate change from all nations in the world and the website is at www.cop21.gouv.fr/en . As well as giving details of the conference it has some useful background and links to existing declarations and agreements. The context for this are well explained in the report on assessing the current risks http://tinyurl.com/climate-risk prepared by an expert group at Cambridge University's Centre for Science and Policy and led by Professor Sir David King.

It says this:

What, in the context of a changing climate, we might do to each other is deeply uncertain. But we can start from the understanding that the climate hardly changed at all in the first ten thousand years of human civilization, and that even the 0.8°C of climate change we have seen so far is now causing us significant problems. It seems likely that high degrees of climate change would pose enormous risks to national and international security. Extreme water stress, and competition for productive land, could both become sources of conflict. Migration from some regions may become more a necessity than a choice, and could take place on a historically unprecedented scale. The capacity of the international community for humanitarian assistance, already at full stretch, could easily be overwhelmed. The risks of state failure could rise significantly, affecting many countries simultaneously, and even threatening those that are currently considered developed and stable.

This quote makes worrying reading, as we know from the news that this is already a significant problem and that 2014 was the hottest on record.

Lets hope with all the differing approaches countries and faiths have there can be a meeting of minds and we can achieve some lasting agreement to move the world away from its current very dangerous path.

PLAYING FIELDS AND CHURCH ROOMS FUNDING UPDATE

We recently received the results of the survey carried out at the Consultation Day at the Village Hall on 4th June. We're happy to say there is overwhelming support for the proposed plan for the playing fields with a 98% support for toilets with a shelter. There was good support for the other proposals as well. Based on this evidence we are meeting a member of the CRCC team (Cornwall Rural Community Council) to discuss further fund raising both for immediate requirements such as good play equipment but also for long term plans as outlined on 4th June. The Parish Council have agreed to donate £11,500 which CRCC have advised us will attract match funding for immediate needs.

Also, funding has been received from 'First Steps' a part of the Community Rights programme which supports projects that have not had any grant aid funding. The intended result of this project is a 'Community Action Plan' based on our parish which will be available for all and intended to help future grant aided funding applications. The playing fields association members, along with the Church Rooms restoration team, have already been to two events leading to writing the action plan. We have two Parish Councillors as observers for the playing fields and two more who are voting members of the church rooms restoration of which Janet Townsend is chair. We hope to have further consultations with the public and welcome any interested parties to join us.

A Parish Economic Plan

The Government has awarded St Endellion Parish Council a Coastal Communities Team grant of £10,000 to prepare an Economic Plan for the parish by January 2016.

The council's application identified a number of obstacles and opportunities for economic and employment growth in our area which the study will investigate. It is an opportunity to bring representatives of the main business sectors together with the council in a steering group because there is no Chamber of Commerce or tourism association at the moment, which has caused problems in the past when trying to access government grant funding.

Harbour Commission Chair Dugald Sproull, Jon Cleave, Julian Harris, Ian Sandbrook (St Endellion Festival) and Mark Symons (Farming) have agreed to join a Steering Group and it is hoped that representatives of St Austell Brewery and Nathan Outlaw will also join. Ms Debbie Wilshire, former Vice Principal of Cornwall College will give advice on vocational training. A representative of Cornwall Council and two St Endellion local councillors will represent the community.

One of our main economic sectors is tourism and in the past a major constraint has been a seasonal shortage of vehicle parking in Port Isaac. The parish council has partly addressed this by constructing the new car park at the entrance to Port Isaac but the lack of parking for day trip coaches is a continuing problem. The Steering Group and its consultant will explore solutions with the Cornwall Council highways authority. It will also examine potential future film/ TV location business with South West Film.

Another problem for all sectors is the local availability of trained staff and the long distances that our young people have to travel to attend vocational training courses, most of them in St. Austell or Truro. We will be exploring with training providers outreach training in the local community or surrounding area.

There is also a need for small business units within the parish that could be connected to the existing superfast broadband network. The idea needs to be developed by the Steering Group with Cornwall Council who own a small existing estate within the parish next to St. Endellion church.

