the story of Port Isaac Rowing Club continues ...

The initial mention of gig rowing occurred over a pint in the Golden Lion after an RNLI meeting. One of the RNLI crew described what he'd seen at Padstow and Cadgwith, where there were well-established rowing clubs. This sparked some interest; another of the group had been involved at Newquay Rowing Club since the 1970s. After more discussion, and undoubtedly more beer, it was decided to visit Padstow and check out what this sport of gig rowing was all about. Newquay and Padstow Rowing Clubs invited the interested novice rowers to have a go at rowing, singing and maybe the odd pint.

This, in itself, inspired more interest in the village from a diverse selection of people; some who wanted to row from Port Isaac, and others who wanted to contribute something to the community. A committee was formed, a grant and loan were applied for from North Cornwall District Council enough for the cost of a gig, trailer, oars and boat cover. The club committed to raise a percentage of the money borrowed with five years to pay the interest free loan back.

Funds were raised in many ways; donations were made from so many people, both local to the community and further afield, who believed that having a rowing club would be positive for the village. Share certificates were designed and sold. The whole community was involved including the Primary School, where they ran a competition to produce a design to be used on club clothing, T-shirts and sweatshirts.

A boat builder from Padstow, Peter Reveley, aka Dasher, was commissioned to build the gig. He had already built 'Dasher' for Padstow Rowing Club and 'Cape Cornwall' for the rowing club of the same name, based in Sennon.

A name had to be chosen for Port Isaac's first gig and a competition was held. A short list of names was compiled from research on gigs that had existed at some time in the village, Tom Sawyer, Jane and Corsair. 'Corsair' was the clear leader.

She was officially launched in Port Isaac on Easter Sunday 1991. Other clubs were invited to attend. Races were held, apparently Port Isaac didn't fair too well on this occasion. The crews were still novices; at least that's one excuse that's been used! A good day nonetheless.

One of the best achievements of this era of the club is when the Ladies Crew came in second place in 1995 at the World Pilot Gig Championships held in the Isles of Scilly and third at the County Championships at Newquay.

Port Isaac Rowing Club has published a booklet about Corsair and the history of the Club. Copies are £3 and are available from Clare Jon at The Angry Anchovy.

The gig showered with champagne by Peter "Dasher" Reveley, who built *Corsair*! The afternoon was enjoyed with a BBQ, beer and cakes on the Platt, making it a truly memorable and heart-warming occasion.

Our MP, Scott Mann talks to Trio

Early April saw the introduction of the National Living Wage, which gave 1.3 million people an immediate pay rise. All those aged 25 and over received an instant 50p increase to £7.20 per hour. That means anyone who was working 37.5 hours a week on the minimum wage will now be £75 better off a month, or £900 in the next year alone. The Living Wage will rise every year to over £9/hr by 2020.



Businesses big and small are being supported through cuts to business rates and tax, which not only facilitate pay rises, but also make the UK a more attractive place to do business and promotes growth.

The three per cent extra stamp duty on second homes also came into effect. This means a second home in Cornwall costing $\mathfrak L1$ million will attract $\mathfrak L73,750$ in tax — an increase of $\mathfrak L30,000$. This extra money will fund self-build projects which I lobbied the Chancellor for before the Budget.

After the Budget there was a lot of coverage of the proposed cuts to Personal Independence Payments (PIP). I like other MPs was concerned about this, and I informed the government that I would be opposing the cuts. The proposals were subsequently scrapped the following week.

The government is rightly pursuing its goal of having a more affordable welfare system, however, this needs to be done in a fairer way so that it is reformed for the next generation without hitting existing claimants who are merely following the rules.

I had this same stance on the proposed cut to Working Tax Credits last year, requesting that existing claimants be made exempt from any changes. This cut was also vetoed, but we have brought in a lower benefit cap of £20,000 to stop welfare dependency and the frustration that taxpayers feel when they see benefit claimants receiving more money than what they bring home after a hard week's work.

The Government announced recently that it would be sending 27 million pro-EU leaflets to households at a cost of £9 million to the taxpayer, which I was angry to hear. There is a hunger amongst the general public for more information on the EU, but a government leaflet should be impartial and include basic facts and figures so people can make their own conclusions.

During the Easter break I joined fellow MPs Steve Double and Sarah Newton to celebrate the opening of Cornwall Air Ambulance's newest facility - the Lady Mary Holborow Fundraising and Volunteering Building - in honour of their Chairman who has done much charity work throughout the Duchy.

