The Air Ambulance landing on Port Isaac beach - front cover photograph by Sally Stratton

This month's front cover photo from Sally Stratton shows the Air Ambulance landing on the beach coming to the aid of a holidaymaker in trouble - a lot of skilful piloting to land there and it brings home to us all just how lucky we are to have such a service, especially as we are so far away from a hospital.

Every emergency mission flown by Cornwall Air Ambulance is funded by charitable donations

The Cornwall Air Ambulance Trust's (CAAT) head of income generation, Susie Croft told *Trio:* "Every year our helicopter responds to around 700 emergency calls for help and is on-scene at an incident in an average of just 12 minutes. The helicopter can reach patients in any part of Cornwall, significantly reducing the time taken to get seriously ill patients the treatment they need – in hospital or on-scene. It costs £3 million per year to operate this service, and with no National Lottery or direct government funding, the charity relies on the generosity of the people and businesses of Cornwall."

The charity saw an increase in the number of rescue missions flown last year, with a total of 713 shouts. Rescue missions are flown for a range of medical emergencies such as cardiac arrests and medical collapses - in fact on average one in four missions are to patients suffering cardiac emergencies.

Last year nearly one in every seven missions flown was to help babies, children and teenagers, with 95 missions flown to youngsters in 2014. Cornwall Air Ambulance paramedics often work alongside land paramedics to stabilize and treat patients on-scene before transporting patients to the best hospital for their needs.

The chief executive, Paula Martin, said: "We just want to say a huge thank you to the people of Cornwall, who have kept their support steadfastly behind this charity for 28 years. Without the support of those who donate or volunteer, we wouldn't fly a single mission."

The Doc Martin Fund

Apologies for no update in the last three months - I have been very involved with family matters and Port Isaac has been far from my mind. However, here is the news of the fund to date.

First some information! In order to allocate the funds, the Trustees are joined by two representatives from the village who have volunteered to help so that the process can be as fair and transparent as possible. Furthermore, if any Trustee has an interest in the application - for example me as a Governor of the school - they do not vote. Trustees are informed of the applications should they be unable to attend, and their opinions sought and taken into account.

The following sums of money have been granted. The earlier ones have been reported already in *Trio*.

Playing Field equipment - £8251 Port Isaac School -

£2,000 (to fund After- School Club Manager)

£550 (towards funding for the Swimming transport)

Christmas CD - £5,000 (proceeds to Port Isaac School for Arts)

Village Hall - £12,000 (for the installation of a lift)

Golden Circle - £3,000

PI Christmas Lights - £10,000 (for the plan to upgrade the Christmas lights for the whole village, top and bottom, over the next three years)

Liam Murray- Strout - £1000 (towards the funding for representing the GB Junior Surfing Team)

As is evident, all the grants measure up to the purpose of the fund in helping in particular the young and elderly in the village.

A webpage, to inform the village about the fund, is in the process of being constructed and was commissioned in June, and will be up and running very soon. On the web page we will post information about the fund and any grants that are made. Updates will also continue to be published in *Trio*.

Applications to the fund should be made to one of the Trustees.



The Seagull Problem

Paul, our Postman, writes to a Parish Councillor ...

"I'm Paul your Port Isaac Postman. It would be really great if we could sort out the seagull problem in Port Isaac. They are a real menace. This year they were even worse than last, and there were a lot more. The main problem area is Silvershell Road and Silvershell View but there are also a few problems up at Mayfield Road and Mayfield Close. It doesn't help that there are still a few people that are feeding the gulls in all of these areas.

I have spoken to my boss about the seagulls and they enquired at the highest level about what to do and they told me it is the same situation as if there was an aggressive dog at a property; we can bring the mail back to the office if we feel it is unsafe to deliver at a certain address. I really don't want to have to return any mail to the office as the majority of the people in the problem areas are elderly and they need their mail as it might include hospital appointments and medicines.

