Duchess of Cornwall celebrates the link between Port Isaac and disadvantaged children in Kosovo

On Tuesday July 19th, HRH The Duchess of Cornwall was the special guest at a reception celebrating the relationship between Port Isaac and some of the poorest children at the other end of the continent.

For several years, Port Isaac people have been donating shoes, clothes, money and practical support to help ethnic minority children in



Kosovo, one of the poorest countries in Europe. Poverty forces the children to try to earn money by begging, and their parents earn a few euros a day by sorting through rubbish for metal and plastic to recycle. Support from Cornwall has enabled children to get off the streets and into school.

Port Isaac residents have visited Kosovo to run art and music projects for the children, to help with catch-up classes, and to refurbish a building used for lessons, a kindergarten, adult education and other activities to strengthen the community. Support has also come from Rotary Clubs around Cornwall.

The unlikely relationship started when a Port Isaac couple working in Kosovo set up a charity, The Ideas Partnership, to help marginalized minority children into school. They learned that the obstacles were complex - including lack of clothes and shoes for the harsh winters, poor healthcare, parents' poverty, and lack of entry-level education. As friends and neighbours in Port Isaac began to hear about the charity's work, the contributions and ideas flowed in.

HRH The Duchess of Cornwall visited The Ideas Partnership in Kosovo in March this year, and heard how support from Cornwall was helping the charity's work. She met many of the children who have benefited, and gave them a gift of books to help their reading (including HRH The Prince of Wales' 'The Old Man of Lochnagar'). The children made her a piece of art with a message of thanks, combining the flags of Cornwall and Kosovo.

Her Royal Highness asked to meet those in Cornwall whose support has made so much possible. During her Port Isaac visit she met over 50 locals and others who have helped the children in diverse ways: villagers who have gone out to Kosovo to volunteer; people who have donated baby clothes, shoes, and wheelchairs; representatives of Port Isaac village school, where the children have been swapping books about themselves with children on the other side of the continent; and individuals and representatives of groups that raised money, including Bodmin College, Rotary Falmouth, the overseas project team of Rotary Cornwall, and Port Isaac's Fisherman's Friends.

Kosovo Ambassador to the UK, His Excellency Lirim Greicevci was among those greeting Her Royal Highness. He said, "The UK has been a key supporter of



Kosovo's freedom and independence and the relationship between our two countries is strong and deep. The visit by Their Royal Highnesses The Prince of Wales and The Duchess of Cornwall in Kosovo in March marked a high point of this relationship. I am equally as proud of the people-topeople contacts and, in particular, of the generous support from our many friends at Port Isaac through The Ideas Partnership who are doing an outstanding job for local communities in Kosovo."

Her Royal Highness's meeting with Port Isaac supporters of The Ideas Partnership was in parallel with HRH The Prince of Wales's tour of the village.



Our MP, Scott Mann talks to Trio ...

I'm delighted that the Conservative Party has ushered Britain's second female Prime Minister into Number 10. Of course the qualities of the person should be more important than their gender, but I nevertheless still welcome this milestone in British politics.

Theresa May, who is state educated and has been one of our longest serving Home Secretaries, is known for her steely resolve and perseverance which will be vital tools in negotiating a deal with Brussels.

I know that people in Cornwall will be concerned about EU funding following the referendum, and this was top of my list when talking with party leader candidates about what they planned for our country. Although EU funding in Cornwall is set to end by 2020 anyway, all of Cornwall's MPs want to see a replacement implemented which will see less hoop-jumping.

We discussed it at length in recent meetings with the Local Enterprise Partnership (LEP) and Cornwall Council, with the LEP also updating us on its Growth Deal 3 project which will see millions of pounds invested in Cornwall by central government until 2020.

Cornwall has already secured £198m from Growth Deals 1 and 2 which have been implemented in the last few years which aim to create 4,000 jobs and 6,000 new homes in the county.

In June I went to Stepper Point to meet with the Coastwatch organisation who monitor the Camel Estuary. During the watch, we observed kayakers, sail boats and fishing vessels, all of whom are kept safe by this fantastic organisation.