The parish council already has planning permission for a local produce outdoor market on its Port Isaac car park. The idea of an early morning market will be explored involving local fishing, farming and craft suppliers.

The overall vision for the future is a community that can produce sustainable employment opportunities for young people who have grown up and been educated here, by building on existing economic strengths and overcoming growth constraints.

This is not a final list or is the Steering Group a 'closed shop'. Anyone who has an idea that they think would help local business, the arts and employment are welcome to put them forward and contact details will be advertised in the next *Trio* once the Steering Group has been set up.



Picnic season is finally here so just gather together friends and family and head for the beach. Enjoy the sun, catch up with loved ones and relax, relax, relax. And eat. Almost everything tastes better eaten in the

sun, but for a truly delicious picnic there are a few factors to consider... Pack accordingly, it's a good idea is to make a checklist of what you want to bring, and then cross off each item as you place it into your basket.

Planning a picnic is just like planning a small, transportable party, and if you think of it that way, it will help you with the organizing. Thinking through the who, what, when, where, why and how will keep you from missing any details. Essentially, the ideal picnic is nothing more than choosing a great location, inviting a good group of people, bringing something to sit on, and packing some delicious food and drinks.

Picnic Packing List

- A comfortable blanket or ground covering to sit on. If you are worried about ruining your favorite quilt or blanket, bring along a vinyl tablecloth to serve as an under layer.
- A cooler for items that need to be kept cold. Use plenty of ice packs to keep everything chilled. You can also freeze bottled water, lemonade, or fruit juice to double as ice packs and save space just be sure you have the time to let them thaw prior to serving. Last but not least, don't put the cooler in the boot of your car during transport, as it's the hottest part of the car.

"This is an ideal spot for a picnic", said the husband. "Yes, it must be" replied his wife, "a million ants can't be wrong."

- A basket or large bag to carry everything else. You don't necessarily need to get an old fashioned wicker basket, but try to use something more charming than a bunch of grocery bags.
- Plastic storage containers and plastic storage bags. Both of these items prevent things from spilling, while also keeping food separated and fresh.
- A tray or two is nice for setting drinks on so they don't tip easily. I always bring a few knives just in case for cutting up fruits and veggies, slicing cake or tarts. And a bottle opener and a corkscrew is a must for soda and other drinks.
- Plates, forks, knives, napkins, cups and/or glassware, and a cutting board. I prefer using the real stuff over plastic or paper. It makes the picnic feel more special, and it saves the environment.

While we're on the subject, there are some other things you might want to pack: insect repellant, sunscreen, hand sanitizer, condiments (salt and pepper especially), extra napkins or paper towels, and possibly matches for lighting birthday candles (one of our favorite reasons to picnic) or when we're roasting hot dogs. And if you're like me, you'll probably also have some bandages and antibacterial ointment on hand just in case. Plus a small stereo or your phone to stream/play background music, a sharp knife, bin bags and wet wipes.

Consider packing two containers - a picnic basket for tableware and non-perishable items and a cooler for cold food and beverages. To make it easy to get at the items you need when you arrive at your picnic site, pack your basket in reverse order. Place non-perishable food on the bottom, then serving items and tableware, and finally the tablecloth on top.

Just remember that whatever menu you settle on, you'll want to keep the food at the proper temperature to avoid food borne illness. Plan on bringing a cooler if you are serving salads with a mayonnaise dressing, with eggs in them, poultry or meat. If you pack raw meat or poultry to cook on your picnic, remember to keep it packaged separately. Cheese fares pretty well, but you'll also want to keep it cool if you have a long ways to go before it will be served. I usually bring ice packs along in any case. You'll also want to keep any leftovers cold for the trip home.

- Since frequent opening of a cooler allows the cool air to escape, use one for frequently used items such as beverages. Use the second cooler for perishable foods like meats and salads.
- When packing a cooler, it should be about 25% ice and 75% food. Place ice on the bottom and along the sides of the cooler. Then place the heaviest and most perishable foods on top of the ice. Fill in with lighter items.
- Transfer chilled foods directly from the refrigerator to the cooler. Don't use the cooler to chill warm or room temperature items.
- A full cooler will stay colder longer than one that is partially empty, so choose an appropriate sized one. If food doesn't completely fill your cooler, add more ice.