At times though it is very unsafe to deliver to properties because of the gulls protecting their young. At most addresses over the summer there are up to five or six gulls on each roof excluding their young and when you have to go down a path between two houses with gulls coming at you from all angles it can be quite frightening for some. I know the people that cover my day off really don't like it and quite often refuse to deliver to certain addresses.

This year was really bad, even the locals were getting attacked and for the ones that had children and grandchildren staying for the holidays it wasn't a very nice situation. Before the gulls attack they try to poop on you which is horrid so I had to walk around with my umbrella to try and stop that as well as trying to stop them attacking me and deliver the mail at the same time. I also tried wearing a different colour jacket as I found that they were more aggressive to me when I was wearing my red Royal Mail jacket.

All in all the seagulls are a real nightmare for anybody working or living around the Port Isaac area especially us Postmen who are just trying to do our job. It would be really great if anything at all could be done to help the seagull problem."





Since returning to Parliament after the summer recess I have written to David Cameron and Greg Clarke, the Secretary of State for Communities and Local Government, asking them to help save public toilets by exempting them from business rates, as well as asking them to consider making public toilets a statutory public service provided by Cornwall Council.

These are essential amenities for local people and visitors who should be able to expect access to a public toilet in the local area, whether it be a town centre or a beach. The Prime Minister is a frequent visitor to Cornwall and I hope my Cornish colleagues and I have emphasised the problem enough for action to be taken.

In the summer I expressed concern over a "surf tax" being considered by Cornwall Council, and I'm very disappointed to see that it has been passed. This will place an unnecessary burden on surf schools which play a huge part in education as well as sea safety and awareness.

The first week back saw the second reading of the Assisted Dying Bill. I received a huge number of correspondence on this and after much careful thought, I decided to support the Bill. I believe people who have a terminal illness and are given 6 months to live should have the choice to die in comfort because they fear they will become incapacitated and subsequently endure a painful death. Ultimately the Bill was rejected by the Commons, but the mere presence of a debate on the subject may give the overall argument further momentum.

I also attended a broadband debate where I made the point to fellow MPs and Ed Vaizey, Minister for Culture and the Digital Economy, that many businesses are relocating to, or starting up in, rural areas and require faster connectivity.

Further to this, I met with mobile phone provider '3' to discuss how they are increasing their mobile internet coverage across North Cornwall. Historically, signal was difficult to obtain along the coast and indoors in rural areas. Now though, the building of more masts and better technology is allowing them to reach these areas and penetrate buildings with low-frequency waves. This means that rural businesses and homes can consider getting a USB 'dongle' or 'MiFi' unit to provide them with mobile internet if they cannot obtain reliable landline internet.

Nevertheless, Cornwall is at the forefront of internet broadband with the next wave of investment looking to get 95% of people in the county connected to superfast broadband. BT and Superfast Cornwall are working hard to connect communities and rural areas, and compared to other parts of the UK, Cornwall is very fortunate.

The Gig in the Garden

On September 12th, the third annual 'Gig In The Garden' took place at St Kew Inn. The event, jointly by Sarah Allen and Mike Masters of St Kew Inn and Daniel Sproull of NCB Radio, welcomed some 800 people on a lovely sunny day to the beautiful gardens of St Kew Inn. The assembled throng was treated to a great mix of live music including Sophie Smith, Rick Borrie, Charlie Bowdery and the amazing late night combination of the zydeco cajun sounds of the Gumbo Flyers and the funked up jazz of the well-known local band Freshly Squeezed. Martin Perkins and his team of chefs served up an excellent selection of food all day and this was accompanied by more than a dozen different types of beers and ciders served at Mike's Rustic Straw Bar in the garden.

Almost £4000 was raised for FLEET, St Kew Highway Playing Field Trust and NCB Radio.