They are looking for volunteers to join the group, and I cannot recommend it enough for those who want give something back to the community and enjoy the fantastic views on offer from their HQ.

In Parliament I took part in the launch of the new All Party Parliamentary Group for Entrepreneurship, which will certainly help with my campaign to promote small business and tourism in North Cornwall.

I'm also keen to promote women in enterprise as we have some exceptional women running small businesses in North Cornwall, and I'm confident that they will inspire young school leavers to do the same and start their own enterprises.

The Federation for Small Businesses has launched a Women in Enterprise campaign and I have been championing this in the Commons.




In July, we remembered the sacrifice made to restore democracy as we paid tribute to the tens of thousands of soldiers who fell at the Battle of the Somme - the bloodiest battle in British military history. The stories from the trenches at that time are truly shocking and gives us all a reality check on modern life today.

St Endellion Churchyard

I would like to take this opportunity to explain some of the difficulties we have had with St Endellion Churchyard this year.

When we took the maintenance of the churchyard back from the County Council we reemployed our previous contractor to cut the grass. Sadly just after he started this season he had a stroke and has had to give up his business. He did however pass the work on to another contractor. Unfortunately this did not work out. And we were left with no one to cut the grass at the peak growing time.

We now have the probation service in to carry out the work and as you will see doing a fantastic job. They not only cut the grass but strim around memorials and cut the hedges out as well. There is still work to be done, but once it is up to standard again we will continue to employ them on a permanent basis. Their supervisor Ted Mitchell has had many years of experience and they all seem happy to carry out the work under his supervision. We are not only bringing the churchyard up to standard but also providing a service.

Another problem we hope to address is to carry out repairs to headstones that are leaning and in some cases unsafe. This will cost money and we do have a very limited budget. If you have a loved one's memorial that needs attention we would welcome you to have it repaired yourselves. You just need to call Drew Memorials of Bodmin (01208 76435) and they will carry out the work and invoice you direct.

I hope this has explained where we are with the churchyard and we will continue to care for it into the future.

Many years ago, I travelled to long for the first time, to stay with the Community at the Abbey there. It was a long journey by car to Oban, by ferry to the isle of Mull, across Mull in a bus, and then a second, smaller ferry across to the isle of Iona. As the ferry pulled in to the jetty on Iona. I could see a crowd of people. Some were lining up ready to get on the ferry going the other way, but others seemed to standing there expectantly, as if they were waiting for something.

Now the thing to remember about Iona is that unless you live there, you are not allowed to take a car onto the island. Also, if you go to stay for a week at the Abbey, most people arrive at the same time. As we straggled off the ferry, I realised that the crowd of people waiting expectantly were there to meet us foot passengers, most of whom would be staying with the Community. As I got to the top of the slipway, a very colourfully dressed woman greeted me with a large smile and asked if I was going to the Abbey. She took my heavy bags and put them in the van with everyone else's and then led a group of us up the road to the Abbey, where tea and scones were waiting for us weary travellers.

But the welcome didn't end there. Over the week in encounters with volunteers and resident staff as well as other quests, I met people who listened and cared. who never judged, but supported and challenged me, who were passionate about justice and peace in our world today, and who showed me more of the love of God than I had ever come across before. We shared meals together, and we worked alongside one another doing basic chores and we worshipped together using words and songs that were simple and real.

I wasn't a churchgoer, I didn't really know what I thought about God, but I knew that these people had welcomed me because they were Christians in one way or

another. And their welcome changed my life, because it was God's welcome. In the words of an Iona song:

> God welcomes all, strangers and friends God's love is strong and it never ends

I hope and pray that in our churches and in our communities, we can all be people who feel welcomed by God and are able to offer something of God's welcome to all those who we meet.