Enjoy the summer and have a good one. Mx

WELCOME



The Climate-friendly Parish Project heartily welcomes visitors to Port Isaac and the surrounding area, and hopes you will have an enjoyable stay, walking our coastal and inland footpaths, eating locally-harvested food, and breathing our clean air. A warm welcome too to anyone moving here from up-country; we hope you will soon begin to feel at home. Finally, a very special welcome to the Revd Dr Elizabeth Wild, recently licensed and installed as Priest-in Charge of the Benefice of the North Cornwall Cluster of (Anglican) churches, which includes St Endellion and St Peter's in Port Isaac. We understand that she has been a member of the Iona Community for some fifteen years and so, among other issues, the integrity of creation is central to her faith journey. We look forward to sharing with her our concerns about climate change and use of scarce resources, over the coming months.

Tony Wainwright's "Websites of the Month" column picks up those concerns as expressed by the Church of England's 'Lambeth Declaration' (also signed by other churches and faiths) and the Pope's encyclical 'Laudato Si". These show that the major faith communities agree with the scientific consensus, which is **overwhelming**, that the activity of human beings **is** causing climate change, and that it will disproportionately affect the poor and vulnerable. Let us hope that, sooner rather than later, governments (including our own) will also agree, and do something about it, and stop saying their main aim is to "reduce the cost of fuel to the consumer". We also hope that Her Majesty's Government will support any efforts Cornwall Council makes, as a result of "The Case for Cornwall" and any devolution of power that actually results, to harvest electricity from the tides (as well as from sun, wind and waves).

We responded to the cost of fuel quite a few years ago by switching to a dieselengined car. The fuel was more expensive than petrol, but you got so many more miles to the gallon (or km to the litre!) that it worked out cheaper in the long run. Diesel cars were no longer sounding like HGVs, were now lively and not a bit like a bus to drive, and were said to produce less CO2 than petrol-powered cars. We knew that diesel engines did produce some solid particles in their exhaust, but were told that these were probably harmless, and could be removed by a particle filter. A diesel car seemed more environmentally friendly than a petrol one.

How wrong we were! More recent research has shown that diesel engines produce far more oxides of nitrogen, often represented as NOx, including nitrogen dioxide NO2, than do petrol engines, as well as the particles. Nitrogen dioxide, the redbrown fumes given off when concentrated nitric acid attacks metals, is known to cause lung problems, and experiments producing it had to be carried out in a fume-chamber when I was at school. Further, the particles themselves are now also suspected of causing asthma (which is on the increase), as well as lung and heart problems.

A recent newspaper article described some city streets, choked with traffic, as particularly polluted. Mayor Boris Johnson may disagree, but Oxford Street in London has been called the most polluted street in the world, with a constant stream of diesel-engined buses running along it. However, diesel-oil began to replace petrol as the fuel for bus engines in the late 1930s, and oil engines, as they were then called, were universal not long after the Second World War. It is with the private car that the step-change in pollution levels has come, during the last decade or so.

If that were not enough, those particles are now known to absorb light and heat, and are contributing to the warming of the atmosphere. So switching to diesel may have produced less CO₂, but produced other, equally unpleasant, substances and consequences. Our attempt to deal slightly with the curse of greenhouse gases was not as successful as we'd hoped. Thankfully, as regards pollution, we need worry less about petrol engines than we used to ten years or more ago, since tetraethyl lead is no longer used to discourage pre-ignition, and lead-free petrol is available everywhere.

So, our next car will probably be a petrol one, and our remaining time with this one will be more guilt-ridden than we'd expected. Let's hope the weather is good, the going is dry underfoot, the footpaths have been trimmed as planned, and we can leave the car at home. We'll polish our boots, and get out on the Coastpath, or the inland paths, with our trusty OS map and Robin Penna's "Footpath guide" in hand. Will you join us? Happy walking!