The Air Ambulance is held with great affection by the people of Cornwall, who raise millions every year. The new building has been part-funded by the government's Libor fund, which takes money from misbehaving bankers and gives it to deserving charities.

In the past month I've been paid a visit by in Parliament by Lewannick, St Minver and St Kew primary schools who were all a delight to spend some time with and talk to about their visits to London and Westminster.

- * In October 2015, the PCC (Parochial Church Council) voted unanimously to hand the Church Rooms over to a local group willing and able to form a charitable trust which would renovate the building, and at our most recent meeting on April 18th this year this remained our preferred option/hopeful intention.
- * Contrary to popular belief, the Church or at least your church has very little money! We do not receive any central funding. In fact the opposite is the case. St Peter's, like every other church in the country, pays into a central fund in order to support the overall work of the Church. We also have to fund the running costs and maintenance of our church buildings.
- * Any money that St Peter's receives comes directly from donations, wedding and funeral fees and collections; which isn't an overly substantial sum and is now 55% lower than previous years due to the closure of the Church Rooms.
- * St Peter's regular income is roughly £300 a month from 'Planned Giving' plus anything extra which may be collected on Sunday mornings. The latest copy of our finances makes it painfully clear that we can barely afford to keep our church open let alone renovate and maintain the Church Rooms as well, which are unfortunately in a dreadful state of disrepair.
- * In the interests of clarity we would like to point out that St Endellion is in the same position as us regarding their current church hall renovations. They have no access to central Church funds but are supported through a mixture of energetic fundraising and the financial support of a disparate group of benefactors, who whilst they may not attend Sunday services or even live locally, wish to preserve St Endellion in its spiritual and creative endeavours.
- * With this in mind the PCC took a further vote as to the outcome if no group wished to take the Church Rooms on. The PCC was unanimous in agreeing that it was not desirable to take no action and to see the Church Rooms deteriorate further. After much deliberation and one abstention it was agreed that we would have to consider selling the Church Rooms but only "Providing that any and all of the proceeds from the sale must be used for the benefit of the church and community of Port Isaac."
- * We do not want to sell the Church Rooms. However if we do have to consider a sale, then there will be careful consideration of issues such as the best way of preserving the War Memorial and appropriate consultation with the local community. Unfortunately, if we do sell the property, we would be unable to dictate the usage of the plot; as a charity, we are legally obliged to achieve the best price.

We hope this clears up any misunderstandings or confusion that there may be regarding the Church Rooms but if you have any questions please feel free to speak to any of the PCC members and we will do our best to answer them for you.

Nearly ten years ago I attended a meeting of North Cornwall Local Agenda 21 (an environmentally aware group much involved in education) as representative of an ecumenical book club. Being a co-opted member of St Endellion Parish Council I pricked up my ears when a representative of Camel Area Friends of the Earth announced that they planned to inaugurate a "climate-friendly parish of St Endellion". After some discussion, the Climate-friendly Parish was launched as a joint project by FoE and the PC in September 2006, with the object of increasing awareness locally of climate change and global warming, and mitigating their effects in any way possible.

There were half-a-dozen members of the project, from FoE, the PC, local residents and the District Council (NCDC). They attended several Green Fairs, in Wadebridge Town Hall and elsewhere, and organised a number of events in and around Port Isaac. These included a Green Fair in the Church Hall (July 2007), and "Climate Change at The Edge" at which Dan Rogerson, our then MP, spoke (November 2007). "Local Power" (February 2009) and "How Green is Your Plate" (April 2010) were events in the Village Hall, and well-attended. Large amounts of locally-produced food were consumed, and waste disposed-of ecologically (!), although a showing of Al Gore's film "An Uncomfortable Truth" in Port Isaac School was to a very small audience.

A stated aim of the project was to reduce the energy consumption of the parish by 5% per year, so we needed to find out what that consumption was when the project started, and repeat the process a year later, and so on. Establishing the initial data proved unexpectedly difficult: energy suppliers were totally unhelpful (commercial confidentiality!), and local residents are, understandably, reluctant to say how much petrol/oil/gas/electricity they use. Three university students helped us, working on this project, one on offsetting use of fossil fuels by planting trees, and one other.