Planning Applications

The following applications were received and Members made the following responses to Cornwall Council:

- 1. PA16/04851, Land North East of Port Gaverne Hotel new dwelling. Members supported this application unanimously on the grounds that the site is highly suitable for development and will provide a home for a local family.
- 2. PA16/05231, 5 Trewetha Lane, Port Isaac demolition of existing dwelling and erection of replacement dwelling. Members objected unanimously to this application.
- 3. PA16/05339, Rosemary Cottage, 38 Fore Street, Port Isaac Listed Building Consent to repaint front of property - walls, windows, front door, fascia boards and rainwater goods/soil vent pipe. Members had no objection.
- 4. PA16/05374, 10 Castle Rock, Port Isaac ground floor rear bedroom extension and store. Enlargement of balcony. Members had no objection.
- 5. PA16/05911, 25 Silvershell Road, Port Isaac non-material amendment following grant of planning permission PA16/01667 (extension and remodelling of an existing single storey dwelling and associated garage). Members had no objection.

Coach Parking

Members are seeking to identify an area of land that could be used as a coach park, to alleviate the existing parking problems.

Port Isaac Playing Field

Funding is being sought to fund toilets, retail kiosk and changing rooms on the playing field. The possibility of additional funding for more play equipment is also being investigated.

The hedge between the playing field and the car park and the roadside hedge along the footpath are to be severely cut back and reduced in height to encourage bushier growth.

Members were pleased to grant permission to the school to hold a Dog Show on the Playing Field on 3rd September 2016. The dog prevention order will be suspended for the day.

I love chutneys! They are a great way to add some summer sun to dull winter days. Homemade chutneys can be made from fruit, vegetables or a mix of both, slow cooked with herbs, spices, vinegar and sugar to your liking, and then left in a jar to mature and mellow before eating.

First I am going to tell you how to make the Panch Phoran Masala, is a very traditional spice mix used in the Bengali cuisine. It is a blend of five spices.

Ingredients:

- 50 grams cumin seeds 50 grams mustard seeds
- 50 grams fennel seeds
- 50 grams nigella seeds (black onion seeds)
- 25 grams fenugreek seeds

Gooseberry Chutney

Ingredients:

500g of gooseberries, frozen 21/2 tsp panch poran 11/4 tsp fennel seeds 3/4 tsp cumin seeds 3 cloves 2 black cardamom pods 300g of white onion, sliced 30g of ginger 30g of garlic 11/4 tsp ground coriander 3/4 tsp chilli powder 3/4 tsp ground turmeric 120g of palm sugar, or brown 75ml of white wine vinegar 75ml of water 50ml of vegetable oil

Heat the vegetable oil in a heavy-based pan over a medium heat. Add the panch poran, fennel, cumin seeds, clove and black cardamom to the pan and fry until aromatic, then add the sliced onion and cook until golden in colour

While the onions are frying, blitz the garlic and ginger in a food processor with a small splash of water to form a paste. Add to the pan and cook for a further 5 minutes

Add the chilli powder, ground coriander and turmeric to the pan along with the frozen gooseberries. Mix well to combine, then add the palm sugar, white wine vinegar and water

Bring up to a boil then simmer for approximately 30 minutes, or until it forms a thick chutney-like consistency

Remove from the heat and allow to cool. Divide into sterilised jars, seal and store at room temperature for 4-6 months. Refrigerate and use with 2-3 weeks after opening.

This spicy tomato chutney recipe is the perfect accompaniment to cold cuts and cheese, or on a sandwich or burger.

What you need to do:

Preheat a small pan on medium heat. Dry roast all the ingredients until well roasted and you start smelling the aromas of the roasted ingredients. Once roasted, turn off the heat and allow the seeds to cool. Once cooled, powder the Panch Phoran

Spiced Tomato Chutney edients: 800g of tinned chopped tomatoes

Ingredients:

2 red chillies, deseeded 2 banana shallots, chopped 15g of fresh ginger, chopped 2 garlic cloves, chopped 450g of caster sugar 200ml of white wine vinegar 1 tsp mustard seeds salt

freshly ground black pepper

Drain the chopped tomatoes through a sieve placed over a bowl. Reserve about a quarter of the juice captured in the bowl, discarding the rest (or save to use in a stew or bolognese)