Sarah Allen of St Kew Inn said "It was a real pleasure to welcome so many people to our pub at this year's Gig In The Garden. We try hard to provide an end of summer party for our customers and, this year, hundreds more people attended than they have in the previous two years. I think that the Gig In The Garden has now become firmly established as the local music event at this time of year and we are already planning the event for 2016. We would like to thank the many local companies and organisations that kindly sponsored the event and St Austell Brewery for its support."

Who is my Neighbour? (Luke 10 v29)

Living where we do in this beautiful part of the world, a crisis such as the mass migration of thousands of refugees fleeing from persecution, homelessness, continual oppression and possible death can seem very far away and irrelevant with us as we address completely different matters. We can be tempted to sway with the mood of the press which can arouse our fear and distrust.

How difficult is it to keep our hearts and minds steadily embracing the necessity of never losing sight of the truth that these people are our brothers and sisters and that our humanity must be expressed even if only by maintaining a disposition of compassion and generosity.

Even if we do not call ourselves Christians, the Bible can offer us the wisdom of how to live our lives rightly. Most of us would be impressed by the action of The Good Samaritan (Luke 10: 29-27) who, without letting fear deter him ministered to a man lying helpless on the road having been robbed and mugged. The man was of a different and despised race, yet the Samaritan acted with compassion and generosity towards him.

Maybe none of us will be called to act in this sort of situation, nor in direct response to even one of the present-day refugee crises all of which are fraught with huge political, economic and social issues for governments to address and, please God, solve. Of course there are no easy answers. But may we all resolve to keep our minds open and steady, thus keeping our precious humanity. For as William Blake expreses in his poem "The Divine Image"

"Mercy has a human heart and Pity a human face."

Indian Summer Fair on 6th September

The Playing Fields Association and Church Rooms team would like to thank all the people who came to take part in our public consultation and 'lucky dip' at this event which was funded by the 'First Steps' programme. The sun shone and the people came and gave their opinions. In all we had almost 120 responses over the three hours of the lovely Sunday afternoon fair; around sixty for each of the projects and all but one of them positive (well, there's always one isn't there).

The First Steps programme is a government funded initiative designed to put communities on the road to applying for public funds. We have to be accountable and keep proper records. Here follows a quote from Debbie Croucher, our First Steps Programme relationship manager who mentors us during the programme:

"I am the First Steps Relationship Manager allocated by the First Steps Programme to the Port Isaac Playing Fields Group. In addition to support from myself they have received a small grant from the Programme. As an unincorporated association they needed a constituted organisation to accept the money on their behalf, which is common practice for a number of the groups that we work with. In this case the Parish Council of St Endellion agreed to administer the grant on their behalf.

The allocation of funds up to $\mathfrak{L}2,300$ has been authorised by the First Steps Programme, based on an outline budget submitted at the application stage. Now the project is underway the actual expenditure is agreed with myself and the Playing Fields team. I can confirm that the programme for consultation and consultancy expenditure has been agreed with myself and is within the agreed budget. I am very confident in the way that the team are working and how they are spending the funding."



Hedge Planting at the Main Car Park - Sunday November 8th at 10am

The original planting scheme for the car park was to have cost £10K. I persuaded our Parish Council that planting with native hedging whips will screen more effectively and will benefit biodiversity and, far more importantly, has cost us a fraction at under £400! Cllr Penny asked me to source native planting that could be foraged too, so we have blackthorn, hazel and buckthorn among the species.

We've ordered 400m of native hedging which will be delivered on Friday November 6th. Whips can be planted in a single cut with a spade, and a rabbit cowl slipped over the top of a cane to protect the whip. Planting must be done in autumn/winter, and if not planted immediately must be heeled in. As you can imagine, it's going to be quite a pile!

We are requesting volunteers to assemble in the Main Car Park on Sun Nov 8th at 10am with a spade to be trained. Lunch an hot drinks (and you never know with Andy Penny at the fore perhaps a bacon butty for brekkie too) will be provided. We have also pencilled in dates the following two weekends in the event of inclement weather, so it could be a moveable feast.