In co-operation with the then local bus company, Western Greyhound, the Project group conducted a "Bus Timetable Awareness scheme" locally, by articles in "Trio" and by distributing different forms of the timetable around the area. This was intended to encourage the use of the bus service (more ample then than now!) by residents and visitors, rather than private cars which, proportionately, use so much more (fossil) fuel.

The Project was one of five finalists in the Future Friendly Competition, a national competition supported by Procter & Gamble (makers of soaps and detergents) in 2009, our prize being the installation of insulation in the roof of the Village Hall. The following year the Project obtained fifth place in the Cornwall Rural Communities Council / SITA Cornwall Sustainable Village of the Year competition, winning a solarpowered torch (!) and some trees, the survivors of which are, at present, growing in the grassed areas of The Main Car Park.

Members of the Project group have organised meetings at local churches, to explain how global warming occurs, how it produces climate change, and how that should help our interpretation of Biblical passages such as the early parts of the book of Genesis. We went further, and discussed how our religious beliefs affect our view of Creation, and our part in it. We have also spoken to church groups, such as Mothers' Union, about climate change.

We have bought, used and circulated for use by other local residents, three energy meters and five energy monitors, and quite a few relevant books; these are still available in the village. While most of those originally involved have moved away from the area, those remaining have tried to keep climate change, global warming and associated ecological matters in the mind of the population of the Parish, and at the fore of the Parish Council's agenda. We have done this by writing articles like this one and "Websites of the Month" in "Trio", and by selling environmentally-friendly products on a Traidcraft stall at local events.

Now the Project group has almost disappeared, and it seemed time to say, not that it has achieved its purpose, but that some members are moving to 'pastures new' and that the Parish Council will continue the work in evolving its Neighbourhood Development Plan. The group has been wound up, the remaining funds given to Camel Area FoE to continue its work, and I shall write no more. Penny and I will move up-country, to be nearer family and, possibly, to be able to help welcome asylumseekers to this country. Thank you for reading this and previous articles, and for your comments thereon.

Happy and environmentally-friendly walking.

Russell Martin Pollinger

St Endellion Church was filled with family and friends for the funeral service within Holy Communion of Russell Pollinger, 87, of Trelights. The church bells were rung before and after the service at which Prebendary John May, former rector, presided, assisted by Revd Professor Andrew Lewis. Prebendary Paul Fiddes. Lay Prebendaries David Foster and Frances Kent were also seated in their prebendal stalls. Organist was Jennifer May and servers were Geraldine Ashton, Pam Richards, Sandra Warne, Tom Warne and Trish Warne. Readers were Katrina Gill and Su Coster.

Jonathan Polllinger, Russell's son, recalled memories of his father.

Russell Pollinger was born in New Malden, London on St Swithin's Day 15th July 1928. He was educated first at Holy Cross Convent, New Malden (for which he retained a great affection, always wearing his Holy Cross Convent badge each year on Holy Cross Day, 14th September), then Wimbledon College and finally Kelly College, Tavistock, having moved to Devon when New Malden received the first daylight raid of the Second World War.

He cycled eight miles to school every day with his older brother, Gerald and then later with his younger brother, Murray. Unlike his brothers, who returned to London to work with their father in his author's agency, Russell became a farmer. He spent three years as a student at Burnshall Farm, Chillaton and always said that it was walking 13 miles a day ploughing with horses that caused his knees to wear out!

He started farming on his own account in 1949 on land by his family's home in Chillaton, and in 1962, on his marriage to Judith, his father purchased, as a wedding present, Higher Quither, Chillaton where Russell kept dairy cows, a pedigree flock of Dartmoor sheep and grew hay and corn. Their son Jonathan was born in 1963 and their daughter Naomi in 1966. Raymond Goodall, who lived nearby and who'd helped on the farm from the age of eight, joined the family when he was 13 years old. Problems with organo-phosphate sheep dip, forced Russell to retire early in 1984, when he and Judith moved to Hillows House, Michaelstow. Russell was much in demand on a variety of committees including being a governor of St Petroc's School, Bodmin and on the committee of Trelights Farmhouse, when the festival resided there. He was a founder member of Tavistock Round Table and a past member of Tavistock 41 Club. He had been a member of the Country Landowners Association and the National Farmers' Union. He was member of the Woodland Trust, the Mothers Union and the Hornby Railway Collectors Association, Society His extensive knowledge and keen interest in trains, especially steam trains, led him to join the Launceston Railway Circle where he became chairman for two periods of several years and then was made President.