Place the roughly chopped chillies, shallots, ginger and garlic in a blender and blitz to form a smooth paste. Transfer to a heavy-bottomed saucepan along with the sugar, vinegar, mustard seeds and reserved tomato juice

Bring the mixture to a boil over a medium heat then simmer until reduced by a third. Add in the reserved drained tomatoes and season with salt and pepper to taste

Turn the heat down slightly and cook gently for about 1-1.5 hours until the chutney is thick and shiny. Allow to cool before serving. The chutney can be stored in a non-metallic container in the fridge for up to 1 month

So here's to silly season, and remember people, reverse gear makes your car go backwards. Мx

WEBSITES OF THE MONTH

Continuing the theme from last month, which was about wild plants in the County, this month, given the wonderful harvest we are having of fruit and vegetables I thought I would take a trip around the web to see what it had to offer for growing fruit and vegetables. And to give it a nod in the direction of environmental issues, I thought I would start with some good news about climate change from Exeter University www.exeter.ac.uk/news/featurednews/title_528495_en.html. Researchers here have found that the climate in Cornwall has increasing areas that can be classified as subtropical where we will be able to grow more exotic crops – they mention Japanese

persimmon and quinoa. The Environment and Sustainability Institute that have shown this are based at Penryn, www.exeter.ac.uk/esi/ and their website is definitely worth a visit. On the site they have, among other things, short videos about what they do. The latest one is about the work they have been doing on bees - for instance working with a local business to develop bricks with holes that bees like to nest in.



As I say, well worth a visit http://ow.ly/ElhN302y5QF. Another is about a huge bluefin tuna that was washed up on a Cornish beach and how the Institute put on an educational event for the public to understand more about this amazing animal.

However, for advice about growing fruit and vegetables, there are some websites that allotment associations have established that give useful information. For example the South West Counties Allotment Association (http://ow.ly/VIQC302xiyD) has a guide for beginners that is pretty comprehensive. It also has links to bee keeping websites - and many more – for example compost making and so on – all useful if you are going to be a serious fruit and or vegetable grower. The National Allotment Association has pages on its website www.nsalg.org.uk/growing-advice/ specifically aimed at the 'novice grower' and these, as with the previous one are very useful. They have a nice section that has tasks for the month. For August, they suggest lifting your onions; thinning out apple and pear clusters; harvesting your early grapes and other soft fruit; sowing seeds for late crops; pruning apple and pear trees; and there is advice about managing pests.

You can get some good ideas from the Cornwall Garden Society website that has a really excellent section on gardens in Cornwall and what is grown there and also a section on hints and tips cornwallgardensociety.org.uk/hints-tips ; the section on Autumn and Winter is something to look forward to.

Going back to the idea of growing more subtropical plants, there are a couple of nice sites that give good advice about how to manage the obvious problems that might arise – a cold snap, pests etc. Firstly, Tropical Permaculture www.tropicalpermaculture.com/tropical-vegetables.html has a list of warm and tropical vegetables and ideas on how best to grow them. Permaculture itself is an interesting topic and you can read more about it on the website. The idea is to design your approach to cultivation in a way that uses the natural characteristics of the plants and animals in the ecosystem to regulate it rather than doing lots of things yourself. It comes from the idea of permanent culture

A second useful source of tips, this time for tropical fruits in our sometimes less than tropical climate can be found in the website of "Off The Grid News" http://ow.ly/ hV3O302xkbU. There are some good instructions on how to grow pineapples for example. There is an amusing and well-presented video that they link to on www.youtube.com/watch?v=Y1klxRnjZOI that shows how to grow pineapples indoors if the weather where you are isn't subtropical after all.

I thought I would finish off today with a mention of the extraordinary records that have been broken for global warming. The headline in the Guardian newspaper "Hottest ever June marks 14th month of record-breaking temperatures" summed it up. So the upside is if things carry on like this more tropical fruit and veg should be on offer and the downside ... the Guardian article is good on that too http://ow.ly/1spA302xkDH