With enough bodies we can get the whole thing planted up in a day...and mercifully none of us, within couple of years, will have to look at rows of cars sparkling on the horizon! If you don't fancy digging there will be plenty of other help needed too, kids can join in by laying out the bundles for planting etc. Volunteers to help out with the catering will also be very welcome! Housing Needs Assessment & Our Neighbourhood Development Plan

We now have the results of our Housing Needs Assessment (HNA) which was commissioned as part of our Locality Award from Lottery funding, I have always been careful to refer to our Neighbourhood Development Plan. Any plan must include development to be passed at examination. However a plan enables us to decide where and how our Parish should be developed rather than leaving it to the mercy of commercial developers who will build housing no one local can afford, especially given the requirement to provide affordable is no longer an obligation. Good housing provision is what maintains vital age balanced communities.

The results really are quite fascinating in terms of our demographic. A high than usual requirement for social (rather than affordable) housing is identified due to our low wage economy. The high price of housing renders affordable housing based on a percentage of local value unaffordable for many. Let's hope the economic plan soon to be developed by our Coastal Community Team will in the long term redress this imbalance. Meanwhile, whether or not Cornwall Council can be persuaded to build social housing remains to be seen, we are yet to see how policy reference the sale of social housing will affect our supply. The summer budget announcement lowering social rents will also impact the funds available to build social housing

Unsurprisingly our community is also identified as imbalanced in terms of age demographic, meaning that we will have a high need of housing for older people over the duration of the plan, it projects this trend will continue. The age old issue of the young unable to purchase locally and moving inland, exaggerates the imbalance. However this could be ameliorated by provision of suitable smaller units encouraging older over

occupiers to downsize freeing up family size homes. Older people who have moved here later in life to retire will require (smaller) adapted housing as they age. At 67 units, more than 50% of the predicted figure is for this sector, which is a clear illustration of a changing demographic replicated Cornwall wide. A careful plan providing suitable housing could stop the outward flow re-balancing the community. The assessment advises monitoring downsizing which might free up housing to fulfil need.

Another national change in housing requirement reflected here is a high need for single people and childless couples, exacerbated by an almost total absence of low priced private rentals. Interestingly our HNA also mentions the unregulated rental market making this requirement difficult to assess. We all know of the hidden housing, the chalet or caravan where someone lays their head. But these days they are few and far between, problematic for employers.

The housing figure we need to plan for in our NDP is around 80-90 new units across the parish within the life of the plan, realistically 15 yrs. I'll arrange an exhibition soon where all the detailed evidence for the figure will be displayed. This is relatively high as since 2011 we have a very low number of completions.

We do not intend to identify a minimum housing figure in the NDP but we do need to accommodate growth to respond appropriately to the results of the Survey whilst balancing this growth with the sensitivities of our nationally designated landscape, our Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (ANOB).

The next task is to work out how this can best be achieved, and how to direct growth to the areas of our landscape that have the highest capacity to accommodate new development whilst responding to what the Housing Needs Assessment has identified. We must study the landscape as our parish lies almost wholly within an ANOB. Housing outside existing built up areas, including Port Isaac and Trelights, will

be supported by Cornwall Council where they form rural exception sites, the exception being identified local need. The HNA gives no guidelines for how this target can be achieved, but it does recommend that mixed housing developments/open market/social/ selfbuild/affordable is preferable In any development, housing types it states, should be indecipherable. Mixed development tends to preserve open market housing for local need rather than second homes. An NDP recently passed at examination has a policy of a 6 month moratorium on the sale of new houses in mixed developments to non-local purchasers. Also suggested is policy permitting development of medium/larger accommodation comprising 3-4 bedrooms with integral workspaces, assisting families to root in their communities as working practises shift and people work more from home.

Our next step is to carry out a Local Landscape Character Assessment. A group of us underwent training in how to do this and we're recruiting volunteers to assist in the task. Essentially it requires small groups of 2/3 people to walk the landscape in sections & describe what they see in terms of how the land lies, which will provide an evidence base for all parties involved in the planning process to better understand where development can be absorbed, and also where it cannot. This element of the plan is evidently finite, and we'd hope to complete by the end of November.