Toys and model figures were an interest all his life and he enjoyed collecting, painting and restoring what became an extensive collection. He insisted that his toy dog Caesar, much loved and much the worse for wear, should be placed on his coffin.

He loved worshipping at St Endellion and was churchwarden for some years, Head Server and chief steward at the Easter and Summer Music Festivals. Ever practical and good with his hands, he made the Christmas crib, repaired the font cover and was always willing to make things for arrangers of flower festivals and for Judith in her work with children. Whatever Russell was doing (or other people were!) he was determined it should be done properly. He had an especially keen sense of what was proper and dignified and right for anything in the church, and had no hesitation in expressing his views if he thought it wasn't being done as it should be!



Always interested in others, he loved to meet and talk with people. He had a mischievous sense of humour, which he never lost, continuing to joke with his carers right up to his last few days.

Although baptized and confirmed, for many years he only attended church for harvest festival and funerals, but after his mother's death, he became a regular worshipper and it was in St Endellion that his faith grew and deepened. The eucharist meant a great deal to him and he very much appreciated Revd Professor Andrew Lewis regularly bringing him communion in these last weeks. With all his family with him, he died peacefully at home, as he had wished, just 20 minutes after Andrew had prayed and anointed him.

He leaves a widow, Judith, sons Jonathan and Raymond, daughter Naomi and three grandchildren Lauren, Oscar and Olivia.

In his last weeks he was very well cared for and supported by the doctors and district nurses of Port Isaac surgery, Bluebird Care, Cornwall Care and Carers Break

A reception after the service was held at Trevathan Farm, St Endellion. Donations in lieu of flowers for St Endellion Church and the Royal British Legion raised £940.00

Russell's body had been brought into St Endellion Church on Monday evening, the night before his funeral, when a short service was conducted by Revd Professor Andrew Lewis and Prebendary David Foster. Cremation took place at Glynn Valley on Wednesday morning. Revd Canon David Steven officiated.

Websites of the Month

Last week I attended a funeral and a wedding. The funeral I attended was of Captain John Massie, who lived in Trewetha for many years, with Barbara, Richard and their enormous dog, Cadbury (see photo). John had a good send off and one of his son's spoke very warmly about him and I thought it would be nice for readers who knew John and his family to read this extract:

"Finally though it was through his association with Concorde that most will remember him. He was hugely and rightly proud of this plane and proud that he flew it. He never tired of talking about it and showing it off to anyone interested and was at the centre of many of Concorde's 'special' events. He was part of the crew that flew the Queen and Prince Philip round the Middle East, part of the crew that did the only global circumnavigation by Concorde and the captain that held the record for the fastest civilian Transatlantic crossing at 2 hours 57 minutes. There were probably numerous other feats and firsts but for all the pride he took in what he did

he never saw it as being more than a job and always recognised how lucky he was to be doing it. He was the perfect pilot in the perfect plane. But he has landed for the last time now and I can hear him saying 'Captain John Massie and his crew thank you for being part of his life and wish you a happy and successful onward journey in yours'."

So onto some websites about weddings and funerals and I thought I would concentrate on small businesses offering these services rather than the traditional faith communities as the latter are relatively easy to find and of course would suit most people, but if you were looking for something rather different, then these are some pointers that might be helpful.

For some general information about wedding ceremonies and their history see https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Marriage_in_England_and_Wales as there has been an explosion in the types of weddings since the places where such ceremonies could be held was deregulated in 1994 and also same sex marriages have been lawful since 2014. So the available options are very wide.

For funerals the Funeral Helper website http://funeralhelper.org/garden-burial.html answers lots of questions very clearly and it is worth a read. Funerals are also taking on different forms these days and another site, that is clearly an advocate for home burials http://www.funeralinspirations.co.uk/information/Home-Burial.html has a link to a video diary of someone who has done just this and it explains all the ins and outs. They make the point that home burials have been part of the way the very rich have lived in the past and there are no laws against as such, just some regulations concerning public health that need to be followed.

There is a good place to start for Cornwall dwellers actually for all sorts of ceremonies but including weddings and funerals is http://www.cornishcelebrants.co.uk/cornish-ceremonies/. This was set up a couple of years ago, according to the site, by two experienced people who have worked in the Cornish Registration Service for many years. As they say in the background to the project

"..being faced with redundancy we decided to continue doing what we do best – offering bespoke ceremonies to celebrate special events."

