Port Isaac's Scilly Gig success in 25th birthday year

Port Isaac Rowing Club's ladies crew found winning form at the World Pilot Gig Championships, held at the beginning of May in the Isles of Scilly. Tony Cook, former Captain of Cornwall Rugby team, took Port Isaac's ladies A crew the top of their category to win a trophy in the club's 25th year.

This was highest placing for the ladies crew since 1995. From lining up against 152 gigs at the St Agnes starting line, the ladies fought through four heats to take the winning spot in group F, coming 61st overall, beating 90 other crews from clubs across Cornwall, Devon and around the world.

Tony said, "I had every faith the ladies would do it. They are all fully committed to the training programme I designed for them and were able to reap the rewards this weekend. The fact that this year we are celebrating the 25th Anniversary of the Port Isaac's first gig launch made it all the more special".

In addition to the Ladies A crew, Port Isaac entered a Ladies B and a Men's crew, both of whom finished second in their

categories. A ladies crew also competed in the Supervets race, coming in the top third -eighth out of 24 gigs.

"Overall it was a great World Championships for Port Isaac Rowing Club and we're really proud of all our crews", added Tony. "Now we're looking forward to doing it all again next year!"

Our MP, Scott Mann talks to Trio

I was pleased to hear that the Government has made a U-turn on its policy to turn every school into an academy. Since it was announced in the Budget in March, I have not been keen on the idea of forcing schools to become academies – especially those which had attained an 'outstanding' rating from Ofsted. I informed the Government that I did not support the policy and would vote against it if brought before the Commons.

I understand the arguments for academies because of the independence that comes with them, but I could not vote for a policy which forced schools to change their status. The Government has said it has listened closely to concerns and that 'Good' and 'Outstanding' schools will not be forced to become academies.

I have visited many schools in North Cornwall in the past year and seen how they work well under different systems, from local authority control to academy trusts. The most important issue with school provision isn't the mechanism of delivery, but the benefits to the child.

Meanwhile, I spoke on the Housing and Planning Bill which was in 'ping-pong' stage as both the Commons and the Lords tried to agree amendments before Parliament rose for prorogation. I welcomed and voted for an amendment to ensure greater protection of high value council houses, which under initial proposals, would have to be sold off to fund the extension of the Right to Buy scheme to housing association tenants.

This greatly concerned me because there are many council houses in coastal communities like Padstow, Boscastle and Port Issac which, through no fault of their own, have increased in value as local house prices escalate. We need to make sure that local people can stay in their communities, and the Government will give local authorities more discretion over what they deem as "higher-value" homes.

There was also much debate on local democracy and neighbourhood plans which are gradually being implemented to properly plan the future of communities. I made a point to the Housing Minister that planning inspectors need to be told to respect the wishes of local people when applications go to appeal which do not fit the locally agreed neighbourhood plan.



It's inevitable that towns and villages grow, but this needs to be in a measured way where local people can have confidence in the change that's occurring in their communities in North Cornwall.

I was also delighted to welcome two North Cornwall community shops to Parliament in the Countryside Alliance Awards - also known as the 'Rural Oscars'.

Padstow Farm Shop won the coveted Clarissa Dickson Wright Award for its work in farming, education, campaigning and conservation. Farm shops are fantastic because they enable communities to buy locally produced food which is fresh and of top quality, which in-turn gives more support to local farmers and strengthens local economies.

St Tudy Community Shop was also shortlisted for the Best Village Shop award, which is a great boost considering the shop has only just celebrated its fifth birthday since being set up by local people.

NEW RNLI BOOK

Port Isaac RNLI staged an evening reception at The Chapel Cafe in Port Isaac to launch a new book, "An Illustrated History of Port Isaac Lifeboats, 1899-2016" jointly written by their Chairman Bob Bulgin BEM and well known author of many books charting RNLI Lifeboat history, Nicholas Leach.

The reception recorded the fascinating story of Port Isaac's historic RNLI Station and the courageous RNLI volunteers as it approaches its 150th year of sea rescue service and also promoted sales of the book which was fully funded by private donation and the Padstow based print company, TJ International in support of the RNLI.

The beautifully crafted 120-page book contains a wealth of information and first hand gripping accounts of rescue work carried out throughout the years. Enhanced by198 photographs in monochrome and colour, many of have not been published before. Further insight into the station's vibrant activity is covered within the pages with details of events supporting the station by dedicated committee members and local artists, A selection of full colour reproductions of Port Isaac lifeboat in action are included in a seven page section.

Readings from the book were given by leading members of the current lifeboat crew Damien Bolton, Andy Cameron and past Hon Sec Jon Cleave plus past crew member David Sumner.

At the close of the evening, which included the sale of over 50 of the books, donations and raffle, there was the sale of a special limited edition run of personally numbered and named hard back editions of the book, raising a further £1000. The unique one-off limited edition publications were in fact hand crafted by TJ International Business Leader, Peter Leach bringing together both traditional book binding techniques with special individual embroidered images and titling created by Wovina, Bodmin .

Betty was the youngest of five surviving children. Her father was a farmer and she was brought up a country girl. When she was 12 her mother died so she went to live with her older sister and her family. She worked in service as a maid and during the war was a member of the Land Army. She met her future husband at the end of the war and moved to the West Midlands. There were three children, Mary, Mark and the youngest son Matthew who sadly died at the age of 35. Hers was a hardworking and productive life and throughout good times and bad Betty's character always shone through.

Family, friends and strangers all felt the warmth and magnetism which Betty exuded. The transference of energy and love were instantly felt in that impulsive hug - even the doctor was included! Rooms lit up with her charismatic presence. She loved colours and combined them beautifully in her unique style of dress - this could be casual and 'way out' or breath-takingly different.