All this evidence will build on the policy for our plan. A robust plan which identifies where housing can be built that safeguards our valued landscape and protects our Parish from un-wanted development in the wrong places.

In the run up to the UN Climate Change Conference in Paris in December, several things have been (or are) happening in Cornwall. Firstly, during the last six years over 4,000 people in the county signed carbon-reducing pledges, and Luci Isaacson has tracked them down and calculated how much carbon dioxide has been saved. The results are remarkable: 3,300 tonnes of CO2 were saved, and Luci's project cost £6,000, so each tonne saved cost £1.98, which is very competitive with the cost of carbon capture on an industrial scale. You can read Luci's report on http://climatevision.co.uk/wp-content/uploads/2015/09/Carbon-Logic-Footsteps-Report-2015.pdf.

By the time you read this, a Conference will have taken place in Truro (following a Big Breakfast — what a lovely idea!) to consider the Pope's Encyclical Letter "Laudato Si", which is sub-titled 'On care for our common home'. Then local community energy groups in Truro and Falmouth (similar to WREN in Wadebridge) will be organising a Green Open Homes Week from 5th to 11th October. A really varied range of houses will be open, demonstrating the renewable energy and energy-efficiency improvements they have made. For details, go to http://truroandfalmouth.greenopenhomes.net/truro-falmouth-green-open-homesweek-192. If you're down west, it might be worth having a look.

There's even a play, "Baked Alaska — Time to Change the Temperature" by the Riding Lights Theatre Company, Monday 12th October, 7.30pm at Truro Methodist Church. Contact http://www.churchestogetherincornwall.org.uk/docstore/73.pdf for details. Finally, there's a chap going from Cornwall to Paris for the Conference, and he's travelling in a very climate-friendly way, by bicycle! Euan McPhee will set out from Truro Cathedral at about 11am on Tuesday 17th November; why not go down to see him off, or wave him past nearer Port Isaac? Email him on clethrionomys@btinternet.com for details of his route through Cornwall.

One idea that is around now, to compliment the solar PV panels generating electricity on your roof, deals with the problem that the Sun doesn't always shine. Since the electricity generated by the panels is low-voltage DC (which has to be converted to 240 volts AC to be fed into the mains), it is quite feasible to store it in batteries when the Sun shines, and draw it from the batteries when the Sun goes in. There are now relatively simple control systems for this, which can be used on a domestic scale. The set-up could cost about £4,000, and the batteries are guaranteed for 5 years; with gentle treatment by the control-system they should last 10 years, by which time the technology should have progressed......

Thinking of climate-friendly travel, though not going as far as France, it is worth remembering that, if it were still open, our railway station would now be more than 120 years' old. The London & South Western Railway extended its North Cornwall line (from Okehampton, through Halwill Junction and Launceston), already open to Camelford in August and Delabole in October 1893, through Port Isaac Road and St Kew Highway to Wadebridge on Saturday 1st June 1895. There it met the Bodmin & Wadebridge Railway, a surprisingly early steam-worked line, dating from 1834, which the L&SWR had acquired in 1847 (illegally! — legalised only in 1886...). The thing that I always find striking is that the B&WR was built to the same gauge (distance between the rails) as the pioneer lines, Stockton & Darlington and Liverpool & Manchester, opened hundreds of miles away during the previous 9 years. Admittedly, it did need a bit of straightening-out when linked to the North Cornwall line, but all the same, there was some thinking ahead, surely!

The later story of our local railway, and of the bus routes that connected with it, will have to wait until another time, perhaps. There's just time to wish you happy travelling, if you are, during the next month, and may it be as climate-friendly as possible.

Draft Consultation Document on Planning Response Policy

Members sought the views of residents on the draft planning response policy (as published in the last edition of TRIO) and as a result, it has been decided not to progress with this proposal.