So here you can arrange pretty well any celebration you can think of; it can be at dusk, or dawn; can involve pets; it can be in all sorts of places (islands, fields, trains, boats); you can have it in fancy dress. I was really impressed with the care with which they have organised their site so that you can see how much it would all cost. You can get an estimate for any particular things you are after if you fill out an online questionnaire. There are also sites like this one http://www.forbetterforworse.co.uk/towns/Port%20Isaac/cornwall.htm that list the venues for weddings in and around Port Isaac – of course the best venue of the lot.



Also getting increasingly popular are green celebrations and this site http://www.thegreenfuneralcompany.co.uk/p/burials provides all you need for a send off with a small carbon footprint. They have a nice description of how they started:

"The Green Funeral Company was founded in 2000 to offer an ecological alternative to traditional funerals. Since then we have helped hundreds of people through the traumatic days following a death and together we have created appropriate, emotionally rewarding funerals... for the first 9 years we ran it from our home in Cornwall. We have now moved our home to Totnes, and our business to Dartington Hall Estate."

They run the "Sharpham Meadow Natural Burial Ground" with the Sharpham Trust http://
www.sharphamtrust.org who are a wonderful organisation dedicated to promoting a more mindful, compassionate and environmentally sustainable world. They have a photograph of the view of the Sharpham Estate and it is very beautiful. Also one of the pages on the site is a series of photographs of the coffins you could have and they look very nice too!

Finally, just a note that Robert Manders has done a really good summary of the St Endellion Climate Friendly Parish, and I would like to record my thanks to Robert and Penny for a great collaboration over the years. Although this is his last column on the Climate Friendly Parish I am hoping we can have future columns from him from 'upcountry'.

Some of Martin's favourite ingredients.

I love May. Some of my favourite ingredients come into their own and the tired winter vegetables are replaced with tender spring greens. British spring Lamb season is just starting, and Cornish Earlies and Jersey Royals are now available.

Asparagus

The British asparagus season traditionally begins on April 24th and runs for around seven to eight short, but delicious weeks, until the end of June. Visit a farm and pick your own to best appreciate its delicacy. Freshly cut and cooked asparagus is particularly flavoursome and far superior to those sold in supermarkets. Asparagus comes in shades of green and is often tinged with purple, especially at the tips.

To prepare asparagus - if the ends are woody, snap off the ends before cooking. If the asparagus is quite mature, you might need to peel away some of the tougher skin near the base too.

The best way to cook asparagus is to drop the stems into a large pan, filled with lightly salted boiling water and blanch for a few minutes, depending on the thickness of the stems. As soon as they are tender but still have bite, drain and serve straight away. If you're serving them cold it's an idea to refresh them in cold running water to fix the colour.



Asparagus spears with poached free-range duck egg, parmesan crisp and hollandaise sauce

2 bunches of asparagus 3 free-range egg yolks 50ml of white wine vinegar 250g of butter, melted salt and pepper



2 2/3 handfuls of chives, chopped 150ml of white wine vinegar 4 duck eggs 500g of baby spinach, wilted 100g of parmesan, grated

For the asparagus, cut off the base of each stem and, using a peeler, peel from the base all the way down and round. Trim the asparagus so that all the stems are the same size and leave to one side.

For the hollandaise sauce, place the egg yolks into a metal bowl along with the vinegar and place this over a pan of simmering water. Whisk the eggs until they have formed a sabayon, then slowly add the butter, whisking all the time. Remove from the heat and check the seasoning. Finish by adding a good handful of chopped chives. Keep warm until you are ready to serve.

For the parmesan crisp, grate a thin layer of parmesan onto a sheet of parchment paper just big enough to fit into a microwave. Place in the microwave and cook for 45 seconds on medium. Remove the crisp from the paper, wrap gently around a rolling pin, then grill until very light golden brown and then leave to go crisp.

To plate, place a large saucepan onto the heat and three-quarters fill with water. Bring to the boil and add the white wine vinegar. Stir the boiling water around so it causes a vortex then crack the duck eggs one at a time into the water and cook for around 6 minutes

Drop the asparagus into a separate pan of boiling salted water, for a couple of minutes until tender, this will depend on the thickness of the stem.

Place a little pile of the wilted spinach in the centre of each serving dish, remove the asparagus from the water and drain well, then arrange around the spinach. Remove the duck eggs from the water and sit in the centre of the spinach. Gently spoon over a good portion of the hollandaise and top with the parmesan crisp. Enjoy!

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
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
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
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