Betty was practical, artistic, musical, loved gardening, cooking, baking - and JOKES! She loved visiting and one could often see her walking round the village, going into different homes or standing chatting in the street. If anyone was ill or upset she would be there with some cakes and was always able to support, boost confidence and lighten folks' lives.

During her life she learned Italian, had typing and piano lessons. She became qualified as a beauty therapist and during her study course, although she was by far the oldest student in the class, was a favourite with everyone. Most of her female friends were told, "You need plenty of blusher to keep you looking young." She also enjoyed knitting, sewing, cycling, yoga, badminton, walking and swimming - indeed she went swimming regularly. Until very recently she kept fit and was active - "Let's all go for a picnic today!" or "I'm walking to art class, I must keep my sugar levels down!" Letter writing was something she also always enjoyed - sending cards too, of her own design and beautifully printed and presented by Michael, all with the familiar pretty stickers on the envelopes.

Mother, Nan, Great Nan and Aunt, her family meant so much and she was very much loved by them all. She would really play with her grandchildren when they were young and they always enjoyed visiting or staying with her and Michael. She was the centre of a family who adored her.

Michael and Betty were together for 51 years and theirs was certainly an everlasting love a 'Cathy & Heathcliffe' or a 'Romeo & Juliet' - it was a strong a bond as either of these. They have had a varied, exciting and happy life together, including quite a lot of travelling - going on holiday, here or abroad, and visiting family. Once could feel the magnetism between them and this has never waned. They would make spontaneous decisions, Betty being probably the more impulsive, but it led to a fulfilling and varied time together.

So many remember Betty - 'a one-off character', 'the life and soul of the art class', 'a good friend to me', 'always full of fun, she made us laugh a lot', 'a special lady', 'unforgettable', 'such a warm and cheery lady, I loved having chats with her on one of her "keep fit" walks', 'she always had time for me', 'her passing will leave an enormous void in all our lives', 'her spirit will always be around us in everything beautiful'.

warmer and for me that means one thing ... mackerel. Mackerel is a beautiful oily fish and with its iridescent, striking skin, and distinctive flavour, it looks stunning on

the plate. Mackerel is a comparatively sustainable fish though the Marine Conservation Society recommend only buying line-caught, UK-landed mackerel where possible and to eat it only occasionally.

Mackerel can be cooked in many different ways, though baking, barbecuing, grilling and pan-frying are the most quickly pan-frying the fillets; just remember to remove the pin bones first by cutting a V notch down the middle of the fillet and pulling the pin bones out.

Barbecuing is fantastic way to cook mackerel fillets as the high heat gets the skin super-crispy and the flesh is cooked in no time.

Pan fried Mackerel Fillets

Heat a dash of olive oil in a frying pan to a medium/high heat; fast and quick is the key! Dry the mackerel fillets with kitchen paper, season the flesh with salt and add to the frying pan, skinside down. As the fillets curl up away from the heat, gently apply pressure to the fillet to ensure that the fish stays flat and all of the skin comes into contact with the pan

common. Arguably the simplest way to cook mackerel is Cook for 1 2 minutes, depending on the thickness of the fillet. Once the skin is crisp and golden, turn the fillet over and remove the pan from the heat. Leave the mackerel in the pan to cook through, for 30 seconds (no more or the fish will over cook!)

> I will do more Mackerel recipes as the summer warms up, but if you need your fix now get down to the Fish Cellars, as line caught fish are great at this time of year.

and one last Asparagus recipe!

As some of you will know, Asparagus season is one of my favourite times of the year. So as the season is about to end I thought I would combine my love of quiche and asparagus and salty Parma ham.

Asparagus and Chervil Quiche

1kg asparagus, peeled and cut into 6-8 cm lengths Shortcrust pastry



1 pinch of chives, chopped plus extra for greasing 100g of spring onions, chopped 1 pinch of salt 350g of mascarpone 1 egg 4 egg yolks

140g of Parma ham 400g of plain flour, plus extra for dusting 1 bunch of chervil, chopped 200g of butter, cold and diced, 2 eggs 1 egg yolk, for brushing the pastry ice cold water

1/2 tsp salt & pinch black pepper

Place the flour into a bowl with the salt and the diced butter. Transfer into a food mixer set to a low setting and mix until like fine breadcrumbs - about 1 minute. Alternatively, you could rub the mixture between your thumb and forefinger until it resembles breadcrumbs.

Add the egg and then add the iced water, little by little, until the dough comes together (it should not be too dry, otherwise it will just crumble when you roll it out). Place the dough in cling film and transfer to the fridge to rest for 30 minutes.

When the dough is ready to roll out, preheat the oven to 180°C/gas mark 4, and grease and flour your quiche tin. Roll out the pastry to a 0.5cm thickness and lay this into the tin. Line the pastry with a sheet of foil and fill with baking beans. Blind bake the pastry with the baking beans in the oven for 20 minutes, or until the pastry achieves a light golden colour. Remove the baking beans and foil, and brush the base of the tart case with egg yolk. Bake for a further 5 minutes, then remove from the oven. Allow the pastry to cool while you make the filling.

Reduce the oven temperature to 170°C/gas mark 3.

Blanch the asparagus in boiling salted water for 3 minutes and then refresh in iced water for two minutes. Drain and dry well. Mix the chervil, chives, mascarpone, spring onion, eggs, egg yolks, salt and pepper in a bowl and set aside. Lay the asparagus spears in the cooled pastry tart, pointing outwards in a circular pattern, then lay the ham in between the asparagus. Pour on the chervil and mascarpone mix. Bake in the oven for 25-30 minutes, until it is light brown and firm to touch in the centre. Allow to cool to room temperature, slice and then serve.

So that's it for this month, have a good one, and let's hope no one takes the P.I.S.S!