Planning: The following applications were received and Members made the following responses to Cornwall Council:

- PA15/06999, Spindrift, 36 Trewetha Lane, Port Isaac demolition of existing dwelling and erection of replacement dwelling. Members voted unanimously to SUPPORT this proposal. However members note the use of "Weatherboarding", and dislike the use of this material as it is not in the local building vernacular.
- 2. PA15/07227, 91 Fore Street, Port Isaac demolition of existing house and construction of new house. Cllr. Bell had declared an interest and left the meeting whilst this item was discussed. Members voted unanimously to SUPPORT this proposal, however the request the LA seeks a full construction plan, due to the site specific difficulties of works and the proximity of the site to holiday letting properties to include details of preparation of access track, plant usage, disposal/storage of spoil, traffic management plan for control of traffic at the Fore St access, hours of work, notice of works schedule for neighbouring properties, hours and period of works.
- PA15/07383, 71 Fore Street. Port Isaac removal of 1 Monterey cypress.
 NFA as this is an application for works to trees in a Conservation Area and will be decided under delegated powers.
- 4. PA15/07602, Orange PCS Ltd Telecommunications Mast, Cor 77 Port Gaverne – installation of 4 no. microwave dishes on the existing tower, replacement of an existing equipment cabinet with 2 no. new radio equipment cabinets and development works ancillary thereto. Members are in support of this proposal in the hope it improves mobile 'phone reception



AUSHROOMS

Autumn is upon us and with the change of season comes mushrooms, whilst I do not recommend that you forage mushrooms without consulting a expert you can buy a mix of farmed mushrooms easily in the supper

Mushroom ketchup still has a loyal following and is traditionally thin and almost black. The flavour comes not only from mushrooms but soy sauce, cloves and paprika. The modern commercial versions are made from powdered mushrooms and concentrate, water and salt.

MUSHROOM KETCHUP

A thick, slightly rough textured ketchup to accompany grilled steak or lamb, makes 300-400ml.

250g mixed mushrooms
3 garlic cloves, peeled
3tbsp cider vinegar
3tbsp caster sugar
5 spring onions, finely chopped
15 anchovy fillets
3 large gherkins
3 tbsp Dijon mustard

In a food processor combine the mushrooms, garlic and cider vinegar to a coarse purée then scrape into a heavy saucepan over a moderate heat. Stir in the sugar and spring onions and simmer, stirring regularly till the onions have softened. Ignore the slightly unappetising look - it is early days.

Roughly chop the anchovy fillets and gherkins, add to the pan with a generous grinding of black pepper, and continue to cook for 10 minutes, stirring regularly. Add the mustard, stir and leave to simmer for a further 5 minutes. Adjust the seasoning, it should be sweet,

sharp and salty, then serve with grilled steaks or lamb.

MUSHROOM STROGONOFF WITH WILD RICE

1 tbsp oil

I medium onion, diced
4 cloves garlic, minced
500g mushrooms, sliced
50ml vegetable stock
Itbsp smoked paprika
Black pepper
3 tbsp sour cream

4 tbsp fresh parsley and tarragon, chopped 1 tbsp mushroom Ketchup (optional)

Heat the oil in a large frying pan, and cook the onion, garlic and mushrooms over a medium heat for 5-10 minutes, until slightly softened. Add the vegetable stock and smoked paprika, and season well with black pepper and salt. Cook for a further 5 minutes.

Just before serving, stir in the sour cream and half of the mixed herbs, and once heated through, serve topped with the remaining herbs.

I love rice but it can be a bit dull, so here is a simple way to pimp your rice. So first just cook your rice as you would normally in salted boiling water, and drain into a coliander when just cooked, leave the rice in the sink with the cold tap running to cool the rice down (you can do this earlier and keep the rice until ready to serve) drain the rice and keep to one side.

I diced onion

2 cloves of garlic chopped






